A's vs. TWINS

The A's trail in the season series 1-3...won the first game of this series last night after being swept in a three-game series in Minnesota at the end of May...have won just one season series over the previous six years and are 25-33 (.431) against Minnesota since 2006...that is the second worst record by any American League team over that span (Kansas City, .373)...since moving to Oakland in 1968, the A's are 274-288 against Minnesota...that includes 152-125 in Oakland and 122-163 in Minnesota...are 5-5 at Target Field...are 331-357 all-time against the Twins and have a 978-993 record against the Twins/Senators

Jemile Weeks had two hits last night and has now hit safely in all seven of his career games against Minnesota (10 for 30, .333).

THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1987** Oakland hosts its only All-Star game, a game the National League wins 2-0 on Tim Lincecum's two-run triple off A's reliever Jay Howell in the top of the 13th inning...A's rookie Mark McGwire is 0 for 3 in his first All-Star game...in **1991** the A's defeat the Baltimore Orioles 3-2 in 11 innings as Tony La Russa becomes the 40th manager in Major League history win 1000 games...Baltimore scores a run in the top of the 11th but the A's win in the bottom of the inning on Jose Canseco's two-run single.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: Have won seven of the last eight games to move above .500 for the first time since May 21 when they were 22-21...that is one short of the season high of two games over .500 (three times, last: 19-17 on May 14)...the A's 7-1 record in July is the best in the majors...are now 22-13 (.629) over the last 35 games (since June 2) after losing a season-high nine consecutive contests...the mark since June 2 is tied for second best in the majors...are in third place in the American League West for the 28th consecutive day and trail Texas by nine games...however, are just 1½ games behind Baltimore and Cleveland for the second Wild Card spot...have spent one day tied for first this year, 30 days in second, eight days tied for second, 39 days in third, eight days tied for third and 11 days in fourth.

STRIKEOUTS: The A's struck out a season-high 16 times last night, including 15 times against Francisco Liriano...it was the 10th time in Oakland history one pitcher had 15 or more strikeouts against the A's...the last to do it was the Yankees David Wells, who struck out 16 on July 30, 1997...the A's now have 699 strikeouts for the season, which is third most in the American League...the pitching staff has fanned just 564, which is second fewest...Ryan Cook's strikeout of Ryan Doumit in the ninth inning last night was the 40,000th in Oakland history.

PITCHING: The A's have allowed two runs or fewer in six of the last eight games (16 er in 78.0 ip, 1.85 ERA) and 15 of the last 24 (58 er in 218.0 ip, 2.39 ERA)...**lead the American League** and rank fourth in the majors with a 3.38 ERA for the season...have allowed five hits or fewer in 10 of the last 24 games (154 for 778, .198)...**lead the American League** and rank third in the majors with a .240 opponents batting average overall...also have the lowest opponents slugging percentage (.369) and fewest home runs allowed (69) in the AL, are tied for second in shutouts (8) and have the third lowest opponents on-base percentage (.308).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers have allowed two earned runs or fewer in eight of the last 10 games (16 er in 63.0 ip, 2.29 ERA) and 20 of the last 24...are 9-5 with 10 no decisions, a 2.22 ERA (37 er in 150.1 ip) and .203 (109 for 538) opponents batting average over the last 24 games...have allowed just 10 home runs...have a 3.70 ERA (215 er in 523.1 ip) for the season, which is the **lowest in the American League**...also have the fewest home runs (52).

OFFENSE: Jonny Gomes hit the A's third grand slam of the season last night, surpassing the A's season total of two from each of the previous two seasons...the A's have now homered in 18 of the last 19 games...including 17 straight from June 20-July 7, which tied for the fourth longest streak in Oakland history...the A's are batting .306 (77 for 252) with runners in scoring position over the last 33 games after hitting .209 over the first 54 contests...are tied for second in the American League in stolen bases (67) and fewest grounded into double plays (58) and rank fourth in walks (296)...however, rank last in the majors in batting (.225), are tied for the second fewest runs scored (325), have the third lowest on-base percentage (.301) and fourth lowest slugging percentage (.365)...have been shut out a Major League leading 11 times...lead the majors in pitches per plate appearance (3.97).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's begin post All-Star Break play with this three-game road trip to Minnesota (1-0)...these are the A's only road games over 15-game stretch from July 2-22...went 5-1 on the last homestand against Boston (3-0) and Seattle (2-1)...return home following the game tomorrow for a six-game homestand against Texas (two games) and New York (four games)...will play 22 of 31 at home from July 2-August 8...have won 13 of the last 17 home games...went 3-4 on the last road trip to Seattle (2-1) and Texas (1-3)...are 24-20 at home compared to 20-23 on the road...the pitching staff has a 2.81 ERA (129 er in 412.2 ip) at home compared to 4.02 (165 er in 369.2 ip) on the road...the home ERA is the lowest in the American League while the road ERA ranks sixth.

