• Was named to the National League All-Star team and tossed a scoreless inning in the game on 7/16 at New York (NL).

- Was successful in each of his first 25 save opportunities thru 6/16.
- Was named the MLB Delivery Man of the Month for the consecutive months of April and May
- Saved his 20th game on 5/26 at Milwaukee just the eighth pitcher since saves became official in 1969 to record at least 20 saves before the end of May.
- Became the eighth Pittsburgh pitcher to record 30 saves in a season and the fastest to do so (since 1969) when he earned his 30th on 7/21 at Cincinnati.

#### **2013 POSTSEASON:**

• Posted a 0.00 ERA (3.1 IP) in four appearances...Pitched a perfect ninth inning in the Wild Card Game vs. Cincinnati on 10/1...Struck out three of the four batters he faced in the ninth inning during Pittsburgh's 7-1 win in Game Two of the Division Series at St. Louis on 10/4 and earned the save in Game Three at PNC Park on 10/6.

#### **CAREER SUMMARY**

- **2012:** Established career highs in appearances and strikeouts while spending entire season with Pittsburgh...Ranked seventh among National League relief pitchers in strikeouts and fourth with a 13.81 strikeout/per 9.0 IP..
- **2011:** Began season with Lehigh Valley (Phillies' AAA), where he posted a 1.93 ERA and held opposing hitters to a .217 batting average in 28 relief appearances... Posted a 1.47 ERA (18.1 IP/3 ER) in 17 games at PNC Park...Allowed just two of his 19 inherited runners to score...Pitched at least 1.0 inning in 22 of his 28 games with Pittsburgh.
- **2010:** Was with the Cleveland organization, but missed entire season recovering from right knee surgery.

2013: His 33 saves (in 35 chances) ranked tied for the seventh in the National League while his 94.3 save percentage ranked tied for second in the National League and tied for third in the Majors behind Miami's Steve Cishek (94.4) and Toronto's Casey Janssen (94.4).

- Named the Padres' Darrel Akerfelds Bullpen Award winne
- Was 2-1 and 18-for-19 in save opportunities with a 0.89 ERA (3 ER, 30.1 IP) with 31 strikeouts in his final 31 relief appearances (June 26-end of season)...began the season with a 0-4 record and a 4.78 ERA (14 ER, 26.1 IP) with 15 strikeouts in his first 27 relief appearances.

- Recorded 30+ saves for the third time in his career (2006, 2009)...recorded 20+ saves for the seventh time in his nine Major League seasons.
- Tossed 20.1 consecutive scoreless innings (June 26-September 3), limiting opposing hitters to a .119 (8-for-67) batting average.

2012: In his first season with the Padres, posted the best save percentage among all qualifying National League closers, going 23-for-24 in save opportunities, while also being honored with his first career All-Star selection.

- · His 95.8 (23-for-24) save percentage ranked second-best overall among qualifying Major League relievers and was the third-best among qualifying relievers in Padres franchise history (Rod Beck, 100.0 in 2003 and Trevor Hoffman, 98.1 in 1998).
- Named to the 2012 National League All-Star team, but did not pitch in the game.
- Posted a career-best 21.1 scoreless innings streak from June 20-August 10, second-longest streak by a Padres
- pitcher in 2012 behind Luke Gregerson's 23.0 scoreless innings streak.
  Converted 23-straight save opportunities from the start of the season up until his last outing, the second-longest save streak by a National League reliever in 2012 (Aroldis Chapman, CIN, 27-straight saves converted).
  Began the season by posting a 0.93 ERA (1 ER, 9.2 IP) and 13 strikeouts against just two walks and three hits
- allowed in his first 10 outings before landing on the 15-day DL on May 5 with a strained right lat.

  Went 2-0 with a 0.68 ERA (2 ER, 26.1 IP), 17 saves in 17 chances and 32 strikeouts against just six walks and eight hits allowed for a .093 (8-for-86) opponents batting average from June 5-August 10 after being reinstated from the DL.
- · Had his first and only blown save of the season in his last outing of the year on September 30 vs. SF, allowing two home runs and a season-high three runs, his only home runs allowed in 2012 and his only game allowing multiple runs.
- · Pitched on zero days of rest 11 times in 2012, converting all nine of his save opportunities on such occasions and not allowing a run in his 11.0 innings of work.

