# OAKLAND ATHLETICS (58-45) VS. TEXAS RANGERS (51-51)

ABOUT THE A'S: Lost two of three at Houston to snap a nine series unbeaten streak (seven wins, two splits)...it was the A's first series loss since dropping two of three to Seattle June 14-16...have now lost three of the last four games...however, are 8-4 (.667) since the All-Star Break and have won 15 of the last 21 games...are 22-8 (.733) dating back to June 17...are 58-45 (.563) overall, which is the fifth best record in the American League and seventh best in the majors...have a run differential of +86, which is fourth best in the AL and fifth best in the majors... are in second place in the AL West for the 20th consecutive day and trail first place Houston by 7½ games...have the second Wild Card spot, one game ahead of Tampa Bay and two games behind first place Cleveland...have spent 28 days in second in the West this year, one day tied for second, 44 days in third, six days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, seven days tied for fourth and 17 days in fifth...lost back-to-back games on Sunday and Monday for the first time since they were swept in the day/night doubleheader at Texas on June 8...split a four-game series with Minnesota last weekend to snap a streak of six consecutive series wins.

**SINCE MAY 16:** The A's are 39-20 (.661) dating back to May 16, which is the second best record in the majors over that span...have a 3.85 ERA (230 er in 538.1 ip), which is second lowest to the Dodgers (3.21)...rank third in the majors in home runs (108) and extra base hits (237), fourth in runs (339) and fifth in doubles (121) and slugging (.479)...have outscored the opposition 339-244 for a run differential of +95.

*HOME AND AWAY:* The A's begin a nine-game homestand tonight against Texas (four games), Milwaukee (three games) and St. Louis (two games)... will play 18 of their next 26 games at home...have a season-high six-game home winning streak and have won 13 of the last 15 home games...went 5-0 on the last homestand against Chicago (3-0) and Seattle (2-0)...it was the A's first perfect homestand of more than three games since going 6-0 against Toronto and San Francisco from July 3-8, 2014...went 3-4 on the last road trip to American League Central leading Minnesota (2-2) and AL West leading Houston (1-2)...are 22-10 over their last 33 road games (includes May 19 suspended game) after starting the year 5-15 on the road...are 31-20 (.608) at home compared to 27-25 (.519) on the road...have the third best home record in the AL...have a 3.53 ERA (187 er in 477.0 ip) at home, which is second lowest in the AL, compared to 4.57 on the road.

AGAINST THE WEST: The A's are 25-24 (.510) against American League West competition compared to 33-21 (.611) against all other teams...the mark against the West is second best within the division as Houston is 35-12 and everyone else is under .500...last year, the A's went 38-38 (.500) against the West, 59-27 (.686) against all other teams.

*OFFENSE:* The A's batted .221 (54-for-244) with 26 runs (3.7 per game) in seven games on the road trip...did not have an extra base hit yesterday, which is the first time they had all singles in a game since April 16 (also against Houston)...it snapped a streak of 83 consecutive games with an extra base hit, which was the fifth longest such streak in Oakland history...have not gone back-to-back games without an extra base hit since Sept. 11-12, 2014...are tied for fourth in the American League in extra base hits (362) and rank fifth in home runs (164) and slugging (.444)...have the fourth fewest strikeouts (814)...are tied for the fewest sacrifice hits (2), rank third in hit by pitches (50) and fourth in most grounded into double plays (87).

THE LONG BALL: The A's homered just once in the three-game series at Houston...went homerless on Monday to snap a streak of 21 consecutive games with a home run...that was the second longest streak in Athletics history and fell two short of the record of 23 (July 2-27, 1996)...hit 42 home runs during the streak...did not homer yesterday and have not gone homerless in backto-back games since May 4-5 at Pittsburgh...have 164 home runs for the season, which ranks seventh in the majors.

**PITCHING:** The A's compiled a 5.40 ERA and .273 opponents batting average on the road trip...walked 29 batters in 61.2 innings (4.23 per nine innings) and surrendered 14 home runs (2.04 per nine innings)...however, have a 3.46 ERA (83 er in 215.2 ip) over the last 24 contests...overall, rank second in the American League in opponents slugging percentage (.401) and fewest home runs (121), third in OPS (.713), fourth in ERA (4.04) and batting average (.243) and fifth in on-base percentage (.312).

**STARTING PITCHING:** A's starting pitchers went 1-2 with a 6.69 ERA (27 er in 36.1 ip) on the last road trip but are 11-3 with a 3.91 ERA (53 er in 122.0 ip) over the last 21 games...have 42 wins for the season, which is tied for second most in the majors to Houston (44)...rank fifth in the American League in ERA (4.17).

**ON THE BASES:** A's opponents have been caught stealing 30 times, which is the most in the majors...however, they have stolen 62 bases, which is tied for fourth most...A's pitchers have 10 pickoffs, which is tied for fourth...on offense, the A's are 34-for-50 (68.0%) in stolen base attempts...have the second lowest stolen base percentage in the American League and the third fewest stolen bases and attempts.

*LEFT AND RIGHT:* The A's are 19-8 (.704) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 39-37 (.513) against right-handers...the mark against lefties is second best in the majors to Houston (23-7)... are batting .266 with an .810 OPS against left-handed pitchers compared to .241 with a .749 OPS against right-handers...have the third best batting average and OPS against lefties in the American League and the fourth lowest batting average against righties...have the second most home runs off lefties (49).

