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OAKLAND ATHLETICS (0-1) VS. CHICAGO WHITE SOX (1-0)

A'S IN POSTSEASON PLAY: The A's return to the post-season for the third consecutive season, sixth time in the last nine years and 11th time in the last 21 seasons...are one of six teams to reach the post-season in each of the last three years (Astros, Braves, Brewers, Dodgers, Yankees)...over the last nine years, only the Dodgers (8) have more than six postseason appearances and over the last 21 seasons only the Yankees (17), Cardinals (14), Dodgers (12) and Braves (12) have more...this is the 29th postseason appearance in franchise history, which includes 21 with Oakland and eight with Philadelphia...the 29 postseason appearances are fourth most all-time...qualified for the post-season by winning their first American League West championship since 2013...it was the A's third AL West title in the last nine years, their seventh in the last 21 and their 17th overall...the 17 division titles are fourth most all-time behind the Braves (20), Yankees (19) and Dodgers (19)...are 82-79 (.509) all-time in the post-season and the wins are sixth most

SIX-GAME LOSING STREAK: The A's extended their post-season losing streak to six games yesterday with a 4-1 loss to Chicago...that matches the longest post-season losing streak in Athletics history (Oct. 10, 2006-Oct. 7, 2012)...have not won a post-season game since Game 3 of the 2013 ALDS against Detroit, a 6-3 win at Comerica Park.

ELIMINATION GAMES: After losing the first game of this best of three series, the A's are facing elimination today...have lost five straight post-season games when facing elimination dating back to the 2012 ALDS against Detroit...began that series by losing each of the first two games of the best of five series, but then won Games 3 and 4 before losing in Game 5...are 2-5 when facing elimination dating back to 2012 and 3-10 dating back to 2000.

POSTSEASON STRUGGLES: The A's lost the AL Wild Card game against Tampa Bay last year to extend their losing streak in winner-take-all post-season games to nine...that is the longest such streak in Major League history...the last time Oakland won a winner-take-all post-season game was Game 7 of the 1973 World Series, a 5-2 win over New York...dating back to 2000, the A's have now lost 15 of their last 16 post-season games with a chance to clinch the series...have won just one of their last 13 post-season series (includes one-game wild card games), the 2006 ALDS against Minnesota...won 11 of their first 15 post-season series in Oakland through the 1990 ALCS.

BEST OF THREE: Each of the A's previous three post-season appearances were one-game Wild Card appearances, all losses (2014, 18, 19)...will play more than one post-season game for the time since 2013 when they lost to Detroit in the American League Division Series, 3 games to 2.

PLAYOFF SEEDING: The A's are the number two seed in the American League...tied Minnesota but had a better intradivision record (26-14 to 23-17)...the winner of this series will advance to Dodger Stadium to play the winner of the Twins vs. Astros series beginning Mon., Oct. 5.

POSTSEASON EXPERIENCE: Of the 28 players on the A's Wild Card roster, 20 had played in a post-season game prior to this year...six had played for the A's in the Wild Card game in each of the previous two post-seasons (Canha, Davis, Hendriks, Laureano, Olson, Semien)...Petit, Pinder and Wendelken were also on each of the previous two post-season rosters...Petit pitched in 2019 and Pinder and Wendelken did not play in either game...La Stella has the most post-season experience as this is his fifth year (has played 13 games)...Soria (11 games) and Diekman (8 games) have now played in four post-season...Hendriks, who did not pitch yesterday, has played in three post-seasons (five games).

STARTING PITCHING: Jesús Luzardo tossed 3.1 innings yesterday and A's starting pitchers have pitched fewer than four innings in each of Oakland's last three post-season games (Manaea 2.0 last year, Hendriks 1.0 as opener in 2018)...prior to this streak, A's starters had never tossed fewer than four innings in two straight post-season games...during the regular season, A's starters ranked seventh in the majors in innings pitched (307.0) but the av-

erage of 5.12 innings pitched per start was second lowest in Athletics history to a mark of 5.09 in 2018...tossed seven innings or fewer in all 60 games.

