A's vs. RED SOX

The A's won the season series last year, 8-1...it was the A's best record against the Red Sox in franchise history (previous: 18-3 in 1928)...lost the first game but have won eight straight since then...that is the A's **longest winning streak against the Red Sox since May 2-28, 1932** when they also won eight straight...the only longer streaks are a pair of 10-game streaks from June 4-August 15, 1925 and May 29-August 29, 1929...went 2-1 in Boston last year and 6-0 in Oakland...the only other time in Oakland history the A's went undefeated against Boston in the Coliseum was in 1988 (6-0)...are 35-29 against Boston since 2006...that includes 23-9 in Oakland, 11-19 at Fenway and 1-1 in Tokyo...are 227-275 since moving to Oakland in 1968...that includes 135-114 in Oakland, 91-160 in Boston and 1-1 in Tokyo...all-time, the A's are 869-1056 against the Red Sox..

TODAY'S TIDBITS

Grant Balfour has converted each of his last 21 saves, which is tied for the third longest streak in A's history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012.

Ryan Cook has not allowed a run in his last eight games and 9.2 innings.

Brandon Moss has hit safely in all five of his career games against Boston and is 11 for 15 (.733) with seven runs, three doubles, three home runs and nine RBI.

THIS DATE IN A'S HISTORY

In **1916** Jack Nabors defeats Boston 6-2 to even his season record at 1-1...he would go on to lose 19 consecutive games to set the Athletics franchise record...in **1969** Rollie Fingers tosses the first of his two career shutouts, a five-hitter in the A's 7-0 win at Minnesota...in **1984** Dave Kingman homers twice but the A's lose to Dennis Eckersley at Boston, 12-8...in **2003** Miguel Tejada hits a walk-off home run in the bottom of the 11th inning as the A's defeat Detroit, 6-5.

ABOUT THE A's

ABOUT THE A'S: The A's were swept in a three-game series at Tampa Bay over the weekend for their first three-game losing streak of the season...have not lost more than three in a row since a nine-game losing streak last year from May 22 to June 1...are now 12-7 (.632), which is the third best record in the American League...it is the best record by an A's team after 19 games since the 1992 club also started the year 12-7 (won game 20)...the loss yesterday dropped the A's into second place in the AL West, ending a streak of 11 consecutive days in sole possession of first and 15 consecutive days with at least a share of first...the streak of 11 consecutive days alone in first was the A's longest since they finished the 2006 season with a 65-day streak...for the season, have spent 13 days in sole possession of first, two days tied for first, one day in second, three days tied for second, two days tied for fourth and one day in fifth..

AGAINST LEFT-HANDERS: The A's are 4-0 in games in which the opponent starts a left-handed pitcher compared to 8-7 against right-handers...are the only team in the majors undefeated against lefties...are batting .306 (55 for 180) against south paws overall, which is second best in the majors, compared to .237 (111 for 469) against right-handers...last year, the A's went 30-29 (.508) in games started by lefties and 64-39 (.621) in games started by righties.

A's OFFENSE: The A's hit .179 (17 for 95) and scored just four runs in the three-game series against Tampa Bay over the weekend...had just two doubles and a home run and have gone back-to-back games without an extra base hit for the first time since 2011...entered the three-game series leading the majors in runs, doubles, walks and extra base hits...still lead the majors in doubles (42) and extra base hits (67)...also lead in stolen bases (18)...had a .303 average with runners in scoring position entering the Tampa Bay series but went 3 for 25 (.120) against the Rays to fall to .277...lead the American League in runs (100), walks (79) and on-base percentage (.341) and rank fourth in slugging (.430).