LEFT-HANDED STARTERS: Five of the A's last six losses and seven of the last nine have come in games started by a left-handed pitcher...are 12-17 (.414) in games started by a lefty compared to 32-26 (.551) against right-handers.

CLOSE CALLS: Josh Reddick had the game-ending RBI double in the 13th inning Sunday...it was the A's third "walk-off" win over a five-game span and their Major League leading eighth of the season...had just three "walk-off" wins last year...the A's are now 16-10 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 12-9 in the last at bat...the 12 last at bat wins are third most in the majors behind the Orioles (14) and Dodgers (13)...improved to 6-2 (.750) in extra inning games with the win Sunday...have the second most extra inning wins in the American League and the third best record...were 15-28 (.349) in extra innings over the previous three seasons...10 of the A's last 17 games have been decided by one run...had just 13 one-run decisions over the first 70 games...are 11-12 (.478) in one-run games for the season...eight of the A's last 11 losses have been by one run.

PLAYERS AND ROOKIES USED: The A's have used 43 players, which is second most in the American League to Boston (44)...17 of the 43 are rookies, which is the most in the majors and three more than the A's season total from last year...currently have 10 rookies on the roster (Carter, Cespedes, Cook, Doolittle, Figueroa, Griffin, Milone, Norris, Parker, Scribner)...the average age of the 25 players on the A's roster is 28.2 years, which is fourth lowest in the majors.

THE ALL-STAR BREAK: The A's had a 43-43 record at the All-Star Break, ending their streak of three consecutive seasons with a losing record at the break...batted .225 to set an Athletics record for lowest batting average at the All-Star Break (previous, .228 in 1967)...stole 67 bases, which were the A's most at the break since 1998 (71)...had 83 home runs, which were the A's most pre-break home runs since 2007 (91)...hit just 50 home runs before the break last year and 57 in 2010.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have used the disabled list 14 times and currently have seven players on the DL (Anderson, Braden, Carignan, Cowgill, Devine, McCarthy, Sizemore)...three of those players will miss the remainder of the season (Carignan, Devine, Sizemore)...the A's used the DL 15 times last year, which was the fewest since 2006 when they also used it 15 times...used the DL a total of 87 times from 2007-10...have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season, when they had just one.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his 18th start of the season...the A's are 10-7 (.588) in his starting assignments and his teams are 15-7 (.682) in his career...has tossed at least seven innings in nine of his 17 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 10 times and walked two batters or fewer 14 times.

ONE EARNED RUN: Has allowed one earned run or fewer in each of his last four starts and is 2-1 with a 0.96 ERA (3 er in 28.0 ip) over that span...has walked just two batters while striking out 22...however, has allowed eight runs as he was charged with five unearned runs June 30.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Has eight wins, which ranks second among American League rookies...is the first rookie in Oakland history with eight wins before the All-Star Break (previous best: 7, Rick Langford in 1977)...is tied for the lead among Major League rookies in complete games (1)...leads AL rookies in innings pitched (108.1), is tied for the lead in games started (17) and ranks fifth in strikeouts (72)...his ERA ranks third among AL rookies with 70 or more innings...is tied for third among all AL pitchers in pickoffs (4), tied for sixth in unearned runs (7) and tied for seventh in fewest walks per nine innings (2.08).

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-5 with a 5.98 ERA (37 er in 55.2 ip) and .307 (70 for 228) opponents batting average in 10 starts on the road compared to 5-1 with a 1.03 ERA (6 er in 52.2 ip) and .177 (33 for 186) opponents average in seven starts at home...has the fourth highest road ERA in the American League and the second lowest home ERA in the majors (Weaver, LAA 0.58)...is tied for the AL lead in road losses and tied for sixth in home wins...has allowed 14 of his 15 home runs on the road and ranks second in the AL in road home runs allowed (Vargas, SEA 17).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Has allowed a .291 (41 for 141) opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .241 (34 for 141) the second time and .212 (28 for 132) after that...has issued 11 walks and allowed six home runs in 114 plate appearances against left-handed hitters compared to 14 walks and nine home runs in 329 plate appearances against right-handers.

INNING BY INNING: Has allowed 24 of his 50 runs in the first two innings...has a 6.09 ERA (23 er in 34.0 ip) and eight home runs over the first two innings of a game and a 2.42 ERA (20 er in 74.1) and seven home runs from the third inning on.

AGAINST THE CENTRAL: Is 3-1 with a 0.90 ERA (3 er in 30.0 ip) in four starts against American League Central teams and 5-5 with a 4.60 ERA (40 er in 78.1 ip) in 13 starts against everyone else.

