The A's won the first meeting of 2013 last night...after today, the A's also face the Reds in Cincinnati Aug. 6-7 for the A's first appearance at Great American Ballpark...last met in 2010 when the A's were swept in a three-game series in Oakland, June 21-23...have lost four of their last six games against the Reds after winning each of the first seven...the A's lead the all-time series, 9-4...are 6-4 in Oakland and 3-0 in Cincinnati

### TODAY'S TIDBITS

**Grant Balfour** is a perfect 18 for 18 in save opportunities and is one of three Major League closers without a blown save...has converted each of his last 36 save chances, which is the longest active streak in the majors and four short of the Oakland record of 40...has 44 saves with the A's, which is tied with Koch and Foulke for eighth in Oakland history.

### THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1958** Hector Lopez hits three home runs in the A's 8-6, 12 inning win over Washington...in **1974** Campy Campaneris has two hits in the A's 5-0 win over California, giving him 1000 in his Oakland career...in **1997** Mark McGwire hits his ninth career grand slam in a 6-3 win over Texas, tying the franchise record held by Jimmie Foxx, Sam Chapman and Gus Zernial...in **2005** the A's set an Oakland record for margin of victory in a shutout with a 16-0 win over San Francisco...switch-hitter Nick Swisher becomes just the second player in Oakland history to homer from both side of the plate in the same game.

### ABOUT THE A's

**ABOUT THE A'S:** Have lost four of the last six games and seven of the last 11...are 45-34 overall, which is the third best record in the American League...it matches the best start by an A's team over the last 21 years (2000, 2002, 2003, 2004)...the 45 wins are already the A's most before the All-Star Break since 2008 (51-44)...are tied with Texas for first place in the AL West...have spent 13 of the last 15 days and 15 of the last 19 with at least a share of first...are 1-0 in this eight-day stretch where they have three days off (June 24-July 1)...that follows a 31-day stretch from May 24-June 23 where they played 30 games...went 19-11 (.633) over that span, which was the second best record in the majors (Toronto, 18-9)...are 102-60 (.630) since July 1 of last year, which is the best mark in the majors over that span (Cincinnati, 99-64)...are 7-9 over the last 16 games...went 12-4 over the first 16 games (second best record in the majors through April 18), 6-15 over the next 21 contests (tied for the worst in the majors from April 19 to May 10) and 20-6 from May 11 to June 7 (best in the majors)...have spent 25 days in sole possession of first, five days tied for first, 48 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth

**INTERLEAGUE PLAY:** The A's are 6-2 in interleague play, which is the fourth best record in the majors (3-1 vs. San Francisco, 2-1 vs. Milwaukee, 1-0 vs. Cincinnati)...have a 3.01 ERA (24 er in 71.2 ip), which ranks seventh, and are batting .273 (75 for 275), which is 10<sup>th</sup> best...after this two-game series with the Reds, the A's host St. Louis and Chicago for a pair of three-game series...conclude interleague play with a three-game series at Pittsburgh July 8-10 and a two-game series at Cincinnati Aug. 6-7...went 10-8 against the National League last year, snapping a streak of three consecutive seasons with a losing interleague record...it was the ninth time in 16 seasons the A's had a winning interleague record...the A's are now 160-132 (.548) all-time in interleague play, which is sixth best.

**MONTH-BY-MONTH:** The A's are 13-10 in June after going 16-12 in both April and May...with one more win in June, the A's will clinch a winning record for the seventh consecutive month dating back to last June...that is tied for the fourth longest such streak in Oakland history and is the longest since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...have hit 29 home runs this month, which is tied for second in the American League (Baltimore, 30).

**NIGHT AND DAY:** The A's have a 32-17 (.653) record in night games, which is the best mark in the majors (St. Louis, 32-19)...are 13-17 (.433) during the day, which is the third worst mark in the American League...have a 3.54 ERA (175 er in 444.2 ip) at night compared to 4.21 (127 er in 271.1 ip) during the day...have the lowest night ERA in the AL and the fourth highest day ERA...are batting .254 (433 for 1707) with 258 runs scored in night games (5.27 per game) compared to .240 (245 for 1020) with 113 runs during the day (3.77 per game).