OFFENSE: Tommy La Stella singled to lead off the seventh inning yesterday and break up the perfect game...it marked the third time in Athletics post-season history the A's were no hit over the first six innings...Justin Verlander no-hit the A's over the first 6.2 innings of Game 5 of the 2013 ALDS and Burrell Grimes no-hit the Philadelphia A's over the first 7.0 innings of Game 3 of the 1931 World Series...the A's ended up scoring a run on three hits yesterday and are now batting .167 (16-for-96) with four runs scored and one extra base hit (home run) in three post-season games over the last three years...batted .225 during the regular season, which was sixth lowest in the majors and second lowest in the 120-year history of the Athletics franchise to the 1908 Philadelphia A's (.223).

LEFT AND RIGHT: During the regular season, the A's were 11-3 (.786) in games in which the opponent started a left-handed pitcher compared to 25-21 (.543) when they start a right-hander...the record against lefties was second best in the majors to the White Sox (14-0)...lost three of their last five games against left-handed starters after winning each of the first nine.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's played a day game yesterday, are scheduled for a day game today and, if the series goes three games, would play a day game tomorrow...played 30 of their 60 regular season games during the day, which was five more than any other team...became the first team other than the Cubs to play at least half their games during the day since the Giants in 1994 (61-of-115, 53.0%)...the last time the A's played at least half of their games during the day was in 1960 when they played 78-of-155 (50.3%)...were 17-13 (.567) during the day, 19-11 (.633) at night...had a 4.28 ERA during the day, a 3.29 ERA at night...batted .240 during the day, .212 at night.

TEAM NOTES: The A's finished the season with a 36-24 record for a .600 winning percentage...that tied for the second best record in the American League, tied for fourth best in the majors and tied for eighth best in Oakland history...went 22-10 (.688) in Oakland compared to 14-14 (.500) on the road...had the sixth best home record in the majors and posted a winning record at home for the fourth consecutive season...the .688 winning percentage was the second best home mark in Oakland history to the 2003 A's, who went 57-24 (.704)...were successful in 26-of-29 (89.7%) stolen base attempts, which is the best percentage in Major League history ahead of the 2007 Phillies (138-of-157, 87.9%)...compiled a 3.77 ERA, which was fifth lowest in the majors...had the fifth lowest opponents on-base percentage (.302), the ninth lowest OPS (.693) and the 10th lowest slugging percentage (.392)...committed 26 errors, which was fourth fewest in the majors...had a .9874 fielding percentage after setting an Athletics record with a mark of .9865 last year...turned just 33 double plays, which was the fewest in the majors...**additional team notes can be found in the A's Season in Review beginning on page 9.**

A's vs. WHITE SOX: Yesterday, the A's and White Sox met for the first time in the post-season...Oakland won the season series last year, 5-1...swept a three-game series in the Coliseum July 12-14 and won two of three in Chicago Aug. 9-11...have won each of the last three season series an are 15-4 against the White Sox over that span, including 8-1 in Oakland...have an eight-game home winning streak during the regular season, which is the second longest Coliseum winning streak against Chicago in Oakland history (10, May 18, 2001-May 6, 2003)...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 317-290 against the White Sox during the regular season...that breaks down to 167-138 in Oakland and 150-152 in Chicago...including 68-64 at Guaranteed Rate Field...all-time, the A's are 994-1045 against Chicago.

