OAKLAND ATHLETICS (47-39) VS. MINNESOTA TWINS (53-31)

ABOUT THE A'S: The A's defeated Minnesota last night to extend their winning streak to four games and move into sole possession of second place in the American League West for the first time since May 30...the win also moved the A's into a tie with Cleveland for the second Wild Card spot, which is the first time the A's have shared that spot since May 31...trail first place Houston in the West by seven games for the seventh consecutive day and are three games behind Tampa Bay for the first Wild Card...have also won six of the last seven games and 11 of the last 14...are 15-6 (.714) dating back to June 9, which is the second best record in the majors behind the Yankees (15-5, .750)...are a season-high eight games over .500 at 47-39...have spent nine days in second in the West this year, one day tied for second, 44 days in third, six days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, seven days tied for fourth and 17 days in fifth.

AGAINST THE CENTRAL: The A's are 9-1 against American League Central teams...are batting .268 (103-for-384) with 69 runs (6.27 per game) and 22 home runs in 11 games (includes May 19 suspended game)...the pitching staff has a 3.09 ERA (34 er in 99.0 ip) and .216 (77-for-356) opponents batting average...are now 61-20 (.753) against the Central dating back to Aug. 23, 2016.

BEFORE THE BREAK: The A's have clinched a winning record at the All-Star Break for the second consecutive season as they are 47-39 with five games remaining...have hit 136 home runs, which is one short of the Athletics record for home runs at the break...the 1996 club had 137 in 1996...have 303 extra base hits, which is third best (321 in 2018, 317 in 1996)...are averaging 5.08 runs per game and have not averaged five or more runs per game before the break since 2004 (5.02).

THE LONG BALL: The A's have homered in each of the last seven games (15 home runs total)...now have 85 home runs over the last 45 games dating back to May 13, which is second most in the majors over that span behind the Twins (89)...hit 51 home runs over the first 42 contests and have 136 for the season, which ranks fourth in the American League.

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .258 (383-for-1483) with a .490 slugging percentage (93 doubles, five triples, 80 home runs) and an average of 5.8 runs per game (248 runs) over the last 43 games dating back to May 16...hit .236 with a .396 slugging percentage and 4.4 runs per game over the first 44 contests...rank third in the American League in hit by pitches (43), fourth in fewest strikeouts (674) and most grounded into double plays (73) and fifth in doubles (157)...A's pinch hitters rank second in the AL in plate appearances (55) and doubles (3), tied for second in home runs (3), third in RBI (12) and extra base hits (6) and tied for third in walks (7).

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 3.34 ERA (63 er in 170.0 ip) over the last 19 games dating back to June 11 and have a 4.12 ERA for the season, which is fifth lowest in the American League...also rank second in fewest home runs (98) and opponents slugging percentage (.396), third in opponents batting average (.241), tied for third in shutouts (6) and fourth in OPS (.709)

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 4-0 with a 2.81 ERA (8 er in 25.2 ip) over the last four games and 9-3 with a 3.83 ERA (38 er in 89.1 ip) over the last 16 contests...overall, starters rank second in the American League in wins (35) and opponents slugging percentage (.398), third in winning percentage (.603) and fourth in ERA (4.16), opponents batting average (.239), OPS (.705) and innings pitched (467.1).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed just one error in the last eight games and have a .986 fielding percentage, which is third best in the American League...have turned just 54 double plays, which is third fewest...have the fourth fewest unearned runs (22).

ON THE BASES: A's opponents have been caught stealing 24 times, which is second most in the majors to the Phillies (25)...however, Oakland has allowed 57 stolen bases, which is second most to the Mets (76)...on offense, the A's are 27-for-42 (64.3%) in stolen base attempts...have the second lowest stolen base percentage in the American League and the third fewest stolen bases and attempts.

FOUR SERIES IN FOUR CITIES: This three-game series with Minnesota is the third series in stretch where the A's play four series in four different cities...began the stretch by sweeping a two-game series at St. Louis and then won

three of four at Los Angeles (AL) last weekend...conclude it with a three-game series at Seattle this weekend...are 6-1 over the first seven games of this 12-game stretch.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-0 on this brief three-game homestand against Minnesota...went 6-4 on the last homestand and are 7-9 over the last 16 home games...went 5-1 on the last road trip to St. Louis (2-0) and Los Angeles-AL (3-1) and are now 17-5 over their last 23 road games (includes May 19 suspended game) after starting the year 5-14 on the road...leave following the game tomorrow for a three-game series at Seattle, which takes the A's into the All-Star Break...are 25-19 (.568) at home compared to 22-20 (.524) on the road.

