## OAKLAND ATHLETICS (18-22) VS. CLEVELAND INDIANS (20-17)

**ABOUT THE A'S:** Have won three of the first four games of the homestand after going 1-8 on the last road trip...are now 8-14 (.364) since the rain out in Texas on April 13 after starting the year 10-8 (.556)...are 18-22 (.450) overall, which is the fifth worst record in the American League...are in fifth place in the AL West for the ninth time in the last 10 days and are a season-high tying 6½ games out of first place...however, are only 1½ games out of second place...have spent two days in second this year, 11 days in third, four days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, four days tied for fourth and 12 days in fifth.

**EXTRA INNINGS AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS:** The A's played their third extra inning game in the last five games last night and now have five extra inning games for the season, which is tied with Detroit and Kansas City for the most in the American League...have won each of their last two extra inning games after losing the first three...had their third walk-off win of the season last night, which is tied for the most in the majors...have four walk-off losses, which is tied for the most in the majors...are 3-7 in games decided in the last bat and the losses are second most in the AL...improved to 6-6 in one-run games with the win and the 12 one-run decisions are tied for second most in the AL.

**HOME AND AWAY:** The A's are 3-1 on this six-game homestand against Cincinnati (2-1) and Cleveland (1-0) and have won six of the last seven home games...the loss on Thursday snapped a season-high five-game home winning streak...are 13-7 (.650) in the Coliseum and 5-15 (.250) in all other ballparks...are 17-1-3 over their previous 21 series in the Coliseum and have a record of 45-18 (.714) in Oakland dating back to June 16, 2018...are 13-9 (.591) at home this year compared to 5-13 (.278) on the road...are tied for the fifth best home record in the American League but have the second worst road record...leave following the game tomorrow for a nine-game road trip to Seattle (two games), Detroit (four games) and Cleveland (three games)...it will be the third of four straight nine-game road trips to start the year, which are the A's longest road trips of the season...went 1-8 on the last road trip to Toronto (0-3), Boston (0-3) and Pittsburgh (1-2)...it was their worst road trip of eight or more games since going 1-9 against Boston, Baltimore and Chicago from June 2-12, 2011.

**AGAINST THE CENTRAL:** The A's faced an American League Central team for the first time this year last night and won...the game last night began a stretch where the A's are scheduled to play 10 of 12 games against the Central...after a two-game series at Seattle to start the next road trip, the A's have a four-game series at Detroit and a three-game series at Cleveland...last year, the A's compiled a 26-8 (.765) record against AL Central teams, which was the second best record by any team against the Central (Houston 25-7, .781)...it was second best in Oakland history to a mark of 32-9 (.780) in 2002...are now 53-19 (.736) against the Central dating back to Aug. 23, 2016.

**LEFT AND RIGHT:** The A's are 8-4 (.667) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 10-18 (.357) against right-handers...the record against lefties is third best in the American League but the mark against righties is second worst (Toronto, 9-17)...have not faced a southpaw in the previous nine games and have faced just one over the previous 15 contests (Rodriguez, BOS on April 29)...are batting .267 with an .820 OPS against left-handed pitchers compared to .230 with a .682 OPS against right-handers...have the second best batting average and third best OPS against lefties in the AL...have the fourth lowest batting average and OPS against righties...lead the AL in home runs off lefties (17).

**STARTING PITCHING:** A's starting pitchers are 2-4 with a 3.12 ERA (23 er in 66.1 ip) and .223 (56-for-251) opponents batting average over the last 11 games after going 6-7 with a 6.95 ERA and .295 opponents average over the previous 18 contests...have 14 of the A's 18 wins, which is tied for fourth most in the American League...last year, starters had just 52 of the A's 97 wins (53.6%)...have one of three complete games in the AL (Cleveland, Texas)...the no-hitter by Fiers on Tuesday marked the first time an A's starter pitched more than seven innings since Aug. 15, 2018 (Anderson, 7.2)...it snapped a streak of 77 consecutive games of seven innings or fewer (tied for second longest in Oakland history), 146 consecutive games of eight innings or fewer (third longest) and 146 consecutive games without a complete game (fourth longest).

**PITCHING:** The A's have compiled a 3.76 ERA (63 er in 150.2 ip) over the last 16 games after posting a 6.26 ERA over the previous 13 contests...have a 3.46 ERA (80 er in 208.0 ip) at home compared to 5.43 on the road...have

the fourth lowest home ERA in the American League but the road ERA is the highest in the majors...the no-hitter by Fiers Tuesday night against Cincinnati was the A's fourth shutout of the season, which is tied for second most in the AL.

**OFFENSE:** The A's are batting .214 (100-for-468) with 47 runs scored (3.6 per game) and nine home runs in 13 games dating back to the start of the last road trip...are now hitting .239 for the season, which is fifth lowest in the American League...also have the fifth lowest OPS (.716), on-base percentage (.317) and slugging percentage (.399)...A's pinch hitters are 7-for-23 (.304) with four walks and four RBI...are tied for the most pinch walks in the AL, rank second in hits and third in batting.

