ABOUT THE A'S: Won two of three from Milwaukee and have now won four of the last five games after losing five of the previous six...are 26-12 (.684) dating back to June 17 and 62-48 (.564) for the season...have the sixth best record in the American League but the eighth best in the majors...are in second place in the AL West for the 29th consecutive day and trail first place Houston by 8½ games, which is the A's largest deficit in the West since June 19 when they were nine out...are ½ game behind Tampa Bay for the second Wild Card spot...have spent 37 days in second in the West, one day tied for second, 44 days in third, six days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, seven days tied for fourth and 17 days in fifth.

SINCE MAY 16: The A's are 43-23 (.652) dating back to May 16, which is tied for the best record in the majors over that span...have a 3.94 ERA (264 er in 602.1 ip), which is fifth best...rank third in the majors in extra base hits (259), fifth in home runs (117), sixth in slugging (.470) and seventh in runs (365).

CLOSE CALLS: Each of the A's last five games and 10 of the last 13 have been decided by two runs or fewer...are 7-6 over those 13 games but have been outscored 66-49...are 18-12 (.600) in one-run games, which is tied for the fourth best record in the majors...are tied with Houston for the most one-run wins in the American League...have eight walk-off wins, which is tied with the Dodgers for the most in the majors...have seven walk-off losses, which is second most to the Mets (9)...are 12-14 in games decided in the last at bat and the losses are third most in the AL...are 4-7 in extra inning games...the 11 games are tied for the most in the AL and the losses are tied for second most...are third in the AL in losses when leading after seven innings (6).

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's are 7-4 (.636) in interleague play (2-1 vs. Cincinnati, 1-2 vs. Pittsburgh, 2-0 vs. St. Louis, 2-1 vs. Milwaukee)...rank third in the majors with a 2.62 ERA (31 er in 106.1 ip)...in addition to this two-game series with St. Louis, the A's will also host San Francisco (Aug. 24-25) and travel to Chicago (Aug. 5-7) and San Francisco (Aug. 13-14)...went 12-8 (.600) against the National League last year, which tied for the eighth best interleague record in the majors...finished with a winning record against the NL for the first time since 2015 and the 13th time in 22 seasons of interleague play...are 224-191 (.540) all-time in interleague play, which is fourth best in Major League history.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 4.22 ERA (80 er in 170.2 ip) since the All-Star Break after posting a 4.06 ERA before the break...now have a 4.09 ERA for the season, which is fifth lowest in the American League...also rank second in fewest home runs (127), third in opponents slugging percentage (.401) and OPS (.713), fourth in batting average (.243) and fifth in on-base percentage (.313)...A's starting pitchers are 1-1 with a 2.84 ERA (10 er in 31.2 ip) over the last five games after going 0-4 with an 8.69 ERA over the previous six contests...are 43-29 with a 4.16 ERA (280 er in 605.1 ip) for the season...rank third in the AL in wins and fifth in ERA.

OFFENSE: The A's are hitting .184 (60-for-321) with 16 doubles, 10 home runs and 33 runs scored over the last 10 games (3.3 runs per game)...overall, rank fifth in the American League in home runs (173) and have the third fewest strikeouts (871)...are tied for the fewest sacrifice hits (2), rank second in hit by pitches (54) and third in grounded into double plays (94).

THE LONG BALL: Chad Pinder hit his ninth home run of the season on Thursday and Stephen Piscotty, who was reinstated from the injured list today, also has nine home runs...the A's already have eight players with 10 or more home runs, which is one short of the Athletics record of nine (2000 and 2017)...the A's have hit 173 home runs, which is tied for seventh most in the majors and is 15th most in Oakland history (14th is 175 in 2006, 13th is 176 in 2003, 12th is 186 in 2013).

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters are 5 for their last 12 (.417) with two walks and three RBI...overall, are tied for the American League lead in doubles (6), rank second in hits (17), RBI (17), extra base hits (9) and plate appearances (73) and third in home runs (3) and walks (9).

ON THE BASES: A's opponents have been caught stealing 32 times, which is tied with Philadelphia for the most in the majors...however, they have stolen 66 bases, which is fourth most...A's pitchers have 11 pickoffs, which is tied for fourth...on offense, the A's are 38-for-56 (67.9%) in stolen base attempts...have the second lowest stolen base percentage in the American League, are tied for the third fewest stolen bases and tied for the fourth fewest attempts.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 4-3 on this nine-game homestand against Texas (2-2), Milwaukee (2-1) and St. Louis (two games)...are 35-23 (.603) at home compared to 27-25 (.519) on the road...this homestand starts a stretch where the A's will play 18 of 26 games at home...leave following the game tomorrow for an eight-game, one-hotel road trip to Chicago-NL (three games), Chicago-AL (three games) and San Francisco (two games)...it marks the first time the A's have played consecutive series in Chicago...went 3-4 on the last road trip to AL Central leading Minnesota (2-2) and AL West leading Houston (1-2)...are 22-10 over their last 33 road games (includes May 19 suspended game) after starting the year 5-15 on the road.

LEFT AND RIGHT: The A's are 19-8 (.704) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 43-40 (.518) against right-handers...the mark against lefties is second best in the majors to Houston (24-7)...have not faced a lefty in the previous eight games and 14 of the previous 15...have 27 games against left-handed starters for the season, which is third fewest in the American League...are batting .267 with an .815 OPS against left-handed pitchers compared to .238 with a .742 OPS against right-handers...have the third best batting average and OPS against lefties in the AL and the third lowest batting average against righties...have the third most home runs off lefties (51).

OFF DAYS: The A's had yesterday off, which was their first scheduled Friday day off since Oct. 3, 1980...it was their second day off over a 15-day stretch from July 29-Aug. 12...will have another Friday off on Aug. 23.

