A's vs. RAYS

The A's trail in the season series 0-3 as they were swept in a three-game series at Tampa Bay in April 1...it was just the second time they were swept by the Rays in a three-game series (May 24-26, 2005)...since 2007, the A's have won three season series and lost three season series...are 27-30 against the Rays over that span...all-time, the A's are 86-55 (.610) against Tampa Bay, which is the best record against the Rays by any American League team (New York, 165-107, .607)...are 47-21 in Oakland and 39-34 at Tropicana Field.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Jed Lowrie has a career-high 11-game hitting streak...is 19 for 46 (.413) with 10 runs, eight doubles, two triples, one home run, eight RBI and six multiple hit games during the streak.

Brandon Moss has homered in each of his last three games (four home runs total)...is now batting .394 (13 for 33) with seven home runs and 14 RBI over his last 10 contests...has eight home runs in August, which is tied for fourth in the American League.

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In 1974 Claudell Washington has five hits in five at bats, collecting three singles, a double and a triple in the A's 10-5 win at Detroit...in 1995 the A's tie a club record with three triples in a 7-2 win at Baltimore...Brent Gates has one of those triples, and adds a single and a double to fall a home run short of the cycle...in 2001 Eric Chavez homers twice and has eight RBI in the A's 15-0 win at Baltimore.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won four of the last six games but have lost six of the last nine series...are 19-19 since the All-Star Break after going 56-39 before the break...went 20-22 over the first 42 games and trailed Texas by 7½ games on May 16...then went a Major League best 43-21 from May 17 to July 29 to gain 13½ games in the standings and take a six-game lead in the American League West...are 12-15 since July 30 and have lost nine games in the West to fall three games behind the Rangers...have not trailed by more than 3½ games since May 26 when they were 4½ back...are in second place in the West for the 20th consecutive day...currently have the second Wild Card spot, ½ game behind Tampa Bay and 3½ games ahead of third place Baltimore...have spent 57 days in sole possession of first, nine days tied for first, 73 days in second, four days tied for second, one day in third, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth...are 216-178 (.548) since Bob Melvin took over as manager June 9, 2011, which is the 10th best record in the majors over that span.

OFFENSE: The A's went 52 for 142 (.366) with 34 runs scored, 12 doubles, a triple and seven home runs in the four-game series at Detroit...the 34 runs were the A's most in a series this year and the 52 hits were their most in a series since August 22-25, 2003 at Toronto when they had 55...have homered in a season-high 11 consecutive games (18 total)...are batting .277 (200 for 721) with 110 runs scored over the last 21 games (5.24 runs per game) after hitting .209 with 72 runs scored (3.13 per game) over the previous 23 contests...are hitting .248 for the season, which is fifth lowest in the American League...also rank second in the AL in walks (477), tied for third in doubles (245), fourth in extra base hits (407), tied for fourth in triples (20) and fifth in runs (599)...A's outfielders have combined for a Major League low .225 (348 for 1549) batting average...the lowest mark by A's outfielders since at least 1916 is .228 in 1979.

IN AUGUST: The A's are 12-13 in August and need to win each of the remaining two games to avoid their first month with a losing record since May of last year (11-16)...currently have a streak of eight consecutive months with a winning record dating back to last June...that is the fourth longest such streak in Oakland history and is the longest since a 10-month streak from June, 2002 to September, 2003...are tied for second in the American League in triples in August (6) and rank third in doubles (49), home runs (33) and extra base hits (88)...are tied for the second fewest stolen bases (5)...the last time the A's stole fewer than seven bases in a month of 20 more games was in September of 2007 (5).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a 10-game homestand tonight against Tampa Bay (three games), Texas (three games) and Houston (four games)...this matches the A's longest homestand of the season (July 25-August 4) and concludes a stretch where the A's play 29 of 42 games at home (July 25-Sept. 8)...are 16-16 over the first 32 games of that stretch, including 9-10 at home...went 4-5 on the last homestand against Houston (1-2), Cleveland (2-1) and Seattle (1-2) and are 39-25 (.609) in Oakland, which is the fourth best home record in the AL...went 4-3 on the last road trip to Baltimore (1-2) and Detroit (3-1) and are 36-33 (.522) on the road.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 5.91 ERA (49 er in 74.2 ip) over the last nine games...have surrendered 15 home runs and walked 34 batters over that span...have the lowest opponents on-base percentage (.300) and fewest walks (349) in the American League, the third lowest batting average (.245) and the fourth lowest slugging percentage (.386) and ERA (3.69)...the last time the A's finished the season with an on-base percentage under .300 was in 1972 (.284)...have four 10-game winners (Colón, Griffin, Milone, Parker) for the first time since 2006 (Blanton, Haren, Loaiza, Zito)...the four 10-game winners are second most in the majors (Detroit, 5).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 6-3 with a 3.32 ERA (33 er in 89.1 ip) over the last 15 games and have allowed one run or fewer seven times over that span...are now 40-21 with a 3.38 ERA (212 er in 564.2 ip) over the last 91 games (since May 17) after going 14-21 with a 5.09 ERA over the first 42 contests...lead the American League with four complete game shutouts, are tied for second with six complete games, tied for third with 54 wins and rank fourth with a 3.89 ERA (348 er in 805.0 ip)...have used just seven starting pitchers this year, which is their fewest since employing six in 2004...in the majors, only Detroit has used fewer starters this year (6).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's rank last in the majors in assists (1144) and are on pace to break the Athletics record for fewest assists in a non-strike season (1508 in 1984)...have just 95 double plays, which is tied with Cincinnati for the fewest in the majors...the Oakland record for fewest double plays in a non-strike season is 115 in 1980.

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters are batting .143 (16 for 112), which is second lowest in the American League (Baltimore, .136)...the lowest mark in Oakland history is .141 in 1994...lead the AL in strikeouts (35), rank second in plate appearances (130), home runs (4) and walks (16) and are tied for third in RBI (13)...the 130 plate appearances are the most since 2000 (162) and the four home runs are the most since 2002 (5).

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 24-17 (.585) in one-run games...are tied for the American League lead in one-run wins and have the fourth best record...are 7-5 (.583) in extra inning games, which is the fourth best record in the AL...have seven "walk-off" wins...are tied for the Major League lead with 13 wins when trailing after six innings (Pittsburgh).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's placed Josh Reddick on the disabled list Monday and have now used the DL four times in the last 37 days after a 77-day streak without placing a player on the DL...the 77-day streak is the second longest by an A's team since 1990 (94, May 28-Aug. 30, 2005)...currently have five players on the DL and have used it 13 times for the season...have not used the DL fewer than 15 times since 2005 (8).

THIS AND THAT: The A's are 47-6 when outperforming the opposition, which is the best mark in the majors...began the season by going 13-3 against AL West competition compared to 5-15 against all other teams through May 9...are 19-22 against the West since May 10 while going 38-18 against everyone else...have used 41 players...have not used fewer than 48 players in a season since 2006 when they used 40...have used 17 pitchers, which is the fewest since 2004 (17)...the A's average time of game is 3:04, which is currently second longest in Oakland history (3:08 in 2000).

