OAKLAND ATHLETICS (88-74) VS. KANSAS CITY ROYALS (89-73)

ABOUT THE A'S: The A's compiled an 88-74 record to earn the second Wild Card spot in the American League...finished with the fewest wins for a playoff team in Oakland history...the previous low was 90 by the 1974 A's...finished in second place in the AL West, 10 games behind Los Angeles...it marked the 12th time in the last 16 seasons the A's finished first or second in the West...the A's largest lead in the West was six games as late as June 21 and the largest lead over the third place team in the Wild Card was 11½ games on July 18...were a season-high 28 games over .500 at the conclusion of play Aug. 9...had a four-game lead in the West and an 11-game lead over the third place team in the Wild Card at the time...then went 16-30 (.348) the rest of the way, which was the second worst record in the majors (Arizona, 13-32, .289)...went into a four-game series at Anaheim Aug. 28-31 with a 78-54 record, which was one game behind the Angels...were swept in the four-game series and went 10-20 (.333) over the final 30 games beginning Aug. 28, which was the third worst record in the majors (Arizona and Milwaukee, 9-20 .310).

A's IN POSTSEASON: The A's return to postseason play for the third consecutive season and eighth time in the last 15 years...only the Yankees (12), Cardinals (11) and Braves (9) have made more postseason appearances over that span...this is the fifth time in Athletics history the A's appeared in the postseason in at least three straight seasons (1929-31, 1971-75, 1988-90, 2000-03)...this will be the 26th postseason appearance in franchise history, which includes 18 with Oakland and eight with Philadelphia...the A's have an all-time record of 82-75 (.522) in the postseason...this is the A's second postseason appearance as a Wild Card team, their first since the single-game Wild Card playoff game was instituted...the previous was in 2001 when they went 102-60 but finished 14 games behind Seattle.

A's AND ROYALS IN THE POSTSEASON: The A's and Royals will meet in the postseason for the second time...the other time came in the 1981 American League Division Series...the A's went 37-23 before the strike, which was the best record in the AL West, and the Royals went 30-23 following the strike, which was the best record in the West...the A's swept the ALDS, outscoring Kansas City 10-2...Mike Norris tossed a four-hit 4-0 shutout in Game 1 and Steve McCatty went the distance in a 2-1 win in Game 2...the series moved to Oakland for Game 3, which the A's won, 4-1.

WILD CARD ROSTER: Seven of the 25 players on the A's Wild Card roster have not appeared in a postseason game (Abad, Burns, Dunn, Freiman, Gregerson, Parrino, Pomeranz)...seven have played in each of the previous two postseasons with the A's (Cook, Crisp, Donaldson, Doolittle, Moss, Norris, Reddick)...two players have played in a Wild Card game (Fuld, Soto).

AFTER THE ALL-STAR BREAK: The A's went 29-38 (.433) after the All-Star Break, which tied for the fourth worst record in the American League...it was the lowest post All-Star Break winning percentage in Major League history by a team that reached the playoffs...the previous low was .466 (34-39) by the 2005 San Diego Padres...the A's are the 10th team in Major League history to post a losing record after the All-Star Break and make the playoffs...three of the previous nine went on to win the World Series (1987 Twins, 1990 Reds, 2006 Cardinals)...hit .233 after the break, which was the lowest mark in the AL, fourth lowest in the majors and third lowest in Oakland history...hit 48 home runs after the break, which were the fewest post-break home runs by an A's team in a non-strike season since 1979 (44).

OFFENSE: The A's batted .244, which was fourth lowest in the American League...however, **led the majors** with 586 walks and ranked fifth in the AL in on-base percentage (.320)...led the AL in triples (33), ranked third in runs scored (729), eighth in home runs (146) and ninth in slugging percentage (.381)...the triples tied for sixth most in Oakland history and were the most by an A's team since the 1987 club also had 33...struck out 1104 times, which was second fewest in the majors (Kansas City, 985)...ranked third in the AL in bunt hits (25), which were the most by an A's team since 1999 (27).