HOME AND AWAY SPLITS: The A's are batting .240 (354-for-1473) and are averaging 4.55 runs per game at home (200 runs in 44 games), compared to .254 with an average of 5.63 runs per game on the road...have the fifth lowest home batting average in the American League...have a 3.81 ERA (174 er in 411.0 ip) at home compared to 4.47 on the road...have the fourth lowest home ERA in the AL.

LEFT AND RIGHT: The A's are 16-7 (.696) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 31-32 (.492) against right-handers...the mark against lefties is second best in the majors to Houston (19-6)...are batting .276 with an .839 OPS against left-handed pitchers compared to .237 with a .737 OPS against right-handers...have the third best batting average and OPS against lefties in the AL, but the fourth lowest batting average against righties...rank third in the AL in home runs off lefties (39).

A'S IN JUNE: The A's went 17-11 (.607) in June, which was the fourth best record in the American League...it marked the second consecutive season Oakland finished with a winning record in June (were 17-10 last year)...allowed the fewest home runs in the AL (27) and had the lowest opponents slugging percentage (.376) and OPS (.682)...also ranked third in ERA (3.99), tied for third in fewest walks (77) and fourth in batting average (.243) and on-base percentage (.305)...the offense ranked second in extra base hits (106), tied for third in doubles (58) and fourth in runs (149)...the extra base hits were second in Oakland history in June to the record of 116 in 1996...hit 45 home runs, which was second only to the 1996 club (55).

A's vs. TWINS: The A's won the first meeting of 2019 last night after winning the season series last year, 5-2...won two of three in Oakland and three of four in Minnesota...have won 10 of the last 12 games at the Coliseum and 19 of the last 23...are 28-13 against the Twins over the last seven seasons...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 306-302 against Minnesota...that includes 171-130 in Oakland and 135-172 in Minnesota...are 18-17 at Target Field...are 363-371 all-time against the Twins and have a 1010-1007 record against the Twins/Senators...the 1010 wins match the A's most against any franchise (Orioles/Browns).

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman was named to his first American League All-Star team on Sunday...leads the AL in extra base hits (45), ranks third in total bases (176), fifth in slugging (.545), tied for sixth in home runs (21), tied for eighth in runs (57) and doubles (21) and tied for ninth in triples (3) and go-ahead RBI (13)...**Liam Hendriks** has not allowed a run in his last 12 games (12.2 ip) and in 24 of his last 25 relief appearances (1 er in 29.2 ip, 0.30 ERA)...has the second lowest relief ERA in the AL (1.01)...**Matt Olson** has homered 17 times in 46 games dating back to May 12, which is the most in the majors over that span...**Marcus Semien** leads the majors with 87 games played and has now started each of the A's last 168 games dating back to June 28 of last year.

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1983** Carney Lansford hits the 7000th home run in the history of the A's franchise, but the A's lose to Texas 16-4 when the Rangers score 12 times in the top of the 15th inning...in **1988** Jose Canseco hits three home runs but it's Mark McGwire's 16th inning solo home run that lifts the A's to a 9-8 victory at Toronto...the following day, McGwire again homers in the 16th inning of the A's 4-2 win at Cleveland...in **1994** Bobby Witt ties Mike Torrez' club record with his third consecutive shutout, a six-hit, 10-0 win at Boston.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Mike Fiers (8-3, 4.01 ERA)

