ABOUT THE A'S: Have won three of five since the All-Star Break...have also won five of the last seven games but are 10-11 over the last 21 contests...are 30-22 (.577) since bottoming out at a season-high 16 games under .500 (14-30) at the conclusion of play on May 22...are tied for third best record in the American League and tied for fifth best in the majors dating back to May 23...are 44-52 (.458) overall, which is the fourth worst record in the AL...are in fourth place in the AL

West for the second time in the last three days...however, have spent 68 of the last 72 in sole possession of last...for the season, have spent six days in sole possession of first, three days tied for first, five days in second, three days tied for second, two days in third, five days tied for third, nine days in fourth, three days tied for fourth and 68 days in fifth...the 68 days alone in last are second most by an A's team over the last 17 years (162 in 2009).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have allowed one run or fewer in 25 of the last 52 games and are 23-17 with a 2.62 ERA (97 er in 332.2 ip) over that span, which dates back to May 23...have a 3.06 ERA for the season, which is second lowest in the majors (St. Louis, 2.83)...the last time A's starters finished a season with an ERA under 3.16 was in 1974 (2.98)...rank second in the majors in innings pitched (591.0) and fewest home runs (43)...have allowed six home runs in five games since the All-Star Break after allowing three home runs in the final 15 games before the break.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 3.06 ERA (49 er in 144.0 ip) in July and have a 3.38 ERA for the season, which is the lowest in the American League and sixth lowest in the majors...also lead the AL in shutouts (12), opponents slugging percentage (.357) and fewest extra base hits (223) and rank second in opponents batting average (.237) and fewest home runs (78) and third in opponents on-base percentage (.300).

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .236 (165-for-698) with 71 runs scored over the last 21 games (3.4 runs per game)...have scored two runs or fewer in 10 of those games...for the season, rank third in the American League in triples (24) and fewest strikeouts (634) and fourth in batting average (.256)...have been successful in 56-of-70 (80.0%) stolen base attempts, which is the best mark in the majors.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed just three errors over the last eight games but have 85 for the season, which is 11 more than any other team (Milwaukee, 74)...the 85 errors are one more than the season total from 2006 when the A's set the club record for fewest errors in a season...the errors have led to 44 unearned runs, which is second most in the majors (San Diego, 48).

RUN DIFFERENTIAL: The A's have out-scored the opposition 412-364 for a run differential of +48...that is fifth best in the American League and eighth best in the majors...are 28-19 (.596) in games decided by three runs or more, which is the fourth best record in the AL...however, are 16-33 (.327) in games decided by two runs or fewer, which is second worst in the majors (Toronto, 13-31, .295).

CLOSE CALLS: The A's collected their second walk-off win in the last four games last night after collecting just one over their first 45 home games...have now won each of their last three extra inning games after starting the season 0-6 in games longer than nine innings...the A's 3-6 (.333) record in extra inning is tied for third worst in the American League...improved to 10-22 (.313) in one-run games with the win last night, but that is still the worst record in the majors behind Toronto (10-20)...the worst record in one-run games in Oakland history is 16-26 (.381) in 1980 and the worst in Athletics history is .256 in 1916 (11-32)...are now 5-11 in games decided in the last at bat...the wins are tied with the Yankees for the fewest in the majors and the losses are tied for second most in the AL.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-2 on this six-game homestand against Minnesota (2-1) and Toronto (1-1)...start their first post-break road trip tomorrow, a five-game trip to San Francisco (three games) and Los Angeles-NL (two games)...went 3-3 on their final road trip before the break against New York (1-2) and Cleveland (2-1)...are 21-28 (.429) at home compared to 23-24 (.489) on the road...have the fourth worst home record in the American League...have finished the season with a home winning per-

centage under .429 once in Oakland history and that was in 1979 (31-50, .383).

LEFT AND RIGHT: The A's have won two of their last three games, all started by a left-handed pitcher...are now 7-18 (.280) when the opponent starts a left-hander compared to 36-34 (.514) when they start a right-hander...the mark against lefties is second worst in the majors (Colorado, 5-16)...are batting .244 (218-for-892) against lefties compared to .260 (631-for-2423) off righties...the average against righties is fourth highest in the American League.

