TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour is a perfect 20 for 20 in save opportunities and is one of two Major League closers without a blown save...has now converted each of his last 38 save chances, which is the longest active streak in the majors and two short of the Oakland record of 40 set by Dennis Eckersley (Sept. 15, 1991-Aug. 7, 1992).

Josh Donaldson is batting .458 (22 for 48) with 13 runs scored, five home runs and 14 RBI in 13 interleague games...has the fourth best interleague average in the majors...ranks second among American League third basemen in RBI (55) and walks (35), tied for second in doubles (22) and third in batting (.318) and home runs (14).

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1983** Carney Lansford hits the 7000th home run in the history of the A's franchise, but the A's lose to Texas 16-4 when the Rangers score 12 times in the top of the 15th inning...in **1988** Jose Canseco hits three home runs but its Mark McGwire's 16th inning solo home run that lifts the A's to a 9-8 victory at Toronto...the following day, McGwire again homers in the 16th inning of the A's 4-2 win at Cleveland...in **1994** Bobby Witt ties Mike Torrez' club record with his third consecutive shutout, a six-hit, 10-0 win at Boston.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won five of the last six games to improve to a season-high tying 14 games over .500 at 49-35 (also 41-27 on June 13)...that is the best mark by an A's team after 84 games since the 1990 club started the year 53-31...only six teams in Oakland history have won their 50th game in the 85th game or earlier (1971, 1972, 1975, 1988, 1989, 1990)...have the second best record in the American League and fifth best in the majors...the win last night moved the A's into sole possession of first place in the AL West for the first time since June 21...have spent 26 days in sole possession of first this year and six days tied for first...the 32 days with at least a share of first are the A's most since 2006 when they had 126...have also spent 53 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth...are 106-61 (.635) since July 1 of last year, which is the **best mark in the majors** over that span (Atlanta, 102-66)...swept a two-game series from Cincinnati to start the homestand and now have nine sweeps for the season...had 11 all last year...went 12-4 over the first 16 games (second best record in the majors through April 18), 6-15 over the next 21 contests (tied for the worst in the majors from April 19 to May 10), 20-6 from May 11 to June 7 (best in the majors) and 6-9 from June 8 to 24 (tied for second worst in majors).

BEFORE THE BREAK: The A's have clinched a winning record before the All-Star Break for the first time since 2008 (51-44)...the 49 wins are already the A's second best total before the break over the last 10 years to the 2008 club...the pitching staff is averaging 2.44 walks per nine innings, which is the best pre-break mark in Oakland history (2.47 in 1972) and second best in Athletics history (2.36 in 1944).

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's have a 34-17 (.667) record in night games, which is the best mark in the majors (Pittsburgh, 31-20)...are 15-18 (.455) during the day, which is the fourth worst mark in the American League...have a 3.56 ERA (183 er in 462.2 ip) at night, which is the lowest mark in the AL...are batting .255 (452 for 1772) with 270 runs scored in night games (5.29 per game) compared to .242 (270 for 1117) with 126 runs during the day (3.82 per game).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's have won 17 of the last 20 home games and are 27-13 (.675) for the season, which is the second best mark in the majors (Atlanta, 29-11)...are 5-1 on this eight-game homestand against Cincinnati (2-0), St. Louis (2-1) and the Cubs (1-0)...leave following the game tomorrow for a six-game road trip to Kansas City (three games) and Pittsburgh (three games)...went 2-5 on the last road trip to Texas (1-3) and Seattle (1-2) and are 22-22 (.500) on the road.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's have the fourth best interleague record in the majors at 10-3 (Tampa Bay, 9-1; New York-NL, 8-2; Pittsburgh, 11-3)...need one more win to clinch a winning record against the National League for the second consecutive year and 10th time in 17 seasons...are 164-133 (.552) all-time in interleague play, which is fifth best...rank ninth this year with a 3.32 ERA (43 er in 116.2 ip) and .272 (119 for 437) batting average...the A's offense is second in walks (51), third in runs (74), eighth in doubles (24) and tied for eighth in home runs (16)...after this series with the Cubs, the A's conclude interleague play with a three-game series at Pittsburgh July 8-10 and a two-game series at Cincinnati Aug. 6-7.