PITCHING: The A's compiled a 3.22 ERA, which ranked second in the American League and third in the majors...it was the seventh lowest ERA in Oakland history and was the lowest since 1990 (3.18)...allowed a .290 opponents on-base percentage, which was the **lowest by a Major League team since Houston had a mark of .289 in 1981**...it was the lowest by an AL team in the designated hitter era (1973-present) and second lowest in Oakland history (.284 in

1972)...had the lowest OPS in the majors (.646) and the second lowest opponents batting average (.233) and slugging percentage (.356)...set an Athletics franchise record for strikeouts for the third time in the last four years with 1244...broke the previous mark of 1183 set in 2013...however, tied for sixth in the AL in strikeouts in 2014...issued just 406 walks, which was second fewest in the AL (New York, 398) and the fewest by an A's team in a non-strike season since 1944 (390)...averaged 2.50 walks per nine innings, which was the **third lowest mark in Athletics history and the lowest since 1904** (2.42)...had a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 3.06, which ranked third in the AL and was the best mark in Athletics history (2.76 in 2013).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers were 62-51 with a 3.37 ERA...led the American League and ranked fourth in the majors in ERA...the ERA was eighth lowest in Oakland history and was the lowest since 1989 (3.34)...also led the AL in opponents on-base percentage (.295), tied for the lead in complete games (7), ranked second in opponents batting average (.237) and innings pitched (996.0) and third in opponents slugging percentage (.368)...the A's had four pitchers aged 30 or older start a game in 2014 (Kazmir 32, Chavez 21, Hammel 12, Lester 11), which were their most since 2000 (Appier, Heredia, Olivares, Prieto)...had just one 30-year old start a game over the previous three seasons (Colón).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's compiled a 48-33 (.593) record at home compared to 40-41 (.494) on the road...tied for the third best home record in the American League and had the eighth best road record...this marks just the second time in Athletics history the A's reached the postseason with a losing record on the road (39-42 in 2003)...started the year 18-6 (.750) on the road but then went 22-35 (.386) over their final 57 road games...batted .234 on the road, which was second lowest in the AL and in Oakland history (.230 in 1968)...won 16 home series, lost eight and split two...won 12 road series, lost 10 and split four.

THIS AND THAT: The A's went 21-28 (.429) in one-run games, which tied for the third worst record in the American League...the 28 one-run losses tied for the most in the AL, tied for fourth most in Oakland history and were the most since the 1986 club lost 29...the A's led the majors in run differential (+157)...became the third team since the Wild Card began in 1995 to lead the majors in run differential and not win their division...the other two, Anaheim (2002) and New York-AL (2010), were also Wild Cards...A's pinch hitters led the AL in doubles (8) and walks (25), ranked second in hits (32), extra base hits (11) and plate appearances (186), tied for second in home runs (3) and third in RBI (22)...the doubles were the most by an A's team in the designated hitter era, the walks and plate appearances were second most and the extra base hits tied for second.

RECENTLY: A's starting pitchers have not walked a batter in the last five games, which is the longest such streak in Oakland history...last walked a batter Sept. 23 against the Angels in the seventh inning (Cron by Gray), a streak of 36.0 innings...A's pitchers have not walked a batter in the last four games, which matches the longest streak by an A's team since at least 1914...last walked a batter Sept. 24 against the Angels in the ninth inning (Iannetta by Doolittle), a streak of 34.1 innings...A's pitchers have a 2.67 ERA (50 er in 168.1 ip) over the last 19 games...A's starting pitchers are 6-9 with a 2.62 ERA (47 er in 161.2 ip) over the last 24 games...the A's have been shut out five times in the last 29 games and are batting .220 (213 for 967) with 92 runs scored (3.17 per game) over that span...were shutout just six times over the first 133 contests.

