ABOUT THE A'S: Have won five of the last eight games and 12 of the last 18...are 29-17 (.630) since the All-Star Break, which is the third best record in the American League...are 79-58 (.577) overall, which is the fifth best record in the AL and seventh best in the majors...the 21 games over .500 are one short of the season high of 22 (78-56 on Aug. 30)...are tied with Cleveland for the second AL Wild Card spot and are one game behind first place Tampa Bay...have been in second place in the AL West every day dating back to July 2 and trail first place Houston by 9½ games...have spent 69 days in second in the West, one day tied for second, 44 days in third, six days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, seven days tied for fourth and 17 days in fifth.

THE MIDDLE OF JUNE: The A's were 36-36 (.500) at the conclusion of play on June 16 but have gone 43-22 (.662) since then, which is the third best record in the majors...last year, the A's were 34-36 (.486) through June 15 but then went 63-29 (.685) from June 16 through the end of the season, which was the best record in the majors.

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit 216 home runs, which is tied for seventh in the majors but is sixth most in Athletics history (5th is 227 in 2018)...have set a franchise record for most players with 10 or more home runs (10) and have tied the mark for most players with 20 or more home runs (5)...are one of five teams with at least five players with 20 or more home runs and only the Twins have more (8)...are also one of five with at least 10 players with 10 or more home runs...have two games this year where all nine players in the starting lineup had at least 10 home runs (Aug. 21 and 24) and seven in Athletics history (the other five were in 2000)...have hit back-to-back home runs 11 times, which is tied for second most in Oakland history (13 in 2000)...have five wins when going homerless, which is second fewest in the majors (Seattle, 3)...the Athletics record for fewest wins in a season when going homerless is six in 2017.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 6-0 with a 3.59 ERA (29 er in 72.2 ip) over the last 13 games and 14-5 with a 3.35 ERA (70 er in 188.1 ip) over the last 32 contests...are 56-33 with a 4.02 ERA overall...rank third in the American League in wins and fourth in ERA and innings pitched (762.0).

PITCHING: The A's rank second in the American League in fewest home runs (168), third in opponents OPS (.716) and slugging percentage (.405) and fourth in ERA (4.07), batting average (.244) and on-base percentage (.311).

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .272 (121-for-445) with 82 runs scored over the last 13 games (6.3 runs per game)...have scored 711 runs for the season, which ranks fifth in the American League...have been hit by a pitch 75 times, which is tied for the most in the AL and is third most in Athletics history (88 in 2001, 76 in 2018)...also rank third in the AL in fewest strikeouts (1114), most grounded into double plays (124) and fewest stolen bases (41) and fifth in home runs (216), OPS (.772), slugging (.447) and extra base hits (483).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed just one error in the last eight games and have 70 for the season, which is third fewest in the American League...the Athletics record for fewest errors in a non-strike season is 84 in 2006...the errors have led to 29 unearned runs, which is the fewest in the majors...the fewest in Athletics history in a non-strike season is 42 in 1991...have turned 99 double plays, which is fourth fewest in the AL...are second in the majors in opponents caught stealing (37).

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters are batting .278 (22-for-79) with seven doubles, five home runs, 23 RBI and 12 walks...lead the American League in RBI, are tied for the lead in home runs, rank second in hits, doubles and extra base hits (12), third in plate appearances (94) and tied for third in walks...the 12 extra base hits are tied for second most in Oakland history and are one short of the record of 13 set in 1968...the five homers are tied for third most (8 in 1970, 6 in 2013)...the 23 RBI are the most since 1998 (24).

AGAINST THE WEST: The A's will play 18 of their 25 remaining games (including the May 19 suspended game) against American League West competition...are 31-27 (.534) against the West compared to 48-31 (.608) against all other teams...have won 14 of the last 20 against divisional foes after starting the year 17-21...have a 4.62 ERA (270 er in 526.0 ip) against the West, a

3.67 ERA in all other contests...last year, the A's went 38-38 (.500) against the West, 59-27 (.686) against everyone else.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 1-0 on the penultimate homestand of the season, a six-game stand against Los Angeles-AL (1-0) and Detroit (three games plus the completion of the May 19 suspended game)...went 6-3 on the last homestand against Houston (3-1), New York-AL (3-0) and San Francisco (0-2) and are 26-10 (.722) over the last 36 home games after starting the year 18-16 (.556)...are 44-26 (.623) at home for the season, which is the third best home record in the American League...have clinched a winning record at home for the third consecutive year...have hit 109 home runs at home, which is the A's second best total over the last 17 years (129 in 2017)...went 4-3 on the last road trip to Kansas City (3-1) and New York-AL (1-2) and are now 30-17 over their last 48 road games (includes May 19 suspended game) after starting the year 5-15 on the road...are 35-32 (.522) on the road.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's won 7-5 yesterday and half of their games (69 of 138) have been decided by two runs or fewer...are 39-30 (.565) in those games...are tied for second in the majors in games decided by two runs or fewer and tied for third in wins...are 22-18 (.550) in one-run games...are tied for second in the American League in one-run wins and games (40)...have nine walk-off wins, which is tied for second in the majors (Dodgers, 12), and nine walk-off losses, which is tied for third...have nine losses when leading after seven innings, which is tied for the most in the majors (Red Sox, Mariners, Cubs)...are 5-8 (.385) in extra inning games...are tied for second in the AL in extra inning losses and tied for third in games (13).

THIS AND THAT: The A's are 24-12 (.667) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 55-46 (.545) against right-handers...the mark against lefties is second best in the American League to Houston (29-9) but the 36 games are tied for third fewest...have a run differential of +119, which is fourth best in the AL and sixth best in the majors.

