OAKLAND ATHLETICS (97-64) VS. SEATTLE MARINERS (67-94)

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won seven of the last 10 games, 13 of the last 17 and are 29-12 (.707) dating back to Aug. 14...are 46-23 (.667) since the All-Star Break, which is the second best record in the majors (Houston, 49-22, .690) and the fifth best post-break record in Athletics history...are 97-64 (.602) overall, which is the fourth best record in the American League and sixth best in the majors...are 33 games over .500, tied for a season high (96-63 on Sept. 26)...have not been more than 33 games over .500 since finishing the 2002 season at 44 games over .500 (103-59)...won 97 games last year and now have 194 wins over the last two seasons, which is sixth most in Oakland history over a two-year stretch and the most since they had 199 from 2002-03...have won at least 90 games in each of the last two years, four of the last eight and 10 of the last 20...only the Yankees (15), Red Sox (13), Cardinals (11) and Braves (11) have more 90-win seasons over the last 20 last years...have a run differential of +167, which is fourth best in the AL and fifth best in the majors...have finished +160 or better three times in Oakland history: 239 in 2001, 180 in 1988, 163 in 1990.

TOP OF THE CHARTS: Oakland has won 97 games for the second season in a row and since the start of the 2018 season, at 194-129 have the 4th-best record in the Majors behind Houston (209-114), New York-AL (203-120) and Los Angeles-NL (197-127)...Oakland was 17-7 over the final 24 games of 2017 and if you include their mark since Sept. 6, 2017, they are 211-136 and have the 3rd-best record in the Majors in that span behind Houston (225-122) and New York-AL (220-127).

STRING OF SUCCESS: Oakland has won 97 games in consecutive seasons, the first time with 97+ wins in back-to-back seasons since 2001 (102) and 2002 (103)...the only other time that the club has done it since the move to Oakland was three straight seasons in 1988 (104), 1989 (99) and 1990 (103)...the Philadelphia A's also did it in consecutive seasons from 1928-31 (98, 104, 102, 107) and 1910-11 (102, 101).

A'S IN POSTSEASON: The A's return to the postseason for the second consecutive season, fifth time in the last eight years and 10th time in the last 20 seasons...over the last eight years, only the Dodgers (7) have more than five postseason appearances and over the last 20 seasons only the Yankees (16), Cardinals (13), Dodgers (11) and Braves (11) have more than 10...this is the 28th postseason appearance in franchise history, which includes 20 with Oakland and eight with Philadelphia...that is fourth most all-time...have reached the postseason for the fourth time as the American League Wild Card, the third time in the two wild card era.

RECORD-SETTING SCORER: Marcus Semien is tied with Reggie Jackson (1969) for the most runs scored in Oakland history with 123...Semien's total is T10th-most in A's history with Jackson and Jimmie Foxx (1929)...Semien ranks 4th in Majors in runs scored behind Mookie Betts (134), Rafael Devers (128) and Ronald Acuna Jr. (127).

THE MIDDLE OF JUNE: The A's were 37-36 (.507) at the conclusion of play on June 16 but have gone 60-28 (.682) since then, which is the best record in the majors...last year, the A's were 34-36 (.486) through June 15 but then went 63-29 (.685) from June 16 through the end of the season, which was the best record in the majors.

IN SEPTEMBER: The A's are 18-7 (.720) in September, which is the fourth best record in the majors...the 18 wins are the A's most in September since going 19-8 in 2013...rank 5th in the majors in runs this month (142)...lead the AL in walks (106), 3rd in doubles (47), T3rd in extra base hits (94), third in home runs (42), 4th in OPS (.802) and 3rd in on-base percentage (.339) and tied for fifth in triples (5)...the pitching staff is third in opponents batting average (.232) and on-base percentage (.291).

