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OAKLAND ATHLETICS (0-1) VS. SEATTLE MARINERS (1-0)

ABOUT THE A'S: The A's opened their 52nd season in Oakland last night with a 9-7 loss to Seattle, snapping a two-game Opening Day winning streak... have started the season 1-1 in four of the previous five seasons (went 0-2 in 2016)...are now 0-4 in neutral site openers (0-3 in Tokyo, 0-1 in Las Vegas)... the A's have won 16 American League West titles, three AL Wild Cards, six AL pennants and four World Championships in their 51 seasons in Oakland... only the New York Yankees (18), Atlanta Braves (18) and Los Angeles Dodgers (17) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11), Cardinals (8) and Dodgers (7) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)... have a 4216-3915 (.519) record over the previous 51 seasons in Oakland... only four teams have won more games over that span (New York Yankees, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis)...this is the Athletics franchise 119th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 16 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships...the A's are 8931-9387 (.488) in their previous 118 seasons...that includes a 3886-4248 record from 1901-54 in Philadelphia and 829-1224 from 1955-67 in Kansas City.

TOKYO A'S: This marks the third time the A's have opened the season in Tokyo...are now 2-3 in the Tokyo Dome...split a two-game series with Boston in 2008 (lost 6-5 on March 25, won 5-1 on March 26), split a two-game series with Seattle in 2012 (lost 3-1 on March 22 and won 4-1 on March 29) and lost the first game of 2019 last night...the Tokyo Dome is third ballpark in which Oakland has played a home game...in addition to the Coliseum, the A's played six games in Las Vegas at Cashman Field in 1996.

18 STRAIGHT: The A's return home following the game tonight and play the Giants in Spring Training games on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday...have Wednesday off and then open the North American part of the schedule with 18 games in 18 days from March 28 to April 14...that is the A's longest stretch of the season without a scheduled day off.

DURING THE SPRING: The A's are 11-8 (.578) during the spring, which is the second best record among Cactus League teams and fifth best in the majors through games of March 19...are 10-3 over the last 13 games after starting the spring 1-5...are scheduled to play just 22 games, which are the fewest by an A's team during the spring since 1980 when they had 20...return home following the game tonight to play three Spring Training games with San Francisco from March 24-26...have snapped their streak of three consecutive springs with a losing record and need one more win to clinch their first winning record during the spring since going 22-11-2 in 2015...are tied for the second highest opponents batting average (.289) among Cactus League teams through games of March 19 and have the third highest ERA (5.69)...the offense has the fourth lowest batting average (.251) and OPS (.747) in the CL and the fifth lowest on-base percentage (.322) and slugging percentage (.425)...since 1991 (the earliest year spring stats are available), the A's lowest batting average during the spring is .256 in 2011 and the lowest on-base percentage is .325 last year.

ROSTER NOTES: The A's opened the season with 12 pitchers and 13 position players for the first time since 2016...had 13 pitchers in each of the previous two seasons...had 10 pitchers the other two times they opened in Japan (2008, 2012)...10 players return from last years Opening Day roster (Buchter, Chapman, Davis, Hendriks, Olson, Petit, Pinder, Piscotty, Semien, Treinen) and 10 other players on the roster played for the A's at some point last year (Barreto, Canha, Dull, Fiers, Laureano, Montas, Phegley, Rodney, Trivino, Wendelken)...four were signed as free agents (Estrada, Grossman, Hundley, Soria) and one was acquired in a trade (Profar)...Hundley is the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

TENURE: None of the 25 players on the A's Opening Day roster played for Oakland prior to the 2015 season...only four have played for Oakland in each of the previous four seasons (Canha, Dull, Phegley, Semien) and of those four, only Semien has been on each of the A's last five Opening Day rosters...only two have been on the last four Opening Day rosters (Davis, Hendriks)...Matt Olson, who was drafted on June 4, 2012, has the longest uninterrupted tenure in the A's organization...he is followed by Ryan Dull, who was drafted two days later.

ROOKIE AND VETERANS: The A's have no rookies on the Opening Day roster for the second consecutive season and third time in the last six years (also

2014)...five players have six or more years of service (totals are entering the season): Rodney (15 years, 137 days), Soria (12 years), Hundley (10 years, 59 days), Estrada (9 years, 35 days) and Petit (8 years, 16 days).

THE YOUNG AND THE OLD: The average age on the A's Opening Day roster is 29.48 years, which is the oldest A's Opening Day roster since 2004 (30.16)...Franklin Barreto, who was 23 years and 21 days, is the youngest and he is the youngest player on an A's Opening Day roster since 2010 (Brett Anderson, 22 years and 63 days)...he is followed by Ramón Laureano (24 years, 248 days) and Matt Olson (24 years, 356 days)...Fernando Rodney was the oldest at 42 years and 2 days and he is the oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history...the previous oldest was Doug Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953 (45 years, 246 days)...Rodney is followed by Marco Estrada (35 years, 258 days) and Nick Hundley (35 years, 193 days).

