## OAKLAND ATHLETICS (79-52) VS. HOUSTON ASTROS (80-50)

MONDAY, AUGUST 27, 2018 — MINUTE MAID PARK — 7:10 P.M. CDT

**ABOUT THE A'S:** The A's won three of four at Minnesota to start the road trip and have now won each of their last five series...are 7-0-1 over their last eight series and 17-1-2 over the last 20 dating back to June 15...have won 18 of their last 24 games since being swept at Colorado...are 24-10 (.706) since the All-Star Break, which is the best record in the majors...are 79-52 (.603) overall, which is fourth best record in the American League and the majors...it is tied for the fifth best record in Oakland history after 131 games and is the best since the 2002 club was 80-51 (would improve to 88-51 in 2002 before loss #52)...are 27 games over .500 for the first time since Aug. 12, 2014 (73-46)...have not been more than 27 over since Aug. 9, 2014 when they were 28 over (72-44)...the A's 79 wins are four more than their season total from last year.

**THE STANDINGS:** The A's are in second place in the American League West and trail first place Houston by 1½ games for the fourth consecutive day...were tied for first with the Astros on Aug. 18, 20 and 21...trailed Houston by a season-high 12 games entering play on June 19 but have gone 43-16 over that stretch while the Astros have gone 31-25...have the second AL Wild Card spot and are a season-high five games ahead of third place Seattle...were a season-high 11 games back of the second Wild Card spot at the conclusion of play June 15 but have gone 45-16 since then while Seattle has gone 29-32...are 4½ games behind the first Wild Card team, New York.

**THE LAST 61 GAMES:** The A's are 45-16 (.738) dating back to June 16, which is the best record in the majors over that span...it matches the best 61-game stretch in the majors this year and is the A's best record over a 61-game span since June 5-Aug. 13, 2005 when they were also 45-16...have come from behind in 21 of the 45 wins and have scored the winning run in the eighth inning or later in 15 of the victories.

**IN AUGUST:** The A's are 16-6 (.727) in the month of August, which is the second best record in the majors (STL, 19-5)...the wins are the A's most in August since 2012 (18-10)...went 13-12 in April, 15-14 in May, 17-10 in June, 17-8 in July and have clinched a winning record in August...this is the sixth season in Oakland history in which the A's have posted a winning record in April, May, June, July and August (1971, 1972, 1990, 2003, 2013)...each of the previous five teams have gone on to post a winning record in September...have a 2.51 ERA (57 er in 204.0 ip), which is second lowest in the majors to Tampa Bay (2.49)...the offense leads the American League in slugging (.473), ranks second in batting (.267), OPS (.801), doubles (52) and extra base hits (88) and tied for third in home runs (34).

**HOME AND AWAY:** The A's are 40-26 (.606) on the road and need one more win to clinch a winning record on the road for the first time since 2013 (44-37)...have the third best road record in the majors...are 3-1 on this seven-game road trip to Minnesota (3-1) and Houston (three games)...went 2-1 on the last road trip to Los Angeles (AL) and are 32-14 (.696) on the road dating back to May 14 after starting the year 8-12...went 6-3 on the last homestand against Seattle (2-1), Houston (2-1) and Texas (2-1)...return home following the game Wednesday for a 10-game homestand against Seattle (four games), New York-AL (three games) and Texas (three games)...are 21-6 (.778) at home dating back to June 16 after starting the year 18-20 in the Coliseum...are 39-26 (.600) at home for the season.

**HOME AND AWAY SPLITS:** The A's lead the majors with a .268 (631-for-2356) batting average, 114 home runs and an average of 5.56 runs per game on the road...the home runs are the A's most on the road since 1999 and the 367 runs scored are their most since 2013 (414)...have the third lowest home batting average in the majors (.234) and the sixth fewest runs per game (3.98)...have hit just 67 home runs at home.