THE INJURED LIST: The A's have used the injured list just 13 times after using it at least 23 times in each of the previous four seasons...currently have five players on the IL (Cotton, Estrada, Gossett, Manaea, Piscotty), including four on the 60-day IL (Cotton, Estrada, Gossett, Manaea)...Cotton and Manaea are on rehab assignments...have had at least five players on the DL every day dating back to April 26, 2018.

*THIS AND THAT*: The A's have committed 55 errors for a .986 fielding percentage, which ranks fourth in the American League...the Athletics record for fewest errors in a non-strike season is 84 in 2006...A's pinch hitters are tied for the AL lead in doubles (5), rank second in hits (16), RBI (16) and extra base hits (8), tied for second in plate appearances (67) and third in home runs (3)... have six walk-off wins, which is second most in the AL (Houston, 7)...have seven walk-off losses, which is second most in the majors (New York-NL, 9)

*A's vs. RANGER5*: The A's lead the season series, 6-3...swept a three-game series in Oakland in April and are 3-3 in Texas...have won six straight and 18 of the last 21 games in Oakland...have won 15 of their last 19 games overall dating back to July 23 of last year and are hitting .293 (196-for-669) with 139 runs scored (7.3 per game) and 38 home runs over that span...have won each of the previous two season series and are 30-17 (.638) against the Rangers over the last three years...are 371-370 all-time against the Texas Rangers... that breaks down to 196-173 in Oakland and 175-197 in Texas...are 108-109 at Globe Life Park...have an all-time record of 468-452 against the Rangers/ Senators franchise.

# TODAY'S TIDBITS

**Matt Chapman** ranks fourth in the American League in extra base hits (52), sixth in slugging (.540) and tied for sixth in doubles (27) and total bases (202)...*Liam Hendriks* has the second lowest relief ERA in the majors (1.18)...*Ramón Laureano* is batting .400 (26-for-65) with 21 runs, eight doubles, seven home runs, 14 RBI and 10 multiple hit games in 18 games in July...ranks second in the AL in runs and extra base hits (15) this month, tied for second in doubles, tied for fourth in hits and tied for fifth in home runs...*Matt Olson* has hit 21 home runs in 68 games since he was reinstated from the 10-day injured list May 7...the home runs are third most in the majors over that span...the A's have gone 43-24 (.642) since his return after compiling a 15-19 (.442) record while he was on the IL...*Marcus Semien* has a consecutive games played streak of 185 (all starts)...the consecutive games *slayed* streak is fourth longest.

# THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1930** the A's have two triple steals in the same game...Al Simmons, Bing Miller and Dib Williams turn the trick in the first inning and Mickey Cochrane, Simmons and Jimmie Foxx steal together in the fourth inning...in **1936** Frankie Hayes ties a major league record with four doubles in a game against Cleveland...in **1996** Mark McGwire hits a 488 foot home run into the fifth deck at SkyDome...at the time it was the longest home run in the majors since all home runs have been measured starting in 1992...in **2001** the A's acquire Jermaine Dye from Kansas City in a three-team trade.

# TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Brett Anderson (9-5, 3.82 ERA)

*LAST FOUR STARTS:* IS 2-0 with a 2.36 ERA (7 er in 26.2 ip) and .198 (18-for-91) opponents batting average over his last four starts...went 3-0 with a 2.63 ERA and .222 opponents average over his first four starts and was 4-5 with a 4.87 and .283 opponents average over his next 12 starts in between (April 27-June 23).

**NIGHT AND DAY:** Is 7-2 with a 2.89 ERA (24 er in 74.2 ip) and .214 (59-for-276) opponents batting average in 12 starts at night compared to 2-3 with a 5.53 ERA (25 er in 40.2 ip) and .319 (52-for-163) opponents average in eight starts during the day...ranks second in the American League in OPS at night (.620), fourth in ERA and tied for sixth in wins.

**THE LONG BALL:** Has allowed 13 home runs over his last 12 starts and 72.1 innings after surrendering just one home run over his first eight starts and 43.0 innings...has yielded 14 home runs overall and his average of 1.09 home runs per nine innings is 10th lowest in the American League...11 of the 14 home runs are solo shots.

**RUN SUPPORT:** Has received three runs of support or fewer in 10 of his last 12 starts...however, has starts with 16 runs of support and 13 and his season run support average of 6.55 (84 rs in 115.1 ip) is eighth highest in the American League....is 9-1 in 14 starts with run support of two runs or more.

**BEFORE AND AFTER THE BREAK:** Is 0-0 with a 3.55 ERA (5 er in 12.2 ip) in two starts since the All-Star Break after going 9-5 with a 3.86 ERA in 18 starts before the break...had never won more than five games before the break entering this season...is now 28-35 with a 4.25 ERA in 93 career games before the break compared to 27-22 with a 3.83 ERA (183 er in 430.0 ip) in 84 games after the break.

**AGAINST THE WEST:** Is 4-2 with a 2.70 ERA (15 er in 50.0 ip) and .204 (37-for-181) opponents batting average in eight starts against American League West competition compared to 5-3 with a 4.68 ERA (34 er in 65.1 ip) and .287 (74-for-258) opponents average in 12 starts against all other teams.

*DAYS REST:* Is scheduled to start on four days rest today...is 2-1 with a 5.40 ERA (20 er in 33.1 ip) in six starts on four days rest compared to 7-4 with a 3.18 ERA (29 er in 82.0 ip) in 14 starts on five days rest or more compared to.

