ABOUT THE A'S: Have won three of the last four games and are a season-high tying 15 games over .500 for the fifth time this year...are 6-6 over the last 12 games and 13-12 over the last 25 contests...however, are 43-28 for the season, which is tied with San Francisco for the best record in the majors...the A's have held sole

possession of the best record in the majors for two days this year (May 21 and 22)...this is the A's best record after 71 games since the 1992 club was also 43-28...with a win today, the A's would have their best record after 72 games since the 1990 club was 46-26...are in sole possession of first place in the American League West for the 51st consecutive day (since April 28) and have held at least a share of first for 55 consecutive days (since April 24) and 65 of the last 67...this is the A's longest stretch of consecutive days in first place since spending the final 65 days of the 2006 season in first...have 64 days in sole possession of first this year, four days tied for first, four days in second, three days tied for second, one day tied for third and three days in fourth...have a 4½ game lead over Los Angeles in the West, which is one game short of the season-high of 5½ (last on June 6)...have owned the best record in the AL every day since May 31.

OFFENSE: The A's have 28 runs, 40 hits and five home runs over the last three games after tallying 14 runs, 32 hits and one home run over the previous five contests...**lead the majors** in runs scored (369), walks (302) and on-base percentage (.337), rank third in home runs (82), sixth in slugging (.413) and eighth in extra base hits (218).

THE LONG BALL: Four of the A's last five home runs have been three-run shots and five of the last seven have come with at least two men on base...lead the majors with 43 home runs with runners on base and four grand slams...have 82 home runs for the season, which ranks second in the American League and third in the majors...the pitching staff has allowed seven home runs in the last three games after yielding just one over the previous six contests...have surrendered 60 home runs for the season, which is tied for second fewest in the AL and tied for eighth fewest in the majors...only 19 of those have come with runners on base, which is second fewest in the majors (St. Louis, 17).

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters are 8 for their last 14 (.571) with two doubles, a home run, seven RBI and two walks...lead the American League in pinch walks (14) and RBI (14)...the walks rank third in the majors and the RBI are sixth...are tied for the AL lead in doubles (4) and extra base hits (6), rank second in hits (18), on-base percentage (.429), slugging percentage (.459) and plate appearances (77) and third in batting (.295).

PITCHING: The A's have allowed 33 runs on the homestand (30 er in 45.0 ip, 6.00 ERA)...that has upped the season ERA to 3.05, which is the highest it has been since May 10 (3.06)...**lead the majors** in ERA (3.05) and opponents on-base percentage (.291) and rank second in batting average (.229) and slugging percentage (.346)...also lead the majors with a .203 (108 for 533) opponents batting average with runners in scoring position...have issued the third fewest walks in the American League (199) and are tied for the third most shutouts (7).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 10-9 with a 3.56 ERA (58 er in 146.2 ip) over the last 24 games but are 30-17 with a 3.08 ERA (147 er in 429.1 ip) for the season...have the fewest losses in the majors and the second lowest ERA (St. Louis, 3.00)...are tied for second in the American League in complete games (2) and rank fourth in innings pitched (429.1).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed at least one error in each of the last five games (seven errors total), including a season-high tying three Monday night (third time)...now have 12 errors in the last eight games and 53 for the season, which is third most in the American League...however, have just 19 unearned runs, which is tied for third fewest in the AL...A's outfielders have 13 assists in the last 24 games and 20 for the season, which is **tied for the most in the majors** (Arizona, New York-NL).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-2 on this 10-game homestand against New York-AL (2-1), Texas (1-1) and Boston (four

games)...went 5-2 on the last homestand and are 20-14 (.576) at home for the season, which is tied with Los Angeles for the second best home record in the American League (Cleveland, 22-12)...have won 14 of the last 19 home games after losing six straight...are batting .265 (306 for 1156) with 46 home runs in 34 games in Oakland compared to .240 with 36 home runs in 37 games on the road...went 5-4 on the last road trip to New York-AL (2-1), Baltimore (2-1) and Los Angeles-AL (1-2)...it marked their 10th consecutive road trip with a .500 or better record, which is the A's longest such streak since an 11-trip streak from June 26, 1989-July 11, 1990...have not finished a road trip with a losing record since going 2-5 at Texas and Seattle June 17-23, 2013...are 23-14 (.622) on the road for the season, which is tied with Milwaukee for the best mark in the majors.

