A's vs. INDIANS

The A's have lost the season series for the second time in the last three years as they trail 4-0 with three games remaining...were swept in a fourgame series in Cleveland in May...it marked the Indians first four-game sweep of the A's since April 26-29, 1999...are 10-11 against Cleveland over the last three years...eight of those wins came in the final eight games last year...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 258-226 against the Indians...that breaks down to 136-98 in Oakland and 122-128 in Cleveland...all-time, the A's are 893-1019 against the Indians.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Yoenis Céspedes has homered four times in his last 15 games following a career-high 25-game homerless streak...now has 13 RBI in his last 16 games after driving in eight runs over his previous 36 contests.

Eric Sogard is batting .314 (22 for 70) with 11 RBI in 21 games since the All-Star Break.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1930 Lefty Grove wins his 20th game of the season, defeating St. Louis in Philadelphia, 4-2...in 1983 Chris Codiroli and Dave Beard combine on a 4-0 shutout against California, the A's third consecutive shutout...the shutout comes as part of an Oakland record 37 consecutive scoreless innings...in 1991 Dennis Eckersley strikes out Chili Davis at Minnesota for his 2000th career strikeout...in 1996 Geronimo Berroa hits two home runs in the first game of a doubleheader against Boston, the A's 199th and 200th of the season...that broke the A's franchise record of 199.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Are 4-3 over the last seven games but are 5-9 over the last 14 contests...are 12-13 since the All-Star Break after going 56-39 before the break...are in second place in the American League West for the sixth consecutive day and trail Texas by 1½ games...have not been more than two games back since May 31 when they were three out...currently have the second Wild Card spot, ½ game behind Tampa Bay and three games ahead of third place Baltimore...held at least a share of first place in the West for 35 consecutive days from July 2-August 9...that included a streak of 32 consecutive days in sole possession of first from July 2-August 6...those were the A's most consecutive days in first since they spent the final 65 days of the 2006 season in first...for the season, the A's have spent 57 days in sole possession of first, nine days tied for first, 59 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth...the A's are 209-172 (.549) since Bob Melvin took over as manager June 9, 2011, which is the 10th best record in the majors over that span.

PITCHING: The A's pitching staff tossed its 10th shutout of the season yesterday, which ranks fourth in the American League...have allowed two runs or fewer in three of the last four games (8 er in 38.0 ip, 1.89 ERA) and now have a 3.58 ERA for the season, which is third lowest in the AL...have the lowest opponents on-base percentage (.296) and fewest walks (301) in the majors...the last time the A's finished the season with an on-base percentage under .300 was in 1972 (.284)...are on pace to walk 406 batters...the Oakland record for fewest walks in a non-strike season is 415 in 1976...are averaging 2.50 walks per nine innings...the last time the A's averaged fewer than 2.51 walks per nine innings was in 1904 (2.42)...rank second in the AL in opponents batting average (.242) and opponents slugging percentage (.381)...have allowed fewer than 10 runs in 97 consecutive games, which is the second longest streak by an A's team since 1976...had a 98-game streak from Aug. 19, 1988-June 7, 1989...it is the second longest streak by an AL team since 1992 (Toronto, 136 from May 17, 2008-April 24, 2009)...have not allowed 10 runs in a game since April 25 against Baltimore.

STARTING PITCHING: The A's are scheduled to start a right-handed pitcher for the 12th consecutive game tonight, which is the A's longest such streak since July 21-Oct. 2, 1999 when they did it in 68 consecutive games...starters are 3-5 with a 3.62 ERA (26 er in 64.2 ip) over that span...however, are 35-18 with a 3.29 ERA (180 er in 491.2 ip) and .236 (438 for 1854) opponents batting average over the last 78 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA and .272 opponents average over the first 42 contests...are 49-39 with a 3.89 ERA (316 er in 732.0 ip) for the season...lead the American League in complete game shutouts (4), rank third in wins, tied for third in complete games (4) and fourth in ERA and innings pitched...have used just seven starting pitchers, which is their fewest since employing six in 2004.

