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OAKLAND ATHLETICS (94-61) VS. TEXAS RANGERS (74-81)

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won the first two games of OAKLAND A'S four short of the Athletics record of

this series...have swept 12 series, which is tied for third in the majors and matches the most by an A's team over the last 17 years (also 2013)...have not swept more than 12 series since they had 15 in 2002...have won four straight, 10 of the last 11, 15 of the last 18 and 26 of the last 35...are 43-20 (.683) since the All-Star Break, which is the best record in the majors...are a season-high 33 games over .500 at 94-61 (.606)...that is the fourth best record in the American League and sixth best in the majors...have not been more than 33 games over .500 since finishing the 2002 season at 44

games over .500 (103-59)...won 97 games last

year and now have 191 wins over the last two seasons, which is their most in back-to-back seasons since they had 199 from 2002-03...have won at least 90 games in each of the last two years, four of the last eight and 10 of the last 20...only the Yankees (15), Red Sox (13) and Braves (11) have more 90win seasons over the last 20 last year.

MAGIC AND TRAGIC NUMBERS: The A's have sole possession of the first American League Wild Card spot for the 10th consecutive day...are two games ahead of Tampa Bay and three games ahead of Cleveland...have a magic number of five to clinch a playoff spot...trail first place Houston in the AL West by seven games...have a tragic number of one to be eliminated from the AL West race.

THE MIDDLE OF JUNE: The A's were 37-36 (.507) at the conclusion of play on June 16 but have gone 57-25 (.695) since then, which is the best record in the majors...it matches the A's best record over an 82-game stretch over the last 14 years...last year, the A's were 34-36 (.486) through June 15 but then went 63-29 (.685) from June 16 through the end of the season, which was the best record in the majors.

IN SEPTEMBER: The A's are 15-4 (.789) in September, which is the second best record in the majors to the Brewers (16-4, .800)...lead the majors in runs this month (127)...lead the American League in walks (86), are tied for the lead in triples (5) and rank third in doubles (36), home runs (35), extra base hits (76) and on-base percentage (.345).

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit 250 home runs, which is the most in Athletics history, fifth most in the majors this year and 11th most in Major League history... the previous A's record was 243 in 1996...have also set franchise records for most players with 20 or more home runs (7) and most players with 10 or more (10) and have tied the mark for most players with 30 or more (3)...are one of 11 teams in Major League history with seven or more players with 20 or more home runs...only the Twins, with eight this year, have more.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 52-28 (.650) at home, which is the third best home record in the American League...with a win today, the A's would tied for the sixth best home record in Oakland history and have

the best since 2003 (57-24)...a loss would tied for the seventh best home record and be the most since 2013 (52-29)...this is the A's third consecutive season with a winning record at home...have 279 extra base hits at home, which is second most in Oakland history to the record of 309 in 2017...have 122 home runs, which is third most (129 in 2017, 126 in 2000)...are 4-1 on the final homestand of the season, a six-game stand against Kansas City (2-1) and Texas (2-0)...went 5-1 on the last homestand and are 33-11 (.750) over the last 44 home games dating back to June 17...leave following the game today for the final road trip of the season, a six-game trip to Los Angeles-AL (two games) and Seattle (four games) that starts on Tuesday.

OFFENSE: The A's rank fourth in the American League in home runs (250) and fifth in runs (829), extra base hits (553), OPS (.780), on-base percentage (.328) and slugging percentage (.452)...the extra base hits are fourth most in Oakland history (569 in 2018, 555 in 2001, 554 in 2017) and the runs scored are fifth (947 in 2000, 893 in 1999, 884 in 2001, 861 in 1996)...have been hit by a pitch 84 times, which is the most in the AL, third most in the majors and

four short of the Athletics record of 88 set in 2001...have 1278 strikeouts, which is fourth fewest in the AL but fourth most in Athletics history (1491 in 2017, 1387 in 2012, 1381 in 2018)...rank third in the AL in fewest stolen bases (46) and most grounded into double plays (133).

PITCHING: The A's shutout the Rangers over the first five innings last night to extend their scoreless streak to 29 innings...that tied for second longest in Oakland history and was the longest since Aug. 27-31, 1996 (also 29)... are tied for second in the American League in shutouts (11), rank third in opponents OPS (.714) and slugging (.405), fourth in ERA (4.01), batting average (.243) and on-base percentage (.309) and fifth in fewest walks (461)...have 1241 strikeouts, which is fourth fewest in the AL but is three short of the Athletics record of 1244 in 2014...have allowed 194 home runs, which is tied for second fewest in the AL but fourth most in Oakland history (210 in 2017, 205 in 1996, 197 in 1997).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 6-0 with a 3.79 ERA (24 er in 57.0 ip) over the last 11 games, 15-1 with a 3.90 ERA (70 er in 161.2 ip) over the last 30 and 17-2 with a 3.94 ERA (84 er in 191.2 ip) over the last 35...each of the last two losses by A's starters have come against Houston (Anderson on Aug. 18, Fiers on Sept. 9)...have not lost to a team other than Houston since Aug. 13 at San Francisco (Anderson)...starters are 66-34 with a 4.03 ERA overall...rank second in the American League in wins and fourth in ERA and innings pitched (851.0).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have committed 80 errors, which is third fewest in the AL...the Athletics record for fewest errors in a season is 81 in 1981 and the fewest in a non-strike season is 84 in 2006...the errors have led to 34 unearned runs, which is the fewest in the majors...the fewest in Athletics history is 39 in 1981 and the fewest in a non-strike season is 42 in 1991.

THIS AND THAT: The A's are 33-12 (.733) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 61-49 (.554) against right-handers...the mark against lefties is second best in the majors to Houston (34-11)...have a run differential of +170, which is third best in the American League and fourth best in the majors...have finished +160 or better three times in Oakland history: 239 in 2001, 180 in 1988, 163 in 1990...A's pinch hitters have 13 extra base hits, which ties the Oakland record set in 1968.

A's vs. RANGERS: The A's have won the season series for the third consecutive year as they lead 13-5 entering the final game today...went 13-6 last year and have won more than 13 games against the Rangers just once (15-4 in 2003)...have set a franchise record for most home runs against a single opponent (35)...went 6-3 in Texas and are 7-2 in Oakland...have a seven-game winning streak and are 22-6 over the last 28 games...have won 22 of the last 27 games in Oakland...are 37-19 (.661) over

the last three years...are 378-372 all-time against the Texas Rangers...that breaks down to 200-175 in Oakland and 178-197 in Texas...went 111-109 at Globe Life Park, which was the second best record by a visiting American League team (Yankees, 56-46, .549)...have an all-time record of 475-454 against the Rangers/Senators franchise.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Olson is tied for the American League lead in home runs (8) and extra base hits (14) in September and is tied for second in RBI (19)...has the most September home runs (26) and RBI (60) in the majors over the last three years...*Marcus Semien* is tied for third in Oakland history in runs scored (119), ranks fourth in extra base hits (79), sixth in total bases (331), tied for sixth in hits (181) and tied for 10th in doubles (40).