OPENING DAY STARTING LINEUPS: Five players returned from last year's Opening Day starting lineup (Chapman, Davis, Olson, Piscotty, Semien)...Marcus Semien made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop, which tied the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform...Mike Fiers became the A's 12th different starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice) and Laureano is the A's sixth different center fielder in the last six years (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...Olson became the first A's first baseman to start back-to-back openers since Daric Barton in 2010-11.

THE INJURED LIST: The A's began the season with five players on the injured list for the fourth consecutive season (Cotton, Gossett, Herrmann, Manaea, Martini)...Oakland used the disabled list 26 times last year, which was second most in Oakland history to the record of 27 set in 2016...it marked the fourth consecutive season and eighth time in the last 12 years the A's have used the IL at least 20 times...have had at least four players on the IL every day since Aug. 24, 2015, at least three every day since July 30, 2011 and have not had fewer than two players on the IL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

NUMBER CHANGES: Robbie Grossman has switched to #8...Mike Aldrete returns to #17 and Mark Kotsay is #7.

CONTRACT STATUS: The A's have three players under contract beyond the 2019 season...Joakim Soria and Mike Fiers are signed through 2020 and Stephen Piscotty is signed through 2022 with a club option for 2023...Yusmeiro Petit has a club option for 2020.

A's vs. MARINERS: The A's lost the first meeting of 2019 last night...have lost each of the previous six season series after going 9-10 against Seattle last year...the last time Oakland lost six consecutive season series to one team was 1993-98 to Boston...went 5-5 in Oakland and 4-5 in Seattle...eight of the 19 games were decided by one run and four others by two...are 46-69 (.400) against Seattle dating back to the start of the 2013 season, which is the second worst record by any American League team against the Mariners (TB, 13-26/.333)...all-time, the A's are 350-293 against the Mariners...that includes 189-132 in Oakland, 160-159 in Seattle and 1-2 in Tokyo...are 84-95 at T-Mobile Park.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Khris Davis hit his fourth career Opening Day home run last night, which sets an Athletics record for most career home runs on Opening Day...broke the previous mark of three held by Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...**Matt Olson** has a consecutive games played streak of 163...**Joakim Soria** has a 0.77 ERA (3 er in 35.0 ip) in 34 career appearances against Seattle and has converted each of his 21 save opportunities...**Blake Treinen** has not allowed an earned run in 14 career appearances against Seattle (15.1 ip)...**J.B. Wendelken** tossed 2.0 scoreless innings last night and now has a career-high 16.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to last year.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Marco Estrada (7-14, 5.64 ERA in 2018)

FOR OPENERS: Begins his 12th season in the majors and is with his fourth team...has pitched for Washington (2008-09), Milwaukee (2010-14), Toronto (2015-18) and Oakland (2019)...is on his seventh Opening Day roster (2012-15, 17-19)...was signed by the A's as a free agent on Jan. 25, 2019.

FIVE-GAME LOSING STREAK: Went 0-5 with a 9.12 ERA (26 er in 25.2 ip) and .336 (38-for-113) opponents batting average over his final six starts of 2018...surrendered eight home runs...received just four runs of support (1.40 RSA)...the losing streak matches his career high...it is the fifth five-game losing streak of his career...his last win came on Aug. 20, 2018 against Baltimore.

SPRING TRAINING RECAP: Was 0-1 with a 9.00 ERA in two Cactus League starts...pitched in simulated games on his other scheduled work days...opponents were 9-for-27 (.333).

ESTRADA vs. SEATTLE: Is 3-3 with a 3.41 ERA (37.0 ip, 27 h, 14 r, 14 er, 15 bb, 32 so, 3 hr) in six career starts...lost each of his first three starts (5.82 ERA) but is 3-0 with a 1.35 ERA (3 er in 20.0 ip) in three starts since then...is 2-1 with a 3.00 ERA (6 er in 18.0 ip) in three starts at T-Mobile Park and 1-2 with a 3.79 ERA (8 er in 19.0 ip) in three starts in his home ballparks...was the winning pitcher in his only start last year, a 5-1 Toronto win at Seattle on Aug. 4 (7.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 4 so)...retired 19 of the first 20 batters he faced (Cruz walk in the second) before allowing his only hit on a one-out double by Haniger in the seventh...was relieved by Tepera after walking Healy to start the eighth.