THIS DATE IN ATHLETICS HISTORY

In **1969** Sal Bando is a perfect 5 for 5 in an 8-4 A's win at Seattle against the Pilots...he was 5 for 5 against Seattle earlier in the same season on July 17...in **1987** Dave Stewart becomes the A's first 20-game winner in seven years when he picks up the decision in the A's 4-3 victory over Cleveland...in **1995** Dennis Eckersley becomes the ninth major leaguer to pitch 900 games in his career when he tossed one inning at California...in **2000** the A's set Oakland records with 23 runs scored and a 21-run margin of victory in a 23-2 win over Texas...Adam Piatt has four hits and Miguel Tejada has five RBI...in **2014** Brandon Moss hits two home runs and sets an Athletics post-season record with five RBI in a 9-8, 12-inning loss to Kansas City in the American League Wild Card game.

TODAY'S STARTING PITCHER: Chris Bassitt (5-2, 2.29 ERA)

BASSITT IN POSTSEASON: Is scheduled to make his first career postseason appearance and it will come against the team that drafted him...was selected by the White Sox in the 16th round of the 2011 First-Year Player Draft and made his Major League debut with Chicago in 2014...was traded to the A's on Dec. 9, 2014 with Marcus Semien, Josh Phegley and Rangel Ravelo for Jeff Samardzija and Michael Ynoa.

FOR STARTERS: Spent the entire season on the active roster for the first time in his six-year career and went 5-2 with a 2.29 ERA in 11 starts...his ERA ranked second among pitchers in the West divisions (Lamet, SD 2.09) and sixth in the majors...it was fifth lowest in Oakland history among pitchers with at least 10 starts...also tied for fifth in the West divisions in winning percentage (.714), ranked seventh in opponents OPS (.659), batting average (.233) and slugging percentage (.371), tied for seventh in wins and eighth in on-base percentage (.288)...had career lows in ERA and opponents on-base percentage...walked 17 batters in 63.0 innings for a career-low 2.43 walks per nine innings...struck out 55 for a career best 3.24 strikeout-to-walk ratio...led the A's in innings pitched and tied for the lead in games started...went 1-0 with a 1.08 ERA over his first three starts, 1-2 with a 5.95 ERA over his next four starts from Aug. 12-29 and 3-0 with a 0.34 ERA over his final four starts...is now 15-7 with a 3.35 ERA in 39 games, including 36 starts, over the last two years.

HOME AND AWAY: Went 2-1 with a 0.72 ERA, .207 opponents batting average and .512 OPS in five starts in Oakland compared to 3-1 with a 4.56 ERA, .270 opponents average and .683 OPS in five starts on the road...his home ERA was second lowest in the majors (Keller, KC 0.27) and second lowest in Oakland history among pitchers with at least 30 innings (Treinen, 0.63 in 2018)...did not allow a home run in 37.1 innings in Oakland and now has a nine-game, 48.0-inning, 195-batter faced homerless streak in the Coliseum...is 9-10 with a 2.44 ERA (51 er in 188.1 ip) in 35 career games in the Coliseum, 10-11 with a 4.63 ERA (108 er in 210.0 ip) in 44 games in all other ballparks...has yielded just 11 home runs in 188.1 career innings in Oakland (0.53 per nine innings).

NIGHT AND DAY: Went 3-0 with a 1.15 ERA in six starts at night compared to 2-2 with a 4.13 ERA in five starts during the day...his night ERA was the lowest in the majors and in Oakland history among pitchers with at least 30 innings at night...is now 5-0 with a 2.39 ERA (19 er in 71.2 ip) over his last 13 games, 12 starts, at night dating back to July 19, 2019.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .233 opponents batting average, which broke down to .223 (31-for-139) with a .590 OPS against right-handed hitters compared to .248 (25-for-101) with a .755 OPS against left-handers...yielded four of his six home runs to lefties and has surrendered 18 of his 27 home runs over the last two years to lefties...walked just one batter to lead off an inning and has held opponents to a .203 (13-for-64) batting average and .227 on-base percentage in that situation...the on-base percentage was sixth lowest in the majors...five of his six home runs came with the bases empty...had a .244 opponents batting average with runners in scoring position, but that dropped to .176 with RISP and two outs...had a .204 opponents batting average and two home runs with zero or one out, a .295 average with four home runs with two outs...had a .130 opponent average with two strikes...surrendered three of his six home runs to the opponents clean-up hitter.

