A's vs. RANGERS

The A's trail the season series, 4-6...are 1-2 in Oakland and 3-4 in Texas...have lost the season series five times over the previous seven seasons and are 66-77 (.462) against the Rangers since 2006...are 307-321 all-time against the Texas Rangers...that breaks down to 165-148 in Oakland and 143-173 in Texas...including 76-85 at Rangers Ballpark...have an alltime record of 404-403 against the Rangers/Senators.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Ryan Cook has not allowed an earned run in his past 13 games and 14.0 innings.

Jed Lowrie has hit safely in each of the seven games this homestand (12 for 29, .414) and has four multiple hit games over that span.

Bob Melvin has compiled a 697-673 record in 10 seasons as a manager...needs three more wins for 700 in his career...is 204-165 (.553) since taking over the A's June 9, 2011...that is the seventh best record in MLB over that span.

Eric Sogard is on a career-high nine-game hitting streak (13 for 34, .382).

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1924** Joe Hauser becomes the second American Leaguer to hit three home runs in a game...he adds a double for a then-record 14 total bases...**1972** Catfish Hunter pitches a five-hit shutout as the A's defeat Kansas City 5-0...it follows a three-hit shutout by Ken Holtzman, which followed a two-hit shutout by Vida Blue.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost the past two games to snap their four-game winning streak and are now 7-4 over the last 11 games...are 7-6 since the All-Star Break and 63-45 for the season, which is the third best record in the American League and sixth best in the majors...have a 3½ game lead over Texas in the American League West, which is tied for the second largest lead by a division leader in the majors...were in third place in the West on May 16 with a 20-22 record and trailed Texas by 7½ games...have gone a Major League best 43-23 (.652) since May 17 and have picked up 11 games in the standings over that span...remain in sole possession of first place in the Al West for the 27th consecutive day (since July 2)...those are the A's most consecutive days in first since they spent the final 65 days of the 2006 season in first...for the season, the A's have spent 52 days in sole possession of first, six days tied for first, 53 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's began the season by going 13-3 against American League West competition compared to 5-15 against all other teams through May 9...are 16-16 against the West since May 10 while going 29-11 against everyone else...are batting .260 (435 for 1674) with 253 runs (48 games, 5.27 runs per game) against the AL West compared to .230 (460 for 2004) with 228 runs (60 games, 3.80 runs per game) against the rest of baseball.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 21-12 (.636) in one-run games, which is the second best record in the majors (Texas, 18-10)...are tied for the lead in one-run wins...are 7-4 (.636) in extra inning games...are tied for the AL lead in extra inning wins and are tied for the third best record...have six "walk-off" wins...are 13-8 in games decided in the last at bat...lead the majors with 13 wins when trailing after six innings...overcame a five-run deficit to win for the third time last Sunday, the second time against the Angels (also April 29)...it marks the first time the A's have done that three times in a season since 2002.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 4-3 on this 10-game homestand against Los Angeles (3-1), Toronto (1-2) and Texas (three games)...have won 24 of the last 32 home games and are 34-18 (.654) at home for the season, which is the second best home record in the American League (Cleveland, 37-19)...this homestand begins a stretch where the A's will play 19 of 25 games (through Aug. 21) and 29 of 42 (through Sept. 8) at home...also have a nine-game homestand from Aug. 13-21 and a 10-game homestand from Aug. 30-Sept. 8...went 3-3 on the last road trip to Los Angeles (1-2) and Houston (2-1) and are 29-27 (.518) on the road...begin a six-game road trip on Tuesday to Cincinnati (two games) and Toronto (four games).

PITCHING: The A's lead the majors in opponents on-base percentage (.295) and fewest walks per nine innings (2.47) and have allowed the second fewest walks (268)...the last time the A's averaged fewer than 2.51 walks per nine innings was in 1904 (2.42)...the last time the A's finished the season with an on-base percentage under .300 was in 1972 (.284)...are on pace to issue 402 walks this season...the Oakland record for fewest walks in a non-strike season is 415 in 1976...lead the American League in ERA (3.60), rank second in opponents batting average (.241) and are third in opponents slugging percentage (.381)...have allowed fewer than 10 runs in 85 consecutive games, which is the second longest streak by an A's team since 1976...had a 98-game streak from Aug. 19, 1988-June 7, 1989...have not allowed 10 runs in a game since April 25 against Baltimore.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 3-2 with a 4.73 ERA (21 er in 40.0 ip) in seven games on the homestand...have walked 22 while striking out 24 and have yielded seven home runs...are now 32-12 with a 3.15 ERA (148 er in 423.1 ip) and .230 (365 for 1584) opponents batting average over the last 66 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA and .272 opponents average over the first 42 contests...are 46-33 with a 3.85 ERA (284 er in 663.2 ip) for the season...lead the American League in complete game shutouts (4) and innings pitched (663.2), are tied for second in complete games (4), tied for third in wins and rank fourth in ERA.

