ABOUT THE A'S: Have won six of the last eight games, 12 of the last 15 and are 28-11 (.718) dating back to Aug. 14...are 45-22 (.672) since the All-Star Break, which is the second best record in the majors (Houston, 47-22, .681) and the fourth best post-break record in Athletics history...are 96-63 (.604) overall, which is the fourth best record in the American League and sixth best in the majors...are a season-high tying 33 games over .500 for the second time this year (94-61 on Sept. 21)...have not been more than 33 games over .500 since finishing the 2002 season at 44 games over .500 (103-59)...won 97 games last year and now have 193 wins over the last two seasons, which is tied for sixth most in Oakland history over a two-year stretch and the most since they had 199 from 2002-03...have won at least 90 games in each of the last two years, four of the last eight and 10 of the last 20...only the Yankees (15), Red Sox (13), Cardinals (11) and Braves (11) have more 90-win seasons over the last 20 last years...have a run differential of +167, which is fourth best in the AL and fifth best in the majors...have finished +160 or better three times in Oakland history: 239 in 2001, 180 in 1988, 163 in 1990.

MAGIC NUMBER: The A's magic number to clinch a playoff spot is one...can clinch home field for the Wild Card game with a win and a Tampa Bay loss...have sole possession of the first American League Wild Card spot for the 15th consecutive day...are one game ahead of Tampa Bay and three games ahead of Cleveland...have won the season series with Tampa Bay (4-3) and Cleveland (5-1) and would host the Wild Card game in the event of a two-way tie for the top spot...a three-way tie would lead to two playoff games to determine the two Wild Card teams.

THE MIDDLE OF JUNE: The A's were 37-36 (.507) at the conclusion of play on June 16 but have gone 59-27 (.686) since then, which is the best record in the majors...last year, the A's were 34-36 (.486) through June 15 but then went 63-29 (.685) from June 16 through the end of the season, which was the best record in the majors.

IN SEPTEMBER: The A's are 17-6 (.739) in September, which is the second best record in the majors to Milwaukee (20-4, .833)...the 17 wins are the A's most in September since going 19-8 in 2013...lead the majors in runs this month (138)...lead the AL in walks (96), rank second in doubles (46), tied for second in extra base hits (90), third in home runs (39), OPS (.813) and on-base percentage (.341) and tied for third in triples (5)...the pitching staff is third in opponents batting average (.233) and on-base percentage (.292).

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit 254 home runs, which is the most in Athletics history, fifth most in the majors this year and 10th most in Major League history...the previous A's record was 243 in 1996...have also set franchise records for most players with 20 or more home runs (7) and most players with 10 or more (10) and have tied the mark for most players with 30 or more (3)...are one of 11 teams in Major League history with seven or more players with 20 or more home runs...only the Twins, with eight this year, have more.

LEFT AND RIGHT: The A's have faced a left-handed starting pitcher in 15 of the previous 33 games and are scheduled to face a lefty in two of the final three...are 34-13 (.723) in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 62-50 (.554) against right-handers...the mark against lefties is second best in the majors to Houston (35-11)...are hitting .263 against left-handed pitchers, .246 against right-handers.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 2-1 on the final road trip of the season, a six-game trip to Los Angeles-AL (1-1) and Seattle (1-0)...went 6-1 on the last road trip to Houston (3-1) and Texas (3-0) and are now 39-19 (.672) over their last 58 road games dating back to May 16, which is the second best mark in the majors (Minnesota, 41-18, .695)...are 44-34 (.564) on the road overall and have clinched a winning record on the road for the second consecutive season...went 47-34 last year...have hit 132 home runs on the road, which is four

short of the Athletics record of 136 set last year...have 281 extra base hits, which is tied for fourth most in Athletics history (300 in 2001, 296 in 2018, 287 in 2000, 281 in 2004)...have a 4.48 ERA (340 in 683.1 ip) on the road compared to 3.56 at home...went 4-2 on the final homestand of the season against Kansas City (2-1) and Texas (2-1)...were 33-12 (.733) over the final 45 home games and 52-29 (.642) overall, which tied for the seventh best home record in Oakland history.