**ON THE BASES:** The A's are 13-for-20 (65.0%) in stolen base attempts...the stolen bases are fourth fewest in the American League and the percentage is third lowest...opponents are 29-for-36 (80.6%) against the A's...the stolen bases allowed are second most in the AL and the percentage is fourth highest...have one pickoff, which is tied for second fewest.

**BASEBALL HAS THE SACRIFICE:** The A's are one of two teams without a sacrifice hit (Detroit) and now have a streak of 84 consecutive games without a sacrifice hit...that is the second longest streak in Major League history...the record is 95 by Toronto from Aug. 14, 2002 to May 25, 2003...the A's last sacrifice hit was by Chad Pinder on Aug. 12, 2018 at Los Angeles (AL)...Matt Olson had a bunt single Wednesday night, the A's first bunt hit of the season.

**THE LONG BALL:** The A's are 0-14 when going homerless and are one of three teams in the majors that has not won a game when hitting no home runs (Houston, Seattle)...now have a 16-game losing streak when going homerless dating back to last year, which matches the longest such streak in Oakland history (June 3-July 3, 1979)...last won when going homerless on Sept. 11 of last year...are 1-14 when getting out-homered, which is the worst record in the majors

**THE INJURED LIST:** The A's have used the injured list nine times this year and currently have seven players on the IL (Canha, Cotton, Estrada, Gossett, Herrmann, Manaea, Martini), four of which are on the 60-day IL (Cotton, Gossett, Herrmann, Manaea)...Canha and Martini are on rehab assignments...have had at least four players on the IL every day since Aug. 24, 2015, at least three every day since July 30, 2011 and have not had fewer than two players on the IL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

**A's vs. INDIANS:** The A's won the first meeting of 2019 last night after winning the season series last year, 4-2...won two of three in Oakland and two of three in Cleveland...have now won eight of the last 10 games...have won eight of the last nine in Oakland but have lost seven of the last 10 in Cleveland...have won four of the previous five season series and are 19-14 against Cleveland dating back to the start of the 2014 season...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 279-241 against the Indians...that breaks down to 149-105 in Oakland and 130-136 in Cleveland...including 46-67 at Progressive Field...all-time, the A's are 914-1034 against the Indians.

### TODAY'S TIDBITS

**Matt Chapman** has hit safely in each of his seven career games against Cleveland and is 13-for-26 (.500) with nine runs, five doubles, a triple, three home runs (1.115 slugging percentage), three RBI and three walks...**Josh Phegley** leads American League catchers with 22 RBI...**Marcus Semien** has committed just one error and leads AL shortstops in fielding percentage (.993)...**Blake Treinen** extended his home scoreless streak to 32.0 innings last night, which is the longest in Oakland history by a reliever and third longest by any Oakland pitcher.

### THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1931** Al Simmons drives in a run for the 11<sup>th</sup> consecutive game as Lefty Grove defeats Chicago, 5-2 en route to a 31-win season...the win moves the A's into first place for good as the Athletics win their third straight American League pennant...in **2012** Brandon Inge drives in four runs for the fourth time in his last five games to become the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over a five-game stretch...the first was Lou Gehrig in 1931...in **2014** Derek Norris hits two three-run home runs on a 3-0 count in consecutive innings in the A's 9-1 win over Washington.

## TODAY'S OPENER AND PROBABLE LONG MAN

**FOR OPENERS:** The A's will use an "opener" for the first time this year today... did it nine times last year, all in September, and the A's were 4-5 in those games...the openers (Hendriks eight times, Trivino once) compiled a 1.86 ERA while the long men (Mengden four times, Bassitt three times, Fiers and Cahill once) combined for a 3.55 ERA...Hendriks tossed 1.2 innings in the first opener game but the opener pitched exactly 1.0 innings in each of the final eight games...the long man averaged 3.7 innings per game, with a high of 5.0 by Daniel Mengden on Sept. 12 at Baltimore.