*STRIKEOUTS*: Has struck out just 57 batters in 115.1 innings and his average of 4.45 strikeouts per nine innings is the lowest mark in the majors ahead of teammate Mike Fiers (5.67)...his strikeout-to-walk ratio of 1.63 is fifth lowest.

*THIS AND THAT:* Was placed on the paternity list on Monday and returns to the active roster today...made his 20th start of the season in his last outing, which marks the third time in his 11-year career he has made 20 or more starts (31 in 2015 with the Dodgers, 30 in 2009 with the A's)...has nine wins, which are two more than his combined total over the previous three seasons...has won 10 games twice: 11 in his rookie season with the A's in 2009 and 10 with Los Angeles (NL) in 2015...his 115.1 innings pitched are his most since 2015 (180.1)...the A's are 14-6 (.700) in his starting assignments.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Was one of three inactive pitchers for the opening series in Japan...was slotted in as the A's third starter when the club returned home and made his first start March 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings to extend his home scoreless streak to an Oakland record 34.1 innings...broke the previous record of 33.0 set by Matt Keough (Sept. 5, 1979-April 16, 1980)...it is also the longest Athletics home scoreless streak since at least 1908...the streak ended in the first inning of his next start April 4 against Boston, marking the first time he allowed a run in the Coliseum since May 7, 2018...then defeated the Orioles 13-2 at Baltimore on April 9 for his third win in his third start...the only other time in his career he won at least his first two starts in a season was in 2012 when he won his first four starts after missing the first 4½ months of the season following "Tommy John" surgery...was 3-0 with a 2.50 ERA over his first three starts through April 9...then went 1-3 with a 5.52 ERA over his next six starts through May 14...left with a 7-3 lead on April 14 at Texas but Soria blew the save in the eighth inning...it was his first of two starts in which the bullpen blew the save (June 12 at Tampa Bay, Hendriks)...was charged with his first loss of the season April 21 games Toronto when he lasted a season-low 2.2 innings following an ankle injury...it snapped a career-high tying four-game winning streak dating back to Sept. 19, 2018 (fourth time)...went 4-0 with a 3.50 ERA and .243 opponents average during the streak, which spanned seven starts... made his next scheduled start April 27 at Toronto but allowed a season-high 10 hits for his second consecutive loss...finished April 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA and .307 opponents batting average in five starts...then went 3-1 with a 3.34 ERA and .225 opponents batting average in five starts in May...snapped his twogame losing streak May 3 at Pittsburgh when he picked up his 50th career win in the A's 14-1 victory...walked a season-high five and had a no decision in the A's 5-4, 13-inning win over Cincinnati May 8 in Oakland...did not strike out a batter for the sixth time in his career as a starter (number seven came on June 23 against Tampa Bay)...struck out a season-high five but also sur-

rendered a career-high tying three home runs in a 4-3 loss at Seattle on May 14...left his start on May 20 at Cleveland after 5.1 innings with a cervical strain but did not miss a start...picked up the win in that start to begin a six-start stretch through June 18 where he went 3-1 with a 2.70 ERA...tossed a season-high 110 pitches in a 7-1 win over Seattle on May 26...the pitches were his most since June 26, 2015 at Miami (113)...struck out a season-high tying five batters in a no decision on June 7 at Texas...allowed a season-high seven runs on nine hits and two walks in 3.0 innings in an 8-2 loss at Tampa Bay June 23...tossed a season-high 7.2 innings and allowed two hits when he combined with Liam Hendriks on a three-hit shutout in a 4-0 win at Los Angeles (AL) on June 29.

LAST START: He had his second consecutive no decision in the A's 5-4 win at Minnesota on Saturday...surrendered a career-high tying three home runs... allowed a leadoff home run to Garver in the bottom of the first and Cruz added a solo shot one out later...Sano followed with a double but Anderson retired each of the next 14 batters...had a 3-2 lead entering the bottom of the seventh when he allowed a leadoff home run to Sano...was relieved by Petit and the A's scored twice in the ninth for the win.

of his right foot May 17 and was transferred to the 60-day DL June 14...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 28 and pitched exclusively in relief following his return, logging a 5.74 ERA and .306 opponents batting average in 10 appearances...recorded his first save in his first outing following his return Aug. 28 at Detroit...pitched the final three innings of the A's 14-4 win, allowing three runs on five hits in 3.0 innings.

2012—Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings...yielded a .148 average with runners in scoring position...was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts... left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so)...combined for a 1-1 record and a 4.62 ERA during a six-start rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...began his rehab assignment July 21 with Stockton, one year and seven days after having reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow...was transferred to Sacramento July 26.

2011—Was limited to just 13 starts and was 3-6 with a 4.00 ERA when he underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his left elbow July 14...went 2-1 with a 1.56 ERA over his first five starts and did not allow a home run in 34.2 innings...then went 1-5 with a 5.73 ERA over his final eight starts, yielding eight home runs in 48.2 innings...allowed a .270 opponents batting average, including a .252 against right-handed hitters and .303 against left-handers...his opponents average dropped to .221 with runners in scoring position...tied for seventh in the American League with five pickoffs...opponents were successful in just 5 of 12 (41.7%) stolen base attempts...tossed his second career complete game in his second start of the season but took the loss in a 2-1 decision at Minnesota April 8...matched his career high by tossing 9.0 innings May 5 against Cleveland, but had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning loss...allowed a career-high 10 runs on a career-high 11 hits in a 10-3 loss to New York May 31...allowed five runs on nine hits in 5.0 innings in his final start, a 6-3 loss at Boston June 5...was placed on the disabled list June 7 with left elbow soreness...received a Platelet Rich Plasma injection after he was examined by Dr. James Andrews at the Andrews Institute in Pensacola, Fla. June 13...was examined again a month later and it was determined that his injury required surgery...Dr. Andrews performed successful reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow, July 14.

