CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Is a .210 (13-for-62) career hitter in 35 games in parts of three seasons in the majors with St. Louis (2010 and 2012) and Chicago-AL (2013)...is a .282 (669-for-2370) career hitter in 693 games over nine seasons in the minors...was the starting catcher in the 2007 All-Star Futures Game at San Francisco... also played in the Futures Game in 2008 at New York (AL)...earned postseason All-Star honors in the Texas League in 2007 and the Midwest League in 2006.

2013 HIGHLIGHTS

Spent the entire regular season at Triple-A Charlotte where he batted .224 with seven home runs and 26 RBI in 64 games...earned a September promotion to Chicago (AL) and went 1-for-18 (.056) with a double and two RBI in 10 games with the White Sox...all 10 of his games came as a catcher, including six starts...opponents were successful in all three of their stolen base attempts off him...went 0-for-his-first-14, which was the longest hitless streak of his career, before delivering a two-run double in the ninth inning at Detroit Sept. 21 for his lone hit of the season...hit .224 with seven home runs and 26 RBI in 64 games with Charlotte...batted .260 (40-for-154) with all seven of his home runs and 25 of his 26 RBI against right-handed pitching compared to .125 (7-for-56) against left-handers...hit .189 at home, .250 on the road...combined for a .175 batting average in April and May, hit .270 in June, .340 in July and .152 in August...hit .300 with a .391 on-base percentage when leading off an inning...had a .159 batting average with runners in scoring position...appeared exclusively at catcher on defense, where he played 42 games...tossed out 15-of-70 (21.4%) attempted base stealers...also made one start at designated hiter and doubled in his only at bat as a pinch hitter...saw his most action batting seventh (21 games) and ninth (19 games)...hit two home runs and drove in a season-high four runs May 18 at Buffalo...had a season-high 10-game hitting streak from June 19 to July 12 (14-for-36, .389).

2012—Spent most of the season with Triple-A Memphis, but appeared in 10 games with St. Louis (two stints)...was recalled by the Cardinals July 6 and optioned July 8 without making an appearance...was recalled a second time Aug. 29 and spent the remainder of the season with St. Louis...made one start each at catcher and first base... went 1-for-5 (.200) as a pinch-hitter...went 1-1 with a double and a run scored in his season debut Aug. 30 at Washington...recorded his first Major League stolen base Sept. 8 vs. Milwaukee...started the season finale Oct. 3 vs. Cincinnati, going 1-for-4...ranked second in the Pacific Coast League with a .994 fielding percentage...threw out 27.7 percent (23-of-83) of attempted basestealers...hit .249 with five home runs and 28 RBI against right-handers compared to .160 vs. lefties...was a .261 hitter on the road, compared to .182 at home...tied a Memphis club record with six hits May 24 at Tucson...recorded consecutive three-hit games June 22-23...hit two home runs Aug. 5 at Fresno...compiled an eight-game hitting streak from Aug. 10-20 (11-for-31, .355).

2011—Played the entire season with Triple-A Memphis...his 92 games at catcher were the second-most in the Pacific Coast League...threw out 23.5 percent (24-of-102) of attempted basestealers...hit .335 on the road...seven of his eight home runs came against left-handers...posted a seven-game hitting streak from Aug. 3-12 (14-for-30, .467, including six consecutive multi-hit efforts.

2010—Appeared in 15 games, seven starts, over two stints with St. Louis...went 6-for-24 (.250) as a catcher and 3-for-8 (.375) as a pinch-hitter...was recalled from Triple-A Memphis for the first time April 14...made his Major League debut April 15 vs. Houston...registered his first ML hit April 20 at Ari-

zona, a single off Dan Haren...collected his first RBI April 26 vs. Atlanta before being optioned back to Memphis following the game...was recalled for the remainder of the season Aug. 18...went 2-for-4 with a RBI Sept. 29 vs. Pittsburgh ...hit a career-high 12 home runs over 82 games with Memphis...threw out 31.4 percent (16-of-51) of attempted basestealers, the second-best mark in the PCL...was named the Cardinals Minor League Player of the Month for June after hitting .344 with four home runs and 14 RBI...went 11-for-24 (.458) with two homers and six RBI over a six-game game span from June 2-11.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

