A's vs. MARINERS

The A's trail in the season series, 5-6...are 3-4 in Oakland and 2-2 in Seattle...over the previous seven seasons, the A's have won the season series in even numbered seasons (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012) and the Mariners have won in odd numbered years (2007, 2009, 2011)...the A's are 76-68 (.528) against Seattle since 2006...all-time, the A's are 309-230 (.573) against Seattle, which is the second best mark by any team against the Mariners to Boston's .576 mark (min. 20 games)...are 171-99 in Oakland, 137-130 in Seattle and 1-1 in Tokyo...are 61-66 at Safeco Field.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour is a perfect 17 for 17 in save opportunities and is one of three Major League closers without a blown save...has converted each of his last 36 save chances, which is the longest active streak in the majors and four short of the Oakland record of 40 (Eckersley, 1991-92)...has 44 saves with the A's, which is tied with Koch and Foulke for eighth in Oakland history.

Yoenis Céspedes had the third two-homer game of his career and all have come this month...has four home runs against Seattle this year and has hit 10 of his 38 career home runs against the Mariners.

Brandon Moss has six home runs in the month of June, which is tied with Céspedes and two other players for fourth in the American League this month

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1969 Sal Bando, Ted Kubiak and Reggie Jackson all hit solo homers in the third inning of the A's 7-3 win against Minnesota in the first game of a doubleheader...it is the first three-homer inning in Oakland history...in 1979, twelve days after Jim Essian's inside-the-park Grand Slam, Larry Murray hits an inside-the-park home run in the A's 6-5 win over the Texas Rangers.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Are 6-7 over the last 13 games but have gained ½ game in the standings over that span as Texas has gone 6-8...remain in sole possession of first place in the American League West for the 10th consecutive day and 12th day in the last 15 days and have a one-game lead over the Rangers...are 44-32, which is the second best record in the AL and fifth best in the majors...it matches the best start by an A's team over the last 13 years (2002 and 2003)...the 44 wins are already the A's most before the All-Star Break since 2008 (51-44)...are 19-9 (.679) during this stretch that began May 24 and concludes tomorrow where the A's play 30 games in 31 days...following Sunday's game, the A's will have three days off over an eight-day stretch through July 1...are 26-13 (.667) since May 11, which is the best mark in the majors over that span (Toronto, 23-12)...are 101-58 (.635) since July 1 of last year, which is also the best mark in the majors over that stretch (Cincinnati, 98-62)...are 101-61 over the last 162 games...for the season, have spent 25 days in sole possession of first, three days tied for first, 46 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

PITCHING: The A's pitching staff has compiled a 2.98 ERA (103 er in 310.2 ip) and .230 (266 for 1155) opponents batting average over the last 34 games (since May 17) after logging a 4.35 ERA and .255 opponents average over the first 42 contests...for the season, the A's lead the American League in opponents on-base percentage (.297), rank second in opponents slugging percentage (.387) and third in ERA (3.73) and opponents batting average (.244)...have issued the second fewest walks (189).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 18-6 with a 3.04 ERA (76 er in 224.2 ip) and .225 (187 for 830) opponents batting average over the last 34 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA and .272 opponents batting average over the first 42 contests...have tossed seven or more innings in 19 of the 34 games and allowed two runs or fewer 21 times...are 32-27 with a 4.10 ERA (212 er in 465.0 ip) for the season...lead the AL in innings pitched, rank third in wins and eighth in ERA...are tied for the third most home runs (59).

OFFENSE: The A's hit a season-high tying four home runs last night...it was their third four-homer game of the season and all have come this month (6th at Chicago, last Sunday vs. Seattle)...have 11 home runs in the last six games and are batting .279 (58 for 208) with 36 runs scored over that span (6.00 runs per game)...did not walk last night but still lead the majors with 293 for the season...struck out 10 times last night, marking the 10th time in Oakland history the A's won a game in which they struck out 10 or more times without drawing a walk...it was the third time in the last two years...rank second in the American League in hit by pitches (28), third in doubles (148) and extra base hits (239) and fourth in runs (354) and on-base percentage (.327).

MONTH-BY-MONTH: The A's are 12-8 in June after going 16-12 in both April and May...have six consecutive months with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the A's longest such streak since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...have hit 27 home runs this month, which is tied with Boston and San Diego for the most in the majors...rank second in the AL with 89 runs in June.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 31-16 (.660) record in night games, which is the best mark in the majors (St. Louis, 31-17)...are 13-16 (.448) during the day, which is the third worst mark in the American League...have a 3.47 ERA (165 er in 427.2 ip) at night compared to 4.16 (121 er in 262.0 ip) during the day...have the lowest night ERA in the AL and the fifth highest day ERA...are batting .252 (414 for 1642) with 246 runs scored in night games (5.23 per game) compared to .241 (237 for 983) with 110 runs during the day (3.79 per game).