OFFENSE: The A's have been shut out eight times this year, including three times in the last 17 games...are now batting .211 (131 for 621) with 64 runs scored over the last 19 games (3.4 runs per game)...are hitting .243 for the season, which is fourth lowest in the American League...the A's lead the majors in walks (398) and rank fifth in the American League in doubles (196)...A's pinch hitters are batting .135 (12 for 89), which is the lowest mark in the AL...the lowest mark in Oakland history is .141 in 1994...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (204), rank second in walks (14), are tied for second in home runs (3) and tied for third in RBI (11).

IN JULY: The A's went 15-10 in the month of July, which tied for the third best record in the American League...won 16 games in each of the first three months this year and have now had a winning record for eight consecutive months dating back to last June...that is the fourth longest such streak in Oakland history and is the longest since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...batted .222 (183 for 823) in July, which was the lowest mark in the majors...scored 93 runs in 25 games (3.72 runs per game)...however, the pitching staff allowed just 84 runs for a 3.06 ERA (76 er in 223.1 ip), which was second lowest in the AL...allowed the third fewest walks (64).

THIS AND THAT: The A's placed John Jaso on the 7-day disabled list on July 25, ending their streak of 77 consecutive days without placing a player on the DL...that was the second longest streak by an A's team since 1990 (94, May 28-Aug. 30, 2005)...have now used the DL 10 times this year...have not used the DL fewer than 15 times since 2005 (8)...are 41-25 (.621) in night games, which is the second best record in the American League (Detroit, 39-23)...are 22-20 (.524) during the day...are 50-8 when scoring four or more runs compared to 13-37 when scoring less than four...are 38-16 when scoring first and 25-29 when their opponent scores first...have turned just 77 double plays, which is the fewest in the majors...have sent at least nine men to the plate in an inning 20 times this year...did that just 22 times last year.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 22nd start of the season...the A's are 12-9 (.571) in his starting assignments this year and 32-20 (.615) in his career...his teams are 37-20 (.649) in his 57 career starts...has tossed at least six innings in 15 of his 21 starts, allowed two runs or fewer nine times and walked two batters or fewer 14 times.

LAST FIVE STARTS: Is 3-1 with a 4.20 ERA (14 er in 30.0 ip) over his last five starts...is now 6-3 with a 4.35 ERA (38 er in 78.2 ip) over his last 13 starts after going 3-5 with a 3.71 ERA over his first eight starts.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 5-3 with a 2.97 ERA (19 er in 57.2 ip) in nine starts at home compared to 4-5 with a 5.00 ERA (40 er in 72.0 ip) in 12 starts on the road...in two seasons with the A's, he is 12-7 with a 2.82 ERA (49 er in 156.1 ip) and .239 (141 for 590) opponents average in 24 starts in Oakland compared to 10-11 with a 4.90 ERA (89 er in 163.1 ip) and .295 (196 for 664) opponents average in

28 starts on the road...has allowed 27 of his 44 home runs with the A's on the road.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .196 (21 for 107) batting average with runners in scoring position, which is fourth lowest in the American League....opponents are hitting .205 (32 for 156) with two outs, which ranks seventh in the AL among pitchers with 100 or more innings pitched...has yielded a .323 (42 for 130) batting average with 14 doubles, seven home runs (.592 slugging percentage) and five walks (.348 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...the slugging percentage is sixth highest in the AL and the batting average is eighth highest...allowed a .319 batting average, .555 slugging percentage and .358 on-base percentage to hitters leading off an inning last year.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 7-5 with a 3.96 ERA (40 er in 91.0 ip) and 10 home runs allowed in 15 starts at night compared to 2-3 with a 4.42 ERA (19 er in 38.2 ip) and 10 home runs allowed in six starts during the day...is tied for eighth in the American League in wins at night...in two seasons with the A's, he is 17-10 with a 3.47 ERA (86 er in 223.0 ip) in 36 starts at night compared to 5-8 with a 4.84 ERA (52 er in 96.2 ip) in 16 starts during the day.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed 20 home runs, which is tied for ninth most in the American League...16 have been hit by right-handers, which is second most in the majors (Sabathia, NYY 18)...15 have been solo shots...11 have come in the first two innings of a game...surrendered at least one home run in eight consecutive starts from May 24 to June 30 (12 home runs total).

