CAREER: The 30-year-old outfielder was signed by Texas to a minor league contract on August 20...a two-time All-Star with Milwaukee in 2013 and 2014, he also won a Gold Glove Award in 2013, when he finished ninth in National League MVP voting after reaching career highs with 24 home runs and 40 stolen bases...has four different seasons of 30-ormore steals...has a career .256 average along with 108 home runs in 1171 major league games with New York-NL (2007), Minnesota (2008-09), Milwaukee (2010-15), and Houston (2015-16).

2016: Spent the majority of the season with the Houston Astros...was designated for assignment on August 10, released from the roster on August 18, and given his unconditional release on August 20...batted .210 (62-295) with 5 home runs, 16 doubles, and 29 RBI in 85 games for the Astros this season...had 5 home runs and 24 RBI over his final 48 games with Houston...was signed to a minor league contract by the Rangers on August 20 and batted .308 (4-13) with a double, triple, and 2 RBI over 3 games with Round Rock from August 21-23, making 3 starts in left field.

POSTSEASON: Has played in 15 career postseason games with Minnesota (2009), Milwaukee (2011) and Houston (2015)...owns a .273 (9x33) batting average with three homers, five RBI and an .879 OPS (.333 OBP/.545 SLG)...scored the game-winning run in Game 5 of the 2011 NLDS vs. Arizona, sending Milwaukee to the NLCS...hit two home runs for Houston in the 2015 postseason.

2015: Played in 115 combined games between Houston (41g) and Milwaukee (74g), batting .255 (111x435) with 29 doubles, one triple, 12 homers, 56 RBI and 17 stolen bases... hit .242 (36x149) with nine doubles, four homers, 10 steals and 13 RBI in his 41 games with the Astros (38 starts in center field)...made his eighth career Opening Day roster and start...played in eight games with Milwaukee before getting placed on the 15-day Disabled List with a right hamstring strain on April 17 (retroactive to April 16)...injured the hamstring while running to first base on April 15 at STL...was activated from the DL on May 2...traded to Houston on July 30...battled intercostal discomfort for the Astros final 20 regular season games, playing in just three games (one start)...made his first career appearance in the infield on April 10, moving to second base after Scooter Gennett was ejected...added two leadoff homers to his ledger, belting leadoff shots on May 18 at DET and May 29 vs. ARI, giving him nine career leadoff homers...played in his 1,000th Major League game on May 26 vs. SF...scored his 500th career run on July 2 at PHI...hit his first career grand slam on July 3 vs. CIN, tying a career-high with five RBI...hit his 100th career home run on Aug. 4 at TEX...recorded an extra-base hit in five straight games from Sept. 6-11...was tied for the secondlongest streak by an Astro in 2015 with Jason Castro, behind Jose Altuve's six-game run...pinch-ran in the 8th inning on Sept. 28 vs. TEX...stole second base and then scored on a passed ball, giving Houston an insurance run in their 4-2 win over the division-rival Rangers...in his last start of the season on Sept. 30 at SEA, went 2x4 with a run scored and two steals...executed a game-ending double play by catching a line drive by Franklin Gutierrez and doubling up James Jones at first base...was his 13th career multi-hit, multi-steal game, and his first since Aug. 2, 2014 at STL...played in five of Houston's six postseason games, making four starts in center field...went 4x15 (.267) with two homers and three RBI... homered in Game 4 of the ALDS vs. KC and the Wild Card Game at NYY...hit .307 (23x75) with six doubles, four homers, eight RBI, five steals and a .900 OPS (.354 OBP/.547 SLG) over his final 24 games combined between the regular season and postseason...was acquired by Houston from Milwaukee along with RHP Mike Fiers and slot number 76 in the 2015-16 international pool in exchange for LHP Josh Hader, RHP Adrian Houser, OF Brett Phillips and OF Domingo Santana...2014: Was named to his second consecutive All-Star Team, leading the Brewers in runs (95), homers (23), total bases (274), slugging (.477) and steals (34)...ranked second in the National League in hit by pitches (19), fourth in runs and steals, tied for ninth in total bases (274) and tied for 10th in extra-base hits (61)... was voted as a starter (LF) for the All-Star Game for the first time in his career...was the only Major League player to reach 20 homers and 30 steals in each of the 2013 and 2014 seasons...joined Ryan Braun as the only players in Milwaukee franchise history to record two seasons with 20 homers and 30 stolen bases...batted .331 (43x130) with runners in scoring position, which ranked seventh in the NL... hit five leadoff homers...made his seventh career Opening Day roster...suspended for three games by Major League Basegball on April 22 for his role in a bench-clearing incident on April 20 at PIT...served the suspension from May 14-16... was named the Brewers Player of the Month for March/April (.293, 7 HR, 15 RBI) and May (.354, 4 HR, 16 RBI)...tied his single-game career high of four hits on April 4 at BOS and May 23 at MIA...reached base safely in 35 consecutive games from May 7-June 22, which marked the fifth-longest streak in Milwaukee franchise history...recorded a careerhigh 18-game hitting streak from June 2-22, which was also the longest streak by a Brewer in 2014...hit .325 (25x77) during the streak...2013: Had a career-year after signing a three-year contract extension with Milwaukee on March 13... finished ninth in the NL MVP voting, was named the Brewers MVP by the Milwaukee Chapter of the BBWAA, earned a Rawlings Gold Glove Award, received a National League Player of the Week nod (April 15-21) and was named an All-Star for the first time in his career...became the first Brewers player in 30 years to win a Gold Glove Award (SS Robin