AGAINST THE WEST: The A's began the season by going 13-3 against American League West competition compared to 5-15 against all other teams through May 9...are 10-10 against the West since May 10 while going 16-4 against everyone else...for the season, are 23-13 (.639) against the AL West compared to 21-19 (.525) against everyone else...have the second best intra-division record in the AL (Texas, 22-10)...are batting .267 (340 for 1272) with 204 runs (5.67 per game) against the AL West compared to .230 (311 for 1353) with 150 runs (3.75 per game) against the rest of baseball...are 3-5 in this 10-game stretch against divisional foes that concludes tomorrow (1-2 vs. Seattle, 1-3 at Texas, 1-0 at Seattle).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 2-3 on this seven-game road trip to Texas (1-3) and Seattle (1-0)...went 4-3 on the last road trip to Milwaukee (2-1) and Chicago-AL (2-2) and are 22-20 (.524) on the road, which is the fourth best road record in the American League...went 4-2 on the last homestand against New York (3-0) and Seattle (1-2) and are 22-12 (.647) at home, which is the second best home record in the AL...return home following the game tomorrow for an eight-game homestand against Cincinnati (two games), St. Louis (three games) and the Cubs (three games).

CLOSE CALLS: Have lost each of their last three one-run games after winning nine of the previous 10...are 14-10 (.583) in one-run games for the season...lead the American League in one-run wins, are tied for the third most games (24) and have the fourth best record...are 6-2 (.750) in extra inning games...lead the AL in extra inning wins and are tied for the third best record...are 11-3 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for second in the AL in last at bat wins...have three wins when trailing after eight innings, which is tied for the most in the AL...have five "walk-off" wins.

SERIES NOTES: Have lost back-to-back series to Seattle and Texas, marking the first time the A's have lost two straight series since May 10-15, also against Texas and Seattle...the series loss to the Mariners last weekend snapped a nine series unbeaten streak (7-0-2) and it was the A's first series loss since May 13-15 against Texas.

THIS AND THAT: The A's lead the majors in plate appearances with the bases loaded (100)...lead the American League in bases loaded grounded into double plays (7), rank second in doubles (6) and RBI (63), tied for second in sacrifice flies (7) and third in walks (9)...A's pinch hitters are batting .116 (8 for 69), which is second lowest in the AL...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (80), rank second in walks (10) and RBI (8) and tied for second in home runs (2)...are 36-0 when leading after eight innings and are one of three AL teams that has not lost in that situation (Texas and Toronto)...have faced a right-handed starting pitcher in each of the last seven games after facing a lefty 12 times over the previous 19 contests...have faced a left-handed starting pitcher 26 times this year, which is the most in the AL.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 12th start of the season...the A's are 8-3 (.727) in his starting assignment this year and are 13-5 (.722) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in six of his 11 starts, allowed two runs or fewer five times and walked two batters or fewer eight times.

THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 3-0 with a 3.38 ERA (14 er in 37.1 ip), .209 (29 for 139) opponents batting average and five walks in 37.1 innings over his last six starts...the winning streak is a career high...went 1-2 with a 7.27 ERA, .257 opponents batting average and 12 walks in 26.0 innings over his first five starts.

ROOKIE LEADERS: Is tied for second among American League rookies in wins (4) and ranks third in strikeouts (48), innings pitched (63.1) and games started (11).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .229 opponents batting average and a .342 slugging percentage...based on a minimum of 60 innings pitched, he has the eighth lowest slugging percentage in the American League and the 10th lowest batting average...has yielded a .198 (19 for 96) batting average the first time through the lineup, .233 (21 for 90) the second time and .278 (15 for 54) after that...the mark the first time through the lineup is fifth lowest among AL pitchers with 60 or more innings...has allowed a .213 (13 for 61) batting average to hitters leading off an inning, which is 10th lowest among AL pitchers with 60 or more innings...opponents are batting .192 (29 for 151) with the bases empty compared to .292 (26 for 89) with runners on base...including .354 (17 for 48) with runners in scoring position, which is fifth highest in the AL among pitchers with 60 or more innings...allowed two home run in his last start, snapping a sixgame, 40.0-inning homerless streak...has issued 12 of his 17 walks to left-handed hitters...has allowed a .400 (12 for 30) batting average to the opponents number three hitter but the cleanup hitter is batting just .133 (4 for 30).

