OAKLAND ATHLETICS (40-37) VS. TAMPA BAY RAYS (44-32)

ABOUT THE A'S: Had their four-game winning streak snapped last night and are now 7-3 over the last 10 games...are three games over .500 at 40-37, which is one short of the season high of four (twice, last: 40-36 on June 20)... are in third place in the American League West for the 19th consecutive day and trail first place Houston by eight games...are two games behind Boston for the second Wild Card...have spent eight days in second in the West this year, one day tied for second, 35 days in third, six days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, seven days tied for fourth and 17 days in fifth.

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit 69 home runs over the last 36 games dating back to May 13, which is second most in the majors over that span to Minnesota (72)...hit 51 home runs over the first 42 contests and have 120 for the season, which ranks fifth in the American League...have seven players with 10 or more home runs, which matches Minnesota and Seattle for the most in the majors...Phegley and Piscotty have nine home runs each and the Athletics record for most players with 10 or more home runs in a season is nine in 2000 and 2017...the A's hit a Coliseum record-tying six home runs on Tuesday...it was their fifth game of five or more home runs this year, which are the second most such games in Athletics history (7 in 1996)...the A's are 2-18 when going homerless, which is the second worst mark in the majors (Seattle, 0-14).

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .264 (313-for-1185) with 64 home runs and 199 runs scored (5.9 per game) over the last 34 games after hitting .236 with 56 home runs and 194 runs scored (4.4 per game) over the first 44 contests... rank third in the American League in hit by pitches (38), fourth in fewest strikeouts (603) and most grounded into double plays (62) and fifth in doubles (141)...A's pinch hitters rank second in the AL in plate appearances (51), tied for second in home runs (3) and walks (7), third in RBI (10) and extra base hits (5) and fourth in hits (10)...the number eight hitter is batting .279, which is third best in the majors...rank fourth in OPS (.832).

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 3.20 ERA (32 er in 90.0 ip) and .211 (70for-332) opponents batting average over the last 10 games after logging a 5.61 ERA and .268 opponents average over the previous 13 contests...overall, rank second in the American League in opponents slugging percentage (.397), tied for second in fewest home runs (89), third in OPS (.709) and fifth in opponents batting average (.240).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers allowed three earned runs or fewer in each of the last 13 games and are 6-4 with a 3.00 ERA (26 er in 78.0 ip) over that span...are 30-21 with a 4.06 ERA overall...rank third in the American League in wins, opponents batting average (.235) and slugging percentage (.395), fourth in innings pitched (420.2), OPS (.699) and winning percentage (.588) and fifth in ERA...Brett Anderson became the A's third seven-game winner Tuesday night and the A's join the Dodgers (4) and Twins (4) as the only teams with three or more seven-game winners.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed 10 errors in the last 14 games, which has led to nine unearned runs...had just 12 unearned runs over the first 64 contests...have 21 unearned runs for the season, which is fourth fewest in the American League...have turned just 46 double plays, which is tied for second fewest in the AL

ON THE BASES: A's opponents have been caught stealing 23 times, which is second most in the majors to the Phillies (24)...however, Oakland has allowed 55 stolen bases, which is second most to the Mets (65)...on offense, the A's are 25-for-38 (65.8%) in stolen base attempts...have the second lowest stolen base percentage in the American League and the third fewest stolen bases and attempts.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's had their four-game home winning streak snapped last night and are now 5-3 on this season-long 10-game homestand against Seattle (1-2), Baltimore (3-0) and Tampa Bay (1-1)...snapped a season-high six-game home losing streak a week ago today and are 5-8 over their last 13 home games...have won 12 of the last 14 on the road...overall, are 23-18 (.561) at home compared to 17-19 (.472) on the road...have the fifth best home record in the American League...went 6-4 on the last road trip, a season-long 10-game trip to Los Angeles-AL (2-1), Texas (2-2) and Tampa Bay (2-1)...leave following the game tomorrow for a six-game road trip to St. Louis (two games) and Los Angeles-AL (four games) that starts on Tuesday.