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1912** Eddie Collins steals six bases in a game for the second time in 11 days, an American League record that still stands today...in **1913** 19-year old Herb Pennock and Eddie Plank combine to blank Detroit 1-0 to clinch the AL pennant...in **1989** Dave Stewart pitches seven innings in the A's 5-2 win at Minnesota to win his 20th game of the season and the 100th of his career...it is his third consecutive 20 win season with the A's...in **1996** Mark McGwire ties a major league record by homering twice in the 5th inning of the A's 13-11 win at Seattle...the second homer is a grand slam and his 52nd and final of the season.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Tanner Roark (4-1, 3.83 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Was acquired from Cincinnati on July 31 with cash considerations for minor league outfielder Jameson Hannah and is 4-1 with a 3.83 ERA (20 er in 47.0 ip) in eight starts with the A's...has allowed two earned runs or fewer in five of his eight starts with Oakland and 17 of 29 overall... the A's are 5-3 (.625) in his starting assignments...went 6-7 with a 4.24 ERA in 21 starts with the Reds and is 10-8 with a 4.12 ERA (72 er in 157.1 ip) in 29 starts for the season.

CAREER NOTES: Is scheduled to make his 30th start of the season today... this will be his fourth consecutive season with 30 or more starts and he will be the seventh pitcher with at least 30 starts in each of the last four years (Leake, Lester, Porcello, Quintana, Teheran, Verlander)...picked up his 10th win of the season Sept. 10 for his fourth career 10-win season...has matched his career high with 13 hit batters...has allowed 23 home runs, which is one short of his career high of 24 from last year...currently has a career high in strikeouts per nine innings (8.69) and opponents on-base percentage (.334).

AGAINST THE WEST: IS 3-1 with a 2.45 ERA (10 er in 36.2 ip) in six starts against American League West teams compared to 7-7 with a 4.62 ERA (62 er in 120.2 ip) in 23 starts against all other teams...is 7-5 with a 2.54 ERA (29 er in 102.2 ip) in 16 career starts against the AL West.

AT THE COLISEUM: IS 4-0 with 2.34 ERA (9 er in 34.2 ip) in six starts in the Coliseum this year and 5-0 with a 2.52 ERA (14 er in 50.0 ip) in eight starts in his career.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed 23 home runs, 18 of which have come with the bases empty...12 have come to batters leading off an inning, which is tied for second most in the majors...has yielded just three home runs with two outs...13 of the 23 home runs have come the second time through the lineup...has allowed 21 home runs in 101.0 innings over his last 18 starts after yielding two in 56.1 innings over his first 11 starts.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on five days rest today...is 6-2 with a 3.28 ERA (21 er in 57.2 ip) in 11 starts on four days rest compared to 4-6 with a 4.61 ERA (51 er in 99.2 ip) in 18 starts on five days rest or more.

BEFORE AND AFTER THE BREAK: Was 5-6 with a 3.51 ERA and .249 opponents batting average in 17 starts before the All-Star Break...is 5-2 in 10 starts since then but has a 4.98 ERA (36 er in 65.0 ip) and .298 (78-for-262) opponents average.

THIS AND THAT: Is tied for third in the majors in hit batters (13)...is averaging 18.1 pitches per inning, which is the highest mark in the majors...his wild pitch on Aug. 22 was his first since July 3, 2018, snapping a streak of 37 consecutive starts without a wild pitch.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Allowed three runs in each of his first two starts (5.79 ERA) but then went 3-1 with a 2.53 ERA and .231 opponents batting average over his next six starts from April 13 to May 9...left with a 4-3 lead in his second start on April 6 at Pittsburgh only to have the bullpen blow the save...it was the first of two times the pen blew a save in one of his starts (July 18 vs. St. Louis)...started the Reds April 13 home game against St. Louis in Monterrey, Mexico, and had a no decision in a 5-2 win...allowed one run in 5.1 innings but left trailing 1-0...walked a season-high four batters in 3.2 innings April 29 at New York (NL)...matched that in 3.1 innings July 30 against Pittsburgh...went 1-5 with a 4.09 ERA over a six-start stretch from May 14 to June 15...struck out a season-high nine batters in 5.0 scoreless innings May 26 at Chicago (NL)...went 3-2 with a 2.28 ERA in five starts in May and did not allow a home run in 27.2 innings...it was his lowest single-month ERA since compiling a mark of 2.03 in April of 2016...drove in both of the Reds runs in a 5-2 loss to Washington on June 1...had a suicide squeeze in the second inning and then hit his first career home run in the fourth, a solo shot off Eric Fedde...went over the 1,000 career innings pitched plateau June 8 at Philadelphia...tossed a season-high 7.0 innings and a season-high 116 pitches June 15 against Texas but took the loss, allowing four runs, two earned... yielded one run in back-to-back starts on June 20 at Milwaukee and June 26 at Los Angeles (AL)...then went 1-1 with a 7.30 ERA and .346 opponents batting average in five starts in the month of July...surrendered seven home runs in 24.2 innings...allowed a season-high seven runs on a career-high 13 hits but had a no decision in the Reds 17-9 win at Colorado July 13...it was his 200th career appearance...was the losing pitcher in his final start with the Reds, an 11-4 loss to Pittsburgh on July 30...allowed five runs on six hits and four walks in a season-low 3.1 innings...finished July with a 1-1 record, a 7.30 ERA and .346 opponents batting average in five starts...then went 2-1 with a 3.30 ERA and .246 opponents average in five starts in August...picked up the win in his A's debut on Aug. 4 against St. Louis when he allowed a run on four hits in 5.0 innings.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 6-5 loss to Kansas City last Monday in Oakland...allowed a RBI triple to Mondesi in the first but the A's scored twice in the first and second to take a 4-1 lead...allowed a leadoff home run

TUESDAY'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Homer Bailey (13-8, 4.55 ERA): Was acquired from Kansas City on July 14 for minor league infielder Kevin Merrell...is 6-2 with a 4.21 ERA in 12 starts with Oakland after going 7-6 with a 4.80 ERA in 18 starts with Kansas City... Oakland is 8-4 (.667) in his starting assignments...his six wins match the most by an Athletic acquired in an in-season trade over the last 20 years (Jon Lester, 6 in 2014)...is 4-0 with a 1.88 ERA and .201 opponents batting average over his last seven starts...the four-game winning streak matches the second longest of his career...has 13 wins, which matches his career high from 2012 with Cincinnati...had a no decision in his last start, a 1-0 A's win in 11 innings last Wednesday against Kansas City (7.0 ip, 3 h, 1 bb, 11 so)...is 0-1 with a 6.75 ERA (12.0 ip, 13 h, 9 r, 9 er, 3 bb, 4 so) in two career starts against Los Angeles...including a loss in his only start this year, a 7-3 Royals loss at Kansas City on April 28 (6.0 ip, 6 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 so).

- The A's bullpen has compiled a 3.57 ERA (104 er in 262.1.0 ip) over the last 76 games since June 23 and now has a 3.97 ERA for the season, which is fourth lowest in the American League.
- Has the lowest opponents slugging mark in AL (.390), ranks second in OPS (.700) and third in on-base percentage (.310) and batting average (.235).
- Is 42-for-71 (59.2%) in save opportunities...the 29 blown saves are most in the Majors...they are tied for the most in ML history by a team with 90 or more wins (Colorado in 2007).