2018 RECAP: Went 7-14 with a 5.64 ERA in 28 starts with Toronto...the losses were a career high and tied for fifth most in the American League...his ERA was his highest in a season with 13 or more innings pitched as were his .274 opponents batting average, .331 on-base percentage, .521 slugging percentage and .852 OPS...struck out 103 in 143.2 innings for a career-low 6.45 strikeouts per nine innings...walked 50 and his 2.06 strikeout-to-walk ratio was his lowest since walking five and striking out 10 in his debut in 2008...the Blue Jays were 5-2 in his no decisions and had a 12-16 (.429) record in his starting assignments.

2018 LEAGUE LEADERS: Led the majors by allowing a career-high tying 49 doubles and ranked second with 80 extra base hits (Bundy, BAL with 84)...based on a minimum of 140 innings pitched, he had the third highest ERA and opponents slugging percentage in the AL and the fourth highest OPS...also tied for fifth in the AL in sacrifice flies (7), ranked sixth in home runs (29), tied for seventh in earned runs (90) and tied for eighth in lowest winning percentage (.333).

2018 OPPONENTS BATTING: His opponents batting average included a mark of .231 (56-for-242) against left-handed hitters compared to .306 (99-for-324) against right-handers...his career splits are .219 (487-for-2227) against lefties, .254 (615-for-2419) against righties...yielded a .311 average with runners in scoring position...had a .252 opponents batting average the first two times through the lineup, .349 after that...held the number one hitter in the batting order to a .159 average but the three-hitter batted .417.

2018 SPLITS: Was 4-7 with a 4.72 ERA in 17 starts before the All-Star Break...then went 3-7 with a 7.17 ERA in 11 starts after the break...posted a mark of 4-4 and a 4.55 ERA in 11 starts on four days rest...was 3-10 with a 6.40 ERA in his other 17 starts...was 2-3 with a 4.40 ERA in eight starts during the day, 5-11 with a 6.17 ERA in 20 starts at night...compiled a 2-5 record and a 4.43

ERA in eight starts against AL West competition, 5-9 with a 6.18 ERA in 20 starts against all other teams...was 1-2 with an 8.78 ERA in four interleague starts.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS: Tossed a season-high 7.0 innings and allowed three runs in his first start March 31 against New York (AL) but had a no decision in the Blue Jays 5-3 win...recorded his 1,000th career strikeout when he fanned Mitch Moreland to begin the second inning on April 26 against Boston...took the loss that day to begin a career-high tying five-game losing streak that spanned seven starts through May 29 (5.89 ERA, .311 opponents batting average)...was 2-2 despite a 6.75 ERA and .317 opponents batting average in four starts in April...then went 0-4 with a 5.40 ERA and .300 opponents average in six starts in May...his May losses tied for the most in the majors...walked a season-high four batters May 6 at Tampa Bay but tossed 6.0 scoreless innings...struck out Matt Duffy to end the first inning to become the 20th pitcher in Blue Jays with 500 career strikeouts...struck out a season-high nine in a 13-3 win over Baltimore on June 10...combined with three other pitchers on a three-hit shutout in a 2-0 win over Washington on June 16...tossed 6.2 innings and allowed all three of the hits while logging a season-high 109 pitches...had his best month in June when he was 2-1 with a 2.35 ERA and .207 opponents batting average in five starts...the ERA and opponents batting average were 10th lowest in the AL...lasted 0.1 innings on July 3 against New York (NL) before exiting the game with left hip soreness...it was the shortest start of his career...was placed on the 10-day disabled list July 10 with a left glute strain...was sent to Triple-A Buffalo for a rehab assignment July 24 at Louisville and took the loss (3.1 ip, 3 h, 3 r, 3 er, 2 bb, 3 so)...left the game with a right middle finger blister but was reinstated from the DL July 30...tossed 4.0 innings in a 10-1 loss at Oakland that day and did not strikeout a batter for the first time in his career as a starter...allowed one run on one hit in a season-high tying 7.0 innings in his next start Aug. 4 at Seattle...then went 2-6 with a 7.95 ERA over his final nine starts...matched his season high with four walks Aug. 26 in an 8-3 loss to Philadelphia...that began a season-ending and career-high tying five-game losing streak...the streak spanned six starts, during which he compiled a 9.12 ERA (26 er in 25.2 ip) and .336 (38-for-113) opponents batting average...had a 3-2 record in August despite a 6.15 ERA...then went 0-4 with a 7.99 ERA in five starts in September...tied for third in the AL in losses in September...it was his second four-loss month of the season and the third of his career (June, 2017)...allowed a career-high tying eight runs in 2.2 innings in an 11-0 loss at New York (AL) on Sept. 14 (also May 5, 2013 vs. St. Louis and Sept. 27, 2017 at Boston).

