A's vs. RANGERS

The A's trail in the season series, 4-5...are 3-3 in Texas and 1-2 in Oakland...have lost the season series five times over the previous seven seasons and are 66-76 (.465) against the Rangers since 2006...are 307-320 all-time against the Texas Rangers...that breaks down to 165-148 in Oakland and 143-172 in Texas...including 76-84 at Rangers Ballpark...have an all-time record of 404-402 against the Rangers/Senators.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour is a perfect 17 for 17 in save opportunities...has converted each of his last 35 save chances, which is the second longest streak in Oakland history...has 43 saves with the A's and needs one more to tie Billy Koch and Keith Foulke for eighth place in Oakland history.

Coco Crisp ranks second in the American League in home runs batting leadoff (8)...is tied for eighth among all AL players in stolen bases (13).

Brandon Moss has six home runs in the month of June, which is tied for second in the American League this month.

Chris Young hit a three-run home run last night and four of his seven home runs have come with two runners on base.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1932 Roger Cramer ties an American League record by collecting six hits in six at bats in a nine inning game...in 1972 Catfish Hunter pitches all 11 innings of the A's 3-2 win over Detroit...Joe Rudi has three hits including the game winning homer to lead off the bottom of the 11th...in 1990 Terry Steinbach drives in six runs on a grand slam and a two-run single as the A's defeat the Tigers at Detroit, 12-7...in 2002 Billy Koch records the save in a 5-3 win at Pittsburgh, giving him the save in all three games of the three-game series against Pittsburgh.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost four of the last six games and are 5-6 over the last 11 contests...however, have gained 1½ games in the standings over that span as Texas has gone 4-8...remain in sole possession of first place in the American League West for the eighth consecutive day and 10th day in the last 13 days and have a two-game lead over Texas...are 43-31, which is the second best record in the AL and sixth best in the majors...it is the best start by an A's team since 2003 (44-30)...are 25-12 (.676) since May 11, which is the best mark in the majors over that span (Cincinnati, 24-13)...are 100-57 (.636) since July 1 of last year, which is also the best mark in the majors over that stretch (Cincinnati, 98-60)...are 101-61 over the last 162 games...for the season, have spent 23 days in sole possession of first, three days tied for first, 46 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

SERIES NOTES: Have lost two of the first three games of this series after losing two of three to Seattle over the weekend...need a win today to avoid losing back-to-back series for first time since May 10-15, also against Texas and Seattle...the series loss to the Mariners last weekend snapped a nine series unbeaten streak (7-0-2) and it was the A's first series loss since May 13-15 against Texas...have lost the first game of each of the last two series after winning 10 straight...that tied for the second longest winning streak in series openers in Oakland history to a 12-game streak from July 2-Aug. 10, 2001...are now 16-8 in the first game of a series...that includes 0-3 against Seattle and 16-5 against everyone else...have swept eight series this year...last year, the A's did not record their first sweep until June 12-14 at Colorado.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 17-6 with a 3.02 ERA (71 er in 211.1 ip) and .226 (177 for 783) opponents batting average over the last 32 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA and .272 opponents batting average over the first 42 contests...have tossed seven or more innings in 18 of the 32 games allowed two runs or fewer 20 times...are 31-27 with a 4.12 ERA (207 er in 451.2 ip) for the season...lead the AL in innings pitched, rank third in wins, fourth in fewest walks (116) and eighth in ERA...have surrendered the third most home runs (57).

PITCHING: The A's have allowed 19 runs in the first three games of this series after allowing 17 runs in six games on the last homestand...now have a 2.94 ERA (96 er in 293.2 ip) and .229 (250 for 1091) opponents batting average over the last 32 games (since May 17) after logging a 4.35 ERA and .255 opponents average over the first 42 contests...for the season, rank second in the American League in opponents on-base percentage (.297) and third in ERA (3.73), fewest walks (186), opponents batting average (.244) and opponents slugging percentage (.388).

OFFENSE: The A's are 38 for 138 (.275) with 27 runs scored over the last four games after hitting .204 with 23 runs scored over the previous eight contests...have hit a season-high four home runs twice this year, both in the month of June (6th at Chicago, Sunday vs. Seattle)...have 23 home runs this month, which is second most in the American League to Boston (25)...for the season, the A's lead the majors in walks (286)...rank second in the AL in hit by pitches (28), third in doubles (146) and extra base hits (233) and fourth in runs scored (345) and intentional walks (17).

