A's vs. BLUE JAYS

The A's trail the season series, 3-2...have split the first two games of this four-game series in Toronto after losing two of three in Oakland July 29-31...won the season series last year, 5-4...it marked the first time the A's won the season series since 2007...split six games in Oakland and won two of three in Toronto...the A's are 205-179 against the Blue Jays all-time...that includes 100-93 in Oakland, 105-84 in Toronto and 0-2 in Las Vegas.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Bob Melvin has compiled a 699-678 record in 10 seasons as a manager...needs one more win for 700 in his career...is 206-170 (.548) since taking over the A's June 9, 2011...that is the ninth best record in MLB over that span.

Josh Reddick has hit five home runs over his past two games, which **ties the Major League record** for most home runs in a two-game span...is the first Athletic to hit five homers in two games since Mark McGwire, June 10-11, 1995.

Eric Sogard extended his hitting streak to 14 games Friday night, which is an ongoing career-high, the longest streak by an Athletic this year and the longest active streak in MLB...is 20 for 51 (.392) with 11 runs scored, five doubles and 10 RBI over that span.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1978** Rick Langford tosses a three-hit shutout in the first game of a doubleheader at Minnesota in the A's 2-0 victory...in **2003** Tim Hudson tosses a complete game two-hit shutout and needs just 93 pitches to defeat Boston, 4-0.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost seven of the past nine games...that includes two three-game losing streaks (August 4-7; July 30-August 2) during that stretch...prior to that, had not lost three or more consecutive games since May 6-10 when they lost a season-high five straight...are now 9-11 since the All-Star Break, which is the sixth worst record in the American League...however, are 65-50 for the season, which is the fifth best record in the AL and ninth best in the majors...are now in second place in the American League West and trail Texas by one game...today is the first time the A's have not held at least a share of first place since July 1...were tied for first the past three days after spending the previous 33 consecutive days in sole possession of first (July 2-August 6)...those were the A's most consecutive days in first since they spent the final 65 days of the 2006 season in first...were in third place in the West on May 16 with a 20-22 record and trailed Texas by 7½ games...have gone 45-28 (.616) since May 17, which is the fourth best record in the majors over that span, and have picked up 6½ games in the standings...for the season, the A's have spent 57 days in sole possession of first, nine days tied for first, 54 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth.

OFFENSE: The A's scored a season-high 14 runs on 17 hits on Friday night...that included a season-high five home runs...however, are batting .233 (187 for 803) with 91 runs scored (3.79 runs per game) over the past 24 games (since July 10)...have been shut out four times over that span and nine times for the season, which is tied for fourth most in the American League...are now hitting .245 for the season, which is fourth lowest in the AL...rank second in the majors in walks (421) and rank fifth in the AL in doubles (211)...A's pinch hitters are batting .133 (13 for 98), which is the lowest mark in the AL...the lowest mark in Oakland history is .141 in 1994...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (114), are tied for first in walks (15), rank second in home runs (4) and tied for second in RBI (12).