HOME AND AWAY SPLITS: The A's are batting .241 (332-for-1379) and are averaging 4.54 runs per game at home (186 runs in 41 games) compared to .256 with an average of 5.59 runs per game on the road...have a 3.70 ERA

(158 er in 384.0 ip) at home compared to 4.78 on the road...have the fifth lowest home ERA in the American League.

LEFT AND RIGHT: The A's are 14-7 (.667) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 26-30 (.464) against right-handers...have faced just one lefty over the previous 11 games...the mark against lefties is second best in the American League to Houston (16-6)...are batting .287 with an .874 OPS against left-handed pitchers compared to .236 with a .725 OPS against right-handers...have the second best batting average and OPS against lefties in the AL (Minnesota .300/.877), but the fifth lowest batting average against righties...are tied for the AL lead in home runs off lefties (38).

WALK-OFFS AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's had their fifth walk-off win of the season Thursday night, which is tied with the Diamondbacks, Rockies and Cubs for the most in the majors...have six walk-off losses, which is the most in the majors...are 6-12 in games decided in the last at bat...lead the majors in last at bat losses and are tied with Boston for the American League lead in last at bat games (18)...are 2-6 in extra inning games...lead the majors in extra inning losses and rank second in the AL in extra inning games (8)... have allowed 18 runs in extra innings (17 er in 20.2 ip, 7.40 ERA), which is the most in the majors...have allowed 35 runs in the ninth inning (34 er in 63.0 ip, 4.86 ERA), which is third most in the AL...have lost five times when leading after seven innings, which is third most in the majors (Boston and Seattle, 6)...are 0-26 when trailing after seven innings and are one of three teams without a win (Baltimore, Tampa Bay).

SCORING CHANGE: Major League Baseball has made a scoring change in the June 17 game against Baltimore...in the top of the second inning, credit Ruiz with a hit instead of a sacrifice...this adds one hit and one earned run to Mike Fiers...the change is reflected in the stat packs.

PLAYERS USED: The A's have used just 35 players, which is tied with Houston for the fewest in the American League and tied for third fewest in the majors...have employed 13 relievers, which is the fewest in the AL and third fewest in the majors.

THE INJURED LIST: The A's have used the injured list 11 times this year...currently have six players on the IL (Cotton, Estrada, Gossett, Herrmann, Hundley, Manaea) and all but Estrada and Hundley are on the 60-day IL...have had at least five players on the DL every day dating back to April 26, 2018.

A's vs. RAYS: The A's lead the season series 3-2...have split the first two games in Oakland after taking two of three at Tampa Bay last week...went 2-5 against Tampa Bay last year for the second consecutive season, marking the second time they have lost back-to-back season series to the Rays (2007-08)...the 2-5 record matches the A's worst ever against the Rays (2017)...went 1-3 in the Coliseum and 1-2 at Tropicana Field...seven of the A's last 11 losses have been by one run...all-time, the A's are 108-75 (.590) against the Rays, which is their best record against any American League team...are 59-31 in Oakland and 49-44 at Tropicana Field...the mark in the Coliseum is the A's best record against any AL team.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman has an eight-game hitting streak, which is the second longest active streak in the American League...is 12-for-30 (.400) with eight runs, five doubles, a triple, a home run, five RBI and five walks during the streak...*Khris Davis* leads designated hitters in home runs (16) and RBI (39)...has 149 home runs over the last four years, which are 14 more than any other player...*Liam Hendriks* has not allowed a run in 19 of his last 20 relief appearances and has the fifth lowest relief ERA in the AL (1.14)...... *Marcus Semien* leads the majors with 78 games played and has now started each of the A's last 159 games dating back to June 28 of last year... *Joakim Soria* made his 673rd career appearance last night, which ties Dennys Reyes for the most in Major League history by a Mexican-born pitcher.

