■ 2011: Established career highs in virtually all offensive categories, batting .258 (48-186) with 13 home runs and 29 RBI in 97 games ... entered the season with just three home runs in 273 major-league at-bats ... suffered a fractured fifth metacarpal in his right hand after being hit by a pitch by Cleveland's Josh Judy on 9/8 and missed the remainder of the season ... ranked fourth in the American League with a home run every 14.31 at-bats (min. 185 AB), trailing only Toronto's Jose Bautista (11.93), the Angels' Mike Napoli (12.30) and the Yankees' Curtis Granderson (14.22) ... was hit by a pitch seven times (twice in 139 games from 2008-10) ... the Sox went 60-37 in games he played (26-20 in his starts)... made 43 appearances in right field (18 starts), 22 at first base (12), 11 in center (8), nine in left (7) and six at second (1) ... hit .294 (15-51) with six homers and 14 RBI when playing first ... did not record a home run or RBI in July, but led the Sox with six home runs in August (14 RBI) ... homered in back-to-back games three times, including the first time in his career on 4/30-5/1 vs. Baltimore ... made his second Opening Day roster (also 2009) ... hit the franchise's 10,000th home run on 4/11 vs. Oakland (off Dallas Braden) ... reached base safely in 12 consecutive games from 5/28-6/11 ... made his first career appearance at first base on 7/31 vs. Boston and first start on 8/7 at Minnesota ... tied

- 2010: Hit .224 (22-98) with two homers and 16 RBI in 64 games with the White Sox ... ranked among the American League pinch-hit leaders in extra-base hits (T1st, 5), doubles (2nd, 3) and RBI (T2nd, 7) ... made 25 appearances at second base (18 starts), six in center field (1), four at shortstop, three at third (1) and one in both right and left ... batted .409 (9-22) in 42 games as a substitute, and .171 (13-79) in 22 starts ... posted a .455 (10-22) average in 18 first-half games, compared to .158 (12-76) in 46 appearances after the All-Star Break ... was recalled from Charlotte on 6/1 after batting .270 (50-185) in 70 games ... hit a pinch-hit, three-run homer on 6/9 vs. Detroit, his first home run since 7/12/08 at San Diego ... compiled a career-high, eight-game hitting streak from 6/30-7/16 ... replaced an injured Gordon Beckham on 8/30 at Cleveland and hit a go-ahead, solo home run in the 11th inning ... had seven hits in his last 65 at-bats (.108).
- 2009: Batted .158 (15-95) with three RBI in 46 games in his first season with the Sox ... made 23 appearances at second base (14 starts), 12 in center field (9), seven at shortstop (3) and one at third ... made his first Opening Day roster ... led off for the first time on 4/11 vs. Minnesota (0-2) ... went 11-68 (.162) in 26 games before being optioned to Charlotte on 5/19 ... was recalled from Charlotte on 7/31 and optioned back to the Knights on 8/1 ... was recalled from Charlotte for the third and final time on 8/14 ... made 14 appearances with the Sox following his final promotion, going 4-22 (.182).

- Had the most hits (163) among all ML players with 132 games played or less
- Had 3 walk-off hits (all singles): 6/11 vs DET, 6/25 vs LAD and 8/4 vs LAA
- Slugged his 1st career pinch HR, 8/26 at BOS (Ramon Ramirez), in the 8th inning to tie the game

2008

- Went to spring training as a non-roster invitee with COL and made the Opening Day roster
- Made 21 starts in CF and 2 in LF
- Was on the DL, 7/28-8/22 (non-displaced fracture of the left pinkie finger); missed 23 games
- Hit .308 (12-39) with RISP
- Batted .349 (15-43) in 24 games after the All-Star break

2007

- Had surgery to repair a sports hernia on 1/23 and appeared in only 6 spring training games
- Made 54 appearances in LF and 3 in CF; made 1 start as the DH

- Appeared in 10 games before being placed on the 15-day DL on 4/17 (retro to 4/16) with a strained right adductor sustained during an off-day workout; activated on 6/23
- Hit .303 (10-33) in April
- Went back on the 15-day DL on 7/2 with a strained right ribcage after leaving the game the previous day after 1 AB; activated on 7/24
- Hit his 2nd HR, 8/20 vs KC, snapping a 133-AB home run drought
- Left the game, 8/21 vs KC, with a strained right ribcage and missed 10 games

