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OAKLAND ATHLETICS (68-47) VS. LOS ANGELES ANGELS (58-58)

ABOUT THE A'S: Won seven of eight on the last homestand and are now 13-5 (.722) since the All-Star Break, which is tied with Boston for the best record in the majors...are a season-high tying 21 games over .500 at 68-47 (.591), which is the fourth best record in the American League and the majors...it is the second best record by an A's team after 115 games over the last 26 years (were 71-44 in 2014)...are 12-1-2 over the last 15 series dating back to June 15...had their season-high tying six-game winning streak snapped on Tuesday.

THE STANDINGS: The A's have sole possession of the second American League Wild Card spot for the eighth consecutive day...are 2½ games ahead of the third place team (Seattle) and 4½ games behind the first Wild Card team (New York)...were a season-high 11 games back of the second Wild Card spot at the conclusion of play June 15 but have gone 34-11 (.756) since then...are in second place in the AL West for the eighth consecutive day and trail first place Houston by 4½ games...spent 61 consecutive days alone in fourth from April 25 to June 24 and 32 consecutive days alone in third from June 26 to July 31.

THE LAST 45 GAMES: The A's are 34-11 (.756) dating back to June 16, which is the best record in the majors...it matches the best 45-game stretch in the majors this year and is the A's best over a 45-game stretch since June 25-August 15, 2005 when they were also 34-11...have come from behind in 19 of the 34 wins (eight runs once, six runs once, five runs once, four runs twice, three runs three times, two runs four times and one run seven times)...have scored the winning run in the eighth inning or later in 14 of the victories (eighth inning four times, ninth inning three times, 10th inning three times, 11th inning three times, 13th inning once).

AGAINST THE WEST: Tonight's game begins a stretch where the A's will play each of their next 12 games and 19 of their next 23 against American League West teams...have won six straight and nine of the last 10 games against the AL West after going 10-25 in their first 35 games against divisional foes...are now 19-26 (.422) against AL West teams compared to 49-21 (.700) against all other teams.

ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's have won eight of their last nine one-run games and are a Major League best 22-9 (.710) for the season...are tied for third in one-run wins and only Atlanta has fewer losses (8)...the Athletics record for winning percentage in one-run games is .698 in 1928 (30-13)...are 35-17 (.673) in games decided by two runs or fewer...the record and wins rank third in the majors...are 10-4 (.714) in extra inning games...the wins are the most in the majors, the 14 games are tied for second most and the record is third best...are 19-6 (.760) in games decided in the last at bat...the record is the best in the majors, the losses are the fewest and the wins rank second (TOR, 20)...have 31 come from behind wins, which is fourth most in the majors.

THE LATE INNINGS: The A's scored the winning run in the eighth inning on Wednesday and are now batting .287 (132-for-460) with 87 runs scored and 26 home runs in the eighth inning...all three figures lead the majors...also lead the majors in runs scored in the seventh inning or later (217), are tied for third in runs in extra innings (17) and rank fifth in runs in the ninth (53)...are batting .269 (366-for-1360) in the seventh inning or later, which is the best in the majors, compared to .236 (614-for-2598) in innings 1-6, which is third lowest...have compiled a 3.20 ERA (126 er in 354.0 ip) in the seventh inning or later, which is third lowest in the majors...lead the majors with 10 wins when trailing after seven innings and are tied for fourth with four wins when trailing after eight innings (HOU, MIL and NYY, 5).

