ABOUT THE A'S: Won two of three from Baltimore over the weekend to begin post All-Star Break play and are a season-high tying 24 games over .500 for the fourth time...are 4-4 over the last eight games but have won 10 of the last 14 contests and 19 of the last 28...are 61-37 for the season, which is the best record in the majors for the 30th consecutive day (since June 18) and 32nd day this year (also May 21-22)...have held at least a share of first place in the American League West for 98 days (94 alone, four days tied)...have spent at least 100 days in first place nine times in Oakland history but just once over the last 22 years

(2006)...have been alone in first every day since April 28 and have held at least a share of first since April 24...have a two-game lead in the West over the Angels...have held the best record in the AL every day since May 31.

RUN DIFFERENTIAL: The A's defeated Baltimore by eight runs on Sunday, their 12th win by eight or more runs this year...no other team has more than five...those are the most wins by eight or more runs by an A's team since 2005 (13)...for the season, the A's have outscored the opposition by 150 runs, which is the **most in the majors** (Los Angeles-AL, 88)...it is currently the fifth best season run differential in Oakland history (239 in 2001, 180 in 1988, 163 in 1990, 152 in 1975).

PITCHING: The A's have allowed one run or fewer in seven of the last 14 games and have a 2.29 ERA (32 er in 126.0 ip) over that span...rank second in the majors in opponents batting average (.231), slugging percentage (.349) and on-base percentage (.292) and third in ERA (3.12)...have issued the third fewest walks in the American League (265) and have the fourth most shutouts (9).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have allowed one run or fewer in eight of the last 14 games and are 8-4 with a 2.22 ERA (22 er in 89.0 ip) over that span...have a 3.20 ERA (210 er in 591.0 ip) for the season, which is second lowest in the majors (Los Angeles-NL, 3.13)...have the fewest losses in the majors (24) and are tied for the third most wins (42)...are tied for the American League lead in complete games (3).

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .245 (132 for 538) in July, which is the second lowest mark in the American League (CWS, .238)...have scored 63 runs scored in 16 games (3.94 runs per game) after averaging 5.07 runs per game or better in each of the first three months...lead the majors in walks (366), rank second in runs (485), tied for fourth in fewest strikeouts (693), sixth in home runs (101) and on-base percentage (.328), eighth in slugging percentage (.402) and extra base hits (286) and tied for eighth in triples (20)

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 2-1 on this six-game homestand against Baltimore (2-1) and Houston (three games) after going 6-0 on the last homestand against Toronto (4-0) and San Francisco (2-0)...have won eight of the last nine home games, 26 of the last 33 and are 32-16 (.667) at home for the season...that is tied for the best home record in the majors (Los Angeles-AL, 34-17)...went 2-3 on the last road trip to San Francisco (1-1) and Seattle (1-2) and are 28-21 (.571) on the road, which is tied for the fifth best road record in the majors...leave following the game Thursday for a six-game road trip to Texas (three games) and Houston (three games).

THIS AND THAT: After playing 9 of their previous 17 games against teams that were in first place in their division at the time of the game, the A's are scheduled to play each of their next 20 games and 42 of their final 64 against teams currently under .500...A's outfielders have 27 assists, which is tied with the Mets and Diamondbacks for the most in the majors and is two more than the A's season total from last year...the A's have used just 15 manager's replay challenges, which is the fewest in the American League and tied for second fewest in the majors (Cincinnati, 12)...have posted a winning record in 13 consecutive months, which matches the longest such streak in Oakland history (Sept. 1970-Sept. 1972)...have not used a rookie this year, which is the longest season-opening streak by a ML team since the 1971 Baltimore Orioles went the first 152 games (source: Elias).