THIS AND THAT: Allowed six of his 18 runs in the first inning...had a 4.91 ERA in the first inning, a 1.73 ERA from the second inning on...was 3-0 with a 1.75 ERA in four starts following an A's loss and is 8-1 with a 2.38 ERA (22 er in 83.1 ip) in 14 starts following a loss over the last two years...received 35 runs of support in his 11 starts for a run support average of 5.00...now has a 6.28 RSA in 36 starts over the last two years compared to a 2.67 ERA over his first 30 starts of his career...is 15-1 in 25 career starts with three runs of support or more, 4-20 in 41 starts with two runs of support or fewer...went 2-1 with a 3.34 ERA (11 er in 29.2 ip) in five starts on four days rest, 3-1 with a 1.35 ERA (5 er in 33.1 ip) in six starts on five days rest or more...does not have a complete game in 66 career starts, including 61 with the A's...his streak of 61 consecutive starts with no complete games is sixth longest in Athletics history (5th is 64 by Bob Welch)...allowed one run or fewer in seven of his 11 starts, including no run four times...the A's are 8-3 (.727) in his starting assignment this year and 23-13 (.639) over the last two years.

SINCE THE SURGERY: Did not pitch in the majors in 2017 following May 6, 2016 "Tommy John" surgery...is 17-10 with a 3.29 ERA (93 er in 254.2 ip) and is averaging 8.38 strikeouts per nine innings (237 so in 254.2 ip) in 50 games (41 starts) since the surgery...was 2-11 with a 4.13 ERA and 6.77 strikeouts per nine innings in 29 games (23 starts) before the surgery.

2020 HIGHLIGHTS: Began the season as the A's fourth starter and combined with five A's relievers on a nine-hit shutout in the A's 3-0 win over Los Angeles (AL) on July 27...had a no decision as he tossed four innings...allowed just

one run in a season-high 7.0 innings Aug. 7 against Houston but had a no decision in the A's 3-2 win...that gave him one run or fewer in each of his first three starts, to become the first A's pitcher to begin the season in the starting rotation and allow one run or fewer in each of his first three starts since Gio Gonzalez in 2011 (April 3-14)...also walked a season-high three batters (first of four times)...picked up his second win of the season Aug. 12 at Los Angeles (AL), despite surrendering a season-high four runs in 5.2 innings...it extended his winning streak to a career-high five games dating back to Aug. 11, 2019...posted a 3.32 ERA and .228 opponents batting average during the streak, which spanned 13 games (10 starts)...the winning streak was snapped Aug. 22 against Los Angeles (AL) when he tossed a season-high 105 pitches...lost his next start on Aug. 29 at Houston when he tossed a career-low tying 3.0 innings (third time, last: Sept. 13, 2019 at Texas)...finished August 2-2 with a 4.18 ERA in six starts but then went 3-0 with a 0.34 ERA in four starts in September...allowed just one run in 26.2 innings...his September ERA was second lowest in Oakland history in any month to Cory Lidle's 0.20 ERA in August of 2002 (min. 25.0 ip)...it was the lowest in September in the majors since Greg Maddux had a 0.29 ERA for Atlanta in 1995...it was the first time in his career he won three games in a month...was named American League Pitcher of the Month for his efforts, his first such honor...combined with Diekman and Trivino on a seven-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win over Houston on Sept. 7...pitched a season-high tying 7.0 innings and allowed all seven of the hits...struck out a season-high eight in 6.0 innings a 10-1 win in the second game of the doubleheader at Texas on Sept. 12...allowed just one run but yielded a season-high eight hits...combined with Petit, Wendelken and Weems on a three-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win over San Francisco on Sept. 18...tossed a season-high tying 7.0 scoreless innings in a no decision in a 3-1, 10-inning win over Seattle on Sept. 25...finished the regular season with a 13.2-inning scoreless streak.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 10-inning win over Seattle last Friday in Oakland...tossed 7.0 scoreless innings and allowed five hits without walking a batter...yielded singles to Crawford and Seager in the first but then retired 12 straight...allowed back-to-back singles to Odom and Crawford with one out in the sixth, which was the only time the Mariners got a runner into scoring position

