Has spent parts of each of the last two seasons in the majors with the Chicago Cubs and is a .194 hitter with 10 home runs and 30 RBI in 81 games...was originally signed by the Cubs as a non-drafted free agent Nov. 3, 2008 and is a .274 (675-for-2,460) career hitter with 124 doubles, 51 triples, 52 homers, 290 RBI and 128 stolen bases in seven minor league seasons...was named a Pacific Coast League Midseason All-Star with Triple-A Iowa in 2014 and 2015, a Southern League Midseason and Postseason All-Star with Double-A Tennessee in 2013 and a Florida State League Midseason All-Star with Single-A Daytona in 2012...named the seventh-best Cubs prospect heading into the 2014 season by *Baseball America*...tabbed as the 10th-best Cubs prospect prior to the 2013 season...earned a spot on the Topps Double-A All-Star team in 2013...was selected to play for the World Team in the 15th annual Sirius/XM All-Star Futures Game July 14, 2013 at Citi Field in New York as part of Major League Baseball's All-Star Weekend.

2015 HIGHLIGHTS

Began the season with Chicago, appearing in 11 games from April 5-19 before he was optioned to Triple-A Iowa, April 20...posted a .077 average (2-for-26) with five runs scored and a RBI with the Cubs...made six starts at second base and one start at third, with the Cubs going 5-2 in his seven starts...recorded a walk-off single against the Reds in the Cubs 7-6 triumph, April 13...it was the Cubs first walk-off victory of the season...was named a Pacific Coast League Midseason All-Star for the second-straight season with Iowa...batted .231 with 20 doubles, a league-leading 10 triples, 12 home runs, 36 RBI and 16 stolen bases in 120 games...was the only PCL Player with 10 or more doubles, triples and homers...belted two solo homers, June 15 at Omaha.

2014—Batted .205 with 11 doubles, two triples, 10 homers and 29 RBI in 70 games in his Major League debut with the Cubs...his 10 home runs ranked fourth among National League rookies, three shy of the Mets' Travis d'Arnaud, who led with 13 homers...made 48 starts in center field and 21 starts at second base...hit .244 with three home runs against lefties...batted .190 with seven homers against right-handed pitchers...had eight stolen bases, and was caught stealing five times...was promoted to Chicago and made his Major League debut July 9 at Cincinnati...went 0-for-4 in a start at second base...had four hits and three RBI, July 10 in Cincinnati, in his second career game...is the fourth Cub since 1914 to collect a four-hit effort within his first two career games, the first since Don Johnson on Sept. 27, 1943 vs. the New York Giants...became the first NL player to turn the trick since Washington's Ian Desmond did so on Sept. 12, 2009 at the Marlins...belted his first career home run, July 13 vs. Atlanta, a two-run shot off Julio Teheran...had a career-high six-game hitting streak, Aug. 21-27...batted .375 (9-for-24) with two homers and four RBI during the run...belted five homers over a 10-game stretch from Aug. 24-Sept. 2...had a .914 OPS during the run...began the year with Triple-A Iowa, his first season at that level...was named a Pacific Coast League Midseason All-Star...hit .307 with 25 doubles, 11 triples, 10 home runs, 41 RBI and 21 stolen bases in 89 games prior to his call-up...was the only minor league player to reach 25 doubles, 10 triples, 10 home runs and 20 stolen bases at the time of his promotion to the Cubs on July 9...played 19 games with Lacey in the Dominican Winter League and batted .324 with four home runs and eight RBI...participated in the Cubs Rookie Development Program.

2013—Saw his first action at the Double-A level and set minor league career highs in almost every offensive category, batting .271 with 36 doubles, four triples, 15 home runs, 69 RBI, 69 runs scored and

31 stolen bases in 133 games with Tennessee...named a Southern League Midseason and Postseason All-Star...ranked second in the SL with 134 hits, 36 doubles and 55 extra-base hits, tied for third with 31 stolen bases and was fourth with 223 total bases...earned a spot on the Topps Double-A All-Star team...tallied 62 walks leading to a .352 on-base percentage and an .804 OPS...hit .347 with runners in scoring position...batted .333 with nine RBI with the bases loaded...was selected to play for the World Team in the 15th annual Sirius/XM All-Star Futures Game July 14, 2013 at Citi Field in New York as part of Major League Baseball's All-Star Weekend...started at second base, going 1-for-3 with a solo homer in the World Team's 4-2 loss to the U.S. Team...played with Tigres del Lacey in the Dominican Winter League, batting .200 in 17 games...named the seventh-best Cubs prospect heading into the 2014 season by *Baseball America*.