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 27th start of the season...the A's are 14-12 (.538) in his starting assignments this year and 31-24 (.564) in his career...has tossed six or more innings in 19 of his 26 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 14 times and walked two batters or fewer 18 times.

EIGHT-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 8-0 with a 2.48 ERA (30 er in 108.2 ip) and .202 (78 for 386) opponents batting average over his last 16 starts...the winning streak is a career high (previous: 4, Sept. 10-Oct. 1, 2012), matches the A's season high (Colón, May 20-June 28) and is tied for third longest in the American League for the season...the last A's pitcher to win more than eight straight is Dan Haren, who won 10 straight from April 18-July 1, 2007...went 2-6 with a 5.76 ERA and .294 opponents batting average over his first 10 starts...has held left-handed hitters to a .216 (49 for 227) batting average during his winning streak after allowing a .325 mark over his first 10 starts

16-GAME UNBEATEN STREAK: His current eight-game winning streak includes eight no decisions and his 16-start unbeaten streak is tied for second longest in Oakland history...it is the longest since Dan Haren also had a 16-start streak from April 13-July 1, 2007...the record is 17 by Catfish Hunter from June 2-September 3, 1973.

EIGHT INNINGS OR MORE: Has tossed at least eight innings in each of his last three starts and is 2-0 with a 1.07 ERA (3 er in 25.1 ip) over that span...is the second A's pitcher over the last nine years with three consecutive starts of eight or more innings (Cahill, July 28-August 8, 2010)...the last A's pitcher with more than three consecutive games of eight or more innings is Mark Mulder, who had a six-game streak from April 24-May 23, 2002.

IN AUGUST: Is 4-0 with a 1.93 ERA (8 er in 37.1 ip) in five starts in the month of August...it marks the first four-win month of his career...leads the American League in ERA this month and is tied for second in wins (Perez, TEX 5)...has walked just seven batters while striking out 37 in 37.1 innings.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks eighth in the American League with a .235 opponents batting average...is tied for third with a .200 (25 for 125) average with runners in scoring position and ranks sixth with a .212 (55 for 259) mark against right-handed hitters...the opponents cleanup hitter is batting .178 (13 for 73), which is third lowest in the AL...is fourth in fewest pitches per inning (15.0).

RUN SUPPORT: Has received two runs of support or fewer in 11 of the 16 games in which he took the loss or had a no decision...is 3-6 with two runs of support or fewer and 7-0 with three runs or more...is now 18-0 in 26 career starts with run support of three or more...is 22-2 with run support of two or more.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to pitch on five days rest today...is 4-3 with a 2.84 ERA (27 er in 85.2 ip) in 14 starts on five days rest or more compared to 6-3 with a 4.40 ERA (38 er in 77.2 ip) in 12 starts on four days rest.

THE FIRST INNING: Has allowed 17 runs in the first inning for a 5.88 ERA (26.0 ip)...has a 3.15 ERA (48 er in 137.1 ip) from the second inning on...opponents are batting .295 (31 for 105) with six home runs in the first inning compared to .222 (110 for 495) with 13 home runs from the second inning on.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: Has committed four errors in his last nine starts after going errorless over his first 17 starts this year...his four errors are tied for the most in the majors among pitchers (Lincecum, SF).

GO THE DISTANCE: Tossed his first career complete game August 19 against Seattle, in the 55th start of his career...it was his 54th start as an Athletic and the 53 consecutive starts without a complete game is the fourth longest streak in Oakland history...was the first A's pitcher to go the distance in a walk-off win since Mark Mulder on July 28, 2004, also against Seattle.

SIX HITS OR FEWER: Had a streak of 16 consecutive starts with six hits or fewer from May 11 to August 9...tossed at least 3.0 innings in each start and his streak of 16 consecutive starts of three or more innings and six hits or fewer is second longest by an A's pitcher since at least 1916 (20, Trevor Cahill, May 5-Aug. 14, 2010)...allowed a .192 opponents batting average during the streak.

INDECISIVE: Had a streak of six consecutive no decisions from June 23 to July 28, which matched the longest by an Athletics starter since at least 1916...the other are Mike Norris (June 1-Aug. 6, 1983), Rick Langford (July 17, 1983-June 25, 1985) and Carlos Reyes (June 10-July 17, 1994)...had a 3.50 ERA and .191 opponents batting average during the streak...the A's lost five of the six games...left with the lead in two of the no decisions only to have the bullpen blow the save (July 6 and 23).

LAST START: He picked up his 10th win of the season in the A's 2-1 win at Baltimore last Saturday...tossed a career-high 117 pitches...retired each of the first seven batters he faced before Flaherty homered with one out in the third inning...that was the only run he would allow in eight innings...the A's tied the game with a run in the sixth and Crisp homered in the ninth for the win.

PARKER vs. TAMPA BAY: Is 0-2 with a 3.44 ERA (18.1 ip, 21 h, 7 r, 7 er, 7 bb, 14 so, 2 hr) in three career starts...including a loss in his only start this year, a 1-0 decision at Tampa Bay April 20...allowed a leadoff home run to Joyce in the second inning, but that was the only run he would allow in 6.1 innings...blanked the Rays on four hits and two walks over his final 4.1 innings...Hellickson, Peralta and Rodney combined to shutout the A's on three hits and a walk...went 0-1 with a 4.50 ERA in two starts last year...the loss came in a 4-1 decision in Oakland on August 1...allowed a RBI single to Joyce in the first, a RBI single to Roberts in the fourth and a RBI double to Pena in the sixth...then had a no decision in the A's 5-4 win at Tampa Bay August 24...allowed a leadoff home run to Zobrist in the second, a Keppinger sacrifice fly in the fourth and an Upton RBI double in the fifth...left with the scored tied 3-3.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Sonny Gray (1-2, 3.18 ERA): Is scheduled to make his seventh appearance and fifth start of the season and his career...was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento August 10 for his second stint with the A's this year and is 1-2 with a 3.70 ERA in three starts since his return...made his Major League debut during his first stint from July 10 to 18 and did not allow a run in two relief appearances (4.0 ip)...was 10-7 with a 3.42 ERA in 20 starts with Triple-A Sacramento...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 10-3 A's loss at Baltimore last Sunday (3.1 ip, 8 h, 6 r, 6 er, 2 bb, 3 so)...has never faced the Rays in his career.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

The A's bullpen has a 5.27 ERA (33 er in 56.1 ip) and .276 (63 for 228) opponents batting average over its past 18 games (since August 9) after posting a 1.78 ERA and .175 opponents average in its previous 19 contests...now has a 3.27 ERA for the season, which ranks fifth in the American League...has the fewest walks (120) in the AL and the fewest strikeouts (336)...is tied for the third fewest home runs allowed (33)...ranks third in opponents on-base percentage (.296) and fourth in slugging percentage (.357)...first batters faced are 71 for 331 (.215) with 21 walks and two hit by pitches (3 sf, .263 on-base percentage)...has allowed the fewest first batter walks in the AL, has the second lowest on-base percentage and slugging percentage (.332) and third lowest batting average.