INCOMPLETE: The A's are one of two teams that has not had an opponents starting pitcher toss a complete game (Cubs)...the last pitcher to toss a complete game against the A's was Jason Vargas on Aug. 13, 2014 at Kansas City...have a streak of 138 consecutive games without the opponent tossing a complete game, which is the longest such streak in Athletics history.

THIS AND THAT: The win last night was Bob Melvin's 369th as manager of the A's, which moves him past Ken Macha for third most in Oakland history...only Tony La Russa (798) and Art Howe (600) have more...Josh Reddick hit the A's fifth grand slam of the season Sunday, which is second most in the majors (San Francisco, 6)...the A's lead the majors in RBI with the bases loaded (79)...the A's will play each of their first 22 games after the All-Star Break in California...20 of those games will be in the Bay Area as the A's have a three-game series at San Francisco beginning tomorrow...also travel to Los Angeles July 28-29 for a two-game series against the Dodgers...are the only team in the majors without a rain delay.

ALL-STARS AND THE BREAK: The A's had two players named to the American League All-Star team (Sonny Gray and Stephen Vogt)...it was the first All-Star selection for both players...the A's were 41-50 (.451) at the All-Star Break, which was the 10th worst record in Oakland history at the break...it was the worst since the 2011 club was 39-53 (.424)...2011 also marked the last time the A's were in last place at the break (were 12 back that year).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have seven players on the disabled list (Crisp, Doolittle, Hahn, Ladendorf, Parker, Thompson, Venditte)...Crisp, Doolittle, Ladendorf, Parker and Thompson are on the 60-day DL...have had at least six players on the DL all year...have used the DL a total of 18 times, which matches the season total from last year...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

A's vs. BLUE JAYS: The A's have split the first two games of 2015 after winning the season series last year, 4-3...swept a four-game series in Oakland and were swept in a three-game series at Toronto...out-scored the Blue Jays 19-15 in the seven games...won each of the previous three season series (13-10) but are 25-26 against the Blue Jays dating back to 2009...the A's are 212-183 all-time against Toronto...that includes 105-94 in Oakland, 107-87 in Toronto and 0-2 in Las Vegas.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Billy Burns stole his 20th base of the season last night to become the eighth rookie in Oakland history with 20 or more stolen bases...leads Major League rookies in hits (90), stolen bases (20) and multiple hit games (28)...**Eric Sogard** has a 43-game errorless streak as a second baseman and leads AL second baseman with a .994 fielding percentage...**Ben Zobrist** has not committed an error in 30 games at second base and has a 59-game errorless streak as a second baseman dating back to June 19, 2014.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1964** Bert Campaneris homers twice in his major league debut as the A's defeat Minnesota, 4-3...the first home run comes on the first pitch he sees from Jim Kaat...in **1976** Vida Blue tosses a six-hit shutout and strikes out 13 in the A's 2-0 win over Kansas City to record his 100th career victory...he would go on to win 124 games in an Oakland uniform, second only to Catfish Hunter's 131...in **1996** Terry Steinbach hits his eighth career grand slam in the A's 8-4 win at Chicago...it was his fifth homer in three days.

Saves/Opportunities: 19-for-33 (57.6%)

- The A's bullpen has allowed one earned run or fewer in 21 of its past 25 games and has a 2.62 ERA (20 er in 68.2 ip) over that span.
- Has a 3.34 ERA (48 er in 129.1 ip) over its past 49 games (beginning May 23) after logging a 4.82 ERA in its first 44 games...has a 4.09 ERA for the season, which is second highest in the AL (Texas, 4.47).
- Has 10 wins and 17 losses...the wins are tied for third fewest in the majors and the losses are fourth most in the AL.
- Has allowed the most first batter RBI in the majors (40) and the second most first batter home runs (12).
- Has the second fewest saves in the AL (19), the second lowest save percentage (57.6%) and the second most blown saves (14).
- Has allowed the fourth most home runs in the AL (35).
- The A's are 5-31 when the bullpen allows two runs or more, 37-20 when it allows one run or fewer (three complete games).