CLOSE CALLS: Snapped a three-game losing streak in one-run games with the win last night and are now 15-10 (.600) in one-run games for the season...rank second in the American League in one-run wins and have the fourth best record...improved to 12-5 in games decided in the last at bat with the win last night and are tied for second in the AL in last at bat wins...are tied for third with five "walk-off" wins...are 6-3 (.667) in extra inning games...are tied for the AL lead in extra inning wins.

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .273 (129 for 472) with 78 runs scored over the last 14 games (5.57 per game) after hitting .217 with 37 runs over the previous 11 contests (3.36 per game)...for the season, the A's are tied with Boston for the Major League lead in walks (319)...are tied for second in the American League in hit by pitches (28), rank third in doubles (163) and fourth in extra base hits (263)...lead the majors in plate appearances with the bases loaded (104)...are tied for the AL lead in bases loaded grounded into double plays (7), rank second in doubles (6) and RBI (68) and third in walks (9)...A's pinch hitters are batting .120 (9 for 75), which is the lowest mark in the AL...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (86), rank second in walks (10) and tied for second in home runs (2) and RBI (9).

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 4.84 ERA (61 er in 113.1 ip) over the last 16 games after posting a 2.58 ERA over a 29-game stretch from May 17 to June 16 ...now have a 3.80 ERA for the season, which ranks third in the American League...have the lowest opponents on-base percentage in the AL (.298) and have issued the fewest walks (206)...also rank second in opponents batting average (.245) and fourth in slugging percentage (.392).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 21-6 with a 3.18 ERA (96 er in 272.0 ip) and .229 (231 for 1008) opponents batting average over the last 42 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA and .272 opponents batting average over the first 42 contests...are 35-27 with a 4.08 ERA (232 er in 512.1 ip) for the season...lead the American League in innings pitched, are tied for the lead in complete game shutouts (3), tied for second in complete games (3), rank third in wins and seventh in ERA.

THIS AND THAT: The A's have turned 62 double plays, which is the fewest in the American League and second fewest in the majors (Cincinnati, 59)...sent 10 men to the plate in the second inning last Friday, the 18th time this year they have sent at least nine batters to the plate in an inning...did that just 22 times last year...faced a left-handed starting pitcher last night after facing a righty in each of the previous 14 games...including yesterday, the A's have gone 55 consecutive days without placing a player on the DL, their longest stretch since May 28-Aug. 30, 2005 (94 days).

MONTH-BY-MONTH: The A's won 16 games in each of the first three months this year and finished with a winning record each month...now have seven consecutive months with a winning record dating back to last June, which is tied for the fourth longest such streak in Oakland history...it is the longest since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...the A's had the lowest opponents batting average (.235) and on-base percentage (.285) in the American League in June, ranked third in ERA (3.43) and opponents slugging (.368) and tied for third in winning percentage (.593)...the offense ranked third in home runs (33) and fourth in slugging percentage (.417).

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 17th start of the season...the A's are 13-3 (.813) in his starting assignments this year and 27-13 (.675) over the last two years...his teams are 224-167 (.545) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 14 of his 16 starts, allowed two runs or fewer nine times and walked two batters or fewer 15 times...including nine games with no walks.

EIGHT-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 8-0 with a 1.37 ERA (9 er in 59.0 ip), .244 (52 for 213) opponents batting average and one home run allowed in 59.0 innings over his last eight starts...that matches the longest winning streak of his career (July 21-Sept. 10, 2005)...it is the longest winning streak by an Athletic since Dan Haren had a 10-game winning streak from April 18-July 1, 2007...it is the third longest active streak in the American League...is the first A's pitcher to win eight consecutive starts since Barry Zito (June 28-Aug. 4, 2005)...the Oakland record for consecutive starts with a win is nine by Zito (Aug. 20-Oct. 7, 2001), Bob Welch (May 21-June 30, 1990) and Rick Langford (July 5-Aug. 15, 1980).

11-GAME WINNER: Picked up his 11th win of the season in his last start to become the second Oakland pitcher since 1991 to win 11 games before the end of June (Mark Mulder, 2003)...the 11 wins surpass his season total of last year (10) and are his most since 2005 when he went 21-8 for the Angels and won the Cy Young Award...the 11 wins match his personal best before the All-Star Break (11-5 in 2005)...since 1991, the only Oakland pitcher with more wins before the break is Mark Mulder, who had 12 in both 2003 and 2004.