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .228 (236 for 1035) with 116 runs scored (3.74 runs per game) over the last 31 games (since July 8)...are now hitting .244 for the season, which is fifth lowest in the American League...have 13 home runs in the last nine games after homering just twice over the previous seven contests...have 437 walks, which ranks second in the majors to Boston (446)...have 14 sacrifice hits, which is tied for the fewest in the majors with Boston.

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's began the season by going 13-3 against American League West competition compared to 5-15 against all other teams through May 9...are 18-20 against the West since May 10 while going 32-14 against everyone else...are averaging 5.00 runs per game (270 runs in 54 games) against AL West competition compared to 3.98 (263 runs in 66 games) against everyone else.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-2 on this nine-game homestand against Houston (1-2), Cleveland (three games) and Seattle (three games)...this homestand is part of a stretch where the A's will play 19 of 25 games (July 25-Aug. 21) and 29 of 42 (July 25-Sept. 8) at home...went 5-5 on the last homestand against Los Angeles (3-1), Toronto (1-2) and Texas (1-2)...have another 10-game homestand from Aug. 30-Sept. 8...have lost six of the last eight home games but are 36-22 (.621) in Oakland for the season, which is the fourth best home record in the American League...went 3-3 on the last road trip to Cincinnati (0-2) and Toronto (3-1) and are 32-30 (.516) on the road.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's have a four-game losing streak in one-run games and are 21-16 (.568) in one-run decisions for the season...are tied for third in the American League in one-run wins and have the fourth best record...are 7-5 (.583) in extra inning games, which is fourth best in the AL...have six "walk-off" wins...are 14-9 in games decided in the last at bat.

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters are batting .147 (15 for 102), which is the second lowest mark in the American League (Baltimore, .143)...the lowest mark in Oakland history is .141 in 1994...lead the AL in pinch plate appearances (119) and strikeouts (31) and rank second in home runs (4), RBI (13) and walks (15)...the four pinch hit home runs are the most by an A's team since the 2002 club had five...the 15 walks are also the most since 2002 (15)...the 119 plate appearances are the most since 2004 (120).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have gone back-to-back games without an error after a season-high five games streak with an error...have committed 13 errors in the last 14 games, which has led to 10 unearned runs...made 61 errors over the first 106 games leading to 23 unearned runs...have turned 87 double plays, which is second fewest in the majors (Cincinnati, 84)...rank last in the majors in assists (1038).

THIS AND THAT: The A's are 42-5 when outhomering the opposition, which is the best mark in the majors...are 42-29 (.600) in night games, which is the third best record in the American League, compared to 26-23 (.531) during the day...are 5-7 in the month of August...went 15-10 in July and have posted a winning record in eight consecutive months dating back to last June...that is the fourth longest such streak in Oakland history and is the longest since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...placed John Jaso on the 7-day disabled list on July 25, ending a streak of 77 consecutive days without placing a player on the DL...that was the second longest streak by an A's team since 1990 (94, May 28-Aug. 30, 2005)...have now used the DL 10 times this year...have not used the DL fewer than 15 times since 2005 (8)...are 13-6 on Sundays which is tied with Tampa Bay for the best mark in the majors.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his team-leading 25th start of the season...the A's are 14-10 (.583) in his starting assignments this year and are 26-13 (.667) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 16 of his 24 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 10 times and walked two batters or fewer 21 times.

SINCE THE BREAK: Is 2-2 with a 4.70 ERA (16 er in 30.2 ip) and .218 (26 for 119) opponents batting average in five starts since the All-Star Break after going 8-6 with a 3.68 ERA and .234 opponents average before the break...has allowed 10 home runs in 30.2 innings since the break after allowing 18 in 122.1 innings before the break.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Ranks eighth in the American League in opponents onbase percentage (.278) and ninth in opponents batting average (.231)...has allowed a .160 (32 for 200) batting average the first time through the lineup, which is the lowest mark in the majors among pitchers with 100 or more innings pitched...has a .268 (103 for 385)

opponents average after that...has allowed six home runs the first time through the lineup, 22 after that...his career numbers are .175 (56 for 320) the first time through the lineup, .264 (153 for 579) after that...opponents are batting .130 (6 for 46) with runners in scoring position and two outs, which is third lowest in the AL (min. 100 ip)...has issued 25 of his 38 walks to left-handed hitters.

