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OAKLAND ATHLETICS (61-43) VS. COLORADO ROCKIES (54-47)

ABOUT THE A'S: Have a season-high tying six-game winning streak (June 25-30) after losing the first game after the All-Star Break...are 61-43 (.587), which is the third best record in the American League West, the fifth best record in the AL and the sixth best record in the majors...are 18 games over .500 for the first time since Sept. 9, 2014 when they were 81-63...have not been 19 games over .500 since September 6, 2014 when they were 80-61...are six games behind Houston in the West, which is the closest they have been to first place since May 27 when they were 5½ back...are one game behind the second Wild Card team (Seattle), which is the closest the A's have been to a playoff spot since the fifth game of the season.

THE LAST 34 GAMES: The A's are 27-7 (.794) dating back to June 16, which is the best record in the majors over that span...it is the best 34-game stretch in the majors this year and is Oakland's best record over a 34-game stretch since July 26-Sept. 1, 2006 when they were also 27-7...have come from behind in 17 of the 27 wins (eight runs once, six runs once, five runs once, four runs twice, three runs three times, two runs four times and one run five times)...have scored the winning run in the eighth inning or later in 12 of the victories (eighth inning three times, ninth inning three times, 10th inning three times, 11th inning three times)...have not lost back-to-back games during this stretch.

SERIES NOTES: The A's swept a four-game series at Texas to start the week for their third four-game series sweep of the season (May 17-20 at Toronto and June 25-28 at Detroit)...it marks the second time in Oakland history the A's have swept three four-game series in one season (1981) but it is the first time they have swept three four-game series on the road since 1928...have now won eight consecutive series, which is their longest such streak since July 8-Aug. 11, 2005 when they won nine straight...are 10-0-1 over the last 11 series, which is their longest series unbeaten streak since July 28-Sept. 3, 2006 when they also went 10-0-1 over an 11 series stretch...the last longer streak was in 1989 when they went 9-0-4 over a 13-series stretch from April 10-May 21.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's are 11-4 (.733) in interleague play and have clinched a winning record against the National League for the first time since 2015 (11-9) and the 13th time in 22 seasons of interleague play...have the fourth best interleague record in the majors (Bos, 7-1; Pit, 12-3; Cin, 10-3)...rank seventh in ERA (3.35)...have hit 24 home runs, which ranks third...after this three-game series with Colorado, the A's conclude interleague play with a two-game set against Los Angeles on the next homestand (Aug. 7-8)...are 216-183 (.541) all-time in interleague play, which is fourth best in Major League history...have a 42-17 (.712) record in interdivision play compared to 19-26 (.422) against the American League West.

PITCHERS HITTING: A's pitchers are 2-for-15 (.133) with a run, RBI and four strikeouts this year...they are batting .0821 (33-for-402) with four doubles, 12 RBI, 12 walks and 189 strikeouts since interleague play began in 1997...the batting average is the lowest in the majors over that span (New York-AL, .0824)...the last home run by an A's pitcher was by Blue Moon Odom on Sept. 4, 1972 against California...Odom also had the last triple on Aug. 22, 1971 against Boston...the last extra base hit was by Joe Kennedy, a double on June 12, 2007 at Houston.

EXTRA BASE HITS: The A's set an Oakland record with four triples yesterday...the last time an A's team had four triples was Aug. 29, 1967 when the Kansas City A's had four against Cleveland...the A's rank second in the American League in doubles (197), tied for second in home runs (142) and third in extra base hits (355)...hit 11 home runs in the four-game series at Texas and now have a Major League leading 96 home runs on the road...that is already the 10th highest single season total in Athletics history (9th is 98 in 2001, 8th is 102 in 2016)...are on pace for 139 home runs on the road, which would break the ML record of 138 set by San Francisco in 2001.