### TODAY'S OPENER: 16 RHP LIAM HENDRIKS (1-0, 1.77 ERA)

**Last Outing:** 5/8 vs. Cincinnati (W, 1.0 ip, 1 so)

- Is scheduled to make his first start as the A's "opener" this year...had one loss as the A's opener in eight starts last year...compiled a 2.08 ERA (2 er in 8.2 ip) and had a .188 (6-for-32) opponents batting average...the A's were 4-4 in games in which he started.
- Has made 16 appearances this year and has tossed 20.1 innings, which is tied for fifth among American League relievers.
- Has a 1.77 ERA but has allowed 7-of-12 (58.3%) inherited runners to score, which is the fourth highest percentage in the AL.
- First batters faced are 5-for-12 (.417) with three walks and a sacrifice fly (.500 on-base percentage)
- Has surrendered just one home run in 20.1 innings but has issued nine walks.
- Has a .229 opponents batting average, which including .189 (7-for-37) against right-handed hitters compared to .273 (9-for-33) against left-handers.
- Has not allowed a run in his last four outings (5.1 ip, 4 h, 1 bb, 6 so).
- Opponents are 4-for-25 (.160) with runners in scoring position.
- Is scheduled to pitch on two days rest...has not allowed a run in 10 games with two days rest or fewer (12.1 ip)...has a 4.50 ERA (4 er in 8.0 ip) in six games on three days rest or more.
- Has a 2.53 ERA (3 er in 10.2 ip) and .289 (11-for-38) opponents batting average in nine starts at home compared to a 0.93 ERA and .156 opponents average in seven games on the road.
- Is 1-1 with a 6.42 ERA (33.2 ip, 37 h, 25 r, 24 er, 11 bb, 27 so, 7 hr) in 11 career appearances, including four starts...last faced the Indians in relief on July 16, 2017 in Oakland (0.2 ip)...his last start came on Aug. 24, 2013 at Cleveland while pitching for Minnesota...was the losing pitcher in the Twins 7-2 loss (4.1 ip, 7 h, 7 r, 7 er, 1 bb, 0 so)...is 1-1 with a 7.17 ERA (17 er in 21.1 ip) in four career starts against Cleveland.

### 35 RHP AARON BROOKS (2-3, 5.74 ERA)

**Last Outing:** 4/30 at Boston-GS (L, 4.1 ip, 6 h, 5 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 2 so)

- Was one of three inactive players for the season-opening two-game series against Seattle in Tokyo and did not make the trip to Japan...was inserted into the five spot in the rotation when the season resumed.
- Has made seven appearances, all starts, but has not pitched since April 30...had his turn skipped with off days on May 2 and 6.
- Tossed six scoreless innings for the win in his first start but is 1-3 with a 7.11 ERA (20 er in 25.1 ip), .283 (30-for-106) opponents average and eight home runs allowed in five starts since then
- Has allowed 32 hits, half of which (16) have been for extra bases (eight doubles, eight home runs)...has a .258 opponents batting average and a .516 slugging percentage
- Has a .205 (17-for-83) opponents batting average with the bases empty, .366 (15-for-41) with runners on...opponents are 9-for-25 (.360) with runners in scoring position, but are 2-for-9 (.222) with RISP and two outs...has allowed a .143 (5-for-35) average overall with two outs
- Has a .353 (18-for-51) opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .192 (14-for-73) after that.
- Is 1-1 with a 4.50 ERA (8 er in 16.0 ip) and .233 (14-for-60) opponents batting average in three starts at home compared to 1-2 with a 7.04 ERA (12 er in 15.1 ip) and .281 (18-for-64) opponents average in three starts on the road.
- He was the losing pitcher in his last outing, a start in the A's 5-1 loss at Boston on April 30...allowed a solo home run to Betts in the first, a RBI single to Leon in the second, a two-run home run to Moreland in the fourth and a RBI double by Devers in the fifth...was relieved by Hendriks after 4.1 innings with the A's trailing 5-0.

- Has faced Cleveland once in his career and was the starting and winning pitcher in the A's 5-1 win in Oakland on Aug. 2, 2015 (7.1 ip, 5 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 5 so)...tossed a career-high 7.1 innings and allowed just one run, a one-out home run to Chisenhall in the fifth inning.

### TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

**RHP Daniel Mengden (3-2, 2.77 ERA with Las Vegas):** Will be recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas tomorrow to make his 2019 debut...was 1-2 with a 5.73 ERA in four games, including three starts, this spring when he was optioned to Las Vegas March 11...went 3-2 with a 2.77 ERA and .197 opponents batting average in seven games, including six starts, with the Aviators...struck out 44 batters in 39.0 innings (10.15 per nine innings)...is tied for second in the Pacific Coast League in strikeouts, ranks third in opponents batting average, fifth in ERA and seventh in innings pitched (39.0)...went 2-0 with a 4.24 ERA over his first three games and is 1-2 with a 1.64 ERA in four starts since then...had a no decision in his last start, a 3-1 win over Salt Lake on Tuesday in Las Vegas (6.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 6 so)...was the losing pitcher in his only career appearance against the Indians, a start in the A's 5-3 loss at Cleveland on May 29, 2017 (3.1 ip, 7 h, 5 r, 5 er, 1 bb, 1 so).

4-9, 4.04 ERA (70 er in 151.1 ip)  
Saves/Opportunities: 6-for-14 (42.9%)

- Has allowed just 13 home runs in 151.1 innings for a rate of 0.77 home runs per nine innings, the second lowest mark in the American League (third in the majors).
- Has converted 6-of-14 (42.9%) save opportunities...is the second lowest save percentage in the AL and the second fewest saves.
- Ranks fifth in the AL in innings pitched (151.1)...is tied for the second fewest wins (4) and has the second most losses (9).
- First batters faced are hitting .250 with a .343 on-base percentage (31-for-124, 17 walks, 1 hbp) vs. the Oakland bullpen so far this season...the batting average is third highest in the AL and the OBP is third highest.
- Has allowed 21-of-56 (37.5%) inherited runners to score, which is the second highest percentage in the AL and fifth highest in the majors.

