ABOUT THE A'S: Scored a season-high 17 runs yesterday to snap their losing streak at three games...are 5-4 over the last nine games...are 20-25 overall and the five games under .500 are one short of the season high of six (last: 19-25 on May 14)...the A's .444 winning percentage is fifth lowest in the American League...are in fifth place in the AL West and trail first place Houston by 9½ games...that is ½ game short of the season high of 10 on May 15...have been in last or tied for last every day dating back to April 30...have spent two days in second this year, 11 days in third, four days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, six days tied for fourth and 16 days in fifth...are 10-17 (.370) since the rain out in Texas on April 13 after starting the year 10-8 (.556).

THE LONG BALL: The A's hit a season-high tying five home runs yesterday for the second time in their last three games...have four five-homer games for the season, which marks the third time in Athletics history the A's had at least four games with five or more home runs (7 in 1996, 4 in 1999)...have 10 home runs in the last three games after hitting nine over their previous 14 contests...the A's are 1-15 when going homerless, which is the third worst record in the majors (Houston, 0-7; Seattle, 0-6)...are 2-15 when getting out-homered, which is second worst in the American League (Houston, 1-9).

AGAINST THE CENTRAL: The A's are 3-1 against American League Central teams and are scheduled to play each of their next six games against the Central...travel to Cleveland for a three-game series following this four-game set with Detroit...are now 55-20 (.733) against the Central dating back to Aug. 23, 2016.

LEFT AND RIGHT: The A's are scheduled to face a left-handed starting pitcher in each of the final three games of this series after facing just two lefties over the previous 20 games...have lost each of their last two games in which the opponent starts a lefty but are 8-5 (.615) for the season, which is the fourth best record in the American League...are 12-20 (.375) against right-handers, which is tied for second worst (Toronto, 10-21)...the 13 games against lefties are tied for third most...are batting .260 with an .822 OPS against left-handed pitchers compared to .233 with a .695 OPS against right-handers...have the third best batting average and OPS against lefties in the AL...have the fourth lowest batting average and OPS against righties...are tied for the AL lead in home runs off lefties (22).

FOUR-GAME SERIES: This series with Detroit is the A's fourth four-game series of the season...have won three of four in each of the previous three four-game series (Los Angeles, March 28-31; Boston, April 1-4; Baltimore, April 8-11)...are 8-0-2 over their previous 10 four-game series dating back to June 7-10, 2018.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-2 on this nine-game road trip to Seattle (0-2), Detroit (1-0) and Cleveland (three games) and have lost 11 of their last 13 road games...are 6-15 (.286) on the road for the season, which is the second worst road record in the American League (Kansas City, 5-14)...this is the third of four straight nine-game road trips to start the year, which are the A's longest road trips of the season...went 1-8 on the last road trip to Toronto (0-3), Boston (0-3) and Pittsburgh (1-2), which was their worst road trip of eight or more games since going 1-9 against Boston, Baltimore and Chicago from June 2-12, 2011...went 4-2 on the last homestand against Cincinnati (2-1) and Cleveland (2-1) and are 14-10 (.583) at home.

HOME AND AWAY SPLITS: The A's have compiled a 5.28 ERA (108 er in 184.0 ip) on the road compared to 3.46 at home...have the second highest road ERA in the majors (Texas, 5.55), but the home ERA is fourth lowest in the American League...are batting .253 (194-for-766) and are averaging 5.76 runs per game on the road (121 runs in 21 games) compared to .227 and 3.75 runs per game at home...are averaging the third most runs per game on the road in the AL but the third fewest at home...have hit 35 home runs in 21 games on the road, 26 in 24 games at home.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 3.53 ERA (49 er in 125.0 ip) in 13 games in May after posting a 4.89 ERA in April...have the fifth lowest May ERA in the American League...A's starting pitchers have allowed one run or fewer in five of the last 10 games and are 2-3 with a 2.85 ERA (19 er in 60.0 ip) and .204 (43-for-211) opponents batting average over that span...the A's used an "opener" for the first time this year last Saturday against Cleveland and won...went 4-5 when using an opener last year.

