OAKLAND ATHLETICS (74-55) VS. KANSAS CITY ROYALS (46-85)

ABOUT THE A'S: Were swept in a two-game series by San Francisco over the weekend after sweeping a three-game series from American League East leading New York and taking two of three from AL West leading Houston... are now 7-3 over the last 10 games...are 13-7 (.650) in August, which is the third best record in the AL...are 24-14 (.632) since the All-Star Break, which is also third best in the AL...are 74-55 (.574) overall, which is sixth best in the AL and eight best in the majors...trail Tampa Bay by ½-game for the second AL Wild Card Spot and are one game behind Cleveland for the first spot...have been in second place in the AL West every day dating back to July 2 and trail first place Houston by 9½ games...have spent 60 days in second in the West, one day tied for second, 44 days in third, six days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, seven days tied for fourth and 17 days in fifth.

THE MIDDLE OF JUNE: The A's were 36-36 (.500) at the conclusion of play on June 16 but have gone 38-19 (.667) since then, which is the third best record in the majors...last year, the A's were 34-36 (.486) through June 15 but then went 63-29 (.685) from June 16 through the end of the season, which was the best record in the majors.

AGAINST THE CENTRAL: The A's are 17-5 (.773) against American League Central teams and have outscored them 130-68 (+62)...are batting .274 (221-for-807) with 130 runs (5.65 per game) and 39 home runs in 23 games (includes May 19 suspended game)...the pitching staff has a 2.77 ERA (64 er in 207.2 ip) and .231 (176-for-761) opponents batting average...are now 69-24 (.742) against the Central dating back to Aug. 23, 2016.

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit 204 home runs, which is tied for eighth most in the most but is seventh most in Athletics history (sixth is 205 in 2002, fifth is 227 in 2018)...have set a franchise record for most players with 10 or more home runs (10) and have tied the mark for most players with 20 or more home runs (5)...are one of two teams with at least five players with 20 or more home runs (Twins, 6) and one of four with at least 10 players with 10 or more home runs (Twins, Yankees and Blue Jays 11)...have two games this year where all nine players in the starting lineup had at least 10 home runs (Aug. 21 and 24) and seven in Athletics history (the other five were in 2000)...have just four wins when going homerless, which is second fewest in the majors (Seattle, 2)...the Athletics record for fewest wins in a season when going homerless is six in 2017...have hit back-to-back home runs 11 times, which is tied for second most in Oakland history (13 in 2000).

PITCHING: The A's have a 4.06 ERA (154 er in 341.2 ip) since the All-Star Break after posting a 4.06 ERA before the break...rank third in the American League in post-break ERA and fourth overall...also rank second in fewest home runs (155), third in opponents OPS (.715) and slugging percentage (.404), tied for third in shutouts (8) and fourth in batting average (.244) and on-base percentage (.311).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 5-1 with a 3.66 ERA (24 er in 59.0 ip) over the last 10 games and 11-5 with a 3.17 ERA (51 er in 144.2 ip) over the last 24 contests...are 53-33 with a 4.02 ERA overall and the wins surpass the season total of 52 from last year...rank third in the American League in wins and rank fourth in innings pitched (718.1) and ERA.

OFFENSE: The A's have struck out 1046 times, which is third fewest in the American League...have five sacrifice hits, which is tied for second fewest...the Oakland record for fewest sacrifice hits in a season is six last year...have been hit by a pitch 67 times, which is second in the AL and fifth most in Athletics history (4th is 68 in 2002)...are third in the AL in most grounded into double plays (114).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed seven errors in the last eight games but have just 69 for the season, which is third fewest in the American League...the Athletics record for fewest errors in a non-strike season is 84 in 2006...the errors have led to 27 unearned runs, which is the fewest in the majors...the fewest in Athletics history in a non-strike season is 42 in 1991...rank third in the AL in fewest double plays (92) and tied for fourth in fewest outfield assists (16)...are second in the majors in opponents caught stealing (34).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin a seven-game road trip to Kansas City (four games) and New York-AL (three games) tonight...went 4-4 on the last road trip to Chicago-NL (1-2), Chicago-AL (2-1) and San Francisco (1-1)...are 26-14 over their last 41 road games (includes May 19 suspended game) after starting the year 5-15 on the road...are 31-29 (.517) on the road compared to 43-26 (.623) at home...have clinched a winning record at home for the third consecutive season...went 6-3 on the last homestand against Houston (3-1), New York-AL (3-0) and San Francisco (0-2) and are 25-10 (.714) over the last 35 home games after starting the year 18-16 (.556).

LEFT AND RIGHT: The A's are 22-11 (.667) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 52-44 (.542) against right-handers...the mark against lefties is second best in the American League to Houston (28-9) but the 33 games are third fewest...are batting .266 with an .818 OPS against left-handed pitchers compared to .240 with a .748 OPS against right-handers...rank fourth in the AL in OPS off lefties and fifth in batting average but have the fourth lowest batting average and sixth lowest OPS against righties...the OPS against lefties is currently the best mark in Oakland history (.816 in 1994).

CLOSE CALLS: The A's fell to 20-16 (.556) in one-run games with the loss yesterday, which is the third best record in the American League...are 36-27 (.571) in games decided by two runs or fewer, which is tied for third best...the 63 games however are the most in the AL and tied for sixth most in the majors...rank second in the majors in walk-off wins (9) but are tied for third in the AL in walk-off losses (7)...are third in the AL in most losses when leading after seven innings (7).

THIS AND THAT: A's pinch hitters lead the American League in RBI (22), are tied for the lead in home runs (5) and rank second in hits (21), doubles (6) and extra base hits (11)

THE INJURED LIST: The A's placed Stephen Piscotty on the injured list today, which is the 16th time they have used the IL this year...only Kansas City (12), Houston (15) and San Francisco (15) have used the IL fewer times...had used the IL at least 23 times in each of the previous four seasons...currently have four players on the IL (Gossett, Laureano, Manaea and Piscotty) and have had at least three players on the IL every day since July 30, 2011.