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 30-16 (.652) record in night games, which is tied with St. Louis for the best record in the majors...are 13-15 (.464) during the day, which is the fifth worst mark in the American League...have a 3.48 ERA (162 er in 418.2 ip) at night compared to 4.15 (117 er in 254.0 ip) during the day...have the second lowest night ERA in the AL and the fifth highest day ERA...are batting .252 (406 for 1608) with 238 runs scored in night games (5.17 per game) compared to .238 (225 for 947) with 107 runs during the day (3.82 per game).

AGAINST THE WEST: The A's are 22-12 (.647) against American League West competition compared to 21-19 (.525) against everyone else...have the second best intra-division record in the AL (Texas, 21-10)...are batting .266 (320 for 1202) with 195 runs (5.74 per game) against the AL West compared to .230 (311 for 1353) with 150 runs (3.75 per game) against the rest of baseball...are 2-4 in this 10-game stretch against divisional foes that runs through Sunday (1-2 vs. Seattle, 1-2 at Texas, 0-0 at Seattle).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-2 on this seven-game road trip to Texas (1-2) and Seattle (three games)...went 4-3 on the last road trip to Milwaukee (2-1) and Chicago-AL (2-2) and have won 11 of the last 18 road games...are 21-19 (.525) on the road overall, which is the fourth best road record in the American League...went 4-2 on the last homestand against New York (3-0) and Seattle (1-2) and are 22-12 (.647) at home for the season, which is the second best home record in the AL...had their 11-game home winning streak snapped by Seattle last Friday night...it was the third longest home winning streak in Oakland history and was the longest since a 12-game streak from Aug. 13-Sept. 14, 2002.

CLOSE CALLS: Have lost each of their last two one-run games after winning nine of the previous 10...are 14-9 (.609) in one-run games for the season...lead the American League in one-run wins, have the fourth most games (23) and have the fourth best record...are 6-2 (.750) in extra inning games...lead the AL in extra inning wins and have the third best record...are 11-3 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for second in the AL in last at bat wins...have three wins when trailing after eight innings, which is tied for the most in the AL...have five "walk-off" wins.

THIS AND THAT: The A's are 4 for 4 with a home run, walk and two sacrifice flies in their last seven plate appearances with the bases loaded...lead the majors in plate appearances with the bases loaded (94) and are tied for the lead in doubles (6)...lead the American League in bases loaded grounded into double plays (7), are tied for the lead in sacrifice flies (7), rank second in RBI (62) and third in walks (8)...A's pinch hitters are batting .118 (8 for 68), which is tied for second lowest in the AL...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (78), rank second in walks (9) and tied for second in home runs (2) and RBI (7)...are 35-0 when leading after eight innings and are one of three AL teams that has not lost in that situation (Texas and Toronto)...sent 10 men to the plate in the fourth inning Monday, the 17th time this year they sent at least nine men to the plate in an inning...did that just 22 times last year.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 15th start of the season...the A's are 7-7 (.500) in his starting assignments this year and are 19-10 (.655) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 11 of his 14 starts, allowed two runs or fewer six times and walked two batters or fewer 12 times.

THREE-GAME LOSING STREAK: Is 0-3 with a 4.15 ERA (12 er in 26.0 ip) and .229 (24 for 105) opponents batting average over his last four starts...the losing streak is a career high.

AGAINST THE WEST: Was the losing pitcher in his last start against Seattle, his first career loss against an American League West team...is 4-1 with a 3.26

ERA (14 er in 38.2 ip) in five starts against AL West competition this year compared to 1-5 with a 4.44 ERA (25 er in 50.2 ip) in eight starts against everyone else...is 7-1 with a 2.71 ERA (20 er in 66.1 ip) in 11 career starts against intra-division foes and 5-6 with a 4.02 ERA (47 er in 105.1 ip) in 18 starts against everyone

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 4-2 with a 3.16 ERA (18 er in 51.1 ip) in eight starts at night compared to 1-4 with a 4.97 ERA (21 er in 38.0 ip) in six starts during the day...is tied for the American League lead in day losses...is now 11-3 with a 2.71 ERA (34 er in 113.0 ip) in 18 career starts at night compared to 1-4 with a 5.06 ERA (33 er in 58.2 ip) in 11 starts during the day.

