LOS ANGELES DODGERS (67-51) at OAKLAND ATHLETICS (51-69)

THE EASY BAY: The Dodgers, winners of three in a row, open an eight-game, 11-day road trip tonight with the first of two games against the Oakland Athletics. Los Angeles is coming off a 5-2 homestand, which included series wins over the Nationals (2-1) and the Reds (3-1), and has been stellar at home this year - with its 42-20 mark (.677) on pace to be the best in Dodger Stadium history. Following their brief stay in the Bay Area, the Dodgers continue the trip with three games in Houston this weekend and a three-game series in Cincinnati next week.

Los Angeles opens the road trip with five consecutive Interleague games and has gone 8-4 against the American League this year, including sweeps of the Mariners and Angels at Dodger Stadium.

The Dodgers and Athletics split two games at Dodger Stadium in July, but Los Angeles has a 2-12 all-time record at the O.co Coliseum, including six consecutive losses.

A CHANGE OUTSIDE THE LINES: Yesterday, the Dodgers announced the hiring of **Ron Roenicke**, who will coach third base for the remainder of the season. Roenicke managed the Brewers to a 342-331 record from 2011-15, before being replaced in May. The Southern California native was an outfielder in the Majors from 1981-88, including parts of three seasons with the Dodgers (1981-83). Before being named the Brewers' skipper prior to the 2011 campaign, the 58-year-old was a longtime coach for the Angels, serving as their third base (2000-05) and bench coach (2006-10).

Dodger coach **Lorenzo Bundy** will move to the dugout, where he will remain the outfield coordinator. Bundy has been on the Dodgers' big league staff since 2014.

HOMECOMING: Tonight, the Athletics will distribute **Mark McGwire** "Rookie of the Year" bobbleheads at the O.co Coliseum in celebration of McGwire's 1987 season. McGwire unanimously won the award that year with a rookie-record 49 homers in 151 games.

McGwire is in his third season as Dodger hitting coach and since his arrival in 2013, Los Angeles leads the NL with a .330 team on-base percentage, while ranking second in batting average (.263) and slugging percentage (.408).

In addition to McGwire, Dodger coaches **Rick Honeycutt** and **Davey Lopes** spent time with the Athletics during their playing careers along with current players **Alberto Callaspo**, **Brandon McCarthy**, **Jim Johnson** and **Brett Anderson**. Prior to joining the Dodgers, General Manager **Farhan Zaidi** spent 10 seasons in the Oakland front office.

LOS ANGELES LEGEND: **Andre Ethier**, who was originally selected by the A's in the second round of the 2003 First-Year Player Draft out of Arizona State University before being acquired by the Dodgers on Dec. 13, 2005 in the Milton Bradley trade, has hit safely in his last six games and has posted a .390/.432/.707 slashline in his last 13 games since July 29, going 16-for-41 with five doubles, a triple, two homers and six RBI in that span.

Ethier has continued his ascent up the all-time Los Angeles lists, ranking in the Top 10 in games (1,379, 8th - next: Scioscia, 1,441), runs (625, 10th - next: Gilliam, 630), hits (1,326, 7th - next: Cey, 1,378), doubles (295, 4th, next: Karros, 302), home runs (157, 9th, next: Green, 162) and RBI (668, 5th, next: Cey, 842).

CLIMBING THE LADDER: Dodger closer **Kenley Jansen** has tallied 17 consecutive save opportunities since June 12 and recorded his first four-out save of the season on Sunday, the 130th save of his career to move into sole possession of second place on the all-time Dodger saves list, behind only Eric Gagne (161). The proud new father also ranks second among Los Angeles relievers with 507 career strikeouts, trailing only Jim Brewer's 604 Ks.

The Dodger bullpen has not allowed a run in its last three games (7.2 IP), allowing just one hit, walking one and striking out seven in that span.

KERSH-AWESOME: **Clayton Kershaw** enters tonight's start unbeaten in his last seven starts, going 5-0 with a 0.82 ERA (5 ER/55.0 IP) since his last loss, June 27 at Miami. He has pitched at least 8.0 scoreless innings in five of his last six starts with the only exception coming on Aug. 7 at Pittsburgh. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, only four other pitchers in the live-ball era have had at least five such performances in a six-start span in a single season: **Ray Herbert** (1963), **Bob Gibson** (1968), **Don Drysdale** (1968) and **Orel Hershiser** (1988).

Kershaw, who leads the NL with 205 strikeouts, has surpassed the 200-strikeout mark for the sixth year in a row, joining **Sandy Koufax** (1961-66) and Tom Seaver (9, 1968-76) as the only pitchers in modern National League history (since 1900) to accomplish the feat in six or more consecutive seasons (Source: ESPN Stats & Info). He is tied with Koufax and **Don Drysdale** for the most seasons with 200+ strikeouts in franchise history.

Kershaw is averaging a career-best 11.39 strikeouts per 9.0 innings and is striking out 32.7% of batters faced, which is on pace to be one of the best all-time NL marks:

In two career starts against the A's (both no-decisions), Kershaw combined to allow one run in 13.2 IP (0.66 ERA).

GETTING OFFENSIVE: The Dodgers continue to lead the National League with 146 home runs, while topping the Majors in walks (405) and on-base percentage (.332). Los Angeles is off to a hot offensive start to the month of August and leads the NL with a .286 team batting average (144-for-503) in 15 games this month.

Oakland native **Jimmy Rollins** has hit safely in 15 of his last 17 games and is batting .315 (28-for-89) with seven doubles, a triple, three homers and seven RBI in his last 23 games since July 22. Rollins enters today's game just one double shy of 500 for his career and would become just the fifth active player to reach the milestone, joining **Albert Pujols** (576), **David Ortiz** (569), **Adrian Beltre** (546) and **Alex Rodriguez** (537).