THE WEST AND THE REST: The A's are 11-2 against American League West competition and 1-5 against everyone else...are batting .291 (131 for 450) with 19 home runs in 13 games against the AL West compared to .176 (35 for 199) with two home runs in six games against everyone else...the pitching staff has a 3.00 ERA (39 er in 117.0 ip) against the West compared to 5.67 (34 er in 54.0 ip) against everyone else...are 0-3 in this 10-game stretch against the AL East (0-3 vs. Tampa Bay, three games at Boston, four games vs. Baltimore)...this stretch ends April 29 when the A's host the Angels in a three-game series...currently have an 11-game winning streak against AL West foes, which is tied for the A's second longest winning streak against the West since divisional play began in 1969...it is the longest since 1994 when the record of 13 was set (June 12-August 11).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's are 0-3 on this six-game road trip to Tampa Bay (0-3) and Boston (three games) after going 6-0 on the first road trip...the six-game road winning streak was the third longest season-opening road winning streak in Oakland history and the longest since the 1990 club started the year 8-0 on the road...are 6-3 on the road for the season, which is the second best road record in the American League (Boston, 7-2)...went 4-2 on the last homestand against Detroit (1-2) and Houston (3-0) and are 6-4 at home...return home following the game Wednesday for a seven-game homestand against Baltimore (four games) and Los Angeles (three games)...the A's are batting 284 (93 for 328) with 55 runs scored and 14 home runs in nine games on the road compared to .227 (73 for 321) with 45 runs scored and seven home runs in 10 games in Oakland...A's pitchers have allowed just four home runs in nine games on the road compared to 13 in 10 games in Oakland.

THIS AND THAT: Of the A's last 15 games, 14 have lasted at least 2 hours and 59 minutes...including an Oakland record 13 straight from April 5-19...have played just two games under 2:45 this year and have an average time of game of 3 hours and 13 minutes...the offense leads the majors in pitches per plate appearance (4.04)...the A's have been held to three hits in back-to-back games for the second time this year...also had three hits in each of the first two games of the season...batted .291 in 17 games in between...opponents have been successful in 11 of 12 (91.7%) stolen base attempts, which is tied for the second highest mark in the majors...the A's are 12-0 when scoring four or more runs compared to 0-7 when scoring fewer than four...tied an Oakland record last Tuesday night against Houston with three triples (seventh time, last: August 3, 2002 vs. Detroit).

DATING BACK TO LAST YEAR: The A's are 84-45 (.651) dating back to June 2 of last year, which is the best record in the majors by 4½ games (Atlanta, 79-49) and the best in the American League by 6½ games (New York, 77-51)...have hit 167 home runs 120 games since June 12 of last year, which is second most in the majors to the Yankees (179)...are 22-10 (.688) on the road since August 24 of last year.

PITCHING: The A's have compiled a 5.35 ERA (41 er in 69.0 ip) over the last eight games after posting a 2.82 ERA over the first 11 contests...now have a 3.84 ERA for the season, which ranks sixth in the American League...A's starting pitchers have a 5.40 ERA (39 er in 65.0 ip) and .316 (80 for 253) opponents batting average over the last 12 games...have a 4.47 ERA for the season, which ranks eighth in the AL...starters are tied for the AL lead in wins (9).

ONE-RUN GAMES AND OTHER CLOSE CALLS: The A's are 2-1 in one-run games and both of the wins have come in the last at bat...went 25-18 (.581) in one-run games last year, which was the third best record in the American League...ranked second in the AL in last at bat wins in 2012 (23)...have one walk-off win after tallying a Major League leading 14 last year...that win came in 12 innings, the A's only extra inning game of 2013...went 11-5 (.688) in extra inning games last year, which was the second best record in the AL.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's have five players on the disabled list (Céspedes, Nakajima, Rodriguez, Rosales, Sizemore)...Rodriguez (sprained right elbow), Rosales (strained left intercostal) and Nakajima (strained left hamstring) began the season on the DL...Sizemore (torn left ACL) was added April 10 and Céspedes (muscle strain in left hand) was added a week ago today...Rodriguez and Sizemore will both miss the remainder of the season...the A's have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one...used the DL 21 times last year, the fourth time in the last six years they used it at least 20 times.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...the A's are 3-0 in his starting assignments this year and are 15-3 (.833) when he starts in his career...has tossed six or more innings in each of his three starts, allowing two runs or fewer all three times and walked two batters or fewer twice.

9-1: Is 9-1 over the first 18 starts in his career...is the third pitcher in Oakland history to have nine wins in his first 18 career games...Barry Zito was 9-5 over his first 18 games and Tim Hudson was 10-1...with a win today, he would join Hudson (10-2) and Zito (10-5) as the only pitchers in Oakland history with 10 wins over their first 19 career games.