His 440 home runs rank third among active players...is one of eight players in major-league history to record five straight 40-home run seasons (2004-08), joining Barry Bonds, Ken Griffey Jr., Ralph Kiner, Alex Rodriguez, Babe Ruth, Duke Snider and Sammy Sosa...hit at least 38 homers in seven straight seasons (2004-10), tied with Ruth (1926-32) for the second-longest streak in history behind Rafael Palmeiro (9, 1995-2003)...his 354 home runs through his first 10 seasons were the fourth-most in baseball history behind Albert Pujols (408), Eddie Matthews (370) and Kiner (369)...since 2004, is the only player with four seasons of at least 40 homers, 100 RBI and 100 walks (no one else has more than two)...is a two-time All-Star (2002 and 2012)...ranks fourth on Cincinnati's all-time home run list with 270...his 535-foot home run on Aug. 10, 2004 vs. Los Angeles-NL off Jose Lima is the longest in Great American Ball Park history...played for the United States in the 2009 World Baseball Classic

2013 HIGHLIGHTS

Hit 30-plus home runs for the ninth time in his career and second time in three seasons with the White Sox...became just the second left-hander in franchise history (Jim Thome, 2006-08) to record multiple 30-homer seasons and the first since Pete Ward in 1967-68 to lead the team in consecutive seasons... finished the season in 39th place all-time with 440 home runs...passed the following players during the season: Duke Snider (407), Darrell Evans (414), Billy Williams (426), Mike Piazza (427), Cal Ripken Jr. (431), Andruw Jones (434), Juan Gonzalez (434) and Andre Dawson (438)...ranked among the American League leaders in pitches per plate appearances (2nd, 4.29), strikeouts (3rd in 189), home runs (T4th, 34), home run ratio (5th, 15.44) and walks (T7th, 76)...appeared in 74 games (73 starts) as the designated hitter, 71 (70) at first base and three (two) in left field...batted .262 (65-248) with 18 home runs and 40 RBI as the first baseman, compared to .184 (49-267) with 16 homers and 44 RBI as the DH...hit 24 of his 34 home runs vs. right-handers (26 of 41 in 2012)...his 21 home runs at home ranked second in the AL behind Baltimore's Chris Davis...combined to hit .272 (77-283) with 18 home runs and 51 RBI from June-August (batted .148 in April, .165 in May and .159 in September)...started consecutive games in left field on April 10-11 at Washington...snapped a career-high 0-31 hitless stretch with a solo home run on April 21 vs. Minnesota...scored his 1.000th career run on May 10 vs. Los Angeles-AL...recorded a RBI in five consecutive games from May 14-18 (10 total)...homered in consecutive games for the first time on May 14-15 at Minnesota...recorded his 35th career multi-homer game on May 15 at Target Field, going 3-4 with two homers and five RBI...ranked among the AL leaders in June in RBI (3rd, 24), home runs (T3rd, 9), OPS (6th, .991) and slugging percentage (8th, .589)...went 4-4 with two home runs and five RBI on June 10 vs. Toronto, his 36th career multi-homer game and second of the season...drove in at least four runs for the third time in 2013 on June 23 at Kansas City (two-run single and two-run homer)...went 3-3 with a home run, walk and three RBI on July 9 at Detroit...hit his ninth career game-ending home run on July 4 vs. Baltimore, a solo shot in the ninth inning off Tommy Hunter...matched his career high with four hits (sixth time) on Aug. 4 at Detroit, including a 475-foot home run off Rick Porcello...hit a game-tying RBI single in the ninth inning off Mariano Rivera on Aug. 7 vs. the Yankees (Sox won, 6-5, in 12)...recorded a season-high, nine-game hitting streak from Aug. 9-17 (.438, 14-32)...went 30 games without a multi-hit effort from Aug. 18-Sept. 24...hit his 30th home run on Aug. 26 vs. Houston, joining Thome (2006-08) as the only left-handed hitters in franchise history with consecutive and multiple 30-homer seasons...extended the Sox lead to 4-1 with a two-run homer in a win on Sept. 8 at Baltimore...homered in two of his final three games on Sept. 26 and Sept. 28 vs. Kansas City.