**PITCHING:** The A's have compiled a 5.53 ERA (42 er in 68.1 ip) and .276 (75 for 272) opponents batting average over the last eight games...however, have a 3.18 ERA (119 er in 337.0 ip) over the last 37 games (since May 17) after logging a 4.35 ERA over the first 42 contests...for the season, the A's lead the American League in opponents on-base percentage (.299), rank fourth in opponents batting average (.246) and fifth in ERA (3.80)...have the second fewest walks (198).

**STARTING PITCHING:** A's starting pitchers have gone three consecutive games without a decision for the first time this year...are 18-6 with a 3.15 ERA (84 er in 239.2 ip) and .230 (204 for 888) opponents batting average over the last 37 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA and .272 opponents batting average over the first 42 contests...are 32-27 with a 4.13 ERA (220 er in 480.0 ip) for the season...lead the American League in innings pitched, rank third in wins and eighth in ERA...are tied for the second most home runs (63).

**OFFENSE:** The A's are batting .274 (85 for 310) with 51 runs scored and 13 home runs over the last nine games...hit a season-high tying four home runs last Friday night in Seattle...it was their third four-homer game of the season and all have come this month (6<sup>th</sup> at Chicago, 16<sup>th</sup> vs. Seattle)...lead the majors in walks (304)...rank second in the AL in hit by pitches (28) and third in doubles (152) and extra base hits (245).

**HOME AND AWAY:** The A's are 1-0 on this eight-game homestand against Cincinnati (1-0), St. Louis (three games) and the Cubs (three games)...went 4-2 on the last homestand against New York (3-0) and Seattle (1-2) and have won 14 of the last 15 home games...are 23-12 (.657) at home, which is the best home record in the American League and third best in the majors...went 2-5 on the last road trip to Texas (1-3) and Seattle (1-2) and are 22-22 (.500) on the road.

**CLOSE CALLS:** Have lost each of their last three one-run games after winning nine of the previous 10...are 14-10 (.583) in one-run games for the season...are tied with Cleveland for the American League lead in one-run wins, have the fourth most games (24) and the fourth best record...are 6-3 (.667) in extra inning games...lead the AL in extra inning wins...are 11-5 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for third in the AL in last at bat wins...have three wins when trailing after eight innings, which is tied for the most in the AL...have five "walk-off" wins, which is tied for third in the AL.

**THE WEST AND THE REST:** The A's began the season by going 13-3 against American League West competition compared to 5-15 against all other teams through May 9...are 10-12 against the West since May 10 while going 17-4 against everyone else...for the season, are 23-15 (.605) against the AL West compared to 22-19 (.537) against everyone else...are batting .268 (360 for 1345) with 212 runs (5.58 per game) against the AL West compared to .230 (318 for 1382) with 157 runs (3.83 per game) against the rest of baseball.

**THIS AND THAT:** The A's lead the majors in plate appearances with the bases loaded (102)...lead the American League in bases loaded grounded into double plays (7), rank second in doubles (6), tied for second in RBI (66) and third in walks (9)...A's pinch hitters are batting .113 (8 for 71), which is third lowest in the AL...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (82), rank second in walks (10), tied for second in home runs (2) and third in RBI (8)...are 37-0 when leading after eight innings and are one of three AL teams that has not lost in that situation (Texas and Toronto)...have faced a right-handed starting pitcher in each of the last 10 games after facing a lefty 12 times over the previous 19 contests.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his 16<sup>th</sup> start of the season...the A's are 7-8 (.467) in his starting assignments this year and are 19-11 (.633) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 11 of his 15 starts, allowed two runs or fewer seven times and walked two batters or fewer 13 times.

