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OAKLAND ATHLETICS (90-60) VS. KANSAS CITY ROYALS (55-95)

ABOUT THE A'S: Swept a three-game series at Texas over the weekend for their 12th series sweep of the season...that is tied for third in the majors and matches the most by an A's team over the last 17 years (also 2013)... now have a six-game winning streak, which is the longest active streak in the majors and tied for second longest by the A's this year (11, May 16-27)... have won 11 of the last 13 games and 22 of the last 30... have sole possession of the first American League Wild Card spot for the fourth consecutive day... are 1½ games ahead of Tampa Bay and three games ahead of Cleveland...are a season-high 30 games over .500 at 90-60 (.600), which is the fourth best record in the AL and sixth best in the majors...are 39-19 (.672) since the All-Star Break, which is the best record in the majors...have been in second place in the AL West every day dating back to July 2 and trail first place Houston by 7½ games...have spent 81 days in second in the West, one day tied for second, 44 days in third, six days tied for third, 13 days in fourth, seven days tied for fourth and 17 days in fifth.

90 WINS: The A's won their 90th game of the season yesterday and have back-to-back 90 win seasons for the first time since 2012-13...have four 90-win seasons over the last eight years and 10 over the last 20...only the Dodgers (7) have more 90-win seasons over the last eight years and only the Yankees (15), Red Sox (13) and Braves (11) have more over the last 20.

THE LONG BALL: Matt Chapman's ninth inning home run yesterday at Texas was the A's 244th of the season, which broke the franchise record of 243 set in 1996 ... Marcus Semien hit his 30th home run yesterday, giving the A's a franchise record tying three players with 30 or more home runs (also 1996, 1999, 2001)...have set franchise records for most players with 20 or more home runs (7) and most players with 10 or more home runs (10)...are one of 10 teams in Major League history with

seven or more players with 20 or more home runs...only the Twins, with eight this year. have more.

THE MIDDLE OF JUNE: The A's were 36-36 (.500) at the conclusion of play on June 16 but have gone 53-24 (.688) since then, which is the best record in the majors...last year, the A's were 34-36 (.486) through June 15 but then went 63-29 (.685) from June 16 through the end of the season, which was the best record in the majors.

AGAINST THE CENTRAL: The A's are 23-7 (.767) against American League Central teams, which

is the second best mark against the Central in Oakland history (32-9, .780 in 2002)...have a run differential of +88 in 30 games against the Central (2.9 per game) compared to +64 against all other teams (0.5 per game)...are batting .277 (297-for-1071) with 183 runs (6.1 per game) and 50 home runs in 30 games...the pitching staff has a 2.92 ERA (89 er in 274.2 ip)...are now 75-26 (.743) against the Central dating back to Aug. 23, 2016.

IN SEPTEMBER: The A's are 11-3 (.786) in September, which is tied with the Brewers for the best record in the majors...have scored a Major League leading 99 runs, an average of 7.1 per game...rank second in the American League in on-base percentage (.344), tied for second in triples (4) and third in home runs (29), walks (59), extra base hits (59), OPS (.850) and slugging (.506).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin the final homestand of the season today, a six-game stand against Kansas City (three games) and Texas (three games)... went 5-1 on the last homestand against Los Angeles-AL (3-0) and Detroit (2-1) and are 29-10 (.744) over the last 39 home games dating back to June 17... are 48-27 (.640) overall, which is the third best home record in the American League...have clinched a winning record at home for the third consecutive year...have hit 116 home runs at home, which is tied for third most in Oakland history (129 in 2017, 126 in 2000, 116 in 2002)...have 262 extra base hits, which is sixth most (309 in 2017, 274 in 2002, 273 in 2018, 270 in 1999, 267 in 1996)...went 6-1 on the last road trip to Houston (3-1) and Texas (3-0)...the .857 winning percentage tied for sixth best on a road trip in Oakland history...are now 37-18 (.673) over their last 55 road games dating back to May 16 and 42-33 (.560) for the season...have clinched a winning record on the road for the second consecutive season

OFFENSE: The A's are batting .306 (71-for-232) with 57 runs scored, 14 doubles and 20 home runs over the last six games ... now have 801 runs for the

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season, which ranks fifth in the American League and eighth in Oakland history (7th is 804 in 1998, 6th is 806 in 1987, 5th is 813 in 2018)...have 536 extra base hits, which ranks fifth in the AL and eighth in Oakland history (7th is 540 in 2004, 6th is 542 in 1999)...have been hit by a pitch 82 times, which is the most in the AL, third most in the majors and second most in Athletics history to the record of 88 in 2001...also rank fourth in the AL in home runs (244) and fewest strikeouts (1234) and fifth in OPS (.781), on-base percentage (.327) and slugging percentage (.453)... are third in most grounded into double plays (129) and fewest stolen bases (44)

PITCHING: The A's compiled a 5.95 ERA on the last road trip and allowed 17 home runs in seven games...however, won six of the seven games...have allowed 189 home runs for the season, which is third fewest in the American League but fourth most in Oakland history (210 in 2017, 205 in 1996, 197 in 1997)...also rank third in the AL in opponents OPS (.718) and slugging (.407), fourth in ERA (4.08), batting average (.244), on-base percentage (.311) and fewest strikeouts (1185) and fifth in fewest walks (454)

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 13-1 with a 4.32 ERA (63 er in 131.1 ip) over the last 25 games dating back to Aug. 20...each of the A's last two losses by starting pitchers have been against Houston (Fiers a week ago today, Anderson on Aug. 18)...have not lost to a team other than Houston since Aug. 13 at San Francisco (Anderson)...starters are 64-34 with a 4.10 ERA overall...rank second in the American League in wins and fourth in ERA and innings pitched (820.2).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed at least one error in each of the last four games (six errors total) and now have 79 for the season, which is third fewest in the American League...the Athletics record for fewest errors in a season is 81 in 1981 and the fewest in a non-strike season is 84 in 2006... the errors have led to 33 unearned runs, which is the fewest in the majors... the fewest in Athletics history is 39 in 1981 and the fewest in a non-strike season is 42 in 1991... are second in the majors in opponents caught stealing (39).

THIS AND THAT: The A's are 30-12 (.714) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 60-48 (.556) against right-handers...the mark against lefties is second best in the majors to Houston (33-10)...have a run differential of +152, which is fourth best in the American League and fifth best in the majors...last year, the A's were +139...A's pinch hitters have 13 extra base hits, which ties the Oakland record set in 1968.

