OAKLAND ATHLETICS (51-41) VS. CHICAGO WHITE SOX (42-45)

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won eight of the last 10 games to improve to a season-high 10 games over .500 at 51-41 (.554)...are in second place in the American League West for the eighth consecutive day and trail first place Houston by six games...that is the closest the A's have been to first place since May 8 when they were 5½ back...are ½ game behind Cleveland for the second Wild Card and two games behind Tampa Bay for the first Wild Card...have won each of the previous four series and are unbeaten over the previous six ...were swept in a three-game series by Houston May 31-June 2 but have gone 22-11 (.667) since then, which is the second best record in the American League (Cleveland, 21-9) and fourth best in the majors...last year, the A's were swept in a three-game series by Houston June 12-14 and went 63-30 (.677) the rest of the way...have a run differential of +71, which is fifth best in the AL and sixth best in the majors...have spent 16 days in second in the West, one day tied for second, 44 days in third, six days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, seven days tied for fourth and 17 days in fifth.

AGAINST THE CENTRAL: The A's are 11-2 (.846) against American League Central teams...are batting .276 (137-for-497) with 84 runs (6.00 per game) and 28 home runs in 14 games (includes May 19 suspended game)...the pitching staff has a 2.72 ERA (39 er in 129.0 ip) and .228 (108-for-473) opponents batting average...are now 63-21 (.750) against the Central dating back to Aug. 23, 2016.

THE LONG BALL: The A's have homered in a season-high tying 13 consecutive games (also May 20-June 4) and have 27 home runs total during the streak...now have 97 home runs over the last 51 games dating back to May 13, which is tied with Minnesota for the most in the majors over that span... hit 51 home runs over the first 42 contests and have 148 for the season, which ranks fourth in the American League.

OFFENSE: The A's had a double, a triple and three home runs last night and now have a streak of 25 consecutive games with two or more extra base hits...that is tied for the second longest such streak in Oakland history...the longest is a 30-game streak from Aug. 16-Sept. 23, 2001...overall, the A's rank third in the American League in hit by pitches (45) and fewest strikeouts (717) and fourth in most grounded into double plays (79)...A's pinch hitters rank second in the AL in plate appearances (58) and doubles (4), tied for second in RBI (14) and extra base hits (7), third in home runs (3) and tied for third in walks (7).

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 3.19 ERA (80 er in 226.0 ip) over the last 25 games dating back to June 11 and have a 4.03 ERA for the season, which is fifth lowest in the American League...also rank second in fewest home runs (104) and opponents slugging percentage (.395), third in OPS (.706) and fourth in opponents batting average (.242).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have walked just three batters in 40.0 innings over the last seven games...are 12-4 with a 3.71 ERA (51 er in 123.2 ip) over the last 22 games...overall, rank second in the American League in wins (38), third in opponents slugging percentage (.400) and fourth in ERA (4.11), winning percentage (.613), OPS (.707) and innings pitched (501.2).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have a three-game errorless streak and have just 50 errors for the season...rank fourth in the American League in fielding percentage (.985) but are tied for the third fewest double plays (58)...have the fourth fewest unearned runs (24).

ON THE BASES: As opponents have been caught stealing 28 times, which is the most in the majors...however, Oakland has allowed 60 stolen bases, which is second most to the Mets (83)...on offense, the As are 29-for-44 (65.9%) in stolen base attempts...have the second lowest stolen base percentage in the American League and the third fewest stolen bases and attempts.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-0 on this five-game homestand against Chicago (1-0) and Seattle (two games)...went 2-1 on the last homestand against Minnesota and have won nine of the last 11 home games...went 2-1 on the last road trip to Seattle and are now 19-6 over their last 26 road games (includes May 19 suspended game) after starting the year 5-14 on the road... are 27-20 (.574) at home compared to 24-21 (.533) on the road...are averaging 4.57 runs per game at home (215 runs in 47 games) compared to 5.59 on the road.

LEFT AND RIGHT: The A's are 17-8 (.680) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 34-33 (.507) against right-hand-

ers...the mark against lefties is second best in the majors to Houston (21-6)... are batting .265 with an .807 OPS against left-handed pitchers compared to .241 with a .749 OPS against right-handers...have the third best batting average and OPS against lefties in the American League and the fourth lowest batting average against righties...rank second in the AL in home runs off lefties (43).