2010—Lowered his ERA by more than a run from his rookie campaign of 2009 but two stints on the disabled list with elbow problems limited him to just 19 starts...was 7-6 with a 2.80 ERA after going 11-11 with a 4.06 ERA in his first season...opponents batted .257, including .225 with runners in scoring position...tied for eighth in the AL with four pickoffs...did not allow a run in his first two starts of the season April 8 against Seattle and April 13 at Seattle to become the first starting pitcher in Oakland history (among pitchers who began the season with the A's) to start the season with two consecutive scoreless outings...the last Athletics pitcher to do it was Alex Kellner of the 1953 Philadelphia A's, who started the season with back-to-back complete game shutouts...agreed to terms April 16 on a four-year contract through the 2013 season with club options for 2014 and 2015...had his season-opening scoreless streak snapped at 14.0 innings in his third start, an 8-3 loss to Baltimore...that was the third longest season-opening streak by a starter in Oakland history and the longest since Matt Keough set the record with a 16.0 inning streak in 1980...was 1-1 with a 2.35 ERA in four starts before going on the 15-day disabled list April 27 retroactive to April 25 with left elbow inflammation and a proximal medial forearm strain...was reinstated from the DL May 29...had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...was reinstated July 30 and went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...finished the season with a career-high tying fourgame winning streak...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA in six starts in September.

Oakland is 7-4 (.636) in his starting assignments...made his first start with Oakland on July 17 and his six wins over that span are tied for eighth most in the American League...his six wins match the most by an Athletic acquired in an in-season trade over the last 20 years (Jon Lester, 6 in 2014)...is 4-0 with a 2.25 ERA and .213 opponents batting average over his last six starts...the four-game winning streak matches the second longest of his career...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 3-2 A's win at Houston last Thursday (5.1 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 4 so)...was the winning pitcher in his only career appearance against the Royals, a start in the A's 19-4 win at Kansas City earlier this year on Aug. 26 (6.0 ip, 8 h, 3 r, 3 er, 0 bb, 3 so).

FOR STARTERS: Was acquired from Kansas City on July 14 for minor league infielder Kevin Merrell minutes before he was scheduled to start for the Royals against Detroit...is 6-2 with a 4.70 ERA (32 er in 61.1 ip) in 11 starts with Oakland after going 7-6 with a 4.80 ERA in 18 starts with Kansas City... has allowed three runs or fewer in nine of his 11 starts with the A's but yielded seven and nine runs in his other two...Oakland is 7-4 (.636) in his starting assignments.

SIX WINS WITH THE A's: Made his first start with Oakland on July 17 and his six wins over that span are tied for eighth most in the American League...his six wins match the most by an Athletic acquired in an in-season trade over the last 20 years (Jon Lester, 6 in 2014)...the last time an Athletic had more than six was in 1999 when Kevin Appier and Omar Olivares had seven each.

FOUR-GAME WINNING STREAK: Is 4-0 with a 2.25 ERA (9 er in 36.0 ip) and .213 (29-for-136) opponents batting average over his last six starts and has walked just six batters in 36.0 innings (1.50 per nine innings)...the fourgame winning streak matches the second longest of his career...his career high is six from July 31-Sept. 14, 2013...went 2-2 with an 8.17 ERA and .308 opponents average over his first five starts with the A's and walked eight batters in 25.1 innings (2.84 per nine innings).

13-GAME WINNER: Picked up his 13th win of the season in his last start, which matches his career high from 2012 with Cincinnati...this is his third career 10-win season...was a combined 9-27 over his previous four seasons... his 135 strikeouts, 151.1 innings pitched and 29 starts are his most since 2013 (199 so, 209.0 ip, 32 gs)...his 52 walks are two short of his career high of 54 in 2013.

12-GAME WINNING STREAK SNAPPED: Took the loss at Houston Sept. 9 to snap his career high winning streak at 12 games...the streak was second longest in Oakland history and fell one short of the record of 13 set by Catfish Hunter in 1973 (June 2-Sept. 5)...it doubled his previous career high of six (July 21-Sept. 1, 2018)...it is the second longest winning streak in the majors this year (14, Cole, HOU, May 27-present)...compiled a 2.41 ERA and .214 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned 20 starts from May 7 to Aug. 27...was unbeaten in 21 consecutive starts from May 7 to Sept. 3, which matches Lefty Grove (April 22-Aug. 19, 1931) for the longest unbeaten streak by a starter in Athletics history.

NO-HITTER: Tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati to become the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams...his no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 8-6 win at Texas last Saturday... left after tossing 1.2 innings with nerve irritation in his right arm after logging 1.0 innings in his previous start...allowed a two-out, two-run home run to Odor in the second and then walked DeShields...was relieved by Blackburn, who allowed DeShields to score.

2018 RECAP: Was 12-9 with a 3.59 ERA and .232 opponents batting average in 27 starts before going on the disabled list Aug. 26 with a shoulder injury... underwent surgery Sept. 19 and missed the remainder of the season...his ERA, opponents batting average, on-base percentage (.278), slugging percentage (.385) and OPS (.663) were the lowest of his three seasons...also had career lows in strikeouts per nine innings (6.05) and walks per nine innings (1.79) and had a career-high 3.38 strikeout-to-walk ratio...had a career-high 160.2 innings pitched and 21 home runs and matched his best in wins... walked two batters or fewer in 24 of his 27 starts.

AMONG THE LEADERS, 2018: Based on a minimum of 150 innings, he had the fifth fewest walks per nine innings in the American League, the seventh lowest on-base percentage and the 10th lowest OPS...using the same minimum, he had the ninth fewest walks per nine innings in Oakland history, the 10th lowest on-base percentage and 10th best strikeout-to-walk ratio...averaged 14.8 pitches per inning, which was the lowest mark in the AL among pitchers with 150 or more innings pitched...tied for second in the AL in most sacrifice hits allowed (4), tied for sixth in opponents reaching on an error (8) and tied for 10th in wild pitches (9).

A's 2018 LEADERS: Led the A's in wins, starts, innings, strikeouts (108), hits (141), runs (67), home runs (21) and losses (9)...his nine losses match the fewest by a team-leader in a non-strike season in Oakland history (Hudson, 2001) and the 27 starts and 108 strikeouts were the fewest by an A's team leader since Steve Karsay had 24 starts and 92 strikeouts in 1997.

2018 TRENDS: Went 4-2 with a 1.03 ERA and .134 opponents batting average over his first six starts through the end of April, 1-4 with a 7.18 ERA and .295 opponents average in six starts in May, 5-1 with a 3.12 ERA and .231 opponents average over his next 11 starts from June 5 to Aug. 1 and 2-2 with a 5.12 ERA and .316 opponents batting average over his final four starts.

2018 OPPONENTS BATTING: His .232 opponents batting average broke down to .231 (112-for-485) against right-handed hitters compared to .236 (29-for-124) against left-handers...surrendered 19 of his 21 home runs to righties and has allowed 52 of his 60 career home runs to righties...has a .733 career OPS against righties, .584 against lefties...opponents hit .197 with a .254 on-base percentage and .306 slugging percentage when leading off an inning... had a .193 opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .255 after that...allowed a .189 batting average with two strikes...held the bottom four hitters in the order to a .174 average.