OFFENSE: The A's rank fourth in the American League in home runs (254) and doubles (290) and fifth in runs (840), extra base hits (567), OPS (.779), on-base percentage (.328) and slugging percentage (.451)...have set a franchise record for home runs and the 567 extra base hits are two short of the record of 569 set last year...the runs scored are fifth most in Oakland history (947 in 2000, 893 in 1999, 884 in 2001, 861 in 1996)...have been hit by a pitch 87 times, which is the most in the AL, tied for second most in the majors and one short of the Athletics record of 88 set in 2001...have 1317 strikeouts, which is tied for fourth fewest in the AL but will finish fourth most in Athletics history...rank third in the AL in fewest stolen bases (47) and most grounded into double plays (137).

PITCHING: The A's rank third in the American League in opponents OPS (.714) and slugging percentage (.406), fourth in ERA (4.00), batting average (.243) and on-base percentage (.308) and fifth in fewest walks (466)...have a franchise record 1277 strikeouts, but that is fourth fewest in the AL...have surrendered 200 home runs, which is third fewest in the AL but fourth most in Athletics history (220 in 1964, 210 in 2017, 205 in 1996)...have hit 65 batters, which is three short of the Oakland record of 68 set in 2004.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 4-2 with a 2.72 ERA (17 er in 56.1 ip) over the last 10 games and 16-3 with a 3.96 ERA (80 er in 181.2 ip) over the last 34 contest...are 67-36 with a 4.04 ERA overall...the wins are second most in the majors to Houston (76)...rank fourth in the American League in ERA and innings pitched (871.0).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's have a season-high tying eight-game errorless streak (May 20-28)...have committed 80 errors for the season, which is third fewest in the American League...the Athletics record for fewest errors in a season is 81 in 1981 and the fewest in a non-strike season is 84 in 2006...the errors have led to 34 unearned runs, which is the fewest in the majors...the fewest in Athletics history is 39 in 1981 and the fewest in a non-strike season is 42 in 1991.

A's vs. MARINERS: The A's lead the season series 9-7 and need one more win to clinch their first season series win over the Mariners since going 12-7 in 2012...went 6-2 in Oakland, 0-2 in Tokyo and are 3-3 in Seattle...have won nine of the last 12 games after losing each of the first four...have lost each of the previous six season series...the last time Oakland lost six consecutive season series to one team was 1993-98 to Boston...are 55-75 (.423) against Seattle dating back to the start of the 2013 season...all-time, the A's are 359-299 against the Mariners...that includes 195-134 in Oakland, 163-162 in Seattle and 1-3 in Tokyo...are 87-98 at T-Mobile Park.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman has scored 101 runs this year after scoring 100 times last year...is the fifth player in Oakland history with two seasons of 100 or more runs (Henderson 7, Tejada and Giambi 3, Canseco 2)...**Marcus Semien** has scored 122 runs, which is one short of the Oakland record of 123 set by Reggie Jackson in 1969...is also within reach of the Oakland record for total bases (has 339, Canseco 347 in 1988), extra base hits (82, Giambi 87 in 2001) and at bats (650, Tejada 662 in 2002).