SECOND START: He combined with Otero on a five-hit shutout in the A's 5-0 win over Houston August 15 in Oakland...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed four hits while striking out nine...is the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings in one of the first four games of his career...the other three all had complete game shutouts, most recently John Henry Johnson in his third game on April 23, 1978 against Seattle...allowed only two base runners as far as second base...Corporan singled to start the seventh and went to second on a wild pitch and Villar doubled with one out in the eighth.

THIRD START: He had a no decision in the A's 7-4 loss to Seattle August 20 in Oakland...the A's scored four times in the first inning and he allowed a two-run home run to Franklin in the third...then retired 13 of the final 14 batters he faced and was relieved by Doolittle to start the eighth...he allowed four straight hits for the blown save as the Mariners scored five times in the eighth inning.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 10-3 loss at Baltimore last Sunday...the A's scored a run in the first but he allowed two runs in the bottom of the first on a Jones RBI single and a Wieters sacrifice fly...then allowed three runs in the second inning on a Roberts RBI single, a Machado sacrifice fly and a Davis RBI single...also allowed a Machado sacrifice fly in the fourth and was relieved by Blevins with one out in the fourth and the A's trailing 6-1.

GRAY vs. TAMPA BAY: Is making his first career appearance.

WITH SACRAMENTO: Went 6-4 with a 2.69 ERA and .245 opponents batting average over his first 12 starts through June 6...then went 4-3 with a 4.50 ERA and .280 opponents average over his final eight starts...the River Cats were 12-8 (.600) in his starting assignments...tossed six or more innings in 15 of his 20 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 11 times and walked two batters or fewer 15 times

AMONG THE LEADERS: At the time of his promotion to Oakland on August 10, he ranked second in the Pacific Coast League in strikeouts (118), tied for second in wins (10), tied for fourth in complete games (1), sixth in ERA (3.42), eighth in innings pitched (118.1) and tied for eighth in games started (20).

OPPONENTS BATTING: His opponents batted .259, which included a .244 (53 for 217) mark against left-handed hitters compared to .274 (64 for 234) against right-handers...issued 26 of his 39 walks to left-handers.

2010—Continued to be one of the most durable catchers in the American League, tying for second among AL backstops with 121 starts, despite missing 19 games while on the disabled list and three on the bereavement list...tied with Kevin Kouzmanoff for the team lead in RBI (71) and tied for second in home runs (13)...it marked the second consecutive season he led the club in RBI, as he became the first catcher in Athletics history to lead the team in RBI more than once...the only other time an A's catcher led the team in RBI was in 1944 (Frankie Hayes)...however, the RBI were second fewest by a team leader in Oakland history (Mitchell Page, 70 in 1978)...had career-highs in triples (2) and hit by pitches (12)...had the ninth lowest batting average in the AL (.243) and the 10th lowest on-base percentage (.303)...ranked fourth in the AL in plate appearances per strikeout (11.10) and tied for fifth in hit by pitches and grounded into double plays (22)...in addition to RBI, he also led the team in hit by pitches, grounded into double plays and go-ahead RBI (21)...A's pitchers had a 3.27 ERA with him behind the plate, which was the lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors...they had a 4.46 ERA with the other three catchers...ranked second among AL catchers in total chances (868) and putouts (825) and was third in games (123)...committed a career-high eight errors for a .991 fielding percentage, which ranked fourth lowest among the 14 AL qualifiers behind the plate...tossed out 10-of-76 (13.2%) attempted base stealers, which was the lowest percentage in Oakland history...the previous low was 15.1% by Jason Kendall in 2005...his caught stealing percentage was third lowest in the AL...ranked second among AL catchers in RBI (66) and tied for third in home runs (13)...the RBI were fourth best by a catcher in Oakland history...was batting .266 with 12 home runs and 46 RBI in 76 games over the first four months of the season...then hit .207 with one home run and 25 RBI over his final 55 games since Aug. 1...hit 11 of his 13 home runs against right-handers...hit three home runs with an 0-2 count, which tied for the most in the majors...hit .272 with nine of his 13 home runs in 48 starts hitting clean-up...also batted fifth 21 times...had a .338 average with one out and .198 with zero or two outs...made his third straight Opening Day start at catcher, April 5 against Seattle...committed two errors, the first two-error game of his career...had his seventh career walk-off hit April 7 against Seattle, a double...it was his third walk-off double, which ties Terrence Long for the most in Oakland history...hit a three-run home run in the first inning April 22 against New York, then grounded into a triple play in the sixth inning...it was the seventh triple play turned against the A's in Oakland history, the first since Geronimo Berroa hit into one May 14, 1994 at Kansas City...was batting .254 with four home runs and 11 RBI in 17 games when was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 30, retroactive to April 24, with an intercostal strain...it was his first career stint on the DL and it marked the first time over the last three years he has gone more than two consecutive games without starting at catcher...went 3-for-8 (.375) in three starts at catcher on a rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from May 11 to 15...was reinstated from the DL May 16 and started each of the A's first 11 games at catcher following his return, matching the longest consecutive games started streak at catcher of his career (June 6-18, 2008 and July 21-Aug. 2, 2008)...started 11 straight behind the plate again from June 21 to July 3...drove in the winning run May 18 against Seattle with a RBI single in the bottom of the 10th inning...it was his second walk-off hit of the season and eighth of his career (three singles, three doubles, two home runs)...the eight walk-off hits are tied for third most in Oakland history...had a career best streak of four consecutive multiple hit

games from June 1-4 (8-for-19, 421), including June 3 at Boston when he had his first career two-homer game...matched his career-high with four hits June 8 against Los Angeles and Aug. 28 at Texas...was placed on the bereavement list June 11, missing the three-game series at San Francisco before returning to action June 15...started 83 of the A's final 97 games at catcher but hit just .228 following his return...batted .292 with six home runs in June...the home runs tied for seventh in the AL and were his most ever in a month...agreed to terms on a four-year contract through the 2013 season with a club option for 2014, July 23...had a 0-for-22 streak from Aug. 19 to 26...batted .185 in August, which tied for third lowest in the AL.