THE LONG BALL: The A's have hit 257 home runs, which is the most in Athletics history, fifth most in the majors this year and T8th most in Major League history...Texas is next with 260 in 2005...the previous A's record was 243 in 1996...have also set franchise records for most players with 20 or more home

runs (7) and most players with 10 or more (10) and have tied the mark for most players with 30 or more (3)...are one of 11 teams in Major League history with seven or more players with 20 or more home runs...only the Twins, with eight this year, have more.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 3-2 on the final road trip of the season, a six-game trip to Los Angeles-AL (1-1) and Seattle (2-1)...went 6-1 on the last road trip to Houston (3-1) and Texas (3-0) and are now 40-20 (.667) over their last 60 road games dating back to May 16, which is the second best mark in the majors (Minnesota, 43-18, .705)...are 45-35 (.563) on the road overall and have clinched a winning record on the road for the second consecutive season...went 47-34 last year...have hit 135 home runs on the road, which is one short of Athletics record of 136 set last year...have 285 road extra base hits, which is fourth most in Athletics history (300 in 2001, 296 in 2018, 287 in 2000)...have a 4.42 ERA (344 in 701.0 ip) on the road compared to 3.56 at home...went 4-2 on the final homestand of the season against Kansas City (2-1) and Texas (2-1)...were 33-12 (.733) over the final 45 home games and 52-29 (.642) overall, which tied for 7th best home record in Oakland history.

OFFENSE: The A's rank fourth in the American League in home runs (257) and T5th in doubles (291) and fifth in runs (844), extra base hits (571), OPS (.778), on-base percentage (.328) and slugging percentage (.450)...have set a franchise record for home runs and the 571 extra base hits are a club record (569 set last year)...the runs scored are fifth most in Oakland history (947 in 2000, 893 in 1999, 884 in 2001, 861 in 1996)...have been hit by a pitch 87 times, which is the most in the AL, third most in majors and one short of the Athletics record of 88 set in 2001...have 1330 strikeouts, which is the 7th fewest in the AL but will finish fourth most in Athletics history.

PITCHING: The A's rank third in the American League in opponents OPS (.712) and slugging percentage (.404), fourth in ERA (3.97), batting average (.242) and on-base percentage (.308) and fifth in fewest walks (472)...have a franchise record 1292 strikeouts, but that is fourth fewest in the AL...have surrendered 200 home runs, which is third fewest in the AL but fourth most in Athletics history (220 in 1964, 210 in 2017, 205 in 1996)...have hit 66 batters, which is two short of the Oakland record of 68 set in 2004.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers are 5-2 with a 2.58 ERA (19 er in 66.1 ip) over the last 12 games and 17-3 with a 3.85 ERA (82 er in 191.2 ip) over the last 36 contest...are 68-36 with a 4.01 ERA overall...the wins are tied for second most in the majors to Houston (78)...rank fourth in the American League in ERA and innings pitched (881.0).

A'S vs. MARINERS: The A's lead the season series 10-8 and have clinched their first season series win over the Mariners since going 12-7 in 2012...went 6-2 in Oakland, 0-2 in Tokyo and are 4-4 in Seattle...have won 10 of the last 14 games after losing each of the first four...have lost each of the previous six season series...the last time Oakland lost six consecutive season series to one team was 1993-98 to Boston...are 55-76 (.420) against Seattle dating back to the start of the 2013 season...all-time, the A's are 360-300 against the Mariners...that includes 195-134 in Oakland, 164-163 in Seattle and 1-3 in Tokyo...are 88-99 at T-Mobile Park.

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Matt Chapman has scored 102 runs (100 in 2018)...is fifth player in Oakland history with two seasons of 100 or more runs (Henderson 7, Tejada and Giambi 3, Canseco 2)...**Marcus Semien** is within reach of the Oakland record for total bases (has 343, Canseco 347 in 1988), extra base hits (83, Giambi 87 in 2001) and at bats (656, Tejada 662 in 2002).