THE LONG BALL: Did not allow a home run in his last start after allowing two or more in each of his previous four starts (10 home runs total)...the four-game streak with two or more home runs was the longest by an A's pitcher since Mark Redman also had a four-game streak from June 27-July 17, 2004...has allowed 28 home runs for the season, which is the most in the majors and the most by an A's pitcher since Dan Haren allowed 31 in 2006...20 of the home runs have been solo shots, which is also the most in the majors...the 20 solo home runs match the most by an A's pitcher over the last 26 years...17 have come on the road, which is tied for second most in the majors (Blanton, LAA 18)...has allowed two grand slams, which is tied for the ML lead.

BY INNING: Has a 1.50 ERA (12 er in 72.0 ip) and seven home runs allowed over the first three innings of a game, 6.95 (51 er in 66.0 ip) and 19 home runs in innings four through six and 1.80 (3 er in 15.0 ip) and two home runs from the seventh inning on...has allowed 54 of his 71 runs this year (76.1%) in the fourth through sixth innings...has a 0.75 ERA (2 er in 24.0 ip) in the first inning this year and 1.15 (5 er in 39.0 ip) in his career...has a 10.42 ERA (22 er in 19.0 ip) in the sixth inning this year and 8.38 (27 er in 29.0 ip) in his career.

MONTH BY MONTH: Went 4-1 with a 4.86 ERA and .252 opponents batting average in six starts in the month of July...tied for second in the American League wins in July...it marked the second time he won four games in a month in his career (September, 2012)...allowed more home runs (11) than walks (6) in July...the 11 home runs tied the Oakland record for home runs allowed in any month (fifth time, last: Mark Redman in July, 2004)...went 2-2 with a 4.65 ERA in five starts in April, 3-2 with a 3.55 ERA in six starts in May and 1-2 with a 2.60 ERA in five starts in June...had the seventh lowest June ERA in the American League and also ranked third with a .190 opponents batting average.

THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK SNAPPED: Had his three-game winning streak snapped July 19...posted a 2.93 ERA and .219 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned four starts...that followed a three-game losing streak over a five-start stretch from May 30 to June 20 where he posted a 4.02 ERA and .227 opponents average.

2013 HIGHLIGHTS: Won each of his first two starts: an 8-2 win over Seattle *April 4* in Oakland and an 8-1 win at Los Angeles *April 11...*had a no decision against Houston *April 16* in Oakland...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save...combined with Doolittle and Balfour on a six-hit 2-0 shutout at New York *May 3...*tossed 7.0 innings and allowed all six of the hits...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-3 loss at Cleveland *May 8...*blanked the Indians on two hits over the first four innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high tying 14.0 innings...had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 10 inning loss at Milwaukee *June 4...*tossed 7.0 shutout innings and allowed just four hits while walking one...left after seven innings with a 3-0 lead but Doolittle allowed three runs in the eighth (Cook blown save)...lost his third consecutive decision in the A's 4-0 loss to Seattle *June 15* in Oakland... Hernandez, Furbush and Medina combined to shutout the A's on six hits and two walks...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 loss at Texas *June 20...*left with a 2-1 lead, one out and a runner on second base in the sixth inning but Cook allowed the run to score for the blown save...tossed his first career complete game, a two-hit shutout in the A's 5-0 win over Cincinnati *June 26...*is the first A's pitcher to allow two hits or fewer in a complete game since Dallas Braden's perfect game on May 9, 2010...combined with Balfour on a seven-hit shutout in the A's 3-0 win over Boston *July 13* in Oakland...tossed eight innings and allowed six of the hits...matched his career-high with 110 pitches.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 6-4 win at Toronto last Sunday...walked a career-high six batters in 5.2 innings...allowed an unearned run in the second inning when Lind scored on a Sogard error...that was the only run he allowed over the first five innings and the A's scored three times in the sixth to take a 3-1 lead...allowed two runs in the bottom of the sixth on a Reyes RBI single and an Izturis sacrifice fly and left after 5.2 innings with the scored tied 3-3.