PITCHING: The A's lead the majors in opponents on-base percentage (.295), fewest walks per nine innings (2.45) and fewest walks (282)...the last time the A's averaged fewer than 2.51 walks per nine innings was in 1904 (2.42)...the last time the A's finished the season with an on-base percentage under .300 was in 1972 (.284)...are on pace to issue 397 walks for the season...the Oakland record for fewest walks in a non-strike season is 415 in 1976...rank second in the AL in opponents batting average (.242) and third in ERA (3.64) and opponents slugging percentage (.384)...have allowed fewer than 10 runs in 92 consecutive games, the second longest streak by an A's team since 1976...had a 98-game streak from Aug. 19, 1988-June 7, 1989...have not allowed 10 runs in a game since April 25 against Baltimore.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 5-7 with a 5.28 ERA (44 er in 75.0 ip) and .273 (83 for 304) opponents batting average over the past 14 games (since July 25)...however, are now 34-17 with a 3.36 ERA (171 er in 458.1 ip) and .236 (408 for 1732) opponents batting average over the last 73 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA and .272 opponents average over the first 42 contests...are 48-38 with a 3.95 ERA (307 er in 698.2 ip) for the season...lead the American League in complete game shutouts (4), are tied for second in complete games (4), tied for third in wins, fifth in innings pitched and sixth in ERA.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 21-14 (.600) in one-run games, which is the third best record in the American League...rank third in the AL in one-run wins (Cleveland and Kansas City, 22)...are 7-4 (.636) in extra inning games...are tied for second in the AL in extra inning wins and are tied for the fourth best record...have six "walk-off" wins...are 13-8 in games decided in the last at bat...lead the majors with 13 wins when trailing after six innings...have won three games where they have overcome a five-run deficit, marking the first time the A's have done that three times in a season since 2002.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-3 on this six-game road trip to Cincinnati (0-2) and Toronto (1-1)...went 3-3 on the last road trip to Los Angeles (1-2) and Houston (2-1) and are 30-30 (.500) on the road...are in the middle of a stretch where they will play 19 of 25 games (through Aug. 21) and 29 of 42 (through Sept. 8) at home...have a nine-game homestand from Aug. 13-21 and a 10-game homestand from Aug. 30-Sept. 8...have won 25 of the last 35 home games and are 35-20 (.636) at home for the season, which is the fourth best home record in the AL...the A's are batting .238 (438 for 1838) with 232 runs scored (55 games, 4.22 runs per game) at home and .250 (521 for 2080) with 280 runs (60 games, 4.67 runs per game) on the road...the pitching staff has a 3.41 ERA (198 er in 523.0 ip) in Oakland compared to 3.88 (221 er in 512.1 ip) on the road.

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's began the season by going 13-3 against American League West competition compared to 5-15 against all other teams through May 9...are 17-18 against the West since May 10 while going 30-14 against everyone else...are batting .258 (455 for 1766) with 260 runs (51 games, 5.10 runs per game) against the AL West compared to .233 (501 for 2152) with 252 runs (64 games, 3.94 runs per game) against the rest against the rest of baseball...the pitching staff has a 3.81 ERA (195 er in 460.2 ip) against the AL West compared to 3.51 (224 er in 574.2 ip) against everyone else.

IN JULY: The A's went 15-10 in the month of July, which tied for the third best record in the American League...won 16 games in each of the first three months this year and have now had a winning record for eight consecutive months dating back to last June...that is the fourth longest such streak in Oakland history and is the longest since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...batted .222 (183 for 823) in July, which was the lowest mark in the majors...scored 93 runs in 25 games (3.72 runs per game)...however, the pitching staff allowed just 84 runs for a 3.06 ERA (76 er in 223.1 ip), which was second lowest in the AL...allowed the third fewest walks (64).

THIS AND THAT: The A's placed John Jaso on the 7-day disabled list on July 25, ending their streak of 77 consecutive days without placing a player on the DL...that was the second longest streak by an A's team since 1990 (94, May 28-Aug. 30, 2005)...have now used the DL 10 times this year...have not used the DL fewer than 15 times since 2005 (8)...are 42-27 (.609) in night games, which is the second best record in the American League (Detroit, 45-24)...are 23-23 (.500) during the day...are 45-33 (.577) when facing a right-handed starting pitcher and 20-17 (.541) against left-handers...have turned just 83 double plays, which is the fewest in the AL and second fewest in the majors (Cincinnati, 80)...have sent at least nine men to the plate in an inning 20 times this year...did that just 22 times last year.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 24th start of the season...the A's are 13-10 (.565) in his starting assignments this year and are 25-13 (.658) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 16 of his 23 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 10 times and walked two batters or fewer 21 times.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed at least two home runs in each of his last four starts (10 home runs total), which is the longest streak by an A's pitcher since Mark Redman also had a four-game streak from June 27-July 17, 2004...the last A's starter with a longer such streak was Brian Kingman, who allowed at least two home runs in an Athletics record six consecutive starts from August 12-September 8, 1980...has allowed 28 home runs for the season, which is the most in the majors and the most by an A's pitcher since Dan Haren allowed 31 in 2006...20 of the home runs have been solo shots, which is also the most in the majors...17 have come on the road, which is tied for the most in the majors (Blanton, LAA)...has allowed two grand slams, which is tied for the ML lead.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks fifth in the American League in opponents on-base percentage (.273), is eighth in opponents batting average (.231) and 10th in fewest walks per nine innings (1.95).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .155 (30 for 193) batting average the first time through the lineup, which is the second lowest mark in the majors among pitchers with 100 or more innings pitched...has a .270 (100 for 370) opponents average after that...has allowed six home runs the first time through the lineup, 22 after that...his career numbers are .173 (54 for 313) the first time through the lineup, .266 (150 for 564) after that...opponents are batting .136 (6 for 44) with runners in scoring position and two outs, which is fourth lowest in the AL (min. 100 ip).