PLAYERS USED: The A's have used just 37 players, which is tied with Houston for the fewest in the American League and tied for third fewest in the majors...have used just 14 relievers, which is the fewest in the AL and third fewest in the majors.

THE INJURED LIST: The A's have used the injured list 13 times...currently have six players on the IL (Cotton, Estrada, Gossett, Hundley, Manaea, Piscotty), including four on the 60-day DL (Cotton, Estrada, Gossett, Manaea)...Cotton and Manaea are on rehab assignments...have had at least five players on the DL every day dating back to April 26, 2018.

AT THE BREAK: The A's were 50-41 at the All-Star Break, which was the sixth best record in the American League and eighth best in the majors...it marked the second consecutive season Oakland had a winning record at the break... were 7½ games behind Houston in the West, which is the closest the A's have been to first at the break since 2014 when they were in first...set an Athletics franchise record for home run at the All-Star Break with 145 (previous: 137 in 1996)...that is 12th best total in Major League history before the break, but was sixth best in the majors this year...it was more than the season total from 17 of the A's first 51 years in Oakland...had 318 extra base hits, which was second in Athletics history to the record of 321 set last year...scored 467 runs, which was third best and the most since 2000 (522)...had the sixth best slugging percentage (.441)...the pitching staff had 721 strikeouts, which was second to the record of 728 in 2014.

EXTRA INNINGS AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 2-7 in extra inning games...the losses are the most in the majors and one more than the A's team total from last year...the nine extra inning games are tied for the most in the American league...have allowed 19 runs in extra innings, which is the most in the majors and the most by an A's team since 2011 (22)...are tied with Miami and New York (NL) for the most walk-off losses in the majors (6), tied for second in last at bat losses (13) and tied for third in losses when leading after seven innings (6)...are 0-29 when trailing after seven innings and are one of three teams without a win (Baltimore, Tampa Bay).

A's vs. WHITE SOX: The A's won the first meeting of 2019 last night after winning the season series last year, 5-2...swept a three-game series in Oakland in 2018 and now have a six-game winning streak in the Coliseum...split a four-game series in Chicago last year...have won back-to-back season series from the White Sox and are 11-3 (.786) over the last three years...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 313-289 against the White Sox...that breaks down to 165-138 in Oakland and 148-151 in Chicago...including 66-63 at Guaranteed Rate Field...all-time, the A's are 990-1044 against Chicago.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman ranks third in the American League in extra base hits (46), fifth in total bases (183), tied for sixth in home runs (21), ninth in slugging (.534), 10th in doubles (22) and tied for 10th in runs (60)...Liam Hendriks has a career-high and A's season-high 17.0 inning scoreless streak...has the lowest relief ERA in the majors (0.92)...Matt Olson has a career-high eightgame hitting streak (9-for-35, .257)...has homered 19 times in 52 games dating back to May 12, which is second most in the majors over that span (Trout, LAA 21)...Marcus Semien has started each of the A's last 174 games dating back to June 28 of last year...that is the fourth longest consecutive games started streak in Oakland history and the eighth longest consecutive games played streak.

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In 1930 Philadelphia defeats St. Louis 12-1 to take over first place for good in the American League en route to their second consecutive pennant and world championship...in 1935 Doc Cramer goes 6 for 6, his second career six-hit game...in 1974 Reggie Jackson hits his 200th career home run, but the A's lose 12-6 at New York...in 2003 Mark Ellis scores on a Ramon Hernandez fielders choice in the bottom of the ninth inning to break a scoreless tie as the A's defeat Baltimore, 1-0.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Chris Bassitt (5-4, 4.29 ERA)

LAST NINE STARTS: Is 3-3 with a 6.00 ERA (30 er in 45.0 ip) and .249 (43-for-173) opponents average over his last nine starts after going 2-1 with a 1.93 ERA and .179 opponents batting average over his first five starts...is averaging 7.40 (37 so in 45.0 ip) strikeouts per nine innings over his last nine starts after averaging 10.47 over his first five.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 4-1 with a 3.20 ERA (16 er in 45.0 ip) in seven starts during the day compared to 1-3 with a 5.79 ERA (21 er in 32.2 ip) in seven starts at night...was 0-8 in 15 career day games entering the season