GRIFFIN vs. CLEVELAND: Was the losing pitcher in his only career appearance, a start in the A's 4-3 loss at Cleveland earlier this year on May 8...blanked the Indians on two hits over the first four innings...had a 3-0 lead entering the bottom of the fifth when he loaded the bases with no outs...allowed two runs to score on a fielders choice/error...then allowed solo home runs to Swisher and Santana in the sixth inning for the loss.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Dan Straily (6-6, 4.19 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 20th start of the season...is 0-4 with a 3.95 ERA and .303 opponents batting average in five starts since he was recalled from Sacramento July 20...the four-game losing streak is the longest of his career...has received no run support in three of those starts and his season run support of 3.44 is seventh lowest in the American League among pitchers with 100 or more innings pitched...leads AL rookies in games started (19), strikeouts (85) and innings pitched (107.1) and is tied for second in wins (6)...had a no decision in his last start, a 5-1 A's win at Toronto on Monday (7.1 ip, 6 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 5 so)...has never faced the Indians in his career.

The A's bullpen has a 2.04 ERA (18 er in 79.1 ip) and .190 (54 for 284) opponents batting average over the past 26 games (since July 13)...now has a 2.93 ERA for the season, which ranks second in the American League...has the fewest walks (103) and second fewest strikeouts (305) in the AL, ranks first in opponents on-base percentage (.287) and has allowed the fewest home runs (26)...first batters faced are 63 for 303 (.208) with 18 walks and two hit by pitches (3 sf, .255 on-base percentage)...has allowed the fewest first batter walks in the AL, has the lowest on-base percentage and third lowest batting average

- Has not allowed a run in 25 of his past 28 games (6 er in 25.2 ip, 2.10 ERA) and is 19 for 20 in save opportunities over that span.
- Ranks second in the American League in save percentage (96.7%), is fifth in saves (30) and ninth among AL relievers in ERA (1.91)...his 30 saves are the most by an A's pitcher since 2006 (Huston Street, 37).
- Has 56 career saves with the A's, which ranks eighth in Oakland history...is five away from tying Jay Howell (61) for seventh place.
- Has recorded 497 career strikeouts and is three away from the 500th of his career.
- His opponents have a .193 batting average, which includes .165 (14 for 85) against left-handed hitters and .221 (19 for 86) against righties.
- Has a 1.17 ERA (4 er in 30.2 ip) in 32 games at night compared to 3.31 (6 er in 16.1 ip) in 17 day games.

 Is a perfect 4 for 4 in save opportunities in 25 games in his career against Cleveland (27.1 ip, 24 h, 12 r, 12 er, 11 bb, 39 so, 3 hr, 3.95 ERA).
- Had his Athletics record streak of 44 consecutive saves snapped July 23...it was the sixth longest save streak in Major League history...his streak of 26 consecutive saves to start the season was the second longest streak in Oakland history (Dennis Eckersley, 36 in 1992).

14-GAME WINNER: Is tied for second in Leading the American League with 14 wins...the wins surpass Parker and Milone's team-leading total of 13 from a year ago and are his most wins since 2005 when he went 21-8 for the Angels and won the Cy Young Award...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he needs one more win to become the first pitcher in AL history with 15 wins with four different teams (Indians, White Sox, Angels)

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks seventh in the American League in ERA (2.97)...has logged an ERA under 3.00 just once in his career (2.93 in 2002)...is also tied for the AL lead in shutouts (3), ranks second in fewest walks per nine innings (1.46), tied for second in complete games (3), tied for third in opponents grounded into double plays (19), fourth in winning percentage (.737) and sixth in fewest home runs per nine innings (0.64)...is averaging the third fewest pitches per inning (14.4) and ninth fewest pitches per game (92.8)...has the eighth highest run support (6.01).