Yount, 1982), which was the longest drought in the history of the award...ranked among the NL leaders in triples (T-2nd, 10), steals (4th, 40), slugging (7th, .506) and extra-base hits (T-8th, 61), while ranking second among MLB center fielders in outfield assists (12)...led the team in doubles (27), homers (24), extra-base hits, total bases (271) and slugging percentage...was tied for the club lead in runs (80) and triples...became the first player in club history to record at least 20 homers and 40 steals in a single season...was the only player in the Majors to reach 20 homers and 35 steals... became the second center fielder in club history to make an All-Star Team, joining Davey May (1973)...made his sixth career Opening Day roster...named the NL Player of the Week for the week of April 15-21 after batting .500 (9x18) with two homers, three RBI and five runs in six games... recorded his 500th career hit on April 21 vs. CHC with a single off RHP Scott Feldman...recorded the longest hitting streak by a Brewer in 2013 with his 14-game run from April 23-May 8 (.491, 26x53, 4 HR, 9 BI)...recorded his first career multi-homer game on May 25 vs. PIT...had another multihomer game two days later on May 27 vs. MIN...went 0x1 (grounded out against RHP Mariano Rivera) in the All-Star Game on July 16 at Citi Field...played 3.0 innings in right field...served a one-game suspension on Sept. 26 following his actions while rounding the bases on a home run on Sept. 25 at ATL...2012: Set career highs in homers (19), batting average (.260), on-base percentage (.305), slugging percentage (.463), stolen bases (37) and OPS (.768) in what was his sixth Major League season...made 98 starts, all in center field...ranked tied for fifth in the National League in steals...was one of five Major League players to reach 15 homers and 30 steals, joining Ryan Braun, Mike Trout, B.J. Upton and Jimmy Rollins...closed out his season by batting .281 (66x235) with 14 homers and 33 RBI over his last 67 games...raised his batting average 27 points from .233 to .260...made his fifth career Opening Day roster...hit his first career pinch-hit homer on April 24 vs. HOU with a solo shot off RHP Brett Myers...was placed on the 15-day Disabled List on May 6 with a strained left hamstring (retroactive to May 5)...suffered the injury while running the bases on May 4 at SF...activated from the DL on May 20...played four games on a rehab assignment at Class A Wisconsin from May 16-19... named the National League Co-Player of the Week with Drew Stubbs for the week of July 23-29...hit .346 (9x26) with four homers and 10 RBI during the week...avoided arbitration by signing a one-year contract on Jan. 17...selected to the Dominican Republic provisional roster for the 2013 World Baseball Classic...2011: Made 59 starts in center field, playing in 94 total games...went 16-for-18 in stolen base attempts...made his fourth Opening Day roster and homered on Opening Day for the second consecutive year...followed Rickie Weeks leadoff homer on Opening Day (March 31 at CIN), becoming the first teammates to lead off a season with consecutive homers since Cincinnati's Pete Rose and Bobby Tolan on April 7, 1969 vs. LA...became the first Brewer to homer on back-to-back Opening Day games since Richie Sexson from 2003-04...hit his first career inside-the-park homer on May 28 vs. SF off LHP Jonathan Sanchez...placed on the 15-day Disabled List on July 21 with a fractured left clavicle...suffered the injury while making a catch on July 20 at ARI...underwent surgery on his left clavicle on July 25 (performed by Dr. William Raasch)...played in four rehab games at Class A Wisconsin from Aug. 27-31...activated from the DL on Sept. 1...played in eight postseason games, batting .357 (5x14) with a homer and two RBI...scored the game-winning run in Game 5 of the NLDS on Oct. 7 vs. ARI,