SIX-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 6-0 with a 2.39 ERA (17 er in 64.0 ip) and .176 (39-for-221) opponents batting average over his last 10 starts dating back to his May 7 no-hitter against Cincinnati...the winning streak matches his career high (July 21-Sept. 11, 2018) and is the second longest active streak in the American League...it is the longest winning streak by an A's starting pitcher over the last three years...the last A's pitcher with a winning streak longer than six games is Jarrod Parker, who had a nine-game winning streak from May 28-Sept. 4, 2013...the streak also includes a start in the suspended game May 19 at Detroit, in which he is the pitcher of record with the A's leading 5-3 in the bottom of the seventh...went 2-3 with a 6.81 ERA and .297 opponents batting average over his first eight starts.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Is scheduled to make his 19th start of the season today, which will tie him for the most in the majors among non-opener...his eight wins are tied for ninth in the American League and his most ever before the break (had six in 2016 and 2018)...is tied for fourth in wild pitches (7) and tied for fifth in hit batters (7)...dating back to May 7, he ranks second in the AL in opponents slugging (.294) and OPS (.545), tied for second in wins (6) and third in ERA (2.39) and opponents batting average (.176).

MONTH BY MONTH: Went 4-0 with a 2.30 ERA and .212 opponents batting average in five starts in June...it was the third time in his career he won four games in a month (4-2 in Aug. 2012 and 4-1 in Aug. 2014)...had the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the American League in June (.283), tied for the lead in wins, had the fourth lowest OPS (.561) and ranked fifth in ERA...went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April but is 6-1 with a 2.61 ERA (20 er in 69.0 ip) and .186 (44-for-237) opponents average in 11 starts since then...is now 5-9 with a 5.68 ERA in 25 career appearances in April and 49-35 with a 3.48 ERA (279 er in 722.0 ip) from May through August.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 5-2 with a 3.08 ERA (18 er in 52.2 ip) and .195 (36-for-185) opponents batting average in nine starts at home compared to 3-1 with a 5.03 ERA (27 er in 48.1 ip) and .255 (47-for-184) opponents average in eight starts on the road...is tied for fourth in the American League in home wins, ranks seventh in opponents batting average and eighth in OPS (.591)...is now 9-3 with a 3.18 ERA (40 er in 113.0 ip) and .209 (84-for-402) opponents batting average in 20 career appearances, 19 starts, in the Coliseum.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 6-1 with a 3.09 ERA (23 er in 67.0 ip) and .198 (48-for-243) opponents batting average in 11 starts at night compared to 2-2 with a 5.82 ERA (22 er in 34.0 ip) and .278 (35-for-126) opponents average in seven starts during the day...ranks third in the American League in opponents OPS at night (.565), fifth in opponents batting average, sixth in ERA and tied for sixth in wins.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed five home runs in 189 at bats against left-handed hitters, 10 in 180 at bats against right-handers...10 of the 15 home runs he has allowed have been solo shots...has walked just five batters to lead off an inning...opponents are hitting .254 (16-for-63) with runners in scoring position but that drops to .172 (5-for-29) with RISP and two outs.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on four days rest today...is 2-1 with a 5.46 ERA (18 er in 29.2 ip) in six starts on four days rest, 5-0 with a 2.44 ERA (16 er in 59.0 ip) in nine starts on five days rest and 1-2 with an 8.03 ERA (11 er in 12.1 ip) in three starts on six days rest or more.

THIS AND THAT: Has 999.0 innings pitched in his career and needs one more for 1,000...is 13-5 with a 4.09 ERA (68 er in 154.0 ip) in 28 games, including 27 starts, since he was acquired by Oakland Aug. 6, 2018...the wins are tied for fourth most in the American League over that span...has allowed three runs or fewer in each of his last 12 starts.

NO-HITTER: Tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati to become the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years...then put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston to give him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average over his next three starts...began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, matching the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...his loss to Toronto on April 20 was his first in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a six-game Coliseum winning streak...went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA in

five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42)...then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May...had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124)...tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati...walked two and struck out a season-high tying six...also tossed a season-high 131 pitches, which were the most by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...left his May 13 start at Seattle with a 2-1 lead but the bullpen blew the save...it was the first of three times the bullpen blew a save (May 31 and June 22)...was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...is the pitcher of record...hit an Oakland-record tying three batters June 22 against Tampa Bay (11th time, previous: Raul Alcantara, Sept. 5, 2016).

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 7-2 win at Los Angeles (AL) last Friday...blanked the Angels on three hits and a walk over the first five innings and had a 5-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the sixth inning on a RBI single by Pujols...was relieved by Wang with two outs in the seventh inning and the A's leading 7-1.