2009—Led American League catchers in games started for the second consecutive season (132)...had career-highs in runs (74), hits (156), doubles (37), home runs (15), RBI (88), stolen bases (8) and slugging percentage (.421)...led the A's in hits, doubles, RBI, slugging, hit by pitches (8), sacrifice flies (7), multiple RBI games (20) and go-ahead RBI (18)...became just the second catcher in Athletics history to lead the club in RBI...the other was Frankie Hayes, who had 78 RBI for Philadelphia in 1944...the last A's catcher to lead the team in doubles was Hal Smith of the 1957 Kansas City A's (26)...led the A's in hits for the second consecutive season...struck out 59 times for an average of 10.41 plate appearances per strikeout...that was the sixth best ratio in the American League...however, walked just 28 times for an average of 21.93 plate appearances per walk, which was fifth highest in the AL...also tied for ninth in the AL in sacrifice flies and reaching base on an error (8)...in addition to games started, he also led AL catchers in innings (1173.1), putouts (923) and total chances (996) and tied for the lead in games (135)...the total chances were second most in Oakland history to Jason Kendall's record of 1044 in 2005 and his 68 assists and .995 fielding percentage were fourth best...however, tossed out just 17 of 98 (17.3%) attempted base stealers...was named as the third best defensive catcher in the AL in *Baseball America's* best tools survey...led AL catchers in doubles (34), RBI (83) and stolen bases (8)...the doubles were an Oakland record for a catcher...they were the most by an Athletics catcher since Mickey Cochrane had 35 in 1932...the RBI were second best by a catcher in Oakland history and the steals tied for third best...batted .311 on the road...ranked eighth in the AL in RBI after the All-Star Break (51)...combined for a .333 batting average in the eighth and ninth innings...batted .230 with six of his 15 home runs with two strikes...matched his career-high with four hits April 21 at New York...drove in a run in each of his first seven games against the Yankees, matching the Oakland record for consecutive games with a RBI against New York (Jose Canseco, Aug. 24, 1988-Aug. 30, 1989)...finished April with a .343 batting average, his best single month mark in 2009...stole a career-high two bases June 10 against Minnesota to become the fourth catcher in Oakland history to steal two bases in a game, joining Jason Kendall (three times), Mike Heath (twice) and Mickey Tettleton (once)...went back-to-back games without starting for the only time June 11 and 12...had three assists in the fifth inning June 18 at Los Angeles (NL) and all were putouts to different players (first base, second base and shortstop)...not since 1976 had a catcher recorded three assists in an inning, with the putouts going to three different positions (Vic Correll, ATL Sept. 17, 1976)...had a career-high 10-game hitting streak from July 1 to 12 (16 for 42, .381)...went a career-high 26 consecutive games without a walk from July 6 to Aug. 5...lined out as a pinch hitter July 30 against Boston, snapping a career-opening 21-game hitting streak against the Red Sox (29 for 83, .349)...it was the longest hitting streak in Oakland history against Boston...committed an error Aug. 2 against Toronto, snapping a career best 84-game errorless streak dating back to April 10...it was the sixth longest errorless streak by a catcher in Oakland history...had the game-ending RBI single in the bottom of the ninth inning Aug. 22 against Detroit...hit .264 in September, but had 24 RBI, which tied for third in the AL.

2008—In his first full season in the majors, he led American League catchers in games (141) and games started (136) while hitting a team leading .279...also led the A's in hits (148), hit by pitches (11) and multiple hit games (36) while tying Jack Cust for the team lead in games played (148)...became the first catcher to top the club in games since Jeff Newman in 1979 (143)...tied for seventh in the AL in hit by pitches and tied for 10th in grounded into double plays (20)...batted .241 over his first 45 games through May 24, hit .358 over a 51-game stretch from May 25 to July 28 and finished the year by compiling a .237 average over his final 52 games...hit .291 with six of his seven home runs and 37 of his 42 RBI against right-handed pitching...batted .318 at home, which was the ninth best home batting average in Oakland history...was 5 for 8 (.625) with a double, two home runs and four RBI as a pinch hitter...tied for the AL lead in pinch home runs and tied for fifth in pinch hits...his batting average was the best among AL pinch hitters with five or more plate appearances...hit .389 with two home runs and 10 RBI in 15 interleague games...in addition to leading AL catchers in games and games started, he also ranked

first in innings caught (1215.0), total chances (986) and putouts (927)...his putout total was second best in Athletics history by a catcher to the record of 986 set by Jason Kendall in 2005...his innings were third best in Oakland history...tossed out 16 of 71 (22.5%) attempted base stealers...had his first career four-hit game April 14 at Chicago...was batting .327 over his first 16 games before being inserted into the leadoff spot April 18...batted leadoff in each of his next 20 starts through May 13 and hit .200 over that span...had a career long 0 for 23 streak from May 7 to 14...was 4 for 5 with five RBI June 20 against Florida...the RBI were a career high...became the second catcher in Oakland history with four hits and five RBI in one game (Gene Tenace, Sept. 14, 1973 vs. Texas)...three of the five RBI gave the A's the lead, including his third career walk-off RBI, a double in the 11th inning...is the first Oakland Athletic to have three go-ahead RBI in one game since the stat was tracked beginning in 1974...finished June with a .370 batting average, which ranked third in the American League...connected for his first career pinch hit home run July 10 against Seattle...had the game-ending pinch hit home run Aug. 15 against Chicago...had the game-ending pinch hit double Aug. 28 against Minnesota, his second game-ending pinch hit of the season...is just the second player in Oakland history with two game-ending pinch hits in the same season (Frank Fernandez, 1970)...it was the second game-ending pinch hit double in Oakland history (Tommy Davis, April 10, 1971 vs. Kansas City)...missed consecutive games Sept. 23 and 24 at Texas following a collision at home plate Sept. 22...it marked the first time he went back-to-back games without a start since Jason Kendall was traded July 16, 2007.

2007—Made his Major League debut with Oakland in June and spent five weeks as the back-up to Jason Kendall before starting 56 of the A's final 70 games at catcher following the trade of Kendall July 16...made 61 starts total behind the plate...since 1988, the only Oakland rookie to start more games at catcher is A.J. Hinch, who started 109 games in 1998...batted .249 with seven home runs and 39 RBI in 68 games with the A's...hit .281 against right-handed pitching and .290 with runners in scoring position...batted .288 with five of his seven home runs in the seventh inning or later...hit .333 during the day...had six home runs from the nine spot in the order, which was third most in the American League...tossed out 7 of 36 (19.4%) attempted base stealers...hit .185 over his first 21 games through July 28, .312 over his next 28 games through Sept. 2 and .212 over his final 19 games...was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 10 and made his Major League debut June 12 at Houston...grounded out as a pinch hitter in his first at bat in the 10th inning...collected his first ML hit June 14 at Houston, a pinch hit single off Brian Moehler in the 11th inning of the A's 6-5 win...hit his first home run June 19 against Cincinnati, a solo shot off Todd Coffey in the eighth inning...caught Shane Komine July 17 against Texas to become the first Hawaiian born battery in Major League history...hit his first career walk-off home run Aug. 16 against Chicago, a three-run shot off Matt Thornton with two outs in the bottom of the 10th in an 8-5 win...hit his first career grand slam in the second inning Sept. 10 at Seattle...closed out the A's season with a walk-off single in the bottom of the ninth in the A's 3-2 win over Los Angeles Sept. 30...began the year at Sacramento where he batted .280 with three home runs and 27 RBI in 55 games...tossed out 16 of 42 (38.1%) attempted base stealers...batted .306 over his first 32 games through May 11, went 5 for 39 (.128) over his next 10 games through May 23 and then hit .333 over his final 13 games.

