OAKLAND ATHLETICS (0-0) VS. CHICAGO WHITE SOX (0-0)

ABOUT THE A'S: The A's open their 49th season in Oakland where they have won 16 American League West titles, two AL Wild Cards, six AL pennants and four World Championships...only the New York Yankees (18) and Atlanta Braves (17) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11) and Cardinals (8) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...have a 3975-3670 (.520) record over the previous 48 seasons in Oakland...only four teams have won more games over that span (New York Yankees, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis)...this is the Athletics franchise 116th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 16 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships...the A's are 8690-9142 (.487) in their previous 115 seasons...that includes a 3886-4248 record from 1901-54 in Philadelphia and 829-1224 from 1955-67 in Kansas City.

DURING THE SPRING: The A's went 12-17-3 (.422) this spring, which was the fifth worst record in the Cactus League...it marked the first time the A's finished Spring Training with a losing record since 2011 when they went 12-21-1...committed 45 errors, which was six more than any other team (39, Chicago-NL)...they were the most by an A's team since at least 2000...the pitching staff issued 125 walks, which was the most among CL teams and second most in the majors to Boston (129)...the walks were the most by an A's team during the spring since at least 1990, surpassing the previous high of 123 in 1997, 2000 and 2010...compiled a 6.10 ERA, which was third highest in the majors to San Diego (6.89) and San $\,$ Francisco (6.37)...the ERA was second highest by an A's team during the spring since at least 1990 (6.22 in 1999)...starting pitchers had a 6.81 ERA (83 er in 109.2 ip) compared to 5.64 (106 er in 169.0 ip) by relievers...the offense struck out 225 times, which was second fewest among CL teams... ranked fifth in most walks (106)...stole just 13 bases, which was the fewest in the CL and fourth fewest in the majors...hit 40 home runs, which was the most by an A's team during the spring since 2004 (50)...the A's went 5-7-3 at Hohokam Stadium, 1-0 in Oakland and 6-10 on the road...this marks the third time in the last four springs the A's have played at least three tie games (13 ties total).

FOR OPENERS: The A's snapped their Major League record 10-game Opening Day losing streak with an 8-0 win over Texas last year on April 6...have not won back-to-back openers since 2002-04 when they won three straight...are now 5-17 on Opening Day dating back to 1994...will open in Oakland for the fourth consecutive season and will be the home team for the seventh straight year (2012 in Tokyo)...this is the third time in Oakland history the A's have faced the White Sox on Opening Day...it is the first time since 1975 when the A's won 3-2 in Oakland...also squared off in 1969, a 5-2 A's win in Oakland...prior to moving to Oakland, the A's and White Sox met once on Opening Day, a 10-9 White Sox win over the Kansas City A's in Chicago in 1960...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 21-27 on Opening Day, including 17-13 in Oakland, 4-11 on the road, 0-2 in Tokyo and 0-1 in Las Vegas...all-time, the Athletics are 53-62 in openers.

OPENING DAY STARTING LINEUPS: Three players return from last year's Opening Day starting lineup (Butler, Semien, Vogt)...Rich Hill will be the A's 10th different Opening Day starting pitcher in the last 11 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray)...Josh Reddick is making his fourth Opening Day start in right field in the last five years...Mark Canha will be the A's fifth different Opening Day starter at first base in the last five years.

ROSTER NOTES: The A's Opening Day roster featured 12 pitchers and 13 position players for the eighth time in the last 10 years (the Lambo/Doubront move is officially in-season)...the exceptions were in 2008 and 2012 when they opened in Japan and carried just 10 pitchers...eight players return from last years Opening Day roster (Burns, Butler, Canha, Graveman, Gray, Phegley, Semien, Vogt)...eight other players on the roster played for the A's at some point last year (Bassitt, Crisp, Doolittle, Doubront, Dull, Reddick, Rodriguez, Valencia), three were signed as free agents (Axford, Hill, Madson) and six were acquired in a trade (Alonso, Coghlan, Davis, Hendriks, Lowrie, Rzepczynski).

TENURE: Of the 25 players on the A's Opening Day roster, only three played for Oakland prior to 2013...Coco Crisp is the longest tenured Ath-

letic as he made his A's debut May 21, 2010...two players made their Oakland debut in 2012 (Doolittle, Reddick) and the other 22 first played for the A's in 2013 or later...Sean Doolittle has been with the A's organization the longest as he was selected in the 2007 First-Year Player Draft...Coco Crisp, who signed as a free agent Dec. 23, 2009, is next...15 of the 25 were added following the 2014 campaign.