AS A 40-YEAR OLD: Has won each of his seven starts since turning 40 on May 24...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first pitcher in Major League history to win at least each of his first six starts in his forties...his 11 wins are tied with Tom Candiotti (1998) for second most in Oakland history...the record is 13 by Don Sutton in 1985...is the first Major Leaguer to win 11 games since Jamie Moyer (12) and Tim Wakefield (11) in 2009...has a 2.79 ERA...since 1952, the only American Leaguer to post an ERA under 3.00 is Nolan Ryan (2.91 in 1991)...has two shutouts, which are the most in a season by an Athletics pitcher since Jack Quinn had four for the Philadelphia A's in 1928...the last AL pitcher with two shutouts is Dennis Martinez (2 in 1995)...the last A's pitcher with two complete games is Tom Candiotti in 1998 (3)...ages are based on a players age as of June 30th.

IN JUNE: Went 5-0 with a 1.75 ERA in five starts in June to win American League Pitcher of the Month honors for the fourth time in his career...led the AL in ERA and tied for second in wins...it marked the third time in his career he won five games in a month (August 1999 and August 2005)...it was the fourth lowest single month ERA of his career (1.13 in May 2002, 1.39 in June 1998 and 1.72 in August 2005)...since 2006, the only other Oakland pitcher to win five games in a month is Gio Gonzalez (Sept., 2011).

AMONG THE LEADERS: Leads the American League in fewest walks per nine innings (1.10), is tied for second in wins (11), complete games (2) and shutouts (2), ranks third in winning percentage (.846), fourth in home runs per nine innings (0.68), fifth in ERA (2.79) and opponents slugging percentage (.353), tied for fifth in grounded into double plays (14), sixth in strikeout to walk ratio (4.69) and seventh in opponents on-base percentage (.278)...is averaging the fewest pitches per inning (13.7) and third fewest pitches per game (90.9)...has the second highest run support (7.19).

ACTIVE LEADERS: Has 2499.2 innings pitched and needs 0.1 more to become the 242nd pitcher in Major League history to reach 2500 innings (source: Stats, Inc.)...ranks eighth among active pitchers in innings...also ranks third in complete games (34), fifth in wins (182), sixth in games started (391) and shutouts (11) and seventh in strikeouts (1894).

AT HOME: Is 5-0 with a 2.45 ERA (15 er in 55.0 ip) in eight starts at home and ranks seventh in the American League in home ERA...now has an eight-game winning streak in the Coliseum dating back to Aug. 2 of last year, which is the longest home winning streak by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder won 10 straight from July 31, 2002-June 19, 2003...has a 1.85 ERA (16 er in 78.0 ip) and .220 (.63 for 286) opponents batting average during his current winning streak, which spans 11 starts...has walked just seven batters (0.81 per nine innings)...has not lost in Oakland since July 17, 2012 against Texas.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 7-0 with a 2.11 ERA (15 er in 64.0 ip) and .219 (50 for 228) opponents batting average in nine starts at night compared to 4-2 with a 3.83 ERA (18 er in 42.1 ip) and .308 (52 for 169) opponents average in seven starts during the day...leads the American League in night ERA...now has an 11-game winning streak in night games dating back to July 28 of last year...has a 1.55 ERA (16 er in 92.2 ip) over that 13-start stretch...his last loss at night was July 17, 2012 against Texas...in two seasons with the A's, he is 16-5 with a 2.58 ERA (47 er in 159.1 ip) in 25 starts at night compared to 5-6 with a 4.24 ERA (43 er in 91.1 ip) in 15 starts during the day.

NOT WILD: Does not have a wild pitch in two seasons with the A's, a stretch of 40 starts and 258.2 innings pitched...the 40 consecutive starts without a wild pitch is the second longest streak in Oakland history to the record of 42 held by Catfish Hunter (June 25, 1972-June 27, 1973)...now has a streak of 443.0 innings pitched since his last wild pitch on May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL), which is the longest active streak in the majors.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: Is 2-0 with a 2.57 ERA (2 er in 15.0 ip) in two interleague starts this year...is now 20-13 with a 3.88 ERA (112 er in 260.0 ip) in 41 career interleague appearances, all starts.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-1 win over St. Louis last Friday...retired each of the first 13 batters before walking Holliday with one out in the fifth...then allowed back-to-back singles to Adams and Freese, with the latter driving in a run...that was the only run he would allow in eight innings.