**THREE-GAME LOSING STREAK:** Is 0-3 with a 4.02 ERA (14 er in 31.1 ip) and .220 (27 for 123) opponents batting average over his last five starts...the losing streak is a career high.

**INTERLEAGUE:** Is 0-1 with a 2.84 ERA (4 er in 12.2 ip) in two interleague starts this year...is now 0-1 with a 2.89 ERA (6 er in 18.2 ip) in three career interleague starts.

**BY INNING:** Has a 0.60 ERA (1 er in 15.0 ip) in the first inning this year and 1.20 (4 er in 30.0 ip) in his career...has allowed 35 of his 44 runs this year (79.5%) in the fourth through sixth innings...has a 1.60 ERA (8 er in 45.0 ip) over the first three innings of a game, 6.91 (32 er in 41.2 ip) in innings four through six and 1.13 (1 er in 8.0 ip) from the seventh inning on.

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** Has allowed a .165 (21 for 127) batting average the first time through the lineup, which is the third lowest mark in the American League among pitchers with 70 or more innings pitched...has yielded a .278 (65 for 234) average after that...his career numbers are .182 (45 for 247) the first time through the lineup, .269 (115 for 428) after that...opponents are batting .188 (21 for 112) with two outs, which is sixth lowest in the AL (min. 70 ip)...including .103 (3 for 29) with runners in scoring position and two outs, which is tied for the lowest (min. 70 ip).

**THE LONG BALL:** Has allowed 15 home runs, which is tied for ninth most in the American League...including two grand slams, which is tied for the AL lead...11 of the home runs he has surrendered have been solo shots...10 have come on the road.

**ON THE BASES:** Has not allowed a stolen base this year and opponents are 0 for 2 in stolen base attempts...is one of two qualifying pitchers in the American League that has not allowed a steal (Sabathia)...opponents are 1 for 6 (16.7%) off him in his career.

**NIGHT AND DAY:** Is 4-2 with a 3.16 ERA (18 er in 51.1 ip) in eight starts at night compared to 1-4 with a 4.78 ERA (23 er in 43.1 ip) in seven starts during the day...is tied for the American League lead in day losses...is now 11-3 with a 2.71 ERA (34 er in 113.0 ip) in 18 career starts at night compared to 1-4 with a 4.92 ERA (35 er in 64.0 ip) in 12 starts during the day.

**AGAINST THE WEST:** Is 4-1 with a 3.26 ERA (16 er in 44.0 ip) in seven starts against American League West competition compared to 1-5 with a 4.44 ERA (25 er in 50.2 ip) in eight starts against everyone else...is 7-1 with a 2.76 ERA (22 er in 71.2 ip) in 12 career starts against intra-division foes and 5-6 with a 4.02 ERA (47 er in 105.1 ip) in 18 starts against everyone else.

**2013 START-BY-START:** He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-2 win over Seattle **April 4** in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first four innings...won his second consecutive start in the A's 8-1 win at Los Angeles **April 11**...matched his career-high by tossing 8.0 innings...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Houston **April 16** in Oakland...walked a career-high four batters in six innings but struck out eight...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save...was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-6 loss at Boston **April 22**...allowed a career-high nine runs on a career-high tying eight hits in 4.0 innings...allowed a grand slam to Napoli in the Red Sox five run fifth inning...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 7-3 loss to Baltimore **April 27** in Oakland...allowed four runs in the fourth inning on a two-run home run by Markakis, a solo home run by Jones and a RBI single by Hardy...combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a six-hit 2-0 shutout at New York **May 3**...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all six of the hits...allowed just one base runner as far as third base and that was in the third inning when Stewart walked and went to third on a Cano double...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-3 loss at Cleveland **May 8**...blanked the Indians on two hits over the first four innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high tying 14.0 innings...was the winning pitcher in the A's 5-1 win over Texas **May 13**...allowed a two-out solo home run to Moreland in the second inning but that was the only run he would allow in seven innings...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Kansas City **May 19** in Oakland...allowed single runs in the third, fourth and fifth inning and left with the A's trailing 3-2...was the winning pitcher in the A's 11-5 win at Houston **May 25**...allowed a career-high tying three home runs, all solo shots...was the losing pitcher in the A's 5-2 loss at San Francisco **May 30**...blanked the Giants on one hit and one walk over the first five innings and had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a two-run single to Sandoval in the sixth...had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 10 inning loss at Milwaukee **June 4**...tossed 7.0 shutout innings and allowed just four hits while walking one...left after seven innings with a 3-0 lead but Doolittle allowed three runs in the eighth (Cook blown save)...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-2 loss at Chicago **June 9**...allowed a solo home run to Flowers in the third, two runs in the fourth and a solo home run to Rios in the eighth...lost his third consecutive decision in the A's 4-0 loss to Seattle **June 15** in Oakland...allowed a career-high tying eight hits...Hernandez, Furbush and Medina combined to shutout the A's on six hits and two walks.