INNING BY INNING: Has a 3.21 ERA (15 er in 42.0 ip) and .184 (28-for-152) opponents batting average over the first three innings of a game compared to a 5.55 ERA (22 er in 35.2 ip) and .261 (36-for-138) opponents average from the fourth inning on.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has a .212 (32-for-151) opponents batting average against left-handed hitters compared to .230 (32-for-139) against righties.. however, has surrendered nine of his 11 home runs and issued 24 of his 32 walks to lefties for a .779 OPS (.628 vs. righties)...is tied for the fourth most walks against lefties in the American League...eight of his 11 home runs have come on the road and seven have come with the bases empty...opponents are batting .174 (19-for-109) the first time through the lineup, .272 (31-for-114) the second time and .209 (14-for-67) after that...has a .278 (32-for-115) opponents average with no outs, .1823 (32-for-175) with one or two outs.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received two runs of support or fewer in eight of his 14 starts and is 1-4 in those games...has 50 runs of support for the season (77.2 ip, 5.79 RSA) but 17 of those runs came in one game on May 16 at Detroit.. last year, he received two runs of support or fewer in five of his seven starts and his RSA as a starter was 3.19...has received two runs of support or fewer in 32 of his 44 career starts and his career RSA as a starter is 3.65 (100 rs in 246.1 ip)...is 6-0 in 12 career starts with run support of three runs or more.

CAREER BESTS: Has five wins this year, which is one more than his career total in 40 games (30 starts) entering this season...also has career highs in strikeouts (75), games started (14), runs (38), earned runs (37), home runs (11) and walks (32)...his 77.2 innings pitched are 8.1 short of his best of 86.0 in 2015... his 14 games are four short of his best of 18 from 2015.

PRE AND POST "TOMMY JOHN": Is 7-7 with a 3.81 ERA (53 er in 125.1 ip) and .221 (104-for-471) opponents batting average in 25 games (21 starts) since undergoing "Tommy John" surgery May 6, 2016...is averaging 8.33 strikeouts per nine innings (116 so in 125.1 ip)...was 2-11 with a 4.13 ERA, .263 opponents batting average and 6.77 strikeouts per nine innings in 29 games (23 starts) before the surgery.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Made the trip to Japan but was one of three inactive players for the two-game series against the Mariners...was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27 retroactive to March 25 with a right lower leg contusion...went 0-0 with a 3.27 ERA in three rehab starts with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Las Vegas before he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas April 16...was recalled by Oakland the next day when Marco Estrada went on the injured list...made his first start April 22 against Texas and tossed 5.0 scoreless innings for the win...struck out a season-high nine in his second start April 28 at Toronto (also May 9 against Cincinnati)...however, had a no decision in the A's 5-4 loss in 11 innings...left his third start on May 4 at Pittsburgh after five innings with a 4-3 lead but Wendelken allowed three runs in the seventh inning for the blown save and loss...allowed a season-high seven hits (also July 6 at Seattle) and took the loss on May 9 against Cincinnati to snap the first winning streak of his career, a threegame streak dating back to last year...went 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA and .194 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned 11 games (seven starts) dating back to June 27, 2018...the loss was his first since June 22, 2018 at Chicago (AL)...tossed a career-high tying 8.0 innings, did not allow a run, walked two and yielded four hits in a 17-3 win at Detroit on May 16... walked a career-high six batters in 3.2 innings in a no decision at Cleveland May 21...is the first Major League pitcher since at least 1908 with a pitching line of 3.2 innings, three hits, three runs, three earned runs, six walks and six strikeouts...allowed three runs on four hits and four walks in a season-low 3.1 innings at St. Louis on June 25 but had a no decision in the A's 7-3 win.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 6-3 loss at Seattle last Saturday...allowed a season-high six runs on a season-high tying seven hits in 4.1 innings...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed four runs in the fourth on a pair of two-run home runs by Vogelbach and Seager...was relieved by Wang with runners on first and second and one out in the fifth and Wang allowed both runners to score.

1-0 lead when he allowed three runs in the bottom of the second on a Narvaez two-run single and a Tilson RBI single...Oakland scored once in the sixth to narrow the gap to 3-2 but he was charged with two runs in the bottom of the sixth...put runners on first and second with one out and was relieved by Coulombe who allowed both runners to score...his other start was a no decision in the A's 5-4 loss in Oakland on April 5, 2016...blanked the White Sox on three hits and two walks over the first four innings and had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Frazier with two outs in the fifth inning...the A's came back with one run in the bottom of the fifth but he allowed a RBI single to Jackson in the sixth and left after 5.1 innings trailing 4-2...made his Major League debut with Chicago in 2014 and is 0-2 with a 5.17 ERA (13 er in 22.2 ip) in three career starts at Guaranteed Rate Field.