COLÓN vs. CHICAGO: Is 0-1 with a 5.33 ERA (25.1 ip, 24 h, 15 r, 15 er, 16 bb, 13 so, 3 hr) in four career starts...that includes 0-1 with a 7.36 ERA (15 er in 18.1 ip) in three starts in his home ballpark and 0-0 with a 0.00 ERA (0 er in 7.0 ip) in one start at Wrigley Field...his last start against the Cubs was a loss at Anaheim in a 10-5 decision on June 12, 2004...allowed single runs in the second, third and fourth innings, including home runs by Ramirez in the second and Hollandsworth in the fourth...also allowed three runs in the fifth inning on a Walker home run and a Patterson two-run single.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Dan Straily (4-2, 5.00 ERA): Is scheduled to be recalled from Triple-A Sacramento tomorrow to make his 13th start of the season with the A's...this will be his fourth stint with the A's this year...currently has a career-high three-game winning streak, despite allowing eight runs in 8.0 innings over his last two starts...had a no decision in his last start with the A's June 22, a 7-5 loss at Seattle (3.1 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 5 so)...was optioned to Sacramento the next day and made one start with the River Cats, a loss June 28 against Reno (6.0 ip, 9 h, 6 r 2 er, 1 bb, 6 so, 1 hr)...is 3-1 with a 1.46 ERA in four starts overall with Sacramento...has never faced the Cubs in his career.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

14-8, 3.22 ERA (248.2 ip, 224 h, 95 r, 89 er, 73 bb, 211 so, 22 hr)

The A's bullpen is 2-5 with three saves, three blown saves, a 5.55 ERA (22 er in 35.2 ip) and .292 (42 for 144) opponents batting average over its past 12 games...has a 3.22 ERA for the season, which is tied for fourth in the American League...has issued the fewest walks (73) in the AL and ranks second in opponents on-base percentage (.295)...first batters faced are 47 for 217 (.217) with 10 walks and two hit by pitches (.254 on-base percentage)...the on-base percentage against first batters is the lowest in the majors.

- Is a perfect 20 for 20 in save opportunities and is one of two Major League closers without a blown save (Mujica, STL)...is tied for sixth in the American League in saves.
- His streak of 20 consecutive saves to start the season is the longest such streak by an A's pitcher since Dennis Eckersley set the record by converting each of his first 36 saves in 1992...has not blown a save since April 29, 2012 at Baltimore and has now converted each of his last 38 save chances, which is the longest active streak in the majors and second longest in Oakland history...since 1999, the only AL closer with a longer streak is Jose Valverde (51, Sept. 4, 2010-Sept. 28, 2011).
- Has not allowed a run in 12 of his past 13 games (3 er in 11.2 ip, 2.31 ERA) and 23 of his past 25 (4 er in 24.0 ip, 1.50 ERA).
- Opponents are 3 for 24 (.125) with runners in scoring position, including 1 for 15 with RISP and two outs.
- Has a 0.76 ERA (2 er in 23.2 ip) in 24 games at night compared to 4.82 (5 er in 9.1 ip) in 10 day games.
- Has two wins and a save in his three career outings against the Cubs (4.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb, 5 so)...his appearance last night was his first against Chicago since June 19, 2008.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 18th start of the season...the A's are 9-8 (.529) in his starting assignments this year and 29-19 (.604) in his career...his teams are 34-19 (.642) in his 53 career starts...has tossed at least six innings in 12 of his 17 starts, allowed two runs or fewer eight times and walked two batters or fewer 11 times.

BRIEFLY: Is 1-2 with a 5.96 ERA (15 er in 22.2 ip) and .286 (26 for 91) opponents batting average over his last four starts...went 3-0 with a 3.86 over his first three starts, 0-5 with a 3.62 ERA over his next five and 3-0 with a 3.66 ERA over his next five after that...the five-game losing streak was the longest of his career...was the first pitcher on an A's Opening Day roster to win each of his first three starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...that extended his winning streak to five games dating back to last year...had never won more than two consecutive games in his career.

- Is on his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster (2011-13 with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay)
- Made his 400th career appearance April 6 at Houston.

JERRY BLEVINS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster for the fifth consecutive season.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...matched that mark June 21 at Seattle.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.
- Had a career-high 12-game hitting streak from May 18 to 30...went 15 for 50 (.300) with five doubles, a triple, two home runs and nine RBI during the hitting streak.
- Had the first two two-homer games of his career June 4 at Milwaukee and June 6 at Chicago...became the first Athletic with two multi-homer games over a three-game stretch since John Jaha did it in back-to-back games June 19-20, 1999 at Detroit...added his third two-homer game June 21 at Seattle.