**PITCHING:** The A's have compiled a 2.90 ERA (101 er in 313.0 ip) since the All-Star Break, which is the best mark in the majors by nearly half a run (Atlanta, 3.33)...had a 4.01 ERA before the All-Star Break and now have a 3.72 ERA overall, which ranks fifth in the American League...rank fourth in the AL in opponents on-base percentage (.301) and fifth in batting average (.237), slugging percentage (.392) and OPS (.693)...are third in shut-outs (12), have issued the fourth fewest walks (374) and have surrendered the fifth fewest home runs (149)...A's starting pitchers have allowed one run

or fewer in 14 of the last 24 games and are 13-4 with a 2.35 ERA (36 er in 138.0 ip) and .216 (108-for-501) opponents batting average over that span.

**OFFENSE:** The A's are batting .285 (152-for-533) with 69 extra base hits (43 doubles, 1 triple, 25 home runs) and 80 runs scored over the last 15 games (5.3 runs and 4.6 extra base hits per game)...now have 463 extra base hits for the season, which is second most in the majors (BOS, 492)...are on pace for 573, which would break the Athletics record of 555 set in 2001...rank second in the American League in doubles (264) and home runs (181), fourth in slugging (.438) and OPS (.760) and tied for fifth in runs (626)

**ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS:** The A's are 26-10 (.722) in one-run games, which is the best record in the majors...only Seattle (32) has more wins and only Atlanta (9) has fewer losses...the Athletics record for winning percentage in one-run games is .698 in 1928 (30-13)...are 39-21 (.650) in games decided by two runs or fewer...the wins are tied for third in the majors and the record ranks fourth...are 11-5 (.688) in extra inning games...rank second in the majors in extra inning wins and games (16) and have the third best record...the wins are tied for fourth most in Oakland history...are 20-7 (.741) in games decided in the last at bat...the record is the best in the majors, the losses are the fewest and the wins are tied for second...have two walk-off losses, which are tied for the fewest in the majors (ATL, BOS, TEX)...have 33 come from behind wins, which is tied for sixth most in the majors

**LEADING LATE:** The A's are 56-0 when leading after seven innings and are the only team in the majors that has not lost when leading after seven...have not lost when leading after seven since Sept. 2, 2017 at Texas and now have a 71-game winning streak in those games, which is an on-going Athletics record...the last team to go undefeated when leading after seven innings is the 2012 Orioles (74-0)...the A's (65-0) and Mariners (63-0) are the only teams that have not lost when leading after eight innings...have a 92-game winning streak in those games and have not lost when leading after eight since July 27, 2017 at Toronto.

**THE LATE INNINGS:** The A's lead the majors in runs scored in the eighth inning (96) and in the seventh inning or later (237), rank third in runs in extra innings (18) and fifth in runs in the ninth (57)...are batting .262 (402-for-1532) in the seventh inning or later, which is third best in the majors, and have a 3.14 ERA (141 er in 404.0 ip) in the seventh inning or later, which is fourth lowest...have a Major League leading 11 wins when trailing after seven innings, which are third most in Oakland history (13 in 2014, 12 in 1969)...are tied for the lead with five wins when trailing after eight innings.

**THE DISABLED LIST:** The A's placed Sean Manaea on the disabled list yesterday and A's starting pitchers have now combined for 10 stints on the DL...Oakland has used the disabled list 24 times this year, which is third most in Oakland history (27 in 2016, 25 in 2008)...however, players have missed just 874 games for an average of 36.4 per stint, which is the lowest since 2008 (35.1).

**A's vs. ASTROS:** The A's have lost the season series for the fourth consecutive year as they are 6-10 with three games remaining...went 2-7 in Oakland, which was their worst home mark ever against the Astros...are 4-3 in Houston...have won five of the last seven games after losing eight in a row...are 28-45 (.384) against the Astros over the last four years after winning each of their first four season series against Houston (31-13, .705)...are 59-58 all-time, including 31-29 in Oakland and 28-29 in Houston.

### TODAY'S TIDBITS

**Matt Chapman** leads the majors in doubles (14) and extra base hits (27) since the All-Star Break, ranks second in runs scored (32) and third in hits (48)...**Khris Davis** leads the majors in home runs (39) and ranks second in RBI (103)...has 10 home runs in August, which matches the Oakland record for August (Brosius in 1995, Chavez in 2002)...**Jed Lowrie** is the fourth switch hitter in Athletics history with 20 or more home runs and the fourth with 80 or more RBI...**Blake Treinen** leads Major League relievers in ERA (0.97) and is tied for fourth in saves (32).