ERA (23.2 ip, 22 h, 9 r, 8 er, 7 bb, 21 so, 1 hr) in four career starts...is 1-0 with a 3.18 ERA (4 er in 11.1 ip) in two starts in Oakland and 1-1 with a 2.92 ERA (4 er in 12.1 ip) in two starts at Guaranteed Rate Field as a visitor...was 2-0 with a 0.00 ERA (13.0 ip, 8 h, 4 bb, 13 so) in two starts last year...the first win came in a 13-2 A's victory in Oakland on July 13...tossed six scoreless innings and allowed four hits while walking two...allowed just one base runner into scoring position...was relieved by Treinen to start the seventh with the A's leading 12-0...then combined with Diekman, Soria and Hendriks on a five-hit shutout in the A's 2-0 win at Chicago (AL) on Aug. 11...tossed seven of the innings and allowed four of the hits while walking two...retired each of the final eight batters that he faced.

Saves/Opportunities: 17-for-21 (81.0%)

- The A's bullpen allowed one run in 5.2 innings yesterday after yielding one run in 7.0 innings in the Wild Card game against Tampa Bay last year...the pen has worked at least four innings in each of the A's last five postseason games dating back to Game 5 of the 2013 ALDS.
- Went 4-3 with four saves, two blown saves and a 4.30 ERA during the regular season after play resumed on Sept. 4...was 10-2 with 13 saves, two blown saves and a 1.87 ERA over the first 34 games.
- Led the majors with a 2.74 ERA, which was the sixth lowest ERA by the bullpen in Oakland history and the lowest since the 1990 club had an Oakland record 2.35 ERA.
- Had the second lowest opponents OPS (.616), batting average (.208), slugging percentage (.336) and on-base percentage (.280) in the majors.
- Converted 17-of-21 (81.0%) save opportunities...ranked third in the majors in save percentage and tied for fifth in saves.
- Had the fewest losses in the majors (5), ranked second in fewest home runs (23) and third in fewest walks (77).
- First batters faced went 30-for-166 (.181) with 13 walks, five doubles and five home runs...had the lowest opponents OPS (.540), batting average (.181) and on-base percentage (.239) against first batters in the majors and the fifth lowest slugging percentage (.301).
- Allowed 22-of-67 (32.8%) inherited runners to score...the 67 inherited runners were second fewest in the majors.

SEASON IN REVIEW

A's IN POSTSEASON: The A's return to the postseason for the third consecutive season, sixth time in the last nine years and 11th time in the last 21 seasons...are one of six teams to reach the postseason in each of the last three years (Astros, Braves, Brewers, Dodgers, Yankees)...over the last nine years, only the Dodgers (8) have more than six postseason appearances and over the last 21 seasons only the Yankees (17), Cardinals (14), Dodgers (12) and Braves (12) have more... this is the 29th postseason appearance in franchise history, which includes 21 with Oakland and eight with Philadelphia...that is fourth most all-time...qualified for the post season by winning their first American League West championship since 2013...it was the A's third AL West title in the last nine years, their seventh in the last 21 and their 17th overall...the 17 division titles are fourth most all-time...each of the previous three postseason appearances were one-game Wild Card appearances, all losses (2014, 18, 19)...are 82-78 (.513) all-time in the postseason and the wins are sixth most...currently have a five-game losing streak, which is one short of the Athletics record of six (Oct. 10, 2006-Oct. 7, 2012)...have not won a postseason game since Game 3 of the 2013 ALDS against Detroit...lost the AL Wild Card game against Tampa Bay last year to extend the A's losing streak in winner-take-all postseason games to nine...that is the longest such streak in Major League history...the last time Oakland won a winner-take-all postseason game was Game 7 of the 1973 World Series, a 5-2 win over New York...dating back to 2000, the A's have now lost 15 of their last 16 postseason games with a chance to clinch the series...have won just one of their last 13 postseason series (includes one-game wild card games), the 2006 ALDS against Minnesota...won 11 of their first 15 postseason series in Oakland through the 1990 ALCS.