## 52 LHP RYAN BUCHTER

Saves/Opportunities: 0-2  
Inherited Runners/Scored: 10/3 First Hitters: 5-16, 2 bb, hbp

- Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas April 29 for his second stint with the A's and pitched in five games since then (3.1 ip, h, 2 bb, 4 so)...was on the A's Opening Day roster and logged a 7.04 ERA in 13 games before he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Has allowed a .148 (4-for-27) average against left-handed hitters, .476 (10-for-21) against right-handers.
- Has allowed three of his 10 inherited runners to score this year...allowed just two inherited runners to score all last year.
- Owns a career 1.42 ERA in 14 games against Cleveland spanning 12.2 innings, which include nine strikeouts and five walks.

Last Year: Went 6-0 with a 2.75 ERA and .219 opponents batting average in 54 relief appearances in his first season with the A's...allowed just 2-of-30 (6.7%) inherited runners to score, which was the lowest percentage in the majors.

Inherited Runners/Scored: 12/7 First Hitters: 5-12, 3 bb, sf

- Twelve of his 16 outings this season have been scoreless, including each of his last four games (5.1 ip, 4 h, bb, 6 so).
- Is tied for fifth among American League relievers in innings pitched (20.1).
- Opponents are 16-for-70 (.229) but he has issued nine walks in 20.1 innings.
- Opponents are hitting .273 (11-for-38) off him at home, and .156 (5-for-32) on the road.
- Is 1-1 with a 6.42 ERA in 11 career games against Cleveland spanning 33.2 innings, including 27 strikeouts and 11 walks.

Last Year: Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 7.36 ERA in 13 relief appearances before he was outrighted off the 40-man roster July 2...returned to Oakland Sept. 1 and went 0-1 with a 1.38 ERA in 12 games, including eight starts as the opener.

- Is tied for third among American League relievers in games pitched (19) and ranks fourth in innings (20.2).

Has pitched 10 seasons in the majors with Oakland (2009-13, 18), Colorado (2014), Los Angeles-NL (2015-16), Chicago-NL (2017) and Toronto (2017) and is 46-52 with a 4.09 ERA in 157 games, including 145 starts...is 30-34 with a 3.92 ERA (231 er in 531.0 ip) in 101 games, including 90 starts, in his six seasons with Oakland...was originally selected by Arizona in the 2nd round of the 2006 draft but was one of six players traded to Oakland in the Dan Haren trade following the 2007 season...has 12 career stints on the disabled list...has pitched in the postseason for the A's (2012, 2013) and Dodgers (2015)...pitched in the 2008 All-Star Futures Game and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was tabbed as the A's number one prospect by *Baseball America* following the 2008 season.

**2018 HIGHLIGHTS**

Was signed by the A's to a minor league contract March 19 and began the season at Triple-A Nashville before he was selected on May 2...went 4-5 with a 4.48 ERA in 17 starts with Oakland in a season that was interrupted by two stints on the disabled list...was out from May 19 to July 7 with a strained left shoulder and Aug. 28 to Sept. 12 with a strained left forearm...walked just 13 batters in 80.1 innings for an average of 1.46 walks per nine innings...that was a career low and was second lowest in the American League among pitchers with 80 or more innings pitched (Kluber, CLE 1.46)...struck out just 47 but his 3.62 strikeout-to-walk ratio was a career high...his starts and innings pitched were his most since 2015 when he made 31 starts and tossed 180.1 innings with the Dodgers...was 2-1 with a 2.01 ERA and .191 opponents batting average in five starts at home compared to 2-4 with a 6.06 ERA and .335 opponent average in 12 starts on the road...surrendered one home run in 31.1 innings at home, nine in 49.0 innings on the road...is now 14-12 with a 3.48 ERA (97 er in 250.2 ip) in 44 career games in the Coliseum, 32-40 with a 4.35 ERA (276 er in 570.2 ip) in 113 games in all other ballparks...had a 1-2 record, a 6.08 ERA and .356 opponents batting average in six starts at the All-Star Break...then went 3-3 with a 3.81 ERA and .251 opponents average in 11 starts after the break...issued eight free passes in 23.2 innings before the break (3.04 per nine innings) and then walked just five batters in 56.2 innings after the break (0.79 per nine innings)...has a 19-30 career record before the break, 27-22 after the break...allowed a .285 opponents batting average, including .257 (18-for-70) against left-handed hitters compared to .293 (72-for-246) against right-handers...surrendered nine of his 10 home runs to righties...yielded a .333 batting average with runners in scoring position...opponents hit .280 when leading off an inning but he walked just three...was 0-2 with a 5.66 ERA in five starts on four days rest, 4-3 with a 4.07 ERA in 12 starts on five days rest or more...over the last two years, he is 1-3 with a 7.20 ERA (32 er in 40.0 ip) in 10 starts on four days rest, 7-6 with a 4.42 ERA (47 er in 95.2 ip) in 20 starts on five days rest or more...went 1-1 with a 2.61 ERA in four starts during the day, 3-4 with a 5.13 ERA in 13 starts at night...is 17-16 with a 3.46 ERA (111 er in 288.2 ip) in 55 career games during the day, 29-36 with a 4.43 ERA (262 er in 532.2 ip) in 102 games at night...was 0-1 with a 6.75 ERA in two interleague starts and is now 1-7 with a 5.93 ERA (36 er in 54.2 ip) in 11 career interleague starts...went 1-for-4 (.250) as a hitter and is now 8-for-79 (.101) with three doubles, five RBI and six walks in his career...tossed five innings or fewer in 10 of his 17 starts...walked one batter or fewer 14 times and received two runs of support or fewer 10 times.