ON THE BASES: The A's are 40 for 48 (83.3%) in stolen base attempts, which is the second best percentage in the majors (Washington, 84.2%)...opponents have been successful in 42 of their 48 (87.5%) attempts, which is the second highest percentage in the majors (Cubs, 90.9%)...the A's are the only Major League team without a pickoff.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 12-17 in games decided by two runs or fewer compared to 31-11 in games decided by three runs or more...are 7-4 in extra inning games...lead the majors in extra inning wins and are tied with the Dodgers and Mets for the most extra inning games...have the third best extra inning record in the American League...are 11-8 in games decided in the last at bat...lead the AL in last at bat wins and rank second in last at bat games (Boston, 20)...lead the majors in wins when trailing after seven innings (8) and are tied with Milwaukee for the lead in wins when trailing after eight innings (4)...have four walk-off wins, which is tied for third in the AL.

THIS AND THAT: The A's are the only Major League team that has not used a rookie in 2014...the streak of 71 consecutive games without playing a rookie is the second longest single-season streak in Oakland history...the record is a 73-game streak to start the 1984 season...the A's have outscored the opposition by 130 runs, which is more than double next closest team (San Francisco, 48) and more than triple the next closest American League team (Toronto and Seattle, 37)...the best run differential at the All-Star Break in Athletics history is 95 in 1973 (first All-Star Game was in 1933)...the A's are 9-6 in June...went 16-12 in May after going 18-9 in April...have now posted a winning record in 12 consecutive months dating back to June of 2012...that is the second longest such streak in Oakland history...the record is 13 consecutive months from Sept. 1970-Sept. 1972...the A's average time of game is 3 hours and 11 minutes...the Oakland record is 3:08 in 2000.

A's vs. RANGERS: The season series is even at four games each...the A's are 1-4 in Oakland and 3-0 in Texas...have won each of the previous two season series after losing five of the previous six...are 25-21 over the last three years...are 317-328 all-time against the Texas Rangers...that breaks down to 168-155 in Oakland and 149-173 in Texas...have an all-time record of 414-410 against the Rangers/Senators.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Coco Crisp is batting .386 (22 for 57) with 17 runs, six doubles, two home runs, nine RBI and 11 walks over his last 16 games...Sean Doolittle has a 21.1 innings scoreless streak, which is a career-high and the longest active streak in the American League...Derek Norris leads AL catchers in RBI (29) and a .308 (45 for 146) batting average and is tied for the lead in home runs (7).

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In 1984 Davey Lopes hits an inside-the park home run in the A's 10-2 win over the Kansas City Royals...in 1993 the A's overcome a then club record eight-run deficit to defeat the Kansas City Royals 10-9....trailing 8-0 entering the bottom of the second, the A's score twice in the second and six times in the fifth before Craig Paquette's two-run seventh inning homer puts the A's ahead for good...in 1996 Mark McGwire homers in the fifth inning of the A's 8-5 win at Detroit to extend his Oakland record streak of consecutive games reaching base to 62.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Sonny Gray (6-3, 2.93 ERA)

TWO-GAME LOSING STREAK: Has lost each of his last two starts (8 er in 11.1 ip, 6.35 ERA), marking the first time he has lost consecutive decisions in his career.

LAST FOUR STARTS: Is 1-2 with a 5.63 ERA (15 er in 24.0 ip) and .283 (26 for 92) opponents batting average over his last four starts...went 5-1 with a 1.99 ERA and .206 opponents average over his first 10 starts.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks fifth in the American League in opponents slugging percentage (.324), eighth in opponents batting average (.227) and ninth in ERA (2.93) and opponents on-base percentage (.294)...is also tied for second in shutouts (1) and tied for fifth in complete games (1) and wild pitches (6)...has not committed an error and his 28 total chances are the most among AL pitchers with no errors.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Opponents are batting .153 (13 for 85) with a double and a

home run (.200 slugging percentage) when leading off an inning...the batting average and slugging percentage are the lowest in the majors and his .234 on-base percentage is sixth lowest...has allowed a .170 (25 for 147) career batting average and .204 slugging percentage (two doubles, one home run) against batters leading off an inning...the opponents number four hitter is batting .108 (4 for 37), which is second lowest in the American League...has allowed a .134 (21 for 157) batting average with two strikes...has surrendered six home runs all solo shots...has yielded just 10 home runs in 156.0 career innings (0.58 per nine innings).