2020 RECAP: The A's finished the season with a 36-24 record for a .600 winning percentage...that tied for the second best record in the American League, tied for fourth best in the majors and tied for eighth best in Oakland history...it was the A's best since the 2002 club finished 103-59 (.636)...won 97 games in each of the previous two seasons for a .599 winning percentage...this marks just the second time in Oakland history (1988-90) and fourth time in Athletics history (1928-32, 1909-11) the A's finished with a .599 winning percentage or better in at least three straight seasons...won their 17th AL West title, their first since 2013...only the Braves (20, Yankees (19) and Dodgers (18) have won more division championship...finished seven games ahead of second place Houston, which was the A's largest margin since 1990 when they won the West by nine games...held at least a share of first place for 64 of 66 days and had sole possession of first for each of the final 56 days...spent 97.0% of the season with at least a share of first, which was the second highest percentage in a season in Oakland history...the 1988 A's spent 174 of 179 days (97.2%) either first or tied for first...this year, the A's spent 56 days alone in first eight days tied for first, one day tied for second and one day in third...the 60 games played are the fewest in Athletics history...the previous low was 109 in the strike-shortened 1981 season...it was the fifth time in Oakland history the A's played fewer than 161 games in a season...in addition to 1981, the A's played 114 games in 1994, 144 in 1995 and 155 in 1972 (also strike seasons)...are 230-154 (.599) over the last three seasons, which is the fourth best record in the majors...the A's began the season by winning three of four from Los Angeles (AL) but then had a season-high three-game losing streak to fall to 3-4 at the conclusion of play on July 31...that was the A's only day under .500 and they were in third place in the AL West, one game behind first place Houston...then won each of the first nine games in August, which was the second longest winning streak in the majors in 2020...it tied for the ninth longest winning streak in Oakland history...defeated Seattle 11-1 on Aug. 3 to move into sole possession of first place in West and remained there for the rest of the season...capped the winning streak by sweeping a three-game series from Houston Aug. 7-9 to increase their lead in the West to five games...swept a three-game series at San Francisco Aug. 14-16 to improve to 16-6...then went 6-6 over the next 12 games before a positive Covid-19 test halted the A's season after being swept in a doubleheader at Houston Aug. 29...did not play for the next five days and had four games postponed before play resumed on Sept. 4...were 22-12 at the resumption of play and had a two-game lead in the West...went 14-12 over the final 26 games, but the Astros went 8-16 over that span...lost two of three to San Diego Sept. 4-6 but Houston was swept in a four-game series at Los Angeles (AL) that weekend and the A's increased their lead to 3½ games...then won four of five from the Astros in a five-game series in Oakland from Sept. 7-10 to take a 6½-game lead...a win on Sept. 11 at Texas increased the A's lead to a season-high seven games...went 9-9 the rest of the way...clinched a postseason berth in game 51 on Sept. 18 with a 6-0 win over San Francisco and clinched the West on their day off on Sept. 21 following game 53...it was the second time in Oakland history the A's clinched the division on an off-day (1992)...it marked the first time the A's clinched the West with at least seven games remaining since 1990 when they did it with eight games left in the season.