JESSE CHAVEZ

- Tossed 5.2 innings June 13 against New York (AL), which was the longest relief appearance of his career.
- Recorded a career-high tying seven strikeouts June 13 against New York (AL).

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Did not walk a batter over his first three starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to 2012, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).
- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.
- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.

- Had an 18.0-inning scoreless streak from May 20 to 31.
- Struck out nine batters May 26 at Houston in his first start after turning 40 to set an Athletics record for strikeouts by a 40-year old...the previous high was seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs. Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days)
- Tossed a five-hit shutout May 31 against Chicago (AL) to become the second 40-year old in Oakland history with a shutout (Don Sutton: 40 years, 85 days on June 26, 1985 against Chicago).

RYAN COOK

- Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...added two more on June 3 at Milwaukee and June 11 against New York (AL)...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more...is tied for fourth in Athletics history with Max Bishop behind Henderson, Eddie Joost (19) and Campaneris (13).
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.
- Was on the 15-day disabled from April 30 to May 14 with a strained left hamstring...it was his seventh career stint on the DL, his fourth with the A's.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning.
- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland)...also had four-hit games May 14 against Texas and May 25 at Houston.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of April 22-28...it was his first career weekly honor...went 12 for 22 (.545) with four runs, seven doubles (.864 slugging percentage), 10 RBI and seven walks (1 sf, .633 on-base percentage) in seven games.
- Had a career-high seven-game hitting streak from May 11-18 (12 for 26, .462).
- Made his Major League debut at shortstop in the ninth inning May 24 at Houston...had one appearance at shortstop in the minors with Triple-A Sacramento on Aug. 2, 2012.
- Hit his first career grand slam in the sixth inning June 7 at Chicago, turning a 3-0 deficit into a 4-3 win.

SEAN DOOLITTLE

- Had a career-high tying 13.1-inning scoreless streak from April 29 to May 27.

NATE FREIMAN

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 3 against Seattle and had a RBI single off Joe Saunders in the second inning for his first ML hit...added another single in the fourth inning for his first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run April 22 against Houston, a three-run shot off Erik Bedard in the first inning...it snapped a 0 for 11 streak.
- Was named American League Rookie of the Month for May after batting .351 with three doubles, one home run and nine RBI in 14 games.
- Had his second career three-hit game June 11 and both have come against the Yankees in games started by Sabathia (also May 3).
- Had his first career "walk-off" hit June 13 against New York, a RBI single in the 18th inning off Rivera.

JOHN JASO

- Is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster with his third team (Tampa Bay, 2011; Seattle, 2012).
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 9 at Los Angeles, a three-run shot off Jepsen in the seventh to give the A's a 7-5 lead.
- Played first base May 24 at Houston, his second career appearance at first base (Aug. 25, 2010 at Los Angeles-AL).
- Had a career-high 17-game reaching base streak from May 21 to June 18...hit .345 with a .456 on-base percentage during the streak, which included a career-high nine-game hitting streak from May 25-June 13 (14 for 38, .368).

JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying four RBI April 15 against Houston (fourth time, last: September 19, 2011 vs. Baltimore).
- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career...added his fourth June 1 against Chicago (AL).
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).
- Went a career-high 11 consecutive games without a RBI from June 4 to 15.
- Homered June 21 at Seattle to snap a career-high 62-game homerless streak.

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.
- Hit the game-ending home run in the bottom of the 19th inning April 29 against Los Angeles, his third career walk-off home run (last: September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) and fifth career game-ending hit (also a double and single)...also homered in the sixth inning, his second career multi-homer game (June 12, 2012 at Colorado)...had 12 innings between home runs to become the 17th player in Major League history to go at least 12 innings between home runs in one game...is the second Athletic to do it...Reggie Jackson also went 12 innings between home runs June 11, 1969...had four strikeouts to become the second Major Leaguer since 1916 to have at least two home runs and four strikeouts in one game...Evan Longoria did it August 4, 2009 for Tampa Bay against Boston.
- Made his first career appearance in center field May 9 (also May 13).
- Hit the 7000th home run in Oakland history May 13 against Texas off Justin Grimm in the third inning...hit the 12,000th home run in Athletics franchise history June 5 at Milwaukee, a three-run homer off Michael Gonzalez in the seventh inning.