**2010**—Lowered his ERA by more than a run from his rookie campaign of 2009 but two stints on the disabled list with elbow problems limited him to just 19 starts...was 7-6 with a 2.80 ERA after going 11-11 with a 4.06 ERA in his first season...opponents batted .257, including .225 with runners in scoring position...tied for eighth in the AL with four pickoffs...did not allow a run in his first two starts of the season April 8 against Seattle and April 13 at Seattle to become the first starting pitcher in Oakland history (among pitchers who began the season with the A's) to start the season with two consecutive scoreless outings...the last Athletics pitcher to do it was Alex Kellner of the 1953 Philadelphia A's, who started the season with back-to-back complete game shutouts...agreed to terms April 16 on a four-year contract through the 2013 season with club options for 2014 and 2015...had his season-opening scoreless streak snapped at 14.0 innings in his third start, an 8-3 loss to Baltimore...that was the third longest season-opening streak by a starter in Oakland history and the longest since Matt Keough set the record with a 16.0 inning streak in 1980...was 1-1 with a 2.35 ERA in four starts before going on the 15-day disabled list April 27 retroactive to April 25 with left elbow inflammation and a proximal medial forearm strain...was reinstated from the DL May 29...had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...was reinstated July 30 and went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...finished the season with a career-high tying fourgame winning streak...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA in six starts in September.

2009-Set an Oakland rookie record and led Major League rookies with 150 strikeouts...compiled an 11-11 record and 4.06 ERA in 30 starts...tied for third among American League rookies in games started, ranked fourth in innings pitched (175.1) and tied for fourth in wins...is one of four 21-year olds in Oakland history to win 10 or more games...went 8-4 with a 2.96 ERA over his final 17 starts, beginning June 29...was charged with 15 unearned runs, which tied for the most in the AL...also ranked tied for fifth in grounded into double plays (24), tied for seventh in shutouts (1) and pickoffs (4), eighth in walks per nine innings (2.31) and strikeout to walk ratio (3.33), and 10<sup>th</sup> in strikeouts per nine innings (7.70)...his season run support of 4.62 was eighth lowest in the AL...did not have a wild pitch and his 175.1 innings were the most in the majors among pitchers with no wild pitches...did not commit an error in 29 total chances, all assists...tied for the lead among AL pitchers in double plays (5) and tied for fourth in assists...was ranked number 7 on Baseball America's Top 100 Prospects lists entering the season...was the losing pitcher in his Major League debut, a 5-4 A's loss to Seattle April 10...allowed five runs in 6.0 innings, with all five runs coming in the second inning...recorded his first Major League win May 20 at Tampa Bay when he yielded four runs on four hits and no walks in 6.0 innings in a 7-6 A's win...at the age of 21 years, 108 days, he became the sixth youngest pitcher in Oakland history to record his first ML win...tossed a complete game two-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Boston July 6 (2 bb, 9 so)...at the age of 21 years, 155 days he became the fifth youngest pitcher in Oakland history to toss a shutout and the youngest since Mike Norris July 4, 1976 against Kansas City...did not allow a run over his next two starts, including July 19 against Los Angeles when he retired each of the first 20 batters he faced before Bobby Abreu singled with two outs in the seventh inning to break up the perfect game...became the second rookie in Oakland history to take a perfect game into the seventh inning (Mike Norris, June 28, 1976)...had a career-high 23.0-inning scoreless streak from July 6 to 24...was named American League Rookie of the Month for September after going 4-0 with a 2.28 ERA in four starts...struck out a career-high 10 batters and tossed 6.0 shutout innings in a 2-1 win over Cleveland Sept. 18.

# TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Mike Fiers (9-3, 3.64 ERA)

SEVEN-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 7-0 with a 2.25 ERA (21 er in 84.0 ip) and .197 (58-for-294) opponents batting average over his last 13 starts dating back to his May 7 no-hitter against Cincinnati...the winning streak is a career high (previous: 6, July 21-Sept. 11, 2018), tied for the second longest active streak in the American League (Workman, BOS 8) and the longest by an A's pitcher over the last six years...the last longer streak is nine by Jarrod Parker from May 28-Sept. 4, 2013...has left with the lead in five of his six no decisions during the streak only to have the bullpen blow the save...his other no decision is the May 19 suspended game at Detroit in which he is the pitcher of record with the A's leading 5-3 in the bottom of the seventh... went 2-3 with a 6.81 ERA and .297 opponents batting average over his first eight starts.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks fourth in the American League in opponents slugging percentage (.362), tied for fourth in winning percentage (.750), seventh in OPS (.656) and tied for 10th in wins (9)...also ranks third in the AL in fewest strikeouts per nine innings (5.80), tied for third in wild pitches (9), fifth in fewest pitches per inning (15.5), tied for fifth in games started (21) and tied for eighth in hit batters (7).