INNING BY INNING: Has a 4.29 ERA (20 er in 42.0 ip) over the first two innings of a game, a 2.21 ERA (10 er in 40.2 ip) in innings three and four and a 5.55 ERA (29 er in 47.0) from the fifth inning on.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received just eight runs of support in his eight losses this year (46.2 ip, 1.54 RSA)...has received just 20 runs of support in his 18 losses in two seasons with the A's (105.1 ip, 1.71 RSA)...has received no support nine times over the last two years and one run of support eight times...the A's have been shut out seven times this year, three times in games started by Milone...is 8-1 with three runs of support or more this year and 17-3 in his career.

2013 HIGHLIGHTS: Won each of his first three starts on *April 3* against Seattle, *April 10* at Los Angeles and *April 15* against Houston...was the first pitcher on an A's Opening Day roster to win each of his first three starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...that extended his winning streak to five games dating back to last year...had never won more than two consecutive games in his career...did not walk a batter and matched his career-high with 10 strikeouts *May 1* against Los Angeles...has three career 10-strikeout games and has not walked a batter in any of those contests...is the third A's pitcher since 1916 with three career games of 10 or more strikeouts and no walks (Catfish Hunter, Vida Blue)...walked three batters in back-to-back starts for the first time in his career *May 12* Seattle and *May 18* against Kansas City...snapped his career-high five-game losing streak in the A's 2-1 win over the Royals...posted a 3.62 ERA during the losing streak...tossed a career-high 118 pitches in a no decision in the A's 4-1 loss at Chicago *June 8*...walked a career-high tying four batters a no decision in the A's 7-3 win over Cincinnati *June 25* in Oakland...it was his first four-walk game in over a year (June 13, 2012 at Colorado...allowed a career-high tying three home runs but picked up the win in a 7-5 decision against St. Louis *June 30* in Oakland...tossed a career-low 2.2 innings in a 5-0 loss at Pittsburgh *July 10*.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 3-1 win over Los Angeles last Saturday here in Oakland...walked a career-high tying four batters...allowed his only run in the second inning when Hamilton homered with two outs...blanked the Angels on one hit and three walks over his final five innings.

MILONE vs. TEXAS: Is 0-3 with a 4.24 ERA (23.1 ip, 29 h, 18 r, 11 er, 2 bb, 14 so, 4 hr) in four career starts, all at Texas...was the losing pitcher in his only start this year, a 9-4 A's loss at Texas June 19...allowed a two-run home run to Berkman in the second inning but the A's scored three times in the fifth to take a 3-2 lead...yielded two runs in the bottom of the fifth on a Kinsler sacrifice fly and a Cruz fielders choice...was relieved by Otero with runners on first and second and one out in the sixth and both runners scored.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Jarrod Parker (6-6, 4.07 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 22nd start of the season...has allowed five hits or fewer in each of his last 11 starts...that matches the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 among pitchers with at least three innings in an outing (Rich Harden, April 9, 2006-April 15, 2007)...has a no decision in each of his last six starts, which matches the longest streak by an Athletics starter since at least 1916...has a 3.50 ERA (14 er in 36.0 ip) and .191 (25 for 131) opponents batting average during this six start stretch...is 5-1 with a 2.85 ERA (29 er in 91.2 ip) and .183 (58 for 317) opponents batting average over his last 14 starts (since May 11)...started the year 1-5 with a 7.34 ERA and .345 opponents batting average over his first seven starts...is 4-1 with a 2.91 ERA (34.0 ip, 21 h, 11 r, 11 er, 11 bb, 29 so, 4 hr) in five career starts against Texas...the four wins are his most against any team.

- Had his Athletics record streak of 44 consecutive saves snapped July 23...it was the sixth longest save streak in Major League history...his streak of 26 consecutive saves to start the season was the second longest streak in Oakland history (Dennis Eckersley, 36 in 1992).
- Was named to his first American League All-Star team and pitched a scoreless sixth inning in the game (1 bb, 1 so).
- Had two stints as the A's closer in 2012 and saved a team-leading 24 games in a team-high 75 appearances while posting a 2.53 ERA...was charged with just two blown saves and his save percentage of 92.3 ranked fourth in the American League...was 10th in saves.