**OAKLAND:** Was selected from Nashville May 2 and went 0-2 with a 7.63 ERA and .379 opponents batting average in four starts before he was placed on the 10-day disabled list May 19 with a

strained left shoulder...allowed two runs in 6.1 innings in his first start May 2 at Seattle but had a no decision in the A's 3-2 win...it was his first start as an Athletic since April 24, 2013 at Boston...allowed a season-high nine runs on a season-high 10 hits and a season-high three walks in just 3.0 innings in his second start May 7 against Houston...left his start on May 18 at Toronto with the shoulder injury after tossing a season-low 1.0 inning...made three rehab starts with Nashville before he was reinstated from the DL July 8...went 3-2 with a 2.90 ERA and .239 opponents batting average in nine starts before returning to the DL Aug. 28 with a strained left forearm...combined with Petit, Buchter and Pagán on a five-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Cleveland July 8...it was his first win as an Athletic since April 7, 2013...tossed five of the innings, allowed three of the hits and walked two...it was the last time he walked more than one batter as he issued one free pass or fewer in each of his final 12 starts (5 bb in 60.0 ip, 0.75 walks per nine innings)...struck out a season-high six batters in a 15-3 win at Texas July 23...those were his most strikeouts in a game since Sept. 15, 2015 vs. Colorado...finished July with a 2-1 record, a 3.98 ERA and .309 opponents average in four...then went 1-1 with a 2.15 ERA and .184 opponents average in five starts in August...did not allow a run in three of his August starts and the game went into extra innings in two of his three no decisions...walked just two batters in 29.1 innings...logged 7.0 shutout innings Aug. 3 against Detroit but had a no decision in the A's 1-0, 13-inning win...allowed a two-run home run to Calhoun in the third inning Aug. 10 at Los Angeles (AL), which was the first home run he surrendered to a left-handed hitter since July 28, 2015 at Oakland (Reddick)...had a season-high 18.2-inning scoreless streak from Aug. 10 to 27...tossed a season-high 7.2 scoreless innings Aug. 15 against Seattle but had a no decision in the A's 2-0, 12-inning loss...it was his longest outing since Oct. 1, 2015 at San Francisco (7.2 ip) and his longest scoreless outing since May 26, 2011 at Los Angeles-AL (8.0 ip)...combined with Familia and Trivino on a two-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win over Texas on Aug. 21 in Oakland...tossed seven of the innings, allowed one of the hits and matched his season high with six strikeouts...allowed five runs on seven hits in 2.2 innings in an 11-4 loss at Houston Aug. 27 before going on the DL a second time...did not have a rehab assignment before he was reinstated Sept. 13...went 1-1 with a 6.46 ERA and .318 opponents batting average in four starts following his return...tossed 3.1 innings or fewer in three of those starts...combined with Dull, Montas and Brooks on a four-hit shutout in the A's 10-0 win over Los Angeles (AL) Sept. 19 in Oakland...tossed 6.2 innings and allowed three of the hits.

**NASHVILLE:** Went 2-1 with a 2.78 ERA and .248 opponents batting average in seven starts...did not allow a home run in 32.1 innings...struck out 36 (10.02 per nine innings) and walked just six (1.67 per nine innings) for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 6.0...his opponents batting average included a .223 (21-for-94) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .314 (11-for-35) against left-handers...yielded a .156 batting average and just one walk to batters leading off an inning (.182 on-base percentage)...opponents hit .182 with the bases empty, .346 with runners on...including .333 with runners in scoring position...was 1-1 with a 1.89 ERA in four starts when he was selected by Oakland May 2...returned on June 23 for a three-start rehab assignment and went 1-0 with a 4.05 ERA before he was reinstated from the DL July 8.

