### A's vs. ANGELS

The A's lead the season series, 5-1...are 3-0 at Los Angeles and 2-1 in Oakland...have won 10 of the last 12 games in Anaheim...have scored 52 runs in the six games this year...last year, the A's scored 60 runs in 19 games against the Angels the entire season...have scored at least four runs in all six games this year and are 22-1 against the Angels over the last three years when scoring four or more runs...have been shutout in five of their last 10 losses to the Angels and have scored just one run in three of those games...have won the season series from Los Angeles in each of the previous two seasons and are 26-18 against the Angels over the last three years...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 391-314 against the Angels...that includes 201-150 in Oakland and 190-164 in Anaheim...all-time, the A's are 440-391 against the Angels

### TODAY'S TIDBITS

**Grant Balfour** is the only Major League closer without a blown save as he has converted each of his 25 save opportunities...now has a streak of 43 consecutive saves dating back to last year, which is an Oakland record and sixth longest in ML history.

**Ryan Cook** has not allowed a home run in 41.2 innings this year, which are the most innings among American League relievers with no home runs...has a 67.2-inning homerless streak dating back to last year, which is sixth longest by a reliever in Oakland history.

### THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1992** Carney Lansford ties an Oakland record with three doubles in the A's 6-2 win against Detroit...he adds a single to finish the day a perfect 4 for 4...in **1999** Buddy Groom ties an Oakland record by pitching in his sixth consecutive game...he retires the only batter he faces in the A's 10-5 win over Colorado...in **2002** Cory Lidle tosses a one-hitter in the A's 10-0 win over Texas...it is his first of two one-hitters in 2002.

### ABOUT THE A's

**ABOUT THE A'S:** Won two of three from both Pittsburgh and Boston in the final two series prior to the All-Star Break and have won seven of the last 10 games...are a season-high tying 17 games over .500 at 56-39 (also 54-37 on July 9)...that is the second best record in the American League and fourth best in the majors...it matches the sixth best record in Oakland history after 95 games and is the best since the 1990 team started the year 60-35 (won game 96)...remain in sole possession of first place in the AL West for the 13<sup>th</sup> consecutive day (does not include the All-Star Break)...lead Texas by two games, which is the largest lead by either team since June 19 when the A's had a two-game lead...the A's largest lead of the season is three games (twice, last: June 18)...have won six consecutive series for the first time since July 27-Aug. 16, 2006 when they also won six straight...have not lost a series since losing two of three at Seattle, June 21-23...went 12-4 over the first 16 games (second best record in the majors through April 18), 6-15 from April 19 to May 10 (tied for the worst in the majors), 20-6 from May 11 to June 7 (best in the majors) and 6-9 from June 8 to 24 (tied for second worst in majors)...are 12-5 since June 25 (third best in the majors)...are 113-65 (.635) since July 1 of last year, which is the **best mark in the majors** over that span (Atlanta and Cincinnati, 107-73)...have spent 38 days in sole possession of first this year, six days tied for first, 53 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

**AT THE BREAK:** The A's went into the All-Star Break with a 56-39 record and a two-game lead in the American League West...the 56 wins match the most in Athletics history prior to the break (also 1971, 1972, 1973)...it marks the first time the A's have been in sole possession of first place in the AL West at the break since 1990...it is the eighth time in Athletics history (excludes 1981) and the A's have gone on to win the West each of the previous seven times (1971-75, 88, 90)...the .589 winning percentage is ninth best in Athletics history at the break and the best since 1990 (.622)...the pitching staff averaged 2.42 walks per nine innings, which is the second best mark at the break in A's history (2.36 in 1944)...set a record with 650 strikeouts but the offense also set a record with 716 strikeouts.

**BREAK TO BREAK:** The A's went 107-64 (.626) from the 2012 All-Star Break to the 2013 All-Star Break, which was the best record in the majors ahead of Cincinnati (103-69)...had the fewest walks over that span (418), ranked second in opponents on-base percentage (.299), fifth in saves (52), seventh in ERA (3.60), eighth in opponents batting (.247) and ninth in opponents slugging (.385)...the offense grounded into the fewest double plays (106), tied for first in runs (823), ranked second in walks (607), home runs (210) and extra base hits (554), fourth in strikeouts (1420) and seventh in doubles (314)...individually, Bartolo Colón went 16-5 with a 2.68 ERA in 26 starts, A.J. Griffin was 15-7 with a 3.57 ERA in 31 starts and Grant Balfour went 42 for 42 in saves with a 1.66 ERA in 73 games...Josh Donaldson batted .303 with 24 home runs and 87 RBI in 140 games and Yoenis Céspedes topped the A's with 29 home runs and 89 RBI in 154 games.