CLOSE CALLS: Had their seventh walk-off win of the season Friday against Baltimore, which is tied for fourth in the majors...it was the A's h win when trailing after seven innings and their fifth when trailing after eight...both are the most in the majors...the 10 wins when trailing after seven innings are tied for second most in Oakland history (12 in 1969)...are 17-10 in games decided in the last at bat...lead the majors in last at bat wins and are fourth in games decided in the last at bat...have won nine of their last 12 games decided by two runs or fewer after starting the season 12-17...are 40-17 in games decided by three runs or more...are 10-5 (.667) in extra inning games...lead the majors in extra inning wins, are tied for the lead in games and have the fourth best record.

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters lead the American League in walks (16), doubles (5) and extra base hits (8), rank second in RBI (15), tied for second in hits (20), home runs (3) and plate appearances (98), third in slugging percentage (.425) and fourth in on-base percentage (.378)...the 20 pinch hits match the A's season total from last year and the 16 walks are tied for third in the majors.

ON THE BASES: The A's are 54 for 66 (81.8%) in stolen base attempts, which is the second best percentage in the majors (Washington, 85.0%)...opponents have been successful in 55 of their 66 (83.3%) attempts, which is fourth highest in the majors

AT THE BREAK: The A's were 59-36 (.621) at the All-Star Break...the wins are the most in Athletics history before the All-Star Break (previous: 56 in 1971, 1972 and 1973) and the winning percentage is fourth best and the best since 1990 (51-31, .622)...it marked second time in Athletics history the A's had the best record in MLB at the break (1988)...the pitching staff compiled a 3.09 ERA, which is the lowest by an American League team since the Angels had a 2.89 ERA 1989...it was the lowest by an A's team since 1981 (2.81)...outscored the opposition 466-321 and the run differential of 145 was the best in Athletics history, seventh best in AL history and 14th best in Major League history...it was the best by any team since Seattle in 2001 (149)...the pitching staff set a franchise record for strikeouts with 728 (previous: 650 in 2013)...went into the break in sole possession of first place in the AL West for the second consecutive season after a 22-year streak of not being alone in first at the break.

ALL-STARS: The A's had six players named to the American League All-Star team (Céspedes, Donaldson, Doolittle, Kazmir, Moss and Norris) and one named to the National League All-Star team (Samardzija)...had six players appear in the game, matching the most in Athletics history (1973 and 1975).

A's vs. ASTROS: The A's lead the season series 5-2...are 3-0 in Oakland and 2-2 in Houston...have a six-game winning streak Oakland...won the season series last year, 15-4...the 15 wins tied for third most in Oakland history against one team and were the most since going 17-2 against Seattle in 2006...have

won all three season series against the Astros and lead the all-time series, 25-7...that is the best record by a Major League club against another club among teams that have played each other 20 or more times...six of the A's seven losses to Houston have been by one run...are 13-3 in Oakland and 12-4 in Houston.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Sean Doolittle has 14 saves, which is three short of the Athletics record for saves by a left-handed pitcher (17, Embree in 2007)...**Stephen Vogt** is batting .364, which is the best mark in the majors among batters with 100 or more plate appearances

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1905 Weldon Henley no hits the St. Louis Browns, 6-0...it is one of just four wins for Henley all year...in 1996 Mark McGwire singles off Kevin Tapani in the second inning of the A's 6-5 win at Chicago for his 1000th career hit...he becomes the eighth Oakland Athletic to reach the 1000 mark...in 2012 Coco Crisp has a RBI single in the bottom of the 12th inning to lead the A's to a 5-4 win over New York...the win completes the A's second four-game series sweep of the Yankees since 1914.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Scott Kazmir (11-3, 2.38 ERA)

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks third in the American League in ERA (2.38), tied for third in wins (11), fourth in opponents batting average (.206) and on-base percentage (.259), tied for fourth in winning percentage (.769) and fifth in opponents slugging percentage (.318)...also has the third highest run support (6.21), ranks sixth in fewest pitched per game (94.2), tied for seventh in complete games (1) and ninth in fewest pitches per inning (15.3).

