ABOUT THE A'S: The A's open their 51st season in Oakland where they have won 16 American League West titles, two AL Wild Cards, six AL pennants and four World Championships...only the New York Yankees (18) and Atlanta Braves (17) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11) and Cardinals (8) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...have a 4119-3850 (.517) record over the previous 50 seasons in Oakland...only four teams have won more games over that span (New York Yankees, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis)...this is the Athletics franchise 118th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 16 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships...the A's are 8834-9322 (.487) in their previous 117 seasons...that includes a 3886-4248 record from 1901-54 in Philadelphia and 829-1224 from 1955-67 in Kansas City.

DURING THE SPRING: The A's went 14-16-2 (.469) this spring, which was the fifth worst record in the Cactus League...it marks the third consecutive year Oakland has finished with a losing record during the spring...this is just the third time in Oakland history the A's have posted a losing record in at least three consecutive springs...also did it in three straight years from 2009-11 and four straight from 1974-77...the A's defense turned 39 double plays, which was second most in the majors (Atlanta, 42)...committed 24 errors, which tied for fourth fewest in the CL...the offense ranked third in the CL in fewest strikeouts (25), but were fourth in lowest on-base percentage (.325) and fewest doubles (59) and fifth in lowest batting average (.261)...tied with Houston for the Major League lead in sacrifice flies (16) and also tied for the fewest hit by pitches (8)...hit 44 home runs, which were the most by an A's team during the spring since 2004 when they had 50...the pitching staff has compiled a 3.82 ERA (83 er in 195.2 ip) over the last 22 games after posting a 7.45 ERA over the first 10 contests...surrendered 38 home runs, which tied for fourth fewest in the CL, but issued 114 walks, which tied for second most.

FOR OPENERS: The A's have won two of their last three openers after a Major League record 10-game Opening Day losing streak from 2005-14...are now 6-18 on Opening Day dating back to 1994...this is the third earliest Opening Day in Athletics history and the earliest in North America...opened in Japan on March 25, 2008 and March 28, 2012...will open in Oakland for the sixth consecutive season and will be the home team for the ninth straight year (2012 in Tokyo)...will face the Angels on Opening Day for the second consecutive season and sixth time in Oakland history...are 3-2 in the previous five meetings, including 2-0 in Oakland (1982, 2017) and 1-2 in Anaheim (1976, 1978, 2009)...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 22-28 on Opening Day, including 18-14 in Oakland, 4-11 on the road, 0-2 in Tokyo and 0-1 in Las Vegas...all-time, the Athletics are 54-63 in openers.

OPENING DAY: The A's will play a day game for their home opener for just the second time in the last 41 years...the last time was on April 11, 1994, a 14-5 loss to Toronto...this marks just the seventh day home opener in Oakland history (1971, 1972, 1974, 1976, 1977, 1994, 2018).

OPENING DAY STARTING LINEUPS: Four players return from last year's Opening Day starting lineup (Davis, Joyce, Lowrie, Semien)...that does not include Kendall Graveman, who will become just the second A's pitcher to start back-to-back openers over the last 13 years (Sonny Gray, 2014-15)...Oakland has used 11 different starting pitchers on Opening Day over the last 13 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice)...Matt Olson will be the A's seventh different Opening Day starter at first base in the last seven years, Matt Chapman will be the A's fifth different third baseman in the last five years and Boog Powell will be the A's fifth different center fielder in the last five years...Marcus Semien will make his fourth consecutive Opening Day start at short.

ROSTER NOTES: The A's open the season with 13 pitchers and 12 position players for the second consecutive year...prior to last year, the A's had not opened the season with more than 12 pitchers on a 25-man Opening Day roster since 1994 when they had 13 (had 14 on the 1995 Opening Day roster, which was expanded to 28 following the strike)...10 players return from last years Opening Day roster (Casilla, Coulombe, Davis, Graveman, Hendriks, Joyce, Lowrie, Manaea, Semien, Triggs) and 10 other players on the roster played for the A's at some point last year (Chapman, Gossett, Hatcher, Maxwell, Mengden, Olson, Pinder, Powell, Smolinski, Treinen)...two were signed as a free agent (Lucroy, Petit), and three were acquired in a trade (Buchter, Pagan, Piscotty).

TENURE: Of the 25 players on the A's Opening Day roster, only two played for the A's prior to the 2015 season (Casilla, Lowrie)...however, both of those have played for other teams since then and neither were with the A's in 2015...only two players have been on each of the A's last four Opening Day rosters (Graveman, Semien)...Bruce Maxwell and Matt Olson, who were drafted in 2012, have the longest interrupted tenure with the A's organization.