A's vs. ROYALS: The A's lead the season series 3-1 after taking three of four in Kansas City at the end of August...won the season series last year, 5-2...won three of four in Oakland and two of three in Kansas City...have won 17 of the last 23 games against the Royals and have outscored Kansas City 153-76 over that span (6.7 runs per game to 3.3 runs)...all-time, the A's are 325-266 (.550) against the Royals...the only American League team the A's have a better record against is Tampa Bay (.589)...are 175-118 in Oakland and 150-148 in Kansas City.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman has a career-high 34 home runs, which is an Athletics franchise record for home runs as a third baseman ... Liam Hendriks has 115 strikeouts, which is the most ever by an Australian born pitcher...113 of those have come in relief, which is two short of the Athletics record for strikeouts by a reliever (115, Rollie Fingers in 1975)...Matt Olson has 34 home runs, which are the most among American League first basemen, third in the majors and seventh in Oakland history...Marcus Semien hit his 30th home run of the season yesterday to join Miguel Tejada (2000, 01, 02) as the only shortstops in Athletics history with 30 home runs in a season...the home run was his 28th of the season batting first in the order, which ties the Athletics record set by Rickey Henderson in 1990.

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In 1934 Sugar Cain and Johnny Marcus toss complete games as the A's sweep a doubleheader at St. Louis 2-1 and 2-0...in 1947 the A's score all seven of their runs with two outs in the bottom of the seventh inning to defeat Cleveland 7-3 in the second game of a doubleheader...in 1980 Mike Norris goes the distance in the A's 4-2, 11 inning win at Texas...Oakland scores two in the ninth and two in the 11th as Norris wins his 20th game of the season.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Tanner Roark (4-1, 3.40 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Was acquired from Cincinnati on July 31 with cash considerations for minor league outfielder Jameson Hannah and is 4-1 with a 3.40 ERA (16 er in 42.1 ip) in seven starts with the A's...has allowed two earned runs or fewer in five of his seven starts with Oakland and 17 of 28 overall ... the A's are 5-2 (.714) in his starting assignments...went 6-7 with a 4.24 ERA in 21 starts with the Reds and is 10-8 with a 4.01 ERA (68 er in 152.2 ip) in 28 starts for the season.

CAREER NOTES: Picked up his 10th win of the season in his last start for his fourth career 10-win season...has allowed 22 home runs, which is two short of his career high of 24 from last year...is scheduled to make his 29th start of the season today and needs one more for his fourth consecutive season with 30 or more starts...currently, only Justin Verlander and Julio Teheran have made at least 30 starts each of the last four years.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed 22 home runs, 17 of which have come with the bases empty...11 have come to batters leading off an inning, which is tied for fifth most in the majors...has yielded just three home runs with two outs...12 of the 22 home runs have come the second time through the lineup...has allowed 20 home runs in 96.1 innings over his last 17 starts after yielding two in 56.1 innings over his first 11 starts.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on five days rest today... is 6-2 with a 3.28 ERA (21 er in 57.2 ip) in 11 starts on four days rest compared to 4-6 with a 4.45 ERA (47 er in 95.0 ip) in 17 starts on five days rest or more.

BEFORE AND AFTER THE BREAK: Was 5-6 with a 3.51 ERA and .249 opponents batting average in 17 starts before the All-Star Break...is 5-2 in 10 starts since then but has a 4.77 ERA (32 er in 60.1 ip) and .293 (71-for-242) opponents average

THIS AND THAT: Is tied for fourth in the majors in hit batters (12)...is averaging 17.9 pitches per inning, which is the highest mark in the majors...his wild pitch on Aug. 22 was his first since July 3, 2018, snapping a streak of 37 consecutive starts without a wild pitch...has 144 strikeouts in 152.2 innings and his average of 8.49 strikeouts per nine innings is currently the highest mark of his career (8.24 in 2017).

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Allowed three runs in each of his first two starts (5.79 ERA) but then went 3-1 with a 2.53 ERA and .231 opponents batting average over his next six starts from April 13 to May 9...left with a 4-3 lead in his second start on April 6 at Pittsburgh only to have the bullpen blow the save...it was the first of two times the pen blew a save in one of his starts (July 18 vs. St. Louis)...started the Reds April 13 home game against St. Louis in Monterrey, Mexico, and had a no decision in a 5-2 win...allowed one run in 5.1 innings but left trailing 1-0...walked a season-high four batters in 3.2 innings April 29 at New York (NL)...matched that in 3.1 innings July 30 against Pittsburgh...went 1-5 with a 4.09 ERA over a six-start stretch from May 14 to June 15...struck out a season-high nine batters in 5.0 scoreless innings May 26 at Chicago (NL)...went 3-2 with a 2.28 ERA in five starts in May and did not allow a home run in 27.2 innings...it was his lowest single-month ERA since compiling a mark of 2.03 in April of 2016...drove in both of the Reds runs in a 5-2 loss to Washington on June 1...had a suicide squeeze in the second inning and then hit his first career home run in the fourth, a solo shot off Eric Fedde...went over the 1,000 career innings pitched plateau June 8 at Philadelphia...tossed a season-high 7.0 innings and a season-high 116 pitches June 15 against Texas but took the loss, allowing four runs, two earned... vielded one run in back-to-back starts on June 20 at Milwaukee and June 26 at Los Angeles (AL)...then went 1-1 with a 7.30 ERA and .346 opponents batting average in five starts in the month of July...surrendered seven home runs in 24.2 innings...allowed a season-high seven runs on a career-high 13 hits but had a no decision in the Reds 17-9 win at Colorado July 13...it was his 200th career appearance...was the losing pitcher in his final start with the Reds, an 11-4 loss to Pittsburgh on July 30...allowed five runs on six hits and four walks in a season-low 3.1 innings...finished July with a 1-1 record, a 7.30 ERA and .346 opponents batting average in five starts...then went 2-1 with a 3.30 ERA and .246 opponents average in five starts in August...picked up the win in his A's debut on Aug. 4 against St. Louis when he allowed a run on four hits in 5.0 innings.

LAST START: He won his 10th game of the season in the A's 21-7 win a Houston last Tuesday...Oakland scored seven times in the top of the first and he ended up allowing five runs on eight hits but just one walk in 5.2 innings... surrendered a career-high tying five home runs...yielded a run in the first on a Springer leadoff home run but the A's built an 11-1 lead before he surrendered his next run on a solo home run by Springer in the third...had a 19-2 lead when Maldonado homered in the fifth and a 20-3 lead when he allowed his final two runs in the sixth.