REHAB ASSIGNMENT: Went 0-0 with a 3.27 ERA and .242 opponents batting average on a three start rehab assignment...struck out 16 batters in 11.0 innings and walked two...his first assignment came with Stockton on April 4 against Rancho Cucamonga...retired all nine batters he faced, the first five by strikeout...moved to Las Vegas for a start on April 9 in a 10-2 win against Sacramento...allowed just one run in three innings of work, a bases loaded walk to Michael Reed in the first inning...then had a no decision in a 6-5 loss to Fresno on April 14...allowed five runs on five hits in five innings of work.

2018 RECAP: Had seven stints with Oakland in his return to the majors following "Tommy John" surgery in 2016...went 2-3 with a 3.02 ERA and .221 opponents batting average in 11 games, including seven starts...the ERA and opponents batting average were the lowest of his four seasons as was his .309 on-base percentage, .315 slugging percentage and .624 OPS...the two wins matched his career total entering the season as he was 2-11 over his first three seasons...struck out 41 batters in 47.2 innings for a career-best average of 7.74 strikeouts per nine innings...also went 5-5 with a 4.30 ERA in 18 games, including 14 starts, with Triple-A Nashville...surrendered six home runs in 81.2 innings, an average of 0.66 per nine innings...struck out 83, an average of 9.15 per nine innings, and walked 25 for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 3.32...allowed a .271 opponents batting average, including .215 (29for-135) against left-handed hitters compared to .313 (57-for-182) against right-handers...had a .573 OPS against lefties, .817 against righties.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Brett Anderson (9-5, 3.86 ERA): Picked up his ninth win of the season in his last start, which is tied for ninth in the American League...the wins are two more than his combined total over the previous three seasons...had never won more than five games before the break in his career...his nine wins, 18 starts and 102.2 innings pitched which are his most since 2015 with the Dodgers (10 wins, 31 starts, 180.1 innings pitched)...the A's are 12-6 (.667) in his starting assignments...is 3-1 with a 3.56 ERA over his last five starts.. ranks eighth in the AL in fewest home runs per nine innings (0.88)...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 5-2 A's win at Seattle on July 5 (6.1 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 2 er, 4 so)...is 1-1 with a 4.55 ERA (29.2 ip, 40 h, 16 r, 15 er, 5 bb, 14 so, 1 hr) and a .333 (40-for-120) opponents batting average in five career starts against Chicago...has not faced the White Sox since April 13, 2011 at Chicago, a no decision in the A's 7-4, 10-inning win (5.2 ip, 9 h, 3 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 3 so).

of his right foot May 17 and was transferred to the 60-day DL June 14...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 28 and pitched exclusively in relief following his return, logging a 5.74 ERA and .306 opponents batting average in 10 appearances...recorded his first save in his first outing following his return Aug. 28 at Detroit...pitched the final three innings of the A's 14-4 win, allowing three runs on five hits in 3.0 innings.

2012—Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings...yielded a .148 average with runners in scoring position...was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts... left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so)...combined for a 1-1 record and a 4.62 ERA during a six-start rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...began his rehab assignment July 21 with Stockton, one year and seven days after having reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow...was transferred to Sacramento July 26.

2010—Lowered his ERA by more than a run from his rookie campaign of 2009 but two stints on the disabled list with elbow problems limited him to just 19 starts...was 7-6 with a 2.80 ERA after going 11-11 with a 4.06 ERA in his first season...opponents batted .257, including .225 with runners in scoring position...tied for eighth in the AL with four pickoffs...did not allow a run in his first two starts of the season April 8 against Seattle and April 13 at Seattle to become the first starting pitcher in Oakland history (among pitchers who began the season with the A's) to start the season with two consecutive scoreless outings...the last Athletics pitcher to do it was Alex Kellner of the 1953 Philadelphia A's, who started the season with back-to-back complete game shutouts...agreed to terms April 16 on a four-year contract through the 2013 season with club options for 2014 and 2015...had his season-opening scoreless streak snapped at 14.0 innings in his third start, an 8-3 loss to Baltimore...that was the third longest season-opening streak by a starter in Oakland history and the longest since Matt Keough set the record with a 16.0 inning streak in 1980...was 1-1 with a 2.35 ERA in four starts before going on the 15-day disabled list April 27 retroactive to April 25 with left elbow inflammation and a proximal medial forearm

strain...was reinstated from the DL May 29...had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...was reinstated July 30 and went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...finished the season with a career-high tying fourgame winning streak...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA in six starts in September.