### OAKLAND A'S 50th ANNIVERSARY MOMENTS

In **1982** Rickey Henderson steals four bases against the Milwaukee Brewers, breaking Lou Brock's major league single season record of 118...he would finish the season with 130 steals...in **2010** Brett Anderson allowed four runs in 2.0 innings, ending an Athletics record tying streak of 18 games with six or more innings and three earned runs or fewer by A's starting pitchers.

# TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Brett Anderson (3-3, 3.47 ERA)

**FOR STARTERS:** Was reinstated from the 10-day disabled list July 8 and is 3-1 with a 2.11 ERA (11 er in 47.0 ip) and .218 (37-for-170) opponents batting average in eight starts since his return...was 0-2 with a 7.63 ERA and .379 opponents batting average in four starts when he was placed on the DL May 19 with a strained right shoulder...was signed by the A's to a minor league contract March 19 and began the season at Triple-A Nashville...was selected by Oakland May 2.

**IN AUGUST:** Has not allowed a run in three of his four starts in August and is 1-0 with a 0.68 ERA (2 er in 26.2 ip) and .135 (12-for-89) opponents batting average...the game has gone into extra innings in two of his three no decisions...has walked just two batters in 26.2 innings (.154 on-base percentage)...the lowest single-month ERA of his career is 1.87 in July, 2009 (min. 15.0 ip)...the only pitcher in Oakland history to post an ERA under 1.00 in August (min 25.0 ip) is Cory Lidle in 2002 (0.20).

**DON'T WALK:** Has walked one batter or fewer in each of his last seven starts and has issued four free passes in 42.0 innings over that stretch (0.86 per nine innings)...has walked just 12 batters in 62.1 innings and his average of 1.73 walks per nine innings is the lowest of his career (1.76 in 2010)...has walked one batter or fewer in nine of his 12 starts.

**BEFORE AND AFTER THE BREAK:** Is 2-1 with a 1.86 ERA (8 er in 38.2 ip) and .193 (26-for-135) opponents batting average in six starts since the All-Star Break after going 1-2 with a 6.08 ERA and .356 opponents average in six starts before the break...has walked four in 38.2 innings since the break (0.93 per nine innings) after issuing eight free passes in 23.2 innings before the break (3.04 per nine innings)...is now 26-20 with a 3.65 ERA (162 er in 399.1 ip) in 77 career appearances after the All-Star Break compared to 19-30 with a 4.34 ERA in 75 games before the break.

**DAYS REST:** Is scheduled to start on five days rest today...is 0-2 with a 5.60 ERA (11 er in 17.2 ip) in four starts on four days rest, 3-1 with a 2.62 ERA (13 er in 44.2 ip) in eight starts on five days rest or more...over the last two years, he is 1-3 with a 7.30 ERA (30 er in 37.0 ip) in nine starts on four days rest, 6-4 with a 3.68 ERA (33 er in 80.2 ip) in 16 starts on five days rest or more.

**THIS AND THAT:** Received 13 runs of support July 23 at Texas but has just 17 runs of support in his other 11 starts (56.1 ip, 2.72 RSA)...has received two runs of support or fewer in eight of his 12 starts...has yielded six of his seven home runs and surrendered 21 of his 24 RBI to right-handed hitters.