THE LATE INNINGS: The A's scored 41 runs in the four-game series at Texas, 25 of which came in the seventh inning or later...lead the majors in runs scored in the eighth inning (77), ninth inning (53) and seventh inning or later (202) and rank second in runs in extra innings (16)...have a Major League leading 10 wins when trailing after seven innings...the only times in Oakland history the A's have won more games when trailing after seven innings are in 2014

(13) and 1969 (12)...are tied for second with four wins when trailing after eight innings (New York-AL, 5)...are 41-0 when leading after seven innings and are the only team in the majors that has not lost a game when leading after seven...are 49-0 when leading after eight innings and are one of three teams without a loss in those games (New York, Seattle)...are batting a ML leading .271 (337-for-1242) in the seventh inning or later compared to .236 (554-for-2349) in innings 1-6, which is fifth lowest...have compiled a 3.38 ERA (120 er in 320.0 ip) in the seventh inning or later, which is third lowest in the American League.

COMEBACKS: The A's have overcome deficits of four or more runs to win eight times this year (eight runs once, six runs once, five runs twice and four runs four times), which are the most such wins in one season by an A's team since the 1949 Philadelphia A's also had eight (the most since 1907 is 10 in 1939)...have 29 come from behind wins for the season, which is third most in the majors (Chicago-NL 33, Philadelphia 31).

ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: Four of the A's six wins since the All-Star Break have been one-run victories and Oakland is now a Major League best 19-8 (.704) in one-run games for the season...have the best record in games decided in the last at bat (17-6, .739), the second best record in games decided by two runs or fewer (32-14, .696) and the third best record in extra inning games (9-4, .692).

HOMESTANDS AND ROAD TRIPS: The A's are 4-0 on this seven-game road trip to Texas (4-0) and Colorado (three games) and now have a season-high six-game road winning streak...have won each of their last five road series, which is their longest streak since winning seven straight from July 8-Aug. 29, 2005...are 15-3 over that span...are 6-0-1 over their last seven road series and are 19-5 over that stretch...the seven-series unbeaten streak on the road is their longest since the 2005 streak when they won seven straight...have not had a longer streak since they went 7-0-1 over an eight series stretch from May 30-July 27, 1994...have not lost a road series since they were swept in a two-game set at Texas, June 5-6...this trip concludes a stretch where the A's will play 27 of 35 games on the road from June 19 to July 29...return home following the game Sunday for an eight-game homestand against Toronto (three games), Detroit (three games) and Los Angeles-NL (two games)...that begins a stretch where the A's will play 17 of their next 20 games at home with all 20 coming in California (three games at Los Angeles-AL)...are 35-21 (.618) on the road, which is the third best road record in the majors, compared to 26-22 (.542) at home.

MONTH BY MONTH: The A's have clinched a winning record in the month of July as they are 15-5 (.750) with five games remaining...went 13-12 in April, 15-14 in May and 17-10 in June...this is the eighth season in Oakland history in which the A's have posted a winning record in April, May, June and July (1971, 1972, 1975, 1990, 2003, 2013, 2014)...are tied with Boston for the best record in the majors this month...over the last 13 years, the only time the A's have won more than 15 games in July was in 2012 (19-5).

A's vs. ROCKIES: This is the first meeting between the A's and Rockies since 2015 when the A's won two of three in Oakland, June 29-July 1...it is their first meeting in Denver since June 12-14, 2012 when the A's swept a three-game series...have won five of the last six games, including four straight at Coors Field...lead the all-time series, 15-13...are 9-5 in Oakland and 6-8 in Denver...have won four of their nine season series with the Rockies, including three 3-0 sweeps.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman tied an Oakland single-game record with two triples last night and is 12-for-25 (.480) with nine runs, a double, two triples, two home runs, five RBI and four multiple hit games over his last six games...**Khris Davis** leads the majors with 23 RBI in the month of July and is tied for second with 78 RBI overall...**Blake Treinen** leads Major League relievers in ERA (1.02) and **Lou Trivino** ranks third (1.30).

OAKLAND A'S 50th ANNIVERSARY MOMENTS

In 1996 Geronimo Berroa and Matt Stairs homered in the A's 6-4 loss at Toronto...it is the 23rd consecutive game in which the A's hit a homer, a club record which ended the following day...in 2008 Brad Ziegler tosses 2.0 scoreless innings to extend his career opening scoreless streak to a Major League record 27.0 innings, breaking the previous mark of 25 set by George McQuillan of the 1907 Philadelphia Phillies...the streak would reach 39.0 innings before he allowed his first run.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Sean Manaea (9-6, 3.38 ERA)

FOUR-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 4-0 with a 3.09 ERA (19 er in 55.1 ip) and .214 (44-for-206) opponents batting average in nine starts since the beginning of June...the winning streak is one short of his career high of five (May 20 to June 10, 2017)...began the season by going 4-2 with a 1.03 ERA and .134 opponents batting average over his first six starts through the end of April but then went 1-4 with a 7.18 ERA and .295 opponents batting average in six starts in May.