IN AUGUST: The A's went 17-9 (.654) in August, which was the third best record in the American League...it was the A's fourth consecutive month with a winning record and their second consecutive August with a mark above .500...walked just 61 batters, which was the fewest in the majors...ranked second in the AL in opponents OPS (.713), on-base percentage (.303) and slugging percentage (.411), third in ERA (3.85) and tied for third in saves (9)...the offense was hit by a pitch 22 times, which was the most by an A's team in any month since at least 1905 and the most by a Major League team in August since 2008 (Cleveland, 22)...ranked second in the AL in on-base percentage (.353), third in walks (100) and fifth in runs (146), batting (.267) and OPS (.828)...hit 43 home runs, which tied for second most in Oakland history and was the most since 2001 (43)...had the third best slugging percentage (.475) and fourth best OPS (.828).

A's vs. ANGELS: The A's have clinched the season series for the first time since 2013 as they lead 10-5 with four games remaining...had gone 40-55 against the Angels over the previous five years...are 5-3 in Oakland this year and 5-2 in Anaheim...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 447-381 against the Angels...that includes 233-180 in Oakland and 214-201 in Anaheim...all-time, the A's are 496-458 against the Angels.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Mark Canha has a career-high 18-game reaching base streak dating back to Aug. 13 and is batting .343 (24-for-70) with six home runs, 15 RBI, nine walks and two hit by pitched (.432 on-base percentage) over that span...**Matt Chapman** hit his 31st home run of the season last night, which is one short of the Athletics record for home runs as a third baseman (Eric Chavez in 2001)...**Marcus Semien** ranks sixth in the American League in runs (99), eighth in walks (72), tied for eighth in triples (6) and tied for ninth in doubles (34) and total bases (274).

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1973** the A's defeat the California Angels 4-3 as Ken Holtzman wins his 20th game en route to a 21-13 season...in **2000** Mike Stanley is a perfect 5-for-5 with five RBI in the A's 10-0 win over Toronto...in **2002** the A's blow an 11-0 lead against Kansas City but Scott Hatteberg hits a pinch-hit "walk-off" home run in the bottom of the ninth inning for a 12-11 win, the A's American League record breaking 20th consecutive victory.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Tanner Roark (2-1, 3.30 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Was acquired from Cincinnati on July 31 with cash considerations for minor league outfielder Jameson Hannah and is 2-1 with a 3.30 ERA (11 er in 30.0 ip) in five starts with the A's...has allowed two earned runs or fewer in four of his five starts with the A's and 16 of 26 overall...went 6-7 with a 4.24 ERA in 21 starts with the Reds and is 8-8 with a 4.04 ERA (63 er in 140.1 ip) in 26 starts for the season.

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 1-1 with a 1.85 ERA (5 er in 24.1 ip) and .233 (21-for-90) opponents batting average in four starts against American League West teams...is 5-5 with a 2.39 ERA (24 er in 90.1 ip) in 14 career starts against the AL West.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed 19 home runs, 14 of which have come with the bases empty...nine have come to batters leading off an inning, which is tied for 10th most in the majors...has allowed 17 home runs in 84.0 innings over his last 15 starts after yielding two in 56.1 innings over his first 11 starts...has held the opponents number one hitter to a .197 (13-for-66) average but the clean-up hitter is batting .365 (23-for-63).

HOME AND AWAY: Is 5-2 with a 4.10 ERA (29 er in 63.2 ip) in 12 starts on the road compared to 3-6 with a 3.99 ERA (34 er in 76.2 ip) in 14 starts in his home ballparks, which includes one start at Monterrey Stadium in Mexico...is tied for 10th in the majors in losses at home.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on six days rest today...is 6-2 with a 3.28 ERA (21 er in 57.2 ip) in 11 starts on four days rest compared to 2-6 with a 4.57 ERA (42 er in 82.2 ip) in 15 starts on five days rest or more.

BEFORE AND AFTER THE BREAK: Was 5-6 with a 3.51 ERA and .249 opponents batting average in 17 starts before the All-Star Break...is 3-2 in eight starts since then but has a 5.06 ERA (27 er in 48.0 ip) and .301 (58-for-193) opponents average.

THIS AND THAT: Is tied for fourth in the majors in hit batters (12)...is averaging 17.9 pitches per inning, which is the highest mark in the majors ahead of teammate Homer Bailey (17.7)...his wild pitch on Aug. 22 was his first since July 3, 2018, snapping a streak of 37 consecutive starts without a wild pitch...has 135 strikeouts in 140.1 innings and his average of 8.66 strikeouts per nine innings is currently the highest mark of his career (8.24 in 2017).