2006—Spent the entire season at Double-A Midland where he batted .285 with seven home runs and 55 RBI in 99 games...named to the Texas League All-Star team...hit .382 against left-handers, .330 with runners in scoring position and .356 with RISP and two outs...tossed out 33 of 70 attempted base stealers (47.1%), which was the second best mark in the Texas League...led all Texas League catchers in fielding percentage (.997) and games (91)...played for the United States in the All-Star Futures game July 9 at Pittsburgh and was 0 for 1...hit .341 with two home runs and 17 RBI in 24 games in June...went 3 for 5 with a home run and eight RBI June 22 at Tulsa...was named to the U.S. Olympic Qualifying team...suffered a bruised left wrist while playing for the U.S. team in Cuba and did not return to action with the RockHounds.

2005—Spent his first full professional season with Single-A Stockton and batted .277 with 12 home runs and 65 RBI in 114 games...added 63 walks for a .378 on-base percentage...made 104 appearances at catcher which led the California League...also topped CL catchers in total chances (947), putouts (882), errors (15) and passed balls (19)...tossed out 32 of 86 (37.2%) attempted base stealers...had two home runs and five RBI May 20 against Bakersfield...reached base safely in 27 consecutive games from June 1 to July 5...hit .286 over that span with a .409 on-base percentage...had a grand slam June 17 against Rancho Cucamonga...hit .222 with a home run and two RBI in two postseason games...then played for

the Arizona Fall League Champion Phoenix Desert Dogs and batted .342 with seven RBI in 13 games...added eight walks for a .447 on-base percentage.

2004—Batted .297 with three home runs and 31 RBI in 46 games in his professional debut at Single-A Vancouver of the Northwest League...added 18 walks and was hit by a pitch a team leading 12 times for a .394 on-base percentage...appeared in 27 games at catcher where he committed just one error for a .995 fielding percentage...tossed out 4 of 24 (16.7%) attempted base stealers...began his professional career by hitting safely in each of his first 12 games from July 17 to 29...batted .362 during the streak with two home runs and eight RBI...went 0 for 13 with a walk in three postseason games for Vancouver.

Baldwin HS (Wailuku, Maui, Hawaii) in 2001...majored in Kinesiology at Cal State Fullerton...won the Johnny Bench Award following the 2004 season, given annually to the nation's top collegiate catcher...was also an All-America selection by *Baseball America* and *Collegiate Baseball* and was named Big West Player of the Year after batting .413 with 16 HR and 87 RBI...led Fullerton to the College World Series championship as his two-out RBI single in the bottom of the seventh inning broke a 2-2 tie to lead the Titans to a 3-2 win over Texas in the championship game...hosted the Inaugural Kurt Suzuki Baseball Clinic in Maui in 2012 to raise awareness for the All PONO Sports Organization, promote healthy lifestyles and exercise for children in Hawaii, as well as teach baseball fundamentals...started the Kurt Suzuki Family Foundation in 2011 to support the scientific research of chronic illnesses—specifically kidney disease research—and encourage and promote healthy lifestyle choices...is an ambassador for the NephCure Foundation...along with his wife, raised over \$61,000 for the Jon Wilhite Recovery Fund, to help alleviate medical costs accrued by his friend and former Cal State Fullerton teammate who was injured in the tragic car accident that took the lives of Angels' pitcher Nick Adenhardt and three others in 2009...was named the co-recipient of the 2009 Dave Stewart Community Service Award which is given annually to an A's player for outstanding work in the community...also voted the 2009 Catfish Hunter Award winner by his teammates, an honor for the A's player's performance on the field and conduct in the clubhouse.

- Had successful arthroscopic surgery on his right knee Feb. 14...the surgery, a lateral meniscectomy, was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg in Scottsdale, Ariz.
- Did not pitch in a Spring Training game until March 21.
- Is on his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster (2011-13 with Oakland, 2009-10 with Tampa Bay)
- Made his 400th career appearance April 6 at Houston.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star team and pitched a scoreless sixth inning in the game at Citi Field July 16 (1 bb, 1 so)...at the age of 35 years, 198 days, he was the fifth oldest All-Star in Athletics history...he was the first Australian pitcher named to the Midsummer Classic, the second overall (Dave Nilsson, MIL 1999).
- Converted each of his first 26 save opportunities before he was charged with his first blown save July 23 at Houston...it was his first blown save since April 29, 2012 at Baltimore, snapping his Athletics record streak of 44 consecutive saves...it was the sixth longest save streak in Major League history...his streak of 26 consecutive saves to start the season was the second longest streak in Oakland history (Dennis Eckersley, 36 in 1992).

JERRY BLEVINS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster for the fifth consecutive season.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Became the A's 14th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 14 years April 1 against Seattle.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 13 with a strained muscle in his left hand...it was his second career stint on the DL as he was out from May 7-31 last year with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) with a home run and four RBI on a three-game rehab assignment with Sacramento...was reinstated April 28.
- Had his first career four-strikeout game April 29 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Had his first career four-RBI game April 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...matched that mark June 21 at Seattle and July 28 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 1 against Los Angeles (AL), tying the Oakland record (32nd time, last: Josh Willingham at Seattle, April 24, 2011).
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 16 streak with his third inning single May 12 at Seattle.
- Had a career-high 12-game hitting streak from May 18 to 30...went 15 for 50 (.300) with five doubles, a triple, two home runs and nine RBI during the hitting streak.
- Had the first two two-homer games of his career June 4 at Milwaukee and June 6 at Chicago...became the first Athletic with two multi-homer games over a three-game stretch since John Jaha did it in back-to-back games June 19-20, 1999 at Detroit...added his third two-homer game June 21 at Seattle.
- Went 0 for 4 June 29 against St. Louis to snap a 12-game interleague hitting streak dating back to 2012 (15 for 50, .300)...the streak tied for the third longest interleague hitting streak in Oakland history.
- Stole two bases July 12 against Boston for the second time in his career...the other time was also against the Red Sox (Sept. 1, 2012).
- Won the Home Run Derby at Citi Field July 15...hit 32 home runs at an average of 405 feet...hit 17 in the first round, six in the second and nine in the finals to defeat Bryce Harper...the 32 home runs tied for third most in a single Derby and 17 in the first round tied for third most in a single round...is the second Athletic to win the Derby (Mark McGwire, 1992) and the first non All-Star.
- Missed the first four games after the break after being scratched from the starting lineup July 19 with soreness in his left wrist.
- Homered in the eighth inning July 29 against Toronto to snap a career-high 25-game homerless streak.

JESSE CHAVEZ

- Tossed 5.2 innings June 13 against New York (AL), which was the longest relief appearance of his career.
- Recorded a career-high tying seven strikeouts June 13 against New York (AL).