OFFENSE: The A's scored a season-high 17 runs on a season-high tying 16 hits yesterday, lifting their season batting average four points from .236 to .240...have the fifth lowest batting average, slugging percentage (.408) and OPS (.726) in the American League but the fourth most walks (164)...A's pinch hitters are 7-for-26 (.269) with six walks...lead the AL in pinch walks and plate appearances (34), rank second in hits and fifth in batting.

SCORING MARGIN: The A's defeated Detroit 17-3 yesterday, which was their largest margin of victory this year...now have a positive run differential for the season (+5) despite being five games under .500...nine of the previous 10 games had been decided by two runs or fewer...are 10-13 (.435) in games decided by two runs or fewer...23 of the A's 44 games this year have been decided by two runs or fewer, which is second most in the American League (Seattle, 27)...are 10-13 in those games, including 7-8 in one-run games...also have the second most one-run games in the AL (Seattle, 18).

CLOSE CALLS: The A's have played four extra inning games in the last 10 games and are 2-4 in extra innings for the season...the six games are tied for second most in the majors (Pittsburgh, 8)...in three of those games, the A's had the lead in extra innings only to go on to lose the game...no other Athletics team since at least 1906 has lost more than two such games in one season...have four walk-off wins and five walk-off losses and the losses match Oakland's season total from last year...lead the majors in walk-off games (9) and losses and are tied for the lead in wins...are 4-8 in games decided in the last at bat...the losses are tied for the most in the majors and the 12 games are tied for second most.

A's vs. TIGERS: The A's won the first meeting of 2019 yesterday to extend their winning streak against the Tigers to 13 games...that is third longest in Oakland history and seventh longest in Athletics history against any team...it is the A's longest against the Tigers...have an eight-game winning streak at Comerica Park, which matches the Athletics longest winning streak at any Detroit ballpark (8, Aug. 3, 2001-May 13, 2003, also at Comerica) and is tied for the seventh longest at any road ballpark...won the season series last year, 7-0...it was the fourth time in Athletics history the A's went undefeated in a season series of seven or more games (12-0 vs. New York in 1990, 7-0 vs. Baltimore in 2004, 7-0 vs. Toronto in 2018)...went 3-0 in Oakland and 4-0 in Detroit...have won each of the previous two season series and three of the previous four and are 20-7 against Detroit dating back to 2015...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 265-247 against the Tigers...that includes 145-111 in Oakland, 118-134 in Detroit and 2-2 in Las Vegas...are 42-28 (.600) at Comerica Park, which is the best winning percentage by any team in this ballpark...all-time, the A's are 933-1000 against the Tigers.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Frankie Montas (4-2, 2.78 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his ninth start of the season...has allowed three earned runs or fewer in each of his eight starts and has a 2.78 ERA, which ranks eighth in the American League...has four wins, which are one short of his career high of five from last year...has 42 strikeouts, which are one short of his career high of 43 from last year...the A's are 5-3 (.625) in his starting assignments and are 12-7 (.632) when he starts in his career.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Opponents have grounded into eight double plays with him on the mound, which is second most in the American League...has a .209 (14-for-67) opponents batting average the first time through the line up, .282 (20-for-71) the second time and .316 (12-for-38) the third time...has walked just two batters to lead off an inning...three of the four home runs he has allowed have been solo shots...opponents are hitting .196 (10-for-51) with two outs...has not allowed a hit to the opponents number eight hitter (0-for-15)...has yielded a .326 (14-for-43) average with runners in scoring position.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on six days rest today...is 3-1 with a 2.22 ERA (7 er in 28.1 ip) in five starts on five days rest or more and 1-1 with a 3.71 ERA (7 er in 17.0 ip) in three starts on four days rest.

INNING BY INNING: Has allowed just one run in the first inning this year for a 1.13 ERA (8.0 ip)...has a 1.97 ERA (7 er in 32.0 ip) over innings one through four and a 4.73 ERA (7 er in 13.1 ip) from the fifth inning on...last year, he allowed 14 of his 34 runs in the first inning (8.18 ERA).