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Allowed three runs in each of his first two starts (5.79 ERA) but then went 3-1 with a 2.53 ERA and .231 opponents batting average over his next six starts from April 13 to May 9...left with a 4-3 lead in his second start on April 6 at Pittsburgh only to have the bullpen blow the save...it was the first of two times the pen blew a save in one of his starts (July 18 vs. St. Louis)...started the Reds April 13 home game against St. Louis in Monterrey, Mexico, and had a no decision in a 5-2 win...allowed one run in 5.1 innings but left trailing 1-0...walked a season-high four batters in 3.2 innings April 29 at New York (NL)...matched that in 3.1 innings July 30 against Pittsburgh...went 1-5 with a 4.09 ERA over a six-start stretch from May 14 to June 15...struck out a season-high nine batters in 5.0 scoreless innings May 26 at Chicago (NL)...went 3-2 with a 2.28 ERA in five starts in May and did not allow a home run in 27.2 innings...it was his lowest single-month ERA since compiling a mark of 2.03 in April of 2016...drove in both of the Reds runs in a 5-2 loss to Washington on June 1...had a suicide squeeze in the second inning and then hit his first career home run in the fourth, a solo shot off Eric Fedde...went over the 1,000 career innings pitched plateau June 8 at Philadelphia...tossed a season-high 7.0 innings and a season-high 116 pitches June 15 against Texas but took the loss, allowing four runs, two earned...yielded one run in back-to-back starts on June 20 at Milwaukee and June 26 at Los Angeles (AL)...then went 1-1 with a 7.30 ERA and .346 opponents batting average in five starts in the month of July...surrendered seven home runs in 24.2 innings...allowed a season-high seven runs on a career-high 13 hits but had a no decision in the Reds 17-9 win at Colorado July 13...it was his 200th career appearance...was the losing pitcher in his final start with the Reds, an 11-4 loss to Pittsburgh on July 30...allowed five runs on six hits and four walks in a season-low 3.1 innings...finished July with a 1-1 record, a 7.30 ERA and .346 opponents batting average in five starts...then went 2-1 with a 3.30 ERA and .246 opponents average in five starts in August...picked up the win in his A's debut on Aug. 4 against St. Louis when he allowed a run on four hits in 5.0 innings.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 6-4 loss at Kansas City a week ago today...had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a two-run home run to Dozier in the third...Oakland scored twice in the fifth to take a 4-2 lead but he allowed a Soler RBI double in the fifth and a leadoff home run to O'Hearn to start the sixth...was relieved by Treinen to start the bottom of the seventh with the scored tied 4-4 and Treinen allowed two runs for the loss.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER
LHP Brett Anderson (11-9, 4.04 ERA): Picked up his 11th win of the season in his last start, which matches his career high from his rookie season of 2009 with the A's...his 27 starts and 156.0 innings pitched are the third best totals of his career...had 31 starts and 180.1 innings pitched with the Dodgers in 2015 and 30 starts and 175.1 innings pitched as a rookie with the A's in 2009...has yielded 18 home runs overall and his average of 1.04 home runs per nine innings is sixth lowest in the American League...his average of 4.44 strikeouts per nine innings is the lowest mark in the majors (Nova, CWS 5.37) and the lowest by an A's pitcher since Tom Candiotti had a mark of 4.39 in 1998...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 7-5 A's win at New York last Friday (6.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...is 4-3 with a 2.89 ERA (81.0 ip, 62 h, 26 r, 26 er, 18 bb, 52 so) in 15 career appearances, including 12 starts, against Los Angeles...is 2-0 with a 0.00 ERA (13.2 ip, 5 h, 4 bb, 7 so) in two starts this year.

- Has lowest opponents slugging mark in AL (.398), ranks third in OPS (.714), fourth in on-base percentage (.316), and fifth in batting average (.241).
- Is 35-for-62 (56.5%) in save opportunities...the 27 blown saves are tied for most in the Majors.
- Has allowed the second fewest home runs (61) and has the fourth fewest walks (190) among AL bullpens...has the fifth fewest wins (23).
- Has the third lowest slugging percentage against first batters (.350) among Major League bullpens.

Last Year: Was limited to six starts with Oakland due to two stints on the injured list... began the season on the IL with a strained right forearm, went 2-3 with a 7.16 ERA in six starts...missed the remainder of the season with right elbow lateral epicondylitis.

strain...was reinstated from the DL May 29...had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...was reinstated July 30 and went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...finished the season with a career-high tying four-game winning streak...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA in six starts in September.

2008—Combined for an 11-5 record and a 3.69 ERA in 20 games, 19 starts, with Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland in his first season in the A's organization...also pitched for the United States team in the All-Star Futures Game at Yankee Stadium July 13 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb) and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 13 h, 8 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 10 so, 2 hr) in two starts during the Olympics...was rated as the A's number one prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...was named California League Pitcher of the Week, June 9-15...won both of his starts and allowed just one run in 14.0 innings, while striking out 16...joined Team USA for the Olympics in August...had a no decision Aug. 16 in a 5-4 win over Canada (5.2 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 so)...then started and won in the Bronze Medal game Aug. 23 against Japan, an 8-4 win (7.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 6 so).

2007—Was Arizona's second round pick in 2006 but did not sign until Sept. 1, 2006...made his professional debut in 2007 and was a combined 11-7 with a 3.07 ERA in 23 games, all starts, with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Visalia...was 8-4 with a 2.21 ERA in 14 starts at South Bend and was a *Baseball America* Low Class A All-Star...made one postseason start for Visalia and took the loss (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so, 2.25 ERA)...was traded to the A's on December 14 and was named Oakland's third best prospect by *Baseball America*.

Anderson was originally signed by Diamondbacks scout Joe Robinson...graduated from Stillwater (OK) High School...was a *Baseball America* 1st Team High School All-America selection in 2006 after going 9-0 with two saves and a 0.37 ERA in 12 games as a senior...struck out 102 and walked just nine in 57 innings...his father, Frank, was the head baseball coach at Oklahoma

State University from 2003-12 and is now pitching coach at the University of Houston...was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after-school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.