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1969** Sal Bando, Ted Kubiak and Reggie Jackson all hit solo homers in the third inning of the A's 7-3 win against Minnesota in the first game of a doubleheader...it is the first three-homer inning in Oakland history... in **1979**, twelve days after Jim Essian's inside-the-park Grand Slam, Larry Murray hits an inside-the-park home run in the A's 6-5 win over the Texas Rangers.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Mike Fiers (7-3, 4.28 ERA)

FIRST EIGHT STARTS/LAST EIGHT STARTS: Went 2-3 with a 6.81 ERA and .297 opponents batting average over his first eight starts...then tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 against Cincinnati and is 5-0 with a 2.61 ERA (15 er in 51.2 ip) and .166 (29-for-175) opponents batting average over his last eight starts...ranks second in the American League in opponents batting average dating back to May 7, tied for fourth in wins and eighth in ERA.

FIVE-GAME WINNING STREAK: Currently has a five-game winning streak dating back to his no-hitter, which matches the A's season-high and matches the longest winning streak by an A's starter over the last three years...the streak includes a start in the suspended game May 19 at Detroit, in which he is the pitcher of record with the A's leading 5-3 in the bottom of the seventh...a win in that game or today would extend his streak to six games, which would match his career high from July 21-Sept. 11, 2018.

HOME AND AWAY: IS 5-2 with a 3.28 ERA (17 er in 46.2 ip) and .194 (32-for-165) opponents batting average in eight starts at home compared to 2-1 with a 5.62 ERA (26 er in 41.2 ip) and .259 (41-for-158) opponents average in seven starts on the road...is tied for second in the American League in home wins, ranks sixth in opponents batting average and seventh in OPS (.584)... has the second highest road ERA...is now 9-3 with a 3.28 ERA (39 er in 107.0 ip) and .209 (80-for-382) opponents batting average in 19 career appearances, 18 starts, in the Coliseum.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed 10 home runs in 163 at bats against righthanded hitters, five in 160 at bats against left-handers...10 of the 15 home runs he has allowed have been solo shots...has walked just four batters to lead off an inning...opponents are hitting .259 (15-for-58) with runners in scoring position but that drops to .160 (4-for-25) with RISP and two outs.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 5-1 with a 3.28 ERA (22 er in 60.1 ip) and .194 (42-for-217) opponents batting average in 10 starts at night compared to 2-2 with a 6.75 ERA (21 er in 28.0 ip) and .292 (31-for-106) opponents average in six starts during the day...ranks fourth in the American League in opponents batting average and OPS (.574) at night, tied for seventh in wins and eighth in ERA.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on four days rest today...is 2-1 with a 6.46 ERA (17 er in 23.2 ip) in five starts on four days rest, 4-0 with a 2.58 ERA (15 er in 52.1 ip) in eight starts on five days rest and 1-2 with an 8.03 ERA (11 er in 12.1 ip) in three starts on six days rest or more.

APRIL AND BEYOND: Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April but is 5-1 with a 2.88 ERA (18 er in 56.1 ip) and .178 (34-for-191) opponents average in nine starts since then...is now 5-9 with a 5.68 ERA in 25 career appearances in April and 48-35 with a 3.51 ERA (277 er in 709.1 ip) from May through August.

THIS AND THAT: Is scheduled to make his 17th start of the season, which will tie him for the most in the majors among non-openers...is 3-0 in three starts in June...has won four games in a month twice in his career: 4-1 in Aug. 2014 and 4-2 in Aug. 2012...is 12-5 with a 4.20 ERA (66 er in 141.1 ip) in 26 games, including 25 starts, since he was acquired by Oakland Aug. 6, 2018...the wins are tied for eighth most in the majors over that span.

