The A's won the first meeting of 2012 last night...the two clubs meet in the Coliseum for the second time as the A's lost two of three here in 2007...are 3-7 against the Cardinals all-time...were swept in a three-game series in St. Louis in 2004 and lost two of three in 2010.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 36 save chances, which is the longest active streak in the majors and four short of the Oakland record of 40.

Yoenis Céspedes has hit safely in all 10 interleague games this year (13 for 42, .310) and now has a 12-game interleague hitting streak (15 for 50, .300).

Josh Donaldson is batting .447 (17 for 38) with three home runs and 11 RBI in 10 interleague games...has the fourth best interleague average in the majors.

Jed Lowrie has hit safely in all 10 interleague games (14 for 37, .378).

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1925 Bill Lamar extends his hitting streak to an Athletics record 29 games...in 1990 Dave Stewart pitches the fifth no-hitter in Oakland history in the A's 5-0 win at Toronto...after walking the first two hitters he faced, Stewart retired 25 in a row before a two-out walk in the ninth...in 1996 the A's hit three home runs at California, giving Oakland 18 home runs in their last four games, which ties the AL record...in 2003 Eric Byrnes becomes the fifth player in Oakland history to hit for the cycle and ties an Oakland record with five hits in a 5-2 win at San Francisco.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won three straight to start the homestand and are now 47-34 for the season...that is the third best record in the American League and fifth best in the majors...it is the best mark by an A's team after 81 games since the 1992 club started the year 48-33 (lost game 82)...the 47 wins are already the A's most before the All-Star Break since 2008 (51-44)...are in second place in the AL West and trail Texas by ½ game...have spent 16 of the last 22 days with at least a share of first...overall, have spent 25 days in sole possession of first, six days tied for first, 50 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth...are 9-9 over the last 18 games...went 12-4 over the first 16 games (second best record in the majors through April 18), 6-15 over the next 21 contests (tied for the worst in the majors from April 19 to May 10) and 20-6 from May 11 to June 7 (best in the majors)...are 3-0 in this eight-day stretch where they have three days off (June 24-July 1)...are 104-60 (.634) since July 1 of last year, which is the best mark in the majors over that span (Cincinnati, 99-65)...swept a two-game series from Cincinnati to start the homestand and now have nine sweeps for the season...had 11 all last year.

THE HALF-WAY MARK: The A's played their 81st game of the season last night, which is the statistical half way point of the season...A's pitchers have issued just 201 walks and are on pace for 402, which would be the fewest in Oakland history in a non-strike season (415 in 1976)...opponents have a .296 on-base percentage, which is currently third lowest in Oakland history...it is the lowest since 1972 (.284).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's have swept five of the previous six home series and have now won 15 of the last 17 home games...are 25-12 (.676) at home for the season, which is the second best home record in the majors (Atlanta, 26-11)...are 3-0 on this eight-game homestand against Cincinnati (2-0), St. Louis (1-0) and the Cubs (three games)...have won 15 straight home games against non American League West teams...went 2-5 on the last road trip to Texas (1-3) and Seattle (1-2) and are 22-22 (.500) on the road...have a 3.27 ERA (130 er in 358.0 ip) at home compared to 4.14 (173 er in 376.0 ip) on the road...have the lowest home ERA in the AL.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's are tied with the Mets for the second best interleague record in the majors at 8-2 (3-1 vs. San Francisco, 2-1 vs. Milwaukee, 2-0 vs. Cincinnati, 1-0 vs. St. Louis)...Tampa Bay has the best mark at 9-1...have a 2.51 ERA (25 er in 89.2 ip), which ranks third, and a .273 (92 for 337) batting average, which ranks eighth...after this three-game series with the Cardinals, the A's host Chicago for a three-game series...also have a three-game series at Pittsburgh July 8-10 and a two-game series at Cincinnati Aug. 6-7...went 10-8 against the National League last year, snapping a streak of three consecutive seasons with a losing interleague record...it was the ninth time in 16 seasons the A's had a winning interleague record...the A's are now 162-132 (.551) all-time in interleague play, which is fifth best.

MONTH-BY-MONTH: The A's have clinched a winning record in the month of June as they are 15-10 with two games remaining...this marks the A's seventh consecutive month with a winning record dating back to last June...that is tied for the fourth longest such streak in Oakland history and is the longest since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...have hit 31 home runs this month, which is tied for second in the American League (Toronto, 32).