- Played third base for the second time as a professional May 24 at Houston in the ninth inning...the other time was in 2002 with the Red Sox affiliate in the Gulf Coast League...returned to third base in the 16th inning of the A's 18-inning game against New York (AL) June 13.
- Had his second two homer game of the season June 12 against New York (AL) and third of his career...the two homers gave him a streak where each of his last five hits were home runs...is the sixth player in Oakland history (10th time) to do that, the first since John Jaha (June 18-20, 1999)...the others are Jackson, McGwire (five times), Canseco and Giambi.

PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

DEREK NORRIS

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).
- Had a career-high four RBI June 11 against New York (AL).
- Caught all 18 innings June 20 against New York (AL)...is the second A's catcher since 1973 to catch 18 innings in a game (Damian Miller, Aug. 8, 2004 against Minnesota)

SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

JOSH REDDICK

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento (May 28-30)...appeared in two games in right field and two at designated hitter.
- Walked with the bases loaded in the 10th inning June 1 against Chicago to force in the winning run...it was the 25th "walk-off" walk in Oakland history, the first since Bobby Crosby did it in the 17th inning against Los Angeles (NL) June 17, 2006...it was his third career walk-off RBI (single, double).
- Snapped a career-high 30-game homerless streak with a solo shot in the seventh inning off Quintana June 6 at Chicago (AL).
- Had his third career four-hit game June 16 against Seattle.

CHRIS RESOP

- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and ended up going 1 for 6...he and Norris had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).
- Drew his first two walks of the season April 30 against Los Angeles, snapping a 28-game streak without a walk...his last walk prior to that was August 4, 2012.
- Started in the leadoff spot for the first time in his career May 3 at New York and hit Sabathia's first pitch of the game for his first career leadoff home run.
- Snapped a 0 for 24 streak with his eighth inning home run May 28 against San Francisco.
- Struck out as a pinch hitter in the 10th inning June 13 against New York (AL) and ended up going 0 for 4 with a career-high four strikeouts...is the first player in Oakland history to strikeout four times in a game that he didn't start.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Doubled in the second inning April 3 against Seattle in his first game since September 28, 2011 at Seattle...that extended his hitting streak to six games dating back to September 24, 2011 (8 for 20, .400), which is the longest hitting streak of his career.
- Did not strike out May 5 in New York, snapping his career-high streak of 12 consecutive games with a strikeout (20 strikeouts total)...that included back-to-back four strikeout games last May 1 and 3...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first Athletic to strike out four times in back-to-back games...the four strikeouts match his career high (three times).

SETH SMITH

- Went 2 for 3 with a double April 1 against Seattle in his fifth consecutive Opening Day start (2009-10 in left field with Colorado, 2011 in right field with Colorado, 2012-13 at designated hitter with Oakland)...is 7 for 22 (.318) with two doubles, a home run and three RBI in his five openers...is the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at designated hitter since Erubiel Durazo (2003-05).
- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.
- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.
- Had a career-high four walks June 12 against New York.
- Started the game June 13 against New York (AL) 1 for 6 before singling in the 16th and 18th innings...is the third player in Oakland history to collect two hits in a game in the 16th inning or later...the others are Dick Green on June 4, 1971 against Washington (17th and 21st) and Bert Campaneris on Sept. 6, 1969 against Minnesota (16th and 17th).
- Doubled in the fourth inning June 16 against Seattle off Iwakuma for his 500th career hit.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)...matched that May 15-21 (6 for 15, .400).
- Had his first career three-hit game April 16 against Houston...his second came June 22 at Seattle.
- Had the first two-steal game of his career June 12 against New York.
- Stole a base in three consecutive games from June 5-13 (four stolen bases total) after stealing four bases over the first 115 games of his career.

STEPHEN VOGT

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 25
- Had a sacrifice fly in his first at bat as an Athletic June 25 against Cincinnati, his first career RBI.

CHRIS YOUNG

- Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.
- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
- His sixth inning double April 11 at Los Angeles was the 200th of his career.

- Had his 11th career regular season multi-homer game April 24 at Boston (also has one in the post-season).
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from April 30 to May 17 with a strained left quad...it was his second career stint on the DL...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento May 16 and went 1 for 1 with two walks, a run and a stolen base in a start in center field against Oklahoma City.
- Had back-to-back three-hit games for the second time in his career May 24 and 25 at Houston (Aug. 16-17, 2007).