A's vs. ROYALS: The A's lost the season series, 5-2...lost two of three in Oakland and three of four in Kansas City...the .286 winning percentage was the A's lowest single season mark against the Royals (3-7, .300 in 1994)...outscored the Royals 26-24...hit .233 with four home runs and 11 walks while averaging 3.7 runs per game...the pitching posted a 3.30 ERA and allowed just two home runs...the A's have lost two of the last three seasons series to the Royals and are 11-11 against Kansas City over that span...all-time, the A's are 307-254 against the Royals during the regular season...that breaks down to 169-111 in Oakland and 138-143 in Kansas City.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1969** Sal Bando is a perfect 5 for 5 in an 8-4 A's win at Seattle against the Pilots...he was 5 for 5 against Seattle earlier in the same season on July 17...in **1987** Dave Stewart becomes the A's first 20-game winner in seven years when he picks up the decision in the A's 4-3 victory over Cleveland...in **1995** Dennis Eckersley becomes the ninth major leaguer to pitch 900 games in his career when he tossed one inning at California...in **2000** the A's set Oakland records with 23 runs scored and a 21-run margin of victory in a 23-2 win over Texas.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

TEAM

26-23, 2.91 ERA (151 er in 467.1 ip)
Saves/Opportunities: 31-for-52

- Led the American League in opponents on-base percentage (.279) and ranked second in batting average (.223), slugging percentage (.330) and ERA (2.91)...yielded the fourth fewest home runs (41).
- Converted 31-of-52 (59.6%) save chances, which was the second lowest percentage in the AL...tied for the fewest saves (Houston) in the AL...the 31 saves were the fewest by an A's team in a non-strike season since 1982 (22)...converted just 3-for-10 (30.0%) save chances from August 24 through the end of the season.
- Issued 122 walks, which was the fewest in the majors...averaged 2.35 walks per nine innings, which was the lowest rate in the majors and the lowest in franchise history since at least 1914 (1944, 2.49)...it was the **third lowest mark by an AL bullpen since 1914** (2.11 by KC in 1984, 2.28 by CWS in 1915) and the lowest by a Major League bullpen since 1994 (Montreal, 2.29).
- The A's bullpen has allowed just one run with a 0.96 ERA over its last five games of the regular season (1 er in 9.1 ip) after posting a 7.13 ERA over its previous six contests (14 er in 17.2 ip).
- Issued 20 first batter walks, which were the fewest in the AL and second fewest in the majors (Milwaukee, 29), and has the third lowest on-base percentage (.266).

56 LHP FERNANDO ABAD

- Has no postseason experience
- Had his 18-game, 14.0-inning scoreless streak snapped September 21...however, has allowed just two runs over his last 32 contests (26.1 ip, 0.68 ERA).
- Has two outings against the Royals this season (1.1 ip, 2 so)...has four career games against Kansas City (2.1 ip, 1 h, 1 bb, 3 so).
- Finished the regular season with a 1.57 ERA, which ranked fifth among American League relievers.
- Set career highs in innings (57.1), games (69) and strikeouts (51).
- Started the season by stranding each of his first 26 inherited runners...allowed 5-of-38 (13.2%) to score for the season, which was the third lowest percentage in the AL...it was fourth lowest by an A's reliever since 1974.
- Ranked seventh in the AL in opponents slugging percentage (.253) and WHIP (0.85).
- First batters faced went 11 for 63 (.175) with 24 strikeouts...tied for seventh in the AL in first batter strikeouts...tied for the second most first batter strikeouts by an A's reliever since 1974 (25, Wuertz in 2009).

48 RHP RYAN COOK

- Is 1-0 with a 11.25 ERA (5 er in 4.0 ip) in five career postseason appearances, all in the ALDS with the A's against Detroit.
- Went 0-2 with two blown saves and allowed nine runs with a 7.84 ERA in his final 13 games (since August 14)...that followed a 21-game, 20.0-inning scoreless streak from June 27 to August 12.
- Has a blown save in four games against the Royals this year (3.1 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 3 so, 8.10 ERA)...is 0-1 with a save, a blown save and a 2.89 ERA (3 er in 9.1 ip) in 10 career games.
- Appeared in 54 games despite two stints on the DL and was 1-3 with a save and a 3.42 ERA...the games pitched were his fewest in his three seasons with the A's and his ERA was his highest
- Righties went 15 for 109 (.138) with 37 strikeouts against him...lefties were 17 for 65 (.262) with 13 strikeouts.
- Has a 1.89 ERA (8 er in 38.0 ip) and .156 (20 for 128) opponents batting average in 38 games at night, an 8.25 ERA (11 er in 12.0 ip) and .261 (12 for 46) opponents average in 16 day games.