THREE-TIME ALL-STAR: Was named to his third American League All-Star team and entered the game to start the sixth inning (0.2 ip, 1 h, 1 so)...struck out Stanton, allowed a double to Ramirez and then got Gordon to ground out...was relieved by Uehara who struck out Mesoraco to end the inning...has not allowed a run in three career All-Star Game appearances (3.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb, 2 so)...represented Tampa Bay in 2006 and 2008 and picked up the win in 2008 at New York (AL) with a scoreless 15th inning in a 4-3 AL victory (1 bb, 1 so).

11-GAME WINNER: Picked up his 11th win of the season in his last start, which are his most ever at the All-Star Break (10 in 2006)...is one of two A's pitchers over the last 10 years to win 11 or more before the break (Colón, 12 in 2013)...joins Mark Mulder (12 in 2003 and 2004) and Barry Zito (11 in 2002) as the only A's left-handers over the last 39 years to win at least 10 games before the break...has reached double figures in wins for the seventh time in his career and is two wins short of his career high of 13 in 2007.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 5-0 with a 1.00 ERA (4 er in 36.0 ip) over his last five starts in Oakland...is 6-1 with a 1.57 ERA (10 er in 57.1 ip) in eight starts at home overall compared to 5-2 with a 3.15 ERA (21 er in 60.0 ip) in 10 starts on the road...has the lowest home ERA in the American League and the second lowest in the majors...is tied for fifth in the AL in home wins...has walked seven batters in 57.1 innings at home and 20 in 60.0 innings on the road.

ONE RUN OR FEWER: Has allowed one run or fewer in 11 of his 19 starts this year and 19 of his last 37 starts dating back to June 21, 2013...is 18-8 with a 2.70 ERA (66 er in 220.1 ip) and .221 (182 for 822) opponents batting average over that stretch...has walked 51

(2.08 per nine innings) and struck out 215 in 220.1 innings (8.78 per nine innings) for a strikeout to walk ratio of 4.22...has yielded just 17 home runs (0.69 per nine innings).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .115 (9 for 78) batting average with runners in scoring position, including .056 (2 for 36) with RISP and two outs...among pitchers that qualify for the ERA title, the marks with RISP and RISP and two outs are the lowest in the majors...has not walked a batter to lead off an inning and is the only pitcher in the majors with 60 or more innings and no walks in that situation...has allowed a .132 (30 for 228) batting average with two strikes, which ranks fourth in the American League among pitchers that qualify for the ERA title...has yielded a .193 (63 for 326) batting average against right-handed hitters, which is fifth lowest in the AL...has surrendered nine of his 10 home runs this year and 25 of his 29 over the last two years to righties...has allowed five home runs over his last five starts (29.1 ip) after surrendering five over his first 14 starts (88.0 ip).

INNING BY INNING: Has allowed 21 of his 33 runs over the first three innings of a game...has a 3.25 ERA (20 er in 55.1 ip) in innings one through three and a 1.60 ERA (11 er in 62.0 ip) from the fourth inning on...has not allowed a run after the sixth innings (12.2 ip).

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 5-0 with a 0.93 ERA (5 er in 48.1 ip) in seven starts during the day compared to 6-3 with a 3.39 ERA (26 er in 69.0 ip) in 12 starts at night...has the lowest day ERA in the majors...has allowed just one home run in 48.1 innings during the day...is now 10-2 with a 2.18 ERA (25 er in 103.1 ip) in 17 starts during the day over the last two years and 11-10 with a 4.03 ERA (77 er in 172.0 ip) in 31 starts at night.

DAYS REST: Is 8-1 with a 2.84 ERA (18 er in 57.0 ip) in nine starts on four days rest compared to 3-2 with a 1.94 ERA (13 er in 60.1 ip) in 10 starts on five days rest or more.

THIS AND THAT: The A's are 15-4 (.789) in his starting assignments...has walked two batters or fewer in 15 of his 19 starts and has tossed six or more innings 15 times...has not allowed a run five times.