2008—Combined for an 11-5 record and a 3.69 ERA in 20 games, 19 starts, with Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland in his first season in the A's organization...also pitched for the United States team in the All-Star Futures Game at Yankee Stadium July 13 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb) and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 13 h, 8 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 10 so, 2 hr) in two starts during the Olympics...was rated as the A's number one prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...was named California League Pitcher of the Week, June 9-15...won both of his starts and allowed just one run in 14.0 innings, while striking out 16... joined Team USA for the Olympics in August...had a no decision Aug. 16 in a 5-4 win over Canada (5.2 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 so)...then started and won in the Bronze Medal game Aug. 23 against Japan, an 8-4 win (7.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 6 so).

2007—Was Arizona's second round pick in 2006 but did not sign until Sept. 1, 2006...made his professional debut in 2007 and was a combined 11-7 with a 3.07 ERA in 23 games, all starts, with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Visalia...was 8-4 with a 2.21 ERA in 14 starts at South Bend and was a *Baseball America* Low Class A All-Star...made one postseason start for Visalia and took the loss (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so, 2.25 ERA)...was traded to the A's on December 14 and was named Oakland's third best prospect by *Baseball America*.

Anderson was originally signed by Diamondbacks scout Joe Robinson...graduated from Stillwater (OK) High School...was a *Baseball America* 1st Team High School All-America selection in 2006 after going 9-0 with two saves and a 0.37 ERA in 12 games as a senior...struck out 102 and walked just nine in 57 innings...his father, Frank, was the head baseball coach at Oklahoma

State University from 2003-12 and is now pitching coach at the University of Houston...was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after-school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Mike Fiers (8-3, 3.87 ERA)

AMONG THE LEADERS: Is scheduled to make his 20th start of the season to-day, which will tie him for the most in the majors among non-openers...ranks second in the American League in fewest strikeouts per nine innings (5.89), fourth in wild pitches (8) and tied for fifth in hit batters (7)...dating back to May 7, he has the lowest OPS (.539) in the American League and second lowest in the majors (Scherzer, WAS .524)...ranks second in the AL in opponents slugging (.291), third in ERA (2.31) and opponents batting average (.180) and tied for fourth in wins.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years...then put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston to give him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average over his next three starts...began that streak by tossing just

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Mike Fiers (8-3, 3.87 ERA): Is 6-0 with a 2.31 ERA and .180 opponents batting average over his last 12 starts dating back to his May 7 no-hitter against Cincinnati...the winning streak matches his career high (July 21-Sept. 11, 2018) and is the second longest active streak in the American League... dating back to May 7, he ranks second in the AL in opponents slugging (.291) and OPS (.539), third in ERA (2.31) and opponents batting average (.180) and tied for third in wins (6)...has eight wins overall, which are his most ever before the break...is 13-5 with a 3.83 ERA in 29 games, including 28 starts, since he was acquired by Oakland Aug. 6, 2018...the wins are tied for fifth most in the AL over that span...had a no decision in his last start, a 4-3 A's loss to Minnesota in 12 innings on Wednesday (6.0 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 4 so)...is 2-0 with a 2.21 ERA (36.2 ip, 34 h, 9 r, 9 er, 9 bb, 32 so, 2 hr) in six career starts against Chicago...went 1-0 with a 3.71 ERA in three starts last year.

Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan...took the
fifth spot in the rotation once the regular season resumed.

RYAN BUCHTER

- Did not allow a run in six of his first seven appearances (2.70 ERA).
- That included the 200th appearane of his appearance of his career April 6 at Houston when he tossed a scoreless eighth inning.
- Then allowed at least one run in four of his next six games and had a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents batting average in 13 appearances overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Made one appearance with the Aviators on April 26 against El Paso (1.0 ip) before returning to Oakland April 29.

MARK CANHA

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list April 29 with a sprained right wrist...went 1-for-8 (.125) with a double, RBI, sacrifice fly and three strikeouts on a two-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas on May 10 and 11 and was reinstated May 13.