LHP Brett Anderson (12-9, 4.07 ERA): Won his career-high 12th game of the season in his last start, surpassing his previous high of 11 with the A's in his rookie season of 2009...is scheduled to make his 30th start of the season today, which matches his total from 2009 for second most in his career. is 10-5 with a 3.29 ERA and .240 opponents batting average in 18 starts at night compared to 2-4 with a 5.56 ERA and .319 opponents average in 11 starts during the day...ranks fourth in the American League in ERA at night, sixth in opponents OPS (.661) and tied for seventh in wins...was the winning pitcher is his last start, a 5-3 A's win at Houston last Wednesday (5.0 ip, 7 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 4 so)...is 2-1 with an 8.16 ERA (14.1 ip, 16 h, 13 r, 13 er, 4 bb, 10 so 0 hr) in three career appearances, all starts, against Kansas City...last faced the Royals on Sept. 20, 2017 at Toronto when he was the losing pitcher in the Blue Jays 15-5 loss (5.0 ip, 7 h, 2 r, 2 er, 3 bb, 4 so).

strained left shoulder...allowed two runs in 6.1 innings in his first start May 2 at Seattle but had a no decision in the A's 3-2 win...it was his first start as an Athletic since April 24, 2013 at Boston... allowed a season-high nine runs on a season-high 10 hits and a season-high three walks in just 3.0 innings in his second start May 7 against Houston...left his start on May 18 at Toronto with the shoulder injury after tossing a season-low 1.0 inning...made three rehab starts with Nashville before he was reinstated from the DL July 8...went 3-2 with a 2.90 ERA and .239 opponents batting average in nine starts before returning to the DL Aug. 28 with a strained left forearm...combined with Petit, Buchter and Pagán on a five-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Cleveland July 8...it was his first win as an Athletic since April 7, 2013...tossed five of the innings, allowed three of the hits and walked two...it was the last time he walked more than one batter as he issued one free pass or fewer in each of his final 12 starts (5 bb in 60.0 ip, 0.75 walks per nine innings)...struck out a season-high six batters in a 15-3 win at Texas July 23...those were his most strikeouts in a game since Sept. 15, 2015 vs. Colorado...finished July with a 2-1 record, a 3.98 ERA and .309 opponents average in four...then went 1-1 with a 2.15 ERA and .184 opponents average in five starts in August...did not allow a run in three of his August starts and the game went into extra innings in two of his three no decisions...walked just two batters in 29.1 innings...logged 7.0 shutout innings Aug. 3 against Detroit but had a no decision in the A's 1-0, 13-inning win...allowed a two-run home run to Calhoun in the third inning Aug. 10 at Los Angeles (AL), which was the first home run he surrendered to a left-handed hitter since July 28, 2015 at Oakland (Reddick)...had a season-high 18.2-inning scoreless streak from Aug. 10 to 27...tossed a season-high 7.2 scoreless innings Aug. 15 against Seattle but had a no decision in the A's 2-0, 12-inning loss...it was his longest outing since Oct. 1, 2015 at San Francisco (7.2 ip) and his longest scoreless outing since May 26, 2011 at Los Angeles-AL (8.0 ip)...combined with Familia and Trivino on a two-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win over Texas on Aug. 21 in Oakland...tossed seven of the innings, allowed one of the hits and matched his season high with six strikeouts...allowed five runs on seven hits in 2.2 innings in an 11-4 loss at Houston Aug. 27 before going on the DL a second time...did not have a rehab assignment before he was reinstated Sept. 13...went 1-1 with a 6.46 ERA and .318 opponents batting average in four starts following his return...tossed 3.1 innings or fewer in three of those starts...combined with Dull, Montas and Brooks on a four-hit shutout in the A's 10-0 win over Los Angeles (AL) Sept. 19 in Oakland...tossed 6.2 innings and allowed three of the hits.

2013—Was the A's Opening Day starting pitcher but finished the season in the bullpen after spending four months on the disabled list with a stress fracture in his right foot...was 1-4 with three saves, a 6.04 ERA and .287 opponents batting average in 16 games, including five starts... struck out 46 in 44.2 innings, marking the first time in his career he finished with more strikeouts than innings pitched...walked 21 and his average of 4.23 walks per nine innings was the highest of his career...pitched 3.0 innings in each of his three saves to become the second A's pitcher since 1992 with three three-inning saves in one season (Doug Jones, 1999)...allowed a .214 batting average to hitters leading off an inning...made his first career Opening Day start April 1 against Seattle but was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss...struck out the side in the first inning to become the first A's pitcher since at least 1947 to strike out the side in the first inning on Opening Day...struck out a career-high tying 10 batters in 6.0 innings in his second start, a 9-3 win at Houston April 7...it was his only win of the season...tossed 1.0 inning April 19 at Tampa Bay, allowing four runs on four hits and two walks...left the game early with a sprained right ankle...was scheduled to skip his start April 29 against Los Angeles (AL) but ended up pitching 5.1 innings of relief that night in the A's 10-8, 19-inning win...entered the game in the 13th inning for the first relief appearance of his career after 73 starts...allowed just one run...was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 1 with a sprained right ankle...was diagnosed with a navicular stress fracture

of his right foot May 17 and was transferred to the 60-day DL June 14...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 28 and pitched exclusively in relief following his return, logging a 5.74 ERA and .306 opponents batting average in 10 appearances...recorded his first save in his first outing following his return Aug. 28 at Detroit...pitched the final three innings of the A's 14-4 win, allowing three runs on five hits in 3.0 innings.

2012—Completed his rehab from "Tommy John" surgery in late August and made six starts before his regular season ended when he strained his right oblique Sept. 19...went 4-2 with a 2.57 ERA and .225 opponents batting average...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings...yielded a .148 average with runners in scoring position...was reinstated from the disabled list Aug. 20 and started the next day against Minnesota...allowed just one run in 7.0 innings for the win...it was his first start since June 5, 2011 at Boston...combined with Cook and Balfour on a two-hit shutout in his second start, a 3-0 win at Cleveland Aug. 27...tossed 7.0 innings and allowed both of the hits...allowed one run in each of his next two starts to become the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1918 to begin his season with four consecutive starts of one run or fewer...won each of his first four starts to become the first Oakland pitcher to start the season by winning at least his first four starts since Dave Stewart had six wins in his first six starts in 1990...the four-game winning streak matched the longest of his career (third time, last: Sept. 6 to Oct. 2, 2010)...had a 0.69 ERA, a .185 opponents batting average and three walks in 26.0 innings over his first four starts... left his final start Sept. 19 at Detroit after just 2.1 innings with the oblique injury...returned to start and win Game 3 of the ALDS against Detroit in Oakland...combined with Cook, Doolittle and Balfour on a four-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two of the hits (2 bb, 6 so)...combined for a 1-1 record and a 4.62 ERA during a six-start rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...began his rehab assignment July 21 with Stockton, one year and seven days after having reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his left elbow...was transferred to Sacramento July 26.