**PITCHING:** The A's have 2.75 ERA (44 er in 144.0 ip) over the last 16 games and have three shutouts over that span...now have a 3.62 ERA for the season, which is the lowest mark in the American League...also have the lowest opponents on-base percentage (.295) and have issued the fewest walks (231)...rank second in opponents batting average (.243) and third in slugging percentage (.383).

**STARTING PITCHING:** A's starting pitchers have allowed three runs or fewer in each of the last 11 games and are 6-2 with a 2.28 ERA (18 er in 71.0 ip) and .221 (59 for 267) opponents batting average over that span...are 27-8 with a 2.99 ERA (114 er in 343.0 ip) and .227 (290 for 1276) opponents batting average over the last 53 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA and .272 opponents average over the first 42 contests...are 41-29 with a 3.86 ERA (250 er in 583.1 ip) for the season...are tied for the American League lead in complete game shutouts (3), rank second in innings pitched, tied for second in wins, third in ERA and tied for third in complete games (3).

**OFFENSE:** The A's have scored three runs or fewer in each of the last six games and are batting .159 (29 for 182) with 12 runs scored over that span...have won four of those six games...rank second in the American League in walks (352) and have the fourth lowest batting average (.245)...A's pinch hitters are batting .134 (11 for 82), which is the lowest mark in the AL...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (96), rank second in walks (13), tied for third in home runs (2) and fourth in RBI (9).

**NIGHT AND DAY:** The A's have a 38-20 (.655) record in night games, which is the best mark in the majors (Pittsburgh, 35-22)...are 18-19 (.486) during the day, which is the fifth worst mark in the American League...have a 3.43 ERA (200 er in 524.2 ip) at night, which is the lowest mark in the AL...are averaging 4.93 runs per night game (286 runs in 58 games) compared to 3.86 per day game (143 in 37).

**HOME AND AWAY:** The A's begin a six-game road trip to Los Angeles (three games) and Houston (three games) tonight... went 4-2 on the last road trip to Kansas City (2-1) and Pittsburgh (2-1) and are 26-24 (.520) on the road...have the fourth best road record in the AL...this road trip concludes a 15-game stretch where the A's played 12 games on the road...return home following next Wednesday's game to start a stretch where the A's will play 19 of 25 games at home from July 25-August 21...went 2-1 on the last homestand against Boston and have won 20 of the last 25 home games...are 30-15 (.667) at home for the season, which is the second best mark in the majors (Atlanta, 31-15).

**CLOSE CALLS:** The A's have won five of their last six one-run games and are 19-11 (.633) for the season...lead the American League in one-run wins, have the fourth best record and the fourth most games...are 7-3 (.700) in extra inning games...lead the AL in extra inning wins and have the third best record...are 13-6 in games decided in the last at bat and are tied for third in the AL in last at bat wins...have six "walk-off" wins.

**ALL-STARS:** The A's had two players named to the American League All-Star team (Grant Balfour and Bartolo Colón)...Balfour pitched a scoreless sixth inning (1 bb, 1 so)...Colón is the oldest All-Star in Oakland history (40 years, 53 days) and Balfour was fifth oldest (35 years, 198 days)...in addition, Yoenis Céspedes won the Home Run Derby...hit 32 home runs at an average of 405 feet...hit 17 in the first round, six in the second and nine in the final to defeat Bryce Harper...is the second Athletic to win the derby (Mark McGwire, 1992).

**FOR STARTERS:** Is scheduled to make his 20<sup>th</sup> start of the season...the A's are 11-8 (.579) in his starting assignments this year and are 23-11 (.676) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 13 of his 19 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 10 times and walked two batters or fewer 17 times.

**THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK:** Is 3-0 with a 2.93 ERA (9 er in 27.2 ip) and .219 (23 for 105) opponents batting average over his last four starts...that follows a three-game losing streak over a five-start stretch from May 30 to June 20 where he posted a 4.02 ERA and .227 opponents average.

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** Ranks sixth in the American League in opponents on-base percentage (.277) and 10<sup>th</sup> in opponents batting average (.234)...has allowed a .157 (25 for 159) batting average the first time through the lineup, which is the lowest mark in the majors among pitchers with 90 or more innings pitched...has a .274 (84 for 307) opponents average after that...his career numbers are .176 (49 for 279) the first time through the lineup, .267 (134 for 501) after that...opponents are batting .103 (4 for 39) with runners in scoring position and two outs, which is second lowest in the majors (min. 90 ip).

**AGAINST THE WEST:** Is 4-1 with a 3.27 ERA (16 er in 44.0 ip) in seven starts against American League West competition compared to 4-5 with a 3.91 ERA (34 er in 78.1 ip) in 12 starts against everyone else...is 7-1 with a 2.76 ERA (22 er in 71.2 ip) in 12 career starts against intra-division foes and 8-6 with a 3.79 ERA (56 er in 133.0 ip) in 22 starts against everyone else.

**BY INNING:** Has a 0.47 ERA (1 er in 19.0 ip) in the first inning this year and 1.06 (4 er in 34.0 ip) in his career...has a 8.05 ERA (17 er in 19.0 ip) in the fourth inning this year and 7.31 (26 er in 32.0 ip) in his career...has allowed 43 of his 53 runs this year (81.1%) in the fourth through sixth innings...has a 1.26 ERA (8 er in 57.0 ip) over the first three innings of a game, 6.88 (40 er in 52.1 ip) in innings four through six and 0.69 (1 er in 13.0 ip) from the seventh inning on.

**THE LONG BALL:** Has allowed 18 home runs, which is tied for 10<sup>th</sup> most in the American League...including two grand slams, which is tied for the AL lead...13 of the home runs he has surrendered have been solo shots...12 have come on the road.

**DAYS REST:** Is scheduled to pitch on five days rest today...is 2-4 with a 3.47 ERA (22 er in 57.0 ip) in nine starts on four days rest compared to 6-2 with a 3.86 ERA (28 er in 65.1 ip) in 10 starts on five days rest or more.

**MONTH BY MONTH:** Has seen his ERA decrease each of the first three months...went 2-2 with a 4.65 ERA in five starts in April, 3-2 with a 3.55 ERA in six starts in May and 1-2 with a 2.60 ERA in five starts in June...had the seventh lowest June ERA in the American League and also ranked third with a .190 opponents batting average...is currently 2-0 with a 4.34 ERA (9 er in 18.2 ip) in three starts in July.

**2013 HIGHLIGHTS:** Won each of his first two starts: an 8-2 win over Seattle **April 4** in Oakland and an 8-1 win at Los Angeles **April 11**...walked a career-high four batters in six innings but struck out eight in a no decision against Houston **April 16** in Oakland...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save...allowed a career-high nine runs in 4.0 innings for the loss at Boston **April 22**...allowed a grand slam to Napoli in the Red Sox five run fifth inning...combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a six-hit 2-0 shutout at New York **May 3**...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all six of the hits...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-3 loss at Cleveland **May 8**...blanked the Indians on two hits over the first four innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high tying 14.0 innings...allowed a career-high tying three home runs, all solo shots, but picked up the win in an 11-5 decision at Houston **May 25**...was the losing pitcher in the A's 5-2 loss at San Francisco **May 30**...blanked the Giants on one hit and one walk over the first five innings and had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a two-run single to Sandoval in the sixth...had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 10 inning loss at Milwaukee **June 4**...tossed 7.0 shutout innings and allowed just four hits while walking one...left after seven innings with a 3-0 lead but Doolittle allowed three runs in the eighth (Cook blown save)...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-2 loss at Chicago **June 9**...allowed a solo home run to Flowers in the third, two runs in the fourth and a solo home run to Rios in the eighth...lost his third consecutive decision in the A's 4-0 loss to Seattle **June 15** in Oakland... Hernandez, Furbush and Medina combined to shutout the A's on six hits and two walks...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 loss at Texas **June 20**...left with a 2-1 lead, one out and a runner on second base in the sixth inning but Cook allowed the run to score for the blown save...tossed his first career complete game, a two-hit shutout in the A's 5-0 win over Cincinnati **June 26**...is the first A's pitcher to allow two hits or fewer in a complete game since Dallas Braden's perfect game on May 9, 2010...allowed a one out single to Mesoraco in the fifth and a two-out double to Paul in the seventh...had a no decision in the A's 8-7 win over the Cubs **July 2** in Oakland...allowed a career-high 10 hits and matched his career-high with seven earned runs.