ROOKIE AND VETERANS: The A's have one rookie on the Opening Day roster (Ryan Dull), which is four fewer than last year but one more than 2014...five players have six or more years of service: Coco Crisp (12 years, 158 days), Ryan Madson (10 years, 155 days), Billy Butler (8 years, 102 days), Jed Lowrie (7 years, 111 days) and Rich Hill (6 years, 127 days).

THE YOUNG AND THE OLD: The average age on the A's Opening Day roster is 29.28 years (now 29.24 with Lambo replacing Doubront)...that is the A's oldest Opening Day roster since 2004 when it was 30.16...Kendall Graveman is the youngest player at the age of 25 years, 105 days...this marks the first time in Oakland history the A's have not had a player under the age of 25 on the Opening Day roster...it is believed to be just the second time in Athletics history, although official Opening Day rosters are not available...the only other probable time the A's did not start the season with a player under 25 was 1902...Marcus Semien (25 years, 200 days) is the only other player under the age of 26...there are 10 players that are at least 30 years old... Coco Crisp is the oldest at 36 years, 155 days...he is followed by Rich Hill (36 years, 24 days), Ryan Madson (35 years, 220 days) and John Axford (33 years, 3 days).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's began the season with five players on the disabled list (H. Alvarez, R.J. Alvarez, Fuld, Parker, Sogard) and added a sixth today (Doubront)...began the season with eight players on the DL last year and seven the year before...Parker is on the 60-day DL...the A's used the DL 23 times last year, which matched the 2010 club for second most in Oakland history...have had at least three players on the DL every day since July 30, 2011 and have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

CONTRACT STATUS: The A's have five players under contract beyond the 2016 season...John Axford and Billy Butler are signed through 2017 while Jed Lowrie is signed through 2017 with a club option for 2018...Sean Doolittle and Ryan Madson are signed through 2018 with the A's hold club options on Doolittle for 2019 and 2020...in addition, Coco Crisp has a vesting option for 2017.

A's vs. WHITE SOX: The A's lost the season series last year, 2-5...were swept in a three-game series in Oakland and split a four-game series in Chicago...it marked the second consecutive season the A's have lost the season series...have lost nine of their last 12 games to the White Sox, including four straight in Oakland...have won just one season series over the previous five years and are 17-20 against Chicago over that span...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 300-281 against the White Sox... that breaks down to 158-134 in Oakland and 142-147 in Chicago...including 60-59 at U.S. Cellular Field...all-time, the A's are 977-1036 against Chicago.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

John Axford and Ryan Madson combined to toss 16.1 scoreless innings this spring...Coco Crisp has 299 career stolen bases and needs one more to become one of nine active players with 300 career steals... Ryan Madson finished the 2015 regular season with a 12-game, 11.0-inning scoreless streak...Marcus Semien finished the 2015 season by reaching base safely in each of his final 23 games beginning Sept. 6, which is the longest reaching base streak of his career.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In 1974 Reggie Jackson has four hits and a homer as the two-time defending World Champion Oakland A's open their season with a 7-2 victory at Texas...the A's would go on to win their third consecutive World Championship...in 2006 Marco Scutaro has a walk-off RBI single in the ninth inning to lead the A's to a 4-3 win over the Yankees.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Rich Hill (2-1, 1.55 ERA in 2015)

FOR OPENERS: Is scheduled to make his first career Opening Day start...at the age of 36 years, 24 days, he will become the fourth oldest pitcher to start an opener in Oakland history and the fifth oldest in Athletics history...this will be his first start as an Athletic, his fifth in the last seven years and the 75th of his

career...was signed by the A's as a free agent, Nov. 20, 2015...the A's will be his seventh team and this is his 12th season in the majors...made 70 of his starts in his first five seasons with Chicago-NL (2005-08) and Baltimore (2009)...pitched exclusively in relief from 2010-14 before making four starts with Boston last year.

SPRING TRAINING RECAP: Went 0-2 with an 11.25 ERA in four spring training starts...also pitched in minor league games on March 20 and 25... issued 15 walks in 12.0 innings...the walks matched the most by an A's pitcher over the last 19 springs (Ron Mahay, 2000; Omar Olivares, 2000)... opponents hit .293 (12-for-41)...allowed 13 runs on 10 hits and 12 walks over his first three starts (7.2 ip, 15.26 ERA) before yielding two runs on two hits and three walks in his final start (4.1 ip, 4.15 ERA).