FIERS vs. MINNESOTA: Is 6-1 with a 2.77 ERA (61.2 ip, 50 h, 19 r, 19 er, 22 bb, 61 so, 7 hr) in 11 career appearances, including 10 starts...the wins match his most against any team (Los Angeles-AL)...has a five-game winning streak dating back to Aug. 29, 2015...is 5-1 with a 2.91 ERA (11 er in 34.0 ip) in six starts at Target Field and 1-0 with a 2.60 ERA (8 er in 27.2 ip) in five games in his home ballparks...was 1-0 with a 1.54 ERA (11.2 ip, 9 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 12 so, 1 hr) in two starts last year...the win came in a 6-2 A's victory at Minnesota on Aug. 25...had a 4-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning on a two-out home run by Sano...was relieved by Trivino with two outs in the sixth inning and a runner on first...then had a no decision in a 3-2 win in Oakland on Sept. 22...allowed his only run in six innings of work in the third inning when Astudillo doubled, went to third on a Petit single and scored on a Mauer sacrifice fly...left with a 2-1 lead but Familia allowed a run in the seventh for the blown save.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Tanner Anderson (0-3, 7.13 ERA): Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas June 10 and is scheduled to make his fifth start of the season and his career...allowed four runs on six hits in 11.0 innings over his first two starts (3.27 ERA, .150 opponents batting average) but has surrendered 10 runs on 15 hits in 6.2 innings over his last two (13.50 ERA, .429 opponents average)...the A's are 0-4 in his starting assignments...a .182 opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .357 after that...has a .184 opponents average against right-handed hitters, .378 with all four of his home runs and four of his five walks against lefties...has a .369 OPS against righties, 1.169 against lefties...was the losing pitcher in his last start, an 8-3 A's loss at Los Angeles (AL) last Thursday (2.2 ip, 8 h, 7 r, 7 er, 1 bb, 3 so)...has never faced the Twins in his career...was 4-4 with a 6.26 ERA and .297 opponents batting average in 11 games, including 10 starts, with Las Vegas.

2013—Was the A's Opening Day starting pitcher but finished the season in the bullpen after spending four months on the disabled list with a stress fracture in his right foot...was 1-4 with three saves, a 6.04 ERA and .287 opponents batting average in 16 games, including five starts...struck out 46 in 44.2 innings, marking the first time in his career he finished with more strikeouts than innings pitched...walked 21 and his average of 4.23 walks per nine innings was the highest of his career...pitched 3.0 innings in each of his three saves to become the second A's pitcher since 1992 with three three-inning saves in one season (Doug Jones, 1999)...allowed a .214 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...made his first career Opening Day start April 1 against Seattle but was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss...struck out the side in the first inning to become the first A's pitcher since at least 1947 to strike out the side in the first inning on Opening Day...struck out a career-high tying 10 batters in 6.0 innings in his second start, a 9-3 win at Houston April 7...it was his only win of the season...tossed 1.0 inning April 19 at Tampa Bay, allowing four runs on four hits and two walks...left the game early with a sprained right ankle...was scheduled to skip his start April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) but ended up pitching 5.1 innings of relief that night in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win...entered the game in the 13th inning for the first relief appearance of his career after 73 starts...allowed just one run...was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 1 with a sprained right ankle...was diagnosed with a navicular stress fracture

strain...was reinstated from the DL May 29...had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...was reinstated July 30 and went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...finished the season with a career-high tying four-game winning streak...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA in six starts in September.

2008—Combined for an 11-5 record and a 3.69 ERA in 20 games, 19 starts, with Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland in his first season in the A's organization...also pitched for the United States team in the All-Star Futures Game at Yankee Stadium July 13 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb) and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 13 h, 8 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 10 so, 2 hr) in two starts during the Olympics...was rated as the A's number one prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...was named California League Pitcher of the Week, June 9-15...won both of his starts and allowed just one run in 14.0 innings, while striking out 16...joined Team USA for the Olympics in August...had a no decision Aug. 16 in a 5-4 win over Canada (5.2 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 so)...then started and won in the Bronze Medal game Aug. 23 against Japan, an 8-4 win (7.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 6 so).