THE INJURED LIST: The A's have used the injured list 15 times this year after using it at least 23 times in each of the previous four seasons...currently have five players on the IL (Estrada, Gossett, Laureano, Manaea, Phegley) and two of those are on rehab assignments (Estrada, Manaea)

A'S IN JULY: The A's went 15-9 (.625) in July, which was the third best record in the American League and the eighth best July in Oakland history...it was the second consecutive season the A's finishing with a winning record in July (went 17-8 last year)...ranked third in the AL with a 4.09 ERA and .746 OPS...A's pitchers had the fewest strikeouts (171), the third fewest walks (67) and are tied for the third most saves (7)...the offense hit 38 home runs, which is fifth most in July in Oakland history and the most since 2000 (44)...had the second lowest batting average in the AL (.241).

A'S vs. CARDINALS: The A's lead the season series 2-0 after sweeping a two-game series in St. Louis, June 25-26...now have a four-game winning streak against the Cardinals dating back to Aug. 27, 2016...won two of three in each of the previous two season series but are 8-9 all-time against the Cardinals...are 3-3 in Oakland and 5-6 in St. Louis...including 5-3 in the new Busch Stadium...the two franchises also met in back-to-back World Series with the A's winning in seven games in 1930 and the Cardinals winning in seven games in 1931.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman hit his 24th home run of the season Thursday, which matches his career high from last year and is the most among American League third basemen...**Liam Hendriks** has struck out at least one batter in each of his last 23 games, which is tied for the longest streak by a reliever in Oakland history (Keith Foulke, June 18-Aug. 16, 2003)...**Matt Olson** leads American League first basemen in home runs (22) and is tied for fourth in RBI (47)...**Marcus Semien** ranks fifth in the AL in runs (80), seventh in walks (60), tied for eighth in hits (121) and tied for 10th in doubles (27).

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In 1933 Lefty Grove became the first pitcher since August 2, 1931, a span of 308 games, to shutout the New York Yankees, winning 7-0...in 1991 Dave Henderson hits three home runs and the A's blast a total of six, but all are solo shots as the A's lose 8-6 to Minnesota...in 2002 Mark Ellis ties an Oakland record with two triples in an 8-4 win over Detroit...in 2018 Ramón Laureano becomes the first player in Athletics history with a walk-off RBI for his first Major League hit when he singles in the bottom of the 13th inning of the A's 1-0 win over Detroit.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Mike Fiers (9-3, 3.54 ERA)

SEVEN-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 7-0 with a 2.30 ERA (25 er in 97.2 ip) and .199 (68-for-342) opponents batting average over his last 15 starts dating back to his May 7 no-hitter against Cincinnati...has left with the lead in six of his eight no decisions during the streak only to have the bullpen blow the save...the winning streak is a career high (previous: 6, July 21-Sept. 11, 2018), the third longest active streak in the American League and the longest by an A's pitcher over the last six years...the last longer streak is nine by Jarrod Parker from May 28-Sept. 4, 2013...also has a no decision is the May 19 suspended game at Detroit in which he is the pitcher of record with the A's leading 5-3 in the bottom of the seventh...went 2-3 with a 6.81 ERA and .297 opponents batting average over his first eight starts.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks sixth in the American League in winning percentage (.750), eighth in opponents slugging percentage (.371), ninth in OPS (.666), tied for ninth in batting average (.229) and 10th in ERA (3.54)...also ranks second in fewest strikeouts per nine innings (5.81), fourth in wild pitches (10), tied for fourth in games started (23), sixth in fewest pitches per inning (15.4) and tied for ninth in hit batters (7).

LEADERS DATING BACK TO THE NO-HITTER: During his current seven-game winning streak dating back to May 7, he has the lowest opponents slugging percentage (.316) in the American League...also ranks second in ERA (2.30) and OPS (.585), third in batting average (.199) and sixth in on-base percentage (.269).

FIVE INNINGS OR MORE, THREE RUNS OR FEWER: Has tossed at least five innings while allowing three runs or fewer in each of his last 17 starts...that is the longest such streak by an A's pitcher since at least 1908...the previous long was 16 by Dan Haren (April 7-June 26, 2007)...is 7-1 with a 2.46 ERA (30 er in 109.2 ip) during the streak.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 6-2 with a 2.61 ERA (21 er in 72.1 ip) and .205 (53-for-258) opponents batting average in 12 starts at home compared to 3-1 with a 4.62 ERA (32 er in 62.1 ip) and .254 (59-for-232) opponents average in 11 starts on the road...ranks fourth in the American League in home ERA, is tied for fifth in wins and is sixth in OPS (.604)...is now 10-3 with a 2.92 ERA (43 er in 132.2 ip) and .212 (96-for-452) opponents batting average in 23 career appearances, 22 starts, in the Coliseum.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 7-1 with a 2.76 ERA (29 er in 94.2 ip) and .212 (73-for-344) opponents batting average in 15 starts at night compared to 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA (24 er in 40.0 ip) and .267 (39-for-146) opponents average in eight starts during the day...has the lowest night OPS (.576) and slugging percentage (.311) in the American League and ranks second in the ERA.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: Has made one interleague start this year and it came on May 7 against Cincinnati when he tossed his second career no-hitter...has allowed one run or fewer in four of his last five interleague starts dating back to Aug. 23, 2017 and is 2-0 with a 2.60 ERA (8 er in 27.2 ip) over that span...is 6-5 with a 2.85 ERA (36 er in 113.2 ip) and .210 (85-for-405) opponents batting average in 21 career interleague appearances, including 19 starts.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on five days rest today...is 5-0 with a 2.62 ERA (19 er in 65.1 ip) in 10 starts on five days rest...is 2-1 with a 4.20 ERA (23 er in 49.1 ip) in nine starts on four days rest and 2-2 with a 4.95 ERA (11 er in 20.0 ip) in four starts on six days rest or more.

