CAREER

2015: Split the season between the Royals organization and Phillies, also missing time with a stint on the 15-day disabled list.

· Made the Royals Opening Day roster, playing with Kansas City before landing on the 15-day DL on 5/6 with plantar fascitis in his left foot...reinstated from the DL after a rehab assignment and was designated for assignment on 6/11 and claimed off waivers by the Boston Red Sox on 6/21 before being designated for assignment by the Red Sox on 6/25 and outrighted to Triple-A Pawtucket where he refused his assignment and elected free agency.

QUICK HIT

- First MLB Hit: July 17, 2010 vs. HOU, single of Bud Norris (Major League debut)
- First MLB Home Run: May 22, 2012 vs. WSH, pinch-hit off Tom Gorzelanny
- Signed as a minor league free agent with Seattle on 7/2 and played in 10 games for Triple-A Tacoma before being released by the Mariners on 7/15.
- Signed as a minor league free agent with Philadelphia on 7/17, spending the remainder of the season in the Phillies organization.
- Hit .312 in 26 games for Triple-A Lehigh Valley before having his contract selected by Philadelphia on 9/1, spending the remainder of the season with the Major League club.
- Following the season, signed with the Padres as a minor league free agent on 11/8/15.

2014: Began the season with the Toronto Blue Jays, playing in 34 games total for Toronto and 27 for Triple-A Buffalo before being acquired by the Royals on 7/28 along with RHP Liam Hendriks in exchange for INF Danny Valencia.

- · Made the Blue Jays Opening Day roster...had four separate stints with the Blue Jays before being acquired by the Royals.
- · After being acquired by Kansas City, spent the remainder of the season with the Major League club.
- · Was active on the Royals postseason roster but did not play.

2013: Played the entire season with the Phillies aside from one stint on the disabled list with a rehab assignment between Double-A Reading and Triple-A Lehigh Valley.

- Made his first career Opening Day roster with Philadelphia and played in a career-high 68 games.
- Missed action after undergoing surgery on his left knee from 6/9-7/19.
- Committed just one error in 441 total chances for a .998 fielding percentage, which ranked fourth in the National League among backstops with at least 400 chances on the year.

2012: Split the season between Triple-A Lehigh Valley and the Major League club for the Phillies.

- The Phillies were 23-15 in his 38 starts for the Big league club (.605 winning percentage)...threw out 12 of 30 (40%) attempted base stealers
- · Hit a ninth-inning, game-tying home run off Craig Kimbrel against Atlanta on 8/31, the first home run that Kimbrel had ever allowed on an 0-2 pitch.

2011: Spent the majority of the season with Triple-A Lehigh Valley, hitting .288 (103-for-358) in 103 games, also seeing time with the Big League club.

- Named to the International League All-Star Game for the third straight year.
- Finished third among International League catchers in batting average.
- Selected by Philadelphia in September, appearing in two games total for the Phillies.

2010: Made his Major League debut for the Pirates with nine games, spending the majority of the season with Triple-A Indianapolis.

- Began the season in the minors before being selected by the Pirates on 7/16 for his first career call-up.
- Made his Major League debut on 7/17 with a start, going 2-for-4 in the game.
- With Indianapolis, pitched a scoreless 15th inning on 4/26 to earn a save at Louisville.
- Named an International League All-Star for the second straight year.

2009: Played the entire season with Triple-A Indianapolis, hitting .273 (87-for-319) over 93 games played.

- Named an International League All-Star as well as a Post-Season All-Star.
- · Received the "Top Star" of the Triple-A All-Star Game, going 2-for-2 with a walk, a double and a two-run home run in the International League's 6-5 win over the Pacific Coast League in Portland, Ore.

2008: Split the season between Double-A New Hampshire and Triple-A Syracuse, hitting a combined .239 (59-for-247) with 16 home runs and 43 RBI in 73 total games played.

2007: Split the year between Double-A New Hampshire and Triple-A Syracuse, hitting a combined .235 (64-for-272) with 13 home runs and 49 RBI over 84 total games played.

2006: Played the majority of the season with Double-A New Hampshire with 71 games there, also playing in 12 games for Triple-A Syracuse.

2005: Spent the entire campaign with Double-A New Hampshire, hitting .205 (60-for-292) with 10 doubles, 11 home runs and 34 RBI in 91 games played.

Following the season, played for the Peoria Saguaros in the Arizona Fall League.

2004: Hit a combined .299 (29-for-97) over 29 games between three different levels in the Blue Jays system.
Missed time while on the seven-day disabled lsit from 4/15-25.

2003: In his second season, hit .306 (55-for-180) over 58 games total between Single-A Auburn, Single-A Charleston and Double-A New Haven.

2002: Played his first professional season with Rookie-Level Medicine Hat, hitting .275 (39-for-142) with four home runs and 11 RBI in 44 games played.

· Hit a home run in his first professional at-bat on 6/20 vs. Billings.
