ABOUT THE A'S: Have won five of the last six games...won three of four from both Boston and Los Angeles (AL) on the first homestand after going 0-2 against Seattle in Tokyo...are 6-4 overall, which is the A's best record after 10 games since 2014 when they were also 6-4 (won game 11 in 2014)...this is the A's 52nd season in Oakland where they have won 16 American League West titles, three AL Wild Cards, six AL pennants and four World Championships...only the New York Yankees (18), Atlanta Braves (18) and Los Angeles Dodgers (17) have more division titles than the A's...since the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, only the Yankees (11), Cardinals (8) and Dodgers (7) have more league championships and only the Yankees have more world championships (7)...have a 4216-3915 (.519) record over the previous 51 seasons in Oakland...only four teams have won more games over that span (New York Yankees, Boston, Los Angeles Dodgers, St. Louis)...this is the Athletics franchise 119th season in the American League...since 1901, the A's have 16 AL West titles plus 15 AL pennants and nine World Championships...only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11) have won more World Championships.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers went 6-0 with a 1.16 ERA (6 er in 46.2 ip) and .163 (26-for-160) opponents batting average on the homestand...this marks just the second time over the last five years A's starters have won six consecutive decisions (Sept. 15-24, 2017)...have not had a winning streak longer than six games since May 7-21, 2014 when they had a nine-game winning streak...starters did not allow a run in five of the eight games on the homestand and surrendered three hits or fewer six times...for the season, have the second lowest opponents batting average in the majors (.181) and the fifth lowest ERA (2.30).

PITCHING: The A's pitching staff allowed 18 runs in eight games on the last homestand (16 er in 72.0 ip, 2.00 ERA) after allowing 14 runs in two games against Seattle in Tokyo (6.00 ERA)...tossed three shutouts on the homestand, which is the most in the majors...had back-to-back shutouts against Boston on Monday and Tuesday as part of a 25.0-inning scoreless streak...that was the longest consecutive scoreless innings streak by an A's team since May 31-June 2, 2006, also 25 innings.

THE LONG BALL: The A's homered in each of the eight games on the homestand (12 home runs total) and now have 15 home runs for the season, which is second most in the American League to the Mariners (17) and third most in the majors to the Dodgers (18)...24 of the A's 41 runs this year have come on home runs (58.6%)...last year, the A's ranked third in the majors with 227 home runs...hit a Major League leading and AL record tying 136 of those on the road.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: A's outfielders had two assists yesterday and had four in the four-game series against the Red Sox...have four for the season, which is twice as many as any American League team and second most in the majors to San Francisco (5)...the A's have committed just three errors over the first 10 games for a .992 fielding percentage...that ranks third in the AL.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin their first official road trip of the season today, a 10-game trip Houston (three games), Baltimore (four games) and Texas (three games)...the 10-game trip is the A's longest of the season...went 6-2 on the last homestand against Los Angeles-AL (3-1) and Boston (3-1) and are 6-4 at home (went 0-2 against Seattle in Tokyo as the home team)...are now unbeaten over their last 17 series in Oakland (15 wins, two splits), which is the longest series unbeaten streak in Coliseum history...are 38-14 (.731) in the Coliseum over that stretch...have not lost a series in the Coliseum since they were swept by Houston last year, June 12-14...last year, the A's went 50-31 (.617) at home compared to 47-34 (.580) on the road...had the fourth best home record in the American League but tied for the third best road record in the majors...it was the sixth best road record in Oakland history.

THIS AND THAT: The A's are 6-2 in this stretch where they are scheduled to play 18 games in 18 days from March 28 to April 14...that is the A's longest stretch of the season without a day off...Brett Anderson allowed two runs in the first inning yesterday, which marks the first time the A's have allowed a run in the first inning this year...the A's have scored first in eight of the 10 games and have held the lead at some point in nine of the first 10 contests...are 3-0 in day games, 3-4 at night...the A's have used five different first basemen this year (Canha, Morales, Olson, Pinder, Profar) after using just three all last year (Canha, Olson, Pinder)...are 3-1 in April after completing the month of March with a 3-3 record...it was the fifth time in franchise history the club played a game in March, the first time they played more than three.