2018 SPLITS: Was 6-1 with a 3.44 ERA in 11 starts during the day, 6-8 with a 3.69 ERA in 16 starts at night...is now 16-4 with a 3.21 ERA (68 er in 190.2 ip) in 32 career day games, 17-24 with a 4.20 ERA (136 er in 291.1 ip) in 52 starts at night...went 7-3 with a 3.27 ERA in 13 starts on the road and tied for 10th in the AL in road wins...went 3-0 with a 1.78 ERA in four starts against AL Central teams and now has an eight-game winning streak against the Central dating back to Aug. 23, 2016...is 9-2 with a 2.39 ERA (20 er in 75.1 ip) in 12 career starts against AL Central teams.

2018 RUN SUPPORT: Received a total of eight runs of support in his nine losses (1.61 RSA) and has 28 runs of support in his 28 career losses (138.0 ip, 1.83 RSA)...received two runs of support or fewer in 14 of his 27 starts and was 2-8 in those games...was 10-1 in his other 13 starts...is now 4-26 in 43 career starts with support of two runs or fewer, 29-2 in 40 starts with support of three or more.

Oakland is 8-4 (.667) in his starting assignments...his six wins match the most by an Athletic acquired in an in-season trade over the last 20 years (Jon Lester, 6 in 2014)...is 4-0 with a 1.88 ERA and .201 opponents batting average over his last seven starts...the four-game winning streak matches the second longest of his career...has 13 wins, which matches his career high from 2012 with Cincinnati...had a no decision in his last start, a 1-0 A's win in 11 innings last Wednesday against Kansas City (7.0 ip, 3 h, 1 bb, 11 so)...is 0-1 with a 6.75 ERA (12.0 ip, 13 h, 9 r, 9 er, 3 bb, 4 so) in two career starts against Los Angeles...including a loss in his only start this year, a 7-3 Royals loss at Kansas City on April 28 (6.0 ip, 6 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 so).

2019 PLAYER HIGHLIGHTS

BRETT ANDERSON

- Was one of three inactive pitchers for the opening series in Japan.
- Was slotted in as the A's third starter when the club returned home and made his first start March 30 against Los Angeles (AL)...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings to extend his home scoreless streak to an Oakland record 34.1 innings...broke the previous record of 33.0 set by Matt Keough (Sept. 5, 1979-April 16, 1980)...it is also the longest Athletics home scoreless streak since at least 1908.

- Returned to Oakland for his second stint on June 30...was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in runs scored (65) at the time of his promotion...was also tied for second in doubles (24), tied for fifth in extra base hits (41) and tied for seventh in triples (5).
- Had a career-high 0-for-19 streak from July 16 to Sept. 10

CHRIS BASSITT

- Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan.

AARON BROOKS

• Began the season on the inactive list for the two-game series with Seattle in Japan...took the fifth spot in the rotation once the regular season resumed.

SETH BROWN

- Was batting .297 with 37 home runs and 104 RBI in 112 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland on Aug. 27.
- At the time of his promotion, he ranked second in the minors in home runs to the Diamondbacks Kevin Cron (39) and second in RBI to the Pirates Mason Martin (123)...was leading the Pacific Coast League in RBI and total bases (286), ranked second in home runs, extra base hits (72) and runs (101), fourth in slugging (.634) and ninth in OPS (.986).
- Made his Major League debut with a start in left field on Aug. 26 at Kansas City and went 2-for-6 with a RBI...singled in the second inning off Brad Keller for his first ML hit and had a RBI single in his next at bat in the third inning for his first RBI.
- Had a career-high four hits Aug. 29 at Kansas City in his fourth big league game...become the first Athletic with a four-hit game before his fifth career game since Doug Jennings went 4-for-4 in his fourth game on April 13, 1988.
- Then went 3-for-3 with three RBI the next day at New York (AL), giving him in a hit in seven
 consecutive bats...entered the game in the sixth inning and became the first A's player with
 at least three hits and three RBI in a game he did not start since Billy Hitchcock went 4-for-4
 with four RBI on Sept. 5, 1951
- Had 10 hits over his first five games through Aug. 30, which are the most in Oakland history and the most by an Athletic since Spook Jacobs had 10 in his first five games for the 1954 Philadelphia A's.
- Had two triples Sept. 1 against Los Angeles (AL) to tie the Oakland single-game record (12th time, last: Matt Chapman at Texas, July 26, 2018)...it was the first two-triple game in the Coliseum since May 12, 2007 (Josh Barfield, TOR) and the first by an Athletic since Aug. 3, 2002 (Mark Ellis vs. Detroit).

RYAN BUCHTER

- Did not allow a run in six of his first seven appearances (2.70 ERA).
- That included the 200th appearance of his career April 6 at Houston when he tossed a scoreless eighth inning.

- Then allowed at least one run in four of his next six games and had a 7.04 ERA and .375 opponents batting average in 13 appearances overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas April 22.
- Made one appearance with the Aviators on April 26 against El Paso (1.0 ip) before returning to Oakland April 29.

MARK CANHA

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list April 29 with a sprained right wrist...went 1-for-8 (.125) with a double, RBI, sacrifice fly and three strikeouts on a two-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas on May 10 and 11 and was reinstated May 13.
- Hit his third career pinch-homer May 21 at Cleveland (had two in 2018).

- Had his first career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle...added another on Aug. 25 against San Francisco.
- Went 3-for-3 with a walk and two stolen bases Aug, 1 against Milwaukee...it was the second two-steal game of his career (June 12, 2015 at Los Angeles-AL).
- Reached base safely in a career-high 23 consecutive games from Aug. 13 to Sept. 8...hit .318 with a .442 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had a 10-game hitting streak from Aug. 14 to 26, which fell one short of his career high... went 19-for-42 (.452) with five home runs, 11 RBI, and seven multiple hit games during the streak.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of Aug. 19-25 after going 9-for-19 (.474) with five runs, a double, four home runs, seven RBI and four multiple hit games in five games...it was his first weekly honor.

- Homered in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts May 7 against Cincinnati for the first four-strikeout game of his career.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 10 against Cleveland, a walk-off home run off Brad Hand to lead off the 12th...it was the third time he was at the plate for a walk-off (single and error on July 22, 2018; wild pitch on Sept. 22, 2018).
- Hit safely in each of his five games against the Indians (7-for-22, .318) and has now hit safely in all 11 of his career games against Cleveland...is 18-for-43 (.419) with 12 runs, six doubles, a triple, four home runs and eight RBI (.884 slugging percentage, 1.363 OPS).
- Homered in a career-high tying three consecutive games from May 25-27 (also July 22-24, 2017).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run June 20 against Tampa Bay, a three-run shot off Castillo.
- Had a career-high 41-game errorless streak from June 23 to Aug. 15.
- Had a career-high six RBI June 30 at Los Angeles (AL) when he went 3-for-5 with a double, triple and home run...became the 10th player in Oakland history to fall a single short of the cycle (last: Canha, May 19, 2017)...drove in five runs nine games later against Seattle on July 16.

- Was named to his first American League All-Star Team June 30...finished second on the Player Ballot to Alex Bregman, who was voted in by the fans...walked in his only at bat in the All-Star Game July 9 at Cleveland and also scored a run...is the fifth third baseman in Oakland history to be named to the All-Star team (Bando, 1969, 72-74; Gross, 1977; Lansford, 1988; Donaldson, 2014).
- Also participated in the Home Run Derby on July 8 and hit 13 home runs in a first round loss to Vladimir Guerrero, Jr. (29).
- Had back-to-back two-homer games Aug. 14 at San Francisco and Aug. 15 against Houston, the third and fourth multi-homer games of his career...it marks the 12th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games...the last was Khris Davis (April 10-11, 2019).
- Scored three runs in each of those two games, marking the 16th time in Oakland history a
 player scored three or more runs in back-to-back games (last: Ben Zobrist, June 14-15, 2015).
- Collected his 100th career double Aug. 31 at New York (AL).

