CAREER: Began this season with the Astros, but was acquired by the Rangers in an Aug. 14 trade with Houston in exchange for cash considerations...is the first Australia native in Rangers history...in his big league career, Blackley had held lefties to a .231 (49-212) mark prior to joining Texas...went four years from 2008-11 between major league appearances, and has seen the bulk of his major league action the past two seasons...entered his Rangers career with an 8-8 record and 5.28 ERA over 78 games/23 starts in his big league career with Seattle (2004), San Francisco (2007, 2012), Oakland (2012), and Houston (2013)...prior to his Texas debut, had 8 career wins, 2 of which had come at Rangers Ballpark and 4 of which had been against Texas...during his four years without pitching in the majors from 2008-11, he pitched in the farm systems of Philadelphia (2008), Arizona (2009), the Mets (2010) and Oakland (2010)...spent 2011 in South Korea and also saw winter league action in Mexico and Australia...was originally signed by Seattle as a non-drafted free agent following the 2000 season...pitched for the World team in the MLB Futures Game at U.S. Cellular Field in 2003, the same year he was named Texas League Pitcher of the Year after leading the league with 17 wins... made his MLB debut with Seattle in 2004...missed the entire 2005 season following shoulder surgery...traded to San Francisco April 1, 2007...represented Australia in the World Baseball Classic in 2009 and pitched in the Australian Baseball League in 2010 and 2011...beat the Rangers in his MLB debut on July 1, 2004 in Seattle, one of 8 pitchers, and the most recent, to beat Texas in a start in his big league debut.

STAND BY ME: Blackley is the 4th pitcher in Rangers history to start his major league debut against Texas and later go on to pitch for the Rangers.

2013: Prior to being acquired in a trade by Texas, spent the entire season in the Houston organization after being designated for assignment by Oakland on March 29 at the end of spring training...was acquired by the Astros in a trade with the A's on April 4 and opened the year on the 15-day disabled list with a left shoulder strain...after a one-outing injury rehabilitation assignment with Oklahoma City (AAA), Blackley was reinstated from the disabled list and was on the Astros active roster from April 20-Aug. 8...he was designated for assignment on Aug. 9 and outrighted to Oklahoma City on Aug. 10, but did not appear for the Red-Hawks before being sent to Texas...went 1-1 with a 4.89 ERA (19 ER/35.0 IP) in 42 relief appearances for the Astros, allowing 10 home runs and 20 walks against 29 strikeouts...allowed 7 of 37 inherited runners to score (18.9%)...opponents batted just .234 (30-128), including a .200 (12-60) figure by left-handed hitters.