sending Milwaukee to the NLCS...entered the game as a defensive replacement in the 8th inning before hitting a oneout single, stealing second and scoring on a Nyjer Morgan RBI-single...played in 23 games for Augilas in the Dominican Winter League...signed a one-year contract on Dec. 17, 2010, to avoid the arbitration process...2010: Hit .247 (72x291) with five homers, 24 RBI and 18 steals in 97 games during his first season with the Brewers...made 67 starts, including 66 in center field and one in right field...led the club in stolen bases...made an Opening Day roster for the third consecutive year...went 4x5 with two runs, a double, solo homer and stolen base on Opening Day vs. COL...joined Chuck Carr (1996) and Felipe Lopez (2009) as the only players in club history to produce four hits in their debut with the club...placed on the 15-day Disabled List on May 11 with a strained left rotator cuff (retroactive to May 6)...injured diving back to a base on May 5 at LAD...activated from the DL on May 21...was on the DL from Aug. 6-24 with a concussion, retroactive to Aug. 3...hit by a pitch from RHP Brian Schlitter on Aug. 2 at CHC...closed out his season by batting .356 (16x45)...played in 19 games for Escogido of the Dominican Winter League following the season, batting .269 (18x67) with a .364 OBP...signed a one-year contract on Jan. 19, to avoid the arbitration process...2009: Played in 137 games, making 86 starts in center field...stole 14 bases...committed just one error during the entire season (Aug. 5 at CLE)... made his second career Opening Day roster...recorded a career-high five RBI on July 12 vs. CWS in a 13-7 win... scored the game-winning run in Game 163 of the 2009 season, clinching the AL Central Division for the Twins over the Tigers...singled in the 9th inning and scored on a single by Santiago Casilla...played in one game in the postseason, starting in center field (0x4) in Game 2 of the ALDS vs. NYY... played for Escogido in the Dominican Winter League...traded to Milwaukee following the season on Nov. 6, in exchange for SS J.J. Hardy...2008: Played his first full season in the Major Leagues, making his first career Opening Day roster and start, batting leadoff and starting in center field for the Twins on March 31 (went 2x3)...entered the year as the Mets third-best prospect as ranked by Baseball America...also tabbed as the organization's 'Best Athlete', 'Fastest Baserunner', 'Best Defensive Outfielder', and 'Best Outfield Arm'...hit .258 with seven homers, 59 RBI and 33 steals in 153 games...made 143 starts in center field...ranked seventh in the AL in steals...his 30 bunt hits led the Majors and established a Twins franchise record...ranked second in the Majors in infield hits (50) behind Ichiro Suzuki (52)...hit his first career leadoff homer on April 24 at OAK off LHP Greg Smith...hit for the cycle on May 7 at CWS in what was his first career four-hit game...hit his second career leadoff homer in the contest (off LHP Mark Buehrle)...marked the eighth cycle in Twins history, and the first since Kirby Puckett in 1986... recorded a career-high 12-game hitting streak from May 31-June 11, batting .259 (14x54)...named the AL Co-Player of the Week with Cleveland's Asdrubal Cabrera for the week of Sept. 8-14...hit .333 (7x21) with 10 RBI during the week... played for Escogido in the Dominican Winter League following the season...was acquired by the Twins on Feb. 2 along with Deolis Guerra, Philip Humber and Kelvin Mulvey in exchange for Johan Santana...2007: In his debut season in the Majors, played in 58 games with the Mets, batting .232 (29x125) with two homers, 12 RBI and 12 steals...entered the year as the Mets third-best prospect as ranked by Baseball America...also tabbed as the organization's 'Best Athlete', 'Fastest Baserunner', 'Best Defensive Outfielder', and 'Best Outfield Arm'...began the year at Triple A before getting