LEADING LATE: The A's are the only team in the majors that has not lost a game when leading after seven innings (46-0)...have a 61-game winning streak in those games, which matches the Oakland record (June 1-Sept. 22, 2002)...last lost when leading after seven innings on Sept. 2, 2017 at Texas...the A's (55-0) and Mariners (58-0) are the only teams that have not lost when leading after eight innings...have an 82-game winning streak in those games and have not lost when leading after eight since July 27, 2017 at Toronto.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a brief three-game road trip to Los Angeles tonight...these are Oakland's only three road games over a 20-game stretch from July 30 to Aug. 22 and the A's do not leave California over that span...

went 4-3 on the last road trip to Texas (4-0) and Colorado (0-3) and currently have a three-game road losing streak, which matches the season high (April 28-May 1)...are 27-12 (.692) on the road dating back to May 14 after starting the year 8-12...are 35-24 (.593) on the road for the season, which is the third best road record in the majors, compared to 33-23 (.589) at home...the 35 road wins already match the A's best total over the previous three seasons (35-46 in 2016)...went 7-1 on the last homestand against Toronto (3-0), Detroit (3-0) and Los Angeles-NL (1-1), which was the A's best record on a homestand of seven or more games since going 8-1 against Texas, Tampa Bay and Seattle, Aug. 7-16, 2016...are now 15-3 at home dating back to June 16 after starting the year 18-20 in the Coliseum.

HOME AND AWAY SPLITS: The A's have hit a Major League leading 98 home runs on the road, which is already tied for the ninth highest single season total in Athletics history (8th is 102 in 2016, 6th is 103 in 2012 and 2013, 5th is 105 in 2017)...are batting .264 (555-for-2103) and are averaging 5.53 runs per game on the road (326 runs in 59 games) compared to .229 and 3.88 runs per game at home...have already scored more runs on the road this year than all last year (322)...lead the majors in runs per game on the road and rank fourth in batting...have the second lowest home batting average in the majors and the fifth fewest runs per game.

COUNTDOWN TO 8,000: Khris Davis hit the 7,995th home run in Oakland history Tuesday night, leaving the A's five short of 8,000 since moving to Oakland...only five teams have hit 8000 home runs dating back to 1968 (NYY, BAL, DET, BOS, TEX)...have 12,977 home runs in franchise history and are 23 short of 13,000.

THIS AND THAT: The A's have compiled a 2.84 ERA (79 er in 250.1 ip) over the last 27 games and now have a 3.83 ERA for the season, which is fourth lowest in the American League...rank fifth in opponents batting (.240), slugging (.396) and OPS (.700)...starting pitchers went 5-1 with a 1.40 ERA (7 er in 45.0 ip) on the homestand...the offense ranks fourth in the AL in doubles (220) and fifth in extra base hits (391) and OPS (.748).

ROSTER NOTES: When Fernando Rodney makes his Oakland debut he will become the 31st player to pitch for the A's this year, which will break the franchise record of 30 set in 2015...the current total of 30 is tied with the Angels and Braves for third most in the majors (Cubs, 32; Rays, 31)...have used 13 different starting pitchers, which is second to the Rays (15)...have 11 pitchers with at least five starts, which is the most in the majors...only one member of the current starting rotation was with the A's organization at the start of spring training (Manaea) and two were with another organization at the end of May (Jackson and Fiers).

A's vs. ANGELS: The A's are 4-6 against the Angels...are 3-4 in Oakland and 1-2 in Anaheim...have lost 15 of the last 19 games and 28 of the last 40 at Angel Stadium...have dropped four consecutive season series and are 35-51 (.407) against Los Angeles over the last five years...this marks the first time the Athletics franchise (Kansas City and Oakland) has lost four straight season series to the Angels...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 432-372 against the Angels...that includes 226-176 in Oakland and 206-196 in Anaheim...all-time, the A's are 481-449 against the Angels.