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 8-2 win over Seattle April 4 in Oakland...blanked the Mariners on two hits and a walk over the first four innings and had a 2-0 lead when he allowed a Saunders sacrifice fly in the fifth...the A's scored a run in the bottom of the fifth and he allowed a leadoff home run to Morse in the sixth.

SECOND START: He won his second consecutive start in the A's 8-1 win at Los Angeles April 11...matched his career-high by tossing 8.0 innings...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the fourth inning on a Kendrick RBI double...blanked the Angels on one walk over his final four innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win.

LAST START: He had a no decision in the A's 4-3 win over Houston last Tuesday in Oakland...walked a career-high four batters in six innings but struck out eight...allowed two runs in the third inning on RBI singles by Maxwell and Carter...then walked Pena to load the bases with one out before retiring each of the final 11 batters that he faced...left after six innings with the A's leading 3-2 but Doolittle allowed a run in the eighth for the blown save before Donaldson had a RBI triple in the bottom of the eighth for the win.

GRIFFIN vs. BOSTON: Is 1-0 with a 2.08 ERA (13.0 ip, 7 h, 3 r, 3 er, 2 bb, 8 so, 1 hr) in two career starts, both last year in Oakland...the no decision came in a 3-2 A's win July 4...did not allow a run over the first three innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high 14.0 innings...the streak ended when Ortiz hit his 400th career home run to lead off the fourth inning...also allowed a Gonzalez RBI single in the sixth...left after six innings with the score tied at 2-2...picked up the win in a 7-1 decision September 1...retired each of the first 14 batters before Saltalamacchia had a bunt single with two outs in the fifth inning...had a 6-0 lead when he allowed his only run in the sixth inning on a Pedroia RBI single...retired each of the final four batters he faced.

THIS SPRING: Was 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA (20.0 ip, 20 h, 12 r, 12 er, 4 bb, 21 so, 4 hr) in five starts this spring...walked just four batters in 20.0 innings (1.80 per nine innings)...struck out 21 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.25...allowed a .263 (20 for 76) opponents batting average...also pitched in a minor league game March 13 (4.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 4 so) and started at Seattle March 8 in the game that was cancelled in the top of the fourth because of rain (3.0 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 0 bb, 4 so).

2012 RECAP: Began the year at Double-A Midland but finished the season in the starting rotation for Oakland...went 7-1 with a 3.06 ERA in 15 starts in his Major League debut with the A's...his .875 winning percentage was the best in Oakland history and third best in Athletics history among pitchers with 15 or more starts...it topped the previous Oakland high by Tim Hudson, who went 11-2 (.846) in 1999...it was the best by an Athletic since Jim Nash went 12-1 (.923) in 1966...it was the second best mark by any ML pitcher over the last 17 years to Cliff Lee, who went 22-3 (.880) for Cleveland in 2008...it was second best by a rookie in ML history (since 1900) among pitchers with 15 or more starts to Nash in 1966...had the eighth lowest ERA in the American League among pitchers with 81 or more innings pitched...using the same minimum, it was the sixth best mark by a rookie in Oakland history...ranked 10th among AL rookies in wins...walked just 19 batters in 82.1 innings, an average of 2.08 per nine innings...struck out 64 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.37.

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .236 opponents batting average, which included a .225 (34-for-151) mark against right-handed hitters compared to .245 (40-for-163) against left-handers...opponents were 16-for-83 (.193) with three walks (.221 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...yielded a .218 average with the bases empty but that rose to .341 with runners in scoring position...allowed a .359 batting average to the number three hitter, .218 against everyone else.

SPLITS: Was 7-1 with a 2.34 ERA in 10 starts at night, 0-0 with a 5.23 ERA in five starts during the day...was 3-0 with a 1.95 ERA in five starts against AL West competition.

MINORS: Was named the A's Minor League Co-Pitcher of the Year with Dan Straily after combining for a 7-3 record and a 2.82 ERA in 17 games, all starts, with Double-A Midland and Triple-A Sacramento...struck out 91 and walked just 18 in 102.0 innings...averaged 1.59 walks per nine innings with a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.06...yielded just seven home runs, an average of 0.62 per nine innings...allowed a .211 opponents batting average, including .181 (33-for-182) against left-handed hitters compared to .238 (46-for-193) against right-handers...surrendered six of his seven home runs to righties...opponents hit .195 with the bases empty compared to .294 with runners in scoring position...compiled a 1.32 ERA over the first two innings of a game, had a 7.16 ERA in the third inning and a 2.44 ERA from the fourth inning on.