Was originally drafted by Texas in the 25th round in 2008 and was traded to Washington at the 2010 trading deadline...made his Major League debut with the Nationals in 2013 and went 64-54 with a 3.59 ERA in 182 games, including 141 starts, in six seasons with Washington...was traded to Cincinnati following the 2018 season...pitched for Team USA during its run to the 2017 World Baseball Classic gold medal...started the tournament semifinal 2-1 victory vs. Japan at Dodger Stadium, allowed just 2 hits in 4.0 shutout innings.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS

FOR STARTERS: Is 4-1 with a 2.75 ERA (16 er in 52.1 ip) and .237 (47-for-198) opponents batting average in nine starts since the All-Star Break...ranks **seventh** in the American League in post-break ERA...went 2-1 with a 1.93 ERA and .179 opponents average over his first five starts and was 3-3 with a 6.00 ERA and .249 opponents average in nine starts in between (May 21-July 6)...has career highs in all major categories except losses.

LAST START: He had his second consecutive no decision in the A's 9-8 win at Kansas City a week ago today...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a two-run home run to Soler in the bottom of the first...Oakland built a 7-1 lead before he allowed three runs in the fifth on an error and a two-run double by Cuthbert...was relieved by Petit with two outs in the fifth, runners on first and second and the A's leading 7-5.

FOR STARTERS: Was acquired from Cincinnati on July 31 with cash considerations for minor league outfielder Jameson Hannah and is 2-1 with a 3.30 ERA (11 er in 30.0 ip) in five starts with the A's...has allowed two earned runs or fewer in four of his five starts with the A's and 16 of 26 overall...went 6-7 with a 4.24 ERA in 21 starts with the Reds and is 8-8 with a 4.04 ERA (63 er in 140.1 ip) in 26 starts for the season.

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 1-1 with a 1.85 ERA (5 er in 24.1 ip) and .233 (21-for-90) opponents batting average in four starts against American League West teams...is 5-5 with a 2.39 ERA (24 er in 90.1 ip) in 14 career starts against the AL West.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed 19 home runs, 14 of which have come with the bases empty...nine have come to batters leading off an inning, which is tied for 10th most in the majors...has allowed 17 home runs in 84.0 innings over his last 15 starts after yielding two in 56.1 innings over his first 11 starts...has held the opponents number one hitter to a .197 (13-for-66) average but the clean-up hitter is batting .365 (23-for-63).

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER
LHP Brett Anderson (11-9, 4.04 ERA): Picked up his 11th win of the season in his last start, which matches his career high from his rookie season of 2009 with the A's...his 27 starts and 156.0 innings pitched are the third best totals of his career...had 31 starts and 180.1 innings pitched with the Dodgers in 2015 and 30 starts and 175.1 innings pitched as a rookie with the A's in 2009...has yielded 18 home runs overall and his average of 1.04 home runs per nine innings is sixth lowest in the American League...his average of 4.44 strikeouts per nine innings is the lowest mark in the majors (Nova, CWS 5.37) and the lowest by an A's pitcher since Tom Candiotti had a mark of 4.39 in 1998...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 7-5 A's win at New York last Friday (6.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...is 4-3 with a 2.89 ERA (81.0 ip, 62 h, 26 r, 26 er, 18 bb, 52 so) in 15 career appearances, including 12 starts, against Los Angeles...is 2-0 with a 0.00 ERA (13.2 ip, 5 h, 4 bb, 7 so) in two starts this year.

2019 PLAYER HIGHLIGHTS

BRETT ANDERSON

- Was one of three inactive pitchers for the opening series in Japan.
- Was slotted in as the A's third starter when the club returned home and made his first start March 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings to extend his home scoreless streak to an Oakland record 34.1 innings...broke the previous record of 33.0 set by Matt Keough (Sept. 5, 1979-April 16, 1980)...it is also the longest Athletics home scoreless streak since at least 1908.
- The streak ended in the first inning of his next start April 4 against Boston, marking the first time he allowed a run in the Coliseum since May 7, 2018.
- Then defeated the Orioles 13-2 at Baltimore on April 9 for his third win in his third start...the only other time in his career he won at least his first two starts in a season was in 2012 when he won his first four starts after missing the first 4½ months of the season following "Tommy John" surgery.
- Was 3-0 with a 2.50 ERA over his first three starts through April 9...then went 1-3 with a 5.52 ERA over his next six starts through May 14
- Left with a 7-3 lead on April 14 at Texas but Soria blew the save in the eighth inning...it was his first of [three](#) starts in which the bullpen blew the save (June 12 at Tampa Bay, August 25 vs. San Francisco).
- Was charged with his first loss of the season April 21 games Toronto when he lasted a [season-low](#) 2.2 innings following an ankle injury...it snapped a [career-high](#) tying four-game winning streak dating back to Sept. 19, 2018 (fourth time)...went 4-0 with a 3.50 ERA and .243 opponents average during the streak, which spanned seven starts.
- Made his next scheduled start April 27 at Toronto but allowed a [season-high](#) 10 hits for his second consecutive loss.

- Was named Pacific Coast League Player of the Month for June after batting .387...he led the league in total bases (85), ranked second in hits (45), doubles (13) and RBI (32) and third in slugging (.802).
- Returned to Oakland for his second stint on June 30...was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in runs scored (65) at the time of his promotion...was also tied for second in doubles (24), tied for fifth in extra base hits (41) and tied for seventh in triples (5).

CHRIS BASSITT

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27 retroactive to March 25 with a right lower leg contusion.
- Made one rehab start with Single-A Stockton on April 4 and two with Triple-A Las Vegas on April 9 and 14...was 0-0 with a 3.27 ERA in three starts overall when he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas April 16.
- Was recalled by Oakland the next day when Marco Estrada went on the IL.