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-0 with a 2.63 ERA (7 er in 24.0 ip) in four starts at home compared to 1-2 with a 2.95 ERA (7 er in 21.1 ip) in four starts on the road...has surrendered three of his four home runs on the road...is tied for fourth in the American League in home wins.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Was on the Opening Day roster and was available in the bullpen for the two games against Seattle in Japan but did not pitch...was inserted into the fourth spot in the rotation when the season resumed and picked up the win in his first start March 31 against Los Angeles (AL)...took the loss in his second start on April 5 at Houston when he walked a season high three batters...then went 3-0 with a 3.50 ERA and .224 opponents average over this next three starts from April 10 to 23 to match the longest winning streak of his career (also May 27-June 8, 2018)...the first win came on April 10 at Baltimore when he retired the first 12 batters he faced...surrendered two home runs in the game, giving him four in his first three starts...has not allowed a home run in five games and 28.1 innings since then...tossed a season-high 6.2 innings and allowed a run on three hits for the win in a 2-1 decision over Houston on April 17...did not allow a hit until Gurriel singled with one out in the fifth...tossed a career-high 107 pitches and allowed a season-high nine hits but extended his winning streak to three games in an 11-5 win over Texas April 23...had his three-game winning streak snapped April 29 at Boston when he allowed a season-high seven runs in a season-low 4.1 innings...only one of the runs was earned and the six unearned runs tied for second most in Oakland history...they were the most since Brett Anderson also had six on May 15, 2009 vs. Detroit...finished April with a 3-2 record and a 3.29 ERA in five starts...tied for fifth in the American League in wins in April.

LAST START: He had his second consecutive no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning win over Cleveland a week ago today in Oakland...struck out a career-high tying seven batters...the A's scored a run in the first, but he allowed two in the second on a Bauers RBI double and a grounded into double play...Oakland tied the game in the bottom of the second and he did not allow another run...was relieved by Trivino to the start the seventh with the A's leading 3-2 but Trivino allowed a run for the blown save.

SPRING TRAINING RECAP: Went 2-0 with two saves and a 0.56 ERA (16.0 ip, 11 h, 2 r, 1 er, 5 bb, 16 so) in five games, including two starts...the ERA was the lowest in the majors and his .190 opponents batting average was second lowest in the Cactus League...led the A's in innings pitched (16.0) and strikeouts (16) and tied for the team lead in wins and saves...did not allow a home run...also pitched in relief in the exhibition game against Nippon Ham on March 17 (1.0 ip).

2018 RECAP: Went 5-4 with a 3.88 ERA in 13 games, including 11 starts, over four stints with Oakland...was 5-2 with a 3.35 ERA in eight starts during his first stint from May 27 to July 9 and 0-2 with a 5.40 ERA in five games over his final three stints...surrendered just five home runs in 65.0 innings after yielding 10 home runs in 32.0 innings in 2017...struck out 43 batters (5.95 per nine innings) after fanning 56 in 47.0 innings (10.72 per nine innings) over his first two seasons...allowed a .290 opponents batting average, including .276 (35-for-127) against right-handed hitters compared to .305 (39-for-128) against left-handers...yielded 20 of his 28 extra base hits to lefties and had a .378 slugging percentage against righties compared to .523 against lefties...also went 4-5 with a 4.65 ERA in 15 games, all starts, with Triple-A Nashville...had a .255 opponents batting average, including .189 (18-for-95) against left-handed hitters compared to .290 (51-for-176) against right-handers.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Daniel Mengden (0-1, 6.75 ERA): Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas last Sunday and is scheduled to make his second start of the season...was the losing pitcher in his first start, a 5-3 A's loss to Cleveland last Sunday in Oakland (5.1 ip, 5 h, 4 r, 4 er, 4 bb, 4 so)...was the winning pitcher in his only career appearance against the Tigers, a start in the A's 3-2 win at Detroit on Sept. 20, 2017 (7.0 ip, 7 h, 0 r, 0 er, 0 bb, 4 so)...was 1-2 with a 5.73 ERA in four games, including three starts, this spring when he was optioned to Las Vegas March 11...went 3-2 with a 2.77 ERA and .197 opponents batting average in seven games, including six starts, with the Aviators...struck out 44 batters in 39.0 innings (10.15 per nine innings)...at the time of his May 12 promotion, he was tied for second in the Pacific Coast League in strikeouts, ranked third in opponents batting average, fifth in ERA and seventh in innings pitched (39.0).