APRIL AND BEYOND: Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April but is 7-1 with a 2.45 ERA (28 er in 102.2 ip) and .204 (73-for-358) opponents average in 16 starts since then...is now 5-9 with a 5.68 ERA in 25 career appearances in April and 50-35 with a 3.41 ERA (286 er in 755.2 ip) from May through August.

THIS AND THAT: Went 1-0 with a 2.14 ERA in five starts in July...ranked sixth in the American League in July ERA...had eight wins at the All-Star Break, which are his most ever before the break (had six in 2016 and 2018)...is 14-5 with a 3.64 ERA (76 er in 187.2 ip) in 33 games, including 32 starts, since he was acquired by Oakland Aug. 6, 2018...went 4-0 with a 2.30 ERA and .212 opponents batting average in five starts in June...opponents are hitting .135 (5-for-37) with runners in scoring position and two outs.

NO-HITTER: Tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati to become the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams...with the acquisition of Homer Bailey on July 12 the A's become the sixth team in Major League history with two pitchers with multiple no-hitter on their roster...the last was the 1988 Houston Astros (Bob Forsch and Nolan Ryan)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history.

LAST START: He had his third straight no decision in the A's 6-3 win over Texas last Sunday in Oakland...blanked the Rangers on two hits and four walks over the first five innings and took a 1-0 lead into the sixth...allowed a pair of solo home runs to Santana and Mazaara but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the sixth to take a 4-2 lead...left after six innings but the bullpen allowed three runs in the eighth for the blown save...it was the sixth time this year he left with a lead only to have the bullpen blow the save.

RHP Tanner Roark (0-0, — ERA): Was acquired from Cincinnati on July 31 with cash considerations for minor league outfielder Jameson Hannah...is scheduled to make his first start with the A's after going 6-7 with a 4.24 ERA and .273 opponents batting average in 21 starts with the Reds...is 1-1 with a 1.47 ERA in three interleague starts this year, all against American League teams...has allowed a .230 opponents batting average against right-handed hitters compared to .320 against left-handers...does not have a wild pitch and his 110.1 innings pitched are fourth most in the majors among pitchers with no wild pitches...was the losing pitcher in his last start, an 11-4 loss to Pittsburgh at Cincinnati on Tuesday (3.1 ip, 6 h, 5 r, 5 er, 4 bb, 2 so)...is 2-3 with a 5.45 ERA (36.1 ip, 47 h, 25 r, 22 er, 13 bb, 26 so, 5 hr) in nine career appearances, including seven starts against St. Louis...is 0-0 with 2.61 ERA (10.1 ip, 11 h, 3 r, 3 er, 3 bb, 11 so, 1 hr) in two starts this year, both in Cincinnati.

- The A's bullpen has compiled a 2.95 ERA (36 er in 110.0 ip) over the last 32 games since June 23 and now has a 3.98 ERA for the season, which is fifth lowest in the American League.
- Have the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the AL (.389), rank third in OPS (.708), fifth in batting average (.242), and fifth in on-base percentage (.319).
- Is 26-for-48 (54.2%) in save opportunities...the 22 blown saves are tied for most in the majors...the save percentage is second lowest in the majors.
- Has the second fewest home runs (44) and fourth fewest walks (159) among AL bullpens...has the sixth fewest wins (19) and is tied for the fifth most losses (19).
- Has the second lowest slugging percentage against first batters (.333) among Major League bullpens.

- Has not allowed a run in 15 of his last 18 games (3 er in 10.1 ip, 2.61 ERA) and 22 of his last 26 (4 er in 15.0 ip, 2.40 ERA).
- Has not allowed a run in 29 of 34 games since he was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas April 29 for his second stint with the A's...has a 2.18 ERA (45er in 20.2 ip) and .227 (17-for-75) opponents batting average over that span...logged a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents average over his first 13 games before he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Has allowed a .230 (17-for-74) average against left-handed hitters, .364 (12-for-33) against right-handers.
- Has a 2.00 ERA (2 er in 9.0 ip) in 16 outings on no days rest, a 4.19 ERA (9 er in 19.1 ip) in his other 31 appearances
- Four of his six career outings against St. Louis have been scoreless, but has allowed three or more runs in two games (8.0 ip, 10 h, 7 r, 7 er, 2 bb, 7 so, 7.88 ERA).

Was signed by the A's to a minor league contract March 19 and began the season at Triple-A Nashville before he was selected on May 2...went 4-5 with a 4.48 ERA in 17 starts with Oakland in a season that was interrupted by two stints on the disabled list...was out from May 19 to July 7 with a strained left shoulder and Aug. 28 to Sept. 12 with a strained left forearm...walked just 13 batters in 80.1 innings for an average of 1.46 walks per nine innings...that was a career low and was second lowest in the American League among pitchers with 80 or more innings pitched (Kluber, CLE 1.46)...struck out just 47 but his 3.62 strikeout-to-walk ratio was a career high...his starts and innings pitched were his most since 2015 when he made 31 starts and tossed 180.1 innings with the Dodgers...was 2-1 with a 2.01 ERA and .191 opponents batting average in five starts at home compared to 2-4 with a 6.06 ERA and .335 opponent average in 12 starts on the road...surrendered one home run in 31.1 innings at home, nine in 49.0 innings on the road...is now 14-12 with a 3.48 ERA (97 er in 250.2 ip) in 44 career games in the Coliseum, 32-40 with a 4.35 ERA (276 er in 570.2 ip) in 113 games in all other ballparks...had a 1-2 record, a 6.08 ERA and .356 opponents batting average in six starts at the All-Star Break...then went 3-3 with a 3.81 ERA and .251 opponents average in 11 starts after the break...issued eight free passes in 23.2 innings before the break (3.04 per nine innings) and then walked just five batters in 56.2 innings after the break (0.79 per nine innings)...has a 19-30 career record before the break, 27-22 after the break...allowed a .285 opponents batting average, including .257 (18-for-70) against left-handed hitters compared to .293 (72-for-246) against right-handers...surrendered nine of his 10 home runs to righties...yielded a .333 batting average with runners in scoring position...opponents hit .280 when leading off an inning but he walked just three...was 0-2 with a 5.66 ERA in five starts on four days rest, 4-3 with a 4.07 ERA in 12 starts on five days rest or more...over the last two years, he is 1-3 with a 7.20 ERA (32 er in 40.0 ip) in 10 starts on four days rest, 7-6 with a 4.42 ERA (47 er in 95.2 ip) in 20 starts on five days rest or more...went 1-1 with a 2.61 ERA in four starts during the day, 3-4 with a 5.13 ERA in 13 starts at night...is 17-16 with a 3.46 ERA (111 er in 288.2 ip) in 55 career games during the day, 29-36 with a 4.43 ERA (262 er in 532.2 ip) in 102 games at night...was 0-1 with a 6.75 ERA in two interleague starts and is now 1-7 with a 5.93 ERA (36 er in 54.2 ip) in 11 career interleague starts...went 1-for-4 (.250) as a hitter and is now 8-for-79 (.101) with three doubles, five RBI and six walks in his career...tossed five innings or fewer in 10 of his 17 starts...walked one batter or fewer 14 times and received two runs of support or fewer 10 times.