SKYE BOLT

- Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas May 3 and made his Major League debut that night at Pittsburgh...pinch hit in the seventh inning and popped out to first in his first career at-bat...remained in the game in center field and finished the night 0-for-2 with a strikeout.
- Collected his first ML hit May 4, a pinch-hit double off Keone Kela in the seventh inning.
- Was 1-for-4 in three games when he was optioned back to Las Vegas May 7.

AARON BROOKS

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan...took the fifth spot in the rotation once the regular season resumed.

SETH BROWN

- Was batting .297 with 37 home runs and 104 RBI in 112 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland on Aug. 27.
- At the time of his promotion, he ranked second in the minors in home runs to the Diamondbacks Kevin Cron (39) and second in RBI to the Pirates Mason Martin (123)...was leading the Pacific Coast League in RBI and total bases (286), ranked second in home runs, extra base hits (72) and runs (101), fourth in slugging (.634) and ninth in OPS (.986).
- Made his Major League debut with a start in left field on Aug. 26 at Kansas City and went 2-for-6 with a RBI...singled in the second inning off Brad Keller for his first ML hit and had a RBI single in his next at bat in the third inning for his first RBI.

RYAN BUCHTER

- Did not allow a run in six of his first seven appearances (2.70 ERA).
- That included the 200th appearance of his career April 6 at Houston when he tossed a scoreless eighth inning.
- Then allowed at least one run in four of his next six games and had a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents batting average in 13 appearances overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Made one appearance with the Aviators on April 26 against El Paso (1.0 ip) before returning to Oakland April 29.

MARK CANHA

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list April 29 with a sprained right wrist...went 1-for-8 (.125) with a double, RBI, sacrifice fly and three strikeouts on a two-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas on May 10 and 11 and was reinstated May 13.
- Hit his third career pinch-homer May 21 at Cleveland (had two in 2018).
- Homered in three consecutive games for the first time in his career from May 21-24.
- Hit seven home runs in May, which tied for 10th in the American League and are his **most** ever in a month.

- Committed his first error of the season June 16 against Seattle, which snapped a 152-game errorless streak as an outfielder...the streak was [fifth](#) longest in Oakland history by an outfielder...it was his first error since June 1, 2017.
- Had his first career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle...added another on Aug. 25 against San Francisco.
- Went 3-for-3 with a walk and two stolen bases Aug. 1 against Milwaukee...it was the second two-steal game of his career (June 12, 2015 at Los Angeles-AL).
- Had a 10-game hitting streak from Aug. 14 to 26, which fell one short of his [career high](#)... went 19-for-42 (.452) with five home runs, 11 RBI, and seven multiple hit games during the streak.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of Aug. 19-25 after going 9-for-19 (.474) with five runs, a double, four home runs, seven RBI and four multiple hit games in five games...it was his first weekly honor.

MATT CHAPMAN

- Made his second consecutive Opening Day start at third base on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and had a double, home run and three RBI.
- Homered in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts May 7 against Cincinnati for the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 10 against Cleveland, a walk-off home run off Brad Hand to lead off the 12th...it was the third time he was at the plate for a walk-off (single and error on July 22, 2018; wild pitch on Sept. 22, 2018).
- Hit safely in each of his five games against the Indians (7-for-22, .318) and has now hit safely in all 11 of his career games against Cleveland...is 18-for-43 (.419) with 12 runs, six doubles, a triple, four home runs and eight RBI (.884 slugging percentage, 1.363 OPS).
- Homered in a [career-high](#) tying three consecutive games from May 25-27 (also July 22-24, 2017).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run June 20 against Tampa Bay, a three-run shot off Castillo.
- Had a [career-high](#) 41-game errorless streak from June 23 to Aug. 15.
- Had a [career-high](#) six RBI June 30 at Los Angeles (AL) when he went 3-for-5 with a double, triple and home run...became the 10th player in Oakland history to fall a single short of the cycle (last: Canha, May 19, 2017)...drove in five runs nine games later against Seattle on July 16.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star Team June 30...finished second on the Player Ballot to Alex Bregman, who was voted in by the fans...walked in his only at bat in the All-Star Game July 9 at Cleveland and also scored a run...is the fifth third baseman in Oakland history to be named to the All-Star team (Bando, 1969, 72-74; Gross, 1977; Lansford, 1988; Donaldson, 2014).
- Also participated in the Home Run Derby on July 8 and hit 13 home runs in a first round loss to Vladimir Guerrero, Jr. (29).
- Had back-to-back two-homer games Aug. 14 at San Francisco and Aug. 15 against Houston, the third and fourth multi-homer games of his career...it marks the 12th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games...the last was Khris Davis (April 10-11, 2019).
- Scored three runs in each of those two games, marking the 16th time in Oakland history a player scored three or more runs in back-to-back games (last: Ben Zobrist, June 14-15, 2015).

JHAREL COTTON

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL March 27.
- Began a rehab assignment at Single-A Stockton May 17 and went 0-1 with a 6.43 ERA in three games, including two starts, before his rehab was halted May 29 due to a hamstring injury.
- Underwent right hamstring debridement surgery June 6, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper at the North Central Surgical Center in Dallas, Tex.