ROSTER NOTES: The average age on the A's Opening Day roster was 29.48 years, which was the oldest A's Opening Day roster since 2004 (30.16)...following the roster moves last week, the average age is now 30.20...there are six players on the roster new to the A's organization, which includes four who were signed as free agents (Estrada, Grossman, Hundley, Soria) and two who were acquired in trades (Morales, Profar)...Hundley is the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014...only four players have played for Oakland in each of the last five seasons (Canha, Dull, Phegley, Semien) and of those four, only Semien has been on each of the A's last five Opening Day rosters...the A's have no rookies on the Opening Day roster for the second consecutive season and third time in the last six years (also 2014).

THE INJURED LIST: The A's began the season with five players on the injured list for the fourth consecutive season (Cotton, Gossett, Herrmann, Manaea, Martini) and added two more prior to the Coliseum opener last week (Bassitt, Olson) to bring the total to seven...four of those players are on the 60-day IL (Cotton, Gossett, Herrmann, Manaea)...Oakland used the disabled list 26 times last year, which was second most in Oakland history to the record of 27 set in 2016...it marked the fourth consecutive season and eighth time in the last 12 years the A's have used the IL at least 20 times...have had at least four players on the IL every day since Aug. 24, 2015, at least three every day since July 30, 2011 and have not had fewer than two players on the IL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

DURING THE SPRING: The A's went 14-8 (.636) this spring, which was the best record in the majors...it marked the first time Oakland finished Spring Training with a winning record since going 22-11-2 in 2015...the .636 winning percentage was the seventh best mark in Oakland history and the best since 2015...the 22 games played were the A's fewest during the spring since 1980 when they had 20...had a .248 batting average and .320 on-base percentage, both of which were the lowest marks by an A's team during the spring since 1991 (the earliest year spring stats are available)...had the second lowest batting average among Cactus League teams, the fourth lowest on-base percentage and the fifth lowest OPS (.749)...the pitching staff had the third highest opponents batting average (.276) and the sixth highest ERA (5.26).

CONTRACT STATUS: The A's have three players under contract beyond the 2019 season...Joakim Soria and Mike Fiers are signed through 2020 and Stephen Piscotty is signed through 2022 with a club option for 2023...Yusmeiro Petit has a club option for 2020.

A's vs. ASTROS: The A's lost the season series for the fourth consecutive season last year as they went 7-12 against the Astros...went 2-7 in Oakland, which was their worst home mark ever against the Astros, and 5-5 in Houston...have won six of the last 10 games after losing eight in a row...are 29-47 (.382) against the Astros over the previous four years after winning each of their first four season series against Houston (31-13, .705)...are 60-60 all-time, including 31-29 in Oakland and 29-31 in Houston.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman has reached base safely in all nine games in which he has batted this year...**Khris Davis** is tied for the Major League lead with five home runs and has 138 home runs over the last four years, which is 14 more than any other player (Stanton, 124)...**Ramón Laureano** had three assists in the four-game series against Boston...he now has 12 assists over the last two years, which is tied for second most among Major League outfielders, despite him not making his ML debut until Aug. 3, 2018...**Fernando Rodney** made the 901st appearance of his career Wednesday night, which moves him past Arthur Rhodes for 25th most in Major League history...next up is Cy Young with 906...**Marcus Semien** has hit safely in nine of the A's 10 games and is tied for the American League lead with 12 hits...**Blake Treinen** has not allowed a run in his first five games (6.2 ip) and now has a streak of 24.0 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run dating back to Aug. 23, 2018...**Lou Trivino** has not allowed a run over his first seven games and 6.2 innings...has struck out nine of the 22 batters he has faced and allowed just two base runners (one hit, one walk).

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1993** Eric Fox hits the first Opening Day grand slam in Oakland history as the A's defeat the Detroit Tigers, 9-4...in **1994** Terry Steinbach hits the second Opening Day grand slam in Oakland history, but the A's lose 11-7 at Milwaukee.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Frankie Montas (1-0, 1.50 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his second start of the season...begins his fourth season in the majors and is on his second Opening Day roster (2017 with Oakland)...was available in the bullpen for the two games against Seattle in Japan but did not pitch.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 win over Los Angeles (AL) last Sunday in Oakland...tossed six innings and allowed just one run on three hits...allowed a leadoff double to Calhoun, hit Trout and then retired 16 consecutive batters before Calhoun homered with two outs in the sixth...was relieved by Trivino after allowing a double to Bour to start the seventh inning.