AS A 40-YEAR OLD: His 14 wins are an Oakland record for a 40-year old...the previous mark was 13 by Don Sutton (1985)...the only Athletic with more wins is Jack Quinn (18 in 1928, 15 in 1927)...the last Major League 40-year old with at least 14 wins is Jamie Moyer in 2008 (16)...has tied Tom Candiotti's Oakland record of three complete games set in 1998...is the first Athletics 40-year old with three shutouts since Jack Quinn had four for the 1928 Philadelphia A's...the last Major Leaguer with three shutouts is Dennis Martinez in 1994...currently has a 2.97 ERA...since 1953, the only American League 40-year old with an ERA under 3.00 is Nolan Ryan of the 1991 Texas Rangers (2.91)...won each of his first seven starts after turning 40 on May 24...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first pitcher in Major League history to win at least each of his first six starts in his forties...ages are based on a players age as of June 30th.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 9-2 with a 2.56 ERA (25 er in 88.0 ip) in 13 starts at night compared to 5-3 with a 3.53 ERA (26 er in 66.1 ip) in 11 starts during the day...ranks fifth in the American League in night ERA...his first night loss came on July 3 against Chicago (NL), snapping an 11-game winning streak in night games dating back to July 28 of last year...in two seasons with the A's, he is 18-7 with a 2.73 ERA (58 er in 191.1 ip) in 29 starts at night compared to 6-7 with a 3.98 ERA (51 er in 115.1 ip) in 19 starts during the day.

STREAK SNAPPED: Allowed five runs in 2.2 innings August 7 at Cincinnati, snapping his streak of 15 consecutive starts with six innings or more and three runs or fewer...the streak was the longest by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916, topping the previous high of 14 by Dan Haren from April 18-June 26, 2007...over the last 30 years, the only American League pitcher with a longer streak is Johan Santana (21, June 9-Sept. 24, 2004)...Colón was 11-1 with a 1.69 ERA and .248 opponents batting average during the streak...surrendered just four home runs and issued 20 walks in 106.1 innings.

ACTIVE LEADERS: Ranks third among active pitchers in complete games (35), tied for fourth in shutouts (12), fifth in wins (185), sixth in games started (399), seventh in strikeouts (1916) and eighth in innings pitched (2547.2).

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 185 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (399), innings pitched (2547.2) and strikeouts (1916).

THIS AND THAT: Has a 4.09 ERA (43 er in 94.2 ip) and has yielded 10 home runs over the first four innings of a game...has a 1.21 ERA (8 er in 59.2 ip) and has surrendered just one home run from the fifth inning on...has allowed nine of his 11 home runs to a left-handed hitter...has yielded 48 of his 62 home runs over his last four seasons to lefties...is 8-2 following an A's loss...made his 400th career appearance July 14 against Boston...was named to the American League All-Star team for the third time in his career (1998, 2005)...had 12 wins at the All-Star Break, which matched the most by an A's pitcher before the break since 1991 (Mulder 12 in 2004 and 2003)...went 5-0 with a 1.75 ERA in five starts in June to win American League Pitcher of the Month honors for the fourth time in his career.

LAST START: He lost his second consecutive start in the A's 5-4 loss to Houston on Monday...allowed a two-run double to Barnes in the second, a Castro sacrifice fly and a Carter RBI double in the third and one more run in the fourth on a grounded into double play...was relieved by Chavez to start the fifth inning with the A's trailing 5-0.

COLÓN vs. CLEVELAND: Is 6-4 with a 3.84 ERA (72.2 ip, 68 h, 32 r, 31 er, 18 bb, 45 so, 9 hr) in 11 career appearances, all starts...is 5-2 with a 3.33 ERA (18 er in 48.2 ip) in seven starts in his home ballparks and 1-2 with a 4.88 ERA (13 er in 24.0 ip) in four starts at Progressive Field as a visitor...spent the first five and one-half seasons of his big league career with the Indians and is 37-23 with a 4.01 ERA (246 er in 551.2 ip) in 86 career appearances, including 84 starts, at Progressive Field...was the losing pitcher in his only start this year, a 9-2 A's loss at Cleveland on May 9...allowed a two-run home run to Kipnis in the first and three more runs in the second on a Gomes RBI double, a Stubbs RBI single and a Kipnis sacrifice fly...also allowed a leadoff home run to Swisher in the third...was relieved by Scribner after allowing six runs on eight hits in 4.0 innings.

 Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days)
- Tossed a five-hit shutout May 31 against Chicago (AL) to become the second 40-year old in Oakland history with a shutout (Don Sutton: 40 years, 85 days on June 26, 1985 against Chicago).
- Had his career-high tying eight-game winning streak snapped July 3 by Chicago (NL)...also won eight straight from July 21-Sept. 10, 2005...had a 1.37 ERA and surrendered just one home run in 59.0 innings during the streak, which spanned eight starts...it was the longest winning streak by an Athletic since Dan Haren had a 10-game winning streak from April 18-July 1, 2007...fell one short of the Oakland record for consecutive starts with a win.
- The loss to the Cubs was his first home loss of the season, snapping an eight-game winning streak
 in the Coliseum dating back to Aug. 2, 2012...that was the longest home winning streak by an A's
 pitcher since Mark Mulder won 10 straight from July 31, 2002-June 19, 2003...posted a 1.85 ERA
 during the winning streak, which spanned 11 starts, and walked just seven batters (0.81 per nine
 innings).
- Was charged with a wild pitch July 3 against Chicago (NL), his first since May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL)...it snapped a streak of 443.0 innings without a wild pitch...it was his first wild pitch in 40 starts with the A's, which was the second longest streak in Oakland history...the record is 42 by Catfish Hunter (June 25, 1972-June 27, 1973).
- Went 5-0 with a 1.75 ERA in five starts in June to win American League Pitcher of the Month honors for the fourth time in his career...led the AL in ERA and tied for second in wins...it marked the third time in his career he won five games in a month (August 1999 and August 2005)...it was the fourth lowest single month ERA of his career (1.13 in May 2002, 1.39 in June 1998 and 1.72 in August 2005)...since 2006, the only other Oakland pitcher to win five games in a month is Gio Gonzalez (Sept., 2011).
- Was named to the American League All-Star team for the third time in his career (1998, 2005)...
 at the age of 40 years and 53 days, he is the oldest All-Star in Athletics history...Dennis Eckersley,
 at age 37 in 1992, is second oldest...pitched the Sunday before the game and was replaced on the
 active roster.

RYAN COOK

 Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his
 eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...added two more
 on June 3 at Milwaukee and June 11 against New York (AL)...in Oakland history, only Rickey
 Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more...is tied for fourth in Athletics history with
 Max Bishop behind Henderson, Eddie Joost (19) and Campaneris (13).
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.
- Was on the 15-day disabled from April 30 to May 14 with a strained left hamstring...it was his seventh career stint on the DL, his fourth with the A's.
- His seventh inning RBI single July 13 against Boston was the 500th RBI of his career.
- Led off the game with a double July 22 at Houston to snap a career-high tying 21-game streak without an extra base hit and a career-high 35-game streak without a double...it was his first extra base hit since a home run June 21 at Seattle and his first double since June 3 at Milwaukee.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning...his second was a RBI single in the 11th inning July 14 against Boston.
- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland)...also had four-hit games May 14 against Texas and May 25 at Houston.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of April 22-28...it was his first career
 weekly honor...went 12 for 22 (.545) with four runs, seven doubles (.864 slugging percentage), 10
 RBI and seven walks (1 sf, .633 on-base percentage) in seven games.
- Had a career-high seven-game hitting streak from May 11-18 (12 for 26, .462).
- Made his Major League debut at shortstop in the ninth inning May 24 at Houston...had one appearance at shortstop in the minors with Triple-A Sacramento on Aug. 2, 2012.
- Hit his first career grand slam in the sixth inning June 7 at Chicago, turning a 3-0 deficit into a 4-3 win
- Snapped a career-high tying 0 for 17 streak with a fifth inning single July 29 (third time, last: April 13-May 14, 2012).