2007—Was Arizona's second round pick in 2006 but did not sign until Sept. 1, 2006...made his professional debut in 2007 and was a combined 11-7 with a 3.07 ERA in 23 games, all starts, with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Visalia...was 8-4 with a 2.21 ERA in 14 starts at South Bend and was a *Baseball America* Low Class A All-Star...made one postseason start for Visalia and took the loss (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so, 2.25 ERA)...was traded to the A's on December 14 and was named Oakland's third best prospect by *Baseball America*.

State University from 2003-12 and is now pitching coach at the University of Houston...was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after-school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Is scheduled to make his 19th start of the season today, which will tie him for the most in the majors among non-opener...his eight wins are tied for ninth in the American League and his most ever before the break (had six in 2016 and 2018)...is tied for fourth in wild pitches (7) and tied for fifth in hit batters (7)...dating back to May 7, he ranks second in the AL in opponents slugging (.294) and OPS (.545), tied for second in wins (6) and third in ERA (2.39) and opponents batting average (.176).

MONTH BY MONTH: Went 4-0 with a 2.30 ERA and .212 opponents batting average in five starts in June...it was the third time in his career he won four games in a month (4-2 in Aug. 2012 and 4-1 in Aug. 2014)...had the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the American League in June (.283), tied for the lead in wins, had the fourth lowest OPS (.561) and ranked fifth in ERA...went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April but is 6-1 with a 2.61 ERA (20 er in 69.0 ip) and .186 (44-for-237) opponents average in 11 starts since then...is now 5-9 with a 5.68 ERA in 25 career appearances in April and 49-35 with a 3.48 ERA (279 er in 722.0 ip) from May through August.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 6-1 with a 3.09 ERA (23 er in 67.0 ip) and .198 (48-for-243) opponents batting average in 11 starts at night compared to 2-2 with a 5.82 ERA (22 er in 34.0 ip) and .278 (35-for-126) opponents average in seven starts during the day...ranks third in the American League in opponents OPS at night (.565), fifth in opponents batting average, sixth in ERA and tied for sixth in wins.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed five home runs in 189 at bats against left-handed hitters, 10 in 180 at bats against right-handers...10 of the 15 home runs he has allowed have been solo shots...has walked just five batters to lead off an inning...opponents are hitting .254 (16-for-63) with runners in scoring position but that drops to .172 (5-for-29) with RISP and two outs.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on four days rest today...is 2-1 with a 5.46 ERA (18 er in 29.2 ip) in six starts on four days rest, 5-0 with a 2.44 ERA (16 er in 59.0 ip) in nine starts on five days rest and 1-2 with an 8.03 ERA (11 er in 12.1 ip) in three starts on six days rest or more.

THIS AND THAT: Has 999.0 innings pitched in his career and needs one more for 1,000...is 13-5 with a 4.09 ERA (68 er in 154.0 ip) in 28 games, including 27 starts, since he was acquired by Oakland Aug. 6, 2018...the wins are tied for fourth most in the American League over that span...has allowed three runs or fewer in each of his last 12 starts.

NO-HITTER: Tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati to become the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years...then put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston to give him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average over his next three starts...began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, **matching** the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...his loss to Toronto on April 20 was his first in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a six-game Coliseum winning streak...went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA in

LAST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 7-2 win at Los Angeles (AL) last Friday...blanked the Angels on three hits and a walk over the first five innings and had a 5-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the sixth inning on a RBI single by Pujols...was relieved by Wang with two outs in the seventh inning and the A's leading 7-1.

2018 RECAP: Was in the A's Opening Day starting rotation but was optioned to Triple-A Nashville following a mid-season stint on the disabled list before returning to Oakland in late August, working primarily as a long man in "opener" games...went 7-6 with a 4.05 ERA and .234 opponents batting average in 22 games, including 17 starts, in his third season in the majors and tossed 115.2 innings...was 5-11 with a 5.24 ERA, .265 opponents batting average and 115.0 innings in 21 starts over his first two seasons...struck out just 72 batters in 115.2 innings and his average of 5.60 strikeouts per nine innings was second lowest in the American League (Colon, TEX 4.98)...walked just 26 (2.02 per nine innings)...his opponents batting average broke down to .221 against left-handed hitters compared to .244 against right-handers...issued 20 of his 26 walks to righties...held the opposition to a .185 batting average leading off an inning and issued just three walks for a .211 on-base percentage...the on-base percentage was the lowest in the majors among pitchers with 100 or more innings and the batting average was fourth lowest in the AL...went 4-1 with a 2.98 ERA in nine games, including eight starts, with Nashville...surrendered just two home runs in 45.1 innings, an average of 0.40 per nine innings...walked one batter or fewer in each of his nine appearances and issued seven free passes total, an average of 1.39 per nine innings...struck out 34 for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 4.86...allowed a .231 opponents batting average.