CAREER: The 30-year-old veteran signed a one-year contract with the Rangers on Feb. 29 and will likely see most of his action in left field this season...prior to joining Texas, spent his entire career with the Washington Nationals franchise...is one of only seven major league players with at least 19 home runs and 25 doubles in each of the last four seasons, and has recorded 20-or-more stolen bases in four different seasons...a three-time Silver Slugger Award winner and an All-Star in 2012, Desmond has played 906 games over the past six campaigns (2010-15), ranking 11th in MLB...he also ranks among National League leaders in that span in hits (8th, 894), doubles (T9th, 178), and extrabase hits (12th, 303)...is one of only six big league players with at least 100 home runs and stolen bases since the start of 2010, joining Ryan Braun, Ian Kinsler, Andrew McCutchen, Hanley Ramirez, and Mike Trout...his 88 home runs since the start of 2012 are 12th-most in the N.L.

SILVER SLUGGERS / ALL-STAR: Won 3 consecutive N.L. Silver Slugger Awards at shortstop from 2012-14, first N.L. SS with 3 straight awards since Barry Larkin (5 in a row, 1988-92)...only other MLB players to win the award in each of those years were Andrew McCutchen (N.L. OF), Yadier Molina (N.L. C), and Mike Trout (A.L. OF)...is one of 7 shortstops to win the award 3+ times since it began in 1980, joining Larkin (9), Cal Ripken (8), Alex Rodriguez (7), Derek Jeter (5), Edgar Renteria (3), and Alan Trammell (3)... players with 3 Silver Slugger Awards since the start of 2012: McCutchen (4), Trout (4), Miguel Cabrera (3), Buster Posey (3), Desmond (3)...was selected by N.L. manager Tony LaRussa for the 2012 All-Star Game, but was forced to sit out of the contest in Kansas City due to a sore left oblique muscle that would eventually land him on the disabled list.

POSTSEASON: Played for Nationals in NLDS losses in both 2012 and 2014, batting .270 (10-37) with a double over 9 games...went 7-for-12 in 1st 3 career postseason games, has gone 3-for-25 (.120) in last 6 G...in the 2012 NLDS vs. STL, hit .368 (7-19) for Nats club that led 6-0 in decisive Game 5 before losing 9-7...his .368 OBP led all Nats in that series, and his 7 hits were 2nd to only Ryan Zimmerman (8)...hit .167 (3-18) in Nats' 4-game loss to eventual World Champion Giants in 2014 NLDS.

NATIONALS: Originally selected by the Montreal Expos in the 3rd round of the 2004 June draft and spent 12 seasons in that organization spanning the major league team's move to Washington, D.C. after the 2004 campaign...ranks second in Nationals history (2005-15) to Ryan Zimmerman in most offensive categories, including games (927), runs (424), hits (917), doubles (185), home runs (110), RBI (432), total bases (1474), game-winning RBI (62)...his 122 steals are a club record since the move from Montreal, as are his 12 games

of 4+ hits...in 2012, switched uniform numbers from No. 6 to No. 20 to honor Hall of Famer and former Nationals manager Frank Robinson.

2015: In final year with Washington, batted .233 with 19 HR and 62 RBI in 156 games, career lows in average and OBP (.290), 2nd-lowest SLG (.384) and OPS (.674) to only 2011...his 156 games were 2nd-most in any season (158 G in 2013) and his 45 walks were one shy of career high (46 BB in 2014)...his 187 SO were most in his career and 2nd-most in N.L. (CHC's Kris Bryant-199)...had 13 steals, lowest total in any full season...at home, had .275/.321/.454/.775 line against a road line of .195/.261/.320/.581.

AFTER THE BREAK: Following the All-Star break, batted .262/.331/.446/.777 over his final 72 games with 12 HR and 38 RBI...among Nationals, only player with more HR was N.L. MVP Bryce Harper (16) and his 38 RBI were tied with Harper for 2nd on club behind only Ryan Zimmerman (39)...in August, batted season-best .314 (32-102), posting 2016 monthly highs with 6 HR, 18 RBI, 14 R, and 6 SB...had 2nd career multi-HR game, 8/10 at LAD...his .914 OPS for the month was 20th in the N.L.

NOTES: On 7/23 at PIT, became the 2nd player in WSH history (2005-15) to reach the 100-HR mark (also Zimmerman)...his 34 multi-hit games were 3rd on club...his 24 infield hits were T6th in N.L...singled in his only pinch PA on 6/11 at MIL...hit .195 (29-149) with RISP...according to baseball-reference, his 29 productive outs ranked as 2ndmost in MLB (CWS' Alexei Ramirez-30)...had 27 errors, 2nd-most of his career and 2nd-most among ML SS (OAK's Marcus Semien-35).