2010—Lowered his ERA by more than a run from his rookie campaign of 2009 but two stints on the disabled list with elbow problems limited him to just 19 starts...was 7-6 with a 2.80 ERA after going 11-11 with a 4.06 ERA in his first season...opponents batted .257, including .225 with runners in scoring position...tied for eighth in the AL with four pickoffs...did not allow a run in his first two starts of the season April 8 against Seattle and April 13 at Seattle to become the first starting pitcher in Oakland history (among pitchers who began the season with the A's) to start the season with two consecutive scoreless outings...the last Athletics pitcher to do it was Alex Kellner of the 1953 Philadelphia A's, who started the season with back-to-back complete game shutouts...agreed to terms April 16 on a four-year contract through the 2013 season with club options for 2014 and 2015...had his season-opening scoreless streak snapped at 14.0 innings in his third start, an 8-3 loss to Baltimore...that was the third longest season-opening streak by a starter in Oakland history and the longest since Matt Keough set the record with a 16.0 inning streak in 1980...was 1-1 with a 2.35 ERA in four starts before going on the 15-day disabled list April 27 retroactive to April 25 with left elbow inflammation and a proximal medial forearm strain...was reinstated from the DL May 29...had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...was reinstated July 30 and went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...finished the season with a career-high tying fourgame winning streak...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA in six starts in September.

2008—Combined for an 11-5 record and a 3.69 ERA in 20 games, 19 starts, with Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland in his first season in the A's organization...also pitched for the United States team in the All-Star Futures Game at Yankee Stadium July 13 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb) and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 13 h, 8 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 10 so, 2 hr) in two starts during the Olympics...was rated as the A's number one prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...was named California League Pitcher of the Week, June 9-15...won both of his starts and allowed just one run in 14.0 innings, while striking out 16... joined Team USA for the Olympics in August...had a no decision Aug. 16 in a 5-4 win over Canada (5.2 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 so)...then started and won in the Bronze Medal game Aug. 23 against Japan, an 8-4 win (7.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 6 so).

2007—Was Arizona's second round pick in 2006 but did not sign until Sept. 1, 2006...made his professional debut in 2007 and was a combined 11-7 with a 3.07 ERA in 23 games, all starts, with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Visalia...was 8-4 with a 2.21 ERA in 14 starts at South Bend and was a *Baseball America* Low Class A All-Star...made one postseason start for Visalia and took the loss (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so, 2.25 ERA)...was traded to the A's on December 14 and was named Oakland's third best prospect by *Baseball America*.

Anderson was originally signed by Diamondbacks scout Joe Robinson...graduated from Stillwater (OK) High School...was a *Baseball America* 1st Team High School All-America selection in 2006 after going 9-0 with two saves and a 0.37 ERA in 12 games as a senior...struck out 102 and walked just nine in 57 innings...his father, Frank, was the head baseball coach at Oklahoma

State University from 2003-12 and is now pitching coach at the University of Houston...was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after-school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.

Oakland is 7-4 (.636) in his starting assignments...made his first start with Oakland on July 17 and his six wins over that span are tied for seventh most in the American League...his six wins match the most by an Athletic acquired in an in-season trade over the last 20 years (Jon Lester, 6 in 2014)...is 4-0 with a 2.25 ERA and .213 opponents batting average over his last six starts... the four-game winning streak matches the second longest of his career...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 3-2 A's win at Houston last Thursday (5.1 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 4 so)...was the winning pitcher in his only career appearance against the Royals, a start in the A's 19-4 win at Kansas City earlier this year on Aug. 26 (6.0 ip, 8 h, 3 r, 3 er, 0 bb, 3 so).

FOR STARTERS: Was acquired from Kansas City on July 14 for minor league infielder Kevin Merrell minutes before he was scheduled to start for the Royals against Detroit...is 6-2 with a 4.70 ERA (32 er in 61.1 ip) in 11 starts with Oakland after going 7-6 with a 4.80 ERA in 18 starts with Kansas City... has allowed three runs or fewer in nine of his 11 starts with the A's but yielded seven and nine runs in his other two...Oakland is 7-4 (.636) in his starting assignments.

SIX WINS WITH THE A's: Made his first start with Oakland on July 17 and his six wins over that span are tied for seventh most in the American League... his six wins match the most by an Athletic acquired in an in-season trade over the last 20 years (Jon Lester, 6 in 2014)...the last time an Athletic had more than six was in 1999 when Kevin Appier and Omar Olivares had seven each.

A's 2018 LEADERS: Led the A's in wins, starts, innings, strikeouts (108), hits (141), runs (67), home runs (21) and losses (9)...it marked the second consecutive season, fourth time in Oakland history (also 1996-97) and fifth time in Athletics history (1957) the A's did not have a pitcher with enough innings to qualify for the ERA title...it was just the sixth time in Oakland history the A's did not have a pitcher with enough innings to qualify for the zera title...it was just the sixth time in Oakland history the A's did not have a pitcher with at least 30 starts in a non-strike season (1979, 1986, 1996-97, 2017)...his nine losses match the fewest by a team-leader in a non-strike season in Oakland history (Hudson, 2001) and the 27 starts and 108 strikeouts were the fewest by an A's team leader since Steve Karsay had 24 starts and 92 strikeouts in 1997.

2018 TRENDS: Went 4-2 with a 1.03 ERA and .134 opponents batting average over his first six starts through the end of April, 1-4 with a 7.18 ERA and .295 opponents average in six starts in May, 5-1 with a 3.12 ERA and .231 opponents average over his next 11 starts from June 5 to Aug. 1 and 2-2 with a 5.12 ERA and .316 opponents batting average over his final four starts.

FOR STARTERS: Was acquired from Cincinnati on July 31 with cash considerations for minor league outfielder Jameson Hannah and is 4-1 with a 3.40 ERA (16 er in 42.1 ip) in seven starts with the A's...has allowed two earned runs or fewer in five of his seven starts with Oakland and 17 of 28 overall ... the A's are 5-2 (.714) in his starting assignments...went 6-7 with a 4.24 ERA in 21 starts with the Reds and is 10-8 with a 4.01 ERA (68 er in 152.2 ip) in 28 starts for the season.