RHP Mike Fiers (8-3, 4.01 ERA):	Went 2-3 with a 6.81 ERA and .297 opponents batting average over his first eight starts...then tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 against Cincinnati and is 6-0 with a 2.39 ERA and .176 opponents batting average over his last 10 starts...is tied for second in the American League in wins dating back to May 7, ranks third in opponents batting average and tied for third in ERA...the six-game winning streak matches his career high and is the second longest active winning streak in the AL...it is the longest winning streak by an A's starting pitcher over the last three years...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 7-2 A's win at Los Angeles-AL last Friday (6.2 ip, 6 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so)...is 6-1 with a 2.77 ERA (61.2 ip, 50 h, 19 r, 19 er, 22 bb, 61 so, 7 hr) in 11 career appearances, including 10 starts, against Minnesota...went 1-0 with a 1.54 ERA (11.2 ip, 9 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 12 so) in two starts last year.

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan...took the third spot in the rotation once the regular season resumed.

FRANKLIN BARRETO

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pinch ran in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo...that was his only appearance before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 28 prior to the resumption of the regular season.

CHRIS BASSITT

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27 retroactive to March 25 with a right lower leg contusion.
- Made one rehab start with Single-A Stockton on April 4 and two with Triple-A Las Vegas on April 9 and 14...was 0-0 with a 3.27 ERA in three starts overall when he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas April 16.
- Was recalled by Oakland the next day when Marco Estrada went on the IL.

SKYE BOLT

- Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas May 3 and made his Major League debut that night at Pittsburgh...pinch hit in the seventh inning and popped out to first in his first career at-bat...remained in the game in center field and finished the night 0-for-2 with a strikeout.
- Collected his first ML hit May 4, a pinch-hit double off Keone Kela in the seventh inning.
- Was 1-for-4 in three games when he was optioned back to Las Vegas May 7.

AARON BROOKS

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan...took the fifth spot in the rotation once the regular season resumed.

RYAN BUCHTER

- Did not allow a run in six of his first seven appearances (2.70 ERA).
- That included the 200th appearance of his career April 6 at Houston when he tossed a scoreless eighth inning.
- Then allowed at least one run in four of his next six games and had a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents batting average in 13 appearances overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Made one appearance with the Aviators on April 26 against El Paso (1.0 ip) before returning to Oakland April 29.

MARK CANHA

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list April 29 with a sprained right wrist...went 1-for-8 (.125) with a double, RBI, sacrifice fly and three strikeouts on a two-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas on May 10 and 11 and was reinstated May 13.
- Hit his third career pinch-homer May 21 at Cleveland (had two in 2018).
- Homered in three consecutive games for the first time in his career from May 21-24.
- Hit seven home runs in May, which tied for 10th in the American League and are his **most** ever in a month.
- Committed his first error of the season June 16 against Seattle, which snapped a 152-game errorless streak as an outfielder...the streak was **fifth** longest in Oakland history by an outfielder...it was his first error since June 1, 2017.

MATT CHAPMAN

- Made his second consecutive Opening Day start at third base on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and had a double, home run and three RBI.

- Homered in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts May 7 against Cincinnati for the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 10 against Cleveland, a walk-off home run off Brad Hand to lead off the 12th...it was the third time he was at the plate for a walk-off (single and error on July 22, 2018; wild pitch on Sept. 22, 2018).
- Hit safely in each of his five games against the Indians (7-for-22, .318) and has now hit safely in all 11 of his career games against Cleveland...is 18-for-43 (.419) with 12 runs, six doubles, a triple, four home runs and eight RBI (.884 slugging percentage, 1.363 OPS).
- Homered in a [career-high](#) tying three consecutive games from May 25-27 (also July 22-24, 2017).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run June 20 against Tampa Bay, a three-run shot off Castillo.

