## BOB MELVIN

## MANAGER

Bob Melvin was named interim manager of the A's for the remainder of the 2011 season June 9 and had the interim title removed Sept. 21 when he agreed to terms on a three-year contract through 2014. He replaced Bob Geren, who compiled a $334-376$ (.470) record in four-plus seasons as manager. Melvin has a record of 493-508 (.493) in seven previous seasons as a Major League manager with the Seattle Mariners (2003-04) and Arizona Diamondbacks (2005-09). He is the 29th manager in franchise history and the 17th in Oakland history.

In his previous managerial stint, he guided Arizona to a 337-340 (.498) record in four-plus seasons. He was named manager of the D-backs Nov. 5, 2004 and led the club to a $77-85$ mark in his first season, a 26 -game turnaround from a franchise-worst 51-111 mark in 2004. After a 76-86 finish in 2006, Melvin was named National League Manager of the Year by the BBWAA in 2007 after guiding Arizona to a league-best $90-72$ record. He also earned NL Manager of the Year honors from The Sporting News and the Negro League Baseball Museum's C.I. Taylor Legacy Award. The Diamondbacks followed up their NL West title with a second place finish in 2008, finishing 82-80. Melvin became the winningest manager in Arizona history that season when he earned his 304th win Aug. 14, surpassing Bob Brenly. He was ejected from a game twice during the 2008 season and has 19 career ejections as a manager. Melvin was relieved of his duties as D-backs manager May 8, 2009 after a 12-17 start.

Prior to being named A's manager, Melvin had rejoined the Diamondbacks as a special baseball advisor to President \& CEO Derrick Hall in May of 2011, assisting the baseball operations department and other business divisions of the organization. He was a professional scout for the New York Mets in 2010.

Melvin began his managerial career in 2003 and guided to the Mariners to a $93-69$ record in his rookie campaign, shattering the team record for wins by a first-year Mariners manager set by Lou Piniella in 1993 (82-80). His 93 wins also tied for the 15th-most by any rookie manager in Major League history. The Mariners then fell to $63-99$ in 2004 and he left Seattle with a 156-168 (.481) record in two seasons.

Melvin began his coaching career as Manager Phil Garner's bench coach from 1999-2000, first with the Brewers in 1999 and then in 2000 with the Tigers. While with the Brewers, he also managed the Maryvale team in the Arizona Fall League in 1999. He then served as Bob Brenly's bench coach with the D-backs from 2001-02 when the club won back-to-back NL West titles and the World Series in 2001. Prior to those bench coach roles, he spent three seasons with Milwaukee in various capacities, serving as a scout in 1996, roving instructor in 1997 and as assistant to General Manager Sal Bando in 1998.

A 10-year Major League veteran, Melvin's playing career included stops in Detroit (1985), San Francisco (1986-88), Baltimore (1989-91), Kansas City (1992), Boston (1993), New York-AL (1994) and Chicago-AL (1994). He posted a .233 batting average with 35 home runs and 212 RBI while playing in 692 games.

The former catcher was drafted by Detroit as its first choice in the secondary phase of the 1981 January draft and hit . 220 in 41 games in his rookie season of 1985. Melvin spent the next three seasons sharing the catching duties with Bob Brenly for the Giants and hit a career-high 11 home runs in 1987. After three seasons in Baltimore, he batted a career-high . 314 in 32 games with Kansas City in 1992.

Melvin graduated from Menlo-Atherton High School in Menlo Park, Calif. in 1979 and later attended and played baseball at the University of California in Berkeley. He and his wife, Kelly, reside in Lower Manhattan, NY. Their daughter, Alexi, is a recent graduate of the prestigious Lee Strasberg Theater \& Film Institute in New York.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Made his Major League debut with Arizona in 2009 and has seen big league action in each of the last two seasons, hitting 221 with five home runs and 20 RBI in 54 games...made a majority of his appearances in left field in 2010 after exclusively playing first base in 2009 with the D-backs... is a 264 ( 690 for 2617) career hitter with 121 home runs and 452 RBI in 714 minor league games over seven seasons in the minors...was rated the Diamondbacks fourth best prospect by Baseball America entering the 2010 season...was originally drafted by the White Sox in the fifth round of the 2004 draft and was dealt to Arizona July 7, 2009 for Tony Pena....was the White Sox sixth best prospect prior to 2009...was a Caroline League Midseason All-Star in 2008...set a Kannapolis club record with 93 RBI in 2007.