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 5-1 with a 2.38 ERA (11 er in 41.2 ip) in six starts against American League West competition compared to 1-2 with a 3.40 ERA (19 er in 50.1 ip) in eight starts against everyone else...is now 7-2 with a 1.85 ERA (16 er in 77.2 ip) in 12 career appearances against the West compared to 4-4 with a 3.79 ERA (33 er in 78.1 ip) against all other teams.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-1 with a 2.18 ERA (10 er in 41.1 ip) and .166 (24 for 145) opponents batting average in six starts on the road compared to 3-2 with a 3.55 ERA (20 er in 50.2 ip) and .273 (53 for 194) opponents average in seven starts at home...ranks ninth in the American League in road ERA.

MONTH BY MONTH: His ERA has increased each month of the season...did not allow a run in one start in March, went 4-1 with a 2.06 ERA in April, 1-0 with a 3.00 ERA in May and is 1-2 with a 5.50 ERA (11 er in 18.0 ip) over his first three starts in June...was named American League Pitcher of the Month for the month of April...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings and held the opposition to a .211 batting average...tied for the AL lead in wins in April and ranked fourth in ERA (2.06)...became the sixth A's pitcher since 1993 to win four games in April (Kazmir, 2014; Cahill, 2011; Mulder and Zito, 2003; Rogers, 1998).

THAT'S ODD: Has a 4.81 ERA (26 er in 48.2 ip) in odd numbered innings compared to a 0.83 ERA (4 er in 43.1 ip) in even numbered innings...has a 5.14 ERA (8 er in 14.0 ip) in the first inning this year and a 5.63 ERA (15 er in 24.0 ip) in his career.

THIS AND THAT: Has received run support of two runs or fewer in seven of his 14 starts...the A's have been shut out three times this year, all in his starts...the A's are 8-6 (.571) in his starting assignments this year and are 14-10 (.583) when he starts in his career...has allowed two runs or fewer in 12 of his 24 career starts.

SIX INNINGS OR MORE, THREE RUNS OR FEWER: Allowed four runs in 6.0 innings May 27 against Detroit, snapping his season-opening streak of 10 consecutive starts with six innings or more and three runs or fewer...that is the longest such streak to start a season by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1914...it is the longest such streak by an American League pitcher to start a season since Pedro Martinez had a 12-game streak in 2001.

10th CAREER WIN: Recorded his 10th career win in his 21st career game May 16 at Cleveland...is the fifth pitcher in Oakland history to reach 10 career wins in 21 games or fewer: Tim Hudson (18 games), Barry Zito (19), A.J. Griffin (20) and Bill Krueger (20).

a run on Opening Day (Tim Hudson, 2003)...it was the first Opening Day start of his career...becomes the ninth different Opening Day starter for the A's in the last nine years (Anderson, McCarthy, Cahill, Sheets, Braden, Blanton, Haren, Zito)...became the fifth youngest Opening Day starting pitcher in Oakland history (Blue, Hunter, Cahill, Odom)...was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-3 win over Seattle April 6 in Oakland...did not allow a run in the first inning to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high 14.0 innings (previous: 13.0, August 10-20, 2013)...was the winning pitcher in the A's 3-1 win at Seattle April 12...struck out a career-high tying nine batters...won his third consecutive start in the A's 11-3 win over Houston April 18 in Oakland...allowed a career-high nine hits...was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-0 loss to Texas April 23 in Oakland...walked a career-high four batters...the loss snapped a career-high six-game winning streak dating back to September 11, 2013...went 6-0 with a 2.35 ERA over that eight-start stretch...allowed just two home runs in 46.0 innings during the winning streak...tossed his first career complete game and shutout, a two-hitter in the A's 4-0 win at Texas April 28...became just the fifth pitcher (third visiting pitcher) to allow two hits or fewer in a shutout at Globe Life Park, the first since Matt Garza (Aug. 15, 2008)...had a no decision in the A's 3-2, 10-inning win at Boston May 4...blanked the Red Sox on one hit over the first four innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high tying 14.0 innings...was the winning pitcher in the A's 11-1 win at Cleveland May 16...matched his career-high with nine strikeouts...was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-3 loss at Baltimore June 7...tossed a season-low 5.1 innings and matched his career-high by walking four batters.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-0 loss to New York last Friday in Oakland...allowed two runs in the first inning on a RBI single by Ellsbury and a sacrifice fly by Teixeira...also yielded a RBI single to Gardner in the second...retired 14 of the final 15 batters he faced...Phelps, Betances and Ramirez combined to shutout the A's on two hits.

