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OAKLAND ATHLETICS (60-43) VS. TEXAS RANGERS (42-61)

THURSDAY, JULY 26, 2018 — GLOBE LIFE PARK — 7:05 P.M. CDT

ABOUT THE A'S: Have a five-game winning streak, which is one short of the season high of six (June 25-30)...are 60-43 (.583), which is the third best record in the American League West, the fifth best record in the AL and the sixth best record in the majors...are 17 games over .500 for the first time since Sept. 14, 2014 when they were 83-66...have not been 18 games over .500 since September 9, 2014 when they were 81-63...are 6½ games behind Houston in the West, which is the closest they have been to first place since June 4 when they were also 6½ back...are 1½ games behind the second Wild Card team (Seattle) for the second consecutive day.

COMEBACKS: The A's trailed 5-1 after six innings last night after trailing 10-2 after six innings the night before, but came back to win both games...this marks the first time since at least 1907 that the Athletics have won back-to-back games when trailing by four or more runs at the end of six innings of play...have overcome deficits of four or more runs to win eight times this year (eight runs once, six runs once, five runs twice and four runs four times), which are the most such wins in one season by an A's team since the 1949 Philadelphia A's also had eight (the most since 1907 is 10 in 1939)...have 29 come from behind wins for the season, which is third most in the majors (Chicago-NL 32, Philadelphia 31).

THE LAST 33 GAMES: The A's are 26-7 (.788) dating back to June 16, which is the best record in the majors over that span...it is the best 33-game stretch in the majors this year and is Oakland's best record over a 33-game stretch since July 29-Sept. 3, 2006 when they were also 26-7...have come from behind in 17 of the 26 wins (eight runs once, six runs once, five runs once, four runs twice, three runs three times, two runs four times and one run five times)...have scored the winning run in the eighth inning or later in 12 of the victories (eighth inning three times, ninth inning three times, 10th inning three times, 11th inning three times)...have not lost back-to-back games during this stretch.

THE LATE INNINGS: The A's have scored 34 runs this series, 24 in the seventh inning or later...lead the majors in runs scored in the eighth inning (76), ninth inning (53) and seventh inning or later (201) and rank second in runs in extra innings (16)...have a Major League leading 10 wins when trailing after seven innings...the only times in Oakland history the A's have won more games when trailing after seven innings are in 2014 (13) and 1969 (12)...are tied for second with four wins when trailing after eight innings (New York-AL, 5)...are 40-0 when leading after seven innings and are the only team in the majors that has not lost a game when leading after seven...have won each of their last 55 games when leading after seven innings, which is their longest such streak since a 61-game streak from June 1-Sept. 22, 2002...last lost when leading after seven innings on Sept. 2, 2017 at Texas...are 48-0 when leading after eight innings and are one of three teams without a loss in those games (New York, Seattle)...have won each of their last 75 games when leading after eight with the last loss coming on July 27, 2017 at Toronto...are batting a ML leading .273 (336-for-1233) in the seventh inning or later compared to .235 (545-for-2323) in innings 1-6, which is fourth lowest...have compiled a 3.41 ERA (120 er in 317.0 ip) in the seventh inning or later, which is third lowest in the American League.

SERIES NOTES: The A's have won the first three games of this series and will be attempting to sweep their third four-game series of the season (May 17-20 at Toronto and June 25-28 at Detroit)...the only time in Oakland history the A's have swept three four-game series in one season was in 1981...the last time they swept three four-game series on the road was in 1928...including this series, the A's are now 10-0-1 over the last 11 series...that is their longest series unbeaten streak since July 28-Sept. 3, 2006 when they went 10-0-1 over an 11 series stretch...have not lost a series since being swept by Houston in a three-game series in Oakland, June 12-14.

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit 10 home run in the first three games of the road trip...now have a Major League leading 95 home runs on the road, which is already tied for the 10th highest single season total in Athletics history...are on pace for 140 home runs on the road, which would break the ML record of 138 set by San Francisco in 2001...have 141 home runs overall, which is second most in the majors to the Yankees (162).

ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's improved to 18-8 (.692) in one-run games with a 6-5 win last night...that is the best record in the majors...improved to 17-6 (.739) in games decided in the last at bat, which is also the best record in the majors...the last at bat losses are the fewest in the majors and only Toronto has more wins (19)...have the third best record in games decided by two runs or fewer (31-14, .689) and extra inning games (9-4, .692)...have the second most extra inning games in the majors to Toronto (14)...are tied for sixth in the majors in walk-off wins (6) and are tied for the fewest walk-off losses (2).

MONTH BY MONTH: The A's have clinched a winning record in the month of July as they are 14-5 (.737) with six games remaining...went 13-12 in April, 15-14 in May and 17-10 in June...this is the eighth season in Oakland history in which the A's have posted a winning record in April, May, June and July (1971, 1972, 1975, 1990, 2003, 2013, 2014)...have the second best record in the majors this month (Boston, 15-4) and the 14 wins are the A's most in July since 2014 when they had 15.