2006

- Led the team and finished 5th in the AL in SB (40)
- Made all 121 starts in LF
- Began the season going 0-for-16 and collected just 1 hit in his first 26 AB (.038)
- Had 4 SB, 5/1 at CLE, to tie his career high and the club record
- Walked 4 times, 5/9 vs LAA
- Hit his 1st career grand slam, 6/23 vs HOU and tied his career high with 4 RBI (4th time)
- Got his 200th career SB, 7/8 vs BOS
- Was limited to 7 spring games due to left shoulder tendinitis and a sore left abductor

2005

- Named to his 1st All-Star team after winning the Ameriquest AL All-Star Final Vote
- Finished 2nd among all ML players in SB (59 Chone Figgins, 62)
- Led the AL in infield hits (39) and bunt hits (16)
- Made 118 starts in LF and 6 in CF
- Became the first position player since 1998 to participate in the All-Star Game without hitting a HR in the first half of the season (Walt Weiss and Omar Vizquel)
- Went 17-for-18 in SB attempts of 3rd base
- Missed 5 games with a sore right adductor, 4/13-17
- Reached base safely in 21 consecutive games, 4/29-5/22
- Had 4 SB, 5/14 vs BAL, tying the club record (5th time) and his career high (3rd time)
- Was the 1st player since Hall of Famer Rickey Henderson in 1991 to have two 4-SB games in one season (also 5/7 at TOR) and the first since Vince Coleman in 1986 to do it in the same month (August)
- Was on the 15-day DL, 8/13-28 (strained left adductor);
 played in 2 rehab games with Charlotte (AAA)
- Reached base safely in 11 of 12 postseason games
- Hit a walkoff HR in Game 2 of the World Series vs HOU (Brad Lidge); the 14th walkoff HR in WS history

- Became the 1st player to hit a postseason walkoff HR following a season in which he had none
- Established a WS record with 8 AB in Game 3 at HOU (14 innings)
- Became the 2nd player in ML history to homer in a postseason game during a season in which he did not homer in at least 500 at-bats (Lance Johnson in 1993)
- Donated his bat used in Game 2 of the WS to the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum
- Underwent surgery to repair a sports hernia on 11/25

2004

- Led all ML players in SB (70) and set a club record; finished 5th in the NL in SB % (84.3) & AB (640) and T-9th in triples (7)
- His 70 SB were the most in the majors since 1999 (Tony Womack, 72) and were the most by an outfielder since 1997 (Brian L. Hunter, 74)
- Set career highs in AB, HR (12), SB and walks (58)
- Earned the Lou Brock Award as the NL's top basestealer
- Stole a club-record 23 straight bases to start the season; also stole 18 consecutive bases, 8/21-9/28
- Made his 1st career Opening Day start, 4/5 at STL
- Tied a club record with 4 SB, 9/18 at HOU
- Hit 4 leadoff HR, including back-to-back games: 6/1-2 at LAD
- Had his 2nd career multi-HR game, 4/17 vs HOU

- Named NL Rookie of the Year by The Sporting News and Baseball Digest, ML Rookie of the Year by MLB.com and to the Topps All-Rookie Team
- Earned the Players Choice Award as the league's Outstanding Rookie
- Finished 2nd to Dontrelle Willis in the BBWAA Rookie of the Year voting
- Became the 4th rookie in ML history since 1900 to hit .300 with 100 runs & 40 SB, joining Jimmy Barrett (1900), Joe Jackson (1911) and Ichiro Suzuki (2001)
- Earned MIL's Harvey Keunn Award for Batting Excellence and the Newcomer Award after becoming the 1st MIL rookie in history to hit .300
- Began the season as the club's 5th outfielder, but moved into the starting lineup on 5/13
- Ranked 2nd in the NL in SB (43)

- Led all NL rookies in AVG (.314), hits (175), runs (100), TB (247), triples (8), SB, walks (56), multi-hit games (55) & OBP (.379), 2nd in doubles, SLG % & XBH (46), T-2nd in OF assists (5), T-3rd in RBI (58) and T-6th in HR
- Led the major leagues in day AVG (.375) and ranked 2nd in the NL in RISP AVG (.381)
- Named NL Rookie of the Month for August (.364, 10 2B, 12 SB)
- Made 123 appearances in CF, 13 in RF & 3 in LF
- Reached base safely in 47 straight games, 5/27-7/20, the 2nd-longest streak in MLB behind Barry Bonds (58)
- Hit safely in a career-best 14 straight games, 8/13-28 (.458)
- Stole home, 8/30 at CHI
- Slugged his 1st career leadoff HR, 9/11 vs HOU