In 1972, in a game completed the next day, the A's defeat the Chicago White Sox 5-3 in 19 innings...the game was suspended after 17 innings and ended the next day when Joe Rudi hit a two-run homer in the bottom of the 19th...in 1976 Joe Rudi singles for his 1000th career hit in the A's 2-1 victory over Milwaukee...in 1985 Dave Kingman hits his 400th career home run in the A's 11-5 win at Seattle...in 2009 Mark Ellis is his perfect 5 for 5 and drives in four runs in the A's 9-1 win at Baltimore

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Brett Anderson (2-3, 4.64 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Was reinstated from the 10-day disabled list July 8 and is 2-1 with a 2.96 ERA (9 er in 27.1 ip), .262 (27-for-103) opponents batting average and five walks (1.65 per nine innings) in five starts since his return...was 0-2 with a 7.63 ERA and .379 opponents batting average in four starts when he was placed on the DL May 19 with a strained right shoulder...was signed by the A's to a minor league contract March 19 and began the season at Triple-A Nashville...went 1-1 with a 1.89 ERA in four starts with the Sounds before he was selected by Oakland May 2...went 1-0 with a 4.05 ERA on a three-start rehab assignment with the Sounds from June 23 to July 7.

LEFT AND RIGHT: Has surrendered all six of his home runs and 21 of his 22 RBI to right-handed hitters...has not allowed a home run to a left-handed hitter since July 28, 2015 at Oakland when Josh Reddick homered off him while he was pitching for the Dodgers...has made 37 appearances, including 16 starts since then.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on six days rest today...is 0-2 with a 9.90 ERA (11 er in 10.0 ip) in three starts on four days rest, 2-1 with a 3.03 ERA (11 er in 32.2 ip) in six starts on five days rest or more...over the last two years, he is 1-3 with a 9.20 ERA (30 er in 29.1 ip) in eight starts on four days rest, 5-4 with a 4.06 ERA (31 er in 68.2 ip) in 14 starts on five days rest or more.

THIS AND THAT: Is scheduled to make his 10th start of the season...it will be his eighth on the road and his eighth in a night game...the A's have won in all four of his no decisions and are 6-3 (.667) in his starting assignments...has received two runs of support or fewer in seven of his nine starts...opponents are batting .333 (14-for-42) with runners in scoring position.

2018 START-BY-START: He had a no decision in the A's 3-2 win at Seattle **May 2**...allowed his only two runs in the third inning on a leadoff home run by Healy and a RBI single by Segura...retired 11 straight before allowing back-to-back singles to Haniger and Seager with one out in the seventh...was relieved by Dull with Oakland trailing 2-0 but the A's scored twice in the eighth to get him off the hook and once in the ninth for the win...was the losing pitcher in the A's 16-2 loss to Houston on **May 7** in Oakland...allowed nine runs on 10 hits in 3.0 innings...yielded a two-run single to Gonzalez in the first and a three-run home run to Springer in the second...then allowed a RBI double to Stassi and a RBI single to Altuve in the fourth and was relieved by Hatcher with runners on first and second and no outs...Hatcher allowed both runs to score plus two more of his own...was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-2 loss at New York (AL) **May 13**...allowed three runs in the first inning on a two-run single by Stanton and a RBI single by Hicks...Oakland scored a run in the fifth, but he allowed a run in the bottom of the fifth on a Stanton home run...left after five innings trailing 4-1...had a no decision in the A's 3-1 win at Toronto on **May 18**...tossed just one inning and did not allow a run, despite surrendering two hits...left the game early with a strained left shoulder...combined with Petit, Buchter and Pagán on a five-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Cleveland **July 8**...it was his first win as an Athletic since April 7, 2013...tossed five of the innings and allowed three of the hits...retired the side in order in the first, third and fifth and allowed runners into scoring position in the other two innings...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win at San Francisco on **July 14**...Oakland scored a run in the second but he allowed a Hanson RBI single in the bottom of the second...the A's retook the lead with a run in the third but he allowed two runs in the fourth inning on a Duggar RBI double and a Slater RBI single...was relieved by Petit in the fourth with one out and the A's trailing 3-2 but Oakland scored twice in the seventh for the win...was the winning pitcher in the A's 15-3 win at Texas **July 23**...had a 5-0 lead when he surrendered a two-run home run to Andrus in the bottom of the third inning...those were the only runs he would allow in six innings of work...struck out six, which were his most strikeouts in a game since Sept. 15, 2015 vs. Colorado...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-1 loss at Colorado **July 28**...Oakland scored a run in the first but he allowed two runs in the second inning on a Murphy RBI triple and a Valaika RBI single...then surrendered single runs in the third and fourth innings on home runs by Arenado and Valaika...left after six innings trailing 4-1.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 1-0, 13-inning win over Detroit a week ago today in Oakland...retired each of the first 16 batters he faced before Iglesias doubled with one out in the sixth...tossed seven scoreless innings and allowed just two hits and a walk...it was his longest outing since tossing 7.2 innings Oct. 1 at San Francisco and his longest scoreless outing since Aug. 27, 2012 at Cleveland when he logged 7.0 innings.