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In 1988 the A's defeat Minnesota 6-2 for their 102nd win of the season, breaking the Oakland record of 101 set in 1971...Oakland would go on to win 104 games and sweep the Red Sox in the ALCS before losing to Los Angeles in the World Series...in 1991 Rickey Henderson is a perfect 5-for-5 as the A's defeat Texas 19-5...in 2001 Miguel Tejada hits for the cycle, capping the feat with a seventh inning grand slam in the A's 8-4 win at Seattle.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Tanner Roark (4-2, 4.50 ERA)

FOR STARTERS: Was acquired from Cincinnati on July 31 with cash considerations for minor league outfielder Jameson Hannah and is 4-2 with a 4.50 ERA (25 er in 50.0 ip) in nine starts with the A's...went 3-1 with a 2.70 ERA over his first six starts but is 1-1 with a 9.45 ERA (14 er in 13.1 ip) over his last three...went 6-7 with a 4.24 ERA in 21 starts with the Reds and is 10-9 with a 4.32 ERA (77 er in 160.1 ip) in 30 starts for the season.

CAREER NOTES: Is scheduled to make his 31st start of the season today, which will match the second most of his career (had 33 in 2016)...is one of seven pitchers with at least 30 starts in each of the last four years (Leake, Lester, Porcello, Quintana, Teheran, Verlander)...picked up his 10th win of the season Sept. 10 for his fourth career 10-win season...has surrendered a career-high 27 home runs and has matched his high with 13 hit batters...his 173 hits are eight short of his high of 181 in 2018...currently has a career high in strikeouts per nine innings (8.59), opponents OPS (.802), on-base percentage (.337) and slugging percentage (.464).

AGAINST THE WEST: Is 3-2 with a 3.40 ERA (15 er in 39.2 ip) in seven starts against American League West teams compared to 7-7 with a 4.62 ERA (62 er in 120.2 ip) in 23 starts against all other teams...is 7-6 with a 2.90 ERA (34 er in 105.2 ip) in 17 career starts against the AL West.

DAYS REST: Is scheduled to start on six days rest today...is 6-2 with a 3.28 ERA (21 er in 57.2 ip) in 11 starts on four days rest compared to 4-7 with a 4.91 ERA (56 er in 102.2 ip) in 19 starts on five days rest or more.

THE LONG BALL: Allowed a career-high four home runs in his last start and now has a career-high 27 for the season...21 of those have come with the bases empty...14 have come to batters leading off an inning, which is tied with Bumgarner (SF) for the most in the majors...has yielded just four home runs with two outs...14 of the 27 home runs have come the second time through the lineup...has allowed 25 home runs in 104.0 innings over his last 19 starts after yielding two in 56.1 innings over his first 11 starts.

BEFORE AND AFTER THE BREAK: Was 5-6 with a 3.51 ERA and .249 opponents batting average in 17 starts before the All-Star Break...is 5-3 in 11 starts since then but has a 5.43 ERA (41 er in 68.0 ip) and .304 (84-for-276) opponents average.