2014 HIGHLIGHTS: Tossed 7.1 shutout innings and allowed just three hits in a 6-1 win over Cleveland in the day game *April* 2...is the only Athletics pitcher since at least 1914 to toss at least seven shutout

innings and not walk a batter in his A's debut...extended his seasonopening winning streak to four games April 29 at Texas, marking the first time in his career he started a season 4-0...went 4-0 with a 2.11 ERA and .206 opponents batting average in six starts in April...tied for the American League lead in wins in April, ranked sixth in ERA and eighth in opponents batting...is just the second A's pitcher since 1993 to go 4-0 in April (Cahill, 2011)...it was the fifth time he won four or more games in a month in his career, the first time in April...had 35 strikeouts, which was the fifth highest April strikeout total in Oakland history...was charged with his first loss of the season May 5 against Seattle...it snapped a career-high tying six-game winning streak dating back to Sept. 29, 2013...had a 1.75 ERA and .207 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned eight starts...tossed just 1.1 innings at Cleveland May 17, which was the shortest outing of his career...was ejected by home plate umpire Jerry Layne after walking Aguilar with one out in the second...tossed his second career complete game, a six-hitter in the A's 3-1 win over Detroit May 28 in Oakland...his other complete game was a two-hit shutout against Boston on July 3, 2006...went 161 starts between complete games, which is the seventh longest streak of consecutive starts without a complete game in Major League history...struck out 10 batters *June 3* at New York (AL), his 22nd career 10-strikeout game...had his fourgame winning streak snapped in the A's 10-1 loss at New York (NL) on June 24...had a 1.27 ERA and .184 opponents batting average during the winning streak.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-1 win at San Francisco July 10...tossed 7.0 shutout innings and allowed three base runners to advance into scoring position...retired 12 of the first 13 batters he faced (Hudson walk in third) before Morse singled to lead off the fifth for the Giants first hit...allowed three hits total and walked just one.

RHP Jesse Chavez (7-6, 3.14 ERA): Is 3-5 with a 3.72 ERA and .291 opponents batting average over his last 10 starts after going 4-1 with a 2.54 ERA and .216 opponents average over his first nine starts...is averaging 7.76 strikeouts per nine innings over his last 10 starts (50 so in 58.0 ip) after averaging 9.05 over his first nine starts...is 4-2 with a 2.13 ERA and .219 opponents batting average in seven starts at home compared to 3-4 with a 3.94 ERA and .281 opponents average in 11 starts on the road...ranks fifth in the American League in home ERA...eight of the 10 home runs he has allowed have been solo shots...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 6-02 A's loss at Seattle on July 12 (5.2 ip, 10 h, 3 r, 3 er, 2 bb, 6 so)...the 10 hits were a career-high...is 1-0 with a 2.05 ERA in 17 career appearances, including two starts, against Houston...including 1-0 with a 4.09 ERA (11.0 ip, 12 h, 6 r, 5 er, 5 bb, 11 so, 1 hr) in two starts this year.

- Scored 26 runs in May, which tied for the Major League lead and matched the most in Oakland history in the month of May.
- Went 0 for 5 June 3 at New York, snapping his 47-game streak of reaching base safely as a third
 baseman...that was the longest such streak by an Athletics third baseman since at least 1914...it also
 snapped his streak of 30 consecutive games reaching base safely on the road dating back to Sept. 28
 of last year...that was the longest such streak by an Athletic since Mark McGwire had a 55-game
 streak from Sept. 3, 1995-July 26, 1996.
- Had a career-high 0-for-33 streak from June 6 to 15...the hitless streak tied for seventh longest in Oakland history.
- Struck out a career-high four times June 7 at Baltimore.
- Committed three errors June 9 at Los Angeles (AL) to become the fourth third baseman in Oakland history with three or more errors in a game...the last was Marco Scutaro, who had an Oakland record four on July 6, 2007 against Seattle.
- Was named to his first AL All-Star team and went 0 for 2 with a strikeout as the starting third base-man...became the first Athletic to be elected by the fans since Jason Giambi in 2000 (first base)... received 3,684,820 votes, which was more than 1.1 million ahead of second place Adrian Beltre... is the first A's third baseman to go to the All-Star game since Carney Lansford in 1988...is the fifth Athletic to start at third base in an All-Star Game (Jimmie Foxx, 1934-35; Pinky Higgins, 1936; Jim Finigan, 1955; Sal Bando, 1969)...also participated in the Home Run Derby and lost in a tie breaker to teammate Yoenis Céspedes in the first round.