2015 RECAP: Began the season at Triple-A Syracuse in the Washington organization and finished it by going 2-1 with a 1.55 ERA in four September starts with Boston...the starts were his first as a major leaguer since making 13 with Baltimore in 2009...struck out 36 batters in 29.0 innings (11.17 per nine innings) and walked just five for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 7.20... has 96 strikeouts in 73.0 innings over the last three years (11.84 per nine innings)

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .141 batting average, including .138 (11-for-80) with both of his home runs against right-handed hitters compared to .158 (3-for-19) against left-handers...yielded a .154 average with runners in scoring position...had a .242 opponents average the first time through the lineup, .091 after that.

WITH BOSTON: Was selected by Boston Sept. 8 and made his first start Sept. 13 at Tampa Bay...tossed 7.0 shutout innings and allowed just one hit and one walk while striking out 10, but had a no decision in a 2-0 Red Sox win...it was his first start since July 27, 2009 against Kansas City... joined Hideo Nomo (no-hitter, April 4, 2001) as the only pitchers in the last 100 years with 10 or more strikeouts and one hit or fewer in their first career start as a Red Sox...picked up his first win in his second start Sept. 20 at Toronto...struck out 10 in 7.0 innings again and allowed three runs in a 4-3 decision...then tossed the Red Sox only complete game shutout of the

season, a two-hitter in a 7-0 win over Baltimore Sept. 25 in his only start at Fenway...walked one and struck out 10...it was his third career complete game, his first since Sept. 22, 2006 at Cincinnati...it was his second career shutout (Sept. 16, 2006 against Cincinnati)...it came in his 200th career appearance...became the first pitcher to strikeout 10 or more batters in each of his first three starts with any American League team...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the only pitcher since 1900 to make his season debut in September or later and record 10 or more strikeouts in each of his first three starts...is the fifth pitcher in Red Sox history to reach double-digits in strikeouts in at least three straight games...took the loss in his final start Oct. 1 at New York (AL)...tossed 6.0 innings to bring his career total to 500.0.

MINOR LEAGUE RECAP: Was signed by Washington to a minor league contract March 3 and started the season at Syracuse...was 2-2 with a 2.91 ERA in 25 relief appearances with the Chiefs when he was released June 24...went 1-0 with a 0.00 ERA in two starts with the Long Island Ducks of the independent Atlantic League before signing a minor league deal with Boston Aug. 14...compiled a 3-2 record and a 2.78 ERA in five starts with Triple-A Pawtucket before his promotion to Boston Sept. 8...combined for a 5-4 record and a 2.83 ERA in 30 games with Syracuse and Pawtucket... struck out 61 batters in 54.0 innings, an average of 10.17 per nine innings.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .206 opponents batting average, including .190 (26-for-137) against right-handed hitters compared to .250 (13-for-52) against left-handers...yielded a .171 average to batters leading off an inning but issued 10 walks and hit two batters for a .358 on-base percentage.

THIS AND THAT: Allowed 9-of-23 (39.1%) inherited runners to score... tossed fewer than one inning in 13 of his 25 relief appearances with Syracuse and six or more innings in each of his five starts with Pawtucket...his longest outing as a reliever was 2.0 innings three times.

MORE MINOR LEAGUES: Compiled a 0.90 ERA in eight relief appearances in April and had a 1.10 ERA over his first 17 appearances through May 20...struck out two or more batters in eight of his first 10 games through May 4 (21 so in 13.0 ip)...tossed fewer than one inning in 11 of his 12 appearances from May 6 to June 3 (4 er in 6.0 ip, 6.00 ERA)...was on the disabled list from June 5 to 11 with a strained neck...pitched in just three games following his return (2 er in 2.2 ip) before he was released June 24...allowed his only home run with Syracuse in his final outing June 19 against Buffalo...tossed 6.1 shutout innings for the win in his first start with Pawtucket Aug. 15 at Lehigh Valley...added 6.0 shutout innings in his third start Aug. 27 at Buffalo, giving him a 0.93 ERA over his first three starts... struck out a season-high nine batters in a season-high tying 7.0 innings for the win Sept. 1 against Lehigh Valley...allowed seven runs on 10 hits in 6.0 innings for the loss in his final Triple-A start Sept. 6 against Buffalo.

 third lowest in Oakland history, the saves tied for fifth fewest in a nonstrike season and were the fewest since 1982 (22), and the blown saves

- Allowed 74 home runs, which was second most in the majors to Boston (76) and second most in Athletics history (92, 1964 Kansas City A's)... had the second highest opponents slugging percentage in the AL (.428).
- Allowed 88-of-257 (34.2%) inherited runners to score, which was the highest percentage in the majors.
- Had the highest opponents slugging percentage in the majors against first batters faced (.469) and the most RBI (68)...had the highest firstbatter batting average in the AL (.272), the second fewest walks (26) and third most home runs (19).