2014: Won 3rd straight Silver Slugger Award after careerhigh 91 RBI, 7th-most in N.L...3rd straight 20-HR, 20-SB campaign, one of just 5 players in MLB to do it in 2014 (Todd Frazier, Brian Dozier, Carlos Gomez, Michael Brantley)...his 24 HR were most among ML SS and remain 2nd-highest total of his career...had GW HR in both Nats' N.L. East clincher (9/26 at ATL) and in Jordan Zimmerman's no-hitter (1-0 win, 9/28 vs. MIA) as his 15 GW RBI were most among ML SS...went 8-for-12 (.750) with a double, grand slam, and 17 RBI with the bases loaded...the slam was on 4/10 vs. MIA (Arquimedes Caminero)...had career-high 46 BB...careerhigh 5 RBI on 6/9 at SF (3-5, 2B, 3B)...had 5 hits on 7/21 at COL to match career best...hits in 7 straight PA's 7/21-22)...had 3rd-most SO in N.L. (183)...2013: Won 2nd straight Silver Slugger Award after career-high 38 doubles and 158 games...his 38 doubles were T7th in the N.L...one of 9 players in MLB with a 20-HR, 20-SB season and the only infielder to do it (other 8 players were OF)...paced MLB shortstops with 61 XBH and 12 GW RBI...his 43 BB are still

3rd-most in his career...28 June RBI set a Nationals singlemonth mark (bested Adam Dunn, 27 in May 2009)...1st career grand slam came in 11th-inning of 6-2 win, 6/19 at PHI...N.L. Gold Glove finalist played career-high/DC-baseball record 59 straight errorless games at SS, 4/22-6/27...hit solo homer in 11th inning to snap a 5-5 tie and set stage for a 7-6 win on 4/6 at CIN...starting/batting cleanup for the first time in career, plated both runs in 2-0 win on 5/1 at ATL with 2-run HR in the 4th inn. off Paul Maholm...his 145 SO were T7th in N.L...2012: Won 1st N.L. Silver Slugger Award as N.L.'s top offensive shortstop in his lone All-Star season...led all MLB SS in HR (25), slugging (.511) and OPS (.845), career highs in all 3 categories as well as average (.292)...most HR ever by a D.C. middle infielder (1901-71, 2005-15)...1st of 3 consecutive 20-HR, 20-SB seasons...hit 17 HR before break, and had .308 average in 2nd 'half'...on DL, 7/22-8/16 with left oblique strain that also caused him to miss an appearance at the All-Star Game in Kansas City...increased fielding percentage by 23 points, made 19 fewer errors and upped zone rating by 49 points compared to rookie season (2010) totals...was N.L. Gold Glove Finalist...2011: Hit .253 with 27 2B and 49 RBI over 154 games in his 2nd full big league season...career-high 25 stolen bases, most among Nats... career-best 11-game hit streak, 6/5-17 (.319, 15-47)...gameending infield single, 7/31 vs. NYM...hit game-tying HR on 1-2 pitch off Antonio Bastardo on 8/21 vs. PHI, eventual 5-4, 10-inning win...had 5 hits on 9/16 at NYM...2010: In his 1st full ML season, paced N.L. rookies with 42 multi-hit games... also ranked among N.L. rookie leaders in stolen bases (T2nd, 17), hits (3rd, 141), total bases (4th, 206), RBI (6th, 65), runs (6th, 59), doubles (6th, 27), triples (T6th, 4) and XBH (8th, 41)...one of 2 rookies on Nats Opening Day roster...his 10 HR were most by a MON/WSH shortstop since Orlando Cabrera hit 17 for 2003 Expos...one of 5 N.L. shortstops with 40+XBH, joining Troy Tulowitzki (62), Stephen Drew (58), Hanley Ramirez (51) and Jose Reyes (50)...2009: Capped strong minor league season as September call-up for Nats, batting .280 (23-82) with 4 HR, 12 RBI, and .879 OPS over 21 G in 1st ML action...in ML debut on 9/10 vs. PHI, went 2-4 with a 2B, HR, and 4 RBI...became 2nd SS since 1920, when RBI were first tracked, to post as many as 4 RBI in ML debut (also PHI's Ted Kazanski, 6/25/53 at CHI)...became just the 2nd big-leaguer since 1920 to record at least 6 hits and 4 RBI in his first 2 ML games...went 10-for-17 with 4 2B, a HR and 4 RBI in his 1st 4 games, becoming the 1st player to collect 10+ hits in initial 4 MLB contests since SFG's Jim Davenport (10for-18) in 1958...also became 1st player since BOS's Morgan Burkhart (2000) to start a career with multi-hit efforts in 1st 4 games...was the first N.L. player to do so since CHI's Doug Dascenzo (1988)...had surgery to remove hook of hamate in left hand, 4/23, performed by Dr. Thomas Graham in Baltimore...combined to hit .330 in 97 games with Double-A Harrisburg and Triple-A Syracuse...2008: Appeared in 96 games, batting combined .256 with 12 HR, 46 RBI and 15 SB with Harrisburg and the Nationals' Gulf Coast League affiliate...played in the Arizona Fall League, batting .267 (27-101) with 6 2B, 4 3B, 4 HR, and 17 RBI in 28 games for Peoria Saguaros...2007: After being named the no. 10 prospect in the Nationals' chain by Baseball America, batted .264 with 13 HR and 45 RBI in 129 games with Potomac (High-A)...led team with 69 runs and 27 stolen bases... 2006: Played in 129 games with Double-A Harrisburg and Single-A Potomac, batting .228 with 24 2B, nine HR, 48 RBI and 18 stolen bases...played season's first two months with Harrisburg, then finished campaign with Potomac...hit .247 with a HR, 5 RBI and 6 stolen bases in 26 G with the Waikiki BeachBoys