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CAREER

2012—Was named The Sporting News and Players Choice American League Comeback Player of the Year...hit 41 home runs, his most since 2004 (career-high 46), and tied for the sixth most in White Sox history...ranked among the AL leaders in walks (1st, 105), strikeouts (1st, 222), pitches per plate appearance (1st, 4.43), home run ratio (3rd, 13.14), home runs (5th) and RBI ratio (7th, 5.6)...according to Elias, his 30-homer increase from 2011 (11) to 2012 tied for the third-largest in major-league history (minimum 400 at-bats) behind Brady Anderson (+34, 1995-1996), Lou Gehrig (+31, 1926-27) and Sammy Sosa (+30, 1997-98)...finished the season ranked 49th all-time with 406 career home runs...passed Ralph Kiner, Gil Hodges, Rocky Colavito, Carlton Fisk, Joe Carter, Dale Murphy, Al Kaline and Andres Galarraga during the season...became the sixth player (11th time) in franchise history to hit 40 or more home runs in a season, joining Albert Belle (49 in 1998), Jermaine Dye (44 in 2006), Frank Thomas (43 in 2000, 42 in 2003, 41 in 1993 and 40 in 1995-96), Jim Thome (42 in 2006) and Paul Konerko (41 in 2004 and 40 in 2005)...became just the second left-hander in team history to hit 40 or more home runs in a season and the fourth (sixth time) to hit 30-plus...became the fifth player in White Sox history to hit a milestone homer of 400 or more with the club, joining Frank Thomas (400 in 2003), Jim Thome (500 in 2007), Andruw Jones (400 in 2010) and Paul Konerko (400 in 2012)...joined Konerko as the only teammates in baseball history to hit their 400th career homer in the same season (Elias)... homered every 13.15 at-bats, the eighth-best mark in franchise history...became the first player in major-league history to record 100 walks and 200 strikeouts in the same season...led the majors in walks and strikeouts... walked 100-plus times for the eighth time in his career...his 222 strikeouts were the second-highest total in major-league history behind Mark Reynolds' 223 in 2009...was named to his second career All-Star Team (also 2002 with Cincinnati)...homered in consecutive games eight times, including three straight from June 9-12 and July 13-15...reached the 20-homer plateau in 60 games, the fifth-fastest in Sox history and 30 in 97 games, the fourth-fastest pace...hit 25 home runs in the first half, tied with Jermaine Dye (2006) for fifth-most in team history...hit a career-high 11 homers in the first inning...18 of his homers tied the game or gave the Sox the lead, and 17 came with two strikes...hit 15 home runs off lefthanders (none in 2011) and 26 against righties...made 93 starts as the designated hitter, 51 at first base and five in left field...struck out in a major-league record 36 consecutive games (dating back to Sept. 24, 2011)...hit his eighth career Opening Day home run, tying Frank Robinson and Ken Griffey Jr. for the all-time record...recorded his 31st career multi-homer game (first with the Sox) and collected five RBI on April 20 at Seattle...the five RBI were his most since Sept. 24, 2010 vs. Atlanta...hit 11 home runs in May, matching his total from all of 2011...hit a game-winning, two-run home run off Jose Valverde in the ninth inning on May 5 at Detroit...reached base four times on May 11 vs. Kansas City, including his 11th home run, matching his total from 2011...became just the 14th player since 1921 to equal his previous year's home run total (10 or more) in 33 games or less...also snapped his streak of 36 consecutive games with at least one strikeout vs. the Royals...reached base five times (home run and four walks) for the 10th time in his career on May 19 at the Cubs...hit a game-winning, 448-foot home run on May 28 at Tampa Bay...hit his 12th career grand slam and matched a season high with five RBI on June 9 vs. Houston...hit his 20th homer on June 10 vs. Houston...according to Elias, became just the second player in baseball history to hit 20 home runs the year after posting a slugging percentage below .300 (.277 in 2011)...hit his 25th home run on July 3 vs. Texas, becoming the fifth player (sixth time) in franchise history with 25 homers and 60 RBI prior to the All-Star Break...Jermaine Dye (2006). Jim Thome (2006), Frank Thomas (1994, 2000) and Dick Allen (1974) also accomplished the feat (Elias)...did not play in the All-Star Game at Kauffman Stadium...stolen base on July 17 at Boston was his since first Aug. 16, 2008 (with Arizona)...recorded his 32nd career multi-homer game and collected his 1,000th career RBI on Aug. 13 at Toronto...hit his 400th career home run on Aug. 18 at Kansas City...hit his 36th home run on Aug. 20 vs. the Yankees...recorded his 33rd career multi-homer game (third of 2012) on Aug. 24 vs. Seattle...missed 10 games (Sept. 1-2 and Sept. 7-14) with a strained right oblique...hit a game-winning, two-run home run in the eighth inning on Sept. 24 vs. Cleveland, his 41st of the season... also hit a solo homer in the sixth (34th career multi-homer effort).