ROOKIE AND VETERANS: The A's have no rookies on the Opening Day roster for just the second time in the last 12 years (also 2014)...five players have six or more years of service: Casilla (10 years, 148 days), Lowrie (9 years, 111 days), Joyce (8 years, 123 days), Lucroy (7 years, 136 days) and Petit (7 years, 16 days).

THE YOUNG AND THE OLD: The average age on the A's Opening Day roster is 28.56 years...Matt Olson, who turns 24 today, is the youngest player...he is followed by Matt Chapman (24 years, 335 days), Daniel Mengden (25 years, 38 days) and Boog Powell (25 years, 74 days)...there are eight players age 30 or older...Santiago Casilla is the oldest at 37 years, 255 days and is the oldest player on an A's Opening Day roster since Bartolo Colón in 2011 (38 years, 309 days)...he is followed by Jed Lowrie (33 years, 347 days), Matt Joyce (33 years, 238 days), Yusmeiro Petit (33 years, 127 days) and Chris Hatcher (33 years, 76 days).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's begin the season with five players on the disabled list for the third consecutive season (Blackburn, Cotton, Dull, Núñez, Phegley)...Oakland used the DL 23 times last year and the players combined to miss 1058 games, an average of 46.0 games per stint...it marked the third consecutive season and seventh time in the last 11 years the A's have used the DL at least 20 times...have had at least three players on the DL every day since July 30, 2011 and have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

A'S ON THE RADIO: 95.7 FM The Game is in its eighth season as flagship of the A's Radio Network...due to conflicts with the Warriors, the following games will air in the Bay Area on Q102 (102.1 FM): Sunday vs. Los Angeles (AL), next Tuesday and Thursday against Texas, April 7 and 8 at Los Angeles (AL) and April 10 at Los Angeles (NL)...additional updates will be announced based on the Warriors postseason schedule.

CONTRACT STATUS: The A's have two players under contract beyond the 2018 season...Yusmeiro Petit is signed through 2019 with a club option for 2020 and Stephen Piscotty is signed through 2022 with a club option for 2023.

WEST COAST: The A's will play each of their first 22 games on the west coast, beginning with this eight-game homestand against Los Angeles (AL) and Texas...the first road trip is an eight-game jaunt to Los Angeles (AL), Los Angeles (NL) and Seattle, which is followed by a six-game homestand against Chicago (AL) and Boston.

A'S vs. ANGELS: The A's went 7-12 against the Angels last year for the second consecutive season...the 12 losses matched the most in Oakland history against the Angels in a season (2009 and 2016)...have now dropped four consecutive season series and are 31-45 (.408) against Los Angeles over that span...this marks the first time the Athletics franchise (Kansas City and Oakland) has lost four straight season series to the Angels...went 5-5 in Oakland last year and 2-7 in Anaheim...the seven losses matched Oakland's most in a season at Anaheim (2010 and 2014)...have lost 10 of the last 12 games at Angel Stadium and 26 of the last 37...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 428-366 against the Angels...that includes 223-172 in Oakland and 205-194 in Anaheim...all-time, the A's are 477-443 against the Angels.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Olson is celebrating his 24th birthday today and will become the second player in Oakland history and the fifth in Athletics history to make on Opening Day start on their birthday...the other four are Ray Fosse (2-for-5, RBI on April 4, 1974), Pete Suder (0-for-3 on April 16, 1952), Charlie Pick (1-for-2, walk on April 12, 1916) and Ossee Schreckengost (April 11, 1907).

OAKLAND A'S 50th ANNIVERSARY MOMENT

The A's are playing on March 29 for just the second time in Oakland history...in **2012** Cuban native Yoenis Céspedes hits his first Major League home run as the A's defeat Seattle 4-1 in Tokyo, Japan.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Kendall Graveman (6-4, 4.19 ERA in 2017)

FOR OPENERS: Begins his fifth season in the majors and is on his fourth consecutive Opening Day roster...is one of just two players that has been on each of the A's last four Opening Day rosters (Semien)...is scheduled to make his second consecutive Opening Day start and will become just the second A's pitcher to start back-to-back openers over the last 13 years (Sonny Gray, 2014-15)...picked up the win last year against the Angels on April 3 in Oakland, a 4-2 decision (6.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 7 so) and is attempting to become the first A's pitcher to win back-to-back openers since Dave Stewart won four straight from 1988-91...Oakland has used 11 different starting pitchers on Opening Day over the last 13 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).