strained left shoulder...allowed two runs in 6.1 innings in his first start May 2 at Seattle but had a no decision in the A's 3-2 win...it was his first start as an Athletic since April 24, 2013 at Boston...allowed a season-high nine runs on a season-high 10 hits and a season-high three walks in just 3.0 innings in his second start May 7 against Houston...left his start on May 18 at Toronto with the shoulder injury after tossing a season-low 1.0 inning...made three rehab starts with Nashville before he was reinstated from the DL July 8...went 3-2 with a 2.90 ERA and .239 opponents batting average in nine starts before returning to the DL Aug. 28 with a strained left forearm...combined with Petit, Buchter and Pagán on a five-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Cleveland July 8...it was his first win as an Athletic since April 7, 2013...tossed five of the innings, allowed three of the hits and walked two...it was the last time he walked more than one batter as he issued one free pass or fewer in each of his final 12 starts (5 bb in 60.0 ip, 0.75 walks per nine innings)...struck out a season-high six batters in a 15-3 win at Texas July 23...those were his most strikeouts in a game since Sept. 15, 2015 vs. Colorado...finished July with a 2-1 record, a 3.98 ERA and .309 opponents average in four...then went 1-1 with a 2.15 ERA and .184 opponents average in five starts in August...did not allow a run in three of his August starts and the game went into extra innings in two of his three no decisions...walked just two batters in 29.1 innings...logged 7.0 shutout innings Aug. 3 against Detroit but had a no decision in the A's 1-0, 13-inning win...allowed a two-run home run to Calhoun in the third inning Aug. 10 at Los Angeles (AL), which was the first home run he surrendered to a left-handed hitter since July 28, 2015 at Oakland (Reddick)...had a season-high 18.2-inning scoreless streak from Aug. 10 to 27...tossed a season-high 7.2 scoreless innings Aug. 15 against Seattle but had a no decision in the A's 2-0, 12-inning loss...it was his longest outing since Oct. 1, 2015 at San Francisco (7.2 ip) and his longest scoreless outing since May 26, 2011 at Los Angeles-AL (8.0 ip)...combined with Familia and Trivino on a two-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win over Texas on Aug. 21 in Oakland...tossed seven of the innings, allowed one of the hits and matched his season high with six strikeouts...allowed five runs on seven hits in 2.2 innings in an 11-4 loss at Houston Aug. 27 before going on the DL a second time...did not have a rehab assignment before he was reinstated Sept. 13...went 1-1 with a 6.46 ERA and .318 opponents batting average in four starts following his return...tossed 3.1 innings or fewer in three of those starts...combined with Dull, Montas and Brooks on a four-hit shutout in the A's 10-0 win over Los Angeles (AL) Sept. 19 in Oakland...tossed 6.2 innings and allowed three of the hits.

NASHVILLE: Went 2-1 with a 2.78 ERA and .248 opponents batting average in seven starts...did not allow a home run in 32.1 innings...struck out 36 (10.02 per nine innings) and walked just six (1.67 per nine innings) for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 6.0...his opponents batting average included a .223 (21-for-94) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .314 (11-for-35) against left-handers...yielded a .156 batting average and just one walk to batters leading off an inning (.182 on-base percentage)...opponents hit .182 with the bases empty, .346 with runners on...including .333 with runners in scoring position...was 1-1 with a 1.89 ERA in four starts when he was selected by Oakland May 2...returned on June 23 for a three-start rehab assignment and went 1-0 with a 4.05 ERA before he was reinstated from the DL July 8.

2017—Was signed by the Chicago Cubs Jan. 30 and went 2-2 with an 8.18 ERA in six starts before going on the disabled list May 7 with a strained lower back...missed nearly three months of the season and would not pitch for the Cubs again as he was released July 31...signed a minor league deal with Toronto Aug. 15 and returned to the majors Aug. 29...went 2-2 with a 5.13 ERA in seven starts for the Blue Jays and combined with both clubs for a 4-4 record and a 6.34 ERA in 13 starts...allowed a .322 opponents batting average, including .298 against right-handed hitters compared to .436 against left-handers...surrendered all five of his home runs to righties...yielded a .371 batting average with runners in scoring position...opponents hit .345 when leading off an inning, but he issued just one walk...went 1-2 with a 15.68 ERA in four starts at Wrigley Field and 1-2 with a 7.62 ERA in three starts in Rogers Centre for an 11.19 ERA in seven starts in his home ballparks...was 2-0 with a 2.81 ERA in six starts on the road...was 2-0 with a 2.05 ERA in four starts during the day, 2-4 with a 9.18 ERA in nine starts at night...was 1-1 with an 8.84 ERA in five starts on four days rest, 3-3 with a 5.00 ERA in eight starts on five days rest or more...had a 7.04 ERA over the first two innings of his starts, 3.06 after that...opponents were successful in 6-of-7 (85.7%) stolen base attempts...went 1-for-7 (.143) with a RBI, walk and three strikeouts in eight plate appearances with the Cubs...was in the Cubs starting rotation to open the season and