2012—Hit .302 with 13 doubles, seven triples, seven homers, 51 RBI and 25 stolen bases in 85 games with Single-A Daytona before breaking a bone in his foot July 11, ending his season...named a Florida State League Midseason All-Star...batted .325 from May 1-July 11 (the end of his season) after hitting just .232 in 23 April contests...boasted a .354 batting average with runners in scoring position, a .342 mark with RISP and two outs and a .333 batting average with nine RBI with the bases loaded...collected a season-best 11-game hitting streak May 3-16, hitting .422 (19-for-45) with six multi-hit contests during the span...play with Tigres del Lacey in the Dominican Winter League, batting .333 (4-for-12) in 23 games...was tabbed as the 10th-best Cubs prospect prior to the 2013 season.

Was selected by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 20th round of the 2012 draft and went 15-19 with a 3.41 ERA and .227 opponents batting average in 72 games, 43 starts, over his first four seasons in the Los Angeles organization...averaged better than a strikeout per inning during the course of his career with 344 strikeouts in 311.1 innings...pitched for Glendale in the Arizona Fall League following the 2015 season...was rated as the Dodgers ninth best prospect by *Baseball America* prior to the 2016 season...ranked second in the California League with 138 strikeouts in 2014...was a Midseason Midwest League All-Star in 2013.

2015 HIGHLIGHTS

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Spent the first seven seasons of his professional career in the Milwaukee organization...was traded to the A's prior to the start of Spring Training in 2016...made his Major League debut with the Brewers in 2013 and hit .250 with 60 home runs and 162 RBI in 321 games over three seasons with Milwaukee...has appeared exclusively in left field on defense (276 games, 268 starts)...played in the Arizona Fall League in 2012...was a Midwest League Postseason All-Star in 2010.

Batted .247 with a career-high 27 home runs and 66 RBI in 121 games with Milwaukee...also had career highs in walks (44) and stolen bases (6) and matched his best in triples (2) and strikeouts (122)...led the Brewers and tied for 10th in the National League in home runs despite spending over a month of the season on the DL with a torn meniscus in his right knee...hit 21 of his home runs after the All-Star Break, which ranked second in the NL to the Rockies Carlos Gonzalez (27) and tied for third in the majors (Davis, BAL 28)...tied for fifth in the NL in post-break RBI (48)...had just six home runs and 18 RBI in 50 games before the break...had five games with two or more home runs, which tied for third most in the NL...batted .260 (75-for-288) against right-handed pitchers compared to .212 (22-for-104) against left-handers...hit .296 with 16 home runs and 43 RBI in 66 games at home...190 with 11 home runs and 23 RBI in 55 games on the road...tied for eighth in the NL in home runs at home...hit 15 home runs in 41 day games (fourth in the NL), 12 in 80 contests at night...10 of his home runs came in the seventh inning or later, which tied for third in the NL...batted .298 with 10 home runs when leading off an inning...made 107 starts, all in left field...committed five errors, which were the most among NL left fielders and tied for the most in the majors...had just one assist in 108 games overall in the outfield...went 4-for-11 (.364) with two walks, two home runs and three RBI as a pinch hitter...tied for third in the NL in pinch homers...saw his most action with 48 starts batting fifth and 31 hitting clean-up...started games at every spot in the order except third, eighth and ninth.

runs and 27 RBI in 56 games with the Brewers...made 32 starts (30 in left field, two at designated hitter)...had three stints with the Brewers (Opening Day-May 1, July 12-14 and July 23-end of season)...batted .294 (35-for-119) with 11 home runs and 27 RBI in 41 games during his final stint with the Brewers, replacing the suspended Ryan Braun...led the team in home runs (11) and tied Carlos Gomez and Jonathan Lucroy for the team lead in RBI (27) following his July 23 recall...made his Major League debut on Opening Day against Colorado and grounded into a fielder's choice as a pinch-hitter...recorded his first ML hit with a double off Patrick Corbin April 6 against Arizona...hit his first ML homer with a pinch-hit solo shot off Colt Hynes July 23 against San Diego...became the fifth player in franchise history to hit his first career ML homer as a pinch-hitter, joining Bob Hansen (1974), Trent Durrington (2004), Prince Fielder (2005) and Taylor Green (2012)...batted .255 with 13 home runs and 37 RBI in 69 games at Triple-A Nashville.