SEAN DOOLITTLE

Had a career-high tying 13.1-inning scoreless streak from April 29 to May 27.

NATE FREIMAN

Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 3 against Seattle and had a RBI single
off Joe Saunders in the second inning for his first ML hit...added another single in the fourth inning
for his first multiple hit game.

- Hit his first Major League home run April 22 against Houston, a three-run shot off Erik Bedard in the first inning...it snapped a 0 for 11 streak.
- Was named American League Rookie of the Month for May after batting .351 with three doubles, one home run and nine RBI in 14 games.
- Had his second career three-hit game June 11 and both have come against the Yankees in games started by Sabathia (also May 3).
- Had his first career "walk-off" hit June 13 against New York, a RBI single in the 18th inning off Rivera.

JOHN JASO

- Is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster with his third team (Tampa Bay, 2011; Seattle, 2012).
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 9 at Los Angeles, a three-run shot off Jepsen in the seventh to give the A's a 7-5 lead.
- Played first base May 24 at Houston, his second career appearance at first base (Aug. 25, 2010 at Los Angeles-AL).
- Had a career-high 17-game reaching base streak from May 21 to June 18...hit .345 with a .456 on-base percentage during the streak, which included a career-high nine-game hitting streak from May 25-June 13 (14 for 38, .368).

JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying four RBI April 15 against Houston (fourth time, last: September 19, 2011 vs. Baltimore).
- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career...added his fourth June 1 agaisnt Chicago (AL).
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).
- Went a career-high 11 consecutive games without a RBI from June 4 to 15.
- Homered June 21 at Seattle to snap a career-high 62-game homerless streak.
- Hit safely in each of his first 12 interleague games, which tied for the third longest interleague hitting streak in Oakland history...had a 14-game interleague hitting streak dating back to last year.
- Had a career-high tying nine-game hitting streak from June 20 to 30 (also Aug. 4-21, 2010 and April 27-May 6, 2012)...hit .457 (16 for 35) during the streak.

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.
- Hit the game-ending home run in the bottom of the 19th inning April 29 against Los Angeles, his third career walk-off home run (last: September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) and fifth career game-ending hit (also a double and single)...also homered in the sixth inning, his second career multi-homer game (June 12, 2012 at Colorado)...had 12 innings between home runs to become the 17th player in Major League history to go at least 12 innings between home runs in one game...is the second Athletic to do it...Reggie Jackson also went 12 innings between home runs June 11, 1969...had four strikeouts to become the second Major Leaguer since 1916 to have at least two home runs and four strikeouts in one game...Evan Longoria did it August 4, 2009 for Tampa Bay against Boston.
- Made his first career appearance in center field May 9 (also May 13).
- Hit the 7000th home run in Oakland history May 13 against Texas off Justin Grimm in the third
 inning...hit the 12,000th home run in Athletics franchise history June 5 at Milwaukee, a three-run
 homer off Michael Gonzalez in the seventh inning.

- Played third base for the second time as a professional May 24 at Houston in the ninth inning...the other time was in 2002 with the Red Sox affiliate in the Gulf Coast League...returned to third base in the 16th inning of the A's 18-inning game against New York (AL) June 13.
- Had his second two homer game of the season June 12 against New York (AL) and third of his career...the two homers gave him a streak where each of his last five hits were home runs...is the sixth player in Oakland history (10th time) to do that, the first since John Jaha (June 18-20, 1999)... the others are Jackson, McGwire (five times), Canseco and Giambi.

PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

DEREK NORRIS

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up
 going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in
 Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12,
 1992 vs. Texas).
- Had a career-high four RBI June 11 against New York (AL).
- Caught all 18 innings June 20 against New York (AL)...is the second A's catcher since 1973 to catch 18 innings in a game (Damian Miller, Aug. 8, 2004 against Minnesota)

JARROD PARKER

- Began the season with a career-high four-game losing streak...posted an 8.10 ERA and .374 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned five starts from April 2 to 25.
- Allowed a career-high four home runs in a 7-3 loss at Cleveland May 6...prior to that, had allowed
 more than one home run in a start just twice in his career and never more than two.
- Matched his career high by tossing 8.0 innings June 13 against New York (fifth time, third time against New York)...had a no decision in the 3-2, 18-inning win.
- Left his June 29 start against St. Louis after 3.2 innings with tightness in his right hamstring.

SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.

 stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases
 during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento
 (May 28-30)...appeared in two games in right field and two at designated hitter.
- Walked with the bases loaded in the 10th inning June 1 against Chicago to force in the winning run...it was the 25th "walk-off" walk in Oakland history, the first since Bobby Crosby did it in the 17th inning against Los Angeles (NL) June 17, 2006...it was his third career walk-off RBI (single, double).
- Snapped a career-high 30-game homerless streak with a solo shot in the seventh inning off Quintana June 6 at Chicago (AL).
- · Had his third career four-hit game June 16 against Seattle.
- Reached base safely via hit or walk in a career-high 19 consecutive games from June 18 to July 13...
 hit .262 (17 for 65) with a .329 on-base percentage (7 bb, 1 sf) during the streak.
- Struck out a career-high tying four times July 14 against Boston.

CHRIS RESOP

 Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.
- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and ended up

- Doubled in the second inning April 3 against Seattle in his first game since September 28, 2011 at Seattle...that extended his hitting streak to six games dating back to September 24, 2011 (8 for 20, .400), which is the longest hitting streak of his career.
- Did not strike out May 5 in New York, snapping his career-high streak of 12 consecutive games with
 a strikeout (20 strikeouts total)...that included back-to-back four strikeout games last May 1 and 3...
 according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first Athletic to strike out four times in back-to-back
 games...the four strikeouts match his career high (three times).

SETH SMITH

- Went 2 for 3 with a double April 1 against Seattle in his fifth consecutive Opening Day start (2009-10 in left field with Colorado, 2011 in right field with Colorado, 2012-13 at designated hitter with Oakland)...is 7 for 22 (.318) with two doubles, a home run and three RBI in his five openers...is the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at designated hitter since Erubiel Durazo (2003-05).
- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.
- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.
- Had a career-high four walks June 12 against New York.
- Started the game June 13 against New York (AL) 1 for 6 before singling in the 16th and 18th innings...is the third player in Oakland history to collect two hits in a game in the 16th inning or later...the others are Dick Green on June 4, 1971 against Washington (17th and 21st) and Bert Campaneris on Sept. 6, 1969 against Minnesota (16th and 17th).
- Doubled in the fourth inning June 16 against Seattle off Iwakuma for his 500th career hit.
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 30 streak with a third inning double July 29.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)...matched that May 15-21 (6 for 15, .400).
- Had his first career three-hit game April 16 against Houston...his second came June 22 at Seattle.
- Had the first two-steal game of his career June 12 against New York.
- Stole a base in three consecutive games from June 5-13 (four stolen bases total) after stealing four bases over the first 115 games of his career.
- Homered July 7 at Kansas City to snap a career-high 90-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since April 27, 2012.

DAN STRAILY

Struck out a career-high and Oakland rookie record tying 11 batters in 6.2 innings (sixth time, last:
 Tim Hudson, Sept. 10, 1999 at Tampa Bay) in an 8-3 victory at Houston April 5...is the ninth pitcher
 in Oakland history to strikeout 11 or more in fewer than seven innings, the first since Kirk Saarloos
 on September 19, 2006 (11 so in 5.0 ip)...did not issue a walk and is the 12th pitcher in Oakland to
 strikeout 11 or more without walking a batter.

STEPHEN VOGT

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 25
- Had a sacrifice fly in his first at bat as an Athletic June 25 against Cincinnati, his first career RBI.
- Snapped a career-opening 0 for 32 streak with a home run in the fourth inning June 28 against St.
 Louis off Joe Kelly...the hitless streak was the second longest career-opening hitless streak by a
 non-pitcher since 1973 (Chris Carter, OAK; 33 in 2010).

CHRIS YOUNG