MORE WITH THE A's: Was selected from Sacramento June 24, making his Major League debut that day against San Francisco...had a no decision in the A's 4-2 win...tossed 6.0 shutout innings in his second start at Texas June 29 as part of a career-high 14.0 inning scoreless streak from June 24 to July 4...earned his first Major League win in his fourth start, a 6-3 win at Minnesota July 13...allowed three runs in six innings but a Gomes grand slam in the fourth gave him a 4-3 lead...tossed six or more innings and allowed three runs or fewer in each of his first seven starts, which was the longest such streak to start a career in Athletics history...was 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA in eight starts when he went on the disabled list Aug. 4...was reinstated Sept. 1...won each of his first three starts following his return to improve his career record to 6-0 with a 1.94 ERA over his first 11 starts...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, since earned runs became an official stat (1912 in NL, 1913 in AL), he is just the second pitcher to go undefeated in at least his first 11 Major League appearances, all starts, while maintaining an ERA under 2.00...allowed three runs or fewer and walked two batters or fewer in each of his first 11 starts, which is the longest such career-opening streak by a ML pitcher since at least 1916...walked a career-high three batters Sept. 23 at New York, snapping a career-opening streak of 12 consecutive starts with two walks or fewer...that is the longest streak to start a career by an Athletics starting pitcher since at least 1916.

TOMORROW'S PROBABLE STARTING PITCHER

RHP Bartolo Colón (2-0, 3.32 ERA): Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...has not walked a batter over his first three starts and 19.0 innings...is the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...was the winning pitcher in his last start, a 7-5 A's win over Houston last Wednesday in Oakland (6.0 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 so)...is 8-11 with a 3.98 ERA (162.2 ip, 175 h, 77 r, 72 er, 64 bb, 133 so, 25 hr) in 26 career appearances, including 25 starts, against Boston...had a no decision in his only start last year, a 3-2 A's win July 3 in Oakland (6.0 ip, 5 h, 2 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 3 so)...was 1-2 with a 6.30 ERA (20.0 ip, 31 h, 17 r, 14 er, 1 bb, 22 so, 2 hr) in six games, including three starts, this spring.

ATHLETICS BULLPEN BRIEFS

3-0, 2.74 ERA (62.1 ip, 52 h, 22 r, 19 er, 19 bb, 50 so, 5 hr)

Save/Save Opportunities: 3/5 (60.0%)

The A's bullpen has allowed at least two runs in three of the last four games (10 er in 13.0 ip, 6.92 ERA) after allowing one earned run or fewer in each of the previous 13 contests (6 er in 43.1 ip, 1.25 ERA)...now has a 2.74 ERA for the season, which ranks fifth in the American League...ranks third in opponents on-base percentage (.278) and fourth in innings pitched (62.1)...first batters faced are 10 for 56 (.179) with two walks...the .203 on-base percentage against first batters faced is the lowest in the majors and the batting average ranks third...A's relievers have allowed four home runs in the last five games (14.2 ip) after allowing just one over the first 14 contests (46.1 ip).

- Is 3 for 3 in save opportunities and has now converted each of his last 21 save chances dating back to last season...that is tied for the third longest streak in Oakland history...his last blown save came on April 29, 2012 at Baltimore.
- Has a .231 opponents batting average, including .091 (1 for 11) against left-handed hitters compared to .333 (5 for 15) against right-handers.
- Had a win in three appearances against Boston last year (3.0 ip, 4 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 2 so)...has a 7.71 ERA (14 er in 16.1 ip) in 15 career appearances at Fenway Park.
- Posted a 2.25 ERA in four spring training appearances...opponents were 2 for 14 (.143) with no walks in 4.0 innings...had arthroscopic surgery February 14 to perform a lateral meniscectomy of his right knee and did not pitch in a Cactus League game until March 21.
- Had two stints as the A's closer in 2012 and saved a team-leading 24 games in a team-high 75 appearances while posting a 2.53 ERA...was charged with just two blown saves and his save percentage of 92.3 ranked fourth in the American League...was 10th in saves.