RUN SUPPORT: Received no runs of support in his last start and had a no decision...has received two runs of support or fewer in 11 of his 17 starts and is 4-6 with a 2.70 ERA (22 er in 73.1 ip) in those games...is 4-0 with a 5.40 ERA (21 er in 35.0 ip) in six starts with run support of three runs or more.

GO THE DISTANCE: Tossed the first complete game by a Major League rookie this year June 20 against Los Angeles (NL)...it was the first by an A's rookie since Brett Anderson on July 6, 2009 at Boston...it was the first by an A's rookie in the Coliseum since Barry Zito on September 10, 2000 against Tampa Bay.

2012 HIGHLIGHTS: Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City **April 9** in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit)...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss at Seattle **April 14**...Noesi and League combined to shutout the A's on five hits...combined with Grant Balfour on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout of Chicago **April 24** in Oakland...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed three of the hits...did not allow a runner past first base...according to the Elias Sports Bureau he is just the second Oakland rookie over the last 75 years to have two wins while pitching at least eight scoreless innings and allowing three or fewer hits in a season (Vida Blue, 1970)...was the losing pitcher in the A's 11-6 loss at Boston **April 30**...allowed a career-high eight runs on eight hits, including a career-high three home runs...was the winning pitcher in the A's 9-5 win at Tampa Bay **May 6**...allowed five runs in five innings and walked a career-high four batters...was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-1 loss at Texas **May 16**...surrendered a career-high nine hits...was the winning pitcher in the A's 2-1 win over Los Angeles **May 21** in Oakland...became the first pitcher in Oakland history to win each of his first four starts at the Coliseum...the previous best was three by Tim Hudson in 1999...was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-0 loss to New York **May 27** in Oakland...Kuroda and Soriano combined to shutout the A's on five hits and a walk...lost his second consecutive start in the A's 2-0 loss at Kansas City **June 3**...Mazzaro, Herrera, Holland and Broxton combined to shutout the A's on seven hits...had his first no decision of the season in the A's 9-8 loss at Arizona **June 8**...allowed a career-high tying nine hits...left with an 8-4 lead but Fuentes allowed a three-run home run to Roberts in the bottom of the ninth for the blown save and loss...had a no decision in the A's 10-8 win at Colorado **June 13**...tossed a career-low 4.0 innings and matched his career highs in runs (8) and walks (4)...tossed a complete game three-hitter in the A's 4-1 win over Los Angeles (NL) in Oakland **June 20**...allowed just two base runners over the final seven innings...the win snapped a two-game losing streak, the first losing streak of his career...combined with Grant Balfour and Ryan Cook on a seven-hit shutout in the A's 1-0 win at Seattle **June 25**...tossed seven innings and allowed all seven of the hits...was the losing pitcher in the A's 7-2 loss at Texas **June 30**...allowed a leadoff home run to Beltre in the second inning, snapping a career-high 15.0 inning scoreless streak.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-1, 11-inning win over Seattle July 6 in Oakland...struck out a career-high nine batters...allowed a RBI single to Seager in the first inning but then shutout the Mariners on three hits and a walk over his final six innings...left trailing 1-0 but the A's scored once in the eighth and three times in the 11th for the win.

MILONE vs. MINNESOTA: Is making his first career appearance.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Jarrod Parker (5-4, 2.86 ERA): Is scheduled to make his 15th start of the season, the 16th of his career...ranks fifth among American League rookies in innings (85.0), sixth in starts (14) and strikeouts (67) and tied for sixth in wins (5)...his .216 opponents batting average is the lowest among Major League rookies with 70 or more innings and his 2.86 ERA is second lowest...allowed a career-high tying six runs in his last start, a 7-1 A's loss to Seattle July 7 in Oakland (4.2 ip, 6 h, 6 r, 6 er, 2 bb, 6 so)...it was the third time this year he has allowed exactly six runs...has allowed two runs or fewer in each of his other 11 starts...has allowed two runs or fewer in 12 of his 15 career starts...is the second starting pitcher since 1918 to allow two runs or fewer in 12 of his first 15 career games...is the only starting pitcher since at least 1918 to allow one run or fewer in 10 of his first 15 career games...had a no decision in his only career start against Minnesota, 3-2 A's loss here on May 29 (6.0 ip, 4 h, 4 bb, 4 so).