2013—Was the A's Opening Day starting pitcher but finished the season in the bullpen after spending four months on the disabled list with a stress fracture in his right foot...was 1-4 with three saves, a 6.04 ERA and .287 opponents batting average in 16 games, including five starts...struck out 46 in 44.2 innings, marking the first time in his career he finished with more strikeouts than innings pitched...walked 21 and his average of 4.23 walks per nine innings was the highest of his career...pitched 3.0 innings in each of his three saves to become the second A's pitcher since 1992 with three three-inning saves in one season (Doug Jones, 1999)...allowed a .214 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...made his first career Opening Day start April 1 against Seattle but was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss...struck out the side in the first inning to become the first A's pitcher since at least 1947 to strike out the side in the first inning on Opening Day...struck out a career-high tying 10 batters in 6.0 innings in his second start, a 9-3 win at Houston April 7...it was his only win of the season...tossed 1.0 inning April 19 at Tampa Bay, allowing four runs on four hits and two walks...left the game early with a sprained right ankle...was scheduled to skip his start April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) but ended up pitching 5.1 innings of relief that night in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win...entered the game in the 13th inning for the first relief appearance of his career after 73 starts...allowed just one run...was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 1 with a sprained right ankle...was diagnosed with a navicular stress fracture

of his right foot May 17 and was transferred to the 60-day DL June 14...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 28 and pitched exclusively in relief following his return, logging a 5.74 ERA and .306 opponents batting average in 10 appearances...recorded his first save in his first outing following his return Aug. 28 at Detroit...pitched the final three innings of the A's 14-4 win, allowing three runs on five hits in 3.0 innings.

2012—Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings...yielded a .148 average with runners in scoring position...was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts...left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so)...combined for a 1-1 record and a 4.62 ERA during a six-start rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...began his rehab assignment July 21 with Stockton, one year and seven days after having reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow...was transferred to Sacramento July 26.

2011—Was limited to just 13 starts and was 3-6 with a 4.00 ERA when he underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his left elbow July 14...went 2-1 with a 1.56 ERA over his first five starts and did not allow a home run in 34.2 innings...then went 1-5 with a 5.73 ERA over his final eight starts, yielding eight home runs in 48.2 innings...allowed a .270 opponents batting average, including a .252 against right-handed hitters and .303 against left-handers...his opponents average dropped to .221 with runners in scoring position...tied for seventh in the American League with five pick-offs...opponents were successful in just 5 of 12 (41.7%) stolen base attempts...tossed his second career complete game in his second start of the season but took the loss in a 2-1 decision at Minnesota April 8...matched his career high by tossing 9.0 innings May 5 against Cleveland, but had a no decision in the A's 4-3, 12-inning loss...allowed a career-high 10 runs on a career-high 11 hits in a 10-3 loss to New York May 31...allowed five runs on nine hits in 5.0 innings in his final start, a 6-3 loss at Boston June 5...was placed on the disabled list June 7 with left elbow soreness...received a Platelet Rich Plasma injection after he was examined by Dr. James Andrews at the Andrews Institute in Pensacola, Fla. June 13...was examined again a month later and it was determined that his injury required surgery...Dr. Andrews performed successful reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow, July 14.

2010—Lowered his ERA by more than a run from his rookie campaign of 2009 but two stints on the disabled list with elbow problems limited him to just 19 starts...was 7-6 with a 2.80 ERA after going 11-11 with a 4.06 ERA in his first season...opponents batted .257, including .225 with runners in scoring position...tied for eighth in the AL with four pickoffs...did not allow a run in his first two starts of the season April 8 against Seattle and April 13 at Seattle to become the first starting pitcher in Oakland history (among pitchers who began the season with the A's) to start the season with two consecutive scoreless outings...the last Athletics pitcher to do it was Alex Kellner of the 1953 Philadelphia A's, who started the season with back-to-back complete game shutouts...agreed to terms April 16 on a four-year contract through the 2013 season with club options for 2014 and 2015...had his season-opening scoreless streak snapped at 14.0 innings in his third start, an 8-3 loss to Baltimore...that was the third longest season-opening streak by a starter in Oakland history and the longest since Matt Keough set the record with a 16.0 inning streak in 1980...was 1-1 with a 2.35 ERA in four starts before going on the 15-day disabled list April 27 retroactive to April 25 with left elbow inflammation and a proximal medial forearm

strain...was reinstated from the DL May 29...had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...was reinstated July 30 and went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...finished the season with a career-high tying four-game winning streak...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA in six starts in September.