GRAY vs. TEXAS: Is 1-1 with a 1.69 ERA (16.0 ip, 7 h, 3 r, 3 er, 5 bb, 14 so, 1 hr) in two career starts, both this year...the loss came in a 3-0 decision in Oakland April 23...walked a career-high four batters...allowed a RBI triple to Rios in the first, a RBI single to Choice in the fifth and a solo home run to Murphy in the sixth...Perez shut out the A's on three hits and two walks...then tossed his first career complete game and shutout, a two-hitter in the A's 4-0 win at Texas April 28...became just the fifth pitcher (third visiting pitcher) to allow two hits or fewer in a shutout at Globe Life Park, the first since Matt Garza (Aug. 15, 2008)...allowed a Martin single in the third and a Rios single in the seventh.

LHP Scott Kazmir (7-2, 2.20 ERA): Is 3-0 with a 0.95 ERA over his last four starts and has allowed two runs or fewer in each start...has allowed one run or fewer in five of his last seven starts and is 4-1 with a 1.44 ERA and .188 opponents batting average over that span...leads the American League in opponents batting average (.206), ranks second in ERA (2.05) and opponents slugging percentage (.204), third in opponents on-base percentage (.262) and tied for third in wins (8)...is 4-1 with a 1.45 ERA in six starts at home...has the lowest home ERA in the AL and third lowest in the majors...has allowed a .117 batting average with runners in scoring position, which is the lowest mark in the majors...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 5-1 A's win over New York last Saturday in Oakland (6.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 0 er, 3 bb, 2 so)...is 8-8 with a 4.04 ERA in 26 career starts against Boston...the starts and losses are his most against any team...made one start last year with Cleveland, a no decision in a 7-4 loss at Boston May 25 (5.0 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 2 er, 4 bb, 6 so).

THURSDAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Scott Kazmir (8-2, 2.05 ERA)

RECENTLY: Is 3-0 with a 0.95 ERA (3 er in 28.1 ip) over his last four starts and has allowed two runs or fewer in each start...has allowed one run or fewer in five of his last seven starts and is 4-1 with a 1.44 ERA (7 er in 43.2 ip) and .188 (29 for 154) opponents batting average over that span.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Leads the American League in opponents batting average (.206), ranks second in ERA (2.05) and opponents slugging percentage (.294), third in opponents on-base percentage (.262), tied for third in wins (8) and tied for fifth in winning percentage (.800)...also has the second highest run support (6.75), ranks fourth in fewest pitches per inning (14.7), fifth in fewest pitches per game (93.0), tied for fifth in complete games (1) and wild pitches (6) and eighth in fewest home runs per nine innings (0.51).

HOME AND AWAY: Is 4-1 with a 1.45 ERA (7 er in 43.1 ip) in six starts at home compared to 4-1 with a 2.62 ERA (13 er in 44.2 ip) in seven starts on the road...has the lowest home ERA in the American League and third lowest in the majors...has walked five batters in 43.1 innings at home and 15 in 44.2 innings on the road.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .117 (7 for 60) batting average with runners in scoring position, which is the lowest mark in the majors...opponents are 1 for 25 (.040) with RISP and two outs...has not walked a batter to lead off an inning and is one of two pitchers in the majors who have not walked a batter with enough innings to qualify for the ERA title (Hudson, SF)...opponents are batting .239 (21 for 89) with a .256 on-base percentage (two hit batters) and .284 slugging percentage (four doubles) when leading off an inning...the slugging percentage is fifth lowest in the AL...has yielded a .187 (47 for 252) average against right-handers compared to .279 (19 for 68) against left-handers...the mark against righties ranks fourth lowest in the AL...has surrendered all five of his home runs this year and 21 of his 24 over the last two years to righties...four of the home runs this year have been solo shots as have 17 of his 24 over the last two years.