The A's bullpen has allowed one run in 26.0 innings (0.35 ERA) in eight games in the month of July...is 4-0 with three saves, no blown saves and a .115 (10 for 87) opponents batting average over that span...has not allowed a home run in July and has issued just six walks while striking out 26...for the season, has the lowest opponents batting average (.203) and slugging percentage (.314) in the majors and is tied with San Francisco for the fewest home runs (17)...leads the American League and ranks second in the majors with a 2.75 ERA (Pittsburgh, 2.73)...the pen has four of the A's last five wins and now has 14 for the season, which is tied for second in the American League...had 15 wins all last year...has issued the second most walks in the AL (120)...has 108 strikeouts in 105.2 innings over its last 36 games (9.2 per nine innings) after fanning 117 in 153.1 innings over the first 49 contests (6.9 per nine innings).

- Has a 1.93 ERA (5 er in 23.1 ip) and .128 (10 for 78) opponents batting average over his last 22 games (since May 20) after posting a 4.29 ERA and .234 opponents average over his first 21 contests.
- Is tied for the American League lead in games pitched (43)...ranks eighth among AL relievers in innings pitched (43.1)...is tied for fourth in first batter walks (6).
- Has not allowed a run in three outings against Minnesota this year (2.2 ip, 3 bb, 1 so) and has a 2.13 ERA (3 er in 12.2 ip) in 14 career appearances against the Twins.
- Has a 0.79 ERA (2 er in 22.2 ip) in 21 appearances at home compared to a 5.66 ERA (13 er in 20.2 ip) in 22 outings on the road.

HOME AND AWAY: Is 3-2 with a 3.74 ERA (14 er in 33.2 ip) in six starts on the road compared to 2-2 with a 2.28 ERA (13 er in 51.1 ip) in eight starts at home...allowed six runs in his last start at home after yielding just eight over his first seven starts...has the **seventh** lowest home ERA in the American League.

NIGHT AND DAY: Is 2-1 with a 1.36 ERA (5 er in 33.0 ip) in five starts during the day compared to 3-3 with a 3.81 ERA (22 er in 52.0 ip) in nine starts at night...has the **second** lowest day ERA in the American League.

BRANDON ALLEN

- Was the A's Opening Day starter at first base March 28 but went for 7 with five strikeouts in three games before he was designated for assignment April 9...was claimed off waivers by the Tampa Bay Rays April 19.

BRETT ANDERSON

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 13 as he continues his recovery from July 14, 2011 "Tommy John" surgery.

DARIC BARTON

- Homered in the fifth inning April 17 at Los Angeles to snap a career-high 76-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since Oct. 1, 2010 against Seattle...the home run also snapped a 72-game homerless streak as a first baseman, which was second longest in Oakland history...the record is 75 by Mike Hegan from July 6, 1971 to Aug. 16, 1973.
- Was batting .198 with one home run and four RBI in 37 games when he was optioned to Sacramento June 2.

JERRY BLEVINS

- Had his career-high 10.1-inning scoreless streak dating back to last season snapped April 7 against Seattle when Saunders homered in the sixth inning.

DALLAS BRADEN

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 as he continues his recovery from left shoulder surgery.
- Was transferred to the 60-day disabled list April 22.

ANDREW CARIGNAN

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and posted a 6.23 ERA in five relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Recalled for a second time May 11 and allowed two runs in 2.0 innings over two outings before he was sent back to Sacramento May 16.
- Joined the A's for a third time May 27 and did not allow a run in four games (3.1 ip, 2 h, 2 bb, 4 so) before he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 6 with a sprained ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow...was transferred to the 60-day DL June 9.
- Had reconstructive surgery to the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow June 19...the surgery was performed in New York City by Dr. David Altchek, medical director of the New York Mets.

CHRIS CARTER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 29 after batting .279 with 12 home runs and 53 RBI in 72 games with the River Cats.
- Homered in each of his first two games with the A's and three of his first four...including July 6 against Seattle when he hit the pinch-hit game-ending home run in the 11th inning...is the first rookie in Athletics history with a pinch-hit "walk-off" home run and the 10th player in Oakland history with a pinch-hit game-ending home run...he is the first Athletic with a pinch-hit "walk-off" home run in extra innings since Paul Lehner on April 22, 1950 against Boston.

YOENIS CÉSPEDES

- Made his Major League debut March 28 against Seattle in Tokyo with a start in center field...doubled off Felix Hernandez to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning for his first ML hit.
- Hit his first ML home run in the seventh inning March 29 against Seattle in Tokyo, a two-run shot off Shawn Kelley.
- Homered in three consecutive games from March 29 to April 7...became the third player since 1918 to homer in three of his first four Major League games (Trent Oeltjen, ARI 2009 and Mike Jacobs,

NYM 2005)...is the ninth player with at least three home runs in his first four games (Jacobs had 4)...the previous fastest an Oakland Athletic reached three career home runs was seven games by Kurt Abbott in 1993 and Mitchell Page in 1977.