**LAST START:** He combined with Balfour on a seven-hit shutout in the A's 3-0 win over Boston last Saturday in Oakland...tossed eight innings and allowed six of the hits...matched his career-high with 110 pitches (also April 11, 2013 at Los Angeles)...allowed at least one base runner in each of the first six innings before retiring the side in order in the seventh and eighth...only one base runner advanced as far as third base.

**GRIFFIN vs. LOS ANGELES:** Is 2-0 with a 0.56 ERA (16.0 ip, 11 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 8 so, 0 hr) in two career starts, both at Los Angeles...was the winning pitcher in his only outing this year, an 8-1 A's win at Los Angeles on April 11...tossed 8.0 innings...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning on a Kendrick RBI double...blanked the Angels on one walk over his final four innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win...also picked up a win last year on September 12 in a 4-1 decision...tossed 8.0 innings and did not allow a run...scattered six hits and did not walk a batter...allowed just one base runner past second base and that came in the fourth inning when he put runners on first and third with one out...got Aybar to foul out and Wells to fly out to end the threat.

## TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

**RHP Dan Straily (6-2, 4.28 ERA):** Is scheduled to be recalled from Sacramento tomorrow to make his 15<sup>th</sup> start of the season...this will be his fifth stint with the A's this year...was optioned to Sacramento July 10 with the All-Star Break approaching...is 5-0 with a 2.83 ERA and .196 opponents batting average over his last nine starts...the winning streak is a career high, the longest by an American League rookie this year and tied for the second longest active streak among all AL pitchers...was the winning pitcher in his last Major League start, a 2-1 A's win at Pittsburgh July 9 (6.1 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 7 so)...had a no decision in his only minor league start following his last option, a 2-1 Sacramento win over Fresno in 11 innings last Sunday (7.0 ip, 4 h, 2 bb, 7 so)...is 1-0 with a 7.88 ERA in three career starts against Los Angeles...including a no decision in his only start this year, a 10-8 A's win in 19 innings on April 29 (4.2 ip, 7 h, 6 r, 6 er, 1 bb, 6 so).

- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...matched that mark June 21 at Seattle.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).

- Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).
- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.

- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts with one walk or fewer and two innings or more... that was the longest season-opening streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Had an 18.0-inning scoreless streak from May 20 to 31.
- Struck out nine batters May 26 at Houston in his first start after turning 40 to set an Athletics record for strikeouts by a 40-year old...the previous high was seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs. Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days)

- Had his career-high tying eight-game winning streak snapped July 3 by Chicago (NL)...also won eight straight from July 21-Sept. 10, 2005...had a 1.37 ERA and surrendered just one home run in 59.0 innings during the streak, which spanned eight starts...it was the longest winning streak by an Athletic since Dan Haren had a 10-game winning streak from April 18-July 1, 2007...fell one short of the Oakland record for consecutive starts with a win.

- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...added two more on June 3 at Milwaukee and June 11 against New York (AL)...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more...is tied for fourth in Athletics history with Max Bishop behind Henderson, Eddie Joost (19) and Campaneris (13).
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19...went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.

- Was on the 15-day disabled from April 30 to May 14 with a strained left hamstring... it was his seventh career stint on the DL, his fourth with the A's.

### **JOSH DONALDSON**

- Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning.

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases

during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento (May 28-30)...appeared in two games in right field and two at designated hitter.

- Walked with the bases loaded in the 10th inning June 1 against Chicago to force in the winning run...it was the 25th "walk-off" walk in Oakland history, the first since Bobby Crosby did it in the 17th inning against Los Angeles (NL) June 17, 2006...it was his third career walk-off RBI (single, double).
- Snapped a career-high 30-game homerless streak with a solo shot in the seventh inning off Quintana June 6 at Chicago (AL).
- Had his third career four-hit game June 16 against Seattle.