A's vs. ROYALS: The A's and Royals meet for the first time this year tonight... Oakland has already finished the season series with three American League Central teams plus four teams from the East...the A's won the season series last year, 5-2...won three of four in Oakland and two of three in Kansas City... have won 14 of the last 19 games against the Royals and have outscored Kansas City 119-57 over that span (6.3 runs per game to 3.0 runs)...have won eight of the last 10 in Kansas City...all-time, the A's are 322-265 (.549) against the Royals...the only American League team the A's have a better record against is Tampa Bay (.589)...are 175-118 in Oakland and 147-147 in Kansas City.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Mark Canha was named American League Player of the Week today after going 9-for-19 (474) with five runs, four home runs and seven RBI in five games last week...**Matt Chapman** has 29 home runs and needs one more to join Sal Bando and Eric Chavez as the only players in Athletics history to hit 30 home runs as a third baseman...**Liam Hendriks** has 15 saves, a 1.35 ERA (4 er in 26.2 ip), 46 strikeouts and two walks (both intentional) in 25 games since taking over as the A's closer when Treinen went on the IL June 21...**Matt Olson** leads AL first basemen in home runs (26), total chances (865), putouts (789) and assists (70) despite missing 34 games while on the injured list...**Marcus Semien** is one of four players in the AL to appear in each of his teams games (Merrifield and Soler, KC; Villar, BAL) and has a consecutive games played streak of 211 dating back to June 28 of last year (all starts).

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1916** Joe Bush no-hits Cleveland 5-0 in Philadelphia after lasting just three innings against Cleveland a day earlier...in **1973** Ken Holtzman tosses a four-hit shutout to improve to 19-11 in the A's 1-0 win over New York... Vic Davalillo's pinch hit RBI single in the eighth inning drives in the only run of the game...in **2011** the A's tie an Oakland record with eight doubles in a 15-5 win at Boston.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Homer Bailey (11-8, 5.06 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Was acquired from Kansas City on July 14 for minor league infielder Kevin Merrell minutes before he was scheduled to start for the Royals against Detroit...is 4-2 with a 5.68 ERA (24 er in 38.0 ip) and .273 (42-for-154) opponents batting average in seven starts with the A's after going 7-6 with a 4.80 ERA and .250 opponents average in 18 starts with Kansas City, all before the All-Star Break...has allowed three runs or fewer in five of his seven starts with the A's but yielded seven and nine runs in his other two...has tossed five innings or fewer in 12 of his 25 starts overall.

AGAINST THE CENTRAL: Is 4-0 with a 2.42 ERA (12 er in 44.2 ip) in eight starts against American League Central competition compared to 7-8 with a 6.48 ERA (60 er in 83.1 ip) in 17 starts against all other teams.

HOME AND AWAY: Since joining the A's, he is 3-0 with a 2.96 ERA (8 er in 24.1 ip) in four starts in the Coliseum and 1-2 with a 10.54 ERA (16 er in 13.2 ip) in two starts on the road...for the season, he is 7-3 with a 3.87 ERA (34 er in 79.0 ip) in 14 starts in his home ballparks compared to 4-5 with a 6.98 ERA (38 er in 49.0 ip) in 11 starts on the road...is tied for eighth in the American League in home wins.

CAREER NOTES: Picked up his 11th win of the season in his last start, which are his most wins since 2013 when he had 11 with Cincinnati...has won more than 11 games once and that was in 2012 when he had 13 for the Reds...was a combined 9-27 over his previous four seasons...his 25 starts are also his most since 2013 (32) and his 128.0 innings pitched and 116 strikeouts are his most since 2014 (145.2 ip, 124 so).

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Struck out a season-high eight batters in 5.0 innings in his Kansas City debut April 3 against Minnesota but had a no decision in a 7-6 loss...left with a 6-3 lead but the bullpen blew the save...it was the first of three times the pen blew a save in one of his starts (June 7 vs. Chicago-AL, July 4 vs. Cleveland)...picked up his first win as a Royal April 13 against Cleveland when he tossed 7.0 scoreless innings...it was his first win since May 12, 2018 at Los Angeles (NL) and it snapped a career-high 10-game losing streak...posted a 6.88 ERA and .333 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned 13 starts from May 18, 2018 to April 8, 2019...was 2-1 with a 4.30 ERA and .220 opponents batting average over his first four starts through April 18...then went 2-5 with a 6.87 ERA and .310 opponents batting average over his next nine starts from April 23 to June 7...walked a season-high four batters (also May 16 vs. Texas and June 29 at Toronto) in a season-low 1.0 innings April 23 at Tampa Bay...it was his shortest start since Aug. 28, 2016 at Arizona, also 1.0 inning...had a season-high three-game losing streak that spanned four starts from May 16 to June 1...had a 9.64 ERA and .350 opponents batting average during the streak...then went 4-0 with a 2.57 ERA and .227 opponents batting average over a six start stretch from June 13 to July 17...the four-game winning streak was his longest since May 23-June 8, 2014, when he also won four in a row...won three consecutive starts from June 13 to 23 and allowed just one run in 19.0 innings (0.47 ERA)...did not allow a run in back-to-back starts on June 13 against Detroit (6.0 ip) and June 18 at Seattle (7.2 ip) as part of a 16.2-inning scoreless streak from June 13 to 23...combined with Lopez and McCarthy on a six-hit shutout in the latter contest against the Mariners...tossed a season-high 7.2 innings, which was his longest scoreless outing since a complete-game on June 29, 2014 at San Francisco...also had a season-high 121 pitches...finished June 3-1 with a 3.48 ERA...it was his first three-win month since June of 2014 (3-1)...then had a no decision in his final start as a Royal on July 4 against Cleveland...was the winning pitcher in his A's debut, allowing two runs in 6.0 innings in a 10-2 victory over Seattle in Oakland on July 17...allowed a season-high nine runs on a season-high eight hits in 2.0 innings in an 11-1 loss at Houston July 22...became the eighth pitcher in Oakland history to allow nine or more runs in two innings or fewer, the first since Jesse Hahn on June 22, 2017, also against Houston (10 r in 2.0 ip)...tossed seven scoreless innings in a 9-5 win at San Francisco Aug. 14 and went 2-for-3 with a RBI at the plate for his sixth career multiple hit game.