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 33-17 (.660) record in night games, which is the best mark in the majors (Texas, 35-21)...are 14-17 (.452) during the day, which is the fifth worst mark in the American League...have a 3.49 ERA (176 er in 453.2 ip) at night, which is the lowest mark in the AL...are batting .254 (442 for 1738) with 262 runs scored in night games (5.24 per game) compared to .241 (253 for 1051) with 118 runs during the day (3.81 per game).

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 3.04 ERA (120 er in 355.0 ip) in 39 games since May 17...that includes a 1.82 ERA (33 er in 163.0 ip) in 17 home games...logged a 4.35 ERA over the first 42 contests and have a 3.72 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...have the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the AL (.296), rank second in batting average (.244) and third in slugging percentage (.386)...are tied for the fewest walks (201).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 20-6 with a 2.98 ERA (85 er in 256.2 ip) and .224 (212 for 945) opponents batting average over the last 39 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA and .272 opponents batting average over the first 42 contests...are 34-27 with a 4.00 ERA (221 er in 497.0 ip) for the season...lead the American League in innings pitched and complete game shutouts (3), are tied for second in complete games (3), rank third in wins and eighth in ERA.

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .274 (102 for 372) with 62 runs scored and 15 home runs over the last 11 games...lead the majors in walks (313)...rank second in the AL in hit by pitches (28), third in doubles (157) and fourth in extra base hits (252).

CLOSE CALLS: Have lost each of their last three one-run games after winning nine of the previous 10...are 14-10 (.583) in one-run games for the season...rank second in the American League lead in one-run wins and have the fourth best record...are 6-3 (.667) in extra inning games...are tied for the AL lead in extra inning wins...are 11-5 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for third in the AL in last at bat wins...have three wins when trailing after eight innings, which is tied for the most in the AL...have five "walk-off" wins, which is tied for third in the AL...have five "walk-off" wins, which is

THIS AND THAT: The A's sent 10 men to the plate in the second inning yesterday, the 18th time this year they have sent at least nine batters to the plate in an inning...did that just 22 times last year...lead the majors in plate appearances with the bases loaded (103)...lead the American League in bases loaded grounded into double plays (7), rank second in doubles (6) and RBI (68) and third in walks (9)...A's pinch hitters are batting .125 (9 for 72), which is second lowest in the AL...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (83), rank second in walks (10) and tied for second in home runs (2) and RBI (9)...are 39-0 when leading after eight innings and are one of three AL teams that has not lost in that situation (Texas and Toronto)...have faced a right-handed starting pitcher in each of the last 12 games after facing a lefty 12 times over the previous 19 contests.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his team-leading 17th start of the season...the A's are 9-7 (.563) in his starting assignments this year and 26-19 (.578) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 11 of his 16 starts, allowed two runs or fewer seven times and walked two batters or fewer 11 times.

FOUR-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 4-0 with a 2.34 ERA (11 er in 42.1 ip) and .176 (25 for 142) opponents batting average over his last six starts...the winning streak matches his career high from Sept. 10-Oct. 1, 2012...is now 5-1 with a 2.59 ERA (18 er in 62.2 ip) and .180 (38 for 211) opponents batting average over his last nine starts...started the year 1-5 with a 7.34 ERA and .345 opponents batting average over his first seven starts.