### CHRIS RESOP

- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

### FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

### ADAM ROSALES

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.
- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and ended up going 1 for 6...he and Norris had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).
- Drew his first two walks of the season April 30 against Los Angeles, snapping a 28-game streak without a walk...his last walk prior to that was August 4, 2012.
- Started in the leadoff spot for the first time in his career May 3 at New York and hit Sabathia's first pitch of the game for his first career leadoff home run.
- Snapped a 0 for 24 streak with his eighth inning home run May 28 against San Francisco.
- Struck out as a pinch hitter in the 10th inning June 13 against New York (AL) and ended up going 0 for 4 with a career-high four strikeouts...is the first player in Oakland history to strikeout four times in a game that he didn't start.

### SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Doubled in the second inning April 3 against Seattle in his first game since September 28, 2011 at Seattle...that extended his hitting streak to six games dating back to September 24, 2011 (8 for 20, .400), which is the longest hitting streak of his career.
- Did not strike out May 5 in New York, snapping his career-high streak of 12 consecutive games with a strikeout (20 strikeouts total)...that included back-to-back four strikeout games last May 1 and 3...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first Athletic to strike out four times in back-to-back games...the four strikeouts match his career high (three times).

### SETH SMITH

- Went 2 for 3 with a double April 1 against Seattle in his fifth consecutive Opening Day start (2009-10 in left field with Colorado, 2011 in right field with Colorado, 2012-13 at designated hitter with Oakland)...is 7 for 22 (.318) with two doubles, a home run and three RBI in his five openers...is the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at designated hitter since Erubiel Durazo (2003-05).
- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.
- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.
- Had a career-high four walks June 12 against New York.
- Started the game June 13 against New York (AL) 1 for 6 before singling in the 16th and 18th innings...is the third player in Oakland history to collect two hits in a game in the 16th inning or

later...the others are Dick Green on June 4, 1971 against Washington (17th and 21st) and Bert Campaneris on Sept. 6, 1969 against Minnesota (16th and 17th).

- Doubled in the fourth inning June 16 against Seattle off Iwakuma for his 500th career hit.

### **ERIC SOGARD**

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)...matched that May 15-21 (6 for 15, .400).
- Had his first career three-hit game April 16 against Houston...his second came June 22 at Seattle.
- Had the first two-steal game of his career June 12 against New York.
- Stole a base in three consecutive games from June 5-13 (four stolen bases total) after stealing four bases over the first 115 games of his career.
- Homered July 7 at Kansas City to snap a career-high 90-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since April 27, 2012.

### **DAN STRAILY**

- Struck out a career-high and Oakland rookie record tying 11 batters in 6.2 innings (sixth time, last: Tim Hudson, Sept. 10, 1999 at Tampa Bay) in an 8-3 victory at Houston April 5...is the ninth pitcher in Oakland history to strikeout 11 or more in fewer than seven innings, the first since Kirk Saarloos on September 19, 2006 (11 so in 5.0 ip)...did not issue a walk and is the 12th pitcher in Oakland to strikeout 11 or more without walking a batter.

### **STEPHEN VOGT**

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 25
- Had a sacrifice fly in his first at bat as an Athletic June 25 against Cincinnati, his first career RBI.
- Snapped a career-opening 0 for 32 streak with a home run in the fourth inning June 28 against St. Louis off Joe Kelly...the hitless streak was the second longest career-opening hitless streak by a non-pitcher since 1973 (Chris Carter, OAK; 33 in 2010).

### **CHRIS YOUNG**

- Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.
- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
- His sixth inning double April 11 at Los Angeles was the 200th of his career.
- Had his 11th career regular season multi-homer game April 24 at Boston (also has one in the post-season).
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from April 30 to May 17 with a strained left quad...it was his second career stint on the DL...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento May 16 and went 1 for 1 with two walks, a run and a stolen base in a start in center field against Oklahoma City.
- Had back-to-back three-hit games for the second time in his career May 24 and 25 at Houston (Aug. 16-17, 2007).
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts June 26 against Cincinnati...it was the fifth four-strikeout game of his career, but his first since May 20, 2009 at Florida.