2009—Set an Oakland rookie record and led Major League rookies with 150 strikeouts...compiled an 11-11 record and 4.06 ERA in 30 starts...tied for third among American League rookies in games started, ranked fourth in innings pitched (175.1) and tied for fourth in wins...is one of four 21-year olds in Oakland history to win 10 or more games...went 8-4 with a 2.96 ERA over his final 17 starts, beginning June 29...was charged with 15 unearned runs, which tied for the most in the AL...also ranked tied for fifth in grounded into double plays (24), tied for seventh in shutouts (1) and pickoffs (4), eighth in walks per nine innings (2.31) and strikeout to walk ratio (3.33), and 10th in strikeouts per nine innings (7.70)...his season run support of 4.62 was eighth lowest in the AL...did not have a wild pitch and his 175.1 innings were the most in the majors among pitchers with no wild pitches...did not commit an error in 29 total chances, all assists...tied for the lead among AL pitchers in double plays (5) and tied for fourth in assists...was ranked number 7 on *Baseball America's* Top 100 Prospects lists entering the season...was the losing pitcher in his Major League debut, a 5-4 A's loss to Seattle April 10...allowed five runs in 6.0 innings, with all five runs coming in the second inning...recorded his first Major League win May 20 at Tampa Bay when he yielded four runs on four hits and no walks in 6.0 innings in a 7-6 A's win...at the age of 21 years, 108 days, he became the sixth youngest pitcher in Oakland history to record his first ML win...tossed a complete game two-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Boston July 6 (2 bb, 9 so)...at the age of 21 years, 155 days he became the fifth youngest pitcher in Oakland history to toss a shutout and the youngest since Mike Norris July 4, 1976 against Kansas City...did not allow a run over his next two starts, including July 19 against Los Angeles when he retired each of the first 20 batters he faced before Bobby Abreu singled with two outs in the seventh inning to break up the perfect game...became the second rookie in Oakland history to take a perfect game into the seventh inning (Mike Norris, June 28, 1976)...had a career-high 23.0-inning scoreless streak from July 6 to 24...was named American League Rookie of the Month for September after going 4-0 with a 2.28 ERA in four starts...struck out a career-high 10 batters and tossed 6.0 shutout innings in a 2-1 win over Cleveland Sept. 18.

2008—Combined for an 11-5 record and a 3.69 ERA in 20 games, 19 starts, with Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland in his first season in the A's organization...also pitched for the United States team in the All-Star Futures Game at Yankee Stadium July 13 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb) and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 13 h, 8 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 10 so, 2 hr) in two starts during the Olympics...was rated as the A's number one prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...was named California League Pitcher of the Week, June 9-15...won both of his starts and allowed just one run in 14.0 innings, while striking out 16...joined Team USA for the Olympics in August...had a no decision Aug. 16 in a 5-4 win over Canada (5.2 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 so)...then started and won in the Bronze Medal game Aug. 23 against Japan, an 8-4 win (7.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 6 so).

2007—Was Arizona's second round pick in 2006 but did not sign until Sept. 1, 2006...made his professional debut in 2007 and was a combined 11-7 with a 3.07 ERA in 23 games, all starts, with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Visalia...was 8-4 with a 2.21 ERA in 14 starts at South Bend and was a *Baseball America* Low Class A All-Star...made one postseason start for Visalia and took the loss (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so, 2.25 ERA)...was traded to the A's on December 14 and was named Oakland's third best prospect by *Baseball America*.

Brett F. Anderson was originally signed by Diamondbacks scout Joe Robinson...graduated from Stillwater (OK) High School...was a *Baseball America* 1st Team High School All-America selection in 2006 after going 9-0 with two saves and a 0.37 ERA in 12 games as a senior...struck out 102 and walked just nine in 57 innings...his father, Frank, was the head baseball coach at Oklahoma

State University from 2003-12 and is now pitching coach at the University of Houston...was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after-school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.

LAST START: He had his third straight no decision in the A's 6-3 win over Texas last Sunday in Oakland...blanked the Rangers on two hits and four walks over the first five innings and took a 1-0 lead into the sixth...allowed a pair of solo home runs to Santana and Mazaara but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the sixth to take a 4-2 lead...left after six innings but the bullpen allowed three runs in the eighth for the blown save...it was the sixth time this year he left with a lead only to have the bullpen blow the save.

- Hit safely in each of his five games against the Indians (7-for-22, .318) and has now hit safely in all 11 of his career games against Cleveland...is 18-for-43 (.419) with 12 runs, six doubles, a triple, four home runs and eight RBI (.884 slugging percentage, 1.363 OPS).
- Homered in a **career-high** tying three consecutive games from May 25-27 (also July 22-24, 2017).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run June 20 against Tampa Bay, a three-run shot off Castillo.
- Had a **career-high** six RBI June 30 at Los Angeles (AL) when he went 3-for-5 with a double, triple and home run...became the 10th player in Oakland history to fall a single short of the cycle (last: Canha, May 19, 2017)...drove in five runs nine games later against Seattle on July 16.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star Team June 30...finished second on the Player Ballot to Alex Bregman, who was voted in by the fans...walked in his only at bat in the All-Star Game July 9 at Cleveland and also scored a run...is the fifth third baseman in Oakland history to be named to the All-Star team (Bando, 1969, 72-74; Gross, 1977; Lansford, 1988; Donaldson, 2014).
- Also participated in the Home Run Derby on July 8 and hit 13 home runs in a first round loss to Vladimir Guerrero, Jr. (29).

JHAREL COTTON

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL March 27.
- Began a rehab assignment at Single-A Stockton May 17 and went 0-1 with a 6.43 ERA in three games, including two starts, before his rehab was halted May 29 due to a hamstring injury.
- Underwent right hamstring debridement surgery June 6, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper at the North Central Surgical Center in Dallas, Tex.

KHRIS DAVIS

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.

- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.
- Homered twice on May 13 at Seattle to snap a 20-game homerless streak, which was his longest as an Athletic...it was his third multi-homer game of the season, his 19th as an Athletic and the 25th of his career.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list May 24 retroactive to May 22 with a left hip/oblique contusion and did not have a rehab assignment...suffered the injury on May 5 in Pittsburgh but played in seven of the A's 15 games following that before going on the IL, batting .346 with two home runs and three RBI...was reinstated from the IL June 1.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts July 26 against Texas...it was his 10th career four-strikeout game, his second this year (April 26 at Toronto).

RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.
- Did not allow a run in six appearances with the Aviators and had two saves and 14 strikeouts in 9.2 innings when he was recalled by Oakland April 22.
- Allowed at least one run in four of his next five appearances (7.11 ERA, .433 opponents batting average) and was optioned back to Las Vegas May 2.