SPRING TRAINING RECAP: Went 1-2 with a 7.53 ERA in five starts this spring...allowed a .305 (18-for-59) opponents batting average...did not allow a home run in 14.1 innings and struck out 16 (10.05 per nine innings)...surrendered one run in his first start, posted a 14.14 ERA in his second through fourth starts and then tossed 5.1 scoreless innings in his final Cactus League start on March 19 at Los Angeles (NL)...also pitched in a minor league game March 24.

GRAVEMAN vs. LOS ANGELES: Is 2-2 with a 3.96 ERA (63.2 ip, 66 h, 29 r, 28 er, 16 bb, 45 so, 9 hr) in 11 career starts...is 1-2 with a 4.96 ERA (18 er in 32.2 ip) in six starts in Anaheim and 1-0 with a 2.90 ERA (10 er in 31.0 ip) in five starts in Oakland...went 1-1 with a 4.66 ERA (29.0 ip, 30 h, 15 r, 15 er, 9 bb, 25 so, 5 hr) in five starts last year...the win came in the A's 4-2 victory in Oakland on Opening Day, April 3...became the A's 11th different Opening Day starting pitcher in the last 12 years...is just the second of those pitchers

to pick up the win (Gray, 2015)...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a two-run home run to Trout in the third inning...those were the only runs he would allow in six innings of work...then took the loss in a 2-1 decision at Los Angeles April 27...allowed a RBI single to Pujols and a RBI double to Cron in the first inning but retired each of the next eight batters...shutout the Angels on three hits over his final five innings...Oakland was held to a run on three hits by Nolasco and four relievers...had a no decision in the A's 3-2, 11-inning win over Los Angeles (AL) May 8 in Oakland...surrendered a two-run home run to Valbuena in the first inning, but those were the only runs he would allow...shutout the Angels on five hits and a walk over his final six innings...also had a no decision in the A's 10-8 loss at Anaheim Aug. 30...allowed a solo home run to Trout in the first and a two-run home run to Pujols in the third...allowed two runs in the fifth on another two-run home run by Pujols and left after five innings with an 8-5 lead...the Angels scored five times in the seventh for the win (Hatcher blown save)...had his third no decision in an 8-7, 10-inning loss on Sept. 5...allowed three runs in the second inning on a Phillips RBI single, an Upton bases loaded walk and a Pujols sacrifice fly...the A's scored a run in the fourth but he gave that back on a Pujols RBI single in the fifth...left after five innings with a 5-4 lead but the pen allowed two runs in the sixth for the blown save.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Sean Manaea (12-10, 4.37 ERA in 2017): Went 1-0 with a 2.53 ERA in three games this spring, all starts...also pitched in a minor league game on March 23...allowed a .237 opponents batting average...issued five walks in 10.2 innings...yielded two runs or fewer in each start...is 1-2 with a 5.10 ERA (30.0 ip, 30 h, 19 r, 17 er, 11 bb, 19 so, 5 hr) in six career starts against Los Angeles...went 0-1 with a 6.23 ERA (17.1 ip, 20 h, 13 r, 12 er, 7 bb, 12 so, 2 hr) in four starts last year...compiled a 12-10 record and a 4.37 ERA in 29 starts in his second season in the majors...went 1-3 with a 5.52 ERA and .179 opponents batting average over his first six starts, 7-2 with a 2.92 ERA and .246 opponents average over an 11-start span from May 20 to July 16 and 4-5 with a 5.55 ERA and .328 opponents average over his final 12 starts...led the A's in wins, games started, innings pitched (158.2), strikeouts (140), hits (167), walks (55) and hit batters (10).

a career high as was his opponents batting average (.280), on-base percentage (.338), slugging percentage (.442) and OPS (.780)...allowed 12 home runs and his average of 1.03 home runs per nine innings was a career low...his 19 starts are his fewest in his three seasons with Oakland.

OPPONENTS BATTING: His opponents batting average broke down to .238 (44-for-185) against left-handed hitters compared to .315 (70-for-222) against right-handers...entered the season with a .273 career average against lefties, .272 against righties...opponents batted .266 with runners in scoring position but just .186 with RISP and two outs...eight of the 12 home runs he allowed came with runners on base...had a .240 opponents batting average with two strikes, which was second highest in the American League among pitchers with 100 or more innings pitched...the opponents number three hitter batted .479 with a .528 on-base percentage and .833 slugging percentage.