CAREER NOTES: Picked up his 10th win of the season in his last start for his fourth career 10-win season...has allowed 22 home runs, which is two short of his career high of 24 from last year...is scheduled to make his 29th start of the season today and needs one more for his fourth consecutive season with 30 or more starts...currently, only Justin Verlander and Julio Teheran have made at least 30 starts each of the last four years.

- Was 3-0 with a 2.50 ERA over his first three starts through April 9...then went 1-3 with a 5.52 ERA over his next six starts through May 14
- Left with a 7-3 lead on April 14 at Texas but Soria blew the save in the eighth inning...it was his first of three starts in which the bullpen blew the save (June 12 at Tampa Bay, August 25 vs. San Francisco).
- Was charged with his first loss of the season April 21 games Toronto when he lasted a season-low 2.2 innings following an ankle injury...it snapped a career-high tying four-game winning streak dating back to Sept. 19, 2018 (fourth time)...went 4-0 with a 3.50 ERA and ..243 opponents average during the streak, which spanned seven starts.
- Made his next scheduled start April 27 at Toronto but allowed a season-high 10 hits for his second consecutive loss.
- Finished April 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA and .307 opponents batting average in five starts...then went 3-1 with a 3.34 ERA and .225 opponents batting average in five starts in May.
- Snapped his two-game losing streak May 3 at Pittsburgh when he picked up his 50th career win in the A's 14-1 victory.
- Walked a season-high five and had a no decision in the A's 5-4, 13-inning win over Cincinnati May 8 in Oakland...did not strike out a batter for the sixth time in his career as a starter (number seven came on June 23 against Tampa Bay).
- Struck out a season-high five but also surrendered a career-high tying three home runs in a 4-3 loss at Seattle on May 14
- Left his start on May 20 at Cleveland after 5.1 innings with a cervical strain but did not miss a start...picked up the win in that start to begin a six-start stretch through June 18 where he went 3-1 with a 2.70 ERA.
- Tossed a season-high 110 pitches in a 7-1 win over Seattle on May 26...the pitches were his most since June 26, 2015 at Miami (113).
- Struck out a season-high tying five batters in a no decision on June 7 at Texas
- Allowed a season-high seven runs on nine hits and two walks in 3.0 innings in an 8-2 loss at Tampa Bay June 23.
- Tossed a season-high 7.2 innings and allowed two hits when he combined with Liam Hendriks on a three-hit shutout in a 4-0 win at Los Angeles (AL) on June 29.
- Was 9-5 with a 3.86 ERA in 18 starts at the All-Star Break...had never won more than five games before the break entering this season.
- Surrendered a career-high tying three home runs July 20 at Minnesota
- Was on the paternity list from July 22 to 24 but did not miss a start.
- Did not walk a batter in three of his five starts in July and issued just two free passed in 30.2 innings (0.59 per nine innings)

FRANKLIN BARRETO

• Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pinch ran in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo...that was his only appearance before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 28 prior to the resumption of the regular season.

- Was named Pacific Coast League Player of the Month for June after batting .387...he led the league in total bases (85), ranked second in hits (45), doubles (13) and RBI (32) and third in slugging (.802).
- Returned to Oakland for his second stint on June 30...was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in runs scored (65) at the time of his promotion...was also tied for second in doubles (24), tied for fifth in extra base hits (41) and tied for seventh in triples (5).

CHRIS BASSITT

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27 retroactive to March 25 with a right lower leg contusion.
- Made one rehab start with Single-A Stockton on April 4 and two with Triple-A Las Vegas on April 9 and 14...was 0-0 with a 3.27 ERA in three starts overall when he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas April 16.
- Was recalled by Oakland the next day when Marco Estrada went on the IL.

SKYE BOLT

- Was recalled from Triple-A Las Vegas May 3 and made his Major League debut that night at Pittsburgh...pinch hit in the seventh inning and popped out to first in his first career at-bat... remained in the game in center field and finished the night 0-for-2 with a strikeout.
- Collected his first ML hit May 4, a pinch-hit double off Keone Kela in the seventh inning.
- Was 1-for-4 in three games when he was optioned back to Las Vegas May 7.

AARON BROOKS

• Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan...took the fifth spot in the rotation once the regular season resumed.

SETH BROWN

- Was batting .297 with 37 home runs and 104 RBI in 112 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland on Aug. 27.
- At the time of his promotion, he ranked second in the minors in home runs to the Diamondbacks Kevin Cron (39) and second in RBI to the Pirates Mason Martin (123)...was leading the Pacific Coast League in RBI and total bases (286), ranked second in home runs, extra base hits (72) and runs (101), fourth in slugging (.634) and ninth in OPS (.986).
- Made his Major League debut with a start in left field on Aug. 26 at Kansas City and went 2-for-6 with a RBI...singled in the second inning off Brad Keller for his first ML hit and had a RBI single in his next at bat in the third inning for his first RBI.
- Had a career-high four hits Aug. 29 at Kansas City in his fourth big league game...become the first Athletic with a four-hit game before his fifth career game since Doug Jennings went 4-for-4 in his fourth game on April 13, 1988.
- Then went 3-for-3 with three RBI the next day at New York (AL), giving him in a hit in seven
 consecutive bats...entered the game in the sixth inning and became the first A's player with
 at least three hits and three RBI in a game he did not start since Billy Hitchcock went 4-for-4
 with four RBI on Sept. 5, 1951
- Had 10 hits over his first five games through Aug. 30, which are the most in Oakland history and the most by an Athletic since Spook Jacobs had 10 in his first five games for the 1954 Philadelphia A's.
- Had two triples Sept. 1 against Los Angeles (AL) to tie the Oakland single-game record (12th time, last: Matt Chapman at Texas, July 26, 2018)...it was the first two-triple game in the Coliseum since May 12, 2007 (Josh Barfield, TOR) and the first by an Athletic since Aug. 3, 2002 (Mark Ellis vs. Detroit).

RYAN BUCHTER

- Did not allow a run in six of his first seven appearances (2.70 ERA).
- That included the 200th appearance of his career April 6 at Houston when he tossed a scoreless eighth inning.

- Then allowed at least one run in four of his next six games and had a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents batting average in 13 appearances overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Made one appearance with the Aviators on April 26 against El Paso (1.0 ip) before returning to Oakland April 29.