2012: Pitched in 28 games for the A's and Giants in 2012, his first major league action since 2007 with San Francisco...for the year, was 5-4 with a 4.54 ERA and .252 opponents batting average in his 15 starts compared to 1-0 with a 2.86 ERA and .219 opponents average in 13 relief appearances...allowed just one of 7 inherited runners to score overall...began season at Triple-A Fresno in the San Francisco organization and was 3-0 with a save, a 0.39 ERA and .163 opponents batting average in 4 games/3 starts, before he was selected by Giants May 1...at Fresno, opponents were 1-for-27 (.037) with runners on base, including 0-for-11 with RISP...made 4 relief appearances for Giants, first outing on May 2 vs. MIA (2.0 IP, 1 H, 1 BB) was first ML appearance since a start Sept. 29, 2007 at Los Angeles (NL)...was designated for assignment May 13...claimed off waivers by Oakland on May 15 and went 6-4, 3.86 in 24 games/15 starts with A's...ranked 2nd in the American League with 7 pickoffs...was also charged with 3 balks, which was 2nd-most in the AL...was 3-1, 2.82 with a .210 opp. Average in 12 games/5 starts in Oakland...A's were 8-7 in his 15 starts...first start was May 28 at Minnesota (ND, 5.0 IP, 1 R), first ML start since Sept. 29, 2007...made 7 consecutive starts from May 28 to July 1, his longest stay in the starting rotation... had an eight-game, 47.2-inning, 186-batter homerless streak from May 28 to July 24...allowed 2 runs in 6.0 innings June 15 vs. San Diego to pick up his first MLB win since defeating Texas in his ML debut July 1, 2004...the span of 7 years, 350 days between wins is the longest since Vicente Romo went 8 years and 3 days between victories from July 16, 1974 to July 19, 1982...it was the 4th-longest streak by a pitcher in the expansion era (since 1961) behind Jim Bouton (8 years, 65 days), Romo and Joe Grzenda (7 years, 362 days)...struck out a career-high 8 batters in 7.0 innings July 24 at Toronto...pitched just 7 times over a 54-day stretch from July 30 to Sept. 21...finished the season in the starting rotation after injury to Brett Anderson...allowed 9 runs (8 earned) in 3.0 innings over his first 2 starts Sept. 22 at New York and Sept. 27 at Texas...then allowed just one run in 6.0 innings to defeat the Rangers Oct. 2 in Oakland Oct. 2...was on the A's ALDS roster against Detroit but did not appear in a game...2011: Pitched for the KIA Tigers of the Korean Baseball Organization...appeared in 25 games/22 starts with the Tigers, posting a 7-5 record with a 3.48 ERA...also pitched for Melbourne in the Australian Baseball League and was 1-0 with a save and a 3.55 ERA in 8 relief appearances...allowed a .214 opponents batting average with 18 K's in 12.2 innings...2010: Began the season in the New York Mets organization and was 0-0, 8.53 in 4 relief appearances at Triple-A Buffalo before he was released May 1...had a loss and a 15.88 ERA in one start and one relief appearance for Chihuahua of the Mexican League before signing a minor league contract with the A's organization May 14...combined to post a 2-1 record and a 2.43 ERA in 17 games/6 starts with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...was on the disabled list June 19-Aug. 5 with a strained left elbow...was sent to Stockton for 2 starts before returning to Sacramento Aug. 18...returned to Mexico to pitch for Hermosillo during the winter and was 5-1 with a 2.09 ERA in 9 starts...also made 2 starts for Melbourne in the Australian Baseball League and was 0-1 with a 0.82 ERA...2009: Pitched for the Reno Aces in their inaugural season...recorded 101 strikeouts