**CAREER**

**2017**—Was signed by the Chicago Cubs Jan. 30 and went 2-2 with an 8.18 ERA in six starts before going on the disabled list May 7 with a strained lower back...missed nearly three months of the season and would not pitch for the Cubs again as he was released July 31...signed a minor league deal with Toronto Aug. 15 and returned to the majors Aug. 29...went 2-2 with a 5.13 ERA in seven starts for the Blue Jays and combined with both clubs for a 4-4 record and a 6.34 ERA in 13 starts...allowed a .322 opponents batting average, including .298 against right-handed hitters compared to .436 against left-handers...surrendered all five of his home runs to righties...yielded a .371 batting average with runners in scoring position...opponents hit .345 when leading off an inning, but he issued just one walk...went 1-2 with a 15.68 ERA in four starts at Wrigley Field and 1-2 with a 7.62 ERA in three starts in Rogers Centre for an 11.19 ERA in seven starts in his home ballparks...was 2-0 with a 2.81 ERA in six starts on the road...was 2-0 with a 2.05 ERA in four starts during the day, 2-4 with a 9.18 ERA in nine starts at night...was 1-1 with an 8.84 ERA in five starts on four days rest, 3-3 with a 5.00 ERA in eight starts on five days rest or more...had a 7.04 ERA over the first two innings of his starts, 3.06 after that...opponents were successful in 6-of-7 (85.7%) stolen base attempts...went 1-for-7 (.143) with a RBI, walk and three strikeouts in eight plate appearances with the Cubs...was in the Cubs starting rotation to open the season and

allowed just one run over his first two starts...struck out a season-high five batters and allowed six runs on a season-high eight hits in 3.2 innings on April 18 against Milwaukee, but had a no decision in a 9-7 win...walked a career-high six batters April 24 at Pittsburgh, but allowed three runs in a season-high 6.0 innings for the win...finished April 2-0 with a 3.54 ERA in four starts...was placed on the 10-day disabled list May 7 with a strained lower back...it was his 10th career stint on the DL...was transferred to the 60-day DL June 8...went 2-2 with a 4.61 ERA in six games, including five starts, on a rehab assignment with Double-A Tennessee from June 25 to July 23...was reinstated from the DL and designated for assignment July 26...was released July 31 and signed a minor league deal with Toronto Aug. 15...went 1-1 with a 0.93 ERA in two starts with Triple-A Buffalo before he was selected by the Blue Jays Aug. 29...started and lost that day to Boston, despite allowing just one run in 5.2 innings...tossed a season-high tying 6.0 innings in his next two starts on Sept. 3 at Baltimore and Sept. 9 against Detroit...picked up his first win as a Blue Jay and matched his season-best with five strikeouts in the start against the Tigers...had a win and a 2.70 ERA over his final two starts.

**2016**—In his second and final season with the Dodgers, missed a majority of the season due to injury...all told, pitched in four games (three starts), allowing 15 runs in 11.1 innings while going 1-2...in March, underwent arthroscopic surgery to repair a bulging disk in his lower back...began the season on the 60-day disabled list...went a combined 0-1 with a 2.25 ERA in three rehab starts with Single-A Rancho Cucamonga and Triple-A Oklahoma City before he was reinstated, Aug. 14...was placed on the 15-day DL Aug. 23 (retro to Aug. 21) with a blister on his left index finger...was reinstated Sept. 22 and pitched in two games (one start), going 1-0 with a 4.91 ERA.

**2015**—Won double-digit games (10) for the first time since his rookie campaign in 2009 (11), and set career marks in starts (31), innings (180.1) and quality starts (18) for the Dodgers...led major league qualifiers with a 66.7 ground ball percentage...forced 23 ground ball double-plays, eighth most among starting pitchers (min. 25 starts)...went 1-2 with a 2.27 ERA in six May starts, including a rain-shortened 5.0-inning complete game (1 r, 0 er) at Colorado, May 8...tied a career high (third time) with 10 strikeouts on June 26 at Miami...at the plate, led the Dodgers with nine successful sacrifices...did not commit an error, while ranking second among National League pitchers with 47 assists...in the postseason, started and lost Game 3 of the NLDS at New York (3.0 ip, 7 h, 6 r, 6 er, 3 so), a 13-7 decision.

**2014**—Limited to just eight starts with the Rockies due to a broken left index finger and lower back surgery...went 1-3 with a 2.91 ERA...allowed only one home run in 43.1 innings...permitted three or fewer earned runs in seven of his eight starts, including five quality starts...broke his left index finger, April 12 at San Francisco, and missed the next 83 games...while recovering, made two rehab starts for Triple-A Colorado Springs and went 1-0 with a 0.96 ERA...injured his back during an Aug. 5 start against the Cubs and underwent surgery, Aug. 14 to repair a herniated disc in his lower back...the surgery was performed by Dr. Chris Yeung in Phoenix.