MARCO ESTRADA

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and was 0-2 with a 6.85 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day injured list April 17 with a lumbar strain.

MIKE FIERS

- Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).
- Put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts.
- That gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then allowed a [season-high](#) six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average
- Began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, [matching](#) the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...walked a [season-high](#) four.
- Struck out a [season-high](#) six batters April 12 at Texas.
- Yielded a [season-high](#) nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss to Toronto on April 20...it was his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a six-game Coliseum winning streak
- Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42).
- Then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May...had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124).
- Tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati (also Aug. 21, 2015 vs. Los Angeles-NL)...walked two and struck out a [season-high](#) tying six...also tossed a [season-high](#) 131 pitches, which were [the most](#) by an A's pitcher since Mark

Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...retired the first 11 before Winker reached base on an error with two outs in the fourth...set down the next seven before walking Suarez to start the seventh...Suarez was erased on a double play, Puig walked and Fiers then retired the final seven batters to complete the no-hitter.

- Became the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters... is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea last year on April 21...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has **two** career complete games, both no-hitters...according to Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).
- Had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May 13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...left with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth for the blown save...it was the first of **five** times he left a game with the lead only to have the bullpen blow the save (May 31, June 22, July 3 and July 18).
- Was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...**is the pitcher of record**.
- Allowed one earned run or fewer in five consecutive starts from June 17 to July 12 and was 3-0 with a 1.09 ERA over that span.
- Hit an **Oakland-record tying** three batters June 22 against Tampa Bay (11th time, previous: Raul Alcantara, Sept. 5, 2016).
- Went 4-0 with a 2.30 ERA and .212 opponents batting average in five starts in June...it was the third time in his career he won four games in a month (4-2 in Aug. 2012 and 4-1 in Aug. 2014)...had the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the American League in June (.283), tied for the lead in wins, had the fourth lowest OPS (.561) and ranked fifth in ERA.
- Retired the side in order in the first inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his 1,000th career inning pitched.
- Walked a **season-high tying** four batters July 18 at Minnesota

DANIEL GOSSETT

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.
- Had his third career four-hit game June 5 at Los Angeles (AL), his first since Sept. 18, 2016 at New York (NL).
- Had a RBI single off Chaz Roe in the ninth inning on June 10 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit.

CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.

- Began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas June 13 and hit .333 with four home runs and 13 RBI in 13 games...reached base safely in each contest (.397 on-base percentage)...appeared in eight games at catcher and five at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL July 2 and went 1-for-3 with a grand slam and four RBI in his Oakland debut that night against Minnesota...became the first player in Athletics history (1901-present) to hit a grand slam in his first game with the A's.
- The grand slam was the second of his career (July 23, 2013 at Los Angeles-AL) and the four RBI **matched** his career high (third time, last: April 23, 2016 vs. Pittsburgh).
- Then was a perfect 4-for-4 two days later against the Twins for his first career four-hit game.
- Played an inning in left field July 22 at Houston, which was his first game in the outfield since Oct. 1, 2017 (also left field).

LIAM HENDRIKS

- Had a then **career-high 14.2**-inning scoreless streak from April 30 to May 28...allowed three runs in 4.1 innings over his next four games and then had a **career-high 20.2**-inning scoreless streak from June 6 to July 20.
- Was named American League Reliever of the Month for June after going 1-0 with two saves and a 0.60 ERA in 14 relief appearances...allowed just one run in 15.0 innings while striking out 22...it was his first career Reliever of the Month award.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star team as a replacement for Tampa Bay's Charlie Morton...pitched the sixth inning in the All-Star Game on July 9 in Cleveland (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 3 so, 1 hr)...the three strikeouts were the most by an Athletic in an All-Star Game since Jay Howell also had three in 1987.

NICK HUNDLEY

- Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston (**also** June 18 vs. Baltimore).
- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.
- Reached base safely in a **career-high 28** consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second longest reaching base streak by a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979).
- Had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland, his second career game-ending RBI...the other was Aug. 3, 2018 vs. Detroit, also a single.
- Had a **career-high and A's season-high 16**-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...it matched the longest hitting streak by an Athletic over the last eight years...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak.
- Had an Oakland **record-tying** streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973).
- Had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI (Aug. 20, 2018 vs. Texas) and his first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB).
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts June 20 against Tampa Bay, his first career four-strikeout game.
- Was hit by a pitch an Oakland record-tying two times June 22 against Tampa Bay.
- Had seven home runs and 22 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for fourth in the AL in RBI in June.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of July 15-21 after going 13-for-24 (.542) with 10 runs, six doubles, two home runs, two RBI and five multiple hit games in six games...it was his first career weekly honor.

SEAN MANAEA

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

NICK MARTINI

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 8 and hit .302 with 10 RBI and seven walks (.392 on-base percentage) in 12 games before he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas May 28.
- Was recalled by Oakland July 22 and went 0-for-2 with a strikeout that day at Houston...also pitched a scoreless eighth inning in the A's 11-1 loss (2 bb, 1 so)...it marked the 14th time in Oakland history a position player pitched...it was the second time this year and seventh time in the last five years.

KENDRYS MORALES

- Was acquired from the Toronto Blue Jays for minor league infielder Jesus Lopez and international slot money March 27.
- Made his second career appearance as a pitcher April 20 against Toronto in the ninth inning (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the other came on May 20, 2018 against Oakland at Toronto (1.0 ip, 1 bb)...it marked the 13th time in Oakland history a position player pitched, the sixth time in the last five years...is just the third to allow a run and is the first two walk two batters...the last was Jake Smolinski last year on June 13 against Houston.
- Matt Olson returned from the IL May 7 and Morales was batting .204 with a home run and seven RBI in 34 games when he was designated for assignment May 13...was traded to the New York Yankees the next day with cash for a player to be named later or cash considerations.

MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators, including three at first base and two at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL May 7.
- Committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...it was the fourth longest errorless in Oakland history by a first baseman.
- Had his fifth career multi-homer game June 28 at Los Angeles-AL (last: July 22, 2018 vs. San Francisco) and matched his career high with five RBI (June 1, 2018 at Kansas City).
- Had a [career-high](#) 16-game hitting streak from June 30 to July 21, which tied for fifth longest in Oakland history by a first baseman...went 19-for-64 (.297) with four home runs and nine RBI during the streak.
- Batted .262 with seven doubles, nine home runs and 20 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for second in the AL in June extra base hits (16) and tied for third in home runs (9).

JOSH PHEGLEY

- Had a [career-high](#) nine-game hitting streak from April 2-14...went 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...scored a run in each of the last seven games during the streak and drove in a run in each of the last six.

- Went 4-for-5 with two doubles, a home run, and a career-high eight RBI May 3 at Pittsburgh... it was his first career four-hit game...became just the 13th catcher in Major League history to drive in eight or more runs in game, the first Athletic...was the fifth Oakland Athletic with eight or more RBI in a game, the first since Eric Chavez on Aug. 30, 2001.
- Had his second career four-hit game May 16 at Detroit.
- Tied for ninth in the AL with 20 RBI in May...those are his **most** RBI in a month, topping his 13 from April this year.

CHAD PINDER

- Snapped a 0-for-12 streak as a pinch hitter June 18 against Baltimore with his first career pinch home run...it was his first pinch hit since Sept. 9, 2018.

STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...**matched his career high in hits (fourth time) and RBI (fifth time)**...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.
- Reached base safely in a **career-high** 25 consecutive games from April 28 to May 29...hit .280 with a .357 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 8 against Cincinnati, a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 13th.
- Had his second career four-strikeout game May 13 at Seattle (also Aug. 30, 2016 at Milwaukee).
- Collected his 500th career hit May 16 at Detroit.
- Had successful surgery June 13 to remove a melanoma from his right ear...the procedure was performed by Dr. Brian Parrett at the California Pacific Medical Campus.

JURICKSON PROFAR

- Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).
- Committed his eighth error of the season in his 28th game at second base May 3 at Pittsburgh...then had a 25-game errorless streak from May 4 to June 1.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 16 at Detroit.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 21 at Cleveland, which ties an Athletics record.
- Finished May with six home runs, which **matched** his most ever in a month (September, 2018)
- Had his second career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle (also June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).

FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

MARCUS SEMIEN

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris,

Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.

- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping what was then a career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018...did not make his second error until June 2 for a 41-game errorless streak from April 12-June 1...that [tied for fourth](#) longest in Athletics history by a shortstop.
- Led off the game with a home run May 28 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the third lead-off home run of his career.
- Was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 1 against Houston.
- Had a career-high 17-game hitting streak from June 4 to 20...hit .375 (27-for-72) with 16 runs, five doubles, a triple, three home runs and 13 RBI during the streak, which is the [longest in the AL this year](#) and the longest single-season hitting streak by an Athletic since a 22-game streak by Eric Byrnes from May 8-June 1, 2003 (Mark Ellis had a 17-game hitting streak from Sept. 21, 2010-April 5, 2011)
- Went 4-for-5 with three runs, two home runs and four RBI June 7 at Texas...it was his fourth career multi-homer game and his sixth four-hit game.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of June 3-9 after going 13-for-31 (.419) with seven runs, two doubles, two home runs, nine RBI and three walks...it was the first weekly award of his career.
- Hit his 10th home run of the season June 15 and is the first Athletic to reach double figures in home runs in five consecutive seasons since Mark Ellis from 2005-09...is the 18th player in Oakland history with five or more 10-homer seasons.
- Tied for fourth in the AL in hits in June (35).
- Went 2-for-4 with two home runs and five RBI July 4 against Minnesota...it was his second two-homer game of the season and the fifth of his career...one of the home runs was a grand slam, the fourth of his career...it was his second career five-RBI game (Sept. 20, 2018 vs. Los Angeles-AL).

JOAKIM SORIA

- Was on his 11th career Opening Day roster and made his Oakland debut in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...the A's became his seventh team in 12 seasons in the majors.
- Was charged with the loss March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) when he surrendered a [career-high tying](#) four runs without retiring a batter (11th time, first since Sept. 1, 2018 at Washington).
- Made his first career start June 5 at Los Angeles (AL) as the A's "opener" (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 so)...it came in his 667th career appearance...his career-opening streak of 666 appearances before making his first start was the longest in Major League history, topping the 638 games by Troy Percival before his first start on Sept. 30, 2007.

BEAU TAYLOR

- Was batting .297 with 33 walks and a .450 on-base percentage in 38 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland June 8.
- Made his first career start June 10 at Tampa Bay and went 0-for-2.
- Hit his first career home run June 18 against Baltimore, a solo shot off Gabriel Ynoa in the third inning.

BLAKE TREINEN

- Walked four batters April 7 at Houston, his most ever as a reliever...also allowed his first run of the season in that game and was charged with the loss and blown save...it snapped a streak of 24.1 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run, dating back to Aug. 25, 2018.
- Allowed his first run at home on May 11 against Cleveland, snapping a streak of 32.0 consecutive scoreless innings at home dating back to 2018...that was the longest home scoreless streak in Oakland history by a reliever and third longest overall...it was the first time he allowed a run at home since July 21, 2018 vs. San Francisco.
- Allowed a run in the 12th inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his first home loss since Sept. 5, 2017...it snapped a 10-game Coliseum winning streak, which matched the longest home winning streak ever by an Oakland pitcher (Paul Lindblad, April 21, 1975-June 25, 1976).

LOU TRIVINO