THIS AND THAT: Is tied for fourth in the majors in hit batters (13)...is averaging 18.0 pitches per inning, which is the highest mark in the majors...has a 5.70 ERA (19 er in 30.0 ip) in the first inning, a 3.07 ERA (30 er in 88.0 ip) in innings two through four and a 5.95 ERA (28 er in 42.1 ip) from the fifth inning on...his wild pitch on Aug. 22 was his first since July 3, 2018, snapping a streak of 37 consecutive starts without a wild pitch.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS: Allowed three runs in each of his first two starts (5.79 ERA) but then went 3-1 with a 2.53 ERA and .231 opponents batting average over his next six starts from April 13 to May 9...left with a 4-3 lead in his second start on April 6 at Pittsburgh only to have the bullpen blow the save...it was the first of two times the pen blew a save in one of his starts (July 18 vs. St. Louis)...started the Reds April 13 home game against St. Louis in Monterrey, Mexico, and had a no decision in a 5-2 win...allowed one run in 5.1 innings but left trailing 1-0...walked a season-high four batters in 3.2 innings April 29 at New York (NL)...matched that in 3.1 innings July 30 against Pittsburgh...went 1-5 with a 4.09 ERA over a six-start stretch from May 14 to June 15...struck out a season-high nine batters in 5.0 scoreless innings May 26 at Chicago (NL)...went 3-2 with a 2.28 ERA in five starts in May and did not allow a home run in 27.2 innings...it was his lowest single-month ERA since compiling a mark of 2.03 in April of 2016...drove in both of the Reds runs in a 5-2 loss to Washington on June 1...had a suicide squeeze in the second inning and then hit his first career home run in the fourth, a solo shot off Eric Fedde...went over the 1,000 career innings pitched plateau June 8 at Philadelphia...tossed a season-high 7.0 innings and a season-high 116 pitches June 15 against Texas but took the loss, allowing four runs, two earned...yielded one run in back-to-back starts on June 20 at Milwaukee and June 26 at Los Angeles (AL)...then went 1-1 with a 7.30 ERA and .346 opponents batting average in five starts in the month of July...surrendered seven home runs in 24.2 innings...allowed a season-high seven runs on a career-high 13 hits but had a no decision in the Reds 17-9 win at Colorado July 13...it was his 200th career appearance...was the losing pitcher in his final start with the Reds, an 11-4 loss to Pittsburgh on July 30...allowed five runs on six hits and four walks in 3.1 innings...finished July with a 1-1 record, a 7.30 ERA and .346 opponents batting average in five starts...then went 2-1 with a 3.30 ERA and .246 opponents average in five starts in August...picked up the win in his A's debut on Aug. 4 against St. Louis when he allowed a run on four hits in 5.0 innings.

LAST START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 8-3 loss to Texas a week ago today in Oakland...allowed a career-high four home runs in a season-low 3.0 innings...yielded solo home runs to Choo and Calhoun and a two-run home

run to Andrus in the first inning and another solo home run to Calhoun in the third...was relieved by Puk to start the fourth.

- The A's bullpen has compiled a 3.47 ERA (110 er in 285.0 ip) over the last 82 games since June 23 and now has a 3.91 ERA for the season, which is fourth lowest in the American League.
- Has the lowest opponents slugging mark in AL (.386), ranks third in OPS (.695), and third in on-base percentage (.308) and batting average (.233).
- Is 45-for-75 (60.0%) in save opportunities...the 30 blown saves are the most in the Majors...they now hold the MLB record by a team with 90 or more wins (Colorado in 2007 had 29).
- Have the fewest home runs allowed (70) and has the fourth fewest walks (218) among AL bullpens...has the sixth fewest wins (29).
- Has the third lowest slugging percentage against first batters (.344) among Major League bullpens.

- Was 10-5 with a 3.95 ERA (61 er in 139.0 ip) and 132 strikeouts in 25 games as a starter this season...made his first relief appearance of the season Sept. 20, striking out two in one perfect inning...has seven strikeouts in 4.0 innings pitched as a reliever in total this season.
- Is 6-2 with a 3.01 ERA (23 er in 68.2 ip) in 13 games at home compared to 4-3 with a 4.60 ERA (38 er in 74.1 ip) in 14 games on the road...has yielded just five home runs in 68.2 innings in Oakland.
- Has made 12 career relief appearances (8 er in 26.2 ip, 2.70), including two this year, four last year, five in 2015, and one in 2014.
- Was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27 retroactive to March 25 with a right lower leg contusion...was reinstated from the IL and optioned to Las Vegas April 16 and recalled by Oakland the next day when Marco Estrada went on the injured list.
- Is 0-4 with a 4.72 ERA (18 er in 34.1 ip) in seven career games (six starts) against Seattle.