MARK CANHA

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list April 29 with a sprained right wrist...went 1-for-8 (.125) with a double, RBI, sacrifice fly and three strikeouts on a two-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas on May 10 and 11 and was reinstated May 13.
- Hit his third career pinch-homer May 21 at Cleveland (had two in 2018).
- Homered in three consecutive games for the first time in his career from May 21-24.
- Hit seven home runs in May, which tied for 10th in the American League and are his most ever in a month.
- Committed his first error of the season June 16 against Seattle, which snapped a 152-game errorless streak as an outfielder...the streak was fifth longest in Oakland history by an outfielder...it was his first error since June 1, 2017.
- Had his first career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle...added another on Aug. 25 against San Francisco.
- Went 3-for-3 with a walk and two stolen bases Aug, 1 against Milwaukee...it was the second two-steal game of his career (June 12, 2015 at Los Angeles-AL).
- Reached base safely in a career-high 23 consecutive games from Aug. 13 to Sept. 8...hit .318 with a .442 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had a 10-game hitting streak from Aug. 14 to 26, which fell one short of his career high... went 19-for-42 (.452) with five home runs, 11 RBI, and seven multiple hit games during the streak.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of Aug. 19-25 after going 9-for-19 (.474) with five runs, a double, four home runs, seven RBI and four multiple hit games in five games...it was his first weekly honor.
- Hit .347 with a .434 on-base percentage, .602 slugging percentage and 1.036 OPS in August... the batting average and on-base percentage were the best single-month marks of his career... had six home runs and 18 RBI in 25 games and the RBI were his second best one-month total (21 in Aug. 2015).
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts and a hit by pitch Sept. 7 against Detroit...the four strikeouts matched his career high (third time, last: June 1, 2017 at Cleveland).

MATT CHAPMAN

- Made his second consecutive Opening Day start at third base on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and had a double, home run and three RBI.
- Homered in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts May 7 against Cincinnati for the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 10 against Cleveland, a walk-off home run off Brad Hand to lead off the 12th...it was the third time he was at the plate for a walk-off (single and error on July 22, 2018; wild pitch on Sept. 22, 2018).
- Hit safely in each of his five games against the Indians (7-for-22, .318) and has now hit safely in all 11 of his career games against Cleveland...is 18-for-43 (.419) with 12 runs, six doubles, a triple, four home runs and eight RBI (.884 slugging percentage, 1.363 OPS).
- Homered in a career-high tying three consecutive games from May 25-27 (also July 22-24, 2017).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run June 20 against Tampa Bay, a three-run shot off Castillo.
- Had a career-high 41-game errorless streak from June 23 to Aug. 15.
- Had a career-high six RBI June 30 at Los Angeles (AL) when he went 3-for-5 with a double, triple and home run...became the 10th player in Oakland history to fall a single short of the cycle (last: Canha, May 19, 2017)...drove in five runs nine games later against Seattle on July 16.

- Was named to his first American League All-Star Team June 30...finished second on the Player Ballot to Alex Bregman, who was voted in by the fans...walked in his only at bat in the All-Star Game July 9 at Cleveland and also scored a run...is the fifth third baseman in Oakland history to be named to the All-Star team (Bando, 1969, 72-74; Gross, 1977; Lansford, 1988; Donaldson, 2014).
- Also participated in the Home Run Derby on July 8 and hit 13 home runs in a first round loss to Vladimir Guerrero, Jr. (29).
- Had back-to-back two-homer games Aug. 14 at San Francisco and Aug. 15 against Houston, the third and fourth multi-homer games of his career...it marks the 12th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games...the last was Khris Davis (April 10-11, 2019).
- Scored three runs in each of those two games, marking the 16th time in Oakland history a
 player scored three or more runs in back-to-back games (last: Ben Zobrist, June 14-15, 2015).
- Collected his 100th career double Aug. 31 at New York (AL).

JHAREL COTTON

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL March 27.
- Began a rehab assignment at Single-A Stockton May 17 and went 0-1 with a 6.43 ERA in three games, including two starts, before his rehab was halted May 29 due to a hamstring injury.
- Underwent right hamstring debridement surgery June 6, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper at the North Central Surgical Center in Dallas, Tex.

KHRIS DAVIS

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.
- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts April 26 at Toronto...it was his first of three four-strikeout games (July 26 vs. Texas, Aug. 20 vs. New York) and he now has 11 in his career.
- Homered twice on May 13 at Seattle to snap a 20-game homerless streak, which was his longest as an Athletic at the time...it was his third multi-homer game of the season, his 19th as an Athletic and the 25th of his career.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list May 24 retroactive to May 22 with a left hip/oblique contusion and did not have a rehab assignment...suffered the injury on May 5 in Pittsburgh but played in seven of the A's 15 games following that before going on the IL, batting .346 with two home runs and three RBI...was reinstated from the IL June 1.
- Had the walk-off walk in the ninth inning July 28 against Texas, his seventh career gameending RBI...it was the first walk-off walk by an Athletic since Josh Reddick on June 1, 2013 against Chicago (AL).
- Hit the go-ahead home run in the bottom of the eighth inning July 30 night against Milwaukee to snap a 29-game homerless streak...it was his longest homerless streak as an Athletic

and the second longest of his career (36, Sept. 6, 2014-April 27, 2015)...it was his first home run since June 18 against Baltimore.

RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.
- Did not allow a run in six apperaances with the Aviators and had two saves and 14 strikeouts in 9.2 innings when he was recalled by Oakland April 22.
- Allowed at least one run in four of his next five appearances (7.11 ERA, .433 opponents batting average) and was optioned back to Las Vegas May 2.

MARCO ESTRADA

• Was on the A's Opening Day roster and was 0-2 with a 6.85 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day injured list April 17 with a lumbar strain.

MIKE FIERS

- Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).
- Put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts.
- That gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then allowed six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average.
- Began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings and walking a season-high four in a no decision at Houston April 7.
- Yielded a season-high nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss to Toronto on April 20...it was
 his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a sixgame Coliseum winning streak.
- Then tossed five innings or more and allowed three runs or fewer in each of his next 19 starts from April 26 to Aug. 9, which was the longest such streak by an A's pitcher since at least 1908...the previous long was 16 by Dan Haren (April 7-June 26, 2007)...it is the third longest streak by an American League pitcher over that span (26, Corey Kluber, Aug. 3, 2017-June 10, 2018; 22, Johan Santana, June 9-Sept. 29, 2004)...went 9-1 with a 2.28 ERA during the streak.
- Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42).
- Then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May... had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124).
- Tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati (also Aug. 21, 2015 vs. Los Angeles-NL)...walked two and struck out six...tossed a season-high 131 pitches, which were the most by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...retired the first 11 before Winker reached base on an error with two outs in the fourth...set down the next seven before walking Suarez to start the seventh...Suarez was erased on a double play, Puig walked and Fiers then retired the final seven batters to complete the no-hitter.
- Became the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...
 is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy
 Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the
 Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with
 the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in
 Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea

last year on April 21...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has two career complete games, both no-hitters...according to Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).

