OAKLAND ATHLETICS (10-10) VS. HOUSTON ASTROS (12-5)

ABOUT THE A'S: Have lost two straight after winning a season-high tying four consecutive games...are now 10-10 overall, which marks the third time in the last four years the A's have been .500 after 20 games...have not been more than two games over .500 or two games under .500 all year...are 6-3 in the Coliseum and 4-7 in all other ballparks...had their game in Texas postponed due to rain on Saturday...the game will be made up as part of a day/ night doubleheader on June 8 (1:05 and 8:05).

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's are 4-8 (.333) against American League West competition, 6-2 (.750) against all other teams...have been outscored 64-49 by Western division teams (-15 run differential) but have outscored everyone else 53-31 (+22)...are hitting .236 (96-for-406) with 49 runs (4.08 per game) and 15 home runs in 12 games against the West, .281 (79-for-281) with 53 runs (6.63 per game) and 21 home runs in eight games against all other teams...have a 5.18 ERA (62 er in 107.2 ip) against the West, 3.80 (30 er in 71.0 ip) against everyone else...last year, the A's went 38-38 (.500) against the West and 59-27 (.686) against all other teams...started 2018 with a 10-25 (.286) record against AL West teams but then went 28-13 (.683) over the final 41 games.

LEFT AND RIGHT: The A's are scheduled to face a left-handed starting pitcher today for the 10th time this year, which is the most in the majors...are 6-3 in those games compared to 4-7 when the opposition starts a right-hander... are batting .274 (62-for-226) against left-handed pitching compared to .245 (113-for-461) against right-handers.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 0-1 on this eight-game homestand against Houston (0-1), Toronto (three games) and Texas (three games)...went 6-2 on the last homestand against Los Angeles-AL (3-1) and Boston (3-1) and are 6-5 at home (went 0-2 against Seattle in Tokyo as the home team)...are unbeaten over their last 17 series in Oakland (15 wins, two splits), which is the longest series unbeaten streak in Coliseum history...are 38-15 (.717) in the Coliseum over that stretch...have not lost a series in the Coliseum since they were swept in a three-game series by Houston last year, June 12-14...went 4-5 on the first road trip to Houston (0-3), Baltimore (3-1) and Texas (1-1)... last year, the A's went 50-31 (.617) at home compared to 47-34 (.580) on the road...had the fourth best home record in the AL but tied for the third best road record in the majors...it was the sixth best road record in Oakland history.

OFFENSE: The A's were held to four hits yesterday after collecting 10 or more hits in each of the final seven games of the last road trip...hit .288 with 60 runs scored (6.67 per game) and 21 home runs in nine games on the first road trip and are batting .224 (81-for-361) with 42 runs (3.82 per game) and 15 home runs in 11 games at home...overall, the A's rank second in the American League in runs (102), home runs (36) and extra base hits (64) and fifth in slugging (.454).

THE LONG BALL: The A's did not homer yesterday to snap their streak of consecutive games with two or more home runs at an Athletics record seven... broke the previous mark of six, done five times (last: Sept. 18-23, 2013)... hit 21 home runs during the seven-game streak and have 36 for the season, which is second most in the American League (Seattle, 42) and third most in the majors (Los Angeles-NL, 37)...it is also the most in Athletics history over the first 20 games of the season (previous: 31 in 1964)...hit a season-high five home runs in back-to-back games at Baltimore last Wednesday and Thursday, marking the second time in Athletics history the A's have hit at least five home runs in back-to-back games (June 27-28, 1987)...55 of the A's 102 runs this year have come on home runs (53.9%).

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 6.84 ERA (69 er in 77.2 ip) over the last nine games after logging a 2.94 ERA over the first 11 contests...have surrendered 16 home runs over the last nine games after yielding eight over the first 11...are tied with the Cubs and Pirates for the most shutouts in the majors (3).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 3-4 with a 7.77 ERA (42 er in 48.2 ip) and .291 (59-for-203) opponents batting average over the last 10 games after going 6-1 with a 2.30 ERA and .181 opponents batting average over the first 10 contests...nine of the A's 10 wins this year are by starting pitchers, which is tied for second most in the majors (Tampa Bay, 10)... starters have tossed fewer than seven innings in all 20 games, which is the