THE WEST AND THE REST: Is 2-2 with a 6.68 ERA (24 er in 32.1 ip) in six starts against American League West competition compared to 2-0 with a 3.19 ERA (11 er in 31.0 ip) in five starts against all other teams...his career numbers are 3-2 with a 5.93 ERA (36 er in 54.2 ip) in 10 starts against the West, 3-1 with a 3.00 ERA (16 er in 48.0 ip) in eight starts against everyone else.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 3-1 with a 5.62 ERA (26 er in 42.2 ip) in seven starts at night compared to 1-1 with a 3.74 ERA (9 er in 21.2 ip) in four starts during the day...has allowed all five of his home runs at night.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on four days rest today...is 0-2 with a 7.00 ERA (21 er in 27.0 ip) in five starts on four days rest compared to 4-0 with a 3.47 ERA (14 er in 36.1 ip) in six starts on five days rest or

BRIEFLY: Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started the fifth game of the season April 5 at Houston...was optioned to Sacramento the next day when Bartolo Colón was reinstated from the suspended list...went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA in three starts with the River Cats before being recalled from Sacramento April 29 to start for Brett Anderson...started that night, was optioned to Sacramento April 30 and recalled May 1 when Anderson went on the DL...is 3-2 with a 4.64 ERA (27 er in 52.1 ip) in nine starts

2013 HIGHLIGHTS: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-3 victory at Houston April 5...struck out a career-high and Oakland rookie record tying 11 batters in 6.2 innings (sixth time, last: Tim Hudson, Sept. 10, 1999 at Tampa Bay)...is the ninth pitcher in Oakland history to strikeout 11 or more in fewer than seven innings, the first since Kirk Saarloos on September 19, 2006 (11 so in 5.0 ip)...did not issue a walk and is the 12th pitcher in Oakland to strikeout 11 or more without walking a batter...had a no decision in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win over Los Angeles April 29 in Oakland...allowed a career-high six runs in 4.2 innings...had a no decision in the A's 5-4 win at New York May 5...left a 4-1 lead in the sixth inning but Blevins allowed two inherited runners to score plus one of his own for the blown save...was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-3 loss at Seattle May 10...allowed a career-high tying six runs in 5.0 innings...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 6-2 loss to Texas May 15 in Oakland...tossed just 4.1 innings, matching his career low...combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a three-hit shutout in the A's 1-0 win at Texas May 21...tossed a career-high 7.0 innings and allowed two of the hits...did not walk a batter to become just the second visiting pitcher at Rangers Ballpark to toss seven or more innings and allow two or fewer baserunners (Erik Bedard, July 7, 2007)...won his second consecutive start in the A's 4-1 win over San Francisco *May* 27...blanked the Giants on three hits over the first five innings to extend his scoreless streak to a careerhigh 12.0 innings...had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 10 inning win over Chicago June 1 in Oakland...left with a 3-1 lead but Doolittle allowed two runs for the blown save...had a no decision in the A's 5-4, 10inning win at Chicago June 6...matched his career-high by tossing 7.0 innings.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 8-7 loss at Texas on Monday...allowed a career-high tying six runs on a career-high tying eight hits in 4.2 innings...allowed a Pierzynski two-run home run in the second and a Martin RBI double in the third...the A's then scored six times in the fourth to take a 6-3 lead but he allowed a solo home run to Cruz in the bottom of the fourth...allowed a RBI double to Pierzynski in the fifth and was relieved by Chavez, who allowed a two-run home run to Cruz for the loss.

STRAILY vs. SEATTLE: Is 0-1 with an 8.86 ERA (9.1 ip, 9 h, 10 r, 9 er, 8 bb, 7 so, 3 hr) in two career starts...the loss came in his only start this year, a 6-3 A's loss at Seattle May 10...allowed a career-high tying six runs in 5.0 innings...allowed a RBI single to Morse and a RBI double to Smoak in the first inning...then allowed a three-run home run to Ibanez in the third and a RBI double to Morales in the fifth...had a no decision in his start last year in a 7-4, 10-inning A's win in Oakland September 29...allowed an unearned run in the second inning when Jaso scored on a Céspedes error...then allowed three runs in the fourth inning on a Seagar home run and a Saunders two-run home run...left after 4.1 innings with the A's trailing 4-1 but Oakland scored once in the eighth, twice in the ninth and three times in the 10th for the

WITH SACRAMENTO: Went 3-0 with a 0.96 ERA (18.2 ip, 11 h, 5 r, 2 er, 6 bb, 20 so) in three starts with Sacramento...was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in wins at the time of his April 29 promotion...has a .159 opponents batting average, including .111 (3 for 27) by left-handed hitters compared to .190 (8 for 42) by right-handers...did not allow a home run in 18.2 innings.