MONTH BY MONTH: Is 3-0 with a 2.29 ERA (9 er in 35.1 ip) in five starts in June and is 6-1 with a 2.24 ERA (17 er in 68.1 ip) in 10 career starts in the month...has never won four game in a month...was 2-2 with a 3.62 ERA and .216 opponents average in five starts in May...was 1-4 with a 7.36 ERA and .350 opponents batting average in six starts in the month of April...the losses matched the most in Oakland history by a pitcher in the month of April (12th time)...the ERA was the fifth highest April ERA in Oakland history among pitchers with 25 or more innings pitched...it was the highest since Gil Heredia had a 9.24 ERA in 2001...the opponents batting average was fourth highest in Oakland history in April among pitchers with 100 or more batters faced...it was the highest since Heredia had a .360 mark in 2001.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: Was the winning pitcher in his only interleague start this year May 28 against San Francisco (2 er in 7.0 ip, 2.57 ERA)...went 1-2 with a 5.85 ERA (13 er in 20.0 ip) and .264 (19 for 72) opponents batting average in four interleague starts last year.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to pitch on five days rest today...is 1-3 with a 3.46 ERA (16 er in 41.2 ip) in seven starts on five days rest or more compared to 5-3 with a 4.88 ERA (30 er in 55.1 ip) in nine starts on four days rest.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-3 with a 3.67 ERA (20 er in 49.0 ip) and 11 home runs allowed in eight starts on the road compared to 3-3 with a 4.88 ERA (26 er in 48.0 ip) and four home runs allowed in eight starts in Oakland...last year, he was 6-5 with a 2.61 ERA at home compared to 7-3 with a 4.54 ERA on the road...had the fifth lowest home ERA in the AL.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received two runs of support or fewer in eight of the 10 games in which he took the loss or had a no decision (16 rs in 57.1 ip, 2.51 RSA)...has four runs of support or more in five of his six wips

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed 15 home runs, which is an on-going career-high...yielded just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings last year, an average of 0.55 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the American League and third lowest in the majors...11 of the 15 home runs he has allowed this year have come on the road, which is tied for second in the AL

OPPONENTS BATTING: Opponents have grounded into 13 double plays, which is tied for third most in the American League...yielded a .375 average with runners in scoring position over his first five starts but opponents are 6 for 43 (.140) in 11 starts since then...has a .224 (15 for 67) opponents average with RISP overall...has allowed a .341 (28 for 82) opponents batting average to the first two hitters in the order compared to .219 (60 for 274) against the three through nine hitters.

2013 START-BY-START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-1 loss to Seattle April 2 in Oakland...allowed a three-run home run to Morse in the third inning and a RBI single to Morales in the fifth...had a no decision in the A's 9-5 win at Los Angeles April 9...surrendered a career-high tying nine hits in just 3.1 innings...was the losing pitcher in the A's 10-1 loss to Detroit *April 14* in Oakland...allowed a career-high eight runs on a career-high tying nine hits in just 3.1 innings...lost his third consecutive decision in the A's 1-0 loss at Tampa Bay April 20 ... allowed a leadoff home run to Joyce in the second inning, but that was the only run he would allow in 6.1 innings...Hellickson, Peralta and Rodney combined to shutout the A's on three hits and a walk...extended his losing streak to four games in the A's 10-2 loss to Baltimore April 25...posted an 8.10 ERA and .374 opponents batting average during the losing streak, which was the longest of his career...picked up his first win of the season in the A's 10-6 win over Los Angeles April 30 in Oakland...allowed four runs in six innings but the A's scored three times in the bottom of the fifth and four more in the sixth to take the lead for good...was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-3 loss at Cleveland *May* 6...surrendered a career-high four home runs...had allowed more than one home run in a start just twice in his career and never more than two...all four home runs were solo shots...was the winning pitcher in the A's 4-3 win at Seattle **May 11**...had a 3-0 lead when he allowed a two-run home run to Shoppach in the fifth inning...had a no decision in the A's 2-1 win over Kansas City **May 17** in Oakland...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings...Perez double with one out in the third inning and scored one out later on a Lough RBI double...was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-1 loss at Texas May 22...allowed three runs in the first inning on a two-run home run by Murphy and a solo home run by Beltre...the A's were held to a run on four hits by Wolf and the Rangers bullpen...was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-3 victory over San Francisco *May* **28**...tossed 7.0 innings for the third consecutive start...allowed a RBI single to Pence in the first inning but retired 12 of the next 14 batters after that...combined with Blevins, Cook and Balfour on a three-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win over Chicago *June 2* in Oakland...tossed 6.1 innings and allowed two of the hits...won his third consecutive start in the A's 4-3 win at Chicago *June 7*...allowed singles runs in the third, fourth and fifth to give the White Sox a 3-0 lead but Donaldson hit a grand slam in the sixth inning for the win...had a no decision in the A's 3-2, 18-inning win over New York June 13 in Oakland...matched his career high by tossing 8.0 innings (fifth time, third time against New York)...was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-2 win at Texas June 18...allowed a two-run single to Pierzynski in the third but did not allow a hit the rest of the way.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 6-3, 10-inning loss at Seattle last Sunday...allowed three runs on a pair of home runs by Ibanez: a two-run shot in the first and a solo home run in the fourth...the A's scored twice in the sixth and once in the seventh to tie the game and he was relieved by Doolittle to start the eighth.