SEAN DOOLITTLE

 Agreed to terms on a five-year contract through the 2018 season with club options for 2019 and 2020, April 18.

SAM FULD

- Is the first Athletic to triple in each of his first two games with the A's since Bob Dillinger did it with the Philadelphia A's, April 18-19, 1950.
- Was designated for assignment April 12 and claimed off waivers by Minnesota April 20.

CRAIG GENTRY

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was placed on the 15-day DL March 29 retroactive to March 21 with a lower back sprain...did not play in a Major League game during the spring.
- Went 6 for 12 (.500) with two runs, a double, four RBI, a walk and two strikeouts in three games (one
 in each outfield position) with Triple-A Sacramento and Single-A Stockton on a rehab assignment
 before he was reinstated from the DL April 12.
- Stole two bases June 22 against Boston for the seventh multi-steal game of his career.
- Was picked off and caught stealing July 8 against San Francisco, snapping a streak of 28 consecutive stolen bases...it was his first caught stealing since Aug. 12, 2013.
- Doubled in the fifth inning July 8 against San Francisco to snap a streak of 40 consecutive games without an extra base hit...that was the longest streak by an Athletic since Matt Alexander had a 55game streak from May 20, 1975-Aug. 27, 1977.

SONNY GRAY

- Was the A's Opening Night starter on March 31 against Cleveland and had a no decision in the A's 2-0 loss...tossed 6.0 shutout innings to become just the second starting pitcher in Oakland history to not allow a run on Opening Day (Tim Hudson, 2003)...it was the first Opening Day start of his career...becomes the ninth different Opening Day starter for the A's in the last nine years (Anderson, McCarthy, Cahill, Sheets, Braden, Blanton, Haren, Zito)...became the fifth youngest Opening Day starting pitcher in Oakland history (Blue, Hunter, Cahill, Odom).
- Extended his scoreless streak to a career-high 14.0 innings in a 6-3 win over Seattle April 6...had another 14.0-inning scoreless streak from April 23 to May 4.
- Struck out a career-high tying nine batters in a 3-1 victory at Seattle April 12...also fanned nine in an 11-1 win at Cleveland May 16.
- Had his career-high six-game winning streak snapped in the A's 3-0 loss to Texas April 23 in Oak-land...had a 2.35 ERA over that eight-start stretch dating back to Sept. 11, 2013...allowed just two home runs in 46.0 innings during the winning streak
- Tossed his first career complete game and shutout, a two-hitter in the A's 4-0 win at Texas April 28...
 became just the fifth pitcher (third visiting pitcher) to allow two hits or fewer in a shutout at Globe
 Life Park, the first since Matt Garza (Aug. 15, 2008)
- Went 4-1 with a 2.06 ERA in five starts in April and was named American League Pitcher of the Month...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings and held the opposition to a .211 batting average...tied for the AL lead in wins in April and ranked fourth in ERA (2.06)...became the sixth A's pitcher since 1993 to win four games in April (Kazmir, 2014; Cahill, 2011; Mulder and Zito, 2003; Rogers, 1998).
- Allowed four runs in 6.0 innings May 27 against Detroit to snap his season-opening streak of 10 consecutive starts with six innings or more and three runs or fewer...that is the longest such streak to start a season by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1914...it is the longest such streak by an American League pitcher to start a season since Pedro Martinez had a 12-game streak in 2001.
- Lost back-to-back starts June 7 at Baltimore and June 13 against New York (AL), marking the first time he has lost consecutive decisions in his career (6.35 ERA).

LUKE GREGERSON

- Was on his sixth consecutive Opening Day roster, his first with the A's.
- Made his 400th career appearance June 19 against Boston.