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Did not walk a batter over his first three starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...had a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to 2012, which was the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Tossed a three-hit shutout in the A's rain-shortened 13-0 seven-inning win at Boston April 23...it was his 10th career shutout, his first since May 30, 2011 at Oakland...the seven-inning shutout was third shortest in Oakland history and the shortest since Vida Blue fired 6.0 innings April 9, 1971 against Kansas City...the last complete game of fewer than eight innings by an A's pitcher was by Steve Ontiveros on May 16, 1995 against Chicago (5.0 ip).
- Walked Jacoby Ellsbury to lead off the sixth inning April 23 at Boston, snapping a streak of 32.0 innings and 121 batters faced without a walk dating back to his last walk on August 12, 2012 at Chicago (AL)...the 32.0-inning streak was the longest in Oakland history by a starter and second longest overall to Dennis Eckersley's streak of 50.1 innings from Aug. 17, 1989-June 12, 1990.
- Did not strike out a batter May 14 against Texas, his eighth career start without a strikeout...it was the first time in a game in which he pitched more than 4.0 innings.
- Walked two batters May 20 at Texas, snapping a season-opening streak of eight consecutive starts with one walk or fewer and two innings or more...that was the longest season-opening streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916.
- Had an 18.0-inning scoreless streak from May 20 to 31.
- Struck out nine batters May 26 at Houston in his first start after turning 40 to set an Athletics record for strikeouts by a 40-year old...the previous high was seven by Tom Candiotti (July 31, 1998 vs. Cleveland) and Don Sutton (April 22, 1985 vs. California)...is just the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to start a game at age 40...the other three are Tommy John (last start at 42 years, 126 days), Candiotti (last start at 41 years, 275 days) and Sutton (last start at 40 years, 155 days)
- Tossed a five-hit shutout May 31 against Chicago (AL) to become the second 40-year old in Oakland history with a shutout (Don Sutton: 40 years, 85 days on June 26, 1985 against Chicago).
- Had his career-high tying eight-game winning streak snapped July 3 by Chicago (NL)...also won eight straight from July 21-Sept. 10, 2005...had a 1.37 ERA and surrendered just one home run in 59.0 innings during the streak, which spanned eight starts...it was the longest winning streak by an Athletic since Dan Haren had a 10-game winning streak from April 18-July 1, 2007...fell one short of the Oakland record for consecutive starts with a win.
- The loss to the Cubs was his first home loss of the season, snapping an eight-game winning streak in the Coliseum dating back to Aug. 2, 2012...that was the longest home winning streak by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder won 10 straight from July 31, 2002-June 19, 2003...posted a 1.85 ERA during the winning streak, which spanned 11 starts, and walked just seven batters (0.81 per nine innings).
- Was charged with a wild pitch July 3 against Chicago (NL), his first since May 26, 2009 at Los Angeles (AL)...it snapped a streak of 443.0 innings without a wild pitch...it was his first wild pitch in 40 starts with the A's, which was the second longest streak in Oakland history...the record is 42 by Catfish Hunter (June 25, 1972-June 27, 1973).
- Went 5-0 with a 1.75 ERA in five starts in June to win American League Pitcher of the Month honors for the fourth time in his career...led the AL in ERA and tied for second in wins...it marked the third time in his career he won five games in a month (August 1999 and August 2005)...it was the fourth lowest single month ERA of his career (1.13 in May 2002, 1.39 in June 1998 and 1.72 in August 2005)...since 2006, the only other Oakland pitcher to win five games in a month is Gio Gonzalez (Sept., 2011).
- Was named to the American League All-Star team for the third time in his career (1998, 2005)...at the age of 40 years and 53 days, he is the oldest All-Star in Athletics history...Dennis Eckersley, at age 37 in 1992, is second oldest...pitched the Sunday before the game and was replaced on the active roster.

RYAN COOK

- Allowed his first run of the season on the road May 26 at Houston, snapping a 22.2-inning scoreless streak on the road dating back to Aug. 11, 2012...the road scoreless streak is third longest in Oakland history by a reliever.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his ninth Opening Day Roster (2004-09, 11-13), his third straight with the A's...made his eighth career Opening Start April 1 against Seattle, including three straight with the A's.
- Hit his ninth career leadoff home run April 5 at Houston, his seventh with the A's...added two more on June 3 at Milwaukee and June 11 against New York (AL)...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (43) and Campy Campaneris (10) have more...is tied for fourth in Athletics history with Max Bishop behind Henderson, Eddie Joost (19) and Campaneris (13).
- Homered and doubled in all three games at Houston April 5-7 to become the second player in Oakland history with both a double and a home run in three consecutive games (Matt Stairs, August 14-16, 1997).
- Homered in a career-high four consecutive games from April 5-9...is the first leadoff hitter in Oakland history to homer in four straight games...the last Athletic to do it was Wally Moses (July 21-23, 1937).
- Had a 12-game hitting streak from April 3 to 19... went 20 for 51 (.392) with 18 runs, seven doubles, one triple, five home runs, nine RBI, nine walks and seven multiple hit games during the streak, which was his 11th of 10 or more games.
- Had the fourth "walk-off sacrifice bunt" in Oakland history April 28 against Baltimore...the last was by Marco Scutaro on April 16, 2005 against Anaheim...had two walk-off sacrifice flies last year, in addition to a single.
- Finished April with 24 runs scored to set an Oakland record for runs in April...broke the previous mark of 23 by Jose Canseco in 1988.
- Was on the 15-day disabled from April 30 to May 14 with a strained left hamstring...it was his seventh career stint on the DL, his fourth with the A's.
- His seventh inning RBI single July 13 against Boston was the 500th RBI of his career.
- Led off the game with a double July 22 at Houston to snap a career-high tying 21-game streak without an extra base hit and a career-high 35-game streak without a double...it was his first extra base hit since a home run June 21 at Seattle and his first double since June 3 at Milwaukee.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Had his first career game-ending RBI April 12 against Detroit, a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning...his second was a RBI single in the 11th inning July 14 against Boston.
- Was a perfect 4 for 4 April 27 against Baltimore, matching his career high in hits (August 17, 2012 vs. Cleveland)...also had four-hit games May 14 against Texas and May 25 at Houston.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of April 22-28...it was his first career weekly honor...went 12 for 22 (.545) with four runs, seven doubles (.864 slugging percentage), 10 RBI and seven walks (1 sf, .633 on-base percentage) in seven games.
- Had a career-high seven-game hitting streak from May 11-18 (12 for 26, .462).
- Made his Major League debut at shortstop in the ninth inning May 24 at Houston...had one appearance at shortstop in the minors with Triple-A Sacramento on Aug. 2, 2012.
- Hit his first career grand slam in the sixth inning June 7 at Chicago, turning a 3-0 deficit into a 4-3 win.
- Snapped a career-high tying 0 for 17 streak with a fifth inning single July 29 (third time, last: April 13-May 14, 2012).Went 0 for 2 August 16 against Cleveland, snapping his reaching base streak at a career-high 18 games...went 16 for 64 (.250) with 12 walks and a hit by pitch (.377) on-base percentage during the streak.

SEAN DOOLITTLE

- Had a career-high tying 13.1-inning scoreless streak from April 29 to May 27.