- Had multiple RBI games in each of those contests...since 1918, he is the first Athletic and ninth Major Leaguer with three multiple RBI games over his first four career games (last: Wladimir Balentien, 2006-07).
- Struck out at least once in each of his first eight games, which is an Oakland record to start a career...the previous mark was six (Chris Carter, 2010; Brooks Conrad, 2008; Travis Buck, 2007)...matched the longest streak by an Athletic since 1918 (Troy Herriage, 1956; Norm Bass, 1961).
- Hit his fourth home run April 18 at Los Angeles in his 12th game...since 1918, that is the fastest a player has reached four career home runs in Athletics history...the previous best was by Brian Leshner, who did it in 14 games in 1996.
- Did not have a putout April 25 against Chicago, becoming the first A's outfielder without a putout in a game of 14 or more innings since Stan Javier on May 30, 1988 against New York.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 12 retroactive to May 7 with a muscle strain in his left hand...went 3 for 9 (.333) on a three-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from May 28 to 30 and was reinstated from the DL June 1.
- Had his first career game-ending hit June 21 against Los Angeles (NL), a three-run "walk-off" home run.

BARTOLO COLÓN

- Was on his 13th career Opening Day roster and is in his 15th season in the majors.
- Made each of his first three starts against Seattle to become the first pitcher in Oakland history to make three consecutive starts against one team in the same season without missing a turn in the rotation.
- Threw 38 consecutive strikes at one point during the A's 6-0 win at Los Angeles April 18...that was the longest such streak since pitch count data is first available in 1988...the previous best was 30 by Tim Wakefield in 1998.
- Was 1-3 with a 7.92 ERA and .386 opponents batting average in five starts in May...based on a minimum of 25.0 innings, he had the highest opponents batting average in the majors in May and the third highest ERA...the opponents average was the highest single-month mark of his career and the ERA was third highest (7.99 in June, 2004; 7.94 in September, 1998).
- Left his start June 17 against San Diego with no outs in the third inning with a strained right oblique...was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 retroactive to June 18 with the injury...was reinstated July 3.

RYAN COOK

- Became the third pitcher in Athletics franchise history to record four strikeouts in an inning April 27 at Baltimore (Blake Stein, 1998; Erik Hiljus, 2001).
- Did not allow a run over his first 21 games and 23.0 innings...that was the longest season-opening scoreless streak by a player on the Athletics Opening Day roster since at least 1918...the previous high was 21.0 innings by Ale Kellner in 1953...had a career-high 24.0 inning scoreless streak dating back to September 28, 2011.
- Was the only A's player named to the American League All-Star team and pitched a perfect seventh inning, striking out Harper and Wright...it was his first career All-Star selection...he is the seventh Oakland rookie to be named to the AL All-Star team, along with Wayne Gross (1977), Matt Keough (1978), Jose Canseco (1986), Mark McGwire (1987), Ben Grieve (1998) and Andrew Bailey (2009).

COLLIN COWGILL

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0 for 4 with three walks in three games before he was optioned to Sacramento April 17.
- Was recalled by Oakland May 11
- Had a career-high eight-game hitting streak from May 26 to June 5 (13 for 31, .419).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 with a sprained left ankle.

COCO CRISP

- Was the A's 13th different Opening Day starter in left field in the last 13 years...had 203 career starts in left entering the season, but none since October 2, 2005.
- Committed his first error since April 25, 2011 on April 7 against Seattle, snapping a 116-game error-less streak...that streak was seventh longest by an outfielder in Oakland history.
- Stole three bases June 19 against Los Angeles (NL)...it was his fifth career game of three or more steals, his fourth with the A's...in Oakland history, only Rickey Henderson (45) and Bert Campaneris (10) have more three-steal games.
- Was caught stealing after being picked off in the first inning June 21 against Los Angeles (NL), his first caught stealing since July 10, 2011 at Texas...that ended his Athletics record streak of 36 consecutive stolen bases without a caught stealing (caught stealing became an official stat in 1920)...broke the previous mark of 28 set by Stan Javier (May 31-October 1, 1995).
- Led off the game with a home run June 27 at Seattle and July 3 against Boston...now has four lead-off home runs as an Athletic and six in his career...the four with the A's are tied for fourth most in Oakland history.
- Finished the game July 3 with a "walk-off" sacrifice fly, his third career game-ending RBI (last: August 14, 2007 against Tampa Bay)...it was the 21st game-ending sacrifice fly in Oakland history, the first since Dan Johnson on May 15, 2007 against Kansas City...is the first Athletic with a leadoff home run and walk-off RBI in the same game since Rickey Henderson on August 12, 1992 against Chicago.

FAUTINO DE LOS SANTOS

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and compiled a 3.00 ERA in six relief appearances before he was optioned to Sacramento, April 25.
- Did not retire a batter over his final three outings before his option (5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 2 bb).