JHAREL COTTON

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 as he continued his rehab from Mar. 31, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery...was transferred to the 60-day IL March 27.
- Began a rehab assignment at Single-A Stockton May 17 and went 0-1 with a 6.43 ERA in three games, including two starts, before his rehab was halted May 29 due to a hamstring injury.
- Underwent right hamstring debridement surgery June 6, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper at the North Central Surgical Center in Dallas, Tex.

KHRIS DAVIS

- Made his sixth consecutive Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo...homered in the opener for the third consecutive season and now has an Athletics record four career Opening Day home runs...broke the previous mark of three, which he shared with Jimmie Foxx, Dave Henderson and Terry Steinbach...also has eight RBI, which is tied with Henderson for second most in Oakland history to Steinbach (9).
- Had a two-run single in the seventh inning the next night against the Mariners for the 500th and 501st RBI of his career.
- Homered five times in the first seven games, which matched Mark McGwire (1992) and Reggie Jackson (1974) for the most in Athletics history over the first seven games of the season.
- Hit his 200th career home run April 10 at Baltimore, a seventh-inning solo shot off Josh Rogers...it came in his 790th career game, which were the ninth fewest games in ML history for a player to reach 200 career home runs.
- Homered twice in back-to-back games against the Orioles on April 10 and 11...it was the 11th time in Oakland history a player has back-to-back multi-homer games, the second over the last 20 years (Reddick, Aug. 9-10, 2013).
- Hit his 10th home run of the season in the A's 18th game on April 12 at Texas, which is the fewest games to 10 home runs in Athletics history...the previous earliest was Bob Cerv, who reached it in the Kansas City A's 19th game in 1958.
- Agreed to terms on a two-year contract extension through the 2021 season on April 18.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts April 26 at Toronto...it was his first of three four-strikeout games (July 26 vs. Texas, Aug. 20 vs. New York) and he now has 11 in his career.
- Homered twice on May 13 at Seattle to snap a 20-game homerless streak, which was his longest as an Athletic at the time.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list May 24 retroactive to May 22 with a left hip/oblique contusion and did not have a rehab assignment...suffered the injury on May 5 in Pittsburgh but played in seven of the A's 15 games following that before going on the IL, batting .346 with two home runs and three RBI...was reinstated from the IL June 1.
- Had the walk-off walk in the ninth inning July 28 against Texas, his seventh career gameending RBI...it was the first walk-off walk by an Athletic since Josh Reddick on June 1, 2013 against Chicago (AL).
- Hit the go-ahead home run in the bottom of the eighth inning July 30 night against Milwaukee to snap a 29-game homerless streak...it was his longest homerless streak as an Athletic

and the second longest of his career (36, Sept. 6, 2014-April 27, 2015)...it was his first home run since June 18 against Baltimore.

 Had his fourth two-homer game of the season Sept. 13 at Texas...it was the 26th of his career and his 20th as an Athletic...in Oakland history only McGwire (39), Jackson (28) and Canseco (21) have more multi-homer games.

RYAN DULL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and pitched in the opener on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (0.2 ip, 2 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hr)...that was his only outing before he was optioned to Triple-A Las Vegas March 27, the day before the regular season resumed.
- Did not allow a run in six apperaances with the Aviators and had two saves and 14 strikeouts in 9.2 innings when he was recalled by Oakland April 22.
- Allowed at least one run in four of his next five appearances (7.11 ERA, .433 opponents batting average) and was optioned back to Las Vegas May 2.

MARCO ESTRADA

• Was on the A's Opening Day roster and was 0-2 with a 6.85 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day injured list April 17 with a lumbar strain.

MIKE FIERS

- Was the A's Opening Day starter against Seattle on March 20 in Tokyo and was the losing pitcher in the A's 9-7 loss...it was his first career Opening Day start and he became the A's 12th different Opening Day starting pitcher over the last 14 years (Zito, Haren, Blanton, Braden, Sheets, Cahill, McCarthy, Anderson, Gray twice, Hill, Graveman twice).
- Put together wins in back-to-back starts on March 28 against Los Angeles and April 2 against Boston...did not allow a run in either outing, marking the second time in his career he had back-to-back starts without yielding a run...the other time was June 20-30, 2012 when he did it in three straight starts.
- That gave him a 2-1 record, a 3.00 ERA and a .189 opponents batting average over his first three starts...then allowed six runs in three consecutive starts from April 7-20 and went 0-1 with a 16.20 ERA and .442 opponents batting average.
- Began that streak by tossing just 1.2 innings and walking a season-high four in a no decision at Houston April 7.
- Yielded a season-high nine hits in just 3.1 innings in a 10-1 loss to Toronto on April 20...it was his first loss in the Coliseum since July 18, 2016 while pitching for Houston, snapping a six-game Coliseum winning streak.
- Then tossed five innings or more and allowed three runs or fewer in each of his next 19 starts from April 26 to Aug. 9, which was the longest such streak by an A's pitcher since at least 1908...the previous long was 16 by Dan Haren (April 7-June 26, 2007)...it is the third longest streak by an American League pitcher over that span (26, Corey Kluber, Aug. 3, 2017-June 10, 2018; 22, Johan Santana, June 9-Sept. 29, 2004)...went 9-1 with a 2.28 ERA during the streak.
- Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA and .333 opponents batting average in five starts in April...the ERA was his highest in a month of 10 or more innings (previous: 7.44 in Aug. 2017)...it was second highest in the majors this year among pitchers with 20 or more innings in April (Nova, CWS 8.42).
- Then went 2-1 with a 2.87 ERA and .161 opponents batting average in six starts in May... had the second lowest opponents batting average in the American League in May (Verlander, HOU .124).
- Tossed his second career no-hitter in the A's 2-0 win on May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati (also Aug. 21, 2015 vs. Los Angeles-NL)...walked two and struck out six...tossed a season-high 131 pitches, which were the most by an A's pitcher since Mark Mulder had 132 in a three-hit shutout against Toronto on May 2, 2001...retired the first 11 before Winker reached base on an error with two outs in the fourth...set down the next seven before walking Suarez to start the seventh...Suarez was erased on a double play, Puig walked and Fiers then retired the final seven batters to complete the no-hitter.
- Became the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters... is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams (Ted Breitenstein, Jim Bunning, Randy Johnson, Hideo Nomo, Nolan Ryan, Cy Young)...was named American League Co-Player of the

Week with George Springer May 13...it was his second career Player of the Week honor with the first coming Aug. 23, 2015 following his first no-hitter...this no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history...it was the first since Sean Manaea last year on April 21...his other no-hitter also came in interleague play on Aug. 21, 2015 for Houston against Los Angeles (NL) and he has each of the last two out of six total interleague no-hitters...tossed 131 pitches, which were the most in a no-hitter since he threw 134 in his against the Dodgers...now has two career complete games, both no-hitters...according to Stats, Inc., he is the first pitcher in ML history to have each of his first two career complete games be no-hitters...also according to Stats, his 6.81 ERA entering the game was the highest by any pitcher entering a start in which he threw a no-hitter (min. 25.0 ip).