BY INNING: Has a 0.64 ERA (1 er in 14.0 ip) in the first inning this year and 1.24 (4 er in 29.0 ip) in his career...has allowed 33 of his 42 runs this year (78.6%) in the fourth through sixth innings...has a 1.71 ERA (8 er in 42.0 ip) over the first three innings of a game, 6.86 (30 er in 39.1 ip) in innings four through six and 1.13 (1 er in 8.0 ip) from the seventh inning on.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .169 (20 for 118) batting average the first time through the lineup, which is the third lowest mark in the American League among pitchers with 60 or more innings pitched...has yielded a .280 (63 for 225) average after that...opponents are batting .196 (21 for 107) with two outs, which is ninth lowest in the AL (min. 60 ip)...including 3 for 28 (.107) with runners in scoring position and two outs, which is third lowest (min. 60 ip)...10 of the 14 home runs he has allowed have come with the bases empty...two have been grand slams, which is tied for the AL lead.

ON THE BASES: Has not allowed a stolen base this year and opponents are 0 for 2 in stolen base attempts...is one of three qualifying pitchers in the American League that has not allowed a steal (Colón, Sabathia)...opponents are 1 for 6 (16.7%) off him in his career.

2013 START-BY-START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-2 win over Seattle April 4 in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first four innings...won his second consecutive start in the A's 8-1 win at Los Angeles April 11...matched his career-high by tossing 8.0 innings...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Houston April 16 in Oakland...walked a career-high four batters in six innings but struck out eight...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save...was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-6 loss at Boston April 22...allowed a career-high nine runs on a career-high tying eight hits in 4.0 innings...allowed a grand slam to Napoli in the Red Sox five run fifth inning...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 7-3 loss to Baltimore *April 27* in Oakland...allowed four runs in the fourth inning on a two-run home run by Markakis, a solo home run by Jones and a RBI single by Hardy...combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a six-hit 2-0 shutout at New York May 3...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all six of the hits...allowed just one base runner as far as third base and that was in the third inning when Stewart walked and went to third on a Cano double...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-3 loss at Cleveland *May 8*...blanked the Indians on two hits over the first four innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high tying 14.0 innings...was the winning pitcher in the A's 5-1 win over Texas May 13...allowed a two-out solo home run to Moreland in the second inning but that was the only run he would allowed in seven innings...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Kansas City May 19 in Oakland ... allowed single runs in the third, fourth and fifth inning and left with the A's trailing 3-2...was the winning pitcher in the A's 11-5 win at Houston May 25...allowed a careerhigh tying three home runs, all solo shots...was the losing pitcher in the A's 5-2 loss at San Francisco May 30...blanked the Giants on one hit and one walk over the first five innings and had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a two-run single to Sandoval in the sixth...had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 10 inning loss at Milwaukee June 4...tossed 7.0 shutout innings and allowed just four hits while walking one...left after seven innings with a 3-0 lead but Doolittle allowed three runs in the eighth (Cook blown save)...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-2 loss at Chicago June 9...allowed a solo home run to Flowers in the third, two runs in the fourth and a solo home run to Rios in the eighth.

LAST START: He lost his third consecutive decision in the A's 4-0 loss to Seattle last Saturday in Oakland...allowed a career-high tying eight hits...blanked the Mariners on five hits over the first six innings...then allowed a grand slam to Blanco in the sixth inning...Hernandez, Furbush and Medina combined to shutout the A's on six hits and two walks.