PARKER vs. ST. LOUIS: Has never faced the Cardinals in his career.

The A's bullpen is 1-4 with one save, three blown saves, a 5.63 ERA (15 er in 24.0 ip) and .294 (30 for 102) opponents batting average over its past nine games...has the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the American League (.293) and has issued the fewest walks (71)...also ranks fourth in ERA (3.11)...first batters faced are 43 for 208 (.207) with nine walks and two hit by pitches (.243 on-base percentage)...the on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors.

- Is a perfect 18 for 18 in save opportunities and is one of three Major League closers without a blown save (Mujica, STL and Gregg, CHI)...ranks seventh in the American League in saves.
- Has recorded 44 saves with the A's, which is tied with Billy Koch and Keith Foulke for eighth in Oakland history.
- Was charged with the loss in his last appearance last Sunday after allowing a three-run "walk-off" home run to Morales...had allowed four runs total over his first 31 games for a 1.17 ERA.
- The three runs were the first he has allowed on the road this season...had not allowed a run in 13 games and 12.1 innings away from Oakland.
- His streak of 18 consecutive saves to start the season is the longest such streak by an A's pitcher since Dennis Eckersley set the record by
 converting each of his first 36 saves in 1992...has not blown a save since April 29, 2012 at Baltimore and has now converted each of his last 36
 save chances, which is the longest active streak in the majors and second longest in Oakland history...since 1999, the only AL closer with a
 longer streak is Jose Valverde (51, Sept. 4, 2010-Sept. 28, 2011).
- Opponents are 3 for 24 (.125) with runners in scoring position, including 1 for 15 with RISP and two outs.
- · Has never faced the Cardinals in his career.
- Had two stints as the A's closer in 2012 and saved a team-leading 24 games in a team-high 75 appearances while posting a 2.53 ERA...was charged with just two blown saves and his save percentage of 92.3 ranked fourth in the American League...was 10th in saves.

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his
 second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left
 hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with
 Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...matched that mark June 21
 at Seattle.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Did not walk a batter over his first three starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to 2012, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).
- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.
- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts
 with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an
 Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.

- Had an 18.0-inning scoreless streak from May 20 to 31.
- Struck out nine batters May 26 at Houston in his first start after turning 40 to set an Athletics record
 for strikeouts by a 40-year old...the previous high was seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs.
 Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland
 history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days),
 Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days)
- Tossed a five-hit shutout May 31 against Chicago (AL) to become the second 40-year old in Oakland history with a shutout (Don Sutton: 40 years, 85 days on June 26, 1985 against Chicago).

RYAN COOK

 Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his
 eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...added two more
 on June 3 at Milwaukee and June 11 against New York (AL)...in Oakland history, only Rickey
 Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more...is tied for fourth in Athletics history with
 Max Bishop behind Henderson, Eddie Joost (19) and Campaneris (13).
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.

- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of April 22-28...it was his first career
 weekly honor...went 12 for 22 (.545) with four runs, seven doubles (.864 slugging percentage), 10
 RBI and seven walks (1 sf, .633 on-base percentage) in seven games.
- Had a career-high seven-game hitting streak from May 11-18 (12 for 26, .462).
- Made his Major League debut at shortstop in the ninth inning May 24 at Houston...had one appearance at shortstop in the minors with Triple-A Sacramento on Aug. 2, 2012.
- Hit his first career grand slam in the sixth inning June 7 at Chicago, turning a 3-0 deficit into a 4-3 win.

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 3 against Seattle and had a RBI single
 off Joe Saunders in the second inning for his first ML hit...added another single in the fourth inning
 for his first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run April 22 against Houston, a three-run shot off Erik Bedard in the first inning...it snapped a 0 for 11 streak.
- Had his second career three-hit game June 11 and both have come against the Yankees in games started by Sabathia (also May 3).

- Played first base May 24 at Houston, his second career appearance at first base (Aug. 25, 2010 at Los Angeles-AL).
- Had a career-high 17-game reaching base streak from May 21 to June 18...hit .345 with a .456 on-base percentage during the streak, which included a career-high nine-game hitting streak from May 25-June 13 (14 for 38, .368).

JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying four RBI April 15 against Houston (fourth time, last: September 19, 2011 vs. Baltimore).
- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career...added his fourth June 1 agaisnt Chicago (AL).
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).
- Went a career-high 11 consecutive games without a RBI from June 4 to 15.
- Homered June 21 at Seattle to snap a career-high 62-game homerless streak.

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.
- Hit the game-ending home run in the bottom of the 19th inning April 29 against Los Angeles, his third career walk-off home run (last: September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) and fifth career game-ending hit (also a double and single)...also homered in the sixth inning, his second career multi-homer game (June 12, 2012 at Colorado)...had 12 innings between home runs to become the 17th player in Major League history to go at least 12 innings between home runs in one game...is the second Athletic to do it...Reggie Jackson also went 12 innings between home runs June 11, 1969...had four strikeouts to become the second Major Leaguer since 1916 to have at least two home runs and four strikeouts in one game...Evan Longoria did it August 4, 2009 for Tampa Bay against Boston.
- Made his first career appearance in center field May 9 (also May 13).
- Hit the 7000th home run in Oakland history May 13 against Texas off Justin Grimm in the third inning...hit the 12,000th home run in Athletics franchise history June 5 at Milwaukee, a three-run homer off Michael Gonzalez in the seventh inning.

- Played third base for the second time as a professional May 24 at Houston in the ninth inning...the other time was in 2002 with the Red Sox affiliate in the Gulf Coast League...returned to third base in the 16th inning of the A's 18-inning game against New York (AL) June 13.
- Had his second two homer game of the season June 12 against New York (AL) and third of his
 career...the two homers gave him a streak where each of his last five hits were home runs...is the
 sixth player in Oakland history (10th time) to do that, the first since John Jaha (June 18-20, 1999)...
 the others are Jackson, McGwire (five times), Canseco and Giambi.

PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

DEREK NORRIS

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up
 going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in
 Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12,
 1992 vs. Texas).
- Had a career-high four RBI June 11 against New York (AL).
- Caught all 18 innings June 20 against New York (AL)...is the second A's catcher since 1973 to catch 18 innings in a game (Damian Miller, Aug. 8, 2004 against Minnesota)

SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

JOSH REDDICK

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career
 stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases
 during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento
 (May 28-30)...appeared in two games in right field and two at designated hitter.

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES

• Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.

- Doubled in the second inning April 3 against Seattle in his first game since September 28, 2011 at Seattle...that extended his hitting streak to six games dating back to September 24, 2011 (8 for 20, .400), which is the longest hitting streak of his career.
- Did not strike out May 5 in New York, snapping his career-high streak of 12 consecutive games with
 a strikeout (20 strikeouts total)...that included back-to-back four strikeout games last May 1 and 3...
 according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first Athletic to strike out four times in back-to-back
 games...the four strikeouts match his career high (three times).

SETH SMITH

- Went 2 for 3 with a double April 1 against Seattle in his fifth consecutive Opening Day start (2009-10 in left field with Colorado, 2011 in right field with Colorado, 2012-13 at designated hitter with Oakland)...is 7 for 22 (.318) with two doubles, a home run and three RBI in his five openers...is the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at designated hitter since Erubiel Durazo (2003-05).
- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.
- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.
- Had a career-high four walks June 12 against New York.
- Started the game June 13 against New York (AL) 1 for 6 before singling in the 16th and 18th innings...is the third player in Oakland history to collect two hits in a game in the 16th inning or later...the others are Dick Green on June 4, 1971 against Washington (17th and 21st) and Bert Campaneris on Sept. 6, 1969 against Minnesota (16th and 17th).
- Doubled in the fourth inning June 16 against Seattle off Iwakuma for his 500th career hit.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)...matched that May 15-21 (6 for 15, .400).
- Had the first two-steal game of his career June 12 against New York.
- Stole a base in three consecutive games from June 5-13 (four stolen bases total) after stealing four bases over the first 115 games of his career.

CHRIS YOUNG

- Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.
- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
- His sixth inning double April 11 at Los Angeles was the 200th of his career.
- Had his 11th career regular season multi-homer game April 24 at Boston (also has one in the post-season).