## 2010 HIGHLIGHTS

Spent nearly the entire season with Triple-A Reno before joining the D-backs for his second stint in the big leagues after rosters were expanded Sept. 1...entered the season ranked by Baseball America as the D-backs fourth-best prospect...in 107 games with the Aces, hit .261 with 72 runs scored, 18 doubles, 3 triples, 25 home runs and 86 RBI...led the Aces in home runs, RBI, walks (83), OPS (. 933 ), on-base percentage (.405) and slugging percentage (.528), while finishing tied for second with 14 stolen bases and third with 196 total bases...among Pacific Coast League hitters, finished third in walks and fourth in on-base percentage...tied for second in the D-backs' farm system in home runs and finished fourth in RBI...hit .294 with 13 doubles, a triple, 12 home runs and 73 RBI with runners on base...reached base safely in 25 consecutive home games from July 9, 2009-April 9, 2010, over which he hit .363 with 25 runs scored, five doubles, a triple, eight home runs, 24 RBI and 20 walks...named the organization's Player of the Month in June after batting .329 with six doubles, two triples, six homers, 23 RBI and a . 649 slugging percentage in 26 games after missing nearly the entire month of May while on the disabled list with a left shoulder strain from April 30-May 29...connected for a grand slam June 27 at Salt Lake and finished the game 3 -for- 4 with two doubles and a season-high five RBI...also hit two home runs and added four RBI July 26 vs. Fresno... hit safely in a season-high 11 straight games from July 30-Aug. 9 , and batted .325 with 3 home runs and 10 RBI...recalled from Reno Sept. 1 and hit a game-winning grand slam in the seventh inning to put the D-backs up 5-2 and complete a three-game sweep of the Padres at Chase Field...became only the third rookie to hit a grand slam in D-backs history, joining Karim Garcia (1998) and Chris Snyder (2005)...the four RBI matched his career-high set in 2009....hit . 267 with five runs scored, three doubles, a home run and six RBI in 22 games with the D-backs...hit safely in a season-high three straight games from Sept. 29-Oct. 2, and batted . 333 (3-for-9) with a run scored and RBI.

## CAREER

2009-Acquired in a mid-season trade with the White Sox and earned his first trip to the Majors in late August, appearing in 32 games for the D-backs...over a trio of minor league stops with Double-A Birmingham, Triple-A Charlotte and Triple-A Reno, hit .298 with 24 doubles, four triples, 20 home runs, 75 RBI and an .876 OPS in 115 games...hit .284 with 15 home runs and 53 RBI against right-handed pitchers and .331 with five home runs and 22 RBI versus left-handed pitchers...opened the season in the Chicago White Sox system ranked by Baseball America as the sixth-best prospect and the Best Power Hitter (second straight year) in the organization...for Birmingham, reached base safely in 18 of 19 games from April 22-May 12 (.297, 22-for-97)...promoted to Charlotte June 18 and hit .262 with one home run and eight RBI in 15 games for the Knights....acquired by the D-backs July 7 from the White Sox in exchange for right-handed pitcher Tony Pena....appeared in 38 games at Reno, reaching base via
a hit or walk in 36 games and hitting safely in 31 games...reached base in his first 25 games for the Aces, which tied for the ninth-longest streak in the PCL...batted .344 with nine home runs, 22 RBI and 12 walks during the streak from July 9-Aug. 6...in his first 11 games for the Aces, hit seven home runs and drove in 15 runs...had a 15 -game hitting streak from July 16-31, during which he batted $.367 \ldots$ recalled from Reno Aug. 22 and made his Major League debut as the starting first baseman at Houston, collecting his first hit (in his second plate appearance) with a fourth-inning single off of Brian Moehler...had a career-high four RBI and hit his first career home run, a three-run blast off of Joe Martinez Aug. 27 at San Francisco...following the season, played for the Scottsdale Scorpions in the Arizona Fall League... in 30 games, hit .177 with six doubles, one triple, one home run and 12 RBI.