2011—His .159 average (66-415) would have been the lowest in major-league history with the required plate appearances (was six short), and his streak of seven straight seasons with at least 38 home runs came to an end...established a club record and ranked third in the AL with 177 strikeouts...his 22 games with at least three strikeouts were an AL record...was the first player in the major leagues with more walks than hits since Jack Cust in 2007...his 75 walks were two less than his 2010 total (77) despite playing in 36 less games...did not record an intentional walk for the first time in his career...was one of two players in the majors to register at least 75 walks without the benefit of an intentional walk (also


In his first season with the Red Sox, he led the club with 65 starts in left field and 30 plate appearances as a pinch-hitter, which tied for first in the American League...totaled 76 starts for the Sox (also nine at designated hitter and two in right field...64 of his last 67 starts were in left field, including each of his last 35...hit .346 with runners in scoring position, including a .375 mark with 23 RBI in RISP situations beginning Aug. 1...went 4-for-8 (.500) with 11 RBI when batting with the bases loaded...hit four home runs in the pinch, which tied Atlanta's Evan Gattis for the Major League lead and was the most in a season by an AL player since Minnesota's Matthew LeCroy in 2004 (4)...they tied for second most by a Red Sox in a single season, one shy of Joe Cronin's club/American League record (5 in 1943)... reached safely in 15 of 30 plate appearances as PH, batting .286 (6-for-21) with a double, seven RBI, seven walks and two hit pitched...led the AL and tied for second in the ML with five pinch extra base hits and tied for third in the AL in pinch RBI...his home runs on June 18 against Tampa Bay (2nd Game) and July 3 against San Diego were both walk-off shots...in his final 70 games beginning June 6, he posted a .284 batting average, .357 on-base percentage and .490 slugging percentage...had OBP's over .340 in April (.353), July (.356), August (.346) and September (.400)...hit over .300 in both June (.304) and September (.340)...his .340 mark in September led the Sox and was seventh in the AL...hit .236 against left-handers compared to a .258 average against righties...beginning June 6, had a .282 average, .364 on-base percentage and .495 slugging percentage against left-handed pitching, including a .326/.388/.581 beginning Aug. 16.

BOSTON: Was on his seventh career Opening Day roster (also 2006-08, 2010-12) and started Opening Day at designated hitter on April 1 at New York (AL)...it was his third Opening Day start (also as DH for TB in 2006 and as LF for CIN in 2011)...was Boston's first Opening Day starter at DH other than David Ortiz since Jeremy Giambi in 2003...reached in all four plate appearances April 16 at Cleveland, going 1-for-1 with three walks...knocked his fourth career grand slam (off Pedro Hernandez) and tallied a season-high five RBI May 8 against Minnesota...delivered the go-ahead and eventual game-winning run with a 10th-inning sacrifice fly May 17 at Minnesota...hit the game-tying sacrifice fly in the 6th inning May 25 against Cleveland and threw out a potential run at the plate in the third inning...walked

Ferrell Middle Magnet School in Tampa with 13-year-old honor student Shamika Smith, winner of the five-county Take Jonny To School contest...helped raise \$25,000 for the American Cancer Society and Lupus Foundation of America at the Casa Grande Annual Camp for a Cure in No-vember 2007...was the 2013 recipient of the Boston Baseball Writers' Jackie Jensen Award, presented annually to a major league player for spirit and determination.