DON'T WALK: Has walked six batters in his last eight starts (50.0 ip, 1.08 per nine innings) and has issued two free passes or fewer in 19 of his 21 starts this year...has walked 24 batters in 130.1 innings, an average of 1.66 per nine innings...that ranks fourth lowest in the American League.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks fourth in the American League in opponents on-base percentage (.260), seventh in opponents batting average (.211), eighth in OPS (.627) and 10th in ERA (3.38)...has the sixth fewest strikeouts per nine innings (6.08), is tied for sixth in wild pitches (9), ranks ninth in innings pitched (130.1) and tied for ninth in hit batters (8) and home runs (18)...is averaging the fewest pitches per inning in the majors (14.6)...opponents have reached base on an error eight times, which is tied for second most in the AL.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: Is scheduled to make his third consecutive start in an interleague game and his sixth of the season...will become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make six interleague starts in one season...will tie Washington's Scherzer for the most interleague starts in the majors this year...is 1-2 with a 4.45 ERA (14 er in 28.1 ip) in five interleague starts compared to 8-4 with a 3.09 ERA against the American League...is now 3-5 with a 3.97 ERA (30 er in 68.0 ip) in 12 career starts against the National League.

WITH THE BAT: Is 0-for-3 in two games this year...is now 0-for-8 with a walk, three strikeouts and a sacrifice hit in his career...never batted as a minor leaguer.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received two runs of support or fewer in 11 of his 21 starts, including no runs five times...has received two runs of support or fewer in each of his six losses this year (4 rs in 33.0 ip, 1.09 RSA) and 24 of his 25 career losses (24 rs in 126.1 ip, 1.71 RSA)...is 19-0 in 27 career starts with run support of four or more and 25-1 in 35 starts with three runs of support or more.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Opponents are 18-for-126 (.143) with six walks and three hit by pitches (.200 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...the on-base percentage is the lowest in the majors and the batting average and slugging percentage (.238) are second lowest...has a .172 (30-for-174) opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .257 (45-for-171) the second time and .203 (28-for-138) after that...has surrendered 16 of his 18 home runs to right-handed hitters.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 5-0 with a 2.95 ERA (19 er in 58.0 ip) in nine starts during the day compared to 4-6 with a 3.73 ERA (30 er in 72.1 ip) in 12 starts at night...is tied for fourth in the American League in day wins...now has a 11-game winning streak in day games dating back to May 20, 2017 and has a 3.09 ERA (38 er in 110.2 ip) in 18 day starts total over that stretch...has not lost during the day since April 7, 2017 at Texas...is now 13-3 with a 3.32 ERA (60 er in 162.2 ip) in 27 career day games, 15-22 with a 4.25 ERA (128 er in 271.0 ip) in 48 starts at night.

MONTH BY MONTH: Is 1-0 with a 3.42 ERA (9 er in 23.2 ip) in four starts in July...went 3-0 with a 2.84 ERA and .202 opponents batting average in five starts in the month of June...compiled a 1-4 record and a 7.18 ERA and .295 opponents batting average in six starts in May...tied for the American League lead in May losses and had the second highest ERA (Giolito, CWS 7.36)...it was the second time he lost four games in a month in his career (Aug. 2016)...was 4-1 with a 1.00 ERA and .130 opponents batting average in five starts in April...led the AL in ERA and opponents batting in April and tied for the lead in wins...was named AL Pitcher of the Month in April, his first Pitcher of the Month honor...it was the first time in his career he won four games in a month...his ERA tied for the fourth lowest in any month in Oakland history among pitchers with 30 or more innings pitched...it was the lowest since Cory Lidle had a 0.20 ERA in Aug., 2002...had a .395 OPS and is the fourth pitcher in Oakland history with an OPS under .400 in a month with a minimum of 100 batters faced.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS: Allowed one run in 7.2 innings in his first start on March 30 against Los Angeles (AL) and one run in 8.0 innings in his second start on April 4 against Texas to become the first A's pitcher on an Opening Day roster to start the season with back-to-back outings of seven innings or more and one run or fewer since Steve Karsay in 1994...won three consecutive starts from April 15 to 27 and allowed just two runs (one earned) on six hits over that stretch (0.39 ERA, .078 opponents batting average)...tossed the seventh no-hitter in Oakland history and the 12th in Athletics history in a 3-0 win