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1912** Eddie Plank pitches 19 innings but the A's lose to Washington 5-4...in **1914** the A's defeat the St. Louis Browns 6-0 to clinch the American League pennant...in **1970** Reggie Jackson hits his 100th career home run in a 9-4 loss at California...he would go on to hit 563 home runs in his career...in **1989** Mike Moore, Rick Honeycutt and Gene Nelson combine on a four-hit shutout in a 5-0 victory over Texas to clinch the A's second consecutive AL West Championship.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Mike Fiers (15-4, 3.91 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Went 2-3 with a 6.81 ERA, .297 opponents batting average and .854 OPS over his first eight starts, 10-0 with a 2.12 ERA, .199 opponents average and .572 OPS over his next 17 starts from May 7-Aug. 9 and is 3-1 with a 6.68 ERA (24 er in 32.1 ip), .318 (42-for-129) opponents average, and 12 home runs allowed over his last seven starts...the A's are 22-10 (.688) in his starting assignments...has left with the lead in eight of his no decisions only to have the bullpen blow the save.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Ranks fourth in the American League in winning percentage (.789), tied for seventh in wins (15), eighth in opponents batting average (.244) and 10th in on-base percentage (.305)...also ranks third in fewest strikeouts per nine innings (6.11), tied for fourth in wild pitches (11) and stolen bases allowed (13), fifth in fewest pitches per game (87.4) and fewest pitches per inning (15.6), tied for eighth in games started (32) and tied for ninth in home runs (30).

CAREER BESTS: Has career highs in wins (15), games (32) and games started (32) and his 179.2 innings pitched are two-thirds of an inning short of his best of 180.1 in 2015...his 15 wins are the most by an A's pitcher since Scott Kazmir also had 15 in 2014...the last A's pitcher to win 16 or more games is Bartolo Colon, who won 18 in 2013...is scheduled to make his 33rd start today, which is the most by an A's pitcher since Sonny Gray had 33 in 2014...his 179.2 innings pitched are the most by an A's pitcher since 2016 when Kendall Graveman had 186.0...has allowed 30 home runs, which are two short of his high of 32 (2017 and 2018) and tied for 10th most in a season in Oakland history.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 11-2 with a 3.66 ERA (54 er in 132.2 ip) in 23 starts at night compared to 4-2 with a 4.60 ERA (24 er in 47.0 ip) in nine starts during the day...is tied for fifth in the American League in night wins, ranks seventh in OPS (.686) and eighth in ERA...is 16-3 with a 3.62 ERA (73 er in 181.2 ip) in 32 career appearances at night with the A's.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 9-2 with a 2.90 ERA (33 er in 102.1 ip) in 17 starts at home compared to 6-2 with a 5.24 ERA (45 er in 77.1 ip) in 15 starts on the road...has the fifth lowest home ERA in the American League and the third highest road ERA...is tied for third in the AL in home wins and ranks seventh in OPS (.641)...is now 13-3 with a 3.04 ERA (55 er in 162.2 ip) and .219 (128-for-585) opponents batting average in 28 career appearances, 27 starts, in the Coliseum.

APRIL, SEPTEMBER AND IN BETWEEN: Went 1-1 with a 7.83 ERA in five starts in April and is 1-1 with a 9.19 ERA (16 er in 15.2 ip) in four starts in September...combined for a 12-1 record and a 2.52 ERA in 21 starts in May, June, July and August...in his career, he is 5-9 with a 5.68 ERA in April, 55-35 with a 3.39 ERA from May through August and 8-14 with a 5.73 ERA (104 er in 163.1 ip) in September.

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 5-2 with a 5.75 ERA (52 er in 81.1 ip) in 16 starts against American League West competition compared to 10-2 with a 2.38 ERA (26 er in 98.1 ip) in 16 starts against all other teams...is now 14-15 with a 5.57 ERA (176 er in 284.1 ip) in 54 career appearances against AL West teams, 55-44 with a 3.46 ERA (305 er in 793.1 ip) in 150 games against all other opponents.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on six days rest today...is 2-1 with a 4.59 ERA (26 er in 51.0 ip) in nine starts on four days rest, 11-1 with a 3.21 ERA (37 er in 103.2 ip) in 17 starts on five days and 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA (15 er in 25.0 ip) in five starts on six days rest or more...is 14-1 with a 3.13 ERA (46 er in 132.1 ip) in 22 starts on five days rest in his A's career.

