ABOUT THE A'S: The A's have started the season 0-2 after being swept by Seattle in a two-game series in Japan on March 20 and 21...this marks the second time in the last four years Oakland has started the season 0-2 (also 2016)...have started the year 0-3 seven times in Oakland history, last in 1996...this is the A's 52nd season in Oakland where they have won 16 American League West titles, three AL Wild Cards, six AL pennants and four World Championships...only the New York Yankees (18), Atlanta Braves (18) and Los Angeles Dodgers (17) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11), Cardinals (8) and Dodgers (7) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...have a 4216-3915 (.519) record over the previous 51 seasons in Oakland...only four teams have won more games over that span (New York Yankees, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis)...this is the Athletics franchise 119th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 16 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships... only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Champion-ships...the A's are 8931-9387 (.488) in their previous 118 seasons...that includes a 3886-4248 record from 1901-54 in Philadelphia and 829-1224 from 1955-67 in Kansas City.

18 STRAIGHT: Today's game begins a stretch where the A's are scheduled to play 18 games in 18 days from March 28 to April 14...that is the A's longest stretch of the season without a day off.

COLISEUM OPENERS: The A's have a 23-28 record in Coliseum openers...that includes 19-14 on Opening Day and 4-14 in secondary openers...the last time the A's first game in the Coliseum was not the season opener was in 2012 when they lost 7-3 to Seattle after opening the season in Tokyo, also against the Mariners...the A's have lost each of their last 10 secondary Coliseum openers and have not won since a 15-6 decision over the California Angels

ROSTER MOVES: After trimming their roster to 28 players for the two-game series against Seattle in Japan (with Anderson, Bassitt and Brooks inactive), the A's made three roster moves Wednesday morning to reduce their active roster to 25...Chris Bassitt (right knee contusion) and Matt Olson (right hand surgery) were placed on the 10-day injured list and Ryan Dull was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas...later in the day, the A's acquired Kendrys Morales from the Toronto Blue Jays...today, Franklin Barreto was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas to make room for Morales.

DURING THE SPRING: The A's went 14-8 (.636) this spring, which was the best record in the majors...it marked the first time Oakland finished Spring Training with a winning record since going 22-11-2 in 2015...the .636 winning percentage was the seventh best mark in Oakland history and the best since 2015...the 22 games played were the A's fewest during the spring since 1980 when they had 20...had a .248 batting average and .320 on-base percentage, both of which were the lowest marks by an A's team during the spring since 1991 (the earliest year spring stats are available)...the previous lows were a .256 average in 2011 and a .325 on-base percentage last year...had the second lowest batting average among Cactus League teams, the fourth lowest on-base percentage and the fifth lowest OPS (.749)...the pitching staff had the third highest opponents batting average (.276) and the sixth highest ERA (5.26)...ranked sixth in fielding percentage (.980).

ROSTER NOTES: After opening the season with 12 pitchers and 13 position players, the A's now have 13 pitchers and 12 position players...five players are new to the organization, including four who were signed as free agents (Estrada, Grossman, Hundley, Soria) and two who were acquired in trades (Morales, Profar)...Hundley is the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

TENURE: None of the 25 players on the A's Opening Day roster played for Oakland prior to the 2015 season...however, Brett Anderson was added to the active roster yesterday and he pitched for the A's from 2009-13 before returning to Oakland last year...only four players have played for Oakland in each of the last five seasons (Canha, Dull, Phegley, Semien) and of those four, only Semien has been on each of the A's last five Opening Day rosters...only two have been on the last four Opening Day rosters (Davis, Hendriks)...with Matt Olson going on the injured list and Ryan Dull being optioned to Las Vegas, Chad Pinder, who was drafted on June 6, 2013, now has the longest uninterrupted tenure in the A's organization by a player on the active roster... he is followed by Lou Trivino, who was drafted two days later.

ROOKIE AND VETERANS: The A's have no rookies on the Opening Day roster for the second consecutive season and third time in the last six years (also 2014)...with the addition of Morales, the A's now have seven players with six or more years of service (totals are entering the season): Rodney (15 years, 137 days), Soria (12 years), Morales (10 years, 170 days), Hundley (10 years, 59 days), Anderson (9 years, 135 days), Estrada (9 years, 35 days) and Petit (8 years, 16 days).