- Had his hitless streak and scoreless streak broken up by the first batter in his next start May
 13 at Seattle as Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the
 only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...left
 with a 2-1 lead and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth
 for the blown save...it was the first of eight times he left a game with the lead only to have the
 bullpen blow the save (May 31, June 22, July 3, July 18, July 28, Aug. 15 and Sept. 3).
- Was the starting pitcher in the A's game at Detroit on May 19, which was suspended in the bottom of the seventh inning with the A's leading 5-3...the A's held on to win the game when it was completed on Sept. 6 in Oakland, extending his winning streak to 12 games.
- Allowed one earned run or fewer in five consecutive starts from June 17 to July 12 and was 3-0 with a 1.09 ERA over that span.
- Hit an Oakland-record tying three batters June 22 against Tampa Bay (11th time, previous: Raul Alcantara, Sept. 5, 2016).
- Went 4-0 with a 2.30 ERA and .212 opponents batting average in five starts in June...it was the third time in his career he won four games in a month (4-2 in Aug. 2012 and 4-1 in Aug. 2014)...had the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the AL in June (.283), tied for the lead in wins, had the fourth lowest OPS (.561) and ranked fifth in ERA.
- Then went 1-0 with a 2.14 ERA in five starts in July...ranked sixth in the AL in July ERA.
- Retired the side in order in the first inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his 1,000th career inning pitched.
- Walked a season-high tying four batters July 18 at Minnesota.
- Struck out a season-high eight in 7.0 scoreless innings on Aug. 9 at Chicago (AL) when he combined with Diekman and Soria on a four-hit shutout in the A's 7-0 win.
- Was the winning pitcher in his 200th career appearance, a 2-1 A's win at Kansas City Aug. 27... allowed one run in 5.1 innings.
- Went 4-0 with a 2.76 ERA in five starts in August...it marked the second time he won four games in a month this year (June), the fourth time in his career (Aug. 2012, Aug. 2014)...tied for third in the American League in wins and ranked eighth in ERA.
- Had his 12-game winning streak snapped in the A's 15-0 loss at Houston on Sept. 9...had career highs in runs (9) and home runs (5) and a career low in innings (1.0)...tied the Oakland record for home runs allowed in a game (fourth time, last: Ted Lilly, June 11, 2003 vs. Atlanta) and became the first Major Leaguer since at least 1908 to allow five home runs in one inning pitched or fewer...is the first A's pitcher to allow nine or more runs in one inning pitched or fewer since Lou Brissie allowed nine runs in 0.1 innings in the second game of a June 18, 1950 doubleheader against Cleveland.

DANIEL GOSSETT

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 15 as he continued his rehab from Aug. 1, 2018 right elbow UCL reconstruction surgery.

ROBBIE GROSSMAN

- Made his A's debut on Opening Day, March 20, against Seattle in Tokyo and had a pinch hit single in the seventh inning...it was the eighth Opening Day pinch hit in Oakland history, the first since Eric Byrnes in 2004.
- His fourth inning double on April 7 at Houston was the 100th of his career.
- Hit his first career pinch hit home run April 26 at Toronto.
- Had his third career four-hit game June 5 at Los Angeles (AL), his first since Sept. 18, 2016 at New York (NL).

- Had a RBI single off Chaz Roe in the ninth inning on June 10 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit.
- Stole two bases July 30 against Milwaukee for the second time in his career (May 7, 2013 vs. Los Angeles-AL).
- Homered off Bergen Aug. 14 at San Francisco for his first home run off a left-handed pitcher since July 2, 2018 at Milwaukee (Suter)...it was his first home run against any pitcher since June 18, snapping a 41-game homerless streak...that tied for the third longest homerless streak of his career.
- Had the game-ending RBI single in the bottom of the 13th inning Aug. 16 against Houston for his first career walk-off RBI.

LIAM HENDRIKS

- Had a then career-high 14.2-inning scoreless streak from April 30 to May 28...allowed three runs in 4.1 innings over his next four games and then had a career-high 20.2-inning scoreless streak from June 6 to July 20.
- Recorded a strikeout in 27 consecutive games from June 8 to Aug. 15 (53 so in 29.0 ip, 16.45 per nine innings), which was the longest streak by an A's reliever since at least 1908...topped the previous mark of 26 by Keith Foulke (June 18-Aug. 16, 2003)...walked just three batters over that span, all intentional.
- Was named American League Reliever of the Month for June after going 1-0 with two saves and a 0.60 ERA in 14 relief appearances...allowed just one run in 15.0 innings while striking out 22...it was his first career Reliever of the Month award.
- Was named to his first American League All-Star team as a replacement for Tampa Bay's Charlie Morton...pitched the sixth inning in the All-Star Game on July 9 in Cleveland (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 3 so, 1 hr)...the three strikeouts were the most by an Athletic in an All-Star Game since Jay Howell also had three in 1987.
- Made his 300th career appearance Aug. 14 at San Francisco and tossed 1.1 scoreless innings for the save.
- Converted each of his eight save opportunities in 11 outings in August and allowed just one run (12.1 ip, 6 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 23 so).

CHRIS HERRMANN

- Had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee March 8 at the Pima Surgical Center in Scottsdale, Ariz...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg and involved a chondroplasty procedure to Herrmann's central trochlea of his right knee as well as cleaning up loose bodies in the knee.
- Was placed on the 60-day injured list March 20 retroactive to March 17.
- Began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Las Vegas June 13 and hit .333 with four home runs and 13 RBI in 13 games...reached base safely in each contest (.397 on-base percentage)...appeared in eight games at catcher and five at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL July 2 and went 1-for-3 with a grand slam and four RBI in his Oakland debut that night against Minnesota...became the first player in Athletics history (1901-present) to hit a grand slam in his first game with the A's.
- The grand slam was the second of his career (July 23, 2013 at Los Angeles-AL) and the four RBI matched his career high (third time, last: April 23, 2016 vs. Pittsburgh).
- Then was a perfect 4-for-4 two days later against the Twins for his first career four-hit game.
- Played an inning in left field July 22 at Houston, which was his first game in the outfield since Oct. 1, 2017 (also left field).

NICK HUNDLEY

• Made his A's debut with seventh career Opening Day start on March 20 against Seattle at Tokyo (2010-13, 15-16, 19, all at catcher) and went 0-for-2...became the first non-roster invitee to make the A's Opening Day roster since Sam Fuld in 2014.

CORBAN JOSEPH

• Was batting .371 with 35 doubles, four triples, 13 home runs and 73 RBI in 97 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland Aug. 14.

- At the time of his promotion, he was tied for fifth among minor leaguers in doubles (35) and ranked eighth among full season minor leaguers in batting (.371)...was leading the Pacific Coast League in batting, ranked second in hits (142), tied for second in doubles, third in OPS (1.006), fourth in on-base percentage (.421) and sixth in slugging percentage (.585).
- Hit his first Major League home run Aug. 15 against Houston, a solo shot off Aaron Sanchez in the fourth inning.