LEADERS DATING BACK TO THE NO-HITTER: During his current seven-game winning streak dating back to May 7, he has the lowest ERA (2.25), opponents OPS (.557) and slugging percentage (.293) in the American League... also ranks third in batting average (.197), fourth in on-base percentage (.265) and tied for sixth in wins (7).

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 7-1 with a 2.79 ERA (27 er in 87.0 ip) and .212 (67-for-316) opponents batting average in 14 starts at night compared to 2-2 with a 5.82 ERA (22 er in 34.0 ip) and .278 (35-for-126) opponents average in seven starts during the day...has the lowest night OPS (.572) and slugging percentage (.307) in the American League and ranks second in the ERA..

HOME AND AWAY: Is 6-2 with a 2.58 ERA (19 er in 66.1 ip) and .206 (49-for-238) opponents batting average in 11 starts at home compared to 3-1 with a 4.94 ERA (30 er in 54.2 ip) and .260 (53-for-204) opponents average in 10 starts on the road...has the lowest home opponents slugging percentage in the American League (.307), ranks second in OPS (.576), tied for third in wins and fourth in ERA...is now 10-3 with a 2.91 ERA (41 er in 126.2 ip) and .213 (92-for-432) opponents batting average in 22 career appearances, 21 starts, in the Coliseum.

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 4-1 with a 5.28 ERA (27 er in 46.0 ip) in nine starts against American League West competition compared to 5-2 with a 2.64 ERA (22 er in 75.0 ip) in 12 starts against all other teams...is now 13-14 with a 5.46 ERA (151 er in 249.0 ip) in 47 career appearances against the AL West, 50-44 with a 3.52 ERA (301 er in 770.0 ip) in 146 games against all other teams

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on four days rest today...is 2-1 with a 4.79 ERA (19 er in 35.2 ip) in seven starts on four days rest, 5-0 with a 2.62 ERA (19 er in 65.1 ip) in 10 starts on five days rest and 2-2 with a 4.95 ERA (11 er in 20.0 ip) in four starts on six days rest or more.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has not allowed a home run in his last six starts after surrendering 15 over his first 15...has surrendered five home runs in 227 at bats against left-handed hitters, 10 in 215 at bats against right-handers...10 of the 15 home runs he has allowed have been solo shots...walked three batters to lead off an inning in his last start after walking just five batters to lead off an inning over his first 20 starts...opponents are hitting .147 (5-for-34) with runners in scoring and two outs.

APRIL AND BEYOND: Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April but is 7-1 with a 2.43 ERA (24 er in 89.0 ip) and .203 (63-for-310) opponents average in 14 starts since then...is now 5-9 with a 5.68 ERA in 25 career appearances in April and 50-35 with a 3.42 ERA (282 er in 742.0 ip) from May through August.

RHP Chris Bassitt (7-4, 3.96 ERA): Is 5-3 with a 5.14 ERA and .242 opponents average over his last 11 starts after going 2-1 with a 1.93 ERA and .179 opponents batting average over his first five starts...is averaging 7.23 strikeouts per nine innings over his last 11 starts after averaging 10.47 over his first five...has a run support average of 6.80, which is seventh highest in the American League among pitchers with 80 or more innings pitched...had a 2.67 RSA in his career as a starter entering this season...has allowed a .190 batting average with runners in scoring position...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 5-3 A's win at Minnesota last Friday (5.0 ip, 5 h, 3 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 2 so)...is 1-0 with a 3.27 ERA (22.0 ip, 16 h, 10 r, 8 er, 7 bb, 15 so, 2 hr) in four career appearances, including three starts, against Houston...had a no decision in his only start this year, a 6-4 A's loss in 12 innings in Oakland on June 2 (6.0 ip, 6 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so).

**FOR STARTERS:** Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas June 26 for his second stint with the A's this year and is 4-0 with a 4.28 ERA (13 er in 27.1 ip) in five starts since his return...the wins are tied for the most in the majors over that span...began the year at Las Vegas and was 3-2 with a 2.77 ERA in seven games (six starts) with the Aviators when the A's called for the first time on May 12...made three starts in then pitched twice in relief of an "opener"... was 1-1 with a 5.09 ERA in five games when he was optioned back to Las Vegas June 6...went 1-0 with a 6.10 ERA in two games, one start, at Triple-A following his option and is 4-2 with a 3.47 ERA and .210 opponents batting average in nine games, seven starts, overall with Las Vegas.

*IN JULY:* Is 3-0 despite a 5.48 ERA (13 er in 21.1 ip) in four starts in July...the only other time he won more than two games in a month was in May of 2018 when he went 4-1...is tied for second in the American League in wins in July.

- Was named Pacific Coast League Player of the Month for June after batting .387...he led the league in total bases (85), ranked second in hits (45), doubles (13) and RBI (32) and third in slugging (.802).

### CHRIS BASSITT

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27 retroactive to March 25 with a right lower leg contusion.
- Made one rehab start with Single-A Stockton on April 4 and two with Triple-A Las Vegas on April 9 and 14...was 0-0 with a 3.27 ERA in three starts overall when he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas April 16.
- Was recalled by Oakland the next day when Marco Estrada went on the IL.

### SKYE BOLT

- Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas May 3 and made his Major League debut that night at Pittsburgh...pinch hit in the seventh inning and popped out to first in his first career at-bat... remained in the game in center field and finished the night 0-for-2 with a strikeout.
- Collected his first ML hit May 4, a pinch-hit double off Keone Kela in the seventh inning.
- Was 1-for-4 in three games when he was optioned back to Las Vegas May 7.