longest season-opening streak in Oakland history...tossed fewer than seven innings in each of the final 36 games last year, which was already the longest such streak in Oakland history...Brett Anderson is the only A's starter to pitch more than six innings this year (6.2 on April 9 at Baltimore) and he is also the last A's starter to pitch seven or more innings (7.0 on Aug. 21, 2018 vs. Texas)...starters are averaging 5.17 innings per start...last year, A's starters tossed 824.1 innings, which was the fewest in Athletics history in a nonstrike season (5.09 innings per start).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed five errors in the last seven games after making three over the first 13 contests...have a .989 fielding percentage, which is third best in the American League...A's outfielders have six assists, which is tied for the most in the AL and tied for second most in the majors (Miami, 7).

DAYS ON AND DAYS OFF: The A's played 16 consecutive days without a day off before the rainout in Texas last Saturday...are now scheduled to play three games over a six-day stretch from last Saturday through tomorrow and nine over a 13-day stretch from April 13-25...went 10-6 during the stretch of 16 games in 16 days and are 0-2 since then...despite the rainout on Saturday and a day off Monday, the A's 20 games played are tied with Seattle for the most in the majors and are six more than the team with the fewest games (Minnesota).

THE INJURED LIST: The A's placed Marco Estrada on the injured list today and have now used the IL eight times this year...currently have seven players on the IL (Cotton, Estrada, Gossett, Herrmann, Manaea, Martini, Olson), four of which are on the 60-day IL (Cotton, Gossett, Herrmann, Manaea)...Oakland used the disabled list 26 times last year, which was second most in Oakland history to the record of 27 set in 2016...it marked the fourth consecutive season and eighth time in the last 12 years the A's have used the IL at least 20 times...have had at least four players on the IL every day since Aug. 24, 2015, at least three every day since July 30, 2011 and have not had fewer than two players on the IL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

A's vs. ASTROS: The A's are 0-4 against Houston...lost the first game in Oakland last night after being swept in a three-game series at Minute Maid Park, April 5-7...have lost 16 of their last 22 games to the Astros, including eight of the last 10 in Oakland...lost the season series for the fourth consecutive season last year as they went 7-12 against Houston...went 2-7 in Oakland, which was their worst home mark ever against the Astros, and 5-5 in Houston...are 29-51 (.363) against the Astros over the last five years after winning each of their first four season series against Houston (31-13, .705)...are 60-64 all-time, including 31-30 in Oakland and 29-34 in Houston.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Khris Davis has an eight-game hitting streak and is 11-for-33 (.333) with a double, five home runs and 10 RBI during the streak...leads the majors with 10 home runs and now has 143 over the last four seasons, which are 19 more than any other player...*Ramón Laureano* is tied for the lead among Major League outfielders with five assists...now has 14 assists in 66 games in the outfield over the last two years, which are tied for the most among ML outfielders, despite him not making his ML debut until Aug. 3, 2018... *Josh Phegley* extended his hitting streak to nine games on Sunday, which is an on-going career high, an A's season high, and tied for the longest active hitting streak in the American League...is 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...*Blake Treinen* has not allowed a run in five home games (6.2 ip) and now has a streak of 25.0 consecutive scoreless streak by an A's reliever since Dennis Eckersley had a 26.1 inning streak from June 6-Aug. 2, 1987.

Dave McNally limits the A's to two hits, including a pinch hit single by Tony La Russa in his first at bat a member of the Oakland A's...in **2018**, 50 years after their first game in Oakland, the A's celebrate with a free admission game...Lew Krausse, who was the starting pitcher in 1968, threw out the ceremonial first pitch and the A's defeated the Chicago White Sox, 10-2.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Frankie Montas (2-1, 3.18 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...the A's are 2-1 in his starting assignments and are 9-5 (.643) when he starts in his career...begins his fourth season in the majors and is on his second Opening Day roster (2017 with Oakland)...was available in the bullpen for the two games against Seattle in Japan but did not pitch.