ANDERSON vs. LOS ANGELES: Is 1-3 with a 3.76 ERA (52.2 ip, 46 h, 22 r, 22 er, 14 bb, 33 so, 2 hr) in 10 career appearances, including seven starts...is 1-2 with a 4.23 ERA (13 er in 27.2 ip) in five games at Angel Stadium and 0-1 with a 3.24 ERA (9 er in 25.0 ip) in five games in his home ballparks, all in the Coliseum...has not faced the Angels since 2013 when he appeared in three games, all in relief with the A's (6.1 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 6 so)...tossed 5.1 innings in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win on April 29 in Oakland (3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 5 so)...also pitched on Sept. 18 in Oakland (0.1 ip) and Sept. 25 at Los Angeles (0.2 ip, 1 h, 1 so).

WITH NASHVILLE: Is 2-1 with a 2.78 ERA and .248 opponents batting average in seven starts with Triple-A Nashville...has not allowed a home run in 32.1 innings...has 36 strikeouts (10.02 per nine innings) and has walked just six (1.67 per nine innings) for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 6.0...his opponents batting average includes a .223 (21-for-94) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .314 (11-for-35) against left-handers...has yielded a .156 batting average and just one walk to batters leading off an inning (.182 on-base percentage)...opponents are hitting .182 with the bases empty, .346 with runners on...including .333 with runners in scoring position...tossed 4.0 innings in his first start on April 9 at New Orleans and allowed five runs, all unearned, for the loss...struck out a season-high eight batters in each of his next two starts on April 14 against Omaha (4.0 ip) and April 19 at Iowa (5.0 ip), but no decisions...tossed a season-high 6.0 innings and picked up his first win April 25 against New Orleans...that was his final start before he was selected by Oakland May 2...was 1-1 with a 1.89 ERA in four starts at the time of his promotion...returned on June 23 for a three-start rehab assignment and went 1-0 with a 4.05 ERA before returning to Oakland...tossed 4.0 scoreless innings in his first rehab start June 23 against Round Rock...then allowed a season-high six runs on a season-high seven hits in 3.2 innings in a no decision at Oklahoma City June 28.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Edwin Jackson (3-2, 2.87 ERA): Is 3-2 with a 2.87 ERA in eight starts since he was selected by the A's June 25...his ERA is sixth lowest in the American League over that stretch...has picked up the win in each of his last two starts and has not allowed an earned run (12.0 ip)...went 1-0 with a 2.45 ERA over his first three starts this year and 0-2 with a 5.40 ERA over his next three starts from July 13 to 25...has held the opposition to a .171 batting average with runners in scoring position...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 2-1 A's win over Detroit last Saturday in Oakland (6.1 ip, 5 h, 1 r, 1 bb, 3 so)...is 4-4 with a 3.83 ERA (56.1 ip, 68 h, 37 r, 24 er, 16 bb, 33 so, 6 hr) in 12 career appearances, including nine starts, against Los Angeles...has faced the Angels just once over the last seven years and that came last year in a start on July 18 at Los Angeles (7.0 ip, 3 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 so)...was signed by the A's to a minor league contract June 6 after he was released by the Nationals organization.