FOR STARTERS: Is scheduled to make his fourth start of the season...the A's are 3-0 in his starting assignments this year and 17-10 (.630) in his career...his teams are 214-164 (.566) in his 378 career starting assignments...has tossed six or more innings in each of his three starts this year, allowed two runs or fewer once and walked two batters or fewer all three times.

DON'T WALK: Has not walked a batter over his first three starts and 19.0 innings...is the first Athletics pitcher since at least 1916 to start the season with three consecutive games of five or more innings and no walks...now has a four-game streak with no walks and at least five innings pitched dating back to last year, which is the longest streak by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1916...issued just 23 walks in 152.1 innings last year for an average of 1.36 per nine innings, which was the lowest mark of his career...struck out 91 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 3.96, which was also a career-best...had a .292 opponents on-base percentage, which was second only to his .291 mark in 2005 with the Angels...averaged 14.1 pitches per inning, which was the lowest figure of his career...did not have enough innings to qualify for the league leaders...based on a minimum of 150 innings pitched, he averaged the fewest walks per nine innings in the American League and the fewest pitches per inning in the majors...using the same minimum, he ranked fourth in the AL in fewest pitches per start (89.2), fifth in strikeout to walk ratio and seventh in opponents on-base percentage.

THE LONG BALL: Has allowed two home runs, both three-run shots by left-handed hitters...surrendered 14 of his 17 home runs last year and 41 of his 53 over his last four years to lefties...however, 16 of his 17 home runs last year and 43 of his 51 over his previous three seasons were solo shots.

DOMINICAN LEADERS: His 173 wins are third most among Dominican-born pitchers behind Juan Marichal (243) and Pedro Martinez (219)...also ranks third among Dominicans in games started (378), innings pitched (2412.1) and strikeouts (1843).

SUSPENDED: Was reinstated from the suspended list April 6...was suspended for 50 games Aug. 22, 2012 after testing positive for Testosterone, a performance-enhancing substance in violation of Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program...served the final 40 games of the 2012 season, five games in the playoffs and the first five games this year.

FIRST START: He was the winning pitcher in the A's 6-3 win at Houston April 6...retired 11 of the first 12 batters...had a 1-0 lead when he allowed a three-run home run to Castro in the fourth innings...those were the only runs he would allow in six innings and the A's scored four times in the sixth for the win.

THIS SPRING: Was 1-2 with a 6.30 ERA (20.0 ip, 31 h, 17 r, 14 er, 1 bb, 22 so, 2 hr) in six games, including three starts, this spring...allowed a .344 (31 for 90) opponents batting average but issued just one walk in 20.0 innings...struck out a team leading 22, which tied for ninth in the Cactus League...also started in a minor league game against the Angels March 20 (5.0 ip, 10 h, 5 r, 2 bb, 3 so).

THE DISABLED LIST: Was 6-7 with a 4.22 ERA in 15 starts when he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 23 retroactive to June 18 with a strained right oblique...it was his ninth career stint on the DL...was reinstated July 3 and went 4-2 with a 2.30 ERA over his final nine starts.

SECOND START: He had a no decision in the A's 9-5 win at Los Angeles April 9...surrendered a career-high tying nine hits in just 3.1 innings...also walked three batters but yielded just two runs...had a 4-0 lead when he allowed RBI singles to Trumbo and Callaspo in the third...was relieved by Resop after loading the bases with one out in the fourth...Resop escaped the jam and the A's scored five times in the seventh for the win.

THIRD START: He was the losing pitcher in the A's 10-1 loss to Detroit April 14 in Oakland...allowed a career-high eight runs on a career-high tying nine hits in just 3.1 innings...allowed a Hunter RBI double and a Martinez RBI single in the first and a Jackson two-run home run in the second...then allowed a two-run single to Cabrera and a RBI double to Fielder in the fourth before he was relieved by Scribner, who allowed Fielder to score on a Dirks RBI single.

LAST START: He lost his third consecutive decision in the A's 1-0 loss at Tampa Bay last Saturday...allowed a leadoff home run to Joyce in the second inning, but that was the only run he would allow in 6.1 innings...blanked the Rays on four hits and two walks over his final 4.1 innings...Hellickson, Peralta and Rodney combined to shutout the A's on three hits and a walk.