- The pen was charged with its fifth blown save in its last 10 games on Monday and now has 10 for the season, which is the most in the majors.
- Has converted 6-of-16 (37.5%) save opportunities...has the lowest save percentage in the Majors and has the second fewest saves.
- Has not had a save since April 17 against Houston and the streak of 24 consecutive games without a save matches the longest by an A's team over the last 23 years (Sept. 21, 2004-April 16, 2005)...the longest streak in the post-Billy Ball era (1983-present) is a 26-game streak from April 9-May 6, 1994.
- Has allowed just 17 home runs in 170.2 innings for a rate of 0.90 home runs per nine innings, the third lowest mark in the American League (fifth in the majors).
- Ranks fourth in the AL in innings pitched (170.2)...has the fourth fewest wins (5) and tied for the most losses (10).
- First batters faced are hitting .257 with a .346 on-base percentage (35-for-136, 18 walks, 1 hbp) vs. the Oakland bullpen so far this season...the batting average is third highest and the OBP is fourth highest in the AL.
- Has allowed 23-of-61 (37.7%) inherited runners to score, which is the third highest percentage in the AL and sixth highest in the majors.

- Began the season as the A's fifth starter and went 2-3 with a 5.74 ERA in six starting assignments before pitching in relief of "opener" Liam Hendriks last Saturday (2.25 ERA, 1 er in 4.0 ip).
- His 4.0 innings of relief last Saturday against Cleveland were his most ever as a reliever and the most by an A's reliever this year.
- Has allowed 39 hits, nearly half of which have been for extra bases (nine doubles, 10 home runs)...has a .269 opponents batting average and .538 slugging percentage.
- Has a 4.05 ERA (9 er in 20.0 ip) in four games at home, a 8.27 ERA (15 er in 16.1 ip) in three games on the road.
- Has faced Detroit twice in his career, allowing 10 hits and nine earned runs in 3.0 innings pitched (27.00 ERA).

Last Year: Spent the entire season at Triple-A Colorado Springs in the Milwaukee Brewers organization before he was traded to Oakland Sept. 3 for cash considerations...pitched in three games for Oakland in September and did not allow a run in 2.2 innings

- Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas April 29 for his second stint with the A's and has not allowed a run in eight of nine games since then (6.1 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 4 bb, 8 so, 1.42 ERA)...was on the A's Opening Day roster and logged a 7.04 ERA in 13 games before he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Is tied for second in the American League in games pitched (22).
- Has allowed a .129 (4-for-31) average against left-handed hitters, .500 (11-for-22) against right-handers.
- Has a career 1.42 ERA (1 er, 6.1 ip) in seven career outings against Detroit, including six strikeouts and two walks.

2016—In his second and final season with the Dodgers, missed a majority of the season due to injury...all told, pitched in four games (three starts), allowing 15 runs in 11.1 innings while going 1-2...in March, underwent arthroscopic surgery to repair a bulging disk in his lower back...began the season on the 60-day disabled list...went a combined 0-1 with a 2.25 ERA in three rehab starts with Single-A Rancho Cucamonga and Triple-A Oklahoma City before he was reinstated, Aug. 14...was placed on the 15-day DL Aug. 23 (retro to Aug. 21) with a blister on his left index finger...was reinstated Sept. 22 and pitched in two games (one start), going 1-0 with a 4.91 ERA.

2014—Limited to just eight starts with the Rockies due to a broken left index finger and lower back surgery...went 1-3 with a 2.91 ERA...allowed only one home run in 43.1 innings...permitted three or fewer earned runs in seven of his eight starts, including five quality starts...broke his left index finger, April 12 at San Francisco, and missed the next 83 games...while recovering, made two rehab starts for Triple-A Colorado Springs and went 1-0 with a 0.96 ERA...injured his back during an Aug. 5 start against the Cubs and underwent surgery, Aug. 14 to repair a herniated disc in his lower back...the surgery was performed by Dr. Chris Yeung in Phoenix.