Kiké Hernandez has filled in admirably for **Howie Kendrick** at second base and posted a .415/.489/.707 slashline in his last 15 games, going 17-for-41 with three doubles, three homers and eight RBI since July 24. Hernandez has a favorable matchup tonight against a left-handed starter and leads the Majors (min. 50 AB) with a .414 batting average (24-for-58) vs. lefties.

Carl Crawford has nine hits in his last 12 at-bats and is hitting .353 (12-for-34) with two doubles, a homer and seven RBI in 19 games since returning from the DL on July 21.

Joc Pederson hit his 23rd home run on Sunday, tying with **Frank Howard** (1960) for the second-most homers by a Los Angeles rookie. He's tied for fourth among rookies in franchise history, trailing only **Mike Piazza** (35, 1993), **Del Bissonette** (25, 1928) and **Johnny Frederick** (24, 1929).

- Last pitched on Wednesday against Washington, allowing just three hits over 8.0 scoreless innings, recording the Dodgers' 3-0 victory...struck out eight without a walk on 101 pitches
- **Currently leads the National League with 205 strikeouts and a 11.39 strikeout per nine innings...surpassed 200 Ks for the sixth consecutive season...in franchise history, only Sandy Koufax (6) and Don Drysdale (6) have as many seasons with 200+ strikeouts, and only Koufax (1961-66) accomplished the feat in consecutive seasons**
- **In his last six starts, he has gone 5-0 with a 0.75 ERA (4 ER/48.0 IP) and has limited the opposition to a .167 average...has posted a 19.33 strikeout-to-walk ratio, striking out 58 batters against just three walks**
- **Held a season high scoreless streak at 37.0 innings over six starts (7/3-8/7)...his career-long streak is 41.0, set June 13-July 10, 2014...Luis Tiant is the last pitcher with multiple scoreless streaks of 37.0+ IP in his career, doing so in 1968 with Cleveland (41.0 IP) and 1972 with Boston (40.0 IP)**
- Was named National League Pitcher of the Month for July, going 3-0 with a 0.27 ERA (1 ER/33.0 IP) in four starts and has limited batters to a .162 batting average...struck out 45 against just two walks
- Became the first major-league pitcher since 1900 (the modern era) to strike out at least 10 batters with no runs or walks allowed in three consecutive starts, doing so July 8-23
- Named National League Co-Players of the Week along with teammate **Zack Greinke** for July 17-19, making it his seventh career NL Player of the Week honor, having won most recently for June 1-7, 2015
- Made an appearance in the fifth inning of the 2015 MLB All-Star Game, allowing two runs on three hits, recording the loss in the NL's 3-6 defeat to the AL...struck out one and issued one walk during his inning

CAREER NOTES:

- **Since 1920, has the lowest all-time career ERA among pitchers**
- **Since his debut in 2008, he leads the Majors in ERA (2.47), opponents' average (.208) and WHIP (1.04), while also ranking among the MLB leaders in winning percentage (.663, 2nd), strikeouts (1,650, 2nd), wins (108, 7th), complete games (19, 7th) and shutouts (11, T-2nd)**
- Reached 100 career wins in only 217 starts on May 15 against the Rockies...needed the seventh fewest starts among active players behind only Adam Wainwright (100th win reached in 189 starts), Justin Verlander (191 GS), Tim Hudson (202 GS), Jered Weaver (204 GS), Cliff Lee (209 GS), and Bartolo Colon (212 GS)
- Was selected as the NL's Most Valuable Player in 2014 and has been honored the Cy Young Award three times in his career (2011, 2013 and 2014)...has also won the Rawlings Golden Glove Award in 2011 and has been selected to the last four All-Star games (2011-2014)...is just the ninth all-time pitcher to win three or more Cy Youngs since the award was instituted in 1956 and the first-ever to win the honor three times before the age of 27
- Has topped the Majors in ERA in four consecutive seasons since 2011, becoming the first-ever pitcher to win four straight ERA titles...led the Majors with career-high 21 wins in both 2011 and 2014
- Became just the fourth Dodger pitcher to win the NL MVP award, joining **Sandy Koufax** (1963), **Don Newcombe** (1956) and **Dazzy Vance** (1924), and the first Dodger overall to win the award since **Kirk Gibson** in 1988
- Threw his first-career no-hitter on June 18, 2014 vs. Colorado, striking out a career-high 15 batters on 107 pitches in Dodgers' 8-0 win...his 15 K's were the most ever for a Dodger in a no-hitter and, according to Elias Sports Bureau, the most by any pitcher in ML history that did not allow a runner to reach base via hit, walk or hit by pitch
- **Ranks among the all-time LA leaders in ERA (2.47 1st), wins (108, 10th), winning percentage (.663, 2nd), strikeouts (1,650, 5th), innings pitched (1,540.1, 10th), starts (232, 10th), opponents' batting average (.208, 2nd) and WHIP (1.04, 1st)**
- Has reached the 200-strikeout mark in five consecutive seasons (2011-14)
- Strung together a 41.0 consecutive scoreless innings from June 13-July 10, 2014 which tied with Luis Tiant (1968) for the sixth longest streak in the expansion era behind only **Orel Hershiser** (59.0 IP, 1988), **Don Drysdale** (58.0 IP, 1968), Bob Gibson (47.0 IP, 1968), **Zack Greinke** (43.2 IP, 2015) and Brandon Webb (42.0 IP, 2007)