THE YOUNG AND THE OLD: The average age on the A's Opening Day roster was 29.48 years, which was the oldest A's Opening Day roster since 2004 (30.16)...with the roster moves over the last two days, the average age is now 30.20...Franklin Barreto, who was 23 years and 21 days on March 20, was the youngest player on an A's Opening Day roster since 2010 (Brett Anderson, 22 years and 63 days)...following his option today, Ramón Laureano is now the youngest (24 years, 248 days)...Fernando Rodney was the oldest at 42 years and 2 days and he is the oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history...the previous oldest was Doug Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)... according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953 (45 years, 246 days).

THE INJURED LIST: The A's began the season with five players on the injured list for the fourth consecutive season (Cotton, Gossett, Herrmann, Manaea, Martini) and added two more yesterday (Bassitt, Olson) to bring the total to seven...four of those players are on the 60-day IL (Cotton, Herrmann, Gossett, Manaea)...Oakland used the disabled list 26 times last year, which was second most in Oakland history to the record of 27 set in 2016...it marked the fourth consecutive season and eighth time in the last 12 years the A's have used the IL at least 20 times...have had at least four players on the IL every day since Aug. 24, 2015, at least three every day since July 30, 2011 and have not had fewer than two players on the IL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

NUMBER CHANGES: Robbie Grossman has switched to #8...Mike Aldrete returns to #17 and Mark Kotsay is #7...Kendrys Morales will wear #12.

CONTRACT STATUS: The A's have three players under contract beyond the 2019 season...Joakim Soria and Mike Fiers are signed through 2020 and Stephen Piscotty is signed through 2022 with a club option for 2023...Yusmeiro Petit has a club option for 2020.

A's vs. ANGELS: The A's lost the season series for the fifth consecutive year last season as they went 9-10 against the Angels...it is the Athletics (Kansas City and Oakland) longest season series losing streak against the Angels...went 5-5 in Oakland last year and 4-5 in Anaheim...are 31-45 (.408) against the Angels over the previous five seasons...that breaks down to 23-24 in Oakland and 17-31 on the road...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 437-376 against the Angels...that includes 228-177 in Oakland and 209-199 in Anaheim...all-time, the A's are 486-453 against the Angels.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

The A's used three first basemen in the two games against Seattle in Japan (Olson, Pinder, Canha)...last year, the A's used three first basemen the entire season (Olson, Canha, Pinder) and one of those three (Pinder) played in just one game at first... Chad Pinder doubled in each of the first two games against Seattle...he had eight doubles during the spring, which tied for second most in the Cactus League despite playing in just 15 games...they matched the most by an Athletic during the spring over the last 18 years (last: Eric Sogard, 2013)...Fernando Rodney worked in each of the A's first two games and now has 898 career games pitched, which ties Jim Kaat for 27th most in Major League history...Sparky Lyle is 26th with 899...Blake *Treinen* retired all six batters he faced in his first outing a week ago to-day and now has a streak of 19.1 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run dating back to Aug. 23, 2018... J.B. Wendelken tossed 2.0 scoreless innings on Opening Day and now has a career-high 16.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to last year.

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In 2012 the A's open the regular season in Japan with a 3-1, 11-inning loss to Seattle...Brandon McCarthy allows just one run in seven innings and Kurt Suzuki has a RBI double.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Mike Fiers (0-1, 15.20 ERA)

FOR OPENERS: Is scheduled to make his second start of the season...made his first career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and took the loss (see last start below)...became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice)...is in his ninth season in the majors and is with his fourth team...has pitched for Milwaukee (2011-15), Houston (2015-17), Detroit (2018) and Oakland (2018-present)... is on his fifth Opening Day roster (2013, 15-17, 19).

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss to Seattle on Opening Day, March 20 in Tokyo...Oakland scored single runs in each of the first two innings but he allowed five runs in the third on a Gordon RBI single and a Santana grand slam...the A's scored twice in the bottom third to narrow the gap to 5-4 and he was relieved by Hendriks to start the fourth.

in the first and he allowed a RBI single to Pujols in the third...was relieved by Coleman with two outs in the sixth inning and the scored tied 1-1 and the Tigers scored five times in the bottom of the sixth for the win...then pitched in relief at Anaheim on Sept. 28 in a game "opened" by Lou Trivino...was the losing pitcher in the A's 8-5 loss...started the second inning and allowed three runs in the second, a two-run home run to Trout in the third, and one more run in the fifth.