in 111.1 innings...went 4-7 with a 4.85 ERA over 38 games/12 starts...was also 3-for-3 in save opportunities...went 0-6 with a 7.28 ERA in his 12 starts, 4-1 with a 2.82 ERA in 26 relief appearances...allowed 3 runs in 3.0 innings July 11 vs. Las Vegas to record his first professional save...also pitched for Australia in the World Baseball Classic in March and had a no decision in a start against Cuba March 10 (5.2 IP, 5 H, 1 R-ER, 2 BB, 4 SO)...went 5-1 with a 3.62 ERA in eight starts for Hermosillo in the Mexican Winter League...2008: Made his first 21 appearances of the season as a starter for Triple-A Lehigh Valley, going 5-9 with a 5.47 ERA...was 0-1 with a 5.02 ERA in 7 relief appearances...went 2-3 with a 4.24 ERA in 12 games/10 starts, for Aguilas in the Mexican Winter League...had 55 K's and 19 walks...2007: Had a 3.62 ERA in 24 of his 28 starts for Triple-A Fresno...had a 14.36 ERA in the other four...was 10-8 with a 4.66 ERA in 28 starts overall... pitched at least 6.0 innings in 19 of his 28 starts...was recalled by San Francisco Sept. 21 and made 2 starts for the Giants... had no decisions and a 7.27 ERA...collected his first big league hit Sept. 29 at Los Angeles (NL) off Chad Billingslev...2006: Pitched at least 6.0 innings in 13 of his 25 starts and allowed two earned runs or fewer in 14 of the 25 for Double-A San Antonio... promoted to Triple-A Tacoma Aug. 22 and made 2 starts...finished the year by allowing one hit over 6.0 shutout innings Aug. 31 vs. Salt Lake...2005: Had surgery Feb. 8 to repair 2 small tears in the labrum of his left shoulder (Dr. Lewis Yocum)...spent the entire season on the disabled list...2004: Led Triple-A Tacoma in wins (8) and strikeouts (80)...named Pacific Coast League Pitcher of the Week for the week of May 17-23...selected by Seattle July 1 and won his ML debut that night against Texas at Safeco Field (5.2 IP, 4 R-ER)...optioned to Tacoma Aug. 1...ended the season on the DL (left shoulder tendinitis)...2003: Named the Texas League Pitcher of the Year after leading the league in wins (17)...also ranked 2nd in ERA (2.61) and 4th in strikeouts (144) and innings (162.1)....his wins were the most by a Texas League pitcher since 1978, when Jeff Reardon of the Jackson Mets also won 17...had season-high 11 strikeouts June 2 vs. Arkansas... participated in the Texas League All-Star Game and was named to the Postseason All-Star Team...pitched for the World squad in the 2003 MLB Futures Game July 15 at U.S. Cellular Field...named Seattle's Minor League Pitcher of the Year and received the 2003 John Ellis Award for his community involvement...2002: Finished second among Seattle minor leaguers in strikeouts for Single-A San Bernardino (152)...had a career-high 14 strikeouts July 19 at San Jose in 8.0 innings pitched...2001: Began his professional career with Rookie League Everett and held opponents to a .211 batting average...had a season-high 13 strikeouts July 23 at Tri-Cities in 7.0 innings.

CAREER: Acquired by the Rangers in a trade with the Rays just one week into the 2013 season, Chirinos (pronounced cher-REE-nos) is seeking his first action with Texas...already in his 13th professional season, his only previous major league action came with the Rays in 2011, appearing in 20 games...began catching on a full-time basis in 2009 after previously being a utility infielder early in his career, with his primary position at that point being second base...first caught in the low minors in 2008, and adjusted quickly, earning All-Star honors and was named Best Defensive Catcher in the Cubs system by Baseball America in 2009 and 2010...spent the first 10 years of his professional career in the Cubs organization from 2001-10 before he was acquired by the Rays in a trade involving pitcher Matt Garza on

2013: Was designated for assignment by Tampa Bay on March 31 when Rays set their Opening Day roster...acquired by Texas in April 8 trade in exchange for a player to be named later or cash considerations, the first major league trade between the Rangers and Rays...went 2-for-9 with the Rays this spring...was optioned to Round Rock (AAA) when acquired by Texas, and opened the season at Triple-A.

2012: Missed the entire 2012 season due to a concussion he suffered during spring training when a foul tip struck his mask...spent the year at the Rays spring training complex in Port Charlotte, Fla., rehabbing and undergoing daily vision therapy...played 6 games for Magallanes in the Venezuelan Winter League...2011: Split the campaign between Durham (AAA) and Tampa Bay, batting .218 (12-55) with one home run and 7 RBI over 20 games with the Rays in his only major league action to date...made 15 starts at catcher for the Rays...recalled on July 18 to replace Jose Lobaton, who was placed on the 15-day DL...optioned to Durham on Aug 19 when John Jaso was activated from the DL...started at catcher in his ML debut on July 18 vs. NYY and doubled off A.J. Burnett in his first at-bat...hit his first career home run in a 9-1 win on Aug. 3 vs. TOR, a 3-run blast off Carlos Villanueva, also his first career RBI...collected a career-high 4 RBI and reached base a career-high 4 times, going 2-for-2 with 2 walks...6 of his 7 RBI came in a span of 2 games, Aug 3-4 vs. TOR...on Aug 4 vs. TOR, hit a game-tying RBI single in the 11th inning and a walk-off RBI single in the 12th off Shawn Camp...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he became the first rookie with separate game-tying and game-winning RBI, both in extra innings, since ATL Nick Green on July 2, 2004 vs. BOS...recorded his first career multi-hit game on July 27 at OAK in his only game at 1B since 2009 with Tennessee (Cubs-AA)...caught only 2 of 23 attempted base stealers (8.7 percent)...on Aug 6 vs. OAK allowed 7 SB in 7 attempts, the most steals allowed in Rays history...it was the most steals in a game for the A's since they had 8 on July 29, 1989 vs. SEA, including 5 by Rickey Henderson...hit .259 (73-282) in 78 games for Durham...caught 17 of 63 attempted base stealers (26.9 percent) for Durham, his lowest mark since converting to catcher in 2009...2010: Completed his 10th and final season in the Cubs