- Made his second consecutive Opening Day start at third base on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and had a double, home run and three RBI.
- Homered in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history
 to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts May 7 against Cincinnati for the first four-strikeout game
 of his career.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 10 against Cleveland, a walk-off home run off Brad Hand to lead off the 12th...it was the third time he was at the plate for a walk-off (single and error on July 22, 2018; wild pitch on Sept. 22, 2018).
- Hit safely in each of his five games against the Indians (7-for-22, .318) and has now hit safely
 in all 11 of his career games against Cleveland...is 18-for-43 (.419) with 12 runs, six doubles, a
 triple, four home runs and eight RBI (.884 slugging percentage, 1.363 OPS).
- Homered in a career-high tying three consecutive games from May 25-27 (also July 22-24, 2017).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run June 20 against Tampa Bay, a three-run shot off Castillo.
- Had a career-high six RBI June 30 at Los Angeles (AL) when he went 3-for-5 with a double, triple and home run...became the 10th player in Oakland history to fall a single short of the cycle (last: Canha, May 19, 2017).

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab
 from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL
 March 27.
- Began a rehab assignment at Single-A Stockton May 17 and went 0-1 with a 6.43 ERA in three games, including two starts, before his rehab was halted May 29 due to a hamstring injury.
- Underwent right hamstring debridement surgery June 6, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper at the North Central Surgical Center in Dallas, Tex.

KHRIS DAVIS

- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.
- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th
 time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the
 last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the
 fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who
 reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.
- Homered twice on May 13 at Seattle to snap a 20-game homerless streak, which was his longest as an Athletic...it was his third multi-homer game of the season, his 19th as an Athletic and the 25th of his career.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list May 24 retroactive to May 22 with a left hip/oblique contusion and did not have a rehab assignment...suffered the injury on May 5 in Pittsburgh

but played in seven of the A's 15 games following that before going on the IL, batting .346 with two home runs and three RBI...was reinstated from the IL June 1.

RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.
- Did not allow a run in six apperaances with the Aviators and had two saves and 14 strikeouts in 9.2 innings when he was recalled by Oakland April 22.
- Allowed at least one run in four of his next five appearances (7.11 ERA, 433 opponents batting average) and was optioned back to Las Vegas May 2.

MARCO ESTRADA

 Was on the A's Opening Day roster and was 0-2 with a 6.85 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day injured list April 17 with a lumbar strain.

MIKE FIERS

- Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing
 pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th
 different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden,
 Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).
- Put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts.
- That gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then allowed a season-high six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average
- Began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, matching the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...walked a season-high four.
- Struck out a season-high six batters April 12 at Texas.
- Yielded a season-high nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss to Toronto on April 20...it was
 his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a sixgame Coliseum winning streak
- Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA
 was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second

 (also Aug. 21, 2015 vs. Los Angeles-NL)...walked two and struck out a season-high tying six...
 also tossed a season-high 131 pitches, which were the most by an A's pitcher since Mark
 Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...retired the first 11
 before Winker reached base on an error with two outs in the fourth...set down the next seven
 before walking Suarez to start the seventh...Suarez was erased on a double play, Puig walked
 and Fiers then retired the final seven batters to complete the no-hitter.
- Became the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters... is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea last year on April 21...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has two career complete games, both no-hitters...according to

Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).

- Had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May
 13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the
 only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...left
 with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth
 for the blown save...it was the first of four times the bullpen blew a save (May 31, June 22
 and uly 3).
- Was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...is the pitcher of record.

DANIEL GOSSETT

 Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- · His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.
- Had his third career four-hit game June 5 at Los Angeles (AL), his first since Sept. 18, 2016 at New York (NL).
- Had a RBI single off Chaz Roe in the ninth inning on June 10 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit.

CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale,
 Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty
 procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies
 in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.
- Began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas June 13 and hit .333 with four home runs and 13 RBI in 13 games...reached base safely in each contest (.397 on-base percentage)...appeared in eight games at catcher and five at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL July 2 and went 1-for-3 with a grand slam and four RBI in his
 Oakland debut that night against Minnesota...became the first player in Athletics history
 (1901-present) to hit a grand slam in his first game with the A's.