THIS AND THAT: Has not allowed a run in the first or second inning and opponents are 2-for-19 (.105) in those innings...last year, he allowed 14 of his 34 runs in the first inning (8.18 ERA)...has surrendered four home runs in 17.0 innings after allowing just five in 65.0 innings last year

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 win over Los Angeles (AL) March 31 in Oakland...tossed six innings and allowed just one run on three hits ... allowed a leadoff double to Calhoun, hit Trout and then retired 16 consecutive batters before Calhoun homered with two outs in the sixth.. was relieved by Trivino after allowing a double to Bour to start the seventh inning

SECOND START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-2 loss at Houston April 5...allowed a Bregman RBI single in the third but the A's came back to tie the game in the fourth...surrendered a lead off home run to Correa in the bottom of the fourth to give Houston the lead for good.

LAST START: He picked up his second victory of the season in the A's 10-3 win at Baltimore a week ago today...retired each of the first 12 batters he faced and had a 7-0 lead when he allowed a leadoff home run to Mancini in the fifth...also allowed a two-run home run to Ruiz that inning...was relieved by Wendelken to start the seventh inning with the A's leading 10-3.

two games in the Coliseum...has faced the Astros once this year and was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-2 loss at Houston April 5...allowed a Bregman RBI single in the third but the A's came back to tie the game in the fourth... surrendered a lead off home run to Correa in the bottom of the fourth to give Houston the lead for good...his other two starts came last year when he was 1-1 with a 3.97 ERA (11.1 ip, 14 h, 7 r, 5 er, 6 bb, 3 so)...the loss came in a 7-3 decision in Oakland on June 14...allowed a career-high seven runs on a career-high 11 hits and a career-high tying four walks...the win came on July 9 at Houston when he combined with Trivino and Treinen on a five-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and yielded three of the hits while walking two.

2018 RECAP: Went 5-4 with a 3.88 ERA in 13 games, including 11 starts, over four stints with Oakland...was 5-2 with a 3.35 ERA in eight starts during his first stint from May 27 to July 9 and 0-2 with a 5.40 ERA in five games over his final three stints...surrendered just five home runs in 65.0 innings after yielding 10 home runs in 32.0 innings in 2017...struck out 43 batters (5.95 per nine innings) after fanning 56 in 47.0 innings (10.72 per nine innings) over his first two seasons.

2018 OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .290 opponents batting average, including .276 (35-for-127) against right-handed hitters compared to .305 (39-for-128) against left-handers...yielded 20 of his 28 extra base hits to lefties and had a .378 slugging percentage against righties compared to .523 against lefties...now has a .370 career opponents slugging percentage against righties, .583 against lefties...the opponents clean-up hitter went 3-for-27 (.111) against him.

THIS AND THAT: Allowed 14 of his 34 runs in the first inning for an 8.18 ERA.. had a 3.00 ERA from the second inning on...was 2-3 with a 4.35 ERA in six games in Oakland, 3-1 with a 3.44 ERA in seven games on the road...was 2-1 with a 2.65 ERA in three interleague starts compared to 3-3 with a 4.31 ERA in 10 games against the American League...batted for the first time as a professional and went 0-for-5 with five strikeouts...the A's were 7-4 (.636) in his 11 starting assignments.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS: Was recalled from Triple-A Nashville May 27 and won each of his first three starts, posting a 1.25 ERA and .208 opponents batting average...the winning streak was the longest of his career...struck out a career-high tying seven batters in 6.0 innings in his first start on May 27 against Arizona and was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 victory...no-hit the Diamondbacks over the first five innings...combined with Pagán on an eight-hit shutout in the A's 16-0 win at Kansas City June 1...tossed a career-high eight innings and allowed seven of the hits...had his scoreless streak snapped at a career-high 15.0 innings June 8 against Kansas City...then went 2-2 with a 5.06 ERA and .330 opponents batting average over his next five starts from June 14 to July 9...allowed a career-high seven runs on a careerhigh 11 hits and a career-high tying four walks in a 7-3 loss to Houston on June 14...tossed a career-high 105 pitches and yielded just one run in 6.2 innings in a 12-4 win at San Diego June 20...tossed 3.0 innings June 26 at Detroit, matching his shortest outing as a starter...yielded an Oakland record seven doubles July 1 against Cleveland ... combined with Trivino and Treinen on a five-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win at Houston on July 9...tossed 6.0 innings and yielded three of the hits but was optioned to Nashville the next day...was recalled July 24 and went 0-1 with a 5.79 ERA in two starts before he was optioned back to the Sounds July 30...his third stint lasted one day on Aug. 30 when he allowed a career-high tying seven runs on eight hits in 6.0 innings in a 7-1 loss to Seattle Aug. 30...returned to Oakland Sept. 11 and made two appearances following his return, both in relief (1.1 ip, 1 h)...did not pitch after Sept. 19.