56 LHP FERNANDO ABAD

First Hitters: 9-31, 2 bb, hbp

- Has not allowed a run in 12 of his past 14 games (2 er in 13.1 ip, 1.35 ERA)...has a 2.70 ERA (5 er in 16.2 ip) over his past 23 games after posting a 7.04 ERA in his first 11 contests.
- Has allowed a .162 (6-for-37) batting average to right-handed hitters compared to .278 (15-for-54) with 10 extra base hits (.667 slugging percentage) against left-handers.
- Has allowed 21 hits, 12 of which are for extra bases (five doubles, one triple, six home runs)...has the seventh highest opponents slugging percentage among American League relievers (.505).
- Is tied for the most first batter home runs in the majors (4) and is second in first batter RBI (12).
- Has not allowed a run in four games and 4.1 innings in his career against the Blue Jays (4 h, 1 bb, 3 so).

- Has blown the save in his past two games (2 er in 1.2 ip) after going a perfect 8-for-8 in save opportunities over his previous 11 games (0.71 ERA)...is tied for second in the AL in blown saves (4).
- Has a .175 opponents batting average, including .100 (7-for-70) against lefties and .247 (18-for-73) against righties.
- Has a 1.42 ERA (3 er in 19.0 ip) in 18 games at night compared to a 4.12 ERA (9 er in 19.2 ip) in 19 games during the day.
- Is 1-0 with a blown save and 5.14 ERA (4 er in 7.0 ip) in three career games, including one start, against Toronto.
- Has pitched in 408 games since 2010, which is the most in the majors (Gregerson, HOU 399).

- Was reinstated from the 15-day DL June 18 and has a 4.32 ERA (4 er in 8.1 ip) in 10 games since then.
- Is tied for second among American League relievers in grounded into double plays (8) and tied for fifth in most home runs (6).
- Has a 5.65 ERA in 12 games in his career against Toronto (14.1 ip, 20 h, 9 r, 9 er, 5 bb, 6 so).
- Was on the disabled list from May 22 to June 17 with a fractured right thumb.
- Began the year with Boston and was designated for assignment May 8...was traded to Oakland the next day for a player to be named later or cash.

Last Year: *Spent the entire season with the Red Sox and was 2-4 with a 3.37 ERA, eight saves and one blown save in 64 relief appearances...it was his fourth consecutive season with 60 or more appearances.*

- Earned the win last night, his first since May 31, 2014 against Los Angeles (AL).
- Has not allowed an earned run in 16 of his past 19 games and has a 1.42 ERA (3 er in 19.0 ip) over that span (beginning May 27).
- Has not allowed a home run in two seasons and 35 games pitched with the A's (37.0 ip).
- Has a win in two career games against the Blue Jays (2.2 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so).
- Was selected from Triple-A Nashville May 7 after logging a 2.81 ERA in 10 relief appearances with the Sounds...held opponents to a .143 batting average, including .120 against right-handed hitters.

Last Year: *Spent most of the season with Triple-A Sacramento where he was 3-0 with a 1.97 ERA in 38 relief appearances...also went 1-0 with a 1.00 ERA in seven games over two stints with Oakland.*

- Has all four of his blown saves, both of his losses and a 5.70 ERA (19 er in 30.0 ip) over his last 28 contests (beginning May 8)...compiled a 1.10 ERA over his first 14 games.
- Has allowed 11 home runs, which are the most in the majors among relievers...the home runs are tied for eighth most in Oakland history among relievers and are the most by an A's reliever since 2004 (13, Justin Duchscherer).
- Leads American League relievers in strikeout-to-walk ratio (12.75) and fewest walks per nine innings (0.78), is fourth in innings pitched (46.1) and sixth in strikeouts (51)...is tied for second in blown saves (4).
- First batters faced are 18-for-42 (.429) with four home runs and 13 RBI...the RBI are the most in the majors, the home runs are tied for the most and the batting average is tied for the highest.
- Has not allowed a run in four games and 4.1 innings in his career against Toronto (6 h, 4 so).