ERA while going 5-3...recorded 10 or more strikeouts in seven outings, which was the most in the AL and tied for the most in the majors (Gallardo, MIL; Lincecum, SF)...reached double-digit strikeouts in a four straight starts from Aug. 27-Sept. 13, which was the longest ever such streak by a Sox lefty... started and lost the first official game at the Twins new Target Field on April 12...became the first Red Sox hurler to start the first official game at a new ML ballpark since Howard Ehmke on April 18, 1923 at Yankee Stadium...recorded his 500th career strikeout against Willy Aybar in the fourth inning on April 18 against Tampa Bay...tallied a career-long, eight-game win streak over 11 starts from April 23-June 16 (2.01 ERA), which was the longest stretch by a left-handed Sox starter since Roger Moret went 12-0 from Sept. 19, 1971-Sept. 12, 1973...put together a season-high, 15.2-inning scoreless streak from April 23-May 4...also compiled a 15.0-inning scoreless run from Sept. 13 at Seattle through Sept. 25 at New York (AL)...allowed just one hit with 11 strikeouts over seven innings for the win April 28 at Toronto... named AL Pitcher of the Month for May, his third career monthly honor...during the month, went 5-0 with an AL-best 1.84 ERA and an ML best 45 strikeouts over six starts...threw a pair of complete games, including his 100th career start May 20 against Minnesota and opposite Tim Lincecum June 27 at San Francisco...drove in what proved to be the winning run with a third inning sacrifice fly June 27, becoming the first Sox pitcher to throw a complete game and record an RBI in the same game since Luis Tiant on Sept. 16, 1972...earned a decision in each of his final 19 starts of the season beginning June 16, posting a 12-7 record in that time...improved his career record to 50-18 with a victory over Arizona on June 16 in his 106th career game...earned his first career All-Star selection...tossed a perfect sixth, recording a hold in the July 13 exhibition in Anaheim...retired his first 17 batters and fanned career-high 13 in a 5-1 loss at Safeco Field on July 24...the strikeouts were the most by a Sox lefty since Bruce Hurst on May 5, 1987 at Oakland (14)...won six straight starts from Aug. 27-Sept. 25, posting a 1.76 ERA with 54 strikeouts in 41.0 innings...became the first Sox lefty to win at least six consecutive outings since Bob Ojeda, Sept. 1-28, 1983 (6)...earned the victory in his first five starts of September, becoming the first Red Sox pitcher to win five games in the month since Roger Clemens in 1987 (5-1).

just two base runners on walks in the second and ninth innings...retired 20 straight batters between the free passes...tossed a career-high 130 pitches...threw his second shutout of the season July 3 at New York (AL)...allowed five hits and two walks in the 7-0 win...it was the first shutout by a Sox lefty at Yankee Stadium since Roger Moret on July 4, 1973...was named AL Pitcher of the Month for July, going 3-0 with a 2.05 ERA...it was his first monthly honor...took home AL Pitcher of the Month again for September, the first Boston pitcher with multiple monthly awards in a season since Pedro Martinez (4) in 1999...was 4-1 with a 2.14 ERA over five starts...went 1-2 with a 2.36 ERA over the ALDS and ALCS, leading the Red Sox with four starts, 26.2 innings, and 26 strikeouts...earned the win in Game 1 of the ALDS at Los Angeles on Oct. 1...did not allow an earned run in 14.0 innings in the Division Series, the second-highest total ever behind Jerry Reuss' 18.0 frames with the Dodgers in 1981...gave up a three-run homer to B.J. Upton in Game 3 of the ALCS to snap a string of 24.2 consecutive scoreless postseason frames dating back to Game 2 of the 2007 ALCS.

2007—Spent the majority of the second half with Boston, but also had stints with three of the Sox minor league affiliates while working his way back from lymphoma treatments...began the year on the disabled list and was sent to Single-A Greenville on a rehab assignment April 5...was transferred to Triple-A Pawtucket April 25 and was 0-1 with a 2.25 ERA before experiencing muscle cramping in his left forearm on May 2 vs. Indianapolis...recalled from the rehab assignment and spent the next two weeks undergoing treatment before beginning a second rehab stint with the PawSox...reinstated from the DL June 11 and optioned to Pawtucket...recalled July 23 and earned the win with a start that night at Cleveland, his first since Aug. 23, 2006 at Los Angeles (AL)...gave up two runs on five hits in 6.0 innings, walking three and striking out six in Boston's 6-2 victory...optioned to Double-A Portland Aug. 23 and made one start for the Sea Dogs before being called up again Sept. 2...went 2-0 with a 3.34 ERA in six September outings, including five starts...made three postseason appearances, including one start, for Boston...got the start and earned the win to secure the Sox' four-game sweep of the Rockies in the World Series on Oct. 28 at Colorado...went 5.2 scoreless innings in that outing, allowing three hits and three walks with three strikeouts in Boston's 4-3 victory...prior to that start, threw 3.0 scoreless innings in relief in Game 4 of the ALCS Oct. 16 at Cleveland...finished the postseason with a combined 8.2 scoreless innings over his final two postseason appearances.