2018 WITH NASHVILLE: Was 4-5 with a 4.65 ERA in 15 games, all starts, with Triple-A Nashville...had a .255 opponents batting average, including .189 (18-for-95) against left-handed hitters compared to .290 (51-for-176) against right-handers...surrendered seven home runs, six to righties...had a .519 OPS against lefties, .816 against righties...opponents hit .314 with runners in scoring position but that dropped to .222 with RISP and two outs... allowed a .229 average and five walks (.280 on-base percentage) to batters lead off an inning...was 4-1 with a 3.12 ERA in six starts at home, 0-4 with a 6.99 ERA in six starts on the road...tossed 3.0 innings or fewer in each of his first three starts...allowed a season-high seven hits in 4.0 innings in an 8-6 loss to New Orleans April 28...went 0-3 with a 6.19 ERA in five starts in April and tossed four innings or fewer four times...then went 1-2 with a 3.24 ERA in four starts in May and tossed at least five innings in each start...was credited with his first win of the season May 4 against Memphis when he allowed one run in 6.0 innings of work...struck out a season-high 10 batters in 6.0 innings May 9 against Colorado Springs...tossed a complete game at Memphis on May 14 but was the losing pitcher in a 2-1 loss...allowed two runs on six hits in a season-high eight innings...matched his season high with seven hits in an 11-2 loss at Oklahoma City May 20...was 1-5 with a 4.39 ERA and .269 opponents batting average in nine starts when he was promoted to Oakland May 27 ... was optioned back to Nashville July 10 and tossed 5.0 scoreless innings for his second win July 17 at Omaha...that was his only outing before returning to Oakland July 24 but he was optioned back to the Sounds July 30...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings Aug. 3 against Fresno for the win...then allowed a season-high eight runs on a season-high tying seven hits and a season-high three walks in 4.1 innings at Colorado Springs Aug. 9...however, ended up with a no decision in the Sounds 18-9 win...went 2-0 despite a 5.96 ERA in five starts in August.

RHP Aaron Brooks (2-1, 4.24 ERA): Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...has allowed eight runs in 11.0 innings over his last two starts after tossing six scoreless innings in his first start on April 1 against Boston.. was the winning pitcher in his last start, an 8-5 A's win at Baltimore on April 11 (6.0 ip, 3 h, 3 r, 3 er, 3 bb, 3 so)...is 0-2 with a 57.86 ERA (2.1 ip, 11 h, 15 r, 15 er, 5 bb, 2 so, 1 hr) in two career appearances against Toronto, both starts at Rogers Centre...last faced the Blue Jays on Aug. 12, 2015 with Oakland and took the loss in a 10-3 decision (1.2 ip, 6 h, 8 r, 8 er, 2 bb, 2 so)...went 2-1 with a 4.40 ERA and .273 opponents batting average in four games, includ-ing three starts, this spring...spent the entire 2018 season at Triple-A Colo-rado Springs in the Milwaukee Brewers organization before he was traded to Oakland Sept. 3 for cash considerations...pitched in three games for Oakland in September and did not allow a run in 2.2 innings.

- 66, 10 walks, 1 hbp) against the Oakland bullpen so far this season ... the batting average is tied for the seventh highest in the Majors and the OBP is the eighth highest.