62 LHP SEAN DOOLITTLE

- Has pitched in seven of the A's 10 postseason games over the last two years and is 0-1 with two blown saves and a 3.86 ERA (5 er in 7.0 ip)...has 11 strikeouts (14.14 per nine innings), which is fifth most in Athletics postseason history by a reliever.
- Was reinstated from the 15-day disabled list September 12 and went 1-1 with two saves, a blown save and 6.14 ERA (5 er in 7.1 ip) after being reinstated...however, six of his seven outings were scoreless (5 er on Sept. 17 vs. Texas)...was placed on the disabled list Aug. 24 with a strained right intercostal.
- Has faced the Royals once this season (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 so)...has a win in six career scoreless outings (4.0 ip, 5 h, 4 so).
- Set an Athletics record for saves by a left-hander with 22...had three career saves entering the season...ranked seventh in the American League in save percentage (84.6%) and 10th in saves.
- Finished with 89 strikeouts in 62.2 innings and walked just eight for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 11.13, the best ratio among Major

League relievers...based on a minimum of 60 innings pitched, it was second highest in Athletics history (Eckersley, 18.25 in 1990) and **tied for sixth highest in the majors since 1900**...averaged 1.15 walks per nine innings, which ranked third among AL relievers and fifth lowest in Athletics history among pitchers with 60 or more innings...averaged 12.78 strikeouts per nine innings, which was the best in Athletics history using the 60 inning minimum.

- Ranks first among ML relievers in opponents on-base percentage (.197) and WHIP (0.73)...the on-base percentage was third lowest in Oakland history by a reliever and the batting average ranked eighth (.169).
- Held left-handed hitters to a .118 (9-for-76) batting average...has not allowed a home run to a lefty since April 28, 2013 (Davis, BAL) and has not walked a lefty since Aug. 16, 2013 (Brantley, CLE).
- First batters faced hit .153 with one walk (.164 on-base pct.)...had the second lowest first batter on-base percentage in the AL and fourth lowest by an A's reliever since 1974.

- Has no postseason experience
- Allowed a walk-off home run to Beltre Thursday...had not allowed an earned run over his previous 12 games and 12.0 innings.
- Has faced the Royals twice this season (0.2 ip, 1 h, 2 so)...are his only career games against Kansas City.
- Compiled a career-low 2.12 ERA in 72 relief appearances in his first season with the A's...the games pitched tied for the team lead and tied for 10th in the American League...tied for 10th among AL relievers in innings pitched.
- Is one of five Major League pitchers with 60 or more games pitched in each of the last six seasons (Breslow, Papelbon, Thornton, Ziegler)...his 435 games pitched since 2009 are the most in the majors.
- Surrendered all six of his home runs to righties for a .397 slugging percentage...had a .265 slugging percentage against lefties...has not allowed a home run to a lefty since Sept. 3, 2012 at Los Angeles-NL (Andre Ethier).
- Had eight blown saves this year, which tied for the most in the majors...tied for eighth in the AL in holds (22).

- Is 0-1 with a 4.80 ERA (8 er in 15.0 ip) in three career postseason starts, all in the Division Series with Colorado (2009) and Baltimore (2012)...has 16 strikeouts in 15.0 innings but has also issued nine walks...has held the opposition to a .226 (12-for-53) batting average.
- Went 0-4 with a 9.53 ERA and .351 opponents batting average over his first four starts with the A's, 2-2 with a 2.49 ERA and .215 opponents batting average over his final eight starts.
- Has 29 starts and one relief appearance this season...pitched three scoreless innings of relief on Sept. 18 vs. Texas (3 h, 4 so).
- Did not face the Royals this year...is 1-3 with a 4.99 ERA in eight games (five starts) all-time against Kansas City (17 er in 30.2 ip).
- Was acquired from the Cubs July 5 and went 2-6 with a 4.26 ERA in 13 games, including 12 starts, with the A's...was 8-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 17 starts with Chicago and combined for a 10-11 record and a 3.47 ERA in 30 games overall.
- The 10 wins matched his career high from 2009 and 2010 with Colorado...had a career-high 158 strikeouts and also had the best strikeout-to-walk ratio of his career (3.59)...his .289 opponents on-base percentage was a career low.