LAST 32 STARTS: Has allowed one run or fewer in eight of his 14 starts this year and 16 of his last 32 starts dating back to June 21, 2013...is 15-7 with a 2.59 ERA (55 er in 191.0 ip) and .224 (160 for 714) opponents batting average over that stretch...has walked 44

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 4-0 with a 1.09 ERA (5 er in 41.1 ip) in six starts during the day compared to 4-2 with a 2.89 ERA (15 er in 46.2 ip) in eight starts at night...ranks second in the American League in day ERA...is now 9-2 with a 2.34 ERA (25 er in 96.1 ip) in 16 starts during the day over the last two years and 9-9 with a 3.97 ERA (66 er in 149.2 ip) in 27 starts at night.

MONTH BY MONTH: Is 2-0 with a 0.93 ERA (2 er in 19.1 ip) in three starts in June...went 2-2 with a 2.67 ERA and .220 opponents batting average in five starts in May after going 4-0 with a 2.11 ERA and .206 opponents batting average in six starts in April...tied for the American League lead in wins in April, ranked sixth in ERA and eighth in opponents batting...is the sixth A's pitcher since 1993 to win four games in April (Gray, 2014; Cahill, 2011; Mulder and Zito, 2003; Rogers, 1998)...of those six, only Cahill was undefeated (Cahill started the season 6-0)...it was the fifth time he won four or more games in a month in his career, the first time in April...his last four-win month was June of 2010 with Los Angeles (AL)...had 35 strikeouts, which was the fifth highest April strikeout total in Oakland history.

GO THE DISTANCE: Tossed his second career complete game May 28, a six-hitter in the A's 3-1 win over Detroit in Oakland...his other complete game was a two-hit shutout against Boston on July 3, 2006...went 161 starts between complete games, which is the seventh longest streak of consecutive starts without a complete game in Major League history.

2014 HIGHLIGHTS: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-1 win over Cleveland in the day game *April* 2...tossed 7.1 shutout innings and allowed just three hits...is the only Athletics pitcher since at least 1914 to toss at least seven shutout innings and not walk a batter in his A's debut...combined with Abad, Otero, Gregerson and Doolittle on a three-hit shutout in the A's 3-0 win at Seattle *April* 13...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits but had a no decision as the A's scored twice in the eighth and once in the ninth...was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-3 win at Texas *April* 29 to start a season 4-0 for the first time in his career...was charged with his first loss of the season in the A's 4-2 loss to Seattle *May* 5....that snapped a careerhigh tying six-game winning streak dating back to Sept. 21, 2013 (also

- Made two rehab appearances with Single-A Stockton April 3 and 5 against Visalia (1.2 ip, 2 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 2 so, 1 hr, 10.80 ERA) and was reinstated from the DL April 7.
- Was placed on the DL a second time May 9, retroactive to May 8, with a strained right forearm.

COCO CRISP

- Was on his 10th Opening Day roster (2004-09, 11-14) and made his ninth career Opening Day start, his fourth straight with the A's.
- Hit his first career game-ending home run April 3 against Seattle...it was his sixth regular season "walk-off" RBI.
- Committed his first error of the season April 18, snapping a 145-game errorless streak, which was
 fifth longest in Oakland history by an outfielder...it was his first error since Aug. 23, 2012.
- His second at bat May 18 at Cleveland was the 5000th of his career.
- Had an 11-game hitting streak from May 26 to June 7 (15 for 39, .385).