- Had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May
 13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the
 only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...left
 with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth
 for the blown save...it was the first of eight times he left a game with the lead only to have the
 bullpen blow the save (May 31, June 22, July 3, July 18, July 28, Aug. 15 and Sept. 3).
- Was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...the A's held on to win the game when it was completed on Sept. 6 in Oakland, extending his winning streak to 12 games.
- Allowed one earned run or fewer in five consecutive starts from June 17 to July 12 and was 3-0 with a 1.09 ERA over that span.
- Hit an Oakland-record tying three batters June 22 against Tampa Bay (11th time, previous: Raul Alcantara, Sept. 5, 2016).
- Went 4-0 with a 2.30 ERA and .212 opponents batting average in five starts in June...it was the third time in his career he won four games in a month (4-2 in Aug. 2012 and 4-1 in Aug. 2014)...had the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the AL in June (.283), tied for the lead in wins, had the fourth lowest OPS (.561) and ranked fifth in ERA.
- Then went 1-0 with a 2.14 ERA in five starts in July...ranked sixth in the AL in July ERA.
- Retired the side in order in the first inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his 1,000th career inning pitched.
- Walked a season-high tying four batters July 18 at Minnesota.
- Struck out a season-high eight in 7.0 scoreless innings on Aug. 9 at Chicago (AL) when he combined with Diekman and Soria on a four-hit shutout in the A's 7-0 win.
- Was the winning pitcher in his 200th career appearance, a 2-1 A's win at Kansas City Aug. 27... allowed one run in 5.1 innings.
- Went 4-0 with a 2.76 ERA in five starts in August...it marked the second time he won four games in a month this year (June), the fourth time in his career (Aug. 2012, Aug. 2014)...tied for third in the American League in wins and ranked eighth in ERA.

DANIEL GOSSETT

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.
- Had his third career four-hit game June 5 at Los Angeles (AL), his first since Sept. 18, 2016 at New York (NL).
- Had a RBI single off Chaz Roe in the ninth inning on June 10 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit.
- Stole two bases July 30 against Milwaukee for the second time in his career (May 7, 2013 vs. Los Angeles-AL).
- Homered off Bergen Aug. 14 at San Francisco for his first home run off a left-handed pitcher since July 2, 2018 at Milwaukee (Suter)...it was his first home run against any pitcher since June 18, snapping a 41-game homerless streak...that tied for the third longest homerless streak of his career.
- Had the game-ending RBI single in the bottom of the 13th inning Aug. 16 against Houston for his first career walk-off RBI.

LIAM HENDRIKS

- Had a then career-high 14.2-inning scoreless streak from April 30 to May 28...allowed three runs in 4.1 innings over his next four games and then had a career-high 20.2-inning scoreless streak from June 6 to July 20.
- Recorded a strikeout in 27 consecutive games from June 8 to Aug. 15 (53 so in 29.0 ip, 16.45 per nine innings), which was the longest streak by an A's reliever since at least 1908...topped the previous mark of 26 by Keith Foulke (June 18-Aug. 16, 2003)...walked just three batters over that span, all intentional.
- Was named American League Reliever of the Month for June after going 1-0 with two saves and a 0.60 ERA in 14 relief appearances...allowed just one run in 15.0 innings while striking out 22...it was his first career Reliever of the Month award.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star team as a replacement for Tampa Bay's Charlie Morton...pitched the sixth inning in the All-Star Game on July 9 in Cleveland (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 3 so, 1 hr)...the three strikeouts were the most by an Athletic in an All-Star Game since Jay Howell also had three in 1987.
- Made his 300th career appearance Aug. 14 at San Francisco and tossed 1.1 scoreless innings for the save.
- Converted each of his eight save opportunities in 11 outings in August and allowed just one run (12.1 ip, 6 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 23 so).

CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.
- Began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas June 13 and hit .333 with four home runs and 13 RBI in 13 games...reached base safely in each contest (.397 on-base percentage)...appeared in eight games at catcher and five at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL July 2 and went 1-for-3 with a grand slam and four RBI in his Oakland debut that night against Minnesota...became the first player in Athletics history (1901-present) to hit a grand slam in his first game with the A's.
- The grand slam was the second of his career (July 23, 2013 at Los Angeles-AL) and the four RBI matched his career high (third time, last: April 23, 2016 vs. Pittsburgh).
- Then was a perfect 4-for-4 two days later against the Twins for his first career four-hit game.
- Played an inning in left field July 22 at Houston, which was his first game in the outfield since Oct. 1, 2017 (also left field).

NICK HUNDLEY

• Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

CORBAN JOSEPH

- Was batting .371 with 35 doubles, four triples, 13 home runs and 73 RBI in 97 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland Aug. 14.
- At the time of his promotion, he was tied for fifth among minor leaguers in doubles (35) and ranked eighth among full season minor leaguers in batting (.371)...was leading the Pacific Coast League in batting, ranked second in hits (142), tied for second in doubles, third in OPS (1.006), fourth in on-base percentage (.421) and sixth in slugging percentage (.585).
- Hit his first Major League home run Aug. 15 against Houston, a solo shot off Aaron Sanchez in the fourth inning.

RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston (also June 18 vs. Baltimore).

- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 28 consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second longest reaching base streak by a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979).
- Had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland, his second career game-ending RBI...the other was Aug. 3, 2018 vs. Detroit, also a single.
- Had a career-high and A's season-high 16-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...it matched the longest hitting streak by an Athletic over the last eight years...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak.
- Had an Oakland record-tying streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973).
- Had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI (Aug. 20, 2018 vs. Texas) and his
 first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand
 slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first
 Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last
 Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB).
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts June 20 against Tampa Bay, his first career four-strikeout game.
- Was hit by a pitch an Oakland record-tying two times June 22 against Tampa Bay.
- Had seven home runs and 22 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for fourth in the AL in RBI in June.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of July 15-21 after going 13for-24 (.542) with 10 runs, six doubles, two home runs, two RBI and five multiple hit games in six games...it was his first career weekly honor.
- Batted .392 with 22 runs, nine doubles, eight home runs, 18 RBI and 11 multiple hit games in 22 games in July...led the American League in on-base percentage (.443), ranked second in batting (.392), sluging (.838) and OPS (1.281), tied for fourth in runs, tied for fifth in extra base hits (17), tied for sixth in doubles and tied for sixth in home runs.....based on a minimum of 75 plate appearances, he had the best July batting average in Oakland history and the second best slugging percentage and OPS to Mark McGwire in 1996 (.859/1.318).