**LAST START:** He had a no decision in the A's 4-3 loss at Texas last Thursday...shutout the Rangers on two hits over the first four innings...the A's scored a run in the fifth but he allowed a solo home run to Soto in the bottom of the fifth...Oakland scored another run in the sixth and he issued a lead off walk to Kinsler in the sixth...was relieved by Cook after Kinsler was sacrificed to second and Cook allowed him to score on a wild pitch for the blown save.

**GRIFFIN vs. CINCINNATI:** Has never faced the Reds in his career.

## FRIDAY'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

**RHP Bartolo Colón (5-6, 3.90 ERA):** Is scheduled to make his 16<sup>th</sup> start of the season...is 7-0 with a 1.41 ERA and one home run allowed in 51.0 innings over his last seven starts...the winning streak is an A's season high and the third longest active streak in the American League...it is one short of his career high of eight...picked up his 10<sup>th</sup> win of the season in his last start to become the second 10-game winner in the AL...this is the fourth time since 1991 that an A's pitcher has won 10 games before the end of June...has won each of his six starts since turning 40 on May 24...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first pitcher in Major League history to win each of his first six starts in his forties...is 4-0 with a 2.68 ERA in seven starts at home and now has a seven-game winning streak in the Coliseum dating back to Aug. 2 of last year...is 6-0 with a 2.25 ERA in eight starts at night and now has a 10-game winning streak in night games dating back to July 28 of last year...was the winning pitcher in his last start, 6-3 A's win at Seattle last Friday (8.0 ip, 7 h, 3 r, 3 er, 2 bb, 4 so)...is 1-0 with a 5.06 ERA (16.0 ip, 15 h, 9 r, 9 er, 6 bb, 20 so, 4 hr) in three career appearances, all starts, against St. Louis.

## ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

**13-7, 3.13 ERA (236.0 ip, 211 h, 88 r, 82 er, 71 bb, 200 so, 20 hr)**

**Save/Save Opportunities: 19/28 (67.9%)**

The A's bullpen is 1-4 with one save, three blown saves, a 5.87 ERA (15 er in 23.0 ip) and .296 (29 for 98) opponents batting average over the past eight games...has issued the fewest walks in the American League (71) and has the lowest opponents on-base percentage (.293)...also ranks fourth in ERA (3.13)...first batters faced are 43 for 207 (.208) with nine walks and two hit by pitches (.244 on-base percentage)...the on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors...has allowed 32 of 97 (33.0%) inherited runners to score, which is the fourth highest percentage in the AL.

- Is a perfect 18 for 18 in save opportunities and is one of three Major League closers without a blown save (Mujica, STL and Gregg, CHI)...ranks sixth in the American League in saves.
- His save Friday night was his 44<sup>th</sup> with the A's, which ties him with Billy Koch and Keith Foulke for eighth in Oakland history.
- Was charged with the loss Sunday after allowing a three-run "walk-off" home run to Morales...the runs snapped his 10-game, 9.1-inning scoreless streak...had allowed four runs total over his first 31 games for a 1.17 ERA.
- The three runs were the first he has allowed on the road this season...had not allowed a run in 13 games and 12.1 innings away from Oakland.