**2018 START-BY-START:** He had a no decision in the A's 3-2 win at Seattle **May 2**...allowed his only two runs in the third inning on a leadoff home run by Healy and a RBI single by Segura...was the losing pitcher in the A's 16-2 loss to Houston on **May 7** in Oakland...allowed nine runs on 10 hits in 3.0 innings...was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-2 loss at New York (AL) **May 13**...allowed three runs in the first inning on a two-run single by Stanton and a RBI single by Hicks, and another in the fifth on a Stanton home run...had a no decision in the A's 3-1 win at Toronto on **May 18**...tossed just one inning as he left the game early with a strained left shoulder...combined with Petit, Buchter and Pagán on a five-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Cleveland **July 8**...it was his first win as an Athletic since April 7, 2013...tossed five of the innings and allowed three of the hits...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win at San Francisco on **July 14**...allowed a Hanson RBI single in the second and two runs in the fourth on a Duggar RBI double and a Slater RBI single...was the winning pitcher in the A's 15-3 win at Texas **July 23**...struck out six, which were his most strikeouts in a game since Sept. 15, 2015 vs. Colorado...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-1 loss at Colorado **July 28**...allowed two runs in the second and single runs in the third and fourth innings on home runs by Arenado and Valaika...had a no decision in the A's 1-0, 13-inning win over Detroit **August 3** in Oakland...retired each of the first 16 batters he faced before Iglesias doubled with one out in the sixth...tossed seven scoreless innings and allowed just two hits and a walk...had a no decision in the A's 4-3 loss at Los Angeles (AL) **August 10**...allowed a two-run home run to Calhoun in the third inning, which was the first home run he surrendered to a left-handed hitter since July 28, 2015 at Oakland (Reddick)...was relieved by Trivino to start the sixth inning with the A's leading 3-2 and Trivino allowed two runs for the blown save and loss...had a no decision in the A's 2-0, 12-inning loss to Seattle **Aug. 15** in Oakland...tossed 7.2 scoreless innings and allowed five hits without walking a batter...it was his longest outing since Oct. 1, 2015 at San Francisco (7.2 ip) and his longest scoreless outing since May 26, 2011 at Los Angeles-AL (8.0 ip).

**LAST START:** He combined with Familia and Trivino on a two-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win over Texas last Tuesday in Oakland...tossed seven innings to extend his scoreless streak to 16.2 innings...retired the first six batters before

walking Guzman to start the third...allowed a leadoff double to Choo in the fourth but then retired each of the final 12 batters that he faced.

**WITH NASHVILLE:** Is 2-1 with a 2.78 ERA and .248 opponents batting average in seven starts with Triple-A Nashville...has not allowed a home run in 32.1 innings...has 36 strikeouts (10.02 per nine innings) and has walked just six (1.67 per nine innings) for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 6.0...his opponents batting average includes a .223 (21-for-94) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .314 (11-for-35) against left-handers...has yielded a .156 batting average and just one walk to batters leading off an inning (.182 on-base percentage)...opponents are hitting .182 with the bases empty, .346 with runners on...including .333 with runners in scoring position...tossed 4.0 innings in his first start on April 9 at New Orleans and allowed five runs, all unearned, for the loss...struck out a season-high eight batters in each of his next two starts on April 14 against Omaha (4.0 ip) and April 19 at Iowa (5.0 ip), but no decisions...tossed a season-high 6.0 innings and picked up his first win April 25 against New Orleans...that was his final start before he was selected by Oakland May 2...was 1-1 with a 1.89 ERA in four starts at the time of his promotion...returned on June 23 for a three-start rehab assignment and went 1-0 with a 4.05 ERA before returning to Oakland...tossed 4.0 scoreless innings in his first rehab start June 23 against Round Rock...then allowed a season-high six runs on a season-high seven hits in 3.2 innings in a no decision at Oklahoma City June 28.

**RHP Edwin Jackson (4-3, 2.97 ERA):** Is 4-3 with a 2.97 ERA in 11 starts since he was selected by the A's June 25...his ERA is fourth lowest in the American League over that stretch...is 3-1 with a 1.88 ERA over his last five starts...went 1-0 with a 2.45 ERA over his first three starts and 0-2 with a 5.40 ERA over his next three starts from July 13 to 25...has held the opposition to a .173 batting average with runners in scoring position...eight of the nine home runs he has allowed have been solo shots...was the losing pitcher in his last start, a 4-2 A's loss to Texas last Wednesday in Oakland (4.1 ip, 7 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 2 so)...is 2-2 with a 4.11 ERA (46.0 ip, 43 h, 21 r, 21 er, 12 bb, 32 so, 7 hr) in nine career appearances, including eight starts, against Houston...had a no decision in his only start this year, a 4-3 A's win in Oakland on Aug. 17 (5.0 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 2 so)...began the season at Triple-A Syracuse in the Washington organization and signed a minor league deal with the A's June 6.