LAST START: He won his second consecutive start in the A's 6-2 win over New York (AL) last Tuesday in Oakland...struck out a season-high tying eight batters in 5.2 innings...yielded a two-out solo home run to Sanchez in the first inning but that was the only run he would allow...the A's came back with three in the bottom of first and another in the fourth.

2018 RECAP: Was on the Reds' Opening Day roster for the first time since 2014...recorded 20 starts, his highest total since 2014, while he tied for second in the National League with 14 losses...had the lowest run support (2.54) in the majors among pitchers that worked at least 100.0 innings...missed nearly seven weeks of action with right knee inflammation, going on the disabled list June 2...was reinstated on July 23...did not pitch after Sept. 5...was traded to the Los Angeles Dodgers Dec. 21 with infielder Jeter Downs in exchange for catcher/infielder Kyle Farmer, outfielder Matt Kemp, outfielder Yasiel Puig and cash considerations...was released later that day.

RHP Mike Fiers (12-3, 3.46 ERA):	Is 10-0 with a 2.44 ERA and .206 opponents batting average over his last 19 starts dating back to his May 7 no-hitter against Cincinnati...the winning streak is a career-high and one of eight winning streaks of 10 or more games in Oakland history...is tied for the second longest streak in the majors this year (11, Cole, May 27-present)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, his streak of 19 consecutive starts without a loss is tied with Jarrod Parker (2013) for second longest in Athletics history...the longest is a 21-start streak by Lefty Grove in 1931...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 6-4 A's win over New York-AL last Wednesday in Oakland (5.1 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 4 so)...is 2-3 with a 5.30 ERA (35.2 ip, 25 r, 25 er, 13 bb, 14 so, 4 hr) in seven career appearances, all starts, against Kansas City...was 1-0 with a 6.75 ERA (9.1 ip, 16 h, 9 r, 7 er, 2 bb, 1 so) in two starts last year, both with Detroit.

- Has the second lowest opponents slugging percentage in the AL (.398), rank third in OPS (.715), and fifth in on-base percentage (.317) and batting average (.242).
- Is 32-for-56 (57.1%) in save opportunities...the 24 blown saves are tied for second most in the majors.
- Has allowed the second fewest home runs (56) and has the fourth fewest walks (179) among AL bullpens...has the fifth fewest wins (21).
- Has the fifth lowest slugging percentage against first batters (.359) among Major League bullpens.

- Has not allowed a run in 34 of 41 games since he was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas April 29 for his second stint with the A's...has a 2.20 ERA (7 er in 28.2 ip) and .235 (24-for-104) opponents batting average over that span...logged a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents average over his first 13 games before he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Has allowed a .244 (21-for-86) average against left-handed hitters, .300 (15-for-50) against right-handers.

- Is tied for second among American League relievers in games pitched (62).
- Had a 4.75 ERA with a .212 opponents batting average in 48 games with Kansas City.
- Has struck out 70 batters in 51.0 ip and his average of 12.35 strikeouts per nine innings ranks 14th among American League relievers.

- Is the first player in Oakland A's history with at least 30 doubles, five triples, 20 home runs and 70 walks in one season...the last Athletic to do it was Bob Johnson in 1941.

Last Year: Batted .255 with 15 home runs and 70 RBI in 159 games...had career highs in runs (89), hits (161), doubles (35) and stolen bases (14)...is one of nine Major Leaguers with at least 10 HR and 10 SB in each of the last four seasons.

allowed just one run over his first two starts...struck out a season-high five batters and allowed six runs on a season-high eight hits in 3.2 innings on April 18 against Milwaukee, but had a no decision in a 9-7 win...walked a career-high six batters April 24 at Pittsburgh, but allowed three runs in a season-high 6.0 innings for the win...finished April 2-0 with a 3.54 ERA in four starts...was placed on the 10-day disabled list May 7 with a strained lower back...it was his 10th career stint on the DL...was transferred to the 60-day DL June 8...went 2-2 with a 4.61 ERA in six games, including five starts, on a rehab assignment with Double-A Tennessee from June 25 to July 23...was reinstated from the DL and designated for assignment July 26...was released July 31 and signed a minor league deal with Toronto Aug. 15...went 1-1 with a 0.93 ERA in two starts with Triple-A Buffalo before he was selected by the Blue Jays Aug. 29...started and lost that day to Boston, despite allowing just one run in 5.2 innings...tossed a season-high tying 6.0 innings in his next two starts on Sept. 3 at Baltimore and Sept. 9 against Detroit...picked up his first win as a Blue Jay and matched his season-best with five strikeouts in the start against the Tigers...had a win and a 2.70 ERA over his final two starts.