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his 16<sup>th</sup> start of the season...the A's are 12-3 (.800) in his starting assignments this year and 26-13 (.667) over the last two years...his teams are 223-167 (.572) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 13 of his 15 starts, allowed two runs or fewer eight times and walked two batters or fewer 14 times...including nine games with no walks.

**SEVEN-GAME WINNING STREAK:** Is 7-0 with a 1.41 ERA (8 er in 51.0 ip), .249 (46 for 185) opponents batting average and one home run allowed in 51.0 innings over his last seven starts...the winning streak is an A's season high and the **third** longest active streak in the American League...it is one short of his career high of eight from July 21-Sept. 10, 2005...it is the first time in his career he has won seven consecutive starts...is the first Athletic to win seven or more consecutive starts since Barry Zito won eight straight from June 28-Aug. 4, 2005.

**10-GAME WINNER:** Picked up his 10<sup>th</sup> win of the season in his last start to become the second 10-game winner in the American League (Scherzer, DET)...also won 10 games last year and with one more win he will have his most wins since 2005 when he went 21-8 for the Angels and won the Cy Young Award...this is the fourth time since 1991 that an A's pitcher has won 10 games before the end of June...joins Barry Zito (10 in 2002) and Mark Mulder (11 in 2003 and 10 in 2004)...it is the third time in his career he has won 10 games before the All-Star Break (11-5 in 2005, 10-4 in 2002).

**40-YEAR OLD:** Has won each of his six starts since turning 40 on May 24...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first pitcher in Major League history to win each of his first six starts in his forties...is the third pitcher in Oakland history to win 10 games as a 40-year old...Don Sutton had 13 wins in 1985 at age 40 and Tom Candiotti had 11 wins in 1998 at age 40...is the first Major Leaguer to win 10 games as a 40-year old since Jamie Moyer (12) and Tim Wakefield (11) in 2009...has two shutouts, which are the most in a season by an Athletics 40-year old since Jack Quinn had four for the Philadelphia A's in 1928...the last American League pitcher with two shutouts as a 40-year old is Dennis Martinez, who had two in 1995 for Cleveland at age 41...the last A's 40-year old with two complete games is Tom Candiotti in 1998 (3)...ages are based on a players age as of June 30<sup>th</sup>.

**IN JUNE:** Is 4-0 with a 1.93 ERA (6 er in 28.0 ip) in four starts in June...is one of **three** Major League pitchers with four wins this month...ranks **eighth** in the American League in ERA...this marks the first time he has won four games in a month since Sept., 2005...has won five games in a month twice in his career, both times in August (1999 and 2005)...since 2006, the only Oakland pitcher to win five games in a month is Gio Gonzalez (Sept., 2011).

**ACTIVE LEADERS:** Has 2491.2 innings pitched and needs 8.1 more to become the 242<sup>nd</sup> pitcher in Major League history to reach 2500 innings (source: Stats, Inc.)...ranks **eighth** among active pitchers in innings...also ranks **third** in complete games (34), **fifth** in wins (181), **sixth** in games started (390) and shutouts (11) and **seventh** in strikeouts (1889).

**AT HOME:** Is 4-0 with a 2.68 ERA (14 er in 47.0 ip) in seven starts at home...now has a seven-game winning streak in the Coliseum dating back to Aug. 2 of last year, which is the longest home winning streak by an A's pitcher since Justin Duchschere also had a seven-game streak from Sept. 13, 2004-Aug. 11, 2005...the last A's pitcher with a longer home winning streak is Mark Mulder, who won 10 straight from July 31, 2002-June 19, 2003...has a 1.93 ERA (15 er in 70.0 ip) and .221 (57 for 258) opponents batting average during his current winning streak, which spans 10 starts...has walked just six batters (0.77 per nine innings)...has not lost in Oakland since July 17, 2012 against Texas.