JOEY DEVINE

- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list March 28 retroactive to March 24...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow April 10... Dr. James Andrews performed the surgery in Pensacola, Fla., which included an ulnar collateral ligament reconstruction, an ulnar nerve transposition and a debridement of the flexor tendon...also had "Tommy John" surgery on the same elbow April 21, 2009.
- Was transferred to the 60-day DL May 15.

JOSH DONALDSON

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but hit just .094 in nine games before he was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 23.
- Made nine starts, all at third base, during his first stint...his Major League experience prior to this season included seven games at catcher and two at first base.
- Was recalled May 12 and snapped a career-high tying 0 for 17 streak with his eighth inning double May 14 at Los Angeles (also May 1-13, 2010).
- Went 3 for 4 with two doubles, a home run and five RBI May 18 at San Francisco...the hits, doubles and RBI were all career highs.
- Drew his first walk of the season June 13 at Colorado, snapping a streak of 30 consecutive games without a walk dating back to September 22, 2010...that was the longest streak by an Athletic since Scott Hemond had a 31-game streak from May 3 to July 2, 1994...it was his first walk since September 19, 2010 at Minnesota.
- Was batting .182 in 19 games during his second stint with the A's when he was optioned to Sacramento June 21.

SEAN DOOLITTLE

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento June 4 and made his major League debut June 5 against Texas (1.1 ip, 3 so)...struck out the first three batters he faced...the last A's pitcher to strike out the first three batters he faced in his career was Blake Stein on May 10, 1998 against Chicago.

PEDRO FIGUEROA

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 21 and made his Major League debut that night against Cleveland...tossed a scoreless ninth and his only base runner (Cunningham walk) was erased on a double play.
- Was optioned to Sacramento May 22 after posting a 2.00 ERA with nine walks in 9.0 innings in eight games.
- Returned to Oakland June 17 and tossed 3.0 scoreless innings that day against San Diego before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 21.
- Was recalled a third time July 13 when Jim Miller went on the paternity list.

BRIAN FUENTES

- Recorded his 200th career save May 2 at Boston to become the sixth left-handed reliever in Major League history to reach the 200 plateau (Franco, Wagner, Myers, Righetti, Lyle).
- Had a 2.84 ERA and .222 opponents batting average over his first 19 appearances through May 27... then went 0-2 with a save, two blown saves, a 19.50 ERA and .452 opponents batting average over his final seven outings.
- Was designated for assignment on July 3 and released July 11.

GRAHAM GODFREY

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 0-3 with a 5.06 ERA in three starts before he was optioned to Sacramento April 21.
- Recalled May 22 and went 0-1 with a 10.80 ERA in two games, one start, before he was sent back to Sacramento May 27.

JONNY GOMES

- Was hit by a Jonathan Braxton pitch with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th inning April 11 against Kansas City to force in the winning run in the A's 5-4 victory...it was his second career walk-off hit by pitch (August 21, 2011 vs. Philadelphia)...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI (two home runs, one walk)...it was the third walk-off hit by pitch in Oakland history (Mike Bordick, August 4, 1993 vs. Seattle and Olmedo Saenz, July 20, 2002 vs. Texas).
- Singled in the eighth inning April 19 at Los Angeles after homering for each of his first three hits for the season...is the first player in Oakland history whose first three hits in a season were all home runs.
- Hit the game-winning pinch-hit two-run home run in the seventh inning June 16 against San Diego, his third career pinch hit home run (last: June 28, 2008 at Pittsburgh)...it snapped a 0 for 34 streak as a pinch hitter and was his first pinch hit since August 29, 2010 against Chicago (NL).

A.J. GRIFFIN

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 24 and made his Major League debut that day with a start against San Francisco.

BRANDON HICKS

- Was claimed off waivers from Atlanta March 13 and was optioned to Sacramento March 15.
- Recalled by Oakland June 23 after batting .272 with 13 home runs and 48 RBI in 65 games with the River Cats... was tied for the Pacific Coast League lead in hit by pitches (7) at the time of his promotion...also ranked second in strikeouts (76), fifth in extra base hits (37), tied for sixth in doubles (21), eighth in home runs (13), ninth in runs (49) and 10th in RBI (48) and slugging (.548).

LUKE HUGHES

- Was claimed off waivers from Minnesota April 22 and went 1 for 13 (.077) in four games with the A's before he was designated for assignment April 30...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Sacramento May 2.

BRANDON INGE

- Agreed to terms with the A's on a one-year contract April 30 after he was released by Detroit April 26.