PARKER vs. BALTIMORE: Is 1-0 with a 6.00 ERA (12.0 ip, 15 h, 8 r, 8 er, 2 bb, 13 so) in two career starts, both last year...the no decision came in a 14-9 A's win at Baltimore July 27...had a 5-0 lead when he allowed a solo home run to Davis in the second...also allowed a RBI double to Hardy in the third and then surrendered four runs in the fifth inning on a Hardy RBI single and a Jones three-run home run...the A's scored three times in the sixth and he was relieved by Norberto to start the bottom of the sixth with an 8-6 lead...the bullpen allowed three runs in the eighth inning...the win came in a 5-2 decision at Oakland September 15...allowed single runs in the second and third innings on a Reynolds RBI double and a McLouth solo home run...the A's then scored five times in the bottom of the third and he blanked the Orioles on three hits and a walk over his final four innings.

THIS SPRING: Was 0-2 with a 7.45 ERA (19.1 ip, 25 h, 18 r, 16 er, 5 bb, 13 so, 5 hr) in five games, all starts...also pitched in the A's minor league camp on the A's off day March 6...allowed a .309 (25 for 81) opponents batting average.

2012 RECAP: Was one of three players acquired from Arizona in the Trevor Cahill trade during the offseason and went 13-8 with a 3.47 ERA in 29 starts...tied with fellow rookie Tommy Milone for the team lead in wins as they both set an Oakland record for wins by a rookie...the previous mark of 12 was held by Chris Codiroli (1983) and Joe Blanton (2005)...had the most wins by an Athletics rookie since Harry Byrd won 15 games for the 1952 Philadelphia A's en route to Rookie of the Year honors...the A's became the first team since the 1952 Brooklyn Dodgers to have two rookies win 13 or more games (Joe Black 15, Billy Loes 13)...it was the second time in Oakland history the A's had two rookie 10-game winners...the other time was in 2009 (Anderson 11, Cahill 10)...with Milone making 31 starts, this was the third time in Oakland history the A's had two rookies with 20 or more starts (Keough and Johnson in 1978; Anderson and Cahill in 2009)...led the A's with 140 strikeouts, which was the third best mark by a rookie in Oakland history and the fourth best in Athletics history...his 29 starts were 10th most by an Oakland rookie.

ROOKIE LEADERS: Tied for second among American League rookies in wins, ranked fourth in strikeouts and innings pitched (181.1) and tied for fourth in starts...his ERA was the lowest among AL rookies with 130 or more innings, his .619 winning percentage was second best and his .248 opponents batting average was third best...received one third place vote in the BBWAA AL Rookie of the Year balloting and finished fifth

AMONG THE LEADERS: His winning percentage was 10th best among all AL pitchers...allowed just 11 home runs in 181.1 innings, an average of 0.55 per nine innings...that was the second lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors...had a .358 opponents slugging percentage, which was sixth lowest in the AL...tied for first in the AL in sacrifice hits allowed (7), tied for third in sacrifice flies (8), ranked fifth in stolen bases against (21) and tied for sixth in wild pitches (10).

OPPONENTS BATTING: Allowed a .248 opponents batting average, including .247 (86-for-348) against left-handed hitters and .248 (80-for-322) against right-handers...opponents hit .215 with runners in scoring position, which ranked fourth lowest in the AL...yielded a .173 batting average to the number three hitter in the order, which was fourth lowest in the AL...eight of the 11 home runs he allowed were solo shots.

BASES ON BALLS: Issued a team-leading 63 walks, which were the fewest by a team-leader in a non-strike season in Oakland history...the previous low was 69 by Doug Johns in 1996...walked four batters or more in six of his first 12 starts (36 bb in 73.2 ip, 4.40 per nine innings)...then walked three batters or fewer in each of his final 17 starts (27 bb in 107.2 ip, 2.26 per nine innings).

THIS AND THAT: Went 5-3 with a 2.46 ERA and .209 opponents batting average over his first 13 starts, 2-4 with a 6.15 ERA and .309 opponents average over a seven-start stretch from July 7 to Aug. 14 and 6-1 with a 3.00 ERA and .252 opponents average over his final nine starts...had eight wins after the All-Star Break, which tied for third in the AL.