of the Hawaiian Winter League...**2005:** Made major splash in spring training before advancing 2 levels in the Nationals' system...capped season with Single-A Potomac despite being just 20 years old...at age of 19, hit .306 (11-36) with a 2B, 3B and 4 RBI in 20 Grapefruit League contests with the Nationals...with Savannah (A) of the South Atlantic League, went 0-for-2 on Opening Day, but began a 12-game hitting streak the next day...despite spending only half a season there, was rated as one of the SAL's top 20 prospects by Baseball America ...also honored as SAL's top defensive SS in a BA post-season survey of league managers...**2004:** Combined to hit .228 with 2 home runs and 28 RBI in 59 G for the GCL Expos and Vermont of the Short-Season New York-Penn League during professional debut...hit 1st pro home run on 8/26 vs. GCL Mets.

CAREER: The 30-year-old catcher was acquired in an Aug. 1 trade with Milwaukee, where he had spent his entire career since being selected by the Brewers in the third round of the 2007 June draft...a two-time All-Star (2014, 2016), Lucroy (pronounced luke-roy) produced a .788 OPS figure over his first five full seasons in the major leagues from 2011-15, second-highest among players appearing primarily at catcher in that span (.862-Buster Posey)...his swing-andmiss percentage of 14.4% over those five seasons was the eighth-lowest among all National League gualifiers in that span, as he has averaged 50 walks against 93 strikeouts per 162 games in his career...a Louisiana resident, he led the majors with 53 doubles in 2014, the first time a player appearing primarily at catcher had led his league in doubles in modern MLB history (since 1900)...has been active with community work away from the field, and was the recipient of the Brewers Good Guy Award for three straight seasons (2013-14-15) as voted on by members of the Milwaukee Chapter of the BBWAA...in 2015, also won the Bob Feller Act of Valor Award, which goes to a player who possesses the values, integrity and dedication to serving our country which Bob Feller himself displayed...on March 27, 2012, signed a 5-year contract with Milwaukee through the 2016 season with a club option for 2017.

CAREER: The veteran switch-hitter was acquired by Texas in a August 1 trade with the New York Yankees...a nine-time All-Star (including 2016), he is the only player in major league history to record four-or-more consecutive seasons with at least 100 runs, 20 home runs, 100 RBI and 30 stolen bases, a feat he accomplished each season from 2001-04...the twotime Silver Slugger Award winner is one of five players in baseball history with seven-or-more seasons of at least 20 HR and 20 steals, joining Barry Bonds (10), Bobby Bonds (10), Bobby Abreu (9) and Eric Davis (7)...at the start of the season, the three-time Gold Glove Award winner ranked third among active players in runs scored (1,449), trailing Alex Rodriguez (2,002) and Albert Pujols (1,599)...has driven in a game-winning run against every current major league team, joining Bret Boone, J.D.