### AARON BROOKS

• Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan...took the fifth spot in the rotation once the regular season resumed.

### RYAN BUCHTER

- Did not allow a run in six of his first seven appearances (2.70 ERA).
- That included the 200th appearane of his appearance of his career April 6 at Houston when he tossed a scoreless eighth inning.
- Then allowed at least one run in four of his next six games and had a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents batting average in 13 appearances overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Made one appearance with the Aviators on April 26 against El Paso (1.0 ip) before returning to Oakland April 29.

### MARK CANHA

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list April 29 with a sprained right wrist...went 1-for-8 (.125) with a double, RBI, sacrifice fly and three strikeouts on a two-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas on May 10 and 11 and was reinstated May 13.
- Hit his third career pinch-homer May 21 at Cleveland (had two in 2018).
- Homered in three consecutive games for the first time in his career from May 21-24.
- Hit seven home runs in May, which tied for 10th in the American League and are his most ever in a month.
- Committed his first error of the season June 16 against Seattle, which snapped a 152-game errorless streak as an outfielder...the streak was fifth longest in Oakland history by an outfielder...it was his first error since June 1, 2017.
- Had his first career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle.

- Made his second consecutive Opening Day start at third base on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and had a double, home run and three RBI.
- Homered in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts May 7 against Cincinnati for the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 10 against Cleveland, a walk-off home run off Brad Hand to lead off the 12th...it was the third time he was at the plate for a walk-off (single and error on July 22, 2018; wild pitch on Sept. 22, 2018).
- Hit safely in each of his five games against the Indians (7-for-22, .318) and has now hit safely in all 11 of his career games against Cleveland...is 18-for-43 (.419) with 12 runs, six doubles, a triple, four home runs and eight RBI (.884 slugging percentage, 1.363 OPS).
- Homered in a career-high tying three consecutive games from May 25-27 (also July 22-24, 2017).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run June 20 against Tampa Bay, a three-run shot off Castillo.
- Had a career-high six RBI June 30 at Los Angeles (AL) when he went 3-for-5 with a double, triple and home run...became the 10th player in Oakland history to fall a single short of the cycle (last: Canha, May 19, 2017)...drove in five runs nine games later against Seattle on July 16.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star Team June 30...finished second on the Player Ballot to Alex Bregman, who was voted in by the fans...walked in his only at bat in the All-Star Game July 9 at Cleveland and also scored a run...is the fifth third baseman in Oakland history to be named to the All-Star team (Bando, 1969, 72-74; Gross, 1977; Lansford, 1988; Donaldson, 2014).
- Also participated in the Home Run Derby on July 8 and hit 13 home runs in a first round loss to Vladimir Guerrero, Jr. (29).

### JHAREL COTTON

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL March 27.
- Began a rehab assignment at Single-A Stockton May 17 and went 0-1 with a 6.43 ERA in three games, including two starts, before his rehab was halted May 29 due to a hamstring injury.
- Underwent right hamstring debridement surgery June 6, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper at the North Central Surgical Center in Dallas, Tex.

### KHRIS DAVIS

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.
- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.

- Homered twice on May 13 at Seattle to snap a 20-game homerless streak, which was his longest as an Athletic...it was his third multi-homer game of the season, his 19th as an Athletic and the 25th of his career.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list May 24 retroactive to May 22 with a left hip/oblique contusion and did not have a rehab assignment...suffered the injury on May 5 in Pittsburgh but played in seven of the A's 15 games following that before going on the IL, batting .346 with two home runs and three RBI...was reinstated from the IL June 1.

### RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.
- Did not allow a run in six apperaances with the Aviators and had two saves and 14 strikeouts in 9.2 innings when he was recalled by Oakland April 22.
- Allowed at least one run in four of his next five appearances (7.11 ERA, .433 opponents batting average) and was optioned back to Las Vegas May 2.

### MARCO ESTRADA

• Was on the A's Opening Day roster and was 0-2 with a 6.85 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day injured list April 17 with a lumbar strain.

### MIKE FIERS

- Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).
- Put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts.
- That gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then allowed a season-high six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average
- Began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, matching the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...walked a season-high four.
- Struck out a season-high six batters April 12 at Texas.
- Yielded a season-high nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss to Toronto on April 20...it was
  his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a sixgame Coliseum winning streak
- Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42).
- Then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May... had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124).
- Tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati (also Aug. 21, 2015 vs. Los Angeles-NL)...walked two and struck out a season-high tying six... also tossed a season-high 131 pitches, which were the most by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...retired the first 11 before Winker reached base on an error with two outs in the fourth...set down the next seven before walking Suarez to start the seventh...Suarez was erased on a double play, Puig walked and Fiers then retired the final seven batters to complete the no-hitter.
- Became the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters... is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in

Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea last year on April 21...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has two career complete games, both no-hitters...according to Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).