**NIGHT AND DAY:** Is 6-0 with a 2.25 ERA (14 er in 56.0 ip) and .220 (44 for 200) opponents batting average in eight starts at night compared to 4-2 with a 3.83 ERA (18 er in 42.1 ip) and .308 (52 for 169) opponents average in seven starts during the day...ranks **third** in the American League in night ERA...now has a 10-game winning streak in night games dating back to July 28 of last year...has a 1.59 ERA (15 er in 84.2 ip) over that 12-start stretch...his last loss at night was July 17, 2012 against Texas...in two seasons with the A's, he is 15-5 with a 2.65 ERA (47 er in 159.1 ip) in 24 starts at night compared to 5-6 with a 4.24 ERA (43 er in 91.1 ip) in 15 starts during the day.

**NOT WILD:** Does not have a wild pitch in two seasons with the A's, a stretch of 39 starts and 250.2 innings pitched...the 39 consecutive starts without a wild pitch is the second longest streak in Oakland history to the record of 42 held by Catfish Hunter (June 25, 1972-June 27, 1973)...now has a streak of 435.0 innings pitched since his last wild pitch on May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL), which is the longest active streak in the majors.

**INTERLEAGUE PLAY:** Was the winning pitcher in his only interleague start this year at Milwaukee June 5 (1 er in 7.0 ip, 1.29 ERA)...is now 19-13 with a 4.04 ERA (111 er in 252.0 ip) in 40 career interleague appearances, all starts.

**DOMINICAN LEADERS:** His 181 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (390), innings pitched (2491.2) and strikeouts (1889).

**LAST START:** He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-3 win at Seattle a week ago today...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Franklin in the third inning...those were the only runs he would allow in eight innings...retired each of the final six batters he faced.

**COLÓN vs. ST. LOUIS:** Is 1-0 with a 5.06 ERA (16.0 ip, 15 h, 9 r, 9 er, 6 bb, 20 so, 4 hr) in three career appearances, all starts and all at St. Louis...including one start in the new Busch Stadium, his last start on June 8, 2007...had a no decision in a 10-6 Angels win...tossed just four innings and allowed one run in each inning on a Duncan home run, a Stinnett home run, a Pujols home run and a Stinnett RBI single...his other two starts came in the previous Busch Stadium.

- Had successful arthroscopic surgery on his right knee Feb. 14...the surgery, a lateral meniscectomy, was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg in Scottsdale, Ariz.
- Did not pitch in a Spring Training game until March 21.
- Is on his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster (2011-13 with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay)
- Made his 400th career appearance April 6 at Houston.

## JERRY BLEVINS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster for the fifth consecutive season.

## YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.
- Had a career-high 12-game hitting streak from May 18 to 30...went 15 for 50 (.300) with five doubles, a triple, two home runs and nine RBI during the hitting streak.
- Had the first two two-homer games of his career June 4 at Milwaukee and June 6 at Chicago...became the first Athletic with two multi-homer games over a three-game stretch since John Jaha did it in back-to-back games June 19-20, 1999 at Detroit.

## JESSE CHAVEZ

- Tossed 5.2 innings June 13 against New York (AL), which was the longest relief appearance of his career.
- Recorded a career-high tying seven strikeouts June 13 against New York (AL).

## BARTOLO COLÓN

- Did not walk a batter over his first three starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to 2012, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).
- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.
- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Had an 18.0-inning scoreless streak from May 20 to 31.

- Struck out nine batters May 26 at Houston in his first start after turning 40 to set an Athletics record for strikeouts by a 40-year old...the previous high was seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs. Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days)
- Tossed a five-hit shutout May 31 against Chicago (AL) to become the second 40-year old in Oakland history with a shutout (Don Sutton: 40 years, 85 days on June 26, 1985 against Chicago).