**2013**—Was the A's Opening Day starting pitcher but finished the season in the bullpen after spending four months on the disabled list with a stress fracture in his right foot...was 1-4 with three saves, a 6.04 ERA and .287 opponents batting average in 16 games, including five starts...struck out 46 in 44.2 innings, marking the first time in his career he finished with more strikeouts than innings pitched...walked 21 and his average of 4.23 walks per nine innings was the highest of his career...pitched 3.0 innings in each of his three saves to become the second A's pitcher since 1992 with three three-inning saves in one season (Doug Jones, 1999)...allowed a .214 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...made his first career Opening Day start April 1 against Seattle but was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss...struck out the side in the first inning to become the first A's pitcher since at least 1947 to strike out the side in the first inning on Opening Day...struck out a career-high tying 10 batters in 6.0 innings in his second start, a 9-3 win at Houston April 7...it was his only win of the season...tossed 1.0 inning April 19 at Tampa Bay, allowing four runs on four hits and two walks...left the game early with a sprained right ankle...was scheduled to skip his start April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) but ended up pitching 5.1 innings of relief that night in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win...entered the game in the 13th inning for the first relief appearance of his career after 73 starts...allowed just one run...was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 1 with a sprained right ankle...was diagnosed with a navicular stress fracture

of his right foot May 17 and was transferred to the 60-day DL June 14...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 28 and pitched exclusively in relief following his return, logging a 5.74 ERA and .306 opponents batting average in 10 appearances...recorded his first save in his first outing following his return Aug. 28 at Detroit...pitched the final three innings of the A's 14-4 win, allowing three runs on five hits in 3.0 innings.

**2012**—Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings...yielded a .148 average with runners in scoring position...was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so)...combined for a 1-1 record and a 4.62 ERA during a six-start rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...began his rehab assignment July 21 with Stockton, one year and seven days after having reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow...was transferred to Sacramento July 26.

**2011**—Was limited to just 13 starts and was 3-6 with a 4.00 ERA when he underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his left elbow July 14...went 2-1 with a 1.56 ERA over his first five starts and did not allow a home run in 34.2 innings...then went 1-5 with a 5.73 ERA over his final eight starts, yielding eight home runs in 48.2 innings...allowed a .270 opponents batting average, including a .252 against right-handed hitters and .303 against left-handers...his opponents average dropped to .221 with runners in scoring position...tied for seventh in the American League with five pick-offs...opponents were successful in just 5 of 12 (41.7%) stolen base attempts...tossed his second career complete game in his second start of the season but took the loss in a 2-1 decision at Minnesota April 8...matched his career high by tossing 9.0 innings May 5 against Cleveland, but had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning loss...allowed a career-high 10 runs on a career-high 11 hits in a 10-3 loss to New York May 31...allowed five runs on nine hits in 5.0 innings in his final start, a 6-3 loss at Boston June 5...was placed on the disabled list June 7 with left elbow soreness...received a Platelet Rich Plasma injection after he was examined by Dr. James Andrews at the Andrews Institute in Pensacola, Fla. June 13...was examined again a month later and it was determined that his injury required surgery...Dr. Andrews performed successful reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow, July 14.

**2010**—Lowered his ERA by more than a run from his rookie campaign of 2009 but two stints on the disabled list with elbow problems limited him to just 19 starts...was 7-6 with a 2.80 ERA after going 11-11 with a 4.06 ERA in his first season...opponents batted .257, including .225 with runners in scoring position...tied for eighth in the AL with four pickoffs...did not allow a run in his first two starts of the season April 8 against Seattle and April 13 at Seattle to become the first starting pitcher in Oakland history (among pitchers who began the season with the A's) to start the season with two consecutive scoreless outings...the last Athletics pitcher to do it was Alex Kellner of the 1953 Philadelphia A's, who started the season with back-to-back complete game shutouts...agreed to terms April 16 on a four-year contract through the 2013 season with club options for 2014 and 2015...had his season-opening scoreless streak snapped at 14.0 innings in his third start, an 8-3 loss to Baltimore...that was the third longest season-opening streak by a starter in Oakland history and the longest since Matt Keough set the record with a 16.0 inning streak in 1980...was 1-1 with a 2.35 ERA in four starts before going on the 15-day disabled list April 27 retroactive to April 25 with left elbow inflammation and a proximal medial forearm

strain...was reinstated from the DL May 29...had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...was reinstated July 30 and went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...finished the season with a career-high tying four-game winning streak...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA in six starts in September.