2016—In his second and final season with the Dodgers, missed a majority of the season due to injury...all told, pitched in four games (three starts), allowing 15 runs in 11.1 innings while going 1-2...in March, underwent arthroscopic surgery to repair a bulging disk in his lower back...began the season on the 60-day disabled list...went a combined 0-1 with a 2.25 ERA in three rehab starts with Single-A Rancho Cucamonga and Triple-A Oklahoma City before he was reinstated, Aug. 14...was placed on the 15-day DL Aug. 23 (retro to Aug. 21) with a blister on his left index finger...was reinstated Sept. 22 and pitched in two games (one start), going 1-0 with a 4.91 ERA.

2013—Was the A's Opening Day starting pitcher but finished the season in the bullpen after spending four months on the disabled list with a stress fracture in his right foot...was 1-4 with three saves, a 6.04 ERA and .287 opponents batting average in 16 games, including five starts...struck out 46 in 44.2 innings, marking the first time in his career he finished with more strikeouts than innings pitched...walked 21 and his average of 4.23 walks per nine innings was the highest of his career...pitched 3.0 innings in each of his three saves to become the second A's pitcher since 1992 with three three-inning saves in one season (Doug Jones, 1999)...allowed a .214 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...made his first career Opening Day start April 1 against Seattle but was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss...struck out the side in the first inning to become the first A's pitcher since at least 1947 to strike out the side in the first inning on Opening Day...struck out a career-high tying 10 batters in 6.0 innings in his second start, a 9-3 win at Houston April 7...it was his only win of the season...tossed 1.0 inning April 19 at Tampa Bay, allowing four runs on four hits and two walks...left the game early with a sprained right ankle...was scheduled to skip his start April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) but ended up pitching 5.1 innings of relief that night in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win...entered the game in the 13th inning for the first relief appearance of his career after 73 starts...allowed just one run...was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 1 with a sprained right ankle...was diagnosed with a navicular stress fracture

of his right foot May 17 and was transferred to the 60-day DL June 14...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 28 and pitched exclusively in relief following his return, logging a 5.74 ERA and .306 opponents batting average in 10 appearances...recorded his first save in his first outing following his return Aug. 28 at Detroit...pitched the final three innings of the A's 14-4 win, allowing three runs on five hits in 3.0 innings.

2008—Combined for an 11-5 record and a 3.69 ERA in 20 games, 19 starts, with Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland in his first season in the A's organization...also pitched for the United States team in the All-Star Futures Game at Yankee Stadium July 13 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb) and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 13 h, 8 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 10 so, 2 hr) in two starts during the Olympics...was rated as the A's number one prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...was named California League Pitcher of the Week, June 9-15...won both of his starts and allowed just one run in 14.0 innings, while striking out 16...joined Team USA for the Olympics in August...had a no decision Aug. 16 in a 5-4 win over Canada (5.2 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 so)...then started and won in the Bronze Medal game Aug. 23 against Japan, an 8-4 win (7.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 6 so).

2007—Was Arizona's second round pick in 2006 but did not sign until Sept. 1, 2006...made his professional debut in 2007 and was a combined 11-7 with a 3.07 ERA in 23 games, all starts, with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Visalia...was 8-4 with a 2.21 ERA in 14 starts at South Bend and was a *Baseball America* Low Class A All-Star...made one postseason start for Visalia and took the loss (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so, 2.25 ERA)...was traded to the A's on December 14 and was named Oakland's third best prospect by *Baseball America*.

State University from 2003-12 and is now pitching coach at the University of Houston...was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after-school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.

FOR STARTERS: Is 1-4 with a 5.02 ERA (16 er in 28.2 ip) and .297 (35-for-118) opponents batting average over his last five starts...has issued just five walks in 28.2 innings over that span (1.57 per nine innings)...was 9-5 with a 3.82 ERA over his first 20 starts.

10-GAME WINNER: Picked up his 10th win of the season Aug. 6, which is the third time in his 11-year career he has won 10 games...won 11 games in his rookie season with the A's in 2009 and 10 with Los Angeles (NL) in 2015...his 25 starts and 144.0 innings pitched are third best in his career...had 31 starts and 180.1 innings pitched with the Dodgers in 2015 and 30 starts and 175.1 innings pitched as a rookie with the A's in 2009.

RUN SUPPORT: Has received three runs of support or fewer in 14 of his last 17 starts...however, has starts with 16, 13 and 11 runs of support and his season run support average of 6.38 (102 rs in 144.0 ip) is eighth highest in the American League...is 10-3 in 18 starts with run support of two runs or more.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: Is 2-2 with a 3.48 ERA (31.0 ip, 30 h, 12 r, 12 er, 8 bb, 14 so, 2 hr) in five interleague starts...will become the third pitcher in Oakland history to make six interleague starts in a season, joining Sean Manaea (seven last year) and Chris Bassitt (six this year)...is now 3-9 with a 5.04 ERA (48 er in 85.2 ip) and .307 (107-for-349) opponents batting average in 16 career interleague starts.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on six days rest today...is 8-6 with a 3.21 ERA (36 er in 101.0 ip) in 17 starts on five days rest or more compared to 2-3 with a 6.07 ERA (29 er in 43.0 ip) in eight starts on four days rest...over the last two years, he is 12-9 with a 3.53 ERA (63 er in 160.2 ip) in 29 starts on five days rest or more and 2-5 with a 5.94 ERA (42 er in 63.2 ip) in 13 starts on four days rest.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed 16 home runs over his last 17 starts and 101.0 innings after surrendering just one home run over his first eight starts and 43.0 innings...has yielded 17 home runs overall and his average of 1.06 home runs per nine innings is seventh lowest in the American League...12 of the 17 home runs are solo shots.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 6-3 with a 3.42 ERA (30 er in 79.0 ip) and .239 (73-for-305) opponents batting average in 13 starts on the road compared to 4-6 with a 4.85 ERA (35 er in 65.0 ip) and .290 (73-for-252) opponents average in 12 starts at home...ranks eighth in the American League in road ERA and tied for eighth in wins.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 8-5 with a 3.29 ERA (36 er in 98.1 ip) and .233 (87-for-373) opponents batting average in 16 starts at night compared to 2-4 with a 5.72 ERA (29 er in 45.2 ip) and .321 (59-for-184) opponents average in nine starts during the day...ranks sixth in the American League in ERA at night, seventh in OPS (.650) and tied for 10th in wins.