SEAN MANAEA

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

NICK MARTINI

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 8 and hit .302 with 10 RBI and seven walks (.392 on-base percentage) in 12 games before he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas May 28.

- Made his second career appearance as a pitcher April 20 against Toronto in the ninth inning (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the other came on May 20, 2018 against Oakland at Toronto (1.0 ip, 1 bb)...it marked the 13th time in Oakland history a position player pitched, the sixth time in the last five years...is just the third to allow a run and is the first two walk two batters... the last was Jake Smolinski last year on June 13 against Houston.
- Matt Olson returned from the IL May 7 and Morales was batting .204 with a home run and seven RBI in 34 games when he was designated for assignment May 13...was traded to the New York Yankees the next day with cash for a player to be named later or cash considerations.

SEAN MURPHY

- Was selected from Triple-A Las Vegas Sept. 1.
- Made his Major League debut Sept. 4 against Los Angeles (AL) in a start at catcher and went 1-for-3 in the A's 4-0 win...hit a solo home run off Jake Jewell in the fifth inning for his first hit and RBI...became the first Athletic to catch a shutout in his ML debut since Jack Lapp in the second game of a Sept. 11, 1908 doubleheader against Washington...is just the fourth ML catcher since 1908 to catch a shutout and homer in his debut (last: Aramis Garcia, SF vs. NYM on Aug. 31, 2018).
- Became the sixth player in Oakland history to homer in his debut, the first since Franklin Barreto on June 24, 2017 vs. Chicago (AL).

SHELDON NEUSE

- Was selected from Triple-A Las Vegas Aug. 29 and made his Major League debut Aug. 30 at New York (AL) in a start at designated hitter...drew a walk in his first plate appearance and went 0-for-3.
- Had a two-run double off Ryan Dull Sept. 1 at New York (AL) for his first ML hit and RBI.

MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery
 was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start backto-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators, including three at first base and two at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL May 7.
- Committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...it was the fourth longest errorless in Oakland history by a first baseman.
- Had his first multi-homer game of the season June 28 at Los Angeles (AL) and matched his career-high with five RBI...added another two-homer game Aug. 15 against Houston and now has six multi-homer games in his career.
- Had a career-high 16-game hitting streak from June 30 to July 21, which tied for fifth longest in Oakland history by a first baseman...went 19-for-64 (.297) with four home runs and nine RBI during the streak.
- Batted .262 with seven doubles, nine home runs and 20 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for second in the AL in June extra base hits (16) and tied for third in home runs (9).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run July 30 against Milwaukee (also Aug. 17, 2018 vs. Houston)...it was his third career game-ending RBI.
- Went 4-for-4 with a walk Sept. 7 against Detroit for his second career four-hit game (April 18 vs. Chicago-AL)...it was the second time he reached base safely five times in one game over his last seven games (3-for-4, 2 bb at New York on Aug. 31).

JOSH PHEGLEY

- Had a career-high nine-game hitting streak from April 2-14...went 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...scored a run in each of the last seven games during the streak and drove in a run in each of the last six.
- Went 4-for-5 with two doubles, a home run, and a career-high eight RBI May 3 at Pittsburgh... it was his first career four-hit game...became just the 13th catcher in Major League history to drive in eight or more runs in game, the first Athletic...was the fifth Oakland Athletic with eight or more RBI in a game, the first since Eric Chavez on Aug. 30, 2001.
- Had his second career four-hit game May 16 at Detroit and his third came on Aug. 26 at Kansas City.

• Tied for ninth in the AL with 20 RBI in May...those are his most RBI in a month, topping his 13 from April this year.

CHAD PINDER

- Snapped a 0-for-12 streak as a pinch hitter June 18 against Baltimore with his first career pinch home run...it was his first pinch hit since Sept. 9, 2018...added a second pinch homer Aug. 3 against St. Louis.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts Aug. 13 at San Francisco...it was his first career fourstrikeout game.
- Homered in the resumption of the suspended game against Detroit on Sept. 6, which is recorded as occurring on May 19...also homered on May 17 and 18 and the statistical record shows him homering in three consecutive games for the first time in his career.

STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...matched his career high in hits (fourth time) and RBI (fifth time)...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 25 consecutive games from April 28 to May 29...hit .280 with a .357 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 8 against Cincinnati, a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 13th.

- Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).
- Committed his eighth error of the season in his 28th game at second base May 3 at Pittsburgh...then had a 25-game errorless streak from May 4 to June 1.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 16 at Detroit.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 21 at Cleveland, which ties an Athletics record.
- Finished May with six home runs, which matched his most ever in a month (September, 2018)
- Had his second career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle (also June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).

FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the
 oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug
 Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest
 player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953
 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

MARCUS SEMIEN

 Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.

- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping what was then a career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018...did not make his second error until June 2 for a 41-game errorless streak from April 12-June 1...that tied for fourth longest in Athletics history by a shortstop.
- Led off the game with a home run May 28 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the first of three times he led off the game with a home run (July 19 at Minnesota, Aug. 28 at Kansas City) and he now has five for his career.
- Was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 1 against Houston.
- Had a career-high 17-game hitting streak from June 4 to 20...hit .375 (27-for-72) with 16 runs, five doubles, a triple, three home runs and 13 RBI during the streak, which was third longest in the AL this year and the longest single-season hitting streak by an Athletic since a 22-game streak by Eric Byrnes from May 8-June 1, 2003 (Mark Ellis had a 17-game hitting streak from Sept. 21, 2010-April 5, 2011)

- Went 2-for-4 with two home runs and five RBI July 4 against Minnesota...one of the home runs was a grand slam, the fourth of his career.
- Had a career-high seven RBI Aug. 26 at Kansas City...had the most RBI by an A's leadoff hitter since RBI became an official statistic in 1920...joins Miguel Tejada as the only shortstops in Athletics history with seven or more RBI in a game (Tejada had eight on June 30, 2001).
- Hit his 100th career home run Aug. 30 at New York (AL), a solo shot in the ninth inning of Nestor Cortes, Jr.
- Went 4-for-4 with three runs, two doubles and a hit by pitch Sept .5 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was his seventh career four-hit game, his second this year...it was the second time he reached base five times in a game (4-for-5 with a walk on April 8, 2014 with Chicago-AL vs. Colorado).

JOAKIM SORIA

- Was on his 11th career Opening Day roster and made his Oakland debut in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...the A's became his seventh team in 12 seasons in the majors.
- Was charged with the loss March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) when he surrendered a careerhigh tying four runs without retiring a batter (11th time, first since Sept. 1, 2018 at Washington).