RAMÓN LAUREANO

- Became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...went 0-for-5.
- Had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston (also June 18 vs. Baltimore).
- Was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernandez of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 28 consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second longest reaching base streak by a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979).
- Had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland, his second career game-ending RBI...the other was Aug. 3, 2018 vs. Detroit, also a single.
- Had a career-high and A's season-high 16-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...it matched the longest hitting streak by an Athletic over the last eight years...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak.
- Had an Oakland record-tying streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973).
- Had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI (Aug. 20, 2018 vs. Texas) and his
 first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand
 slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first
 Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last
 Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB).
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts June 20 against Tampa Bay, his first career four-strikeout game.
- Was hit by a pitch an Oakland record-tying two times June 22 against Tampa Bay.
- Had seven home runs and 22 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for fourth in the AL in RBI in June.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of July 15-21 after going 13for-24 (.542) with 10 runs, six doubles, two home runs, two RBI and five multiple hit games in six games...it was his first career weekly honor.
- Batted .392 with 22 runs, nine doubles, eight home runs, 18 RBI and 11 multiple hit games in 22 games in July...led the American League in on-base percentage (.443), ranked second in batting (.392), sluging (.838) and OPS (1.281), tied for fourth in runs, tied for fifth in extra base hits (17), tied for sixth in doubles and tied for sixth in home runs.....based on a minimum of 75 plate appearances, he had the best July batting average in Oakland history and the second best slugging percentage and OPS to Mark McGwire in 1996 (.859/1.318).

SEAN MANAEA

• Was placed on the 60-day injured list Feb. 13 as he continued his rehab from Sept. 19, 2018 shoulder surgery.

NICK MARTINI

- Was placed on the 10-day injured list Mar. 20 retroactive to Mar. 17 with a sprained right knee.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 8 and hit .302 with 10 RBI and seven walks (.392 on-base percentage) in 12 games before he was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas May 28.
- Was recalled by Oakland July 22 and went 0-for-2 with a strikeout that day at Houston...also
 pitched a scoreless eighth inning in the A's 11-1 loss (2 bb, 1 so)...it marked the 14th time in
 Oakland history a position player pitched...it was the second time this year and seventh time
 in the last five years.

KENDRYS MORALES

- Was acquired from the Toronto Blue Jays for minor league infielder Jesus Lopez and international slot money March 27.
- Made his second career appearance as a pitcher April 20 against Toronto in the ninth inning (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 1 so)...the other came on May 20, 2018 against Oakland at Toronto (1.0 ip, 1 bb)...it marked the 13th time in Oakland history a position player pitched, the sixth time in the last five years...is just the third to allow a run and is the first two walk two batters...the last was Jake Smolinski last year on June 13 against Houston.
- Matt Olson returned from the IL May 7 and Morales was batting .204 with a home run and seven RBI in 34 games when he was designated for assignment May 13...was traded to the New York Yankees the next day with cash for a player to be named later or cash considerations.

SEAN MURPHY

- Was selected from Triple-A Las Vegas Sept. 1.
- Made his Major League debut Sept. 4 against Los Angeles (AL) in a start at catcher and went 1-for-3 in the A's 4-0 win...hit a solo home run off Jake Jewell in the fifth inning for his first hit and RBI...became the first Athletic to catch a shutout in his ML debut since Jack Lapp in the second game of a Sept. 11, 1908 doubleheader against Washington...is just the fourth ML catcher since 1908 to catch a shutout and homer in his debut (last: Aramis Garcia, SF vs. NYM on Aug. 31, 2018).
- Became the sixth player in Oakland history to homer in his debut, the first since Franklin Barreto on June 24, 2017 vs. Chicago (AL).
- Had his first career multi-homer game Sept. 10 at Houston, going 3-for-5 with two home runs and four RBI...it came in his sixth career game, matching Mitchell Page for the earliest twohomer game in a career in Oakland history.
- Tied an Oakland record with three doubles Sept. 13 at Texas (31st time, last: Matt Chapman vs. Seattle, Aug. 13, 2018).

SHELDON NEUSE

- Was selected from Triple-A Las Vegas Aug. 29 and made his Major League debut Aug. 30 at New York (AL) in a start at designated hitter...drew a walk in his first plate appearance and went 0-for-3.
- Had a two-run double off Ryan Dull Sept. 1 at New York (AL) for his first ML hit and RBI.
- Had a career-high four hits Sept. 20 at Texas and added a career-high three RBI.

MATT OLSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo.
- Underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery
 was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164.
- Started at first base in the A's Opener on March 20 to become the first Athletic to start backto-back openers at first base since Daric Barton in 2010-11.
- Began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators, including three at first base and two at designated hitter.
- Was reinstated from the IL May 7.
- Committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...it was the fourth longest errorless in Oakland history by a first baseman.
- Had his first multi-homer game of the season June 28 at Los Angeles (AL) and matched his career-high with five RBI.
- Had a career-high 16-game hitting streak from June 30 to July 21, which tied for fifth longest in Oakland history by a first baseman...went 19-for-64 (.297) with four home runs and nine RBI during the streak.

- Batted .262 with seven doubles, nine home runs and 20 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for second in the AL in June extra base hits (16) and tied for third in home runs (9).
- Hit his second career walk-off home run July 30 against Milwaukee (also Aug. 17, 2018 vs. Houston)...it was his third career game-ending RBI.
- Had his second two-homer game Aug. 15 against Houston.
- Went 4-for-4 with a walk Sept. 7 against Detroit for his second career four-hit game (April 18 vs. Chicago-AL)...it was the second time he reached base safely five times in one game over his last seven games (3-for-4, 2 bb at New York on Aug. 31).
- Hit two home runs Sept. 10 at Houston for his third multi-homer game of the season and the seventh of his career...went homerless the next day and then homered in three straight games from Sept. 12-14...it was the fifth time in his career he homered in at least three straight games.

JOSH PHEGLEY

- Had a career-high nine-game hitting streak from April 2-14...went 13-for-33 (.394) with 10 runs scored, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...scored a run in each of the last seven games during the streak and drove in a run in each of the last six.
- Went 4-for-5 with two doubles, a home run, and a career-high eight RBI May 3 at Pittsburgh...
 it was his first career four-hit game...became just the 13th catcher in Major League history
 to drive in eight or more runs in game, the first Athletic...was the fifth Oakland Athletic with
 eight or more RBI in a game, the first since Eric Chavez on Aug. 30, 2001.
- Had his second career four-hit game May 16 at Detroit and his third came on Aug. 26 at Kansas City.
- Tied for ninth in the AL with 20 RBI in May...those are his most RBI in a month, topping his 13 from April this year.

CHAD PINDER

- Snapped a 0-for-12 streak as a pinch hitter June 18 against Baltimore with his first career pinch home run...it was his first pinch hit since Sept. 9, 2018...added a second pinch homer Aug. 3 against St. Louis.
- Went 0-for-4 with four strikeouts Aug. 13 at San Francisco...it was his first career fourstrikeout game.
- Homered in the resumption of the suspended game against Detroit on Sept. 6, which is recorded as occurring on May 19...also homered on May 17 and 18 and the statistical record shows him homering in three consecutive games for the first time in his career.