### RYAN COOK

- Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

### COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...added two more on June 3 at Milwaukee and June 11 against New York (AL)...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more...is tied for fourth in Athletics history with Max Bishop behind Henderson, Eddie Joost (19) and Campaneris (13).
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.
- Was on the 15-day disabled from April 30 to May 14 with a strained left hamstring...it was his seventh career stint on the DL, his fourth with the A's.

### JOSH DONALDSON

- Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning.
- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland)...also had four-hit games May 14 against Texas and May 25 at Houston.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of April 22-28...it was his first career weekly honor...went 12 for 22 (.545) with four runs, seven doubles (.864 slugging percentage), 10 RBI and seven walks (1 sf, .633 on-base percentage) in seven games.
- Had a career-high seven-game hitting streak from May 11-18 (12 for 26, .462).
- Made his Major League debut at shortstop in the ninth inning May 24 at Houston...had one appearance at shortstop in the minors with Triple-A Sacramento on Aug. 2, 2012.
- Hit his first career grand slam in the sixth inning June 7 at Chicago, turning a 3-0 deficit into a 4-3 win.

### SEAN DOOLITTLE

- Had a career-high tying 13.1-inning scoreless streak from April 29 to May 27.

## NATE FREIMAN

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 3 against Seattle and had a RBI single off Joe Saunders in the second inning for his first ML hit...added another single in the fourth inning for his first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run April 22 against Houston, a three-run shot off Erik Bedard in the first inning...it snapped a 0 for 11 streak.
- Had his second career three-hit game June 11 and both have come against the Yankees in games started by Sabathia (also May 3).
- Had his first career "walk-off" hit June 13 against New York, a RBI single in the 18th inning off Rivera.

## JOHN JASO

- Is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster with his third team (Tampa Bay, 2011; Seattle, 2012).
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 9 at Los Angeles, a three-run shot off Jepsen in the seventh to give the A's a 7-5 lead.
- Played first base May 24 at Houston, his second career appearance at first base (Aug. 25, 2010 at Los Angeles-AL).
- Had a career-high nine-game hitting streak from May 25-June 13 (14 for 38, .368).

## JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying four RBI April 15 against Houston (fourth time, last: September 19, 2011 vs. Baltimore).
- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career...added his fourth June 1 against Chicago (AL).
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).
- Went a career-high 11 consecutive games without a RBI from June 4 to 15.

## BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.
- Hit the game-ending home run in the bottom of the 19th inning April 29 against Los Angeles, his third career walk-off home run (last: September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) and fifth career game-ending hit (also a double and single)...also homered in the sixth inning, his second career multi-homer game (June 12, 2012 at Colorado)...had 12 innings between home runs to become the 17th player in Major League history to go at least 12 innings between home runs in one game...is the second Athletic to do it...Reggie Jackson also went 12 innings between home runs June 11, 1969...had four strikeouts to become the second Major Leaguer since 1916 to have at least two home runs and four strikeouts in one game...Evan Longoria did it August 4, 2009 for Tampa Bay against Boston.
- Made his first career appearance in center field May 9 (also May 13).
- Hit the 7000th home run in Oakland history May 13 against Texas off Justin Grimm in the third inning...hit the 12,000th home run in Athletics franchise history June 5 at Milwaukee, a three-run homer off Michael Gonzalez in the seventh inning.
- Played third base for the second time as a professional May 24 at Houston in the ninth inning...the other time was in 2002 with the Red Sox affiliate in the Gulf Coast League...returned to third base in the 16th inning of the A's 18-inning game against New York (AL) June 13.
- Had his second two homer game of the season June 12 against New York (AL) and third of his career...the two homers gave him a streak where each of his last five hits were home runs...is the

sixth player in Oakland history (10th time) to do that, the first since John Jaha (June 18-20, 1999)... the others are Jackson, McGwire (five times), Canseco and Giambi.