JHAREL COTTON

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL March 27.
- Began a rehab assignment at Single-A Stockton May 17 and went 0-1 with a 6.43 ERA in three games, including two starts, before his rehab was halted May 29 due to a hamstring injury.
- Underwent right hamstring debridement surgery June 6, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper at the North Central Surgical Center in Dallas, Tex.

KHRIS DAVIS

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.
- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.
- Homered twice on May 13 at Seattle to snap a 20-game homerless streak, which was his longest as an Athletic...[it was his third multi-homer game of the season, his 19th as an Athletic and the 25th of his career.](#)
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list May 24 retroactive to May 22 with a left hip/oblique contusion and did not have a rehab assignment...suffered the injury on May 5 in Pittsburgh but played in seven of the A's 15 games following that before going on the IL, batting .346 with two home runs and three RBI...was reinstated from the IL June 1.

RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.
- Did not allow a run in six appearances with the Aviators and had two saves and 14 strikeouts in 9.2 innings when he was recalled by Oakland April 22.

- Allowed at least one run in four of his next five appearances (7.11 ERA, .433 opponents batting average) and was optioned back to Las Vegas May 2.

MARCO ESTRADA

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and was 0-2 with a 6.85 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day injured list April 17 with a lumbar strain.

MIKE FIERS

- Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).
- Put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts.
- That gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then allowed a [season-high](#) six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average
- Began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, [matching](#) the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...walked a [season-high](#) four.
- Struck out a [season-high](#) six batters April 12 at Texas.
- Yielded a [season-high](#) nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss to Toronto on April 20...it was his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a six-game Coliseum winning streak
- Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42).
- Then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May...had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124).
- Tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati...walked two and struck out a [season-high](#) tying six...also tossed a [season-high](#) 131 pitches, which were [the most](#) by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...retired the first 11 before Winker reached base on an error with two outs in the fourth...set down the next seven before walking Suarez to start the seventh...Suarez was erased on a double play, Puig walked and Fiers then retired the final seven batters to complete the no-hitter.
- Became the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea last year on April 21...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has [two](#) career complete games, both no-hitters...according to Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).
- Had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May 13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...left with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth for the blown save...it was the first of [three](#) times the bullpen blew a save (May 31 and June 22).

- Was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...[is the pitcher of record](#).

DANIEL GOSSETT

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.
- Had his third career four-hit game June 5 at Los Angeles (AL), his first since Sept. 18, 2016 at New York (NL).
- Had a RBI single off Chaz Roe in the ninth inning on June 10 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit.

CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.

LIAM HENDRIKS

- Had a [career-high 14.2](#)-inning scoreless streak from April 30 to May 28.

NICK HUNDLEY

- Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston ([also](#) June 18 vs. Baltimore).
- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.
- Reached base safely in a [career-high 28](#) consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second longest reaching base streak by a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979).
- Had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland, his second career game-ending RBI...the other was Aug. 3, 2018 vs. Detroit, also a single.
- Had a [career-high and A's season-high 16](#)-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...it matched the longest hitting streak by an Athletic over the last eight years...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak.
- Had an Oakland [record-tying](#) streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973).
- Had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI (Aug. 20, 2018 vs. Texas) and his first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB).
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts June 20 against Tampa Bay, his first career four-strikeout game.
- Was hit by a pitch an Oakland record-tying two times June 22 against Tampa Bay.

SEAN MANAEA

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

NICK MARTINI

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 8 and hit .302 with 10 RBI and seven walks (.392 on-base percentage) in 12 games before he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas May 28.

KENDRYS MORALES

- Was acquired from the Toronto Blue Jays for minor league infielder Jesus Lopez and international slot money March 27.
- Made his second career appearance as a pitcher April 20 against Toronto in the ninth inning (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the other came on May 20, 2018 against Oakland at Toronto (1.0 ip, 1 bb)...it marked the 13th time in Oakland history a position player pitched, the sixth time in the last five years...is just the third to allow a run and is the first two walk two batters...the last was Jake Smolinski last year on June 13 against Houston.
- Matt Olson returned from the IL May 7 and Morales was batting .204 with a home run and seven RBI in 34 games when he was designated for assignment May 13...was traded to the New York Yankees the next day with cash for a player to be named later or cash considerations.

MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators, including three at first base and two at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL May 7.
- Committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...it was the fourth longest errorless in Oakland history by a first baseman.

JOSH PHEGLEY

- Had a [career-high](#) nine-game hitting streak from April 2-14...went 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...scored a run in each of the last seven games during the streak and drove in a run in each of the last six.
- Went 4-for-5 with two doubles, a home run, and a career-high eight RBI May 3 at Pittsburgh...it was his first career four-hit game...became just the 13th catcher in Major League history to drive in eight or more runs in game, the first Athletic...was the fifth Oakland Athletic with eight or more RBI in a game, the first since Eric Chavez on Aug. 30, 2001.
- Had his second career four-hit game May 16 at Detroit.
- Tied for ninth in the AL with 20 RBI in May...those are his [most](#) RBI in a month, topping his 13 from April this year.

CHAD PINDER

- Snapped a 0-for-12 streak as a pinch hitter June 18 against Baltimore with his first career pinch home run...it was his first pinch hit since Sept. 9, 2018.

STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...[matched his career high in hits \(fourth time\) and RBI \(fifth time\)](#)...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.
- Reached base safely in a [career-high](#) 25 consecutive games from April 28 to May 29...hit .280 with a .357 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 8 against Cincinnati, a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 13th.
- Had his second career four-strikeout game May 13 at Seattle (also Aug. 30, 2016 at Milwaukee).
- Collected his 500th career hit May 16 at Detroit.

JURICKSON PROFAR

- Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).
- Committed his eighth error of the season in his 28th game at second base May 3 at Pittsburgh...then had a 25-game errorless streak from May 4 to June 1.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 16 at Detroit.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 21 at Cleveland, which ties an Athletics record.
- Finished May with six home runs, which [matched](#) his most ever in a month (September, 2018)

FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

MARCUS SEMIEN

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.
- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping what was then a career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018...did not make his second error until June 2 for a 41-game errorless streak from April 12-June 1...that [tied for fourth](#) longest in Athletics history by a shortstop.
- Led off the game with a home run May 28 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the third lead-off home run of his career.
- Was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 1 against Houston.
- Had a career-high 17-game hitting streak from June 4 to 20...hit .375 (27-for-72) with 16 runs, five doubles, a triple, three home runs and 13 RBI during the streak, which is the [longest in the AL this year](#) and the longest single-season hitting streak by an Athletic since a 22-game streak by Eric Byrnes from May 8-June 1, 2003 (Mark Ellis had a 17-game hitting streak from Sept. 21, 2010-April 5, 2011)
- Went 4-for-5 with three runs, two home runs and four RBI June 7 at Texas...it was his fourth career multi-homer game and his sixth four-hit game.

- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of June 3-9 after going 13-for-31 (.419) with seven runs, two doubles, two home runs, nine RBI and three walks...it was the first weekly award of his career.
- Hit his 10th home run of the season June 15 and is the first Athletic to reach double figures in home runs in five consecutive seasons since Mark Ellis from 2005-09...is the 18th player in Oakland history with five or more 10-homer seasons.

JOAKIM SORIA

- Was on his 11th career Opening Day roster and made his Oakland debut in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...the A's became his seventh team in 12 seasons in the majors.
- Was charged with the loss March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) when he surrendered a [career-high tying](#) four runs without retiring a batter (11th time, first since Sept. 1, 2018 at Washington).
- Made his first career start June 5 at Los Angeles (AL) as the A's "opener" (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 so)...it came in his 667th career appearance...his career-opening streak of 666 appearances before making his first start was the longest in Major League history, topping the 638 games by Troy Percival before his first start on Sept. 30, 2007.

BEAU TAYLOR

- Was batting .297 with 33 walks and a .450 on-base percentage in 38 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland June 8.
- Made his first career start June 10 at Tampa Bay and went 0-for-2.
- Hit his first career home run June 18 against Baltimore, a solo shot off Gabriel Ynoa in the third inning.

BLAKE TREINEN