- Had a then career-high 14.2-inning scoreless streak from April 30 to May 28.
- Was named American League Reliever of the Month for June after going 1-0 with two saves and a 0.60 ERA in 14 relief appearances...allowed just one run in 15.0 innings while striking out 22...it was his first career Reliever of the Month award.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star team as a replacement for Tampa Bay's Charlie Morton...pitched the sixth inning in the All-Star Game on July 9 in Cleveland (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 3 so, 1 hr)...the three strikeouts were the most by an Athletic in an All-Star Game since Jay Howell also had three in 1987.

NICK HUNDLEY

 Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston (also June 18 vs. Baltimore).
- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 28 consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second longest reaching base streak by a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979).
- Had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland, his second career game-ending RBI...the
 other was Aug. 3, 2018 vs. Detroit, also a single.
- Had a career-high and A's season-high 16-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...it matched the longest hitting streak by an Athletic over the last eight years...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak.
- Had an Oakland record-tying streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973).
- Had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI (Aug. 20, 2018 vs. Texas) and his
 first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand
 slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first
 Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last
 Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB).
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts June 20 against Tampa Bay, his first career four-strikeout game.
- Was hit by a pitch an Oakland record-tying two times June 22 against Tampa Bay.
- Had seven home runs and 22 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for fourth in the AL in RBI in June.

SEAN MANAEA

 Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

NICK MARTINI

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 8 and hit .302 with 10 RBI and seven walks (.392 on-base percentage) in 12 games before he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas May 28.

KENDRYS MORALES

- Was acquired from the Toronto Blue Jays for minor league infielder Jesus Lopez and international slot money March 27.
- Made his second career appearance as a pitcher April 20 against Toronto in the ninth inning (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the other came on May 20, 2018 against Oakland at Toronto (1.0 ip, 1 bb)...it marked the 13th time in Oakland history a position player pitched, the sixth time in the last five years...is just the third to allow a run and is the first two walk two batters...the last was Jake Smolinski last year on June 13 against Houston.
- Matt Olson returned from the IL May 7 and Morales was batting .204 with a home run and seven RBI in 34 games when he was designated for assignment May 13...was traded to the New York Yankees the next day with cash for a player to be named later or cash consideratioons.

MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his
 hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery
 was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.

- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start backto-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators, including three at first base and two at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL May 7.
- Committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...it was the fourth longest errorless in Oakland history by a first baseman.
- Had his fifth career multi-homer game June 28 at Los Angeles-AL (last: July 22, 2018 vs. San Francisco) and matched his career high with five RBI (June 1, 2018 at Kansas City).

- · Had his second career four-hit game May 16 at Detroit.
- Tied for ninth in the AL with 20 RBI in May...those are his most RBI in a month, topping his 13 from April this year.

CHAD PINDER

 Snapped a 0-for-12 streak as a pinch hitter June 18 against Baltimore with his first career pinch home run...it was his first pinch hit since Sept. 9, 2018.

STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...matched his career high in hits (fourth time) and RBI (fifth time)...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 25 consecutive games from April 28 to May 29...hit .280 with a .357 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 8 against Cincinnati, a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 13th.
- Had his second career four-strikeout game May 13 at Seattle (also Aug. 30, 2016 at Milwaukee).

 oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug
 Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest
 player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953
 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only
 players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning
 in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900
 games.

MARCUS SEMIEN

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...
 that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris,
 Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at
 shortstop in an Oakland uniform.
- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping what was then a
 career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018...did not make his second
 error until June 2 for a 41-game errorless streak from April 12-June 1...that tied for fourth
 longest in Athletics history by a shortstop.
- Led off the game with a home run May 28 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the third lead-off home run of his career.
- Was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 1 against Houston.
- Had a career-high 17-game hitting streak from June 4 to 20...hit .375 (27-for-72) with 16 runs, five doubles, a triple, three home runs and 13 RBI during the streak, which is the longest in the AL this year and the longest single-season hitting streak by an Athletic since a 22-game streak by Eric Byrnes from May 8-June 1, 2003 (Mark Ellis had a 17-game hitting streak from Sept. 21, 2010-April 5, 2011)
- Went 4-for-5 with three runs, two home runs and four RBI June 7 at Texas...it was his fourth
 career multi-homer game and his sixth four-hit game.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of June 3-9 after going 13-for-31 (.419) with seven runs, two doubles, two home runs, nine RBI and three walks...it was the first weekly award of his career.