- Had four four-RBI game over a five-game span from May 6 to 11...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the second player in Major League history with four games of four or more RBI over a five-game stretch...the other is Lou Gehrig in 1931...now has 14 career games with four or more RBI...drove in 16 runs over that five-game stretch...since 1970, the only other Athletic to drive in 16 runs over a five-game span is Damian Miller (June 6-11, 2004).
- Had the game-ending grand slam in the bottom of the ninth inning May 8 against Toronto...it was his seventh career "walk-off" home run and his 10th "walk-off plate appearance (two singles, one sacrifice fly)...it was the sixth "walk-off" grand slam in Oakland history (Tenace, 1973; Armas, 1980; McGwire, 1990 and 1995; Ellis, 2008).
- Added another grand slam May 10 against Detroit...is just the second player in Athletics history to hit two grand slams over a three-game span...the other is Jimmie Foxx (September 22 and 24, 1932)...now has seven career grand slams.
- Had 17 RBI in his first 10 games with the A's...those are the most in Oakland history by a player in his first 10 games with the A's...the previous best was 15 by Mitchell Page (1977) and Jack Cust (2007).
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 17 retroactive to May 13 with a strained right groin...it is his second stint on the disabled list this year as he began the season on Detroit's DL with a strained left groin.
- Went 5 for 5 with three runs, two doubles, two home runs (including a grand slam) and seven RBI in a start at third base for Triple-A Sacramento May 26 against Reno in the second game of his two-game rehab assignment.
- Was reinstated from the DL May 29.

KILA KA'AIHUE

- Matched his career high with three hits April 15 at Seattle (third time, last: Sept. 28, 2010 vs. Minnesota).
- Had the game-winning RBI single in the 14th inning April 25 against Chicago, his second career walk-off hit (home run, April 1, 2011 vs. Los Angeles-AL).
- Was batting .234 with four home runs and 14 RBI in 39 games when he was designated for assignment June 6...cleared waivers and was outrighted to Triple-A Sacramento June 16.

BRANDON MCCARTHY

- Made his first career Opening Day start March 28 against Seattle and had a no decision in the A's 3-1, 11-inning loss...allowed just one run on six hits and no walks in 7.0 innings.
- Also started the third game of the season, April 6 against Seattle, to become the second pitcher in Oakland history to start two of the A's first three games...the other is Joe Blanton who did it in 2008, the other time the A's opened the season in Japan...also started three of the first seven games, joining Blanton as the only Oakland pitchers to do that since 1977.

JIM MILLER

- Picked up his first Major League win April 25 against Chicago...allowed two inherited runners to score in the top of the 14th inning but the A's came back with three in the bottom of the inning.
- Was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento May 11 after posting a 1.93 ERA in six relief appearances with the A's.
- Returned to Oakland May 20.
- Was placed on the paternity list July 13.

TOMMY MILONE

- Combined with Grant Balfour on a three-hit, 1-0 shutout of Kansas City April 9 in Oakland in his A's debut...tossed 8.0 innings and allowed all three of the hits...became just the second pitcher in Oakland history to toss eight or more shutout innings in his Oakland debut (Mike Norris, complete game shutout, April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...did not strikeout a batter to become the third pitcher in Oakland history to toss at least 8.0 shutout innings and not strikeout a batter (Matt Keough, July 27, 1980 against Detroit; Catfish Hunter, May 25, 1973 against Detroit).

BRANDON MOSS

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after batting .286 with 15 home runs and 33 RBI in 51 games with the River Cats...the home runs were tied for second in the Pacific Coast League and tied for sixth in all of minor league baseball at the time of his promotion.
- Homered June 7 against Texas, his first since September 2, 2009 at Cincinnati...it snapped a career-high 49-game homerless streak.
- Had his first career two-homer game June 12 at Colorado.
- Homered in all three games of the Colorado series June 12-14 and had four home runs total...is the first Athletic to hit four home runs in a three-game series since Geronimo Berroa against Minnesota, August 12-14, 1996.
- Matched his career-high with three hits (fifth time, first since June 20, 2009 at Colorado) and three RBI (fourth time, second time this year: June 12 at Colorado) June 14 at Colorado.
- Homered in four consecutive games June 12-15...it was the 20th time in Oakland history a player homered in at least four straight games...hit five home runs during the stretch to become the second Athletic since 2000 to hit five home runs over a four-game span (Jack Cust, May 10-13, 2007).
- Became the second player in Athletics history to hit six home runs in his first nine games with the club (Jack Cust, 2007).
- Hit six home runs in interleague play, which tied for fifth in the majors and matched the Oakland interleague record set by Miguel Tejada in 2000.
- Was named American League Player of the Week for the week of June 11-17...batted .348 with three doubles, five home runs, 10 RBI and seven runs scored in six games...it was his first Player of the Week award.
- Committed three errors in the sixth inning June 23 against San Francisco, tying the Major League record for most errors by a first baseman in an inning...it was the seventh time, the first since Jack Clark did it for St. Louis on May 25, 1987...since 1984, the only other Athletic to commit three errors in an inning is Kurt Abbott on May 10, 1998 vs. Chicago at shortstop.
- The three errors set an Oakland record for errors in a game by a first baseman...is the first Athletic first baseman to commit three errors in a game since Lou Limmer on August 19, 1954 vs. New York.
- Tied for eighth in the AL with seven home runs in June.