- The A's bullpen compiled a 3.35 ERA last year, which was second lowest in the American League and third lowest in the majors...had the second lowest opponents batting average (.220), on-base percentage (.294), slugging percentage (.364) and OPS (.658) in the majors...the batting average was fifth lowest in Oakland history and the on-base percentage ranked seventh.
- Won 45 games, which were second most in Major League history by a bullpen to the Tampa Bay Rays 55 victories in 2018...had 641.1 innings pitched, which was second most in the majors (TB, 824.1) and third most in Major League history.
- Ranked sixth in the AL in saves (44) and tied for the fourth fewest blown saves (18)...had the fifth best save percentage (71.0%).
- Struck out 627, which was fourth most in the AL and the most in Athletics history
- Had the third lowest first batter on-base percentage in the AL (.296) and the fourth lowest OPS (.697).

allowed just one run over his first two starts...struck out a season-high five batters and allowed six runs on a season-high eight hits in 3.2 innings on April 18 against Milwaukee, but had a no decision in a 9-7 win...walked a career-high six batters April 24 at Pittsburgh, but allowed three runs in a season-high 6.0 innings for the win...finished April 2-0 with a 3.54 ERA in four starts...was placed on the 10-day disabled list May 7 with a strained lower back...it was his 10th career stint on the DL...was transferred to the 60-day DL June 8...went 2-2 with a 4.61 ERA in six games, including five starts, on a rehab assignment with Double-A Tennessee from June 25 to July 23...was reinstated from the DL and designated for assignment July 26...was released July 31 and signed a minor league deal with Toronto Aug. 15...went 1-1 with a 0.93 ERA in two starts with Triple-A Buffalo before he was selected by the Blue Jays Aug. 29...started and lost that day to Boston, despite allowing just one run in 5.2 innings...tossed a season-high tying 6.0 innings in his next two starts on Sept. 3 at Baltimore and Sept. 9 against Detroit...picked up his first win as a Blue Jay and matched his season-best with five strikeouts in the start against the Tigers...had a win and a 2.70 ERA over his final two starts.

2016—In his second and final season with the Dodgers, missed a majority of the season due to injury...all told, pitched in four games (three starts), allowing 15 runs in 11.1 innings while going 1-2...in March, underwent arthroscopic surgery to repair a bulging disk in his lower back...began the season on the 60-day disabled list...went a combined 0-1 with a 2.25 ERA in three rehab starts with Single-A Rancho Cucamonga and Triple-A Oklahoma City before he was reinstated, Aug. 14...was placed on the 15-day DL Aug. 23 (retro to Aug. 21) with a blister on his left index finger...was reinstated Sept. 22 and pitched in two games (one start), going 1-0 with a 4.91 ERA.

2013—Was the A's Opening Day starting pitcher but finished the season in the bullpen after spending four months on the disabled list with a stress fracture in his right foot...was 1-4 with three saves, a 6.04 ERA and .287 opponents batting average in 16 games, including five starts...struck out 46 in 44.2 innings, marking the first time in his career he finished with more strikeouts than innings pitched...walked 21 and his average of 4.23 walks per nine innings was the highest of his career...pitched 3.0 innings in each of his three saves to become the second A's pitcher since 1992 with three three-inning saves in one season (Doug Jones, 1999)...allowed a .214 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...made his first career Opening Day start April 1 against Seattle but was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss...struck out the side in the first inning to become the first A's pitcher since at least 1947 to strike out the side in the first inning on Opening Day...struck out a career-high tying 10 batters in 6.0 innings in his second start, a 9-3 win at Houston April 7...it was his only win of the season...tossed 1.0 inning April 19 at Tampa Bay, allowing four runs on four hits and two walks...left the game early with a sprained right ankle...was scheduled to skip his start April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) but ended up pitching 5.1 innings of relief that night in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win...entered the game in the 13th inning for the first relief appearance of his career after 73 starts...allowed just one run...was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 1 with a sprained right ankle...was diagnosed with a navicular stress fracture

of his right foot May 17 and was transferred to the 60-day DL June 14...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 28 and pitched exclusively in relief following his return, logging a 5.74 ERA and .306 opponents batting average in 10 appearances...recorded his first save in his first outing following his return Aug. 28 at Detroit...pitched the final three innings of the A's 14-4 win, allowing three runs on five hits in 3.0 innings.

2012—Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings...yielded a .148 average with runners in scoring position...was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so)...combined for a 1-1 record and a 4.62 ERA during a six-start rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...began his rehab assignment July 21 with Stockton, one year and seven days after having reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow...was transferred to Sacramento July 26.