GRIFFIN vs. TEXAS: Is 1-0 with a 2.87 ERA (15.2 ip, 15 h, 6 r, 5 er, 4 bb, 12 so, 1 hr) in three career starts...the win came in his only start this year, a 5-1 A's win in Oakland May 13...allowed a two-out solo home run to Moreland in the second inning but that was the only run he would allowed in seven innings...blanked the Rangers on four hits over his final five innings...had two no decisions in two starts last year...the first no decision came in the A's 4-3 loss at Texas June 29...tossed 6.0 shutout innings and allowed just two hits...loaded the bases on two walks and a hit with one out in the second but retired each of the next 13 hitters before Hamilton singled with two outs in the sixth...was relieved by Blevins with the A's leading 2-0 entering the bottom of the seventh...Balfour allowed four runs in the eighth for the loss and Cook was charged with the blown save...also had a no decision in the A's 12-5, American League West clinching win in the final game of the regular season October 3 in Oakland...the A's scored a run in the first but he allowed five runs, four earned, in the third inning...Beltre had a RBI single, Young a RBI double, Murphy a two-run single and Soto a RBI single...left after 2.2 innings but the A's scored six times in the fourth.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Bartolo Colón (9-2, 2.89 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 15th start of the season...is 6-0 with a 1.05 ERA and no home runs allowed in 43.0 innings over his last six starts...the winning streak is tied for the second longest winning streak of his career...is the first A's pitcher to win six consecutive starts since Dan Haren (July 26-Aug. 21, 2006)...picked up his ninth win of the season in his last start, which is tied for second in the AL...since 1991, the only times the A's had a 10-game winner before the end of June was in 2002 (Zito, 10), 2003 (Mulder 11) and 2004 (Mulder, ..was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 10-2 win over Seattle last Sunday in Oakland (7.0 ip, 8 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 so)...is 17-12 with a 3.92 ERA in 34 career appearances, all starts, against Seattle...the 17 wins are the most among active pitchers against the Mariners...is 10-1 with a 1.91 ERA (18 er in 84.2 ip) in 12 career starts at Safeco Field...was the winning pitcher in his only start against Seattle this year, his last start.

The A's bullpen has a 1.95 ERA (6 er in 27.1 ip) over its past eight games and a 2.93 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...is also second in the AL in opponents on-base percentage (.292)...is tied for fourth in save percentage (75.0%)...has the fewest losses (4) and walks (70)...first batters faced are 41 for 193 (.212) with nine walks and a hit by pitch (.251 on-base percentage)...the on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors...the bullpen tossed 10.0 innings a week ago today against New York and did not allow a run...it was only the third time in Oakland history that A's relievers tossed 10 or more innings without allowing a run (also Sept. 20, 1997 vs. Seattle, 10.0 ip; June 12, 1992 vs. Texas, 12.0 ip).

- Hit the game-ending home run in the bottom of the 19th inning April 29 against Los Angeles, his third career walk-off home run (last: September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) and fifth career game-ending hit (also a double and single)...also homered in the sixth inning, his second career multi-homer game (June 12, 2012 at Colorado)...had 12 innings between home runs to become the 17th player in Major League history to go at least 12 innings between home runs in one game...is the second Athletic to do it...Reggie Jackson also went 12 innings between home runs June 11, 1969...had four strikeouts to become the second Major Leaguer since 1916 to have at least two home runs and four strikeouts in one game...Evan Longoria did it August 4, 2009 for Tampa Bay against Boston.
- Made his first career appearance in center field May 9 (also May 13).
- Hit the 7000th home run in Oakland history May 13 against Texas off Justin Grimm in the third inning...hit the 12,000th home run in Athletics franchise history June 5 at Milwaukee, a three-run homer off Michael Gonzalez in the seventh inning.
- Played third base for the second time as a professional May 24 at Houston in the ninth inning...the
 other time was in 2002 with the Red Sox affiliate in the Gulf Coast League.
- Had his second two homer game of the season June 12 against New York (AL) and third of his
 career...the two homers gave him a streak where each of his last five hits were home runs...is the
 sixth player in Oakland history (10th time) to do that, the first since John Jaha (June 18-20, 1999)...
 the others are Jackson, McGwire (five times), Canseco and Giambi.

PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

DEREK NORRIS

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up
 going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in
 Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12,
 1992 vs. Texas).
- Had a career-high four RBI June 11 against New York (AL).

SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

JOSH REDDICK

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career
 stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases
 during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento

CHRIS RESOP

 Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.

- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.
- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.
- Had a career-high four walks June 12 against New York.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)...matched that May 15-21 (6 for 15, .400).
- · Had the first two-steal game of his career June 12 against New York

CHRIS YOUNG

- Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.
- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
- His sixth inning double April 11 at Los Angeles was the 200th of his career.
- Had his 11th career regular season multi-homer game April 24 at Boston (also has one in the post-season).
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from April 30 to May 17 with a strained left quad...it was his second

 for 1 with two walks, a run and a stolen base in a start in center field against Oklahoma City.