organization...spent the majority of the season at Tennessee and advanced to Triple-A lowa for the first time...set career highs in nearly every offensive category, batting a combined .326 (104-319) with 18 HR, 74 RBI, 28 doubles, .416 OBP, .583 SLG and .999 OPS in 92 games...his .999 OPS ranked 8th among all minor leaguers and led all minor league catchers... ranked 3rd in the Cubs system in batting average...started at catcher in the Southern League All-Star Game for the North Division...also named to the league's postseason All-Star Team...combining both stops, hit .438 (46-105) with 9 HR against left-handed pitching...named the Best Defensive Catcher in the Cubs system by Baseball America prior to trade to Tampa Bay...threw out 28 of 88 base runners attempting to steal (31.8 percent)...was a non-roster invite to Cubs spring training...placed on the DL from May 25-June 3 due to a concussion...promoted to Iowa on Sept. 7 before returning to Tennessee for its postseason run...2009: Converted to catching full-time with Class-A Daytona and earned an Aug. 4 promotion to Tennessee...in his first full season as a backstop, was named Best Defensive Catcher in the Cubs system by BA and a Florida State League postseason All-Star...caught 27.9 percent (24-86) of attempted base stealers between Daytona and Tennessee... established several offensive career highs at the time, totaling a .294 avg., 11 HR, 52 RBI, .396 OBP and .519 SLG...he surpassed all those numbers in 2010...hit 2 grand slams in one game on May 31 vs. Sarasota (Reds)...the next day he hit 2 more HR vs. Sarasota...only one other player in Florida State League history hit 2 slams in one game: Charles Reidell on June 15, 1959 (50 years prior) for the St. Petersburg Saints, a Yankees affiliate at the time...2008: Began the season with Tennessee... played 38 games for the Smokies at third, shortstop and second base...in May reported to Mesa, Ariz., to learn how to catch...once the Arizona League season began, he appeared in 4 games for the AZL Cubs (2 at catcher)...joined Daytona on June 29 and appeared in 37 games (18 at catcher) while also serving as a utility infielder... on May 15 at Montgomery (Rays), his last game with Tennessee before reporting to Arizona for catching instruction, tied a Southern League record with 3 triples...declared a minor league free agent on Nov. 3, and re-signed with the Cubs the following January...2007: Started the 2007 season at Daytona and earned a July 17 promotion to Tennessee...this marked his first action above Class-A ball in his seventh professional season...2006: With Class-A Peoria, set a career high with 19 stolen bases... signed with the Cubs as a 16-year-old on July 2, 2000.

PERSONAL/COMMUNITY: Started the Robinson Chirinos Foundation this offseason, which operates out of his hometown of Punto Fijo, Venezuela...this past December he hosted a clinic and gave baseball equipment including gloves, helmets and catching gear to 300 kids...on Christmas Eve, he delivered more than 800 toys to local kids and patients at a nearby children's hospital...he plans to open a health clinic this year that will provide free exams to the local community...enjoys cooking, particularly traditional food from his native Venezuela...his favorite dish to cook is rice, black beans, plantains and beef.