Last Year: *Spent most of the season with Triple-A Sacramento where he was 4-1 with 16 saves and a 3.06 ERA in 40 relief appearances...also went 1-0 with a 4.63 ERA in 13 games over four stints with Oakland.*

- Has hit safely in each of the five games since the All-Star Break (8-for-22, .364) and is batting .307 for the season, which ranks seventh in the American League...is tied for eighth in triples (5).
- Stole his 20th base of the season last night to become the eighth rookie in Oakland history with 20 or more steals...joins Jemile Weeks (22 in 2011) as the only Oakland rookies to do it over the last 28 years...leads Major League rookies in steals...ranks second among all AL players in steals and is tied for fifth in stolen base percentage (83.3%).
- In addition to stolen bases, he also leads ML rookies in hits (90) and multiple hit games (28) and tops AL rookies in total bases (117)...is tied for the AL lead in runs (41) and tied for second in triples (5)...the triples are tied for fourth most in Oakland history by a rookie.
- Is batting .362 (51-for-141) at home compared to .257 (39-for-152) on the road...has the second best home batting average in the AL.
- Has 25 infield hits, which is second most in the majors (Gordon, MIA 32).
- Has not committed an error and his 145 total chances are fourth most among AL outfielders with no errors.
- Is batting .476 (30-for-63) with five doubles, three triples and two home runs (.746 slugging percentage) when putting the first pitch in play.

Last Year: Went 1-for-6 (.167) in 13 games over two stints with Oakland in his Major League debut...combined to hit .237 with one home run and 28 RBI in 119 games with Midland and Sacramento...tied for fourth in the minors in steals (54).

16 BILLY BUTLER

- Hit .287 in April, .241 in May, .237 in June and is currently batting .204 (11-for-54) in July.
- Has four home runs and 12 RBI over his last 17 games after tallying just two home runs and 20 RBI over his previous 56 contests.
- Hit his ninth home run of the season Sunday, which matches his output from 151 games last year with the Royals.
- Batted .249 before the All-Star Break, which matched the lowest mark of his career at the break (2008)...is a .281 career hitter with 62 home runs and 333 RBI in 706 games before the break compared to .304 (634-for-2085) with 74 home runs and 339 RBI in 549 games after the break.
- Is tied for second in the American League in grounded into double plays (15).

Last Year: Batted .271 with nine home runs and 66 RBI in 151 games in his eighth and final season with Kansas City...the batting average was a career-low as was his .323 on-base percentage and .379 slugging percentage.

20 MARK CANHA

- Is 1-for-14 over his last five games after hitting safely in a career-high tying six consecutive games (also April 8-13)...batted .381 (8-for-21) with six RBI during his hitting streak.
- Is tied for the lead among American League rookies in RBI (33), tied for second in home runs (8), tied for fourth in walks (16) and fifth in runs (30).
- Is hitting .287 (41-for-143) with 17 of his 18 extra base hits against right-handed pitching compared to .147 (11-for-75) with a double against left-handers...is slugging .524 against righties, .160 against lefties.
- Struck out as a pinch hitter last Friday night and is now 0-for-10 with six strikeouts and a RBI as a pinch hitter...is tied for the AL lead in pinch strikeouts.

Last Year: Spent the entire season at Triple-A New Orleans in the Miami farm system where he batted a career-high .303 with 20 home runs and 82 RBI in 127 games...added 57 walks for a career-high .384 on-base percentage.

17 IKE DAVIS

- Had his fifth career walk-off hit last night, his first since July 1, 2014 against Arizona...it was the first pinch walk-off by an Athletic since Chris Carter homered July 6, 2012 against Seattle.
- Is 6-for-30 (.200) with two RBI in 12 games in July and is now batting .217 (13-for-60) in 21 games since he was reinstated from the 15-day disabled list June 19...was batting .282 in 32 games before going on the DL.
- Has made each of his 46 starts against right-handed pitchers and is batting .268 (40-for-149) against righties...is 2-for-14 (.143) against lefties...each of his 146 starts over the last two years have come in games in which the opponent starts a right-hander...is 5-for-46 (.109) against lefties over the last two years.
- Is batting .313 (31-for-99) at night, .172 (11-for-64) during the day.