THE FINAL 26 GAMES: The A's were 22-12 (.647) when the season was halted on Aug. 30 due a positive Covid-19 test...had their Aug. 30 game at Houston and a three-game series at Seattle from Sept. 1-3 postponed and were off for five days before resuming play on Sept. 4...went 14-12 (.538) over the final 26 games...played 26 games over the final 24 days of the regular season, which were the A's most games over a 24-day stretch since July 21-Aug. 13, 1978 when they had 27 games in 24 days...had a stretch from Sept. 8-14 where they played three doubleheaders in three different cities in three different time zones (Sept. 8 vs. Houston, Sept. 12 at Texas, Sept. 14 at Seattle)...went 6-4 over that stretch and the 10 games were the A's most over a seven-day stretch since June 16-22, 1966...played four games in three different cities in three different time zones over a span of 56 hours and 47 minutes from Sept. 13-15 and lost three of those four games...played 16 games in 13 days from Sept. 4-16 and went 9-7 over that span...it was the first time the A's played 16 games in 13 days since July 18-30, 1975.

THE RULE CHANGES: The A's finished with a 6-1 record in extra inning games...six of the games were decided in the first extra inning (10th inning five times, eighth inning once) and the other (Aug. 7 vs. Houston) in 13 innings...scored the runner from second in 6 of 10 innings while the A's pitching staff did not allow the runner that started the inning on second to score in 7 of 10 innings...outscored the opposition 12-6 in extra innings...hit .276 (8-for-29) with two doubles, two home runs and five walks...the opposition was 6-for-34 (.176) with three walks...the average

time of game in the A's extra inning games was 3 hours and 25.7 minutes...however, played five seven-inning doubleheaders necessitated by social justice protests (Aug. 29 at Houston, Sept. 12 at Texas) and Covid-19 (Sept. 8 vs. Houston, Sept. 14 at Seattle and Sept. 26 vs. Seattle) and were 3-7 in those games...were swept on Aug. 29 at Houston and Sept. 26 vs. Seattle and split the other three...the five doubleheaders were the A's most in a season since 1986 when they also had five...the average time of game in the 10 doubleheader games was 2 hours and 27.1 minutes...entering the season, had played just 16 games fewer than nine innings since moving to Oakland in 1968...prior to this year, the most recent was on Aug. 27, 2013 at Detroit, a 6-3 A's win that was called because of rain with no outs in the top of the sixth...overall, the A's average time of game was 2 hours and 57 minutes, which was second quickest in the majors...it was the first time they averaged under 3 hours since 2016 (2:56).

OFFENSE: The A's batted .225, which was sixth lowest in the majors but second lowest in the 120-year history of the Athletics franchise...the low is .223 by the 1908 Philadelphia A's...however, ranked third in the majors in hit by pitches (39) and seventh in walks (238)...had a .322 on-base percentage, which was .097 points higher than the team batting average...the was the largest difference in Oakland history ahead of the 1999 club, which had a difference of .096 (.259 batting average, .355 on-base percentage)...were successful in 26-of-29 (89.7%) stolen base attempts, which is the best percentage in Major League history ahead of the 2007 Phillies (138-of-157, 87.9%)...hit four grand slams, which matched the A's season total from 2018 and 2019 and was second in the majors to San Diego (7)...two of the grand slams came in the ninth inning and the other was in the 10th and the A's are the 18th team in Major League history with three grand slams in the ninth inning or later in a season (last: Toronto, 2018)...also ranked fourth in the majors in slugging (.635) and extra base hits (8) with the bases loaded, tied for fourth in walks (7), sixth in RBI (53) and seventh in batting (.308)...the slugging percentage was second highest in Oakland history (.712 in 2000)...however, hit .228 with runners in scoring position, which was second lowest in the majors (Texas, .218) and the lowest in Oakland history (previously: .232 in 1977)...averaged 4.23 plate appearances per strikeout, which was the second lowest mark in Athletics history (4.11 in 2017)...the A's number three hitters batted a combined .178, which was second lowest in the majors (Texas, .145) and the lowest in Athletics history (previous: .220 in 1979)...averaged 4.02 pitches per plate appearance, which ranked eighth in the majors but was the best in Oakland history since pitch data was tracked beginning in 1988.