over Boston in Oakland on April 21...walked two and matched his career high with 10 strikeouts...walked Betts to start the game but then retired 14 straight before Leon reached on a Semien error...set down the next 12 before walking Benintendi with two outs in the ninth...then got Ramirez to hit into a game-ending force out...it was the 10th no-hitter in Coliseum history (six by A's, four by opponents)...it was the first since Dallas Braden's perfect game on May 9, 2010 vs. Tampa Bay...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Red Sox .895 winning percentage entering the game was the highest in Major League history by a team that was no-hit at least five games into the season...the last pitcher to no hit a team that led the majors in runs per game entering the game was the A's Dave Stewart, who did it against Toronto on June 29, 1990 (also Elias)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week for the week of April 16-22, his first Player of the Week award...allowed a fourth-inning single to Correa in his first start after the no-hitter on April 27 at Houston, snapping his streak of consecutive hitless innings at an Oakland record 14.0 innings...broke the previous mark of 13.0 held by John "Blue Moon" Odom from June 1-7, 1968...opponents went 0-for-47 off him during the hitless streak...yielded four runs on six hits in a 4-1 loss at Seattle May 3 to snap a season-opening streak where he allowed two runs or fewer and tossed five innings or more in each of his first six starts...that tied for the third longest such season-opening streak in Oakland history...it was the longest since Dave Stewart had a seven-game streak in 1990.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 6-5 win in 10 innings over San Francisco last Sunday in Oakland...retired each of the first 13 batters he faced before Hundley singled with one out in the fifth...Hundley later scored on a Slater double...was relieved with two outs and a runner on first in the seventh innings with the A's leading 4-1 but the bullpen allowed that run to score plus two more for the blown save.

2017 RECAP: Compiled a 12-10 record and a 4.37 ERA in 29 starts in his second season in the majors...went 1-3 with a 5.52 ERA and .179 opponents batting average over his first six starts, 7-2 with a 2.92 ERA and .246 opponents average over an 11-start span from May 20 to July 16 and 4-5 with a 5.55 ERA and .328 opponents average over his final 12 starts...led the A's in wins, games started, innings pitched (158.2), strikeouts (140), hits (167), walks (55) and hit batters (10)...allowed a .268 opponents batting average, including .227 (30-for-132) against left-handed hitters compared to .279 (137-for-491) against right-handers...had a .593 OPS against lefties, .809 against righties.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Brett Anderson (2-2, 5.46 ERA): Was reinstated from the 10-day disabled list July 8 and is 2-0 with a 3.14 ERA in three starts since his return...was 0-2 with a 7.63 ERA in four starts when he was placed on the DL May 19 with a strained right shoulder...was signed by the A's to a minor league contract March 19 and began the season at Triple-A Nashville...went 1-1 with a 1.89 ERA in four starts with the Sounds before he was selected by Oakland May 2...went 1-0 with a 4.05 ERA on a three-start rehab assignment with the Sounds from June 23 to July 7...is scheduled to make his eighth start of the season, his seventh on the road...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 15-3 A's win at Texas last Monday (6.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 6 so)...is 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (25.1 ip, 34 h, 16 r, 14 er, 4 bb, 19 so, 3 hr) in five career appearances, all starts, against Colorado...last faced the Rockies on Sept. 22, 2016 and had a no decision in a 7-4 win at Dodger Stadium (5.0 ip, 6 h, 4 r, 4 er, 1 bb, 2 so).

- Tossed two scoreless innings for the win in his Oakland debut on Sunday against the Giants...had wins in each of his first two outings with the A's.
- Has not allowed an earned run in 10 outings in July (12.0 ip)...opponents are 3-for-39 (.077) with a walk and he has three wins and three saves.