NINE-GAME WINNER: Picked up his ninth win of the season in his last start... had a 4-14 record in 40 games over four seasons in the majors entering this year...needs one more win to give the A's three 10-game winners for the first since 2013 when they had five (Colon, Griffin, Milone, Parker, Straily).

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER
RHP Chris Bassitt (9-5, 3.61 ERA): Has not allowed a run in three of his seven starts since the All-Star Break and is 4-1 with a 2.36 ERA and .239 opponents batting average over that span...ranks fourth in the American League in post-break ERA...has a .198 opponents batting average against left-handed hitters and .186 with runners in scoring position...was the winning pitcher in his last start, an 8-4 win over Houston last Saturday in Oakland (6.0 ip, 8 h, 3 r, 3 er, 2 bb, 4 so)...it was his ninth win of the season...had a 4-14 record in 40 games over four seasons in the majors entering this year...was the losing pitcher in his only career appearance against the Giants, a start in the A's 2-1 loss at San Francisco on July 25, 2015 (6.0 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 2 er, 0 bb, 4 so)...is scheduled to make his sixth interleague start Saturday, which will be third most in the majors and second most in Oakland history to Sean Manaea's seven starts last year.

2019 PLAYER HIGHLIGHTS

BRETT ANDERSON

- Was one of three inactive pitchers for the opening series in Japan.
- Was slotted in as the A's third starter when the club returned home and made his first start March 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings to extend his home scoreless streak to an Oakland record 34.1 innings...broke the previous record of 33.0 set by Matt Keough (Sept. 5, 1979-April 16, 1980)...it is also the longest Athletics home scoreless streak since at least 1908.
- The streak ended in the first inning of his next start April 4 against Boston, marking the first time he allowed a run in the Coliseum since May 7, 2018.
- Then defeated the Orioles 13-2 at Baltimore on April 9 for his third win in his third start...the only other time in his career he won at least his first two starts in a season was in 2012 when he won his first four starts after missing the first 4½ months of the season following "Tommy John" surgery.
- Was 3-0 with a 2.50 ERA over his first three starts through April 9...then went 1-3 with a 5.52 ERA over his next six starts through May 14
- Left with a 7-3 lead on April 14 at Texas but Soria blew the save in the eighth inning...it was his first of **two** starts in which the bullpen blew the save (June 12 at Tampa Bay, Hendriks).
- Was charged with his first loss of the season April 21 games Toronto when he lasted a **season-low** 2.2 innings following an ankle injury...it snapped a **career-high** tying four-game winning streak dating back to Sept. 19, 2018 (fourth time)...went 4-0 with a 3.50 ERA and .243 opponents average during the streak, which spanned seven starts.
- Made his next scheduled start April 27 at Toronto but allowed a **season-high** 10 hits for his second consecutive loss.
- Finished April 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA and .307 opponents batting average in five starts...then went 3-1 with a 3.34 ERA and .225 opponents batting average in five starts in May.

- Struck out a **season-high tying** five batters in a no decision on June 7 at Texas

- Was named Pacific Coast League Player of the Month for June after batting .387...he led the league in total bases (85), ranked second in hits (45), doubles (13) and RBI (32) and third in slugging (.802).
- Returned to Oakland for his second stint on June 30...was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in runs scored (65) at the time of his promotion...was also tied for second in doubles (24), tied for fifth in extra base hits (41) and tied for seventh in triples (5).

CHRIS BASSITT

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27 retroactive to March 25 with a right lower leg contusion.
- Made one rehab start with Single-A Stockton on April 4 and two with Triple-A Las Vegas on April 9 and 14...was 0-0 with a 3.27 ERA in three starts overall when he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas April 16.
- Was recalled by Oakland the next day when Marco Estrada went on the IL.

SKYE BOLT

- Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas May 3 and made his Major League debut that night at Pittsburgh...pinch hit in the seventh inning and popped out to first in his first career at-bat... remained in the game in center field and finished the night 0-for-2 with a strikeout.
- Collected his first ML hit May 4, a pinch-hit double off Keone Kela in the seventh inning.
- Was 1-for-4 in three games when he was optioned back to Las Vegas May 7.

AARON BROOKS

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan...took the fifth spot in the rotation once the regular season resumed.

RYAN BUCHTER

- Did not allow a run in six of his first seven appearances (2.70 ERA).
- That included the 200th appearance of his career April 6 at Houston when he tossed a scoreless eighth inning.
- Then allowed at least one run in four of his next six games and had a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents batting average in 13 appearances overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Made one appearance with the Aviators on April 26 against El Paso (1.0 ip) before returning to Oakland April 29.

MARK CANHA

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list April 29 with a sprained right wrist...went 1-for-8 (.125) with a double, RBI, sacrifice fly and three strikeouts on a two-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas on May 10 and 11 and was reinstated May 13.
- Hit his third career pinch-homer May 21 at Cleveland (had two in 2018).
- Homered in three consecutive games for the first time in his career from May 21-24.
- Hit seven home runs in May, which tied for 10th in the American League and are his **most** ever in a month.
- Committed his first error of the season June 16 against Seattle, which snapped a 152-game errorless streak as an outfielder...the streak was **fifth** longest in Oakland history by an outfielder...it was his first error since June 1, 2017.
- Had his first career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle.
- Went 3-for-3 with a walk and two stolen bases Aug. 1 against Milwaukee...it was the second two-steal game of his career (June 12, 2015 at Los Angeles-AL).