- Had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May
  13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the
  only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...left
  with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth
  for the blown save...it was the first of five times the bullpen blew a save (May 31, June 22,
  July 3 and July 18).
- Was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...is the pitcher of record.
- Allowed one earned run or fewer in five consecutive starts from June 17 to July 12 and was 3-0 with a 1.09 ERA over that span.
- Hit an Oakland-record tying three batters June 22 against Tampa Bay (11th time, previous: Raul Alcantara, Sept. 5, 2016).
- Went 4-0 with a 2.30 ERA and .212 opponents batting average in five starts in June...it was
  the third time in his career he won four games in a month (4-2 in Aug. 2012 and 4-1 in Aug.
  2014)...had the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the American League in June (.283),
  tied for the lead in wins, had the fourth lowest OPS (.561) and ranked fifth in ERA.
- Retired the side in order in the first inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his 1,000th career inning pitched

### DANIEL GOSSETT

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

### **ROBBIE GROSSMAN**

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.
- Had his third career four-hit game June 5 at Los Angeles (AL), his first since Sept. 18, 2016 at New York (NL).
- Had a RBI single off Chaz Roe in the ninth inning on June 10 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit.

### CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.
- Began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas June 13 and hit .333 with four home runs and 13 RBI in 13 games...reached base safely in each contest (.397 on-base percentage)...appeared in eight games at catcher and five at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL July 2 and went 1-for-3 with a grand slam and four RBI in his Oakland debut that night against Minnesota...became the first player in Athletics history (1901-present) to hit a grand slam in his first game with the A's.
- The grand slam was the second of his career (July 23, 2013 at Los Angeles-AL) and the four RBI matched his career high (third time, last: April 23, 2016 vs. Pittsburgh).
- Then was a perfect 4-for-4 two days later against the Twins for his first career four-hit game.

#### LIAM HENDRIKS

- Had a then career-high 14.2-inning scoreless streak from April 30 to May 28...allowed three runs in 4.1 innings over his next four games and then had a career-high 20.2-inning scoreless streak from June 6 to July 20.
- Was named American League Reliever of the Month for June after going 1-0 with two saves and a 0.60 ERA in 14 relief appearances...allowed just one run in 15.0 innings while striking out 22...it was his first career Reliever of the Month award.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star team as a replacement for Tampa Bay's Charlie Morton...pitched the sixth inning in the All-Star Game on July 9 in Cleveland (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 3 so, 1 hr)...the three strikeouts were the most by an Athletic in an All-Star Game since Jay Howell also had three in 1987.

### NICK HUNDLEY

• Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

### RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston (also June 18 vs. Baltimore).
- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 28 consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second longest reaching base streak by a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979).
- Had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland, his second career game-ending RBI...the other was Aug. 3, 2018 vs. Detroit, also a single.
- Had a career-high and A's season-high 16-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...it matched the longest hitting streak by an Athletic over the last eight years...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak.
- Had an Oakland record-tying streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973).
- Had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI (Aug. 20, 2018 vs. Texas) and his
  first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand
  slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first
  Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last
  Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB).
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts June 20 against Tampa Bay, his first career four-strikeout game.
- Was hit by a pitch an Oakland record-tying two times June 22 against Tampa Bay.
- Had seven home runs and 22 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for fourth in the AL in RBI in June.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of July 15-21 after going 13for-24 (.542) with 10 runs, six doubles, two home runs, two RBI and five multiple hit games in six games...it was his first career weekly honor.

### SEAN MANAEA

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

### NICK MARTINI

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 8 and hit .302 with 10 RBI and seven walks (.392 on-base percentage) in 12 games before he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas May 28.

Was recalled by Oakland July 22 and went 0-for-2 with a strikeout that day at Houston...also
pitched a scoreless eighth inning in the A's 11-1 loss (2 bb, 1 so)...it marked the 14th time in
Oakland history a position player pitched...it was the second time this year and seventh time
in the last five years.

### **KENDRYS MORALES**

- Was acquired from the Toronto Blue Jays for minor league infielder Jesus Lopez and international slot money March 27.
- Made his second career appearance as a pitcher April 20 against Toronto in the ninth inning (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the other came on May 20, 2018 against Oakland at Toronto (1.0 ip, 1 bb)...it marked the 13th time in Oakland history a position player pitched, the sixth time in the last five years...is just the third to allow a run and is the first two walk two batters...the last was Jake Smolinski last year on June 13 against Houston.
- Matt Olson returned from the IL May 7 and Morales was batting .204 with a home run and seven RBI in 34 games when he was designated for assignment May 13...was traded to the New York Yankees the next day with cash for a player to be named later or cash considerations.

### MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery
  was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start backto-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators, including three at first base and two at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL May 7.
- Committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...it was the fourth longest errorless in Oakland history by a first baseman.
- Had his fifth career multi-homer game June 28 at Los Angeles-AL (last: July 22, 2018 vs. San Francisco) and matched his career high with five RBI (June 1, 2018 at Kansas City).
- Had a career-high 16-game hitting streak from June 30 to July 21, which tied for fifth longest in Oakland history by a first baseman...went 19-for-64 (.297) with four home runs and nine RBI during the streak.
- Batted .262 with seven doubles, nine home runs and 20 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for second in the AL in June extra base hits (16) and tied for third in home runs (9).

### JOSH PHEGLEY

- Had a career-high nine-game hitting streak from April 2-14...went 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...scored a run in each of the last seven games during the streak and drove in a run in each of the last six.
- Went 4-for-5 with two doubles, a home run, and a career-high eight RBI May 3 at Pittsburgh... it was his first career four-hit game...became just the 13th catcher in Major League history to drive in eight or more runs in game, the first Athletic...was the fifth Oakland Athletic with eight or more RBI in a game, the first since Eric Chavez on Aug. 30, 2001.
- Had his second career four-hit game May 16 at Detroit.
- Tied for ninth in the AL with 20 RBI in May...those are his most RBI in a month, topping his 13 from April this year.

