OAKLAND ATHLETICS (95-63) VS. SEATTLE MARINERS (86-71)

ABOUT THE A'S: Were eliminated from the American League West race last night and have a tragic number of two in the race for hosting the Wild Card game (A's would lose tiebreaker to Yankees)...have won five of the last seven games but are 6-6 over the last 12 games...are 40-21 (.656) since the All-Star Break, which is the best record in the majors...are 61-27 (.693) over their last 88 games dating back to June 16, which is the best record in the majors over that span...are 95-63 (.601) overall, which is the fourth best record in the American League and the majors...are 12-2-2 over the previous 16 series and 22-3-3 over the previous 28...are 36-36 (.500) against the AL West, 59-27 (.686) against all other teams.

THE LATE INNINGS: Last night, the A's lost when leading after seven innings for the first time since Sept. 2, 2017 at Texas, snapping an Athletics record 83-game winning streak in those games...lost when leading after eight innings for the first time since July 27, 2017 at Toronto, snapping a 104-game winning streak when leading after eight...are now 68-1 when leading after seven innings and no other team has fewer than three losses...are 77-1 when leading after eight innings and only Seattle has fewer losses (74-0).

WINS: The A's have won 95 games after winning 75 last year and the 20-win improvement is tied for the third biggest turnaround in Oakland history with the 2011-12 club (74 to 94)...had a 23-win improvement from 1987 (81) to 1988 (104) and a 29-win improvement from 1979 (54) to 1980 (83)...the 95 wins are 11th most in Oakland history and are the most since 2013 (96-66).

MONTH BY MONTH: The A's are 14-8 (.636) in September, which is the third best record in the American League...have clinched a winning record for the month and have posted a winning record in each month this year...this is the sixth time in Oakland history the A's have posted a winning record in each month (1971, 1972, 1990, 2003, 2013).

OFFENSE: The A's had three extra base hits last night to tie the Athletics record for most extra base hits in a season with 555...share the mark with the 2001 club...are batting .270 (205-for-760) with a Major League leading 144 runs scored in 22 games in September (6.54 runs per game)...overall, rank second in the majors in doubles (316) and extra base hits, third in home runs (219), runs (790) and slugging percentage (.439) and fourth in OPS (.765)...the home runs are fifth most in Athletics history (243 in 1996, 239 in 2000, 235 in 1999, 234 in 2017) and the doubles rank sixth (336 in 2004, 334 in 2001, 323 in 1928, 319 in 1930, 317 in 2003)...the runs are 10th most in Oakland history (9th is 793 in 2004, 7th is 800 in 1988 and 2002).

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters have 32 plate appearances in the last 13 games (2.5 per game) and are 7-for-25 (.280) with a double, home run, six walks and a hit by pitch over that stretch...overall, A's pinch hitters lead the American League in extra base hits (10), doubles (7), walks (16) and plate appearances (130) and are tied for the lead in hits (28).

PITCHING: The A's had two wild pitches last night and now have 85 for the season, which breaks the Athletics record of 84 set last year...are tied for second in the American League in most wild pitches this year and tied for seventh in AL history...have a 3.46 ERA (213 er in 554.2 ip) since the All-Star Break, which is second lowest in the American League (CLE, 3.40)...overall, rank fourth in the AL in opponents on-base percentage (.301) and OPS (.693), fifth in batting (.237) and slugging (.392) and sixth in ERA (3.80)...are tied for second in shutouts (14), rank fourth in fewest walks (458) and fifth in fewest home runs (180)...have used an average of 6.09 pitchers per game in September (134 in 22 games), including nine once and eight five times.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have tossed fewer than five innings in 18 of the last 28 games and have a streak of 39 consecutive games with seven innings or fewer...have 815.0 innings pitched for the season, which is fifth fewest in the American League...the inning pitched will set an Athletics record for fewest innings pitched by starting pitchers in a non-strike season...the previous mark was 858.2 in 1997.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 45-32 (.584) on the road, which is the fourth best road record in the majors...the 45 wins are the A's most on the road since going 49-32 in 2002...are 50-31 (.617) at home...are 1-1 on their final road trip of the season, a six-game trip to Seattle (1-1) and Los Angeles-AL (three games)...went 3-3 on the last road trip to Baltimore (2-1) and Tampa

Bay (1-2) and are 37-20 (.649) on the road dating back to May 14 after starting the year 8-12...went 4-2 on the final homestand against Los Angeles-AL (2-1) and Minnesota (2-1)...were 32-11 (.744) over the final 43 home games after starting the year 18-20 in the Coliseum.

HOME AND AWAY SPLITS: The A's are batting .265 (728-for-2749) with 128 home runs and an average of 5.47 runs per game on the road (421 runs in 77 games), compared to .241 with 91 home runs and an average of 4.56 runs per game at home...lead the majors in home runs and runs per game on the road and rank third in batting...the 128 road home runs are second most in Athletics history and are two short of the record of 130 set in 1996...have a .466 slugging percentage, which is currently an Athletics road record (.458 in 2000)...have 282 extra base hits, which is third most in Athletics history (300 in 2001, 287 in 2000)...have 421 runs scored, which is their most since 2001 (461).

ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 31-13 (.705) in one-run games, which is the best record in the majors...the Athletics record for winning percentage in one-run games is .698 in 1928 (30-13) and the Oakland record is .696 in 2002 (32-14)...the 31 one-run wins are sixth most in Athletics history and are two short of the record of 33 set in 2004...are 13-6 (.684) in extra inning games, which is the second best record in the majors to Seattle (14-1)...the wins are one short of the Athletics record of 14, set in 1998...are 25-10 (.714) in games decided in the last at bat, which is the best record in the majors...the wins are the most in the majors and are one short of the Oakland record of 26 set in 2004.

THE PLAYOFFS: The A's clinched their third American League Wild Card Monday night, their second in the two wild card era...this will be the A's fourth postseason berth in the last seven years and their ninth in the last 19 seasons last night...over the last seven years, only the Dodgers (5) have more than four postseason appearances (Cardinals could also get their fifth) and over the last 19 seasons only the Yankees (15), Cardinals (12), Red Sox (10) and Braves (10) have more than nine (Dodgers could also get their 10th)...this is the A's 27th postseason appearance all-time, a total surpassed only by the Yankees (54), Dodgers (31) and Cardinals (28).

A's vs. MARINERS: The A's have lost the season series for the sixth consecutive season as they trail 8-10 entering the final game today...the last time Oakland lost six consecutive season series to one team was 1993-98 to Boston...are 5-5 in Oakland and 3-5 in Seattle...eight of the 18 games have been decided by one run and four others by two...are 45-68 (.398) against Seattle dating back to the start of the 2013 season, which is the second worst record by any American League team against the Mariners (TB, 13-26/.333)...all-time, the A's are 349-292 against the Mariners...that includes 189-132 in Oakland, 159-159 in Seattle and 1-1 in Tokyo...are 83-95 at Safeco Field.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman leads the majors with an Oakland record 25 doubles since the All-Star Break...ranks second in hits (79) and extra base hits (42) and tied for second in runs (50)...**Khris Davis** has a career-high 46 home runs, which is fourth most in Oakland history and sixth in Athletics history...leads the majors in home runs and ranks second in RBI (120)...has an Athletics record 25 home runs since the All-Star Break...**Blake Treinen** has a 0.79 ERA, which leads all relievers and is the lowest in Major League history among pitchers with 75 or more innings pitched.

OAKLAND A'S 50th ANNIVERSARY MOMENTS

In 1971 Vida Blue strikes out four in his final start of the season to bring his season total to 301...he joins Rube Waddell as the only two Athletic pitchers to fan 300 in a single season...in 1974 Jim Hunter tosses a seven-hitter to defeat the Minnesota Twins 2-1...it is his 25th win and is also his fourth straight 20-win season...in 1996 Terry Steinbach hits an inside the park home run in the A's 7-5 win over Seattle in the Coliseum...the home run ties Carlton Fisk's record for most home runs by an American League catcher, a record Steinbach would later break...in 2002 the A's clinch their second AL West title in three years and win their 100th game of the season with a 5-3, 10 inning win at Seattle...Miguel Tejada collects his 200th hit of the season to become the first Oakland player to reach the 200 plateau.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Edwin Jackson (6-3, 3.18 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Is 6-3 with a 3.18 ERA in 16 starts since he was selected by the A's June 25...his ERA is fourth lowest in the American League over that stretch...the A's have won in each of his seven no decisions and are 13-3 (.813) in his starting assignments...has allowed two runs or fewer in 10 of his 16 starts...has received one run of support or fewer in seven of his 16 starts.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has held the opposition to a .186 (13-for-70) batting average with runners in scoring position but they are hitting .281 (9-for-32) with RISP and two outs...11 of the 12 home runs he has allowed have been solo shots...has a .167 (22-for-132) opponents batting average the first time through the lineup...has allowed seven of his 12 home runs the second time through the lineup...opponents are hitting .110 (16-for-146) with two strikes...has allowed a .277 (23-for-83) batting average with 10 walks (.362 on-base percentage) and six home runs (.554 slugging percentage) to batters leading off an inning.

INNING BY INNING: Has a 2.06 ERA (11 er in 48.0 ip) and .166 (28-for-169) opponents batting average over the first three innings of a game and a 4.54 ERA (20 er in 39.2 ip) and .273 (42-for-154) opponents batting average from the fourth inning on.

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 3-1 with a 4.50 ERA (20 er in 40.0 ip) in eight starts against American League West teams compared to 3-2 with a 2.08 ERA (11 er in 47.2 ip) in eight starts against everyone else.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 5-2 with a 3.33 ERA (18 er in 48.2 ip) and .204 (37-for-181) opponents batting average in nine starts at home compared to 1-1 with a 3.00 ERA (13 er in 39.0 ip) and .232 (33-for-142) opponents average in seven starts on the road...however, has surrendered 11 of his 12 home runs in Oakland...has allowed just one home run in 39.0 innings on the road...is now 6-2 with a 3.21 ERA (22 er in 61.2 ip) in 11 career starts in the Coliseum.