PITCHING: The A's compiled a 3.77 ERA, which was fifth lowest in the majors...had the fifth lowest opponents on-base percentage (.302), the ninth lowest OPS (.693) and 10th lowest slugging percentage (.392)...the on-base percentage was ninth lowest in Oakland history...had the second fewest hit batters in the majors (15), issued the third fewest walks (165) and tied for the sixth fewest home runs (69)...however, the average of 1.21 home runs per nine innings was fifth highest in Oakland history...struck out 506 batters, which tied for ninth fewest in the majors...however, averaged 8.84 strikeouts per nine innings, which was the highest mark in Athletics history (previous: 7.98 in 2019)...also had the highest strikeout-to-walk ratio in A's history with a mark of 3.07 (previous: 3.06 in 2014)...tied for the fewest triples allowed in the majors (3), had the fourth fewest wild pitches (16), tied for the fifth fewest extra base hits (157) and tied for the sixth most shutouts (5)...averaged 136.7 pitches per game, which was the fewest in the majors and second fewest by an A's team since pitch count data was tracked beginning in 1988...had the second fewest pitches per inning in the majors (15.9).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers went 22-19 with a 4.49 ERA...tied for third in the majors in wins, ranked seventh in innings pitched (307.0) and eighth in fewest walks (88)...however, the average of 5.12 innings pitched per start was second lowest in Athletics history to a mark of 5.09 in 2018...tossed seven innings or fewer in all 60 games...now have a streak of 176 consecutive games with eight innings pitched or fewer dating back to May 18, 2019, which is second longest in Oakland history (186, Aug. 20, 2016-Sept. 14, 2017)...had one complete game in 2020 and it was a seven-inning complete game by Mike Minor on Sept. 14, which snapped a 172-game streak without a complete game...that was second longest in Athletics history...allowed a .260 opponents batting average, which was ninth highest in the majors...averaged 8.30 strikeouts per nine innings, which was the highest mark in Oakland history (previous: 7.65 in 2014)...had a 3.22 strikeout-to-walk ratio, which was also the best (2.98 in 2014).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's committed 26 errors, which was fourth fewest in the majors...had a .9874 fielding percentage after setting an Athletics record with a mark of .9865 last year...turned just 33 double plays, which was the fewest in the majors...averaged 0.55 double plays per game, which was the lowest mark in Oakland history (previous: 0.68 in 1981).

CLOSE CALLS: The A's led the majors in walk-off wins (6) and extra-inning wins (6), tied for second in last at bats wins (10) and tied for sixth in comeback wins (16)...were 6-1 in extra inning games and tied for fifth in extra inning games (7)...went 7-6 in one run games and the 13 one-run decisions tied for second fewest in the majors...however, were 11-4 in two run games and the 15 two-run decisions tied for second most... led the majors in wins when trailing after six innings (6) and four innings (11), tied for the lead in wins when trailing after eight (2) and five innings (8) and tied for third in wins when trailing after seven innings (3).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's went 22-10 (.688) in Oakland compared to 14-14 (.500) on the road... had the sixth best home record in the majors and posted a winning record at home for the fourth consecutive season...the .688 winning percentage was the second best home mark in Oakland history to the 2003 A's, who went 57-24 (.704)...had a .500 or better record on the road for the third straight season...this is the fourth time in Oakland history the A's have finished .500 or better on the road in at least three straight seasons (1971-75, 1988-90, 2000-02)...had a 3.20 ERA and 25 home runs in 287.0 innings in Oakland (0.78 per nine innings, compared to a 4.49 ERA and 44 home runs in 228.1 innings on the road (1.73 per nine innings)