RHP Frankie Montas (2-1, 3.18 ERA): Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...the A's are 2-1 in his starting assignments and are 9-5 (.643) when he starts in his career...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 10-3 A's win at Baltimore last Wednesday (6.0 ip, 3 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 3 so, 2 hr)...is 1-2 with a 5.89 ERA (18.1 ip, 26 h, 14 r, 12 er, 10 bb, 10 so, 3 hr) in five career appearances, including three starts, against Houston...has faced the Astros once this year and was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-2 loss at Houston April 5 (5.0 ip, 7 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 5 so)...went 2-0 with two saves and a 0.56 ERA in five games, including two starts, during the spring...the ERA was the lowest in the majors and his .190 opponents average was second lowest in the Cactus League...went 5-4 with a 3.88 ERA in 13 games, including 11 starts, over four stints with Oakland last year...was 5-2 with a 3.35 ERA in eight starts during his first stint and 0-2 with a 5.40 ERA in five games over his final three stints.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Aaron Brooks (2-1, 4.24 ERA)

2018 RECAP: Went 5-4 with a 3.88 ERA in 13 games, including 11 starts, over four stints with Oakland...was 5-2 with a 3.35 ERA in eight starts during his first stint from May 27 to July 9 and 0-2 with a 5.40 ERA in five games over his final three stints...surrendered just five home runs in 65.0 innings after yielding 10 home runs in 32.0 innings in 2017...struck out 43 batters (5.95 per nine innings) after fanning 56 in 47.0 innings (10.72 per nine innings) over his first two seasons.

2018 OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .290 opponents batting average, including .276 (35-for-127) against right-handed hitters compared to .305 (39-for-128) against left-handers...yielded 20 of his 28 extra base hits to lefties and had a .378 slugging percentage against righties compared to .523 against lefties...now has a .370 career opponents slugging percentage against righties, .583 against lefties...the opponents clean-up hitter went 3-for-27 (.111) against him.

THIS AND THAT: Allowed 14 of his 34 runs in the first inning for an 8.18 ERA.. had a 3.00 ERA from the second inning on...was 2-3 with a 4.35 ERA in six games in Oakland, 3-1 with a 3.44 ERA in seven games on the road...was 2-1 with a 2.65 ERA in three interleague starts compared to 3-3 with a 4.31 ERA in 10 games against the American League...batted for the first time as a professional and went 0-for-5 with five strikeouts...the A's were 7-4 (.636) in his 11 starting assignments.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS: Was recalled from Triple-A Nashville May 27 and won each of his first three starts, posting a 1.25 ERA and .208 opponents batting average...the winning streak was the longest of his career...struck out a career-high tying seven batters in 6.0 innings in his first start on May 27 against Arizona and was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 victory...no-hit the Diamondbacks over the first five innings...combined with Pagán on an eight-hit shutout in the A's 16-0 win at Kansas City June 1...tossed a career-high eight innings and allowed seven of the hits...had his scoreless streak snapped at a career-high 15.0 innings June 8 against Kansas City...then went 2-2 with a 5.06 ERA and .330 opponents batting average over his next five starts from June 14 to July 9...allowed a career-high seven runs on a careerhigh 11 hits and a career-high tying four walks in a 7-3 loss to Houston on June 14...tossed a career-high 105 pitches and yielded just one run in 6.2 innings in a 12-4 win at San Diego June 20...tossed 3.0 innings June 26 at Detroit, matching his shortest outing as a starter...yielded an Oakland record seven doubles July 1 against Cleveland ... combined with Trivino and Treinen on a five-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win at Houston on July 9...tossed 6.0 innings and yielded three of the hits but was optioned to Nashville the next day...was recalled July 24 and went 0-1 with a 5.79 ERA in two starts before he was optioned back to the Sounds July 30...his third stint lasted one day on Aug. 30 when he allowed a career-high tying seven runs on eight hits in 6.0 innings in a 7-1 loss to Seattle Aug. 30...returned to Oakland Sept. 11 and made two appearances following his return, both in relief (1.1 ip, 1 h)...did not pitch after Sept. 19.