JOSH DONALDSON

- Had a 0-for-20 streak from April 2 to 6, which was a career high at the time.
- Had a 10-game hitting streak from April 6-16 (16 for 48, .333), which fell one short of his career high.
- Had his first career two-homer game April 24 at Houston...his second came on May 30 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Reached base safely via hit or walk in a career-high 29 consecutive games from April 6 through the
 first game of the May 7 doubleheader...hit .303 (36 for 119) 24 runs, 10 doubles, seven home runs,
 24 RBI, 16 walks and a hit by pitch (1 sf, .387 on-base percentage) during the streak.
- Homered in three consecutive games for the second time in his career May 13-16 (also: Aug. 29-31, 2012)
- Scored a career-high four runs May 18 at Cleveland.
- Hit his second career walk-off home run May 28 against Detroit...his other was also against the Tigers (April 12, 2013)...it was his fourth career game-ending RBI.
- Went 0 for 5 June 3 at New York, snapping his 47-game streak of reaching base safely as a third
 baseman...that was the longest such streak by an Athletics third baseman since at least 1914...it also
 snapped his streak of 30 consecutive games reaching base safely on the road dating back to Sept. 28
 of last year...that was the longest such streak by an Athletic since Mark McGwire had a 55-game
 streak from Sept. 3, 1995-July 26, 1996.
- Struck out a career-high four times June 7 at Baltimore.
- Committed three errors June 9 at Los Angeles (AL) to become the fourth third baseman in Oakland history with three or more errors in a game...the last was Marco Scutaro, who had an Oakland record four on July 6, 2007 against Seattle.

SEAN DOOLITTLE

 Agreed to terms on a five-year contract through the 2018 season with club options for 2019 and 2020, April 18.

SAM FULD

- Is the first Athletic to triple in each of his first two games with the A's since Bob Dillinger did it with the Philadelphia A's, April 18-19, 1950.
- Was designated for assignment April 12 and claimed off waivers by Minnesota April 20.

CRAIG GENTRY

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was placed on the 15-day DL March 29 retroactive to March 21 with a lower back sprain...did not play in a Major League game during the spring.
- Went 6 for 12 (.500) with two runs, a double, four RBI, a walk and two strikeouts in three games (one
 in each outfield position) with Triple-A Sacramento and Single-A Stockton on a rehab assignment
 before he was reinstated from the DL April 12.

LUKE GREGERSON

Was on his sixth consecutive Opening Day roster, his first with the A's.

A.J. GRIFFIN

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was placed on the 15-day DL March 29 retroactive to March 21 with a flexor muscle strain.
- Underwent successful reconstructive surgery to repair the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow April 30...the surgery was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston.
- Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 4

JOHN JASO

Went 0 for 2 in his second game of the season to snap a streak where he reached base safely via hit, walk or hit by pitch in 28 consecutive starts behind the plate dating back to May 4 of last year... that matched the longest such streak by a catcher in Oakland history (Gene Tenace, June 12-Sept. 25, 1973).

- Hit his second career pinch hit home run April 14 at Los Angeles (AL)...the other was also at Los Angeles on April 9, 2013.
- Struck out four times April 21 against Texas for the second time in his career (also Sept. 16, 2011 at
 Boston)...also stole a base to become the first Athletic since at least 1914 to strikeout at least four
 times in a nine-inning game and steal a base...is the first Major League catcher to do it since at least
 1914
- Had his fourth career walk-off RBI May 9 against Washington, his first as an Athletic.
- Hit his third career leadoff home run May 14 against Chicago (AL), his first since Sept. 4, 2010 at Baltimore.

JIM JOHNSON

Was on his sixth consecutive Opening Day roster, his first with the A's.

ARNOLD LEON

 Was recalled from Sacramento May 7 for the doubleheader against Seattle but did not pitch in either game...was sent back to Sacramento following the game.

JOSH LINDBLOM

 Was recalled from Sacramento April 2 to start the night game of the day/night doubleheader against Cleveland...allowed two runs on five hits in 4.2 innings for a no decision and was optioned back to Sacramento following the game.

JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying 16-game reaching base streak from April 19 to May 6 (also July 26-Aug. 21, 2010)...went 18 for 67 (.269) with six walks and two hit by pitches (.347 on-base percentage) during the streak.
- Had a two-run double in the seventh inning against Chicago (AL) on March 12 for his 500th career hit.