MATT CHAPMAN

- Made his second consecutive Opening Day start at third base on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and had a double, home run and three RBI.
- Homered in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory.

- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts May 7 against Cincinnati for the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 10 against Cleveland, a walk-off home run off Brad Hand to lead off the 12th...it was the third time he was at the plate for a walk-off (single and error on July 22, 2018; wild pitch on Sept. 22, 2018).
- Hit safely in each of his five games against the Indians (7-for-22, .318) and has now hit safely in all 11 of his career games against Cleveland...is 18-for-43 (.419) with 12 runs, six doubles, a triple, four home runs and eight RBI (.884 slugging percentage, 1.363 OPS).
- Homered in a [career-high](#) tying three consecutive games from May 25-27 (also July 22-24, 2017).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run June 20 against Tampa Bay, a three-run shot off Castillo.
- Had a [career-high](#) 41-game errorless streak from June 23 to Aug. 15.
- Had a [career-high](#) six RBI June 30 at Los Angeles (AL) when he went 3-for-5 with a double, triple and home run...became the 10th player in Oakland history to fall a single short of the cycle (last: Canha, May 19, 2017)...drove in five runs nine games later against Seattle on July 16.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star Team June 30...finished second on the Player Ballot to Alex Bregman, who was voted in by the fans...walked in his only at bat in the All-Star Game July 9 at Cleveland and also scored a run...is the fifth third baseman in Oakland history to be named to the All-Star team (Bando, 1969, 72-74; Gross, 1977; Lansford, 1988; Donaldson, 2014).
- Also participated in the Home Run Derby on July 8 and hit 13 home runs in a first round loss to Vladimir Guerrero, Jr. (29).
- Had back-to-back two-homer games Aug. 14 at San Francisco and Aug. 15 against Houston, the third and fourth multi-homer games of his career...it marks the 12th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games...the last was Kris Davis (April 10-11, 2019).
- Scored three runs in each of those two games, marking the 16th time in Oakland history a player scored three or more runs in back-to-back games (last: Ben Zobrist, June 14-15, 2015).

JHAREL COTTON

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL March 27.
- Began a rehab assignment at Single-A Stockton May 17 and went 0-1 with a 6.43 ERA in three games, including two starts, before his rehab was halted May 29 due to a hamstring injury.
- Underwent right hamstring debridement surgery June 6, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper at the North Central Surgical Center in Dallas, Tex.

KHRIS DAVIS

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.
- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013).

- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts April 26 at Toronto...it was his first of [three](#) four-strikeout games (July 26 vs. Texas, Aug. 20 vs. New York) and he now has [11](#) in his career.
- Homered twice on May 13 at Seattle to snap a 20-game homerless streak, which was his longest as an Athletic at the time...it was his [third multi-homer game of the season, his 19th as an Athletic and the 25th of his career.](#)
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list May 24 retroactive to May 22 with a left hip/oblique contusion and did not have a rehab assignment...suffered the injury on May 5 in Pittsburgh but played in seven of the A's 15 games following that before going on the IL, batting .346 with two home runs and three RBI...was reinstated from the IL June 1.
- Had the walk-off walk in the ninth inning July 28 against Texas, his seventh career game-ending RBI...it was the first walk-off walk by an Athletic since Josh Reddick on June 1, 2013 against Chicago (AL).
- Hit the go-ahead home run in the bottom of the eighth inning July 30 night against Milwaukee to snap a 29-game homerless streak...it was his longest homerless streak as an Athletic and the second longest of his career (36, Sept. 6, 2014-April 27, 2015)...it was his first home run since June 18 against Baltimore.

RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.
- Did not allow a run in six appearances with the Aviators and had two saves and 14 strikeouts in 9.2 innings when he was recalled by Oakland April 22.
- Allowed at least one run in four of his next five appearances (7.11 ERA, .433 opponents batting average) and was optioned back to Las Vegas May 2.

MARCO ESTRADA

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and was 0-2 with a 6.85 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day injured list April 17 with a lumbar strain.

MIKE FIERS

- Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).
- Put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts.
- That gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then allowed a [season-high](#) six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average.
- Began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, [matching](#) the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...walked a [season-high](#) four.
- Yielded a [season-high](#) nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss to Toronto on April 20...it was his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a six-game Coliseum winning streak.
- Then tossed five innings or more and allowed three runs or fewer in each of his next 19 starts from April 26 to Aug. 9, which was the longest such streak by an A's pitcher since at least 1908...the previous long was 16 by Dan Haren (April 7-June 26, 2007)...it is the third longest streak by an American League pitcher over that span (26, Corey Kluber, Aug. 3, 2017-June 10, 2018; 22, Johan Santana, June 9-Sept. 29, 2004)...went 9-1 with a 2.28 ERA during the streak.
- Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second

highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42).