KHRIS DAVIS

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.
- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts April 26 at Toronto...it was his first of [three](#) four-strikeout games (July 26 vs. Texas, Aug. 20 vs. New York) and he now has [11](#) in his career.
- Homered twice on May 13 at Seattle to snap a 20-game homerless streak, which was his longest as an Athletic at the time...it was [his third multi-homer game of the season, his 19th as an Athletic and the 25th of his career.](#)
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list May 24 retroactive to May 22 with a left hip/oblique contusion and did not have a rehab assignment...suffered the injury on May 5 in Pittsburgh but played in seven of the A's 15 games following that before going on the IL, batting .346 with two home runs and three RBI...was reinstated from the IL June 1.
- Had the walk-off walk in the ninth inning July 28 against Texas, his seventh career game-ending RBI...it was the first walk-off walk by an Athletic since Josh Reddick on June 1, 2013 against Chicago (AL).
- Hit the go-ahead home run in the bottom of the eighth inning July 30 night against Milwaukee to snap a 29-game homerless streak...it was his longest homerless streak as an Athletic and the second longest of his career (36, Sept. 6, 2014-April 27, 2015)...it was his first home run since June 18 against Baltimore.

RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.
- Did not allow a run in six appearances with the Aviators and had two saves and 14 strikeouts in 9.2 innings when he was recalled by Oakland April 22.
- Allowed at least one run in four of his next five appearances (7.11 ERA, .433 opponents batting average) and was optioned back to Las Vegas May 2.

MARCO ESTRADA

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and was 0-2 with a 6.85 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day injured list April 17 with a lumbar strain.

MIKE FIERS

- Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).
- Put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had

back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts.

- That gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then allowed a **season-high** six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average.
- Began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings in a no decision at Houston April 7, **matching** the shortest start of his career (June 2, 2013 at Philadelphia)...walked a **season-high** four.
- Yielded a **season-high** nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss to Toronto on April 20...it was his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a six-game Coliseum winning streak.
- Then tossed five innings or more and allowed three runs or fewer in each of his next 19 starts from April 26 to Aug. 9, which was the longest such streak by an A's pitcher since at least 1908...the previous long was 16 by Dan Haren (April 7-June 26, 2007)...it is the third longest streak by an American League pitcher over that span (26, Corey Kluber, Aug. 3, 2017-June 10, 2018; 22, Johan Santana, June 9-Sept. 29, 2004)...went 9-1 with a 2.28 ERA during the streak.
- Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42).
- Then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May...had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124).
- Tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati (also Aug. 21, 2015 vs. Los Angeles-NL)...walked two and struck out six...tossed a **season-high** 131 pitches, which were **the most** by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...retired the first 11 before Winker reached base on an error with two outs in the fourth...set down the next seven before walking Suarez to start the seventh...Suarez was erased on a double play, Puig walked and Fiers then retired the final seven batters to complete the no-hitter.
- Became the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea last year on April 21...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has **two** career complete games, both no-hitters...according to Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).
- Had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May 13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...left with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth for the blown save...it was the first of **seven** times he left a game with the lead only to have the bullpen blow the save (May 31, June 22, July 3, July 18, July 28 and Aug. 15).
- Was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...**is the pitcher of record**.
- Allowed one earned run or fewer in five consecutive starts from June 17 to July 12 and was 3-0 with a 1.09 ERA over that span.
- Hit an **Oakland-record tying** three batters June 22 against Tampa Bay (11th time, previous: Raul Alcantara, Sept. 5, 2016).
- Went 4-0 with a 2.30 ERA and .212 opponents batting average in five starts in June...it was the third time in his career he won four games in a month (4-2 in Aug. 2012 and 4-1 in Aug. 2014)...had the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the AL in June (.283), tied for the lead in wins, had the fourth lowest OPS (.561) and ranked fifth in ERA.
- Then went 1-0 with a 2.14 ERA in five starts in July...ranked sixth in the AL in July ERA.

- Retired the side in order in the first inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his 1,000th career inning pitched.
- Walked a [season-high tying](#) four batters July 18 at Minnesota.
- Struck out a [season-high](#) eight in 7.0 scoreless innings on Aug. 9 at Chicago (AL) when he combined with Diekman and Soria on a four-hit shutout in the A's 7-0 win.
- Yielded a [career-high tying](#) four home runs in a no decision on Aug. 15 against Houston (third time, second vs. Houston).

DANIEL GOSSETT

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.
- Had his third career four-hit game June 5 at Los Angeles (AL), his first since Sept. 18, 2016 at New York (NL).
- Had a RBI single off Chaz Roe in the ninth inning on June 10 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit.
- Stole two bases July 30 against Milwaukee for the second time in his career (May 7, 2013 vs. Los Angeles-AL).
- Homered off Bergen Aug. 14 at San Francisco for his first home run off a left-handed pitcher since July 2, 2018 at Milwaukee (Suter)...it was his first home run against any pitcher since June 18, snapping a 41-game homerless streak...that tied for the third longest homerless streak of his career.
- Had the game-ending RBI single in the bottom of the 13th inning Aug. 16 against Houston for his first career walk-off RBI.

CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.
- Began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas June 13 and hit .333 with four home runs and 13 RBI in 13 games...reached base safely in each contest (.397 on-base percentage)...appeared in eight games at catcher and five at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL July 2 and went 1-for-3 with a grand slam and four RBI in his Oakland debut that night against Minnesota...became the first player in Athletics history (1901-present) to hit a grand slam in his first game with the A's.
- The grand slam was the second of his career (July 23, 2013 at Los Angeles-AL) and the four RBI [matched](#) his career high (third time, last: April 23, 2016 vs. Pittsburgh).
- Then was a perfect 4-for-4 two days later against the Twins for his first career four-hit game.
- Played an inning in left field July 22 at Houston, which was his first game in the outfield since Oct. 1, 2017 (also left field).