- Named MLB Delivery Man of the Month for April after leading the Majors with 10 saves in 10 opportunities...posted a 2.20 ERA (4 ER, 16.1 IP) with 17 strikeouts in 15 April appearances
- Picked up 2ê of his saves prior to the All-Star break (26-for-28) and just three after the break (3-for-5)...made only 19 appearances after the break
- Posted a 2.15 ERA (7 ER, 29.1 IP) in his 30 road outings, converting 18 of 20 save opportunities.
- · Finished the season with his third-highest save total and fifth-best save percentage in Rockies history...moved into third place on the Rockies all-time saves list with 84.

2010: Spent his second full season with the Rockies but missed the first 69 games of the year on the DL with an inflamed right shoulder

- Reinstated from the DL on June 22 and made his first appearance of the season that night.

2009; In his first season with Colorado, converted 35 saves in 37 opportunities...second-highest save total of his career and just the seventh 30-save season in franchise history.

- Led all COL relievers with four wins.
- Converted 26 consecutive save chances from June 8-September 27, the longest streak by any NL pitcher that season and a new franchise record...his 94.5 save percentage was second in the NL and also the highest mark in COL history.
- Posted a 5.38 strikeout/walk ratio that ranked second in the NL (behind Chad Qualls, 6.43).
- Named the NL Co-Player of the Week for week ending June 14 (1.93 ERA, 5 games, 5 saves), his first career
- · Made three appearances for COL in the NLDS and was pinned with two losses vs. PHI.

2008; Began the season as the A's closer but was replaced toward the end of the season, converting 18 saves in 25 opportunities.

- Charged with a blown save and loss on Opening Day in Japan, March 25 vs. BOS.
- Tied for third among AL relievers with seven wins and tied for sixth with five losses.

2007: Made 48 appearances, recording 16 saves while missing two months of the season on the DL.

- Ranked third among AL relievers, averaging 11.34 strikeouts per 9.0 IP.
- Placed on the 15-day DL May 15 (retro to May 13) with an irritation of the right ulnar nerve...reinstated July 23 and used as a setup man immediately following his return from the DL and resumed his role as closer on August 15.

2006: Tied for fourth in the American League with a career-high 37 saves, despite missing a total of 29 games due

- Tied for the third-best single-season save total by a 23-year-old in MLB history.
- Also pitched for the United States in the World Baseball Classic, working scoreless ball over 3.0 innings and three
- Recorded a save in five straight A's games from June 8-13, becoming the first A's pitcher to do so since Billy Koch in 2002.
- Saved all three games of a series June 9-11 at NYY and August 11-13 vs. TB.

  Placed on the 15-day DL August 19 for the first time in his career with a strained right groin.
- Saw his first postseason action, making five relief appearances between the ALDS and ALCS...went 0-1 while picking up two saves in his only opportunities.

2005: Named AL Rookie of the Year by the Baseball Writers Association of America after leading all Major League rookies with 23 saves...became the sixth Oakland Athletic to win the award and at the time was just the third closer

- to be named AL Rookie of the Year, joining Gregg Olson (1989) and Kazuhiro Sasaki (2000).

  Also named AL Rookie Player of the Year by *The Sporting News* and received the Players Choice Award for the AL's Outstanding Rookie and was named Rookie of the Year by Baseball America.
- Took over as the A's closer following the injury to Octavio Dotel in May and set the Oakland rookie record for saves. his 23 saves were tied for seventh-most ever by an AL rookie and were fourth-most ever by a player 22-years-old or vounger.
- Tied for second among AL rookies in appearances, ranked eighth in strikeouts, ninth in wins and was 10th in innings pitched...his 67 appearances were second-most ever by an Oakland rookie.
- Ranked second among all AL relievers in ERA, behind only Mariano Rivera...third-lowest relief ERA in OAK history.
- Named to the A's Opening Day Roster and made his ML debut April 6 at BAL...first A's player to make his MLB debut within a year of begin drafted since Ariel Prieto went straight to the Majors in 1995.

2004: Made his professional debut pitching for all three levels of the OAK farm system...combined to go 1-1 with eight saves and a 1.38 ERA (4 ER, 26.0 IP) in 21 outings between Single-A Kané County, Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento.

#### PERSONAL

Huston Lowell Street...he and his wife, Lacey, have two sons, Ripken and Ryder...a graduate of Westlake (TX) High School in 2001...played for the the US national team following his 2002 and 2003 seasons at the University of Texas at Austin…led the Longhorns to three consecutive College World Series appearances and was named the 2002 CWS Most Outstanding Player after saving four games, including the championship game against South Carolina...named All-Big 12 selection from 2002-04...his late father, James, was a star quarterback at Texas, winning 20 consecutive games at one point and leading the Longhorns to a national championship in 1969...James Street also posted a 29-8 record pitching for Texas, leading three UT teams to the College World Series...originally signed by Athletics' scout Blake Davis.