2018 WITH NASHVILLE: Was 4-5 with a 4.65 ERA in 15 games, all starts, with Triple-A Nashville...had a .255 opponents batting average, including .189 (18-for-95) against left-handed hitters compared to .290 (51-for-176) against right-handers...surrendered seven home runs, six to righties...had a .519 OPS against lefties, .816 against righties...opponents hit .314 with runners in scoring position but that dropped to .222 with RISP and two outs... allowed a .229 average and five walks (.280 on-base percentage) to batters lead off an inning...was 4-1 with a 3.12 ERA in six starts at home, 0-4 with a 6.99 ERA in six starts on the road...tossed 3.0 innings or fewer in each of his first three starts...allowed a season-high seven hits in 4.0 innings in an 8-6 loss to New Orleans April 28...went 0-3 with a 6.19 ERA in five starts in April and tossed four innings or fewer four times...then went 1-2 with a 3.24 ERA in four starts in May and tossed at least five innings in each start...was credited with his first win of the season May 4 against Memphis when he allowed one run in 6.0 innings of work...struck out a season-high 10 batters in 6.0 innings May 9 against Colorado Springs...tossed a complete game at Memphis on May 14 but was the losing pitcher in a 2-1 loss...allowed two runs on six hits in a season-high eight innings...matched his season high with seven hits in an 11-2 loss at Oklahoma City May 20...was 1-5 with a 4.39 ERA and .269 opponents batting average in nine starts when he was promoted to Oakland May 27 ... was optioned back to Nashville July 10 and tossed 5.0 scoreless innings for his second win July 17 at Omaha...that was his only outing before returning to Oakland July 24 but he was optioned back to the Sounds July 30...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings Aug. 3 against Fresno for the win...then allowed a season-high eight runs on a season-high tying seven hits and a season-high three walks in 4.1 innings at Colorado Springs Aug. 9...however, ended up with a no decision in the Sounds 18-9 win...went 2-0 despite a 5.96 ERA in five starts in August.

FRIDAY'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Aaron Brooks (2-1, 4.24 ERA): Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...has allowed eight runs in 11.0 innings over his last two starts after tossing six scoreless innings in his first start on April 1 against Boston.. was the winning pitcher in his last start, an 8-5 A's win at Baltimore on April 11 (6.0 ip, 3 h, 3 r, 3 er, 3 bb, 3 so)...is 0-2 with a 57.86 ERA (2.1 ip, 11 h, 15 r, 15 er, 5 bb, 2 so, 1 hr) in two career appearances against Toronto, both starts at Rogers Centre...last faced the Blue Jays on Aug. 12, 2015 with Oakland and took the loss in a 10-3 decision (1.2 ip, 6 h, 8 r, 8 er, 2 bb, 2 so)...went 2-1 with a 4.40 ERA and .273 opponents batting average in four games, includ-ing three starts, this spring...spent the entire 2018 season at Triple-A Colo-rado Springs in the Milwaukee Brewers organization before he was traded to Oakland Sept. 3 for cash considerations...pitched in three games for Oakland in September and did not allow a run in 2.2 innings.

2019 PLAYER HIGHLIGHTS

RYAN BUCHTER

 Made the 200th appearance of his career April 6 at Houston and tossed a scoreless eighth inning.

MATT CHAPMAN

- Made his second consecutive Opening Day start at third base on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and had a double, home run and three RBI.
- Homered in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory.

JHAREL COTTON

 Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL March 27.

KHRIS DAVIS

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season

RYAN DULL

• Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.

DANIEL GOSSETT

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.

CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.

NICK HUNDLEY

 Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokio (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston.

SEAN MANAEA

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

NICK MARTINI

• Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.

MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery
 was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start backto-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.

STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...matched his career high in hits (fourth time) and RBI (fifth time).

JURICKSON PROFAR

• Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).

FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

MARCUS SEMIEN

 Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.

JOAKIM SORIA

 Was on his 11th career Opening Day roster and made his Oakland debut in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...the A's became his seventh team in 12 seasons in the majors. Was charged with the loss March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) when he surrendered a careerhigh tying four runs without retiring a batter (11th time, first since Sept. 1, 2018 at Washington).

BLAKE TREINEN

 Walked four batters April 7 at Houston, his most ever as a reliever...also allowed his first run of the season in that game and was charged with the loss and blown save...it snapped a streak of 24.1 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run, dating back to Aug. 25, 2018.

LOU TRIVINO

Made his first Opening Day roster and pitched in each of the A's first four games...joined Dennis Eckersley (1992) as the only pitchers in Oakland history to appear in each of the first four games of a season.

J.B. WENDELKEN

- Tossed 2.0 scoreless innings on Opening Day and added a scoreless seventh inning March 30
 against Los Angeles (AL) before being charged with his first run in the eighth inning...that
 snapped a career-high 17.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to July 24, 2018.
- Struck out a career-high four batters and allowed just one baserunner across a career-high 3.1 innings pitched against Houston April 7.