12-GAME WINNING STREAK: Took the loss at Houston Sept. 9 to snap his career high winning streak at 12 games...the streak was second longest in Oakland history and fell one short of the record of 13 set by Catfish Hunter in 1973 (June 2-Sept. 5)...it doubled his previous career high of six (July 21-Sept. 1, 2018)...it is the second longest winning streak in the majors this year (14, Cole, HOU, May 27-present)...compiled a 2.41 ERA and .214 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned 20 starts from May 7 to Aug. 27...was unbeaten in 21 consecutive starts from May 7 to Sept. 3, which matches Lefty Grove (April 22-Aug. 19, 1931) for the longest unbeaten streak by a starter in Athletics history.

NO-HITTER: Tossed his second career no-hitter May 7 in Oakland against Cincinnati to become the 34th pitcher in Major League history with multiple regular season no-hitters...is the seventh with a no-hitter for multiple teams...his no-hitter was the 13th in Athletics history, including the eighth in Oakland history.

LAST START: He combined with Bassitt on a two-hit shutout in the A's 8-0 win over Texas a week ago today in Oakland...tossed eight innings and allowed both of the hits...did not walk a batter and faced the minimum...yielded a leadoff single to Choo in the first but he was erased on a double play...al-

lowed a one out single to DeShields in the fourth but he was picked off...retired each of the final 16 batters he faced.

FIERS vs. SEATTLE: Is 3-2 with a 6.15 ERA (52.2 ip, 57 h, 37 r, 36 er, 11 bb, 44 so, 16 hr) in 11 career starts...that includes 1-1 with a 4.56 ERA (13 er in 25.2 ip) in five starts at T-Mobile Park and 2-1 with an 8.00 ERA (24 er in 27.0 ip) in six starts in his home ballparks...is 1-1 with a 5.79 ERA (14.0 ip, 11 h, 9 r, 9 er, 5 bb, 10 so, 4 hr) in three starts this year...the loss came in a 9-7 A's loss on Opening Day, March 20 in Tokyo...Oakland scored single runs in each of the first two innings but he allowed five runs in the third on a Gordon RBI

single and a Santana grand slam...the A's scored twice in the bottom third to narrow the gap to 5-4 and he was relieved by Hendriks to start the fourth...then had a no decision in the A's 6-5, 10-inning loss at Seattle May 13, his first start after his no-hitter...had his hitless streak broken up when Haniger homered to lead off the bottom of the first...however, that was the only run he would allow in five innings of work and he would yield just one more hit...was relieved by Petit to start the sixth with the A's leading 2-1 and Oakland built a 4-1 lead before Trivino allowed three runs in the eighth for the blown save...picked up the win in a 6-5 victory in Oakland on May 25...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a RBI single to Haniger in the third...had a 2-1 lead when he allowed a solo home run to Santana in the fourth...had a 5-2 lead when he allowed a solo home run to Haniger in the fifth...was relieved by Buchter to start the seventh with the A's leading 5-3.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

LHP Brett Anderson (12-9, 4.00 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 31st start of the season today, which matches his career high from 2015 with the Dodgers...already has a career-high 12 wins, besting his total of 11 from his rookie season with the A's in 2009...is 8-3 with a 3.40 ERA and .246 opponents batting average in 15 starts on the road...ranks seventh in the American League in road ERA, tied for seventh in wins and ninth in opponents OPS (.674)...had a no decision in his last start, a 2-1 A's win over Kansas City on Sept. 17 in Oakland (5.0 ip, 5 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 so)...is 10-5 with a 2.36 ERA (129.2 ip, 120 h, 40 r, 34 er, 28 bb, 98 so, 14 hr) in 22 career appearances, including 21 starts against Seattle...the wins are his most against any team...the ERA is fourth lowest ever against the Mariners by any Major League pitcher with at least 100 innings...is 2-1 with a 3.38 ERA (18.2 ip, 16 h, 7 r, 7 er, 5 bb, 13 so, 5 hr) in three starts this year.