HOMESTANDS AND ROAD TRIPS: The A's are 3-0 on this seven-game road trip to Texas (3-0) and Colorado (three games)...this trip concludes a stretch where the A's will play 27 of 35 games on the road from June 19 to July 29...are 18-5 in road games over that stretch and have won six series and split one (includes this series)...the seven-series unbeaten streak on the road is their longest since July 8-Aug. 29, 2005 when they won seven straight...have not lost a road series since they were swept in a two-game series at Texas, June 5-6...after this trip, the A's will play 17 of their next 20 games at home with all 20 coming in California (three games at Los Angeles-AL)...are 26-9 (.742) on the road dating back to May 14 and are 34-21 (.618) overall, which is the third best road record in the majors...are 26-22 (.542) at home.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are batting .266 (525-for-1970) and are averaging 5.73 runs per game on the road (315 runs in 55 games), .224 and 3.73 runs per game at home...lead the majors in runs per game on the road and rank fourth in batting...have the second lowest home batting average in the majors and the fourth fewest runs per game.

THIS AND THAT: The A's have won eight of their last nine games against American League West teams...however, are 18-26 (.409) against AL West competition compared to 42-17 (.712) against all other teams...rank second in the AL in home runs (141), fourth in doubles (197) and extra base hits (350) and fifth in runs (494) and slugging (.429).

A's vs. RANGERS: The A's lead the season series, 7-5...are 2-2 in Oakland and 5-3 in Arlington...have won 15 of the last 22 games dating back to Aug. 25 of last year...over the previous five seasons, the A's have won the season series in odd numbered years and the Rangers in even numbered years...are 56-51 against Texas dating back to the start of the 2013 season...are 359-366 all-time against the Texas Rangers...that breaks down to 189-172 in Oakland and 171-194 in Texas...are 104-106 at Globe Life Park...have an all-time record of 456-448 against the Rangers/Senators franchise.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Khris Davis has homered in four straight games for the first time in his career...has six home runs total over that span and joins Mark McGwire (June 27-30, 1987) as the only players in Oakland history to hit six home runs over a four-game stretch...has homered in six straight games against Texas, which is the second longest streak against the Rangers (7, Ken Griffey Jr., May 20-Aug. 8, 1994)...is a .303 career hitter against Texas with 25 home runs and 57 RBI in 49 games...**Jonathan Lucroy** has a 13-game hitting streak against the Rangers dating back to June 12, 2010 (17-for-46, .370)...**Stephen Piscotty** has seven home runs in the month of July, which is tied for the most in the American League (Calhoun, LAA and Davis, OAK)...**Blake Treinen** leads Major League relievers in ERA (1.04) and **Lou Trivino** ranks fourth (1.33).

In 1977 **Vida Blue** tosses a complete game four hitter in the A's 2-1 win over California...it is the 100th complete game of his career as he becomes the first and only Oakland Athletic to reach the century mark...in 1994 **Stan Javier** ties an Oakland record by collecting three doubles in the A's 6-0 win at California...**Steve Ontiveros**, **Bob Welch** and **Bill Taylor** combine on the three-hit shutout.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Trevor Cahill (1-2, 2.95 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Was reinstated from the 10-day disabled list July 12 and is 0-0 with a 3.86 ERA (4 er in 9.1 ip) and .156 (5-for-32) opponents batting average in two starts since his return...was placed on the DL June 14 retroactive to June 11 with a strained right achilles and had a one-start rehab assignment with Triple-A Nashville July 7 against Iowa (ND, 4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 bb, 7 so)...it was his second stint on the DL this year and he was also out from May 6 to 15 with a right elbow impingement...was signed by the A's as a free agent March 19 and made two spring training appearances before he was optioned to Nashville March 28...went 0-1 with a 3.72 ERA in two starts before he was recalled by Oakland April 17.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has held the opposition to a .093 (10-for-107) batting average with two strikes...has allowed a .171 (14-for-82) opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .265 (22-for-83) the second time and .150 (6-for-40) after that...they are 10-for-56 (.179) with three walks and a hit by pitch (.233 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...are 2-for-18 (.111) with runners in scoring position and two outs...has allowed four of his five home runs to right-handed hitters...three have come with runners on base.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 1-0 with a 0.80 ERA (3 er in 32.2 ip) and .165 (19-for-115) opponents batting average in five starts at home compared to 0-2 with a 5.92 ERA (16 er in 24.1 ip) and .256 (23-for-90) opponents average in five starts on the road...has not allowed a run in three of his five starts in Oakland...now has a seven-game home winning streak and a six-game road losing streak...has not lost at home since July 6, 2016 against Cincinnati and has not won on the road since Aug. 20 2016 at Colorado.

RUN SUPPORT: Received 10 runs of support in his first start, but has just 15 runs of support in his nine starts since then (51.0 ip, 2.65 RSA)...has three starts where he has not allowed a run but has received zero runs of support in two of those starts...the game has gone into extra innings in four of his 10 starts this year...has a 1.01 ERA (3 er in 26.2 ip) in those FOUR starts but has just five runs of support.