NATE FREIMAN

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 3 against Seattle and had a RBI single off Joe Saunders in the second inning for his first ML hit...added another single in the fourth inning for his first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run April 22 against Houston, a three-run shot off Erik Bedard in the first inning...it snapped a 0 for 11 streak.
- Was named American League Rookie of the Month for May after batting .351 with three doubles, one home run and nine RBI in 14 games.
- Had his second career three-hit game June 11 and both have come against the Yankees in games started by Sabathia (also May 3).
- Had his first career "walk-off" hit June 13 against New York, a RBI single in the 18th inning off Rivera.
- Went 4 for 4 with four RBI August 15 against Houston, establishing career highs in hits and RBI...is the first A's rookie with four hits and four RBI in a game since Ben Grieve on June 26, 1998.
- Walked in the first inning August 18 against Cleveland, his first walk since June 1 against Chicago (AL)...that snapped a streak 33 consecutive games without a walk, which is the longest streak by an Athletic since Scott Brosius had a 36-game streak from Aug. 23, 1991-Aug. 25, 1992

JOHN JASO

- Is on his third consecutive Opening Day roster with his third team (Tampa Bay, 2011; Seattle, 2012).
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 9 at Los Angeles, a three-run shot off Jepsen in the seventh to give the A's a 7-5 lead.
- Played first base May 24 at Houston, his second career appearance at first base (Aug. 25, 2010 at Los Angeles-AL).
- Had a career-high 17-game reaching base streak from May 21 to June 18...hit .345 with a .456 on-base percentage during the streak, which included a career-high nine-game hitting streak from May 25-June 13 (14 for 38, .368).

JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying four RBI April 15 against Houston (fourth time, last: September 19, 2011 vs. Baltimore).
- Went 4 for 4 April 19 at Tampa, the third four-hit game of his career...added his fourth June 1 against Chicago (AL) and his fifth August 9 at Toronto.
- Went 2 for 9 in the 19-inning game April 29 against Los Angeles to tie the Oakland record for at bats in a game (11th time, last: Mike Heath at Texas, July 1, 1979).
- Set an Oakland record for hits in the month of April with 34...broke the previous mark of 33 held by Stan Javier (1994) and Ben Grieve (1998)...had 11 doubles, which tied the Oakland April record (Mark Ellis, 2003).
- Went a career-high 11 consecutive games without a RBI from June 4 to 15.
- Homered June 21 at Seattle to snap a career-high 62-game homerless streak.
- Hit safely in each of his first 12 interleague games, which tied for the third longest interleague hitting streak in Oakland history...had a 14-game interleague hitting streak dating back to last year.
- Had a career-high tying nine-game hitting streak from June 20 to 30 (also Aug. 4-21, 2010 and April 27-May 6, 2012)...hit .457 (16 for 35) during the streak.

BRANDON MOSS

- Matched his career high with five RBI April 10 at Los Angeles (also September 29, 2012 vs. Seattle) after driving in four runs the night before.
- Had a career-high four strikeouts April 12 against Detroit...matched that figure April 29 against Los Angeles and May 12 at Seattle.
- Was on the paternity list from April 16 to 18 for the birth of his second son, Brody. (April 16).
- Went 0 for 4 April 21 at Tampa Bay to snap a 15-game road hitting streak dating back to Sept. 20, 2012...hit .463 (25 for 54) during the streak.
- Hit the game-ending home run in the bottom of the 19th inning April 29 against Los Angeles, his third career walk-off home run...also homered in the sixth inning, his second career multi-homer game (June 12, 2012 at Colorado)...had 12 innings between home runs to become the 17th player

in Major League history to go at least 12 innings between home runs in one game...is the second Athletic to do it...Reggie Jackson also went 12 innings between home runs June 11, 1969...had four strikeouts to become the second Major Leaguer since 1916 to have at least two home runs and four strikeouts in one game...Evan Longoria did it August 4, 2009 for Tampa Bay against Boston.

- Made his first career appearance in center field May 9 (also May 13).
- Hit the 7000th home run in Oakland history May 13 against Texas off Justin Grimm in the third inning...hit the 12,000th home run in Athletics franchise history June 5 at Milwaukee, a three-run homer off Michael Gonzalez in the seventh inning.
- Played third base for the second time as a professional May 24 at Houston in the ninth inning...the other time was in 2002 with the Red Sox affiliate in the Gulf Coast League...returned to third base in the 16th inning of the A's 18-inning game against New York (AL) June 13.
- Had his second two homer game of the season June 12 against New York (AL) and third of his career...the two homers gave him a streak where each of his last five hits were home runs...is the sixth player in Oakland history (10th time) to do that, the first since John Jaha (June 18-20, 1999)...the others are Jackson, McGwire (five times), Canseco and Giambi.
- Hit his second walk-off home run of the season August 19 against Seattle...it was the fourth of his career and his third as an Athletic, which is tied for fifth most in Oakland history...is the 10th player in Oakland history with two or more walk-off home runs in one season...now has six career game-ending hits (also a double and a single).

PAT NESHEK

- Did not allow a run in nine spring training appearances (8.1 ip) and has not allowed a run in 19 games (17.1 ip) over the last two springs.
- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2007-08 and 2010 with Minnesota, 2011 with San Diego).

DEREK NORRIS

- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles and ended up going 0 for 5 with a walk...he and Rosales had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).
- Had a career-high four RBI June 11 against New York (AL).
- Caught all 18 innings June 20 against New York (AL)...is the second A's catcher since 1973 to catch 18 innings in a game (Damian Miller, Aug. 8, 2004 against Minnesota).
- Recorded a career-high three hits August 10 at Toronto.

JARROD PARKER

- Began the season with a career-high four-game losing streak...posted an 8.10 ERA and .374 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned five starts from April 2 to 25.
- Was 1-4 with a 7.36 ERA and .350 opponents batting average in six starts in the month of April...the losses matched the most in Oakland history by a pitcher in the month of April (12th time)...the ERA was the fifth highest April ERA in Oakland history among pitchers with 25 or more innings pitched and the opponents batting average was fourth highest among pitchers with 100 or more batters faced.
- Allowed a career-high four home runs in a 7-3 loss at Cleveland May 6...prior to that, had allowed more than one home run in a start just twice in his career and never more than two.
- Had a seven-start streak from May 28 to June 29 where he allowed five hits or fewer and two walks or fewer...that matched the longest such streak by an Athletics starting pitcher since at least 1916 (Alan Wirth, May 6-Sept. 15, 1978).
- Had a streak of 11 consecutive outings with five hits or fewer and three innings or more from May 28-July 28, which matched the longest streak by an Athletic since at least 1916 (Rich Harden, April 9, 2006-April 15, 2007).
- Left his June 29 start against St. Louis after 3.2 innings with tightness in his right hamstring.
- Went 3-0 with a 2.08 ERA and .169 opponents batting average in six starts in the month of June...had the lowest opponents batting average in the American League in June and ranked third in ERA.
- Tossed his first career complete game August 19 against Seattle, an eight-hitter in the A's 2-1 win in Oakland...did not walk a batter and struck out eight...it came in his 55th career start, his 54th as an Athletic...the 53 consecutive starts without a complete game is the fourth longest streak in Oakland history.

SHANE PETERSON

- Made his Major League debut with a start at first base April 16 against Houston and went 0 for 4.
- Singled off Xavier Cedeno in the fourth inning April 17 against Houston for his first Major League hit.