A.J. GRIFFIN

- Began the season on the disabled list as he was placed on the 15-day DL March 29 retroactive to March 21 with a flexor muscle strain.
- Underwent successful reconstructive surgery to repair the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow April 30...the surgery was performed by Dr. Thomas Mehlhoff at the Texas Orthopedic Hospital in Houston
- · Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 4

JOHN JASO

- Went 0 for 2 in his second game of the season to snap a streak where he reached base safely via hit, walk or hit by pitch in 28 consecutive starts behind the plate dating back to May 4 of last year... that matched the longest such streak by a catcher in Oakland history (Gene Tenace, June 12-Sept. 25, 1973).
- Hit his second career pinch hit home run April 14 at Los Angeles (AL) and added a third June 22
 against Boston.
- Struck out four times April 21 against Texas for the second time in his career (also Sept. 16, 2011 at
 Boston)...also stole a base to become the first Athletic since at least 1914 to strikeout at least four
 times in a nine-inning game and steal a base...is the first Major League catcher to do it since at least
 1914
- Had his fourth career walk-off RBI May 9 against Washington, his first as an Athletic.
- Hit his third career leadoff home run May 14 against Chicago (AL), his first since Sept. 4, 2010 at Baltimore.
- Had a RBI single in the first inning June 16 against Texas to snap a career-high 0 for 21 streak.

JIM JOHNSON

Was on his sixth consecutive Opening Day roster, his first with the A's.

SCOTT KAZMIR

- Tossed 7.1 shutout innings and allowed just three hits in his A's debut, a 6-1 win over Cleveland in
 the day game April 2...is the only Athletics pitcher since at least 1914 to toss at least seven shutout
 innings and not walk a batter in his A's debut.
- Extended his season-opening winning streak to four games April 29 at Texas, marking the first time in his career he started a season 4-0.
- Went 4-0 with a 2.11 ERA and .206 opponents batting average in six starts in April...tied for the
 American League lead in wins in April, ranked sixth in ERA and eighth in opponents batting...is just
 the second A's pitcher since 1993 to go 4-0 in April (Cahill, 2011)...it was the fifth time he won four
 or more games in a month in his career, the first time in April...had 35 strikeouts, which was the fifth
 highest April strikeout total in Oakland history
- Was charged with his first loss of the season May 5 against Seattle...it snapped a career-high tying six-game winning streak dating back to Sept. 29, 2013...had a 1.75 ERA and .207 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned eight starts...allowed just one home run in 51.1 innings... struck out 56 and walked just 10.
- Tossed just 1.1 innings at Cleveland May 17, which was the shortest outing of his career...was
 ejected by home plate umpire Jerry Layne after walking Aguilar with one out in the second.
- Had a four-game winning streak from May 28 to June 29 (1.27 ERA and .184 opponents batting average).
- Tossed his second career complete game, a six-hitter in the A's 3-1 win over Detroit May 28 in Oakland...did not walk a batter and struck out eight...his other complete game was a two-hit shutout against Boston on July 3, 2006...went 161 starts between complete games, which is the seventh longest streak of consecutive starts without a complete game in Major League history.
- Struck out 10 batters in 6.1 innings June 3 at New York (AL), his 22nd career 10-strikeout game.

ARNOLD LEON

 Was recalled from Sacramento May 7 for the doubleheader against Seattle but did not pitch in either game...was sent back to Sacramento following the game.

JOSH LINDBLOM

 Was recalled from Sacramento April 2 to start the night game of the day/night doubleheader against Cleveland...allowed two runs on five hits in 4.2 innings for a no decision and was optioned back to Sacramento following the game.

JED LOWRIE

- Had a career-high tying 16-game reaching base streak from April 19 to May 6 (also July 26-Aug. 21, 2010)...went 18 for 67 (.269) with six walks and two hit by pitches (.347 on-base percentage) during the streak.
- Had a two-run double in the seventh inning against Chicago (AL) on March 12 for his 500th career hit.
- Snapped a career-high 0 for 21 streak June 11 at Los Angeles (AL).
- Had a career-high streak of five consecutive multiple hit games from July 5-9.