2018 RECAP: Was acquired by the A's from Detroit Aug. 6 and went 5-2 with a 3.74 ERA in 10 games, including nine starts, with Oakland...was 7-6 with a 3.48 ERA in 21 starts with the Tigers and combined for a 12-8 record and a 3.56 ERA in 31 games, 30 starts...the A's went 8-1 (.889) in his starting assignments and his teams were 21-9 (.700)...had career highs in wins and winning percentage (.600) and matched his highs in games, games started and home runs allowed (32)...his ERA was his lowest in a season of 75 or more innings pitched as was his .296 opponents on-base percentage...walked just 37 batters in 172.0 innings for a career-low average of 1.94 walks per nine innings... had more home runs (12) than walks (11) with the A's.

2018 LEAGUE LEADERS: Ranked fifth in the American League in fewest walks per nine innings and 10th in ERA...had a .172 opponents batting average with runners in scoring position, which was second lowest in the AL among qualifiers for the ERA title (Snell, TB .088)...tied for third in most home runs and tied for ninth in most extra base hits (67)...his .450 opponents slugging percentage was third highest among the 27 AL qualifiers

MAY 30, 2018 AND LATER: Was 4-3 with a 4.78 ERA and .279 opponents batting average over his first nine starts through May 25...then went 8-5 with a 3.07 ERA and .237 opponents average over his final 22 games beginning May 30...his ERA from May 30 through the end of the season was third lowest in the AL.

2018 OPPONENTS BATTING: Had a .249 opponents batting average, which broke down to .231 (78-for-338) against left-handed hitters compared to .268 (88-for-328) against right-handers...issued 26 of his 37 walks to left-handers...opponents hit .270 with 21 of his 32 home runs with the bases empty, .212 with runners on base...allowed a .216 batting average with two outs, including .153 with RISP and two outs...opponents were 0-for-7 with one RBI with the bases loaded...walked just five batters to lead off an inning but had a .269 opponents batting average in that situation...held the opponents number three hitter to a .184 batting average, which was fourth lowest in the AL.

2018 HOME AND AWAY: Went 5-2 with a 2.77 ERA in 12 starts at Comerica Park and 3-0 with a 2.91 ERA in six starts in the Coliseum...combined for an 8-2 record and a 2.81 ERA in 18 starts in his home ballparks compared to 4-6 with a 4.65 ERA in 13 games on the road...ranked fifth in the AL in home ERA and tied for 10th in wins.

MORE 2018 SPLITS: Was 6-6 with a 3.70 ERA in 18 starts before the All-Star Break, 6-2 with a 3.34 ERA in 13 games after the break...tied for seventh in the AL in post-break wins and ranked ninth in ERA...was 3-1 with a 2.76 ERA in eight starts during the day, 9-7 with a 3.82 ERA in 23 games at night.

2018 BY DIVISION AND LEAGUE: Had no decisions and a 1.23 ERA in two interleague starts and is now 5-5 with a 3.10 ERA (36 er in 104.2 ip) in 20 career interleague appearances, including 18 starts...went 4-1 with a 3.63 ERA in 11 starts against AL Central teams...is now 14-6 with a 3.16 ERA (73 er in 208.0 ip) in 37 games against the Central in his career compared to 40-50 with a 4.35 ERA (335 er in 693.0 ip) in 136 games against all other teams...went 3-0 with a 1.47 ERA in three starts against Texas.

2018 THIS AND THAT: Averaged 86.5 pitches per game, which was second fewest in the AL (LeBlanc, SEA 76.5)...his 15.6 pitches per inning were eighth fewest...opponents swung and missed at 19.9% of his pitches, which was the third lowest mark in the AL...had the fourth highest percentage of first pitch strikes (66.4%)...did not commit an error in 31 games and 26 total chances... tied for seventh among AL pitchers in putouts (14)...has 43 putouts over the last four years, which ranks third among AL pitchers...walked one batter or fewer in 22 of his 30 starts and allowed one run or fewer in 14 of his starts... surrendered at least one home run 21 times.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS: Began the season on the 10-day disabled list with a right lumbar strain and was reinstated April 8...was 2-2 with a 5.00 ERA over his first five starts through May 3...then put together consecutive wins for the only time as a Tiger on May 8 at Texas and May 14 against Cleveland...allowed one run in three consecutive starts on June 27 against Oakland (7.0 ip), July 2 at Toronto (8.0 ip) and July 7 against Texas (6.0 ip)...had a loss, a no decision and a win respectively in those three starts...went 5-2 with a 1.79 ERA and .214 opponents batting average over an 11-start stretch from June 27 to Aug. 25...was named Detroit's Pitcher of the Month for June after posting a 1-2 record, a 3.30 ERA and .239 opponents batting average in five starts...combined with Wilson and Greene on an eight-hit shutout in a 5-0 win over Boston on July 21 for his final win as a Tiger...that began a career-high six-game winning streak that spanned 10 starts from July 21 to Sept. 11...compiled a 2.50 ERA and .220 opponents batting average during the winning streak...went 2-1 with a 2.23 ERA in five starts in July...the ERA was the seventh lowest in the AL in the month and his .232 opponents batting average was 10th best...was traded to Oakland Aug. 6 for two players to be named later (minor league pitcher Nolan Blackwood on Aug. 18 and minor league pitcher Logan Shore on Sept. 19)...went 5-0 with a $\overset{\circ}{2}$.72 ERA and .208 opponents batting average over his first seven starts, matching Omar Olivares (1999) for the longest winning streak to start an Oakland career by an in-season acquisition...combined with Buchter and Kelley on a three-hit shutout in the A's 9-0 win over Texas on Aug. 20 in Oakland...tossed seven of the innings and allowed one of the hits...went 3-0 with a 2.73 ERA and .227 opponents batting average in six starts in the month of August...tied for sixth in the AL in wins...his only relief appearance came in his final game of the season on Sept. 28 at Los Angeles (AL), a game started by an "opener" (Trivino).