JOSH REDDICK

- Hit .139 in April, which was the third lowest April batting average in Oakland history (min. 75 PA)...Don Baylor hit .129 in 1976 and Ben Grieve hit .132 in 1999.
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from May 7 to 30 with a sprained right wrist...it was his first career stint on the DL...went 3 for 14 (.214) with five runs, three walks, one strikeout and two stolen bases during a four-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (May 27) and Triple-A Sacramento (May 28-30)...appeared in two games in right field and two at designated hitter.
- Walked with the bases loaded in the 10th inning June 1 against Chicago to force in the winning run...it was the 25th "walk-off" walk in Oakland history, the first since Bobby Crosby did it in the 17th inning against Los Angeles (NL) June 17, 2006...it was his third career walk-off RBI (single, double).
- Snapped a career-high 30-game homerless streak with a solo shot in the seventh inning off Quintana June 6 at Chicago (AL).
- Had his third career four-hit game June 16 against Seattle.
- Reached base safely via hit or walk in a career-high 19 consecutive games from June 18 to July 13... hit .262 (17 for 65) with a .329 on-base percentage (7 bb, 1 sf) during the streak.
- Struck out a career-high tying four times July 14 against Boston.
- Hit three home runs August 9 at Toronto, tying the Athletics record for home runs in a game...it was the 14th three-homer game in Oakland history and the 26th in Athletics history...it was the first since Erubiel Durazo on August 18, 2004 at Baltimore...then hit two home runs the next day against the Blue Jays to tie a Major League record with five home runs over a two-game span...is the first Athletic to do it since Mark McGwire, June 10-11, 1995.
- Had a career-high tying five RBI August 9 at Toronto (also: May 11, 2012 vs. Detroit).

CHRIS RESOP

- Is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2006 with Florida, 2008 with Atlanta and 2011-12 with Pittsburgh).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 23 with a sprained right elbow.
- Had successful UCL reconstruction surgery March 27...the procedure was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston, Texas.

ADAM ROSALES

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was added to the 15-day DL March 26 with a strained left intercostal...hit .320 (8 for 25) with one home run and one RBI during a six-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton (April 17-19) and Triple-A Sacramento (April 21-24)...was reinstated April 25.
- Grounded out as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and ended up going 1 for 6...he and Norris had six plate appearances, which match the most in Oakland history by a player not in the starting lineup (nine times, last: Jerry Browne on June 12, 1992 vs. Texas).
- Drew his first two walks of the season April 30 against Los Angeles, snapping a 28-game streak without a walk...his last walk prior to that was August 4, 2012.
- Started in the leadoff spot for the first time in his career May 3 at New York and hit Sabathia's first pitch of the game for his first career leadoff home run.
- Snapped a 0 for 24 streak with his eighth inning home run May 28 against San Francisco.
- Struck out as a pinch hitter in the 10th inning June 13 against New York (AL) and ended up going 0 for 4 with a career-high four strikeouts...is the first player in Oakland history to strikeout four times in a game that he didn't start.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Doubled in the second inning April 3 against Seattle in his first game since September 28, 2011 at Seattle...that extended his hitting streak to six games dating back to September 24, 2011 (8 for 20, .400), which is the longest hitting streak of his career.
- Did not strike out May 5 in New York, snapping his career-high streak of 12 consecutive games with a strikeout (20 strikeouts total)...that included back-to-back four strikeout games last May 1 and 3... according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first Athletic to strike out four times in back-to-back games...the four strikeouts match his career high (three times).

SETH SMITH

- Went 2 for 3 with a double April 1 against Seattle in his fifth consecutive Opening Day start (2009-10 in left field with Colorado, 2011 in right field with Colorado, 2012-13 at designated hitter with Oakland)...is 7 for 22 (.318) with two doubles, a home run and three RBI in his five openers...is the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at designated hitter since Erubiel Durazo (2003-05).
- Matched his career-high with four hits April 11 at Los Angeles (third time, last: June 4, 2012 vs. Texas) after collecting three hits the night before.
- Hit his sixth career pinch hit home run May 24 at Houston, his first since May 27, 2010 against Arizona.
- Had a career-high four walks June 12 against New York.
- Started the game June 13 against New York (AL) 1 for 6 before singling in the 16th and 18th innings...is the third player in Oakland history to collect two hits in a game in the 16th inning or later...the others are Dick Green on June 4, 1971 against Washington (17th and 21st) and Bert Campaneris on Sept. 6, 1969 against Minnesota (16th and 17th).
- Doubled in the fourth inning June 16 against Seattle off Iwakuma for his 500th career hit.
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 30 streak with a third inning double July 29.

ERIC SOGARD

- Had a career-high five-game hitting streak from April 14 to 20 (7 for 16, .438)...matched that May 15-21 (6 for 15, .400).
- Had his first career three-hit game April 16 against Houston...his second came June 22 at Seattle.
- Had the first two-steal game of his career June 12 against New York.
- Stole a base in three consecutive games from June 5-13 (four stolen bases total) after stealing four bases over the first 115 games of his career.
- Homered July 7 at Kansas City to snap a career-high 90-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since April 27, 2012.
- Had a career-high 14-game game hitting streak from July 19 to August 9...batted .392 (20 for 51) with 11 runs scored and 10 RBI during the streak.

DAN STRAILY

- Struck out a career-high and Oakland rookie record tying 11 batters in 6.2 innings (sixth time, last: Tim Hudson, Sept. 10, 1999 at Tampa Bay) in an 8-3 victory at Houston April 5...is the ninth pitcher in Oakland history to strikeout 11 or more in fewer than seven innings, the first since Kirk Saarloos on September 19, 2006 (11 so in 5.0 ip)...did not issue a walk and is the 12th pitcher in Oakland to strikeout 11 or more without walking a batter.

STEPHEN VOGT

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 25
- Had a sacrifice fly in his first at bat as an Athletic June 25 against Cincinnati, his first career RBI.
- Snapped a career-opening 0 for 32 streak with a home run in the fourth inning June 28 against St. Louis off Joe Kelly...the hitless streak was the second longest career-opening hitless streak by a non-pitcher since 1973 (Chris Carter, OAK; 33 in 2010).

CHRIS YOUNG

- Is in his eighth season in the majors...the first seven came with Arizona...is on his seventh Opening Day roster.

- Made his A's debut April 3 against Seattle and homered in the seventh inning...became the 20th player in Oakland history to homer in his first game with the A's (last: Jonny Gomes, March 29, 2012 vs. Seattle at Tokyo).
- His sixth inning double April 11 at Los Angeles was the 200th of his career.
- Had his 11th career regular season multi-homer game April 24 at Boston (also has one in the post-season).
- Was on the 15-day disabled list from April 30 to May 17 with a strained left quad...it was his second career stint on the DL...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento May 16 and went 1 for 1 with two walks, a run and a stolen base in a start in center field against Oklahoma City.
- Had back-to-back three-hit games for the second time in his career May 24 and 25 at Houston (Aug. 16-17, 2007).
- Went 0 for 4 with four strikeouts June 26 against Cincinnati...it was the fifth four-strikeout game of his career, but his first since May 20, 2009 at Florida.
- Led off the game with a home run for the first time as an Athletic August 12 at Toronto ...it was the 14th of his career, his first since August 7, 2010 against San Diego.