LIAM HENDRIKS

- Had a then [career-high 14.2](#)-inning scoreless streak from April 30 to May 28...allowed three runs in 4.1 innings over his next four games and then had a [career-high 20.2](#)-inning scoreless streak from June 6 to July 20.
- Was named American League Reliever of the Month for June after going 1-0 with two saves and a 0.60 ERA in 14 relief appearances...allowed just one run in 15.0 innings while striking out 22...it was his first career Reliever of the Month award.

- Was named to his first American League All-Star team as a replacement for Tampa Bay's Charlie Morton...pitched the sixth inning in the All-Star Game on July 9 in Cleveland (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 3 so, 1 hr)...the three strikeouts were the most by an Athletic in an All-Star Game since Jay Howell also had three in 1987.
- Made his 300th career appearance Aug. 14 at San Francisco and tossed 1.1 scoreless innings for the save.

NICK HUNDLEY

- Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

CORBAN JOSEPH

- Was batting .371 with 35 doubles, four triples, 13 home runs and 73 RBI in 97 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland Aug. 14.
- At the time of his promotion, he was tied for fifth among minor leaguers in doubles (35) and ranked eighth among full season minor leaguers in batting (.371)...was leading the Pacific Coast League in batting, ranked second in hits (142), tied for second in doubles, third in OPS (1.006), fourth in on-base percentage (.421) and sixth in slugging percentage (.585).
- Hit his first Major League home run Aug. 15 against Houston, a solo shot off Aaron Sanchez in the fourth inning.

RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston (also June 18 vs. Baltimore).
- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.
- Reached base safely in a [career-high](#) 28 consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second longest reaching base streak by a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979).
- Had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland, his second career game-ending RBI...the other was Aug. 3, 2018 vs. Detroit, also a single.
- Had a [career-high and A's season-high](#) 16-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...it matched the longest hitting streak by an Athletic over the last eight years...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak.
- Had an Oakland [record-tying](#) streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973).
- Had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI (Aug. 20, 2018 vs. Texas) and his first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB).
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts June 20 against Tampa Bay, his first career four-strikeout game.
- Was hit by a pitch an Oakland record-tying two times June 22 against Tampa Bay.
- Had seven home runs and 22 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for fourth in the AL in RBI in June.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of July 15-21 after going 13-for-24 (.542) with 10 runs, six doubles, two home runs, two RBI and five multiple hit games in six games...it was his first career weekly honor.

SEAN MANAEA

- Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

NICK MARTINI

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 8 and hit .302 with 10 RBI and seven walks (.392 on-base percentage) in 12 games before he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas May 28.
- Was recalled by Oakland July 22 and went 0-for-2 with a strikeout that day at Houston...also pitched a scoreless eighth inning in the A's 11-1 loss (2 bb, 1 so)...it marked the 14th time in Oakland history a position player pitched...it was the second time this year and seventh time in the last five years.

KENDRYS MORALES

- Was acquired from the Toronto Blue Jays for minor league infielder Jesus Lopez and international slot money March 27.
- Made his second career appearance as a pitcher April 20 against Toronto in the ninth inning (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the other came on May 20, 2018 against Oakland at Toronto (1.0 ip, 1 bb)...it marked the 13th time in Oakland history a position player pitched, the sixth time in the last five years...is just the third to allow a run and is the first two walk two batters...the last was Jake Smolinski last year on June 13 against Houston.
- Matt Olson returned from the IL May 7 and Morales was batting .204 with a home run and seven RBI in 34 games when he was designated for assignment May 13...was traded to the New York Yankees the next day with cash for a player to be named later or cash considerations.

MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start back-to-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators, including three at first base and two at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL May 7.
- Committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...it was the fourth longest errorless in Oakland history by a first baseman.
- Had his first multi-homer game of the season June 28 at Los Angeles (AL) and matched his [career-high](#) with five RBI...added another two-homer game Aug. 15 against Houston and now has [six](#) multi-homer games in his career.
- Had a [career-high](#) 16-game hitting streak from June 30 to July 21, which tied for fifth longest in Oakland history by a first baseman...went 19-for-64 (.297) with four home runs and nine RBI during the streak.
- Batted .262 with seven doubles, nine home runs and 20 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for second in the AL in June extra base hits (16) and tied for third in home runs (9).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run July 30 against Milwaukee (also Aug. 17, 2018 vs. Houston)...it was his third career game-ending RBI.

JOSH PHEGLEY

- Had a [career-high](#) nine-game hitting streak from April 2-14...went 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...scored a run in each of the last seven games during the streak and drove in a run in each of the last six.
- Went 4-for-5 with two doubles, a home run, and a [career-high](#) eight RBI May 3 at Pittsburgh...it was his first career four-hit game...became just the 13th catcher in Major League history

to drive in eight or more runs in game, the first Athletic...was the fifth Oakland Athletic with eight or more RBI in a game, the first since Eric Chavez on Aug. 30, 2001.

- Had his second career four-hit game May 16 at Detroit and his third came on Aug. 26 at Kansas City.
- Tied for ninth in the AL with 20 RBI in May...those are his **most** RBI in a month, topping his 13 from April this year.

CHAD PINDER

- Snapped a 0-for-12 streak as a pinch hitter June 18 against Baltimore with his first career pinch home run...it was his first pinch hit since Sept. 9, 2018...added a second pinch homer Aug. 3 against St. Louis.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts Aug. 13 at San Francisco...it was his first career four-strikeout game.

STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...**matched his career high in hits (fourth time) and RBI (fifth time)**...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.
- Reached base safely in a **career-high** 25 consecutive games from April 28 to May 29...hit .280 with a .357 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 8 against Cincinnati, a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 13th.
- Had his second career four-strikeout game May 13 at Seattle (also Aug. 30, 2016 at Milwaukee).
- Collected his 500th career hit May 16 at Detroit.
- Had successful surgery June 13 to remove a melanoma from his right ear...the procedure was performed by Dr. Brian Parrett at the California Pacific Medical Campus.

JURICKSON PROFAR

- Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).
- Committed his eighth error of the season in his 28th game at second base May 3 at Pittsburgh...then had a 25-game errorless streak from May 4 to June 1.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 16 at Detroit.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 21 at Cleveland, which ties an Athletics record.
- Finished May with six home runs, which **matched** his most ever in a month (September, 2018)
- Had his second career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle (also June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).

FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

MARCUS SEMIEN

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.
- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping what was then a career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018...did not make his second error until June 2 for a 41-game errorless streak from April 12-June 1...that **tyed for fourth** longest in Athletics history by a shortstop.
- Led off the game with a home run May 28 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the third lead-off home run of his career.
- Was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 1 against Houston.
- Had a career-high 17-game hitting streak from June 4 to 20...hit .375 (27-for-72) with 16 runs, five doubles, a triple, three home runs and 13 RBI during the streak, which was **third longest in the AL this year** and the longest single-season hitting streak by an Athletic since a 22-game streak by Eric Byrnes from May 8-June 1, 2003 (Mark Ellis had a 17-game hitting streak from Sept. 21, 2010-April 5, 2011)
- Went 4-for-5 with three runs, two home runs and four RBI June 7 at Texas...it was his sixth career four-hit game...it was his first of **three** two-homer games (July 4 vs. Minnesota and Aug. 5 at Chicago-NL) and he now has **six** multi-homer games in his career.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of June 3-9 after going 13-for-31 (.419) with seven runs, two doubles, two home runs, nine RBI and three walks...it was the first weekly award of his career.
- Hit his 10th home run of the season June 15 and is the first Athletic to reach double figures in home runs in five consecutive seasons since Mark Ellis from 2005-09...is the 18th player in Oakland history with five or more 10-homer seasons.
- Tied for fourth in the AL in hits in June (35).
- Went 2-for-4 with two home runs and five RBI July 4 against Minnesota...one of the home runs was a grand slam, the fourth of his career.
- Had a **career-high** seven RBI Aug. 26 at Kansas City...had the most RBI by an A's leadoff hitter since RBI became an official statistic in 1920...joins Miguel Tejada as the only shortstops in Athletics history with seven or more RBI in a game (Tejada had eight on June 30, 2001).

JOAKIM SORIA

- Was on his 11th career Opening Day roster and made his Oakland debut in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...the A's became his seventh team in 12 seasons in the majors.
- Was charged with the loss March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) when he surrendered a **career-high tying** four runs without retiring a batter (11th time, first since Sept. 1, 2018 at Washington).
- Made his first career start June 5 at Los Angeles (AL) as the A's "opener" (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 so)...it came in his 667th career appearance...his career-opening streak of 666 appearances before making his first start was the longest in Major League history, topping the 638 games by Troy Percival before his first start on Sept. 30, 2007.

BEAU TAYLOR

- Was batting .297 with 33 walks and a .450 on-base percentage in 38 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland June 8.
- Made his first career start June 10 at Tampa Bay and went 0-for-2.
- Hit his first career home run June 18 against Baltimore, a solo shot off Gabriel Ynoa in the third inning.

BLAKE TREINEN

- Walked four batters April 7 at Houston, his most ever as a reliever...also allowed his first run of the season in that game and was charged with the loss and blown save...it snapped a streak of 24.1 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run, dating back to Aug. 25, 2018.

- Allowed his first run at home on May 11 against Cleveland, snapping a streak of 32.0 consecutive scoreless innings at home dating back to 2018...that was the longest home scoreless streak in Oakland history by a reliever and third longest overall...it was the first time he allowed a run at home since July 21, 2018 vs. San Francisco.
- Allowed a run in the 12th inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his first home loss since Sept. 5, 2017...it snapped a 10-game Coliseum winning streak, which matched the longest home winning streak ever by an Oakland pitcher (Paul Lindblad, April 21, 1975-June 25, 1976).

LOU TRIVINO

- Made his first Opening Day roster and pitched in each of the A's first four games...joined Denis Eckersley (1992) as the only pitchers in Oakland history to appear in each of the first four games of a season.
- Was charged with the loss in four consecutive appearances from May 29 to June 5, which matched the longest streak by a reliever in Oakland history (Brian Fuentes, May 18-23, 2011).
- Made his 100th career appearance June 9 at Texas.

J.B. WENDELKEN

- Tossed 2.0 scoreless innings on Opening Day and added a scoreless seventh inning March 30 against Los Angeles (AL) before being charged with his first run in the eighth inning...that snapped a [career-high](#) 17.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to July 24, 2018.
- Struck out a [career-high](#) four batters and allowed just one baserunner across a [career-high](#) 3.1 innings pitched against Houston April 7.
- Had a 1.59 ERA and .171 opponents batting average over his first seven games through April 10...then logged a 10.24 ERA and .310 opponents batting average over his next 11 games and had a 5.57 ERA in 18 games overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas May 12.
- Was recalled for his second stint on June 21 and had two scoreless outings (2.2 ip) before he was sent back to Triple-A June 26.
- Recorded his first Major League win June 25 at St. Louis when he tossed 0.2 scoreless innings...relieved Bassitt with one out in the fourth inning and the A's trailing 3-1...stranded two inherited runners and was credited with the win after Oakland scored six times in the top of the fifth.