WILD PITCH: Has seven wild pitches and now has 23 over the last two years, which are second most in the majors (Godley, 25), despite just 31 games and 142.0 innings over that stretch.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS: Was recalled from Triple-A Nashville April 17 and started and won that day in a 10-2 victory over Chicago (AL)...tossed 7.0 shutout innings and allowed five hits and two walks in his first start as an Athletic since Sept. 27, 2011 at Seattle...struck out a career-high 12 batters in just 6.0 innings May 5 against Baltimore...it was his third career game of 10 or more strikeouts, his first since June 14, 2013 at San Diego...became the third A's pitcher since at least 1908 to strikeout 12 or more batters in six innings or fewer, the first since Steve Karsay on April 26, 1997 vs. Kansas City (12 so in 6.0 ip)...the other is Vida Blue on April 9, 1971 vs. Kansas City (13 so in 6.0 ip)...ended up with a no decision in the A's 2-0, 12-inning win...was 1-1 with a 2.25 ERA in four starts when he was placed on the disabled list May 9 retroactive to May 6 with a right elbow impingement...did not make a rehab appearance before he was reinstated May 16...lost to Boston that day and then had back-to-back no decisions in extra innings on May 22 against Seattle and May 28 against Tampa Bay...tossed 8.0 scoreless innings and allowed just four hits while not walking a batter in the latter contest...was 0-1 with a 3.28 ERA and .225 opponents batting average in four starts after returning from the DL and was 1-2 with a 2.77 ERA and .214 opponents batting average in eight starts before returning to the DL a second time...was placed on the 10-day DL June 14 retroactive to June 11 with a right achilles strain.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 11-inning win over San Francisco last Saturday in Oakland...retired nine of the first 10 batters he faced (Crawford lead off walk in the second) before allowing a one-out solo home run to Belt in the fourth...that was the only run he allowed in 5.2 innings and he left with a 3-1 lead...Treinen allowed a Pence RBI double in the ninth for the blown save.

CAHILL vs. TEXAS: Is 10-4 with a 2.81 ERA (115.1 ip, 102 h, 41 r, 36 er, 34 bb, 72 so, 10 hr) in 18 career appearances, all starts...the 10 wins are his most against any team...nine of those wins have come with the A's, which is tied for second most in Oakland history against the Rangers...the only pitcher with more is Barry Zito with 17...is 4-1 with a 2.58 ERA (13 er in 45.1 ip) in eight starts at Globe Life Park and 6-3 with a 2.96 ERA (23 er in 70.0 ip) in 11 starts in his home ballparks...is 5-3 with a 3.18 ERA (20 er in 56.2 ip) in nine starts in the Coliseum...had a no decision in his only start this year, a 9-4 A's win at Texas on April 23...Oakland scored twice in the third but he gave one of those runs back in the bottom of the third when Kiner-Falefa

2017 RECAP: Was used exclusively as a starter with San Diego but then pitched primarily in relief for Kansas City following a July 24 trade...went 4-3 with a 3.69 ERA in 11 starts with the Padres and 0-0 with an 8.22 ERA in 10 games, three starts, with the Royals...combined for a 4-3 record and a 4.93 ERA in a career-low 21 appearances overall...missed 12 weeks of the season due to three stints on the disabled list...surrendered 16 home runs in 84.1 innings, including 10 in 23.0 innings with the Royals...his average of 1.71 home runs per nine innings was the highest mark of his career...also had career highs in walks per nine innings (4.82), strikeouts per nine innings (9.32), opponents slugging percentage (.483) and opponents OPS (.850)...had a Major League leading 16 wild pitches, including 14 with San Diego...tied for the National League in wild pitches (Arrieta, CHC) despite making just 11 starts...allowed a .275 opponents batting average, including .241 (35-for-145) by left-handed hitters compared to .301 (56-for-186) by right-handers...went 4-3 with a 4.38 ERA in his 14 starting assignments...compiled an 8.25 ERA in seven relief appearances.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Sean Manaea (9-6, 3.38 ERA): Is 4-0 with a 3.09 ERA and .214 opponents batting average in nine starts since the beginning of June...the winning streak is one short of his career high of five (May 20 to June 10, 2017)...began the season by going 4-2 with a 1.03 ERA and .134 opponents batting average over his first six starts then went 1-4 with a 7.18 ERA and .295 opponents batting average in six starts in May...has walked six batters in his last eight starts (1.08 per nine innings) and is averaging 1.67 walks per nine innings for the season, which is fourth lowest in the American League...is scheduled to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make six interleague starts in a season...is 1-2 with a 4.45 ERA in five interleague starts compared to 8-4 with a 3.09 ERA against the AL...had a no decision in his last start, a 6-5 A's win in 10 innings last Sunday in Oakland (6.2 ip, 4 h, 2 r, 2 er, 5 so)...has never faced Colorado in his career.

- Has a record of 28-8 (.778)...the winning percentage is the best in the majors and the wins are also the most in baseball.

- Has a 4.09 ERA (5 er in 11.0 ip) and .267 (12-for-45) opponents batting average in 15 games since he was reinstated from the 10-day disabled list June 25...the team is 14-1 in games in which he pitches during that stretch.