- Then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May... had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124).
- Tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati (also Aug. 21, 2015 vs. Los Angeles-NL)...walked two and struck out six...tossed a [season-high 131](#) pitches, which were [the most](#) by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...retired the first 11 before Winker reached base on an error with two outs in the fourth...set down the next seven before walking Suarez to start the seventh...Suarez was erased on a double play, Puig walked and Fiers then retired the final seven batters to complete the no-hitter.
- Became the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters... is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea last year on April 21...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has [two](#) career complete games, both no-hitters...according to Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).
- Had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May 13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...left with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth for the blown save...it was the first of [seven](#) times he left a game with the lead only to have the bullpen blow the save (May 31, June 22, July 3, July 18, July 28 and Aug. 15).
- Was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...[is the pitcher of record](#).
- Allowed one earned run or fewer in five consecutive starts from June 17 to July 12 and was 3-0 with a 1.09 ERA over that span.
- Hit an [Oakland-record tying](#) three batters June 22 against Tampa Bay (11th time, previous: Raul Alcantara, Sept. 5, 2016).
- Went 4-0 with a 2.30 ERA and .212 opponents batting average in five starts in June...it was the third time in his career he won four games in a month (4-2 in Aug. 2012 and 4-1 in Aug. 2014)...had the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the AL in June (.283), tied for the lead in wins, had the fourth lowest OPS (.561) and ranked fifth in ERA.
- Then went 1-0 with a 2.14 ERA in five starts in July...ranked sixth in the AL in July ERA.
- Retired the side in order in the first inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his 1,000th career inning pitched.
- Walked a [season-high tying](#) four batters July 18 at Minnesota.
- Struck out a [season-high](#) eight in 7.0 scoreless innings on Aug. 9 at Chicago (AL) when he combined with Diekman and Soria on a four-hit shutout in the A's 7-0 win.
- Yielded a [career-high tying](#) four home runs in a no decision on Aug. 15 against Houston (third time, second vs. Houston).

DANIEL GOSSETT

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.

- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.
- Had his third career four-hit game June 5 at Los Angeles (AL), his first since Sept. 18, 2016 at New York (NL).
- Had a RBI single off Chaz Roe in the ninth inning on June 10 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit.
- Stole two bases July 30 against Milwaukee for the second time in his career (May 7, 2013 vs. Los Angeles-AL).
- Homered off Bergen Aug. 14 at San Francisco for his first home run off a left-handed pitcher since July 2, 2018 at Milwaukee (Suter)...it was his first home run against any pitcher since June 18, snapping a 41-game homerless streak...that tied for the third longest homerless streak of his career.
- Had the game-ending RBI single in the bottom of the 13th inning Aug. 16 against Houston for his first career walk-off RBI.

CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.
- Began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas June 13 and hit .333 with four home runs and 13 RBI in 13 games...reached base safely in each contest (.397 on-base percentage)...appeared in eight games at catcher and five at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL July 2 and went 1-for-3 with a grand slam and four RBI in his Oakland debut that night against Minnesota...became the first player in Athletics history (1901-present) to hit a grand slam in his first game with the A's.
- The grand slam was the second of his career (July 23, 2013 at Los Angeles-AL) and the four RBI [matched](#) his career high (third time, last: April 23, 2016 vs. Pittsburgh).
- Then was a perfect 4-for-4 two days later against the Twins for his first career four-hit game.
- Played an inning in left field July 22 at Houston, which was his first game in the outfield since Oct. 1, 2017 (also left field).

LIAM HENDRIKS

- Had a then [career-high 14.2](#)-inning scoreless streak from April 30 to May 28...allowed three runs in 4.1 innings over his next four games and then had a [career-high 20.2](#)-inning scoreless streak from June 6 to July 20.
- Was named American League Reliever of the Month for June after going 1-0 with two saves and a 0.60 ERA in 14 relief appearances...allowed just one run in 15.0 innings while striking out 22...it was his first career Reliever of the Month award.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star team as a replacement for Tampa Bay's Charlie Morton...pitched the sixth inning in the All-Star Game on July 9 in Cleveland (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 3 so, 1 hr)...the three strikeouts were the most by an Athletic in an All-Star Game since Jay Howell also had three in 1987.
- Made his 300th career appearance Aug. 14 at San Francisco and tossed 1.1 scoreless innings for the save.

NICK HUNDLEY

- Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

CALEB JOSEPH

- Was selected from Triple-A Las Vegas Aug. 14.
- Hit his first Major League home run Aug. 15 against Houston, a solo shot off Aaron Sanchez in the fourth inning.

RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston (also June 18 vs. Baltimore).
- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.
- Reached base safely in a [career-high](#) 28 consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second longest reaching base streak by a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979).
- Had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland, his second career game-ending RBI...the other was Aug. 3, 2018 vs. Detroit, also a single.
- Had a [career-high and A's season-high](#) 16-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...it matched the longest hitting streak by an Athletic over the last eight years...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak.
- Had an Oakland [record-tying](#) streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973).
- Had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI (Aug. 20, 2018 vs. Texas) and his first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB).
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts June 20 against Tampa Bay, his first career four-strikeout game.
- Was hit by a pitch an Oakland record-tying two times June 22 against Tampa Bay.
- Had seven home runs and 22 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for fourth in the AL in RBI in June.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of July 15-21 after going 13-for-24 (.542) with 10 runs, six doubles, two home runs, two RBI and five multiple hit games in six games...it was his first career weekly honor.

SEAN MANAEA

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

NICK MARTINI

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 8 and hit .302 with 10 RBI and seven walks (.392 on-base percentage) in 12 games before he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas May 28.
- Was recalled by Oakland July 22 and went 0-for-2 with a strikeout that day at Houston...also pitched a scoreless eighth inning in the A's 11-1 loss (2 bb, 1 so)...it marked the 14th time in Oakland history a position player pitched...it was the second time this year and seventh time in the last five years.

KENDRYS MORALES

- Was acquired from the Toronto Blue Jays for minor league infielder Jesus Lopez and international slot money March 27.
- Made his second career appearance as a pitcher April 20 against Toronto in the ninth inning (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the other came on May 20, 2018 against Oakland at Toronto (1.0 ip, 1 bb)...it marked the 13th time in Oakland history a position player pitched, the sixth time in the last five years...is just the third to allow a run and is the first two walk two batters...the last was Jake Smolinski last year on June 13 against Houston.
- Matt Olson returned from the IL May 7 and Morales was batting .204 with a home run and seven RBI in 34 games when he was designated for assignment May 13...was traded to the New York Yankees the next day with cash for a player to be named later or cash considerations.

MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators, including three at first base and two at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL May 7.
- Committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...it was the fourth longest errorless in Oakland history by a first baseman.
- Had his first multi-homer game of the season June 28 at Los Angeles (AL) and matched his [career-high](#) with five RBI...added another two-homer game Aug. 15 against Houston and now has [six](#) multi-homer games in his career.
- Had a [career-high](#) 16-game hitting streak from June 30 to July 21, which tied for fifth longest in Oakland history by a first baseman...went 19-for-64 (.297) with four home runs and nine RBI during the streak.
- Batted .262 with seven doubles, nine home runs and 20 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for second in the AL in June extra base hits (16) and tied for third in home runs (9).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run July 30 against Milwaukee (also Aug. 17, 2018 vs. Houston)...it was his third career game-ending RBI.

JOSH PHEGLEY

- Had a [career-high](#) nine-game hitting streak from April 2-14...went 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...scored a run in each of the last seven games during the streak and drove in a run in each of the last six.
- Went 4-for-5 with two doubles, a home run, and a career-high eight RBI May 3 at Pittsburgh...it was his first career four-hit game...became just the 13th catcher in Major League history to drive in eight or more runs in game, the first Athletic...was the fifth Oakland Athletic with eight or more RBI in a game, the first since Eric Chavez on Aug. 30, 2001.
- Had his second career four-hit game May 16 at Detroit.
- Tied for ninth in the AL with 20 RBI in May...those are his [most](#) RBI in a month, topping his 13 from April this year.

CHAD PINDER

- Snapped a 0-for-12 streak as a pinch hitter June 18 against Baltimore with his first career pinch home run...it was his first pinch hit since Sept. 9, 2018...added a second pinch homer Aug. 3 against St. Louis.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts Aug. 13 at San Francisco...it was his first career four-strike-out game.

STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...[matched his career high in hits \(fourth time\) and RBI \(fifth time\)](#)...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.
- Reached base safely in a [career-high](#) 25 consecutive games from April 28 to May 29...hit .280 with a .357 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 8 against Cincinnati, a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 13th.

- Had his second career four-strikeout game May 13 at Seattle (also Aug. 30, 2016 at Milwaukee).
- Collected his 500th career hit May 16 at Detroit.
- Had successful surgery June 13 to remove a melanoma from his right ear...the procedure was performed by Dr. Brian Parrett at the California Pacific Medical Campus.

JURICKSON PROFAR

- Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).
- Committed his eighth error of the season in his 28th game at second base May 3 at Pittsburgh...then had a 25-game errorless streak from May 4 to June 1.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 16 at Detroit.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 21 at Cleveland, which ties an Athletics record.
- Finished May with six home runs, which **matched** his most ever in a month (September, 2018)
- Had his second career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle (also June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).

FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

MARCUS SEMIEN

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.
- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping what was then a career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018...did not make his second error until June 2 for a 41-game errorless streak from April 12-June 1...that **tied for fourth** longest in Athletics history by a shortstop.
- Led off the game with a home run May 28 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the third lead-off home run of his career.
- Was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 1 against Houston.
- Had a career-high 17-game hitting streak from June 4 to 20...hit .375 (27-for-72) with 16 runs, five doubles, a triple, three home runs and 13 RBI during the streak, which is the **longest in the AL this year** and the longest single-season hitting streak by an Athletic since a 22-game streak by Eric Byrnes from May 8-June 1, 2003 (Mark Ellis had a 17-game hitting streak from Sept. 21, 2010-April 5, 2011)
- Went 4-for-5 with three runs, two home runs and four RBI June 7 at Texas...it was his sixth career four-hit game...it was his first of **three** two-homer games (July 4 vs. Minnesota and Aug. 5 at Chicago-NL) and he now has **six** multi-homer games in his career.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of June 3-9 after going 13-for-31 (.419) with seven runs, two doubles, two home runs, nine RBI and three walks...it was the first weekly award of his career.
- Hit his 10th home run of the season June 15 and is the first Athletic to reach double figures in home runs in five consecutive seasons since Mark Ellis from 2005-09...is the 18th player in Oakland history with five or more 10-homer seasons.
- Tied for fourth in the AL in hits in June (35).

- Went 2-for-4 with two home runs and five RBI July 4 against Minnesota...one of the home runs was a grand slam, the fourth of his career...it was his second career five-RBI game (Sept. 20, 2018 vs. Los Angeles-AL).

JOAKIM SORIA

- Was on his 11th career Opening Day roster and made his Oakland debut in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...the A's became his seventh team in 12 seasons in the majors.
- Was charged with the loss March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) when he surrendered a **career-high tying** four runs without retiring a batter (11th time, first since Sept. 1, 2018 at Washington).
- Made his first career start June 5 at Los Angeles (AL) as the A's "opener" (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 so)...it came in his 667th career appearance...his career-opening streak of 666 appearances before making his first start was the longest in Major League history, topping the 638 games by Troy Percival before his first start on Sept. 30, 2007.

BEAU TAYLOR

- Was batting .297 with 33 walks and a .450 on-base percentage in 38 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland June 8.
- Made his first career start June 10 at Tampa Bay and went 0-for-2.
- Hit his first career home run June 18 against Baltimore, a solo shot off Gabriel Ynoa in the third inning.

BLAKE TREINEN

- Walked four batters April 7 at Houston, his most ever as a reliever...also allowed his first run of the season in that game and was charged with the loss and blown save...it snapped a streak of 24.1 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run, dating back to Aug. 25, 2018.
- Allowed his first run at home on May 11 against Cleveland, snapping a streak of 32.0 consecutive scoreless innings at home dating back to 2018...that was the longest home scoreless streak in Oakland history by a reliever and third longest overall...it was the first time he allowed a run at home since July 21, 2018 vs. San Francisco.