HOME AND AWAY: Went 5-0 with a 2.94 ERA in 11 starts at home compared to 1-4 with a 6.39 ERA in eight starts on the road...joins Kenny Rogers (11-0 in 1998) and Todd Burns (5-0 in 1988) as the only starting pitchers in Oakland history to go undefeated at home with five or more decisions...the five-game home winning streak matches the longest by an A's pitcher over the previous four seasons...in three seasons with the A's, he is 12-10 with a 3.46 ERA (83 er in 216.0 ip) in 35 starts in Oakland compared to 10-14 with a 4.85 ERA (103 er in 191.0 ip) in 36 starts on the road.

SUPPORT: Went 0-3 in seven starts with two runs of support or fewer, 6-1 in 12 starts with three runs of support or more...is now 1-20 in 32 career starts with run support of two or fewer, 21-4 in 39 starts with support of three or more...the bullpen blew the save in five of his 19 starts...over the last two years, the pen has blown 10 saves in his 50 starts.

DAYS REST: Was 3-0 with a 3.47 ERA in eight starts on four days rest, 3-4 with a 4.82 ERA in 11 starts on five days rest or more...is now 11-7 with a 3.83 ERA (85 er in 200.0 ip) in 34 career starts on four days rest compared to 11-17 with a 4.39 ERA (101 er in 207.0 ip) in 37 starts on five days rest or more.

THIS AND THAT: Made 15 of his 19 starts at night... went 5-2 with a 3.39 ERA in 14 starts against AL West competition compared to 1-2 with a 7.52 ERA in five starts against everyone else...had a 7.11 ERA in the first inning, a 3.54 ERA from the second inning on...had four double plays, which tied for second among AL pitchers...tied for ninth in the AL in triples allowed (4).

MORE 2017: Was the A's Opening Day starter on April 3 against Los Angeles (AL) and picked up the win in a 4-2 decision...became the A's 11th different Opening Day starting pitcher in the last 12 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill)...was just the second of those pitchers to pick up the win (Gray, 2015)...won his second consecutive start in the A's 6-1 win at Texas April 8...no hit the Rangers over the first six innings and Napoli broke up the no-hitter with a two out homer in the bottom of the seventh...did not strike out a batter in 5.0 innings on April 14 against Houston, his first career start without a strikeout...did it again on Aug. 3 at San Francisco and Sept. 16 at Philadelphia...was 2-0 with a 2.00 ERA and .203 opponents batting average in three starts when he was placed on the 10-day disabled April 17 retroactive April 15 with a strained right shoulder...did not have a rehab assignment and was reinstated April 27...had the second unassisted double play by a pitcher in Oakland history April 27 at Los Angeles (AL)...the other was by Blue Moon Odom, also against the Angels, in the second game of a July 11, 1971 doubleheader...went 2-1 with a 2.25 ERA in four starts in April...the ERA was the second lowest single month ERA of his career (1.93 in June, 2015)...issued a career-high tying four walks May 3 at Minnesota and allowed six runs on five hits in 3.1 innings in a 7-4 loss...left his start on May 14 at Texas with a 4-3 lead but Madson blew the save...it was the first of five times the bullpen blew a save in one of his starts (Aug. 8 vs. Seattle, Aug. 30 at Los Angeles-AL, Sept. 5 vs. Los Angeles-AL, Sept. 27 vs. Seattle)...was 0-2 with a 4.97 ERA and .289 opponents average in five starts after his April 27 reinstatement from the DL before returning to the DL a second time with a right shoulder strain on May 29 (retroactive to May 26)...was sent to Triple-A Nashville on a rehab assignment July 19 and went 0-1 with a 7.20 ERA and .383 opponents batting average in three starts...allowed four runs in 2.1 innings at Iowa July 19 and seven runs in 3.0 innings at New Orleans July 24 before allowing one run in 4.2 innings against Salt Lake July 29...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 3 and went 4-2 with a 4.47 ERA and .297 opponents batting average over his final 11 starts...struck out a career-high tying eight batters in a 9-3 victory over Baltimore Aug. 13...that began a season-ending stretch where he went 4-1 with a 3.35 ERA over his final nine starts...the bullpen had three blown saves in his four no decisions over that span and he tossed 2.0 scoreless innings in the other start (Sept. 16 at Philadelphia) before he was removed following a rain delay.