STEPHEN PISCOTTY

- Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day start in right field on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and hit his first home run of the season.
- Went 4-for-4 with a double, home run, walk and five RBI on April 4 against Boston...matched his career high in hits (fourth time) and RBI (fifth time)...added his fifth career four-hit game April 23 against Texas.
- Played in the 500th game of his career on April 24 against Texas.
- Reached base safely in a career-high 25 consecutive games from April 28 to May 29...hit .280 with a .357 on-base percentage during the streak.
- Had his first career game-ending RBI May 8 against Cincinnati, a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 13th.
- Had his second career four-strikeout game May 13 at Seattle (also Aug. 30, 2016 at Milwaukee).
- Collected his 500th career hit May 16 at Detroit.
- Had successful surgery June 13 to remove a melanoma from his right ear...the procedure was performed by Dr. Brian Parrett at the California Pacific Medical Campus.

JURICKSON PROFAR

 Went 4-for-5 with a home run and five RBI April 9 at Baltimore...it was his second career four-hit game (Sept. 2, 2018 vs. Minnesota) and second career five RBI game (June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).

- Committed his eighth error of the season in his 28th game at second base May 3 at Pittsburgh...then had a 25-game errorless streak from May 4 to June 1.
- Hit his first career grand slam May 16 at Detroit.
- Was hit by a pitch twice May 21 at Cleveland, which ties an Athletics record.
- Finished May with six home runs, which matched his most ever in a month (September, 2018)
- Had his second career two-homer game July 17 against Seattle (also June 6, 2018 vs. Oakland).

FERNANDO RODNEY

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and, at the age of 42 years and 2 days, was the oldest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history... the previous oldest was Doug Jones in 1999 (41 years, 285 days)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the oldest player on an Athletics Opening Day roster since Bobo Newsom of the Philadelphia A's in 1953 (45 years, 246 days).
- Joins Tommy John (1985), Rich Gossage (1993) and Doug Jones (1999 and 2000) as the only players in Oakland history to appear in a game at age 42 or greater.
- Made his 900th career appearance April 1 against Boston and tossed a scoreless ninth inning in the A's 7-0 win (1 bb, 2 so)...became the 26th player in Major League history to pitch in 900 games.

MARCUS SEMIEN

- Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at shortstop March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo... that ties the Oakland record for consecutive Opening Day starts by a shortstop (Campaneris, Bordick, Tejada and Crosby)...only Campaneris, with eight, has more Opening Day starts at shortstop in an Oakland uniform.
- Committed his first error of the season April 11 at Baltimore, snapping what was then a career-high 38-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 5, 2018...did not make his second error until June 2 for a 41-game errorless streak from April 12-June 1...that tied for fourth longest in Athletics history by a shortstop.
- Led off the game with a home run May 28 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the first of three times he led off the game with a home run (July 19 at Minnesota, Aug. 28 at Kansas City) and he now has five for his career.
- Was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 1 against Houston.
- Had a career-high 17-game hitting streak from June 4 to 20...hit .375 (27-for-72) with 16 runs, five doubles, a triple, three home runs and 13 RBI during the streak, which was third longest in the AL this year and the longest single-season hitting streak by an Athletic since a 22-game streak by Eric Byrnes from May 8-June 1, 2003 (Mark Ellis had a 17-game hitting streak from Sept. 21, 2010-April 5, 2011)
- Went 4-for-5 with three runs, two home runs and four RBI June 7 at Texas...it was his sixth career four-hit game and it was his first of three two-homer games (July 4 vs. Minnesota and Aug. 5 at Chicago-NL).
- Was named AL Player of the Week for the week of June 3-9 after going 13-for-31 (.419) with seven runs, two doubles, two home runs, nine RBI and three walks...it was the first weekly award of his career.
- Hit his 10th home run of the season June 15 and is the first Athletic to reach double figures in home runs in five consecutive seasons since Mark Ellis from 2005-09...is the 18th player in Oakland history with five or more 10-homer seasons.
- Tied for fourth in the AL in hits in June (35).
- Went 2-for-4 with two home runs and five RBI July 4 against Minnesota...one of the home runs was a grand slam, the fourth of his career.
- Had a career-high seven RBI Aug. 26 at Kansas City...had the most RBI by an A's leadoff hitter since RBI became an official statistic in 1920...joins Miguel Tejada as the only shortstops in Athletics history with seven or more RBI in a game (Tejada had eight on June 30, 2001).
- Hit his 100th career home run Aug. 30 at New York (AL), a solo shot in the ninth inning of Nestor Cortes, Jr.
- Went 4-for-4 with three runs, two doubles and a hit by pitch Sept .5 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was his seventh career four-hit game, his second this year...it was the second time he

reached base five times in a game (4-for-5 with a walk on April 8, 2014 with Chicago-AL vs. Colorado).

JOAKIM SORIA

- Was on his 11th career Opening Day roster and made his Oakland debut in the second game on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 1 so)...the A's became his seventh team in 12 seasons in the majors.
- Was charged with the loss March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) when he surrendered a careerhigh tying four runs without retiring a batter (11th time, first since Sept. 1, 2018 at Washington).
- Made his first career start June 5 at Los Angeles (AL) as the A's "opener" (1.0 ip, 2 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 so)...it came in his 667th career appearance...his career-opening streak of 666 appearances before making his first start was the longest in Major League history, topping the 638 games by Troy Percival before his first start on Sept. 30, 2007.
- Made his 700th career appearance Aug. 27 at Kansas City and tossed a scoreless inning of relief.

BEAU TAYLOR

- Was batting .297 with 33 walks and a .450 on-base percentage in 38 games with Triple-A Las Vegas when he was selected by Oakland June 8.
- Made his first career start June 10 at Tampa Bay and went 0-for-2.
- Hit his first career home run June 18 against Baltimore, a solo shot off Gabriel Ynoa in the third inning.

BLAKE TREINEN

- Walked four batters April 7 at Houston, his most ever as a reliever...also allowed his first run of
 the season in that game and was charged with the loss and blown save...it snapped a streak
 of 24.1 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run, dating back to Aug. 25, 2018.
- Allowed his first run at home on May 11 against Cleveland, snapping a streak of 32.0 consecutive scoreless innings at home dating back to 2018...that was the longest home scoreless streak in Oakland history by a reliever and third longest overall...it was the first time he allowed a run at home since July 21, 2018 vs. San Francisco.
- Allowed a run in the 12th inning on July 3 against Minnesota for his first home loss since Sept.
 5, 2017...it snapped a 10-game Coliseum winning streak, which matched the longest home winning streak ever by an Oakland pitcher (Paul Lindblad, April 21, 1975-June 25, 1976).

LOU TRIVINO

- Made his first Opening Day roster and pitched in each of the A's first four games...joined Dennis Eckersley (1992) as the only pitchers in Oakland history to appear in each of the first four games of a season.
- Was charged with the loss in four consecutive appearances from May 29 to June 5, which matched the longest streak by a reliever in Oakland history (Brian Fuentes, May 18-23, 2011).
- Made his 100th career appearance June 9 at Texas.

J.B. WENDELKEN

- Tossed 2.0 scoreless innings on Opening Day and added a scoreless seventh inning March 30 against Los Angeles (AL) before being charged with his first run in the eighth inning...that snapped a career-high 17.2-inning scoreless streak dating back to July 24, 2018.
- Struck out a career-high four batters and allowed just one baserunner across a career-high 3.1 innings pitched against Houston April 7.
- Had a 1.59 ERA and .171 opponents batting average over his first seven games through April 10...then logged a 10.24 ERA and .310 opponents batting average over his next 11 games and had a 5.57 ERA in 18 games overall when he was optioned to Las Vegas May 12.