BRANDON MOSS

- Became the A's ninth different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last 10 years March 31 against Cleveland.
- Was hit by a pitch four times in the four-game series against Houston April 24-27, which is the most by an Athletic in a series of any length since at least 1914...in Oakland history, only Don Baylor has been hit at least four times over a four-game span (5, Sept. 23-27, 1976).
- Tied a Major League record when he was hit by a pitch twice in the ninth inning April 25 at Houston...it marked the eighth time a batter has been hit by a pitch twice in an inning, the first time by an Athletic
- Played in the 500th game of his career April 25.
- Went 3 for 5 with two home runs and five RBI May 13 against Chicago (AL)...became the first player in Oakland history to hit a home run as both a first baseman and left fielder in one game.
- Matched his career-high with four runs scored, two doubles and three extra base hits May 18 at Cleveland.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of May 12 to 18 after going 10 for 22 (.455) with
 eight runs, five doubles, one triple, three home runs, 11 RBI and five walks in six games...had a .556
 on-base percentage and 1.182 slugging percentage...it was his third career weekly honor.
- Had a streak from May 13 to 23 where each of his 12 hits were for extra bases (six doubles, one
 triple, five home runs)...that is the longest such single season streak in Oakland history, breaking the
 mark of 11 that he set to conclude the 2013 season.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...become the fourth cleanup hitter in Oakland history with a grand slam in the first inning...joins Dave Kingman (June 20, 1984 vs. Kansas City), Mark McGwire (June 26, 1997 vs. Texas) and Matt Stairs (June 6, 2000 vs. San Diego)...his second grand slam came nine days later on June 8 at Baltimore...had no grand slams over the first 531 games of his career.
- Had 19 extra base hits in May to set an Oakland record for extra base hits in the month of May (previous: 18, Giambi in 2001)...had the most extra base hits by an Athletic in any month since Mark McGwire had 19 in April, 1997...had nine home runs and 25 RBI in May, which were his most ever in a month.
- Had his second two-homer game of the season and the sixth of his career June 3 at New York (AL).
- Had a career-high tying eight-game hitting streak from June 21 to 30 (also Sept. 20-27, 2012)...went 11 for 33 (.333) during the streak.
- Matched his career high with four hits July 2 at Detroit...it was his third career four-hit game, his second at Comerica Park (Aug. 28, 2013).
- Was named to his first AL All-Star as a manager's choice...struck out in his only at bat and played right field.

DEREK NORRIS

- Had a streak of five consecutive multiple hit games from April 24-30 (11 for 18, .611).
- Had his first career two-homer game May 11 against Washington and also had a career-high six RBI...both of the home runs were three-run shots...is the first Athletic with two three-run homers in one game since Eric Byrnes on July 4, 2004 against San Francisco...both of the home runs came on a 3-0 count...since pitch count data is first available in 1988, he is the only A's player with two

- 3-0 home runs in his career (source: Stats, Inc. & A's files)...is the first Major Leaguer with two 3-0 homers in one game since Chase Utley on June 28, 2007...the six RBI equal the most by an A's catcher since at least 1914 (Joe Astroth, Sept. 23, 1950 at Washington; Mickey Cochrane, July 30, 1931 vs. St. Louis).
- Hit his first career grand slam May 26 against Detroit.
- Hit his fourth career pinch hit home run June 17 against Texas...had five RBI in the game to become
 the fourth Athletic since 1914 to have five RBI off the bench (Seth Smith, July 27, 2012 vs. BAL;
 Erubiel Durazo, July 10, 2004 vs. CLE; Mickey Tettleton, Aug. 24, 1986 vs. NYY)...it was his
 second career game of five or more RBI (6, May 11, 2014 vs. Washington).
- Was named to his first AL All-Star team as a manager's choice...went 1-for-2 and scored the winning run while catching four innings...is the first A's catcher to go to the All-Star Game since Ramon Hernandez in 2003...finished second in fan voting with 2,689,324 votes, just 11,986 behind Matt Wieters.