The A's bullpen had two losses, one save, two blown saves, a 5.40 ERA (7 er in 11.2 ip) and .320 (16 for 50) opponents batting average in five games on the road trip after posting a 1.99 ERA and .226 opponents batting average on the last homestand...has issued the fewest walks in the American League (70) and has the second lowest opponents on-base percentage (.293)...also ranks fourth in ERA (2.96)...has the fewest losses (5)...first batters faced are 42 for 197 (.213) with nine walks and a hit by pitch (.248 on-base percentage)...the on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors...has allowed 32 of 89 (36.0%) inherited runners to score, which is the highest percentage in the AL

- Is a perfect 18 for 18 in save opportunities and is one of three Major League closers without a blown save (Mujica, STL and Gregg, CHI)...is tied for fifth in the American League in saves.
- His save last night was his 44th with the A's, which ties him with Billy Koch and Keith Foulke for eighth in
- Has not allowed a run in his past 10 games and 9.1 innings...has not allowed a run in 21 of his last 22 appearances (1 er in 21.2 ip, 0.42 ERA) and has a 1.17 ERA for the season, which ranks fourth among AL relievers.
- Grant, May 1-August 14, 1970 His streak of converting 18 consecutive saves to start the season is the longest such streak by an A's pitcher since Dennis Eckersley set the record by converting each of his first 36 saves in 1992...has not blown a save since April 29, 2012 at Baltimore and has now converted each of his last 36 save chances, which is the longest active streak in the majors and second longest in Oakland history...since 1999, the only AL closer with a longer streak is Jose Valverde (51, Sept. 4, 2010-Sept. 28, 2011).
- Has not yielded a run in 13 appearances on the road (12.1 ip).

- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was
 the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.
- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts
 with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an
 Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Had an 18.0-inning scoreless streak from May 20 to 31.

- Struck out nine batters May 26 at Houston in his first start after turning 40 to set an Athletics record
 for strikeouts by a 40-year old...the previous high was seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs.
 Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland
 history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days),
 Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days)
- Tossed a five-hit shutout May 31 against Chicago (AL) to become the second 40-year old in Oakland history with a shutout (Don Sutton: 40 years, 85 days on June 26, 1985 against Chicago).

RYAN COOK

 Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his
 eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...added two more
 on June 3 at Milwaukee and June 11 against New York (AL)...in Oakland history, only Rickey
 Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more...is tied for fourth in Athletics history with
 Max Bishop behind Henderson, Eddie Joost (19) and Campaneris (13).
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was
 by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in
 addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.
- Was on the 15-day disabled from April 30 to May 14 with a strained left hamstring...it was his seventh career stint on the DL, his fourth with the A's.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning.
- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland)...also had four-hit games May 14 against Texas and May 25 at Houston.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of April 22-28...it was his first career
 weekly honor...went 12 for 22 (.545) with four runs, seven doubles (.864 slugging percentage), 10
 RBI and seven walks (1 sf, .633 on-base percentage) in seven games.
- Had a career-high seven-game hitting streak from May 11-18 (12 for 26, .462).
- Made his Major League debut at shortstop in the ninth inning May 24 at Houston...had one appearance at shortstop in the minors with Triple-A Sacramento on Aug. 2, 2012.
- Hit his first career grand slam in the sixth inning June 7 at Chicago, turning a 3-0 deficit into a 4-3 win.

SEAN DOOLITTLE

Had a career-high tying 13.1-inning scoreless streak from April 29 to May 27.

NATE FREIMAN

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 3 against Seattle and had a RBI single
 off Joe Saunders in the second inning for his first ML hit...added another single in the fourth inning
 for his first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run April 22 against Houston, a three-run shot off Erik Bedard in the first inning...it snapped a 0 for 11 streak.
- Had his second career three-hit game June 11 and both have come against the Yankees in games started by Sabathia (also May 3).
- Had his first career "walk-off" hit June 13 against New York, a RBI single in the 18th inning off Rivera.

JOHN JASO

- Is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster with his third team (Tampa Bay, 2011; Seattle, 2012).
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 9 at Los Angeles, a three-run shot off Jepsen in the seventh to give the A's a 7-5 lead.
- Played first base May 24 at Houston, his second career appearance at first base (Aug. 25, 2010 at Los Angeles-AL).

JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying four RBI April 15 against Houston (fourth time, last: September 19, 2011 vs. Baltimore).
- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career...added his fourth June 1 agaisnt Chicago (AL).
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.
- Hit the game-ending home run in the bottom of the 19th inning April 29 against Los Angeles, his third career walk-off home run (last: September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) and fifth career game-ending hit (also a double and single)...also homered in the sixth inning, his second career multi-homer game (June 12, 2012 at Colorado)...had 12 innings between home runs to become the 17th player in Major League history to go at least 12 innings between home runs in one game...is the second Athletic to do it...Reggie Jackson also went 12 innings between home runs June 11, 1969...had four strikeouts to become the second Major Leaguer since 1916 to have at least two home runs and four strikeouts in one game...Evan Longoria did it August 4, 2009 for Tampa Bay against Boston.
- Made his first career appearance in center field May 9 (also May 13).
- Hit the 7000th home run in Oakland history May 13 against Texas off Justin Grimm in the third inning...hit the 12,000th home run in Athletics franchise history June 5 at Milwaukee, a three-run homer off Michael Gonzalez in the seventh inning.
- Played third base for the second time as a professional May 24 at Houston in the ninth inning...the
 other time was in 2002 with the Red Sox affiliate in the Gulf Coast League...returned to third base
 in the 16th inning of the A's 18-inning game against New York (AL) June 13.
- Had his second two homer game of the season June 12 against New York (AL) and third of his
 career...the two homers gave him a streak where each of his last five hits were home runs...is the
 sixth player in Oakland history (10th time) to do that, the first since John Jaha (June 18-20, 1999)...
 the others are Jackson, McGwire (five times), Canseco and Giambi.

PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

DEREK NORRIS

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up
 going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in
 Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12,
 1992 vs. Texas).
- Had a career-high four RBI June 11 against New York (AL).
- Caught all 18 innings June 20 against New York (AL)...is the second A's catcher since 1973 to catch 18 innings in a game (Damian Miller, Aug. 8, 2004 against Minnesota)

SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

JOSH REDDICK

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career
 stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases
 during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento
 (May 28-30)...appeared in two games in right field and two at designated hitter.
- Walked with the bases loaded in the 10th inning June 1 against Chicago to force in the winning
 run...it was the 25th "walk-off" walk in Oakland history, the first since Bobby Crosby did it in the
 17th inning against Los Angeles (NL) June 17, 2006...it was his third career walk-off RBI (single,
 double).
- Snapped a career-high 30-game homerless streak with a solo shot in the seventh inning off Quintana June 6 at Chicago (AL).

CHRIS RESOP

 Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.
- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and ended up
 going 1 for 6...he and Norris had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by
 a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).

Struck out as a pinch hitter in the 10th inning June 13 against New York (AL) and ended up going 0 for 4 with a career-high four strikeouts...is the first player in Oakland history to strikeout four times in a game that he didn't start.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Doubled in the second inning April 3 against Seattle in his first game since September 28, 2011 at Seattle...that extended his hitting streak to six games dating back to September 24, 2011 (8 for 20, .400), which is the longest hitting streak of his career.
- Did not strike out May 5 in New York, snapping his career-high streak of 12 consecutive games with
 a strikeout (20 strikeouts total)...that included back-to-back four strikeout games last May 1 and 3...
 according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first Athletic to strike out four times in back-to-back
 games...the four strikeouts match his career high (three times).

SETH SMITH

- Went 2 for 3 with a double April 1 against Seattle in his fifth consecutive Opening Day start (2009-10 in left field with Colorado, 2011 in right field with Colorado, 2012-13 at designated hitter with Oakland)...is 7 for 22 (.318) with two doubles, a home run and three RBI in his five openers...is the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at designated hitter since Erubiel Durazo (2003-05).
- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.
- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.
- Had a career-high four walks June 12 against New York.
- Started the game June 13 against New York (AL) 1 for 6 before singling in the 16th and 18th innings...is the third player in Oakland history to collect two hits in a game in the 16th inning or later...the others are Dick Green on June 4, 1971 against Washington (17th and 21st) and Bert Campaneris on Sept. 6, 1969 against Minnesota (16th and 17th).

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)...matched that May 15-21 (6 for 15, .400).
- Had the first two-steal game of his career June 12 against New York.
- Stole a base in three consecutive games from June 5-13 (four stolen bases total) after stealing four bases over the first 115 games of his career.

CHRIS YOUNG

- Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.
- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
- His sixth inning double April 11 at Los Angeles was the 200th of his career.
- Had his 11th career regular season multi-homer game April 24 at Boston (also has one in the post-season).
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from April 30 to May 17 with a strained left quad...it was his second
 career stint on the DL...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento May 16 and went 1
 for 1 with two walks, a run and a stolen base in a start in center field against Oklahoma City.
- Had back-to-back three-hit games for the second time in his career May 24 and 25 at Houston (Aug. 16-17, 2007).