CAREER: His wins (6), starts (16), innings pitched (87.2) and strikeouts (66) are his most since 2014 with the Cubs when he had six wins, 27 starts, 140.2 innings and 123 strikeouts...his .217 opponents batting average and .289 on-base percentage are career lows.

BEFORE OAKLAND: Began the season at Triple-A Syracuse in the Washington organization and was 4-2 with a 3.40 ERA and .238 opponents batting average in 10 starts with the Chiefs when he was released June 1 (contract opt-out)...signed a minor league deal with the A's June 6 and was assigned to Triple-A Nashville...went 0-1 with a 4.02 ERA and .207 opponents average in three starts with the Sounds and was 4-3 with a 3.53 ERA in 13 minor league starts overall.

16 SEASONS AND 13 TEAMS: Is in his 16th season in the majors with his 13th team (Los Angeles-NL, Tampa Bay, Detroit, Arizona, Chicago-AL, St. Louis, Washington, Chicago-NL, Atlanta, Miami, San Diego, Baltimore)...has tied Octavio Dotel's Major League record for teams played for in a career.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS: Made his A's debut June 25 at Detroit and had a no decision, despite allowing just one run in 6.0 innings...picked up his first win as an Athletic in his second start on June 30 against Cleveland...the A's are the 11th team for which he has won a game...made consecutive starts against San Francisco on July 13 and 20 and took the loss in each outing for his only losing streak of the season...earned the 100th win of his career in the A's 10-1 win over Toronto on July 30 in Oakland...became the first pitcher to record his 100th career victory in an A's uniform since Brett Tomko on Sept. 14, 2009 at Texas...that began a three-start stretch through Aug. 11 where he went 3-0 with a 0.00 ERA (19.1 ip, 1 r)...the winning streak was his longest since June 30-July 11, 2013 when he also won three in a row...it fell one short of his career high...combined with Buchter and Pagán on a five-hit shout in the A's 7-0 win at Los Angeles (AL) on August 11...tossed 7.1 innings and allowed three of the hits...it was his longest outing since Aug. 3, 2016 vs. Milwaukee (8.0 ip) and his longest scoreless outing since July 16, 2011 at Detroit (9.0 ip)...made the 300th start of his career Aug. 28 at Houston and had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 21-3 win over Los Angeles (AL) last Thursday in Oakland...allowed a RBI double to Fernandez in the third inning but the A's came back with five runs in the bottom of the third and seven more in the fourth...had a 12-1 lead when he allowed a solo home run to Trout in the sixth inning.

2018 IN THE MINORS: Combined for a 4-3 record and a 3.53 ERA in 13 games, all starts, with Triple-A Syracuse in the Washington organization and Triple-A Nashville in the Oakland farm system...the starts were his most as a minor leaguer since 2006 when he made 13 starts with Triple-A Durham in the Tampa Bay farm system...had no decisions and a 5.09 ERA in four starts in April...then went 4-3 with a 3.02 ERA over his final nine starts...surrendered five home runs in 71.1 innings...allowed a .232 opponents batting average, including .221 (32-for-145) by right-handed hitters compared to .244 (31-for-127) by left-handed hitters...surrendered four of his five home runs to lefties...had a .266 (41-for-154) opponents average with the bases empty compared to .186 (22-for-118) with runners on...three of the five home runs he allowed were solo shots...yielded a .174 (12-for-69) average with runners in scoring position...opponents were 11-for-64 (.172) with eight walks (.264 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...went 1-for-5 with a double, walk and two strikeouts as a hitter, including 1-for-2 with a double and a walk in three pinch hitting appearances...allowed one run or fewer in seven of his 13 starts.

- The A's bullpen was credited with its 43rd win of the season Monday night, which is an on-going Athletics record for wins by the bullpen...it is also second most in Major League history (TB 52 in 2018)...are 43-15 (.741), which is the best winning percentage in the Majors.
- A's relievers have 616.2 innings pitched, which is an Athletics record, 2nd most in the majors this year and third most in Major League history.
- Has compiled a 2.93 ERA (102 er in 313.1 ip) over the last 73 games dating back to July 3.
- Has converted 43-of-60 (71.7%) save opportunities, which is sixth best in the Majors...ranks tied for fifth in the American League in saves.
- Ranks second in the AL in opponents on-base percentage (.294), OPS (.659), tied for second in batting average (.222), and third in strikeouts (602), 2nd in ERA (3.31), and second in slugging percentage (.364).
- Has allowed 81-of-231 (35.1%) inherited runners to score, which is the fourth highest percentage in the Majors.

- Was recalled from Triple-A Nashville September 7 for his seventh stint with the A's this year...pitched in relief that day against Texas (3.0 ip, 3 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 3 so)...it was his first relief appearance since May 9, 2015 Seattle.
- Is 2-0 with a 2.67 ERA (9 er in 30.1 ip) in seven games, five starts, over his last three stints after going 0-3 with a 3.86 ERA in three starts over his first four.