BRANDON MOSS

- Became the A's ninth different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last 10 years March 31 against Cleveland.
- Was hit by a pitch four times in the four-game series against Houston April 24-27, which is the most
 by an Athletic in a series of any length since at least 1914...in Oakland history, only Don Baylor has
 been hit at least four times over a four-game span (5, Sept. 23-27, 1976).
- Tied a Major League record when he was hit by a pitch twice in the ninth inning April 25 at Houston...it marked the eighth time a batter has been hit by a pitch twice in an inning, the first time by an Athletic
- · Played in the 500th game of his career April 25.
- Went 3 for 5 with two home runs and five RBI May 13 against Chicago (AL)...became the first player in Oakland history to hit a home run as both a first baseman and left fielder in one game.
- Matched his career-high with four runs scored, two doubles and three extra base hits May 18 at Cleveland.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of May 12 to 18 after going 10 for 22 (.455) with eight runs, five doubles, one triple, three home runs, 11 RBI and five walks in six games...had a .556 on-base percentage and 1.182 slugging percentage...it was his third career weekly honor.
- Had a streak from May 13 to 23 where each of his 12 hits were for extra bases (six doubles, one
 triple, five home runs)...that is the longest such single season streak in Oakland history, breaking the
 mark of 11 that he set to conclude the 2013 season.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...become the fourth cleanup hitter in Oakland history with a grand slam in the first inning...joins Dave Kingman (June 20, 1984 vs. Kansas City), Mark McGwire (June 26, 1997 vs. Texas) and Matt Stairs (June 6, 2000 vs. San Diego)...his second grand slam came nine days later on June 8 at Baltimore...had no grand slams over the first 531 games of his career.
- Had 19 extra base hits in May to set an Oakland record for extra base hits in the month of May (previous: 18, Giambi in 2001)...had the most extra base hits by an Athletic in any month since

Mark McGwire had 19 in April, 1997...had nine home runs and 25 RBI in May, which were his most ever in a month.

Had his second two-homer game of the season and the sixth of his career June 3 at New York (AL).

DEREK NORRIS

- Had a streak of five consecutive multiple hit games from April 24-30 (11 for 18, .611).
- Had his first career two-homer game May 11 against Washington and also had a career-high six RBI...both of the home runs were three-run shots...is the first Athletic with two three-run homers in one game since Eric Byrnes on July 4, 2004 against San Francisco...both of the home runs came on a 3-0 count...since pitch count data is first available in 1988, he is the only A's player with two 3-0 home runs in his career (source: Stats, Inc. & A's files)...is the first Major Leaguer with two 3-0 homers in one game since Chase Utley on June 28, 2007...the six RBI equal the most by an A's catcher since at least 1914 (Joe Astroth, Sept. 23, 1950 at Washington; Mickey Cochrane, July 30, 1931 vs. St. Louis).
- Hit his first career grand slam May 26 against Detroit.

ERIC O'FLAHERTY

 Was placed on the 60-day disabled list February 17 as he continues his recovery from Tommy John surgery.

JARROD PARKER

- Had no decisions and a 10.61 ERA in three spring training starts before it was announced he would undergo Tommy John surgery for the second time in his career.
- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 20 and had the surgery March 24...the surgery was
 performed by Dr. James Andrews in the Andrews Institute in Pensacola, Florida...also had Tommy
 John surgery October 28, 2009 while a member of the Arizona Diamondbacks organization.

DREW POMERANZ

 Is in his fourth professional season and his fourth season in the majors but is on his first Opening Day roster.

NICK PUNTO

 Was on his 12th Opening Day roster (Philadelphia, 2002-03; Minnesota, 2004-10; Boston, 2012; Los Angeles-NL, 2013).

JOSH REDDICK

- Made his third consecutive Opening Day start in right field and is the first Athletic to make three
 consecutive Opening Day starts in right field since Ruben Sierra (1993-95).
- Had his fourth career game-ending RBI April 19 against Houston, a single in the A's three-run ninth inning.
- Went 2 for 4 with two home runs and six RBI May 16 at Cleveland...the RBI were a career high
 (previous: 5, two times) and it was his fifth career multi-homer game...one of the home runs was a
 grand slam, the second of his career (Aug. 31, 2012 vs. Boston).

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

- Began the season on the disabled list as he continued his recovery from Tommy John surgery...was placed on the 15-day DL March 29 retroactive to March 21.
- Went 1-0 with a 1.04 ERA on an eight-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from April 3 to 28...was reinstated from the DL and optioned to Sacramento April 29.
- Was 1-0 with a 0.73 ERA in 11 appearances with Sacramento when he was recalled by the A's on May 9.
- Made his A's debut May 9 against Washington (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 so)...it was his first Major League appearance since Oct. 3, 2012 at Chicago (NL).
- Logged a 1.13 ERA in six relief appearances before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 1.

 Was batting .364 with three home runs and 19 RBI in 21 games with Sacramento when he was recalled by Oakland June 1.