MONTAS vs. HOUSTON: Is 1-1 with a 6.75 ERA (13.1 ip, 19 h, 12 r, 10 er, 7 bb, 5 so, 2 hr) in four career appearances, including two starts...is 1-0 with a 3.86 ERA (3 er in 7.0 ip) in two games at Minute Maid Park and 0-1 with a 9.95

ERA (7 er in 6.1 ip) in two games in the Coliseum...made both of his starts last year when he was 1-1 with a 3.97 ERA (11.1 ip, 14 h, 7 r, 5 er, 6 bb, 3 so)...the loss came in a 7-3 decision in Oakland on June 14...allowed a career-high seven runs on a career-high 11 hits and a career-high tying four walks...allowed a RBI double to Gurriel and a RBI single to Reddick in the first but the A's got one of those runs back in the second...then yielded a RBI single to Correa in the third, a two-run home run to McCann in the fourth, and two unearned runs in the sixth...the win came on July 9 at Houston when he combined with Trivino and Treinen on a five-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and yielded three of the hits while walking two...allowed just two base runners to advance into scoring position...Oakland scored a run in the seventh to take a 1-0 lead and he was relieved by Trivino to start the bottom of the seventh.

THIS AND THAT: Allowed 14 of his 34 runs in the first inning for an 8.18 ERA...had a 3.00 ERA from the second inning on...was 2-3 with a 4.35 ERA in six games in Oakland, 3-1 with a 3.44 ERA in seven games on the road...was 2-1 with a 2.65 ERA in three interleague starts compared to 3-3 with a 4.31 ERA in 10 games against the American League...batted for the first time as a professional and went 0-for-5 with five strikeouts...the A's were 7-4 (.636) in his 11 starting assignments.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS: Was recalled from Triple-A Nashville May 27 and won each of his first three starts, posting a 1.25 ERA and .208 opponents batting average...the winning streak was the longest of his career...struck out a career-high tying seven batters in 6.0 innings in his first start on May 27 against Arizona and was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 victory...no-hit the Diamondbacks over the first five innings...combined with Pagan on an eight-hit shutout in the A's 16-0 win at Kansas City June 1...tossed a career-high eight innings and allowed seven of the hits...had his scoreless streak snapped at a career-high 15.0 innings June 8 against Kansas City...then went 2-2 with a 5.06 ERA and .330 opponents batting average over his next five starts from June 14 to July 9...allowed a career-high seven runs on a career-high 11 hits and a career-high tying four walks in a 7-3 loss to Houston on June 14...tossed a career-high 105 pitches and yielded just one run in 6.2 innings in a 12-4 win at San Diego June 20...tossed 3.0 innings June 26 at Detroit, matching his shortest outing as a starter...yielded an Oakland record seven doubles July 1 against Cleveland...combined with Trivino and Treinen on a five-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win at Houston on July 9...tossed 6.0 innings and yielded three of the hits but was optioned to Nashville the next day...was recalled July 24 and went 0-1 with a 5.79 ERA in two starts before he was optioned back to the Sounds July 30...his third stint lasted one day on Aug. 30 when he allowed a career-high tying seven runs on eight hits in 6.0 innings in a 7-1 loss to Seattle Aug. 30...returned to Oakland Sept. 11 and made two appearances following his return, both in relief (1.1 ip, 1 h)...did not pitch after Sept. 19.