2013—Was the A's Opening Day starting pitcher but finished the season in the bullpen after spending four months on the disabled list with a stress fracture in his right foot...was 1-4 with three saves, a 6.04 ERA and .287 opponents batting average in 16 games, including five starts...struck out 46 in 44.2 innings, marking the first time in his career he finished with more strikeouts than innings pitched...walked 21 and his average of 4.23 walks per nine innings was the highest of his career...pitched 3.0 innings in each of his three saves to become the second A's pitcher since 1992 with three three-inning saves in one season (Doug Jones, 1999)...allowed a .214 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...made his first career Opening Day start April 1 against Seattle but was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss...struck out the side in the first inning to become the first A's pitcher since at least 1947 to strike out the side in the first inning on Opening Day...struck out a career-high tying 10 batters in 6.0 innings in his second start, a 9-3 win at Houston April 7...it was his only win of the season...tossed 1.0 inning April 19 at Tampa Bay, allowing four runs on four hits and two walks...left the game early with a sprained right ankle...was scheduled to skip his start April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) but ended up pitching 5.1 innings of relief that night in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win...entered the game in the 13th inning for the first relief appearance of his career after 73 starts...allowed just one run...was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 1 with a sprained right ankle...was diagnosed with a navicular stress fracture

of his right foot May 17 and was transferred to the 60-day DL June 14...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 28 and pitched exclusively in relief following his return, logging a 5.74 ERA and .306 opponents batting average in 10 appearances...recorded his first save in his first outing following his return Aug. 28 at Detroit...pitched the final three innings of the A's 14-4 win, allowing three runs on five hits in 3.0 innings.

2012—Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings...yielded a .148 average with runners in scoring position...was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so)...combined for a 1-1 record and a 4.62 ERA during a six-start rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...began his rehab assignment July 21 with Stockton, one year and seven days after having reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow...was transferred to Sacramento July 26.

strain...was reinstated from the DL May 29...had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...was reinstated July 30 and went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...finished the season with a career-high tying four-game winning streak...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA in six starts in September.

2008—Combined for an 11-5 record and a 3.69 ERA in 20 games, 19 starts, with Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland in his first season in the A's organization...also pitched for the United States team in the All-Star Futures Game at Yankee Stadium July 13 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb) and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 13 h, 8 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 10 so, 2 hr) in two starts during the Olympics...was rated as the A's number one prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...was named California League Pitcher of the Week, June 9-15...won both of his starts and allowed just one run in 14.0 innings, while striking out 16...joined Team USA for the Olympics in August...had a no decision Aug. 16 in a 5-4 win over Canada (5.2 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 so)...then started and won in the Bronze Medal game Aug. 23 against Japan, an 8-4 win (7.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 6 so).

2007—Was Arizona's second round pick in 2006 but did not sign until Sept. 1, 2006...made his professional debut in 2007 and was a combined 11-7 with a 3.07 ERA in 23 games, all starts, with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Visalia...was 8-4 with a 2.21 ERA in 14 starts at South Bend and was a *Baseball America* Low Class A All-Star...made one postseason start for Visalia and took the loss (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so, 2.25 ERA)...was traded to the A's on December 14 and was named Oakland's third best prospect by *Baseball America*.

Brett F. Anderson was originally signed by Diamondbacks scout Joe Robinson...graduated from Stillwater (OK) High School...was a *Baseball America* 1st Team High School All-America selection in 2006 after going 9-0 with two saves and a 0.37 ERA in 12 games as a senior...struck out 102 and walked just nine in 57 innings...his father, Frank, was the head baseball coach at Oklahoma

State University from 2003-12 and is now pitching coach at the University of Houston...was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after-school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 10th start of the season...went 3-0 with a 2.63 ERA and .222 opponents batting average over his first four starts but is 1-3 with a 6.12 ERA (17 er in 25.0 ip) and .287 (29-for-101) opponents average in five starts since then...his four wins match his total from each of the previous two seasons...has not won more than four games since going 10-9 for the Dodgers in 2015.

NO-HITTER: Tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati to become the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea last year on April 21, 2018...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has two career complete games, both no-hitters...according to Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).

THIS AND THAT: Has not allowed a run in three of his nine starts but has surrendered six runs three times...has walked two batters or fewer seven times...has received two runs of support or fewer in each of his last five starts and six this year...is 2-2 with two runs of support or fewer, 1-1 with three runs of support or more.