- Allowed two runs in back-to-back outings on Sept. 18 and 20 (4 er in 1.1 ip) but each of his 18 other appearances since Aug. 12 have been scoreless...opponents are hitting .197 during that span.
- Tossed three scoreless outings against Kansas City this season (5.0 ip, 5 h, 2 so), his only career appearances against the Royals.
- Spent nearly the entire season with the A's and compiled an 8-2 record with a save and a 2.28 ERA in 72 relief appearances...had a three-day stay at Sacramento from Aug. 21-23 but did not pitch
- His games pitched tied for the team lead and tied for 10th in the American League...also tied for second among AL relievers in wins (8) and ranked second in innings pitched (86.2)...allowed the most hits (80), was fourth in inherited runners (55) and tied for sixth in grounded into double plays (10)...the innings pitched were the most by an A's reliever since Justin Duchscherer in 2004.
- Recorded 159 ground balls, which was the most among Major League relievers (Britton, BAL 147)

- Has not postseason experience.
- Was one of just two rookies to appear in a game for the A's in 2014...went 1-for-6 (.167) with four runs scored and three stolen bases in 13 games over two stints with Oakland...10 of those games came as a pinch runner.
- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento Sept. 1 when rosters expanded for his second stint...went 1-for-1 in 10 games following his return...nine of his 10 appearances following his return came as a pinch runner
- Made his Major League debut during his first stint from July 28 to 30 and went 0 for 5 in three games, including a start in center field.
- Was successful in 54 of 60 (90.0%) stolen base attempts with Sacramento and Double-A Midland and tied for fourth in all of minor league baseball in stolen bases...combined for a .237 batting average in 119 games.

- Is 1 for 8 (.125) with a double in six career postseason games with Arizona (2007 NLCS) and Oakland (2013 ALDS).
- Is 4 for 50 (.080) with a double and no RBI over his last 21 games.
- Went 5 for 22 (.227) against Kansas City this year but is a .295 (33 for 112) career hitter against the Royals...played for Kansas City from 2008-10 and has a .308 (194 for 630) career average at Kauffman Stadium.
- Started games at four different positions for the A's (41 at second base, a team-leading 34 at designated hitter, 17 at first base and 16 at third base)...became the third player in Oakland history to start at least 15 games at four different positions (Angel Mangual, 1974; Don Baylor, 1976).
- Had a .290 slugging percentage, which was the lowest in the majors and the lowest in Oakland history among players with 450 or more plate appearances...the previous Oakland low was .291 by Bert Campaneris in 1976...it was the lowest by an Athletic since Ken Hamlin in 1960 with Kansas City (.271).
- Batted .186 on the road, which was the lowest mark in the American League, second lowest in the majors (Craig, STL/BOS .186) and third lowest in Oakland history.
- Was 3-for-12 (.250) with five walks and three RBI as a pinch hitter...tied for second among AL pinch hitters in walks

4 COCO CRISP

- Has started all 10 of the A's postseason games over the previous two years in center field (11 for 40, .275)...is a .278 (27 for 97) career hitter in 30 postseason games.
- Is batting .215 (20 for 93) in 23 games since missing five games from August 30 to September 3 with a strained neck...missed eight games with a strained neck from July 27-August 3.
- Is 3 for 24 (.125) off Shields during the regular season but is 3 for 4 (.750) during the postseason.
- Is a .223 (89 for 400) career hitter against Kansas City...played for the Royals in 2009 and has a .217 (65 for 299) career average at Kauffman Stadium.
- Batted .246 in 126 games but added a career-high 66 walks for a .336 on-base percentage...his batting average and slugging percentage (.363) were his lowest in his five seasons with the A's