NO-HITTER: Tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati to become the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years...put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts...that gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts... then allowed a season-high six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average... began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, matching the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...walked a season-high nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss

to Toronto on April 20...it was his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a six-game Coliseum winning streak... went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42)...then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May... had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124) ... tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati...walked two and struck out a season-high tying six...also tossed a season-high 131 pitches, which were the most by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May 13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...left with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth for the blown save...it was the first of two times the bullpen blew a save (May 31 vs. Houston, also Trivino)...was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...is the pitcher of record.

LAST START: He won his third consecutive start in the A's 3-2 win over Baltimore on Monday in Oakland...the A's scored a run in the first but he allowed two runs, one earned in the second on a Chapman error and an Alberto sacrifice squeeze...retired 17 straight beginning with the Alberto out and the A's scored twice in the third for the win.

LHP Brett Anderson (7-4, 3.68 ERA): Went 3-0 with a 2.63 ERA and .222 opponents batting average over his first four starts, 1-3 with a 6.12 ERA and .287 opponents average over his next five starts from April 21 to May 14 and is 3-1 with a 2.70 ERA and .250 opponents average in six starts since then...has seven wins this year after combining for seven wins over his previous three seasons...has allowed just eight home runs in 85.2 innings and his average of 0.84 home runs per nine innings is eighth lowest in the American League... six of the eight home runs are solo shots...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 16-2 A's win over Baltimore last Tuesday here in Oakland (7.0 ip, 4 h, 2 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 2 so)...is 1-1 with a 3.70 ERA (24.1 ip, 26 h, 12 r, 10 er, 6 bb, 21 so, 3 hr) in five career starts against Tampa Bay...including a no decision in his only start this year on June 12 at Tropicana Field in a 6-2 A's win (6.1 ip, 7 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 4 so).

State University from 2003-12 and is now pitching coach at the University of Houston...was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after-school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .204 opponents batting average, which is seventh lowest in the American League among pitchers with 60 or more innings pitched...however, 22 of the 48 hits he has allowed have been for extra bases (12 doubles, two triples, eight home runs) and he has a .374 opponents slugging percentage...has held left-handed hitters to a .187 (23-for-123) average, which is 10th lowest in the AL, compared to .223 (25-for-112) against righties...however, has surrendered six of his eight home runs and issued 22 of his 27 walks to lefties for a .707 OPS (.627 vs. righties)...six of his home runs have come with the bases empty...opponents are hitting .196 (9-for-46) with runners in scoring position...has held the opponents number three hitter to a .111 (3-for-27) batting average but the four hitter is batting .360 (9-for-25).

INTERLEAGUE: Is 0-1 with a 4.26 ERA (12.2 ip, 12 h, 6 r, 6 er, 3 bb, 15 so, 4 hr) in two interleague starts this year (May 4 at Pittsburgh, May 9 vs. Cincinnati)... is now 0-3 with a 3.49 ERA (28.1 ip, 29 h, 11 r, 11 er, 6 bb, 28 so, 5 hr) in five career interleague starts.

WITH THE BAT: Went 0-for-2 with two strikeouts earlier this year at Pittsburgh and is now 0-for-4 with three strikeouts in his career...never batter as a minor leaguer.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received two runs of support or fewer in six of his 11 starts this year and is 1-3 in those games...has 42 runs of support for the season (64.1 ip, 5.88 RSA) but 17 of those runs came in one game on May 16 at Detroit...last year, he received two runs of support or fewer in five of his seven starts and his RSA as a starter was 3.19...has received two runs of support or fewer in 30 of his 41 career starts and his career RSA as a starter is 3.55 (92 rs in 233.0 ip)...is 5-0 in 11 career starts with run support of three runs or more.

NIGHT AND DAY: Has three wins over his last four starts in a day game after starting his career 0-9 over his first 17 outings during the day...is 3-1 with a 3.20 ERA (14 er in 39.1 ip) in six starts during the day this year compared to 1-2 with a 4.32 ERA (12 er in 25.0 ip) in five starts at night.