RHP Marco Estrada (0-0, 5.40 ERA): Is scheduled to make his second start of the season...had a no decision in his first start, a 5-4 A's loss in 12 innings to Seattle in Japan a week ago today (5.0 ip, 5 h, 3 r, 3 er, 0 bb, 1 so)...is 1-3 with a 5.90 ERA (29.0 ip, 34 h, 19 r, 19 er, 8 bb, 24 so, 6 hr) in five career starts against Los Angeles, including 0-2 with a 4.76 ERA (11.1 ip, 10 h, 6 r, 6 er, 4 bb, 8 so,

1 hr) in two starts last year...was 0-1 with a 9.00 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in two spring training starts...pitched in simulated games on his other scheduled work days.....went 7-14 with a 5.64 ERA in 28 starts with Toronto last year...the losses were a career high and tied for fifth most in the American League...his ERA was his highest in a season with 13 or more innings pitched as were his .274 opponents batting average, .331 on-base percentage, .521 slugging percentage and .852 OPS...struck out 103 in 143.2 innings for a career-low 6.45 strikeouts per nine innings.

- The A's bullpen compiled a 3.35 ERA last year, which was second lowest in the American League and third lowest in the majors...had the second lowest opponents batting average (.220), on-base percentage (.294), slugging percentage (.364) and OPS (.658) in the majors...the batting average was fifth lowest in Oakland history and the on-base percentage ranked seventh.
- Won 45 games, which were second most in Major League history by a bullpen to the Tampa Bay Rays 55 victories in 2018...had 641.1 innings pitched, which was second most in the majors (TB, 824.1) and third most in Major League history.
- Ranked sixth in the AL in saves (44) and tied for the fourth fewest blown saves (18)...had the fifth best save percentage (71.0%).
- Struck out 627, which was fourth most in the AL and the most in Athletics history
- Had the third lowest first batter on-base percentage in the AL (.296) and the fourth lowest OPS (.697).

of his right foot May 17 and was transferred to the 60-day DL June 14...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 28 and pitched exclusively in relief following his return, logging a 5.74 ERA and .306 opponents batting average in 10 appearances...recorded his first save in his first outing following his return Aug. 28 at Detroit...pitched the final three innings of the A's 14-4 win, allowing three runs on five hits in 3.0 innings.

2012—Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings...yielded a .148 average with runners in scoring position...was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts... left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so)...combined for a 1-1 record and a 4.62 ERA during a six-start rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...began his rehab assignment July 21 with Stockton, one year and seven days after having reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow...was transferred to Sacramento July 26.

2018 RECAP: Was acquired by the A's from Detroit Aug. 6 and went 5-2 with a 3.74 ERA in 10 games, including nine starts, with Oakland...was 7-6 with a 3.48 ERA in 21 starts with the Tigers and combined for a 12-8 record and a 3.56 ERA in 31 games, 30 starts...the A's went 8-1 (.889) in his starting assignments and his teams were 21-9 (.700)...had career highs in wins and winning percentage (.600) and matched his highs in games, games started and home runs allowed (32)...his ERA was his lowest in a season of 75 or more innings pitched as was his .296 opponents on-base percentage...walked just 37 batters in 172.0 innings for a career-low average of 1.94 walks per nine innings... had more home runs (12) than walks (11) with the A's.