### CHAD PINDER

• Snapped a 0-for-12 streak as a pinch hitter June 18 against Baltimore with his first career pinch home run...it was his first pinch hit since Sept. 9, 2018.

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...matched his career high in hits (fourth time) and RBI (fifth time)...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 25 consecutive games from April 28 to May 29...hit .280 with a .357 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 8 against Cincinnati, a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 13th.
- Had his second career four-strikeout game May 13 at Seattle (also Aug. 30, 2016 at Milwaukee).
- Collected his 500th career hit May 16 at Detroit.
- Had successful surgery June 13 to remove a melanoma from his right ear...the procedure was performed by Dr. Brian Parrett at the California Pacific Medical Campus.

### JURICKSON PROFAR

- Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).
- Committed his eighth error of the season in his 28th game at second base May 3 at Pittsburgh...then had a 25-game errorless streak from May 4 to June 1.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 16 at Detroit.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 21 at Cleveland, which ties an Athletics record.
- Finished May with six home runs, which matched his most ever in a month (September, 2018)
- Had his second career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle (also June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).

### FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the
  oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug
  Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest
  player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953
  (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

### MARCUS SEMIEN

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.
- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping what was then a career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018...did not make his second error until June 2 for a 41-game errorless streak from April 12-June 1...that tied for fourth longest in Athletics history by a shortstop.
- Led off the game with a home run May 28 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the third lead-off home run of his career.
- Was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 1 against Houston.
- Had a career-high 17-game hitting streak from June 4 to 20...hit .375 (27-for-72) with 16 runs, five doubles, a triple, three home runs and 13 RBI during the streak, which is the longest in the AL this year and the longest single-season hitting streak by an Athletic since a 22-game

streak by Eric Byrnes from May 8-June 1, 2003 (Mark Ellis had a 17-game hitting streak from Sept. 21, 2010-April 5, 2011)

- Went 4-for-5 with three runs, two home runs and four RBI June 7 at Texas...it was his fourth career multi-homer game and his sixth four-hit game.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of June 3-9 after going 13-for-31 (.419) with seven runs, two doubles, two home runs, nine RBI and three walks...it was the first weekly award of his career.
- Hit his 10th home run of the season June 15 and is the first Athletic to reach double figures in home runs in five consecutive seasons since Mark Ellis from 2005-09...is the 18th player in Oakland history with five or more 10-homer seasons.
- Tied for fourth in the AL in hits in June (35).
- Went 2-for-4 with two home runs and five RBI July 4 against Minnesota...it was his second two-homer game of the season and the fifth of his career...one of the home runs was a grand slam, the fourth of his career...it was his second career five-RBI game (Sept. 20, 2018 vs. Los Angeles-AL).

### JOAKIM SORIA

- Was on his 11th career Opening Day roster and made his Oakland debut in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...the A's became his seventh team in 12 seasons in the majors.
- Was charged with the loss March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) when he surrendered a careerhigh tying four runs without retiring a batter (11th time, first since Sept. 1, 2018 at Washington).
- Made his first career start June 5 at Los Angeles (AL) as the A's "opener" (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 so)...it came in his 667th career appearance...his career-opening streak of 666 appearances before making his first start was the longest in Major League history, topping the 638 games by Troy Percival before his first start on Sept. 30, 2007.

### **BEAU TAYLOR**

- Was batting .297 with 33 walks and a .450 on-base percentage in 38 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland June 8.
- Made his first career start June 10 at Tampa Bay and went 0-for-2.
- Hit his first career home run June 18 against Baltimore, a solo shot off Gabriel Ynoa in the third inning.

### **BLAKE TREINEN**

- Walked four batters April 7 at Houston, his most ever as a reliever...also allowed his first run of
  the season in that game and was charged with the loss and blown save...it snapped a streak
  of 24.1 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run, dating back to Aug. 25, 2018.
- Allowed his first run at home on May 11 against Cleveland, snapping a streak of 32.0 consecutive scoreless innings at home dating back to 2018...that was the longest home scoreless streak in Oakland history by a reliever and third longest overall...it was the first time he allowed a run at home since July 21, 2018 vs. San Francisco.
- Allowed a run in the 12th inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his first home loss since Sept.
   5, 2017...it snapped a 10-game Coliseum winning streak, which matched the longest home winning streak ever by an Oakland pitcher (Paul Lindblad, April 21, 1975-June 25, 1976).

### LOU TRIVINO

- Made his first Opening Day roster and pitched in each of the A's first four games...joined Dennis Eckersley (1992) as the only pitchers in Oakland history to appear in each of the first four games of a season.
- Was charged with the loss in four consecutive appearances from May 29 to June 5, which matched the longest streak by a reliever in Oakland history (Brian Fuentes, May 18-23, 2011).
- Made his 100th career appearance June 9 at Texas.

#### J.B. WENDELKEN

- Tossed 2.0 scoreless innings on Opening Day and added a scoreless seventh inning March 30 against Los Angeles (AL) before being charged with his first run in the eighth inning...that snapped a career-high 17.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to July 24, 2018.
- Struck out a career-high four batters and allowed just one baserunner across a career-high 3.1 innings pitched against Houston April 7.
- Had a 1.59 ERA and .171 opponents batting average over his first seven games through April 10...then logged a 10.24 ERA and .310 opponents batting average over his next 11 games and had a 5.57 ERA in 18 games overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas May 12.