**2009**—Set an Oakland rookie record and led Major League rookies with 150 strikeouts...compiled an 11-11 record and 4.06 ERA in 30 starts...tied for third among American League rookies in games started, ranked fourth in innings pitched (175.1) and tied for fourth in wins...is one of four 21-year olds in Oakland history to win 10 or more games...went 8-4 with a 2.96 ERA over his final 17 starts, beginning June 29...was charged with 15 unearned runs, which tied for the most in the AL...also ranked tied for fifth in grounded into double plays (24), tied for seventh in shutouts (1) and pickoffs (4), eighth in walks per nine innings (2.31) and strikeout to walk ratio (3.33), and 10<sup>th</sup> in strikeouts per nine innings (7.70)...his season run support of 4.62 was eighth lowest in the AL...did not have a wild pitch and his 175.1 innings were the most in the majors among pitchers with no wild pitches...did not commit an error in 29 total chances, all assists...tied for the lead among AL pitchers in double plays (5) and tied for fourth in assists...was ranked number 7 on *Baseball America's* Top 100 Prospects lists entering the season...was the losing pitcher in his Major League debut, a 5-4 A's loss to Seattle April 10...allowed five runs in 6.0 innings, with all five runs coming in the second inning...recorded his first Major League win May 20 at Tampa Bay when he yielded four runs on four hits and no walks in 6.0 innings in a 7-6 A's win...at the age of 21 years, 108 days, he became the sixth youngest pitcher in Oakland history to record his first ML win...tossed a complete game two-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Boston July 6 (2 bb, 9 so)...at the age of 21 years, 155 days he became the fifth youngest pitcher in Oakland history to toss a shutout and the youngest since Mike Norris July 4, 1976 against Kansas City...did not allow a run over his next two starts, including July 19 against Los Angeles when he retired each of the first 20 batters he faced before Bobby Abreu singled with two outs in the seventh inning to break up the perfect game...became the second rookie in Oakland history to take a perfect game into the seventh inning (Mike Norris, June 28, 1976)...had a career-high 23.0-inning scoreless streak from July 6 to 24...was named American League Rookie of the Month for September after going 4-0 with a 2.28 ERA in four starts...struck out a career-high 10 batters and tossed 6.0 shutout innings in a 2-1 win over Cleveland Sept. 18.

**2008**—Combined for an 11-5 record and a 3.69 ERA in 20 games, 19 starts, with Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland in his first season in the A's organization...also pitched for the United States team in the All-Star Futures Game at Yankee Stadium July 13 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb) and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 13 h, 8 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 10 so, 2 hr) in two starts during the Olympics...was rated as the A's number one prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...was named California League Pitcher of the Week, June 9-15...won both of his starts and allowed just one run in 14.0 innings, while striking out 16...joined Team USA for the Olympics in August...had a no decision Aug. 16 in a 5-4 win over Canada (5.2 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 so)...then started and won in the Bronze Medal game Aug. 23 against Japan, an 8-4 win (7.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 6 so).

**2007**—Was Arizona's second round pick in 2006 but did not sign until Sept. 1, 2006...made his professional debut in 2007 and was a combined 11-7 with a 3.07 ERA in 23 games, all starts, with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Visalia...was 8-4 with a 2.21 ERA in 14 starts at South Bend and was a *Baseball America* Low Class A All-Star...made one postseason start for Visalia and took the loss (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so, 2.25 ERA)...was traded to the A's on December 14 and was named Oakland's third best prospect by *Baseball America*.

## PERSONAL/MISCELLANEOUS

Brett F. Anderson was originally signed by Diamondbacks scout Joe Robinson...graduated from Stillwater (OK) High School...was a *Baseball America* 1st Team High School All-America selection in 2006 after going 9-0 with two saves and a 0.37 ERA in 12 games as a senior...struck out 102 and walked just nine in 57 innings...his father, Frank, was the head baseball coach at Oklahoma

State University from 2003-12 and is now pitching coach at the University of Houston...was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after-school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.
- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013)...[now has 24 career multi-home run games, including 18 as an Athletic.](#)
- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.

#### RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.

#### DANIEL GOSSETT

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

#### ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.

#### CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.

#### NICK HUNDLEY

- Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.

#### SEAN MANAEA

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

#### NICK MARTINI

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.

#### JOSH PHEGLEY

- Had a [career-high](#) nine-game hitting streak from April 2-14...went 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...scored a run in each of the last seven games during the streak and drove in a run in each of the last six.
- Went 4-for-5 with two doubles, a home run, and a career-high eight RBI May 3 at Pittsburgh... it was his first career four-hit game...became just the 13th catcher in Major League history to drive in eight or more runs in game, the first Athletic...was the fifth Oakland Athletic with eight or more RBI in a game, the first since Eric Chavez on Aug. 30, 2001.

#### STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...[matched his career high in hits \(fourth time\) and RBI \(fifth time\)](#)...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.

#### JURICKSON PROFAR

- Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).

#### FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

#### MARCUS SEMIEN

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.
- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping a career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018.

#### JOAKIM SORIA

- Was on his 11th career Opening Day roster and made his Oakland debut in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...the A's became his seventh team in 12 seasons in the majors.
- Was charged with the loss March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) when he surrendered a [career-high tying](#) four runs without retiring a batter (11th time, first since Sept. 1, 2018 at Washington).