BY INNING: Has a 1.57 ERA (12 er in 69.0 ip) and seven home runs allowed over the first three innings of a game, 6.96 (49 er in 63.1 ip) and 19 home runs in innings four through six and 1.80 (3 er in 15.0 ip) and two home runs from the seventh inning on...has allowed 52 of his 68 runs this year (76.5%) in the fourth through sixth innings...has a 0.78 ERA (2 er in 23.0 ip) in the first inning this year and 1.18 (5 er in 38.0 ip) in his career...has a 9.82 ERA (20 er in 18.1 ip) in the sixth inning this year and 7.94 (25 er in 28.1 ip) in his career.

MONTH BY MONTH: Went 4-1 with a 4.86 ERA and .252 opponents batting average in six starts in the month of July...tied for second in the American League wins in July...it marked the second time he won four games in a month in his career (September, 2012)...allowed more home runs (11) than walks (6) in July...the 11 home runs tied the Oakland record for home runs allowed in any month (fifth time, last: Mark Redman in July, 2004)...went 2-2 with a 4.65 ERA in five starts in April, 3-2 with a 3.55 ERA in six starts in May and 1-2 with a 2.60 ERA in five starts in June...had the seventh lowest June ERA in the American League and also ranked third with a .190 opponents batting average.

THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK SNAPPED: Had his three-game winning streak snapped July 19...posted a 2.93 ERA and .219 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned four starts...that followed a three-game losing streak over a five-start stretch from May 30 to June 20 where he posted a 4.02 ERA and .227 opponents average.

2013 HIGHLIGHTS: Won each of his first two starts: an 8-2 win over Seattle **April 4** in Oakland and an 8-1 win at Los Angeles **April 11**...walked a career-high four batters in six innings but struck out eight in a no decision against Houston **April 16** in Oakland...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save...combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a six-hit 2-0 shutout at New York **May 3**...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all six of the hits...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-3 loss at Cleveland **May 8**...blanked the Indians on two hits over the first four innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high tying 14.0 innings...had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 10 inning loss at Milwaukee **June 4**...tossed 7.0 shutout innings and allowed just four hits while walking one...left after seven innings with a 3-0 lead but Doolittle allowed three runs in the eighth (Cook blown save)...lost his third consecutive decision in the A's 4-0 loss to Seattle **June 15** in Oakland... Hernandez, Furbush and Medina combined to shutout the A's on six hits and two walks...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 loss at Texas **June 20**...left with a 2-1 lead, one out and a runner on second base in the sixth inning but Cook allowed the run to score for the blown save...tossed his first career complete game, a two-hit shutout in the A's 5-0 win over Cincinnati **June 26**...is the first A's pitcher to allow two hits or fewer in a complete game since Dallas Braden's perfect game on May 9, 2010...combined with Balfour on a seven-hit shutout in the A's 3-0 win over Boston **July 13** in Oakland...tossed eight innings and allowed six of the hits...matched his career-high with 110 pitches.