#### **PAT NESHEK**

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

#### **DEREK NORRIS**

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).
- Had a career-high four RBI June 11 against New York (AL).
- Caught all 18 innings June 20 against New York (AL)...is the second A's catcher since 1973 to catch 18 innings in a game (Damian Miller, Aug. 8, 2004 against Minnesota)

#### **SHANE PETERSON**

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

#### **JOSH REDDICK**

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento (May 28-30)...appeared in two games in right field and two at designated hitter.
- Walked with the bases loaded in the 10th inning June 1 against Chicago to force in the winning run...it was the 25th "walk-off" walk in Oakland history, the first since Bobby Crosby did it in the 17th inning against Los Angeles (NL) June 17, 2006...it was his third career walk-off RBI (single, double).
- Snapped a career-high 30-game homerless streak with a solo shot in the seventh inning off Quintana June 6 at Chicago (AL).
- Had his third career four-hit game June 16 against Seattle.

#### **CHRIS RESOP**

- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

#### **FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ**

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

#### **ADAM ROSALES**

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.
- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and ended up going 1 for 6...he and Norris had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).
- Drew his first two walks of the season April 30 against Los Angeles, snapping a 28-game streak without a walk...his last walk prior to that was August 4, 2012.

- Started in the leadoff spot for the first time in his career May 3 at New York and hit Sabathia's first pitch of the game for his first career leadoff home run.
- Snapped a 0 for 24 streak with his eighth inning home run May 28 against San Francisco.
- Struck out as a pinch hitter in the 10th inning June 13 against New York (AL) and ended up going 0 for 4 with a career-high four strikeouts...is the first player in Oakland history to strikeout four times in a game that he didn't start.

### SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Doubled in the second inning April 3 against Seattle in his first game since September 28, 2011 at Seattle...that extended his hitting streak to six games dating back to September 24, 2011 (8 for 20, .400), which is the longest hitting streak of his career.
- Did not strike out May 5 in New York, snapping his career-high streak of 12 consecutive games with a strikeout (20 strikeouts total)...that included back-to-back four strikeout games last May 1 and 3...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first Athletic to strike out four times in back-to-back games...the four strikeouts match his career high (three times).

### SETH SMITH

- Went 2 for 3 with a double April 1 against Seattle in his fifth consecutive Opening Day start (2009-10 in left field with Colorado, 2011 in right field with Colorado, 2012-13 at designated hitter with Oakland)...is 7 for 22 (.318) with two doubles, a home run and three RBI in his five openers...is the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at designated hitter since Erubiel Durazo (2003-05).
- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.
- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.
- Had a career-high four walks June 12 against New York.
- Started the game June 13 against New York (AL) 1 for 6 before singling in the 16th and 18th innings...is the third player in Oakland history to collect two hits in a game in the 16th inning or later...the others are Dick Green on June 4, 1971 against Washington (17th and 21st) and Bert Campaneris on Sept. 6, 1969 against Minnesota (16th and 17th).
- Doubled in the fourth inning June 16 against Seattle off Iwakuma for his 500th career hit.

### ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)...matched that May 15-21 (6 for 15, .400).
- Had the first two-steal game of his career June 12 against New York.
- Stole a base in three consecutive games from June 5-13 (four stolen bases total) after stealing four bases over the first 115 games of his career.

### CHRIS YOUNG

- Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.
- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
- His sixth inning double April 11 at Los Angeles was the 200th of his career.
- Had his 11th career regular season multi-homer game April 24 at Boston (also has one in the post-season).
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from April 30 to May 17 with a strained left quad...it was his second career stint on the DL...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento May 16 and went 1 for 1 with two walks, a run and a stolen base in a start in center field against Oklahoma City.
- Had back-to-back three-hit games for the second time in his career May 24 and 25 at Houston (Aug. 16-17, 2007).