ERIC O'FLAHERTY

 Was placed on the 60-day disabled list February 17 as he continues his recovery from Tommy John surgery.

JARROD PARKER

- Had no decisions and a 10.61 ERA in three spring training starts before it was announced he would undergo Tommy John surgery for the second time in his career.
- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 20 and had the surgery March 24...the surgery was
 performed by Dr. James Andrews in the Andrews Institute in Pensacola, Florida...also had Tommy
 John surgery October 28, 2009 while a member of the Arizona Diamondbacks organization.

DREW POMERANZ

 Is in his fourth professional season and his fourth season in the majors but is on his first Opening Day roster.

NICK PUNTO

- Was on his 12th Opening Day roster (Philadelphia, 2002-03; Minnesota, 2004-10; Boston, 2012; Los Angeles-NL, 2013).
- Played second base, third base and right field June 22 against Boston to become the second player in
 Oakland history to play each of those positions in one game (Jerry Browne, Aug. 1, 1992 at Kansas
 City)...it was his first appearance in the outfield since Aug. 5, 2008 at Seattle and his second career
 appearance in right field (May 5, 2005 vs. Cleveland)
- Had his fourth career walk-off plate appearance July 4 against Toronto when he doubled and Norris
 scored on an error by Cabrera...he does not have an RBI in three of those plate appearance and the
 fourth is a sacrifice fly.

JOSH REDDICK

- Made his third consecutive Opening Day start in right field and is the first Athletic to make three consecutive Opening Day starts in right field since Ruben Sierra (1993-95).
- Had his fourth career game-ending RBI April 19 against Houston, a single in the A's three-run ninth inning.
- Went 2 for 4 with two home runs and six RBI May 16 at Cleveland...the RBI were a career high (previous: 5, two times) and it was his fifth career multi-homer game...one of the home runs was a grand slam, the second of his career (Aug. 31, 2012 vs. Boston).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 3 retroactive to June 1 with a hyperextended right knee...went 7 for 16 (.471) with a run, three doubles, walk, strikeout, stolen base and caught stealing during a four-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from June 18-22 (three in right field, one at designated hitter)...that included a four-hit game at New Orleans June 21...was reinstated from the DL June 24.

FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ

 Began the season on the disabled list as he continued his recovery from Tommy John surgery...was placed on the 15-day DL March 29 retroactive to March 21.

- Went 1-0 with a 1.04 ERA on an eight-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from April 3 to 28...was reinstated from the DL and optioned to Sacramento April 29.
- Was 1-0 with a 0.73 ERA in 11 appearances with Sacramento when he was recalled by the A's on May 9.
- Made his A's debut May 9 against Washington (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 so)...it was his first Major League appearance since Oct. 3, 2012 at Chicago (NL).
- Logged a 1.13 ERA in six relief appearances before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 1.

JOE SAVERY

 Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento May 9 and appeared in just three games without allowing a run (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 bb) before he was optioned back to Sacramento May 18.

EVAN SCRIBNER

Was on the A's Opening Day roster and did not allow a run in two outings (1.1 ip) before he was
optioned to Sacramento April 7 when Ryan Cook was reinstated from the DL.

ERIC SOGARD

- Snapped a career-high 0 for 18 streak with his fifth inning single May 18 at Cleveland.
- Had the second two-steal game of his career June 17 against Texas (June 12, 2013 vs. New York-AL).

STEPHEN VOGT

- Was batting .364 with three home runs and 19 RBI in 21 games with Sacramento when he was recalled by Oakland June 1.
- Became the first player in Oakland history to play catcher, first base and right field in the same game
 June 22 against Boston...it was his Major League debut at first base...had 68 games in the minors
 at first (last in 2012)...since 1914, the only other Athletic to do it was Bert Campaneris, who did it
 Sept. 8, 1965 when he played all nine positions.