LAST START: Was charged with the loss in the A's 4-0 loss to Texas a week ago today in Oakland...allowed an unearned run in the first when Beltre singled home Kinsler, who reached on a fielding error by Cespedes...allowed a solo home run to Cruz in the second and a two-run homer to Moreland in the seventh before he was replaced by Blevins.

GRIFFIN vs. TORONTO: Is 1-0 with a 2.45 ERA (14.2 ip, 8 h, 4 r, 4 er, 4 bb, 14 so, 3 hr) in three career starts...including 1-0 with a 0.00 ERA (6.0 ip, 3 h, 2 bb, 9 so) in one start in Toronto and 1-0 with a 4.15 ERA (8.2 ip, 5 h, 4 r, 4 er, 2 bb, 5 so, 3 hr) in two starts in Oakland...won his 10th game of the season in his only start against the Blue Jays this year, a 9-4 A's win July 29 in Oakland...allowed a career-high tying three home runs for the fourth time in his career...retired each of the first 13 batters he faced before Lind homered with one out in the fifth...had an 8-1 lead when he allowed three runs in the sixth inning on a leadoff home run by Lawrie and a two-run home run by Encarnacion...was 1-0 with a 0.00 ERA (7.2 ip, 4 h, 2 bb, 9 so) in two starts last year.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Dan Straily (10-8, 3.91 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 19th start of the season...has lost each of his four starts since he was recalled from Sacramento July 20...has a 4.95 ERA (11 er in 20.0 ip) and .321 (27 for 84) opponents batting average over that span...the four-game losing streak is the longest of his career...is now 5-4 with a 3.41 ERA (28 er in 74.0 ip) and .234 (65 for 278) opponents batting average over his last 13 starts after going 1-2 with a 7.27 ERA and .257 opponents batting average over his first five starts...leads American League rookies in games started (18), strikeouts (80) and innings pitched (100.0) and is tied for second in wins (6)...is 0-1 with a 2.53 ERA (10.2 ip, 11 h, 6 r, 3 er, 3 bb, 7 so, 2 hr) in two career starts against Toronto, both in Oakland.

The A's bullpen has a 2.19 ERA (16 er in 65.2 ip) and .185 (43 for 232) opponents batting average over the past 21 games (since July 13)...now has a 2.99 ERA for the season, which is tied for second in the American League...has the fewest walks (96) and strikeouts (289) in the AL, ranks first in opponents on-base percentage (.287) and has allowed the fewest home runs (26)...first batters faced are 63 for 295 (.214) with 15 walks and two hit by pitches (3 sf, .254 on-base percentage)...have issued the fewest first batter walks in the AL, have the lowest opponents on-base percentage and are third in batting average.

- Has not allowed a run in 24 of his past 26 games (5 er in 23.2 ip, 1.90 ERA) and is 18 for 19 in save opportunities over that span.
- Leads the American League in save percentage (96.7%) and ranks fifth in saves (29)...his 29 saves are the most by an A's pitcher since 2006 (Huston Street, 37).
- Has 55 career saves with the A's, which ranks eighth in Oakland history...is six away from tying Jay Howell (61) for seventh place.
- Has recorded 494 career strikeouts and is six away from the 500th of his career.
- Has a 1.21 ERA (4 er in 29.2 ip) in 31 games at night compared to 2.93 (5 er in 15.1 ip) in 16 day games.
- Is 2-1 with a save and 3.45 ERA in 30 games in his career against Toronto (28.2 ip, 25 h, 11 r, 11 er, 6 bb, 38 so, 3 hr).
- Had his Athletics record streak of 44 consecutive saves snapped July 23...it was the sixth longest save streak in Major League history...his streak of 26 consecutive saves to start the season was the second longest streak in Oakland history (Dennis Eckersley, 36 in 1992).
- Was named to his first American League All-Star team and pitched a scoreless sixth inning in the game (1 bb, 1 so).