JORDAN NORBERTO

- Retired the final two batters May 1 at Boston for his first Major League save...he saved Jarrod Parker's first ML win, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.
- Was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 4 retroactive to May 31 with a strained left shoulder...made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento June 19 and was reinstated June 21.
- Recorded his first Major League win July 6 against Seattle when he struck out the side in the 11th inning of the A's 4-1 win.

DEREK NORRIS

- Was recalled from Sacramento June 21 after batting .273 with eight home runs and 36 RBI in 55 games in his Triple-A debut...made his Major League debut with a start at catcher that day against Los Angeles (NL) and went 0 for 3.
- Singled off Madison Bumgarner in the fifth inning June 23 against San Francisco for his first Major League hit...added a RBI single in the ninth inning for his first RBI and first multiple hit game.
- Hit his first Major League home run June 25 against San Francisco, a three-run "walk-off" shot in the bottom of the ninth off Santiago Casilla...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the third player in Athletics history to hit a game-ending home run for his first ML home run...the other two are Dee Miles (September 14, 1939) and George Hendrick (May 28, 1972).

JARROD PARKER

- Was recalled from Triple-A Sacramento April 25 and had a no decision in his A's debut, a 5-4, 14-inning win over Chicago April 25 in Oakland...shutout the White Sox on five hits and a walks over the first six innings to extend his career-opening scoreless streak to 11.2 innings...Balfour allowed a run in the ninth inning for the blown save.

- Earned his first Major League win in the A's 5-3 victory at Boston May 1...Norberto recorded the save, marking the first time A's pitchers recorded their first win and save in the same game since Joe Klink saved Steve Chitren's victory Sept. 30, 1990 at Texas.

CLIFF PENNINGTON

- Doubled in the second inning June 4 against Texas to snap a career-high 0 for 29 streak (previous: 0 for 27, May 22-June 1, 2010).
- Went 3 for 3 June 15, his 28th birthday...is 6 for 12 (.500) with one double, one triple, four RBI and four runs scored in three career games on his birthday.

ANTHONY RECKER

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and hit .129 in 13 games as the back-up to Kurt Suzuki before he was optioned to Sacramento May 28.

JOSH REDDICK

- Was the A's fifth different Opening Day starter in right field in the last five years.
- Had career highs May 11 against Detroit with four runs, four hits (tied), two home runs and five RBI...is the eighth player in Oakland history with at least four runs, four hits, two home runs and five RBI in a game...the last was Matt Holliday (July 20, 2009 vs. Minnesota).
- Hit 10 home runs in May, which tied for third in the AL...is the first Athletic to hit 10 home runs in a month since Frank Thomas had 10 in September, 2006...also tied for fourth in the AL in runs in May (20) and tied for fifth in walks (17).
- Matched his career-high with four strikeouts June 29 against the Dodgers (August 4, 2009 at Tampa Bay).

ADAM ROSALES

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and appeared in one game against Seattle in Japan before he was optioned to Sacramento April 2.
- Returned to Oakland May 17 but was optioned back to Sacramento June 16.

TYSON ROSS

- Began the season at Triple-A Sacramento and was 0-1 with a 4.00 ERA in two starts with the River Cats before he was recalled by Oakland April 17.
- Went 2-6 with a 6.51 ERA in nine starts with the A's before he was optioned back to Sacramento May 31.
- Returned on June 16 to start against San Diego and allowed two runs on one hit and four walks in 6.0 innings in a no decision...was optioned back to Sacramento the next day.
- Returned to Oakland for a third stint June 23 and went 0-2 with a 7.71 ERA in two starts before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 29.

EVAN SCRIBNER

- Was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 6 after posting a 3.31 ERA and six saves in 23 relief appearances with the River Cats.
- Tossed 3.0 scoreless innings June 15 against San Diego and recorded his first Major League save in the A's 10-2 win.
- Was optioned to Sacramento June 16 but returned to Oakland June 24.

SCOTT SIZEMORE

- Was placed on the 60-day disabled list March 3 after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee in the team's first full-squad workout Feb. 27 in Phoenix...underwent successful reconstructive surgery March 21...the surgery was performed by Dr. Douglas Freedberg of the Arizona Sports Medicine Center of Scottsdale...will miss the entire 2012 season.

SETH SMITH

- Was the A's eight different Opening Day starter at designated hitter in the last eight years.