2018 WITH NASHVILLE: Was 4-5 with a 4.65 ERA in 15 games, all starts, with Triple-A Nashville...had a .255 opponents batting average, including .189 (18-for-95) against left-handed hitters compared to .290 (51-for-176) against right-handers...surrendered seven home runs, six to righties...had a .519 OPS against lefties, .816 against righties...opponents hit .314 with runners in scoring position but that dropped to .222 with RISP and two outs...allowed a .229 average and five walks (.280 on-base percentage) to batters lead off an inning...was 4-1 with a 3.12 ERA in six starts at home, 0-4 with a 6.99 ERA in six starts on the road...tossed 3.0 innings or fewer in each of his first three starts...allowed a season-high seven hits in 4.0 innings in an 8-6 loss to New Orleans April 28...went 0-3 with a 6.19 ERA in five starts in April and tossed four innings or fewer four times...then went 1-2 with a 3.24 ERA in four starts in May and tossed at least five innings in each start...was credited with his first win of the season May 4 against Memphis when he allowed one run in 6.0 innings of work...struck out a season-high 10 batters in 6.0 innings May 9 against Colorado Springs...tossed a complete game at Memphis on May 14 but was the losing pitcher in a 2-1 loss...allowed two runs on six hits in a season-high eight innings...matched his season high with seven hits in an 11-2 loss at Oklahoma City May 20...was 1-5 with a 4.39 ERA and .269 opponents batting average in nine starts when he was promoted to Oakland May 27...was optioned back to Nashville July 10 and tossed 5.0 scoreless innings for his second win July 17 at Omaha...that was his only outing before returning to Oakland July 24 but he was optioned back to the Sounds July 30...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings Aug. 3 against Fresno for the win...then allowed a season-high eight runs on a season-high tying seven hits and a season-high three walks in 4.1 innings at Colorado Springs Aug. 9...however, ended up with a no decision in the Sounds 18-9 win...went 2-0 despite a 5.96 ERA in five starts in August.

SPRING TRAINING RECAP: Went 2-0 with two saves and a 0.56 ERA in five games, including two starts...the ERA was the lowest in the majors and his .190 opponents batting average was second lowest in the Cactus League...led the A's in innings pitched (16.0) and strikeouts (16) and tied for the team lead in wins and saves...did not allow a home run...also pitched in relief in the exhibition game against Nippon Ham on March 17 (1.0 ip).

2018 RECAP: Went 5-4 with a 3.88 ERA in 13 games, including 11 starts, over four stints with Oakland...was 5-2 with a 3.35 ERA in eight starts during his first stint from May 27 to July 9 and 0-2 with a 5.40 ERA in five games over his final three stints...surrendered just five home runs in 65.0 innings after yielding 10 home runs in 32.0 innings in 2017...struck out 43 batters (5.95 per nine innings) after fanning 56 in 47.0 innings (10.72 per nine innings) over his first two seasons

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Aaron Brooks (1-0, 0.00 ERA): Is scheduled to make his second start of the season...combined with four A's relievers on a four-hit shutout in the A's 7-0 win over Boston last Monday in Oakland (6.0 ip, 2 h, 1 bb, 6 so)...is 0-2 with a 4.50 ERA (18.0 ip, 19 h, 9 r, 9 er, 4 bb, 14 so, 3 hr) in three career appearances against Houston, all starts with Oakland in 2015...went 2-1 with a 4.40 ERA and .273 opponents batting average in four games, including three starts, this spring...allowed six runs in 2.0 innings in his first outing but then allowed just one run in 12.1 innings over his final three appearances (0.73 ERA)...spent the entire 2018 season at Triple-A Colorado Springs in the Milwaukee Brewers organization before he was traded to Oakland Sept. 3 for cash considerations...pitched in three games for Oakland in September and did not allow a run in 2.2 innings...went 9-4 with a 3.35 ERA in 26 games, 15 starts, with the Sky Sox...the ERA was his lowest as a professional.

- The bullpen has allowed four walks over the last five games (1.65 ERA) after issuing 12 walks over the first four games of the season (5.68 ERA).
- First batters faced are hitting .353 with a .463 on-base percentage (12-for-34, six walks, 1 hbp) against the Oakland bullpen so far this season...the batting average is the third highest in the Majors and the OBP is tied for fourth highest.
- The A's bullpen compiled a 3.35 ERA last year, which was second lowest in the AL and third lowest in the majors...had the second lowest opponents batting average (.220), on-base percentage (.294), slugging percentage (.364) and OPS (.658) in the majors...the batting average was fifth lowest in Oakland history and the on-base percentage ranked seventh.
- Won 45 games, which were second most in Major League history by a bullpen to the Tampa Bay Rays 55 victories in 2018...had 641.1 innings pitched, which was second most in the majors (TB, 824.1) and third most in Major League history.
- Struck out 627, which was fourth in the AL and the most in A's history.