PRE AND POST "TOMMY JOHN": Is 6-6 with a 3.38 ERA (42 er in 112.0 ip) and .212 (88-for-416) opponents batting average in 22 games (18 starts) since undergoing "Tommy John" surgery May 6, 2016...is averaging 8.36 strikeouts per nine innings (104 so in 112.0 ip)...was 2-11 with a 4.13 ERA, .263 opponents batting average and 6.77 strikeouts per nine innings in 29 games (23 starts) before the surgery.

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-3 win over Baltimore last Wednesday in Oakland...tossed 5.2 innings for the third consecutive start... retired 16 of the first 18 batters he faced and did not allow a hit until Villar singled with one out in the sixth...Villar scored on a Nunez single and he was relieved by Buchter with the bases loaded, two outs and the A's leading 3-1... Buchter allowed one inherited runner to score.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Mike Fiers (7-3, 4.28 ERA)

FIRST EIGHT STARTS/LAST EIGHT STARTS: Went 2-3 with a 6.81 ERA and .297 opponents batting average over his first eight starts...then tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 against Cincinnati and is 5-0 with a 2.61 ERA (15 er in 51.2 ip) and .166 (29-for-175) opponents batting average over his last eight starts...ranks second in the American League in opponents batting average dating back to May 7, tied for fourth in wins and eighth in ERA.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 5-2 with a 3.28 ERA (17 er in 46.2 ip) and .194 (32-for-165) opponents batting average in eight starts at home compared to 2-1 with a 5.62 ERA (26 er in 41.2 ip) and .259 (41-for-158) opponents average in seven starts on the road...is tied for second in the American League in home wins, ranks sixth in opponents batting average and seventh in OPS (.584)... has the second highest road ERA...is now 9-3 with a 3.28 ERA (39 er in 107.0 ip) and .209 (80-for-382) opponents batting average in 19 career appearances, 18 starts, in the Coliseum.

NO-HITTER: Tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati to become the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years...put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts...that gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts... then allowed a season-high six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average... began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, matching the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...walked a season-high nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss

- Made one rehab start with Single-A Stockton on April 4 and two with Triple-A Las Vegas on April 9 and 14...was 0-0 with a 3.27 ERA in three starts overall when he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas April 16.
- Was recalled by Oakland the next day when Marco Estrada went on the IL.

SKYE BOLT

- Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas May 3 and made his Major League debut that night at Pittsburgh...pinch hit in the seventh inning and popped out to first in his first career at-bat... remained in the game in center field and finished the night 0-for-2 with a strikeout.
- Collected his first ML hit May 4, a pinch-hit double off Keone Kela in the seventh inning.

AARON BROOKS

• Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan...took the fifth spot in the rotation once the regular season resumed.

RYAN BUCHTER

- Did not allow a run in six of his first seven appearances (2.70 ERA).
- That included the 200th appearane of his appearance of his career April 6 at Houston when he tossed a scoreless eighth inning.
- Then allowed at least one run in four of his next six games and had a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents batting average in 13 appearances overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.

MARK CANHA

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list April 29 with a sprained right wrist...went 1-for-8 (.125) with a double, RBI, sacrifice fly and three strikeouts on a two-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas on May 10 and 11 and was reinstated May 13.
- Hit his third career pinch-homer May 21 at Cleveland (had two in 2018).
- Homered in three consecutive games for the first time in his career from May 21-24.
- Hit seven home runs in May, which tied for 10th in the American League and are his most ever in a month.

MATT CHAPMAN

- Made his second consecutive Opening Day start at third base on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and had a double, home run and three RBI.
- Homered in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts May 7 against Cincinnati for the first four-strikeout game of his career.

- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 10 against Cleveland, a walk-off home run off Brad Hand to lead off the 12th...it was the third time he was at the plate for a walk-off (single and error on July 22, 2018; wild pitch on Sept. 22, 2018).
- Hit safely in each of his five games against the Indians (7-for-22, .318) and has now hit safely in all 11 of his career games against Cleveland...is 18-for-43 (.419) with 12 runs, six doubles, a triple, four home runs and eight RBI (.884 slugging percentage, 1.363 OPS).
- Homered in a career-high tying three consecutive games from May 25-27 (also July 22-24, 2017).

JHAREL COTTON

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL March 27.
- Began a rehab assignment at Single-A Stockton May 17 and went 0-1 with a 6.43 ERA in three games, including two starts, before his rehab was halted May 29 due to a hamstring injury.
- Underwent right hamstring debridement surgery June 6, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper at the North Central Surgical Center in Dallas, Tex.

KHRIS DAVIS

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.
- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.
- Homered twice on May 13 at Seattle to snap a 20-game homerless streak, which was his longest as an Athletic...it was his third multi-homer game of the season, his 19th as an Athletic and the 25th of his career.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list May 24 retroactive to May 22 with a left hip/oblique contusion and did not have a rehab assignment...suffered the injury on May 5 in Pittsburgh but played in seven of the A's 15 games following that before going on the IL, batting .346 with two home runs and three RBI...was reinstated from the IL June 1.

RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.
- Did not allow a run in six apperaances with the Aviators and had two saves and 14 strikeouts in 9.2 innings when he was recalled by Oakland April 22.
- Allowed at least one run in four of his next five appearances (7.11 ERA, .433 opponents batting average) and was optioned back to Las Vegas May 2.

MARCO ESTRADA

• Was on the A's Opening Day roster and was 0-2 with a 6.85 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day injured list April 17 with a lumbar strain.

MIKE FIERS

- Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).
- Put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts.
- That gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then allowed a season-high six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average
- Began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, matching the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...walked a season-high four.
- Struck out a season-high six batters April 12 at Texas.
- Yielded a season-high nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss to Toronto on April 20...it was his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a six-game Coliseum winning streak
- Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42).
- Then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May... had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124).
- Tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati... walked two and struck out a season-high tying six...also tossed a season-high 131 pitches, which were the most by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...retired the first 11 before Winker reached base on an error with two outs in the fourth...set down the next seven before walking Suarez to start the seventh...Suarez was erased on a double play, Puig walked and Fiers then retired the final seven batters to complete the no-hitter.
- Became the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters... is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea last year on April 21...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has two career complete games, both no-hitters...according to Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).
- Had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May 13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...left with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth for the blown save...it was the first of two times the bullpen blew a save (May 31 vs. Houston, also Trivino).
- Was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...is the pitcher of record.

DANIEL GOSSETT

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.
- Had his third career four-hit game June 5 at Los Angeles (AL), his first since Sept. 18, 2016 at New York (NL).
- Had a RBI single off Chaz Roe in the ninth inning on June 10 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit.

CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.

LIAM HENDRIKS

• Had a career-high 14.2-inning scoreless streak from April 30 to May 28.

NICK HUNDLEY

• Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston.
- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 28 consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second longest reaching base streak by a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979).
- Had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland, his second career game-ending RBI...the other was Aug. 3, 2018 vs. Detroit, also a single.
- Had a career-high and A's season-high 16-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...it matched the longest hitting streak by an Athletic over the last eight years...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak.
- Had an Oakland record-tying streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973).
- Had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI (Aug. 20, 2018 vs. Texas) and his
 first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand
 slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first
 Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last
 Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB).

SEAN MANAEA

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

NICK MARTINI

• Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.

KENDRYS MORALES

- Was acquired from the Toronto Blue Jays for minor league infielder Jesus Lopez and international slot money March 27.
- Made his second career appearance as a pitcher April 20 against Toronto in the ninth inning (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the other came on May 20, 2018 against Oakland at Toronto (1.0 ip, 1 bb)...it marked the 13th time in Oakland history a position player pitched, the sixth time in the last five years...is just the third to allow a run and is the first two walk two batters... the last was Jake Smolinski last year on June 13 against Houston.

MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery
 was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start backto-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators, including three at first base and two at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL May 7.
- Committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...it was the fourth longest errorless in Oakland history by a first baseman.

JOSH PHEGLEY

- Had a career-high nine-game hitting streak from April 2-14...went 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...scored a run in each of the last seven games during the streak and drove in a run in each of the last six.
- Went 4-for-5 with two doubles, a home run, and a career-high eight RBI May 3 at Pittsburgh... it was his first career four-hit game...became just the 13th catcher in Major League history to drive in eight or more runs in game, the first Athletic...was the fifth Oakland Athletic with eight or more RBI in a game, the first since Eric Chavez on Aug. 30, 2001.
- Had his second career four-hit game May 16 at Detroit.
- Tied for ninth in the AL with 20 RBI in May...those are his most RBI in a month, topping his 13 from April this year.

STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...matched his career high in hits (fourth time) and RBI (fifth time)...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 25 consecutive games from April 28 to May 29...hit .280 with a .357 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 8 against Cincinnati, a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 13th.
- Had his second career four-strikeout game May 13 at Seattle (also Aug. 30, 2016 at Milwaukee).
- Collected his 500th career hit May 16 at Detroit.

JURICKSON PROFAR

- Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).
- Committed his eighth error of the season in his 28th game at second base May 3 at Pittsburgh...then had a 25-game errorless streak from May 4 to June 1.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 16 at Detroit.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 21 at Cleveland, which ties an Athletics record (many times, last: Piscotty on April 24, 2018 at Texas).
- Finished May with six home runs, which matched his most ever in a month (September, 2018)

FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the
 oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug
 Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest
 player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953
 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

MARCUS SEMIEN

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.
- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping what was then a career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018...did not make his second error until June 2 for a 41-game errorless streak from April 12-June 1...that tied for fourth longest in Athletics history by a shortstop.
- Led off the game with a home run May 28 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the third lead-off home run of his career.
- Was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 1 against Houston.
- Went 4-for-5 with three runs, two home runs and four RBI June 7 at Texas...it was his fourth career multi-homer game and his sixth four-hit game.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of June 3-9 after going 13-for-31 (.419) with seven runs, two doubles, two home runs, nine RBI and three walks...it was the first weekly award of his career.

- Made his first career start June 5 at Los Angeles (AL) as the A's "opener" (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 so)...it came in his 667th career appearance...his career-opening streak of 666 appearances before making his first start was the longest in Major League history, topping the 638 games by Troy Percival before his first start on Sept. 30, 2007.

BEAU TAYLOR

- Was batting .297 with 33 walks and a .450 on-base percentage in 38 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland June 10.
- Made his first career start June 10 at Tampa Bay and went 0-for-2.

BLAKE TREINEN

- Walked four batters April 7 at Houston, his most ever as a reliever...also allowed his first run of the season in that game and was charged with the loss and blown save...it snapped a streak of 24.1 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run, dating back to Aug. 25, 2018.
- Allowed his first run at home on May 11 against Cleveland, snapping a streak of 32.0 consecutive scoreless innings at home dating back to 2018...that was the longest home scoreless streak in Oakland history by a reliever and third longest overall...it was the first time he allowed a run at home since July 21, 2018 vs. San Francisco.

LOU TRIVINO

- Made his first Opening Day roster and pitched in each of the A's first four games...joined Dennis Eckersley (1992) as the only pitchers in Oakland history to appear in each of the first four games of a season.

- Made his 100th career appearance June 9 at Texas.

- Tossed 2.0 scoreless innings on Opening Day and added a scoreless seventh inning March 30 against Los Angeles (AL) before being charged with his first run in the eighth inning...that snapped a career-high 17.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to July 24, 2018.
